Michigan Mirror

Is Stephen J. Roth planning to oppose Senator Blair Moody in the 1952 senatorial primary? In his outburst against Neil Staebler, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, which involved Democratic party fund raisers soliciting campaign contributions from high G.O.P. officials, Roth registered high shock and righteous indignation and spoke out "for the party good."

Roth was by-passed by the appointment of ex-newspaperman Blair Moody to the senatorial seat left vacant by the death of Senator Arthur Vandenberg.

Says one columnist: "Roth was simply sticking a needle into the Williams administration to see how tender it might be and whether there were any others around with needles they wanted to stick."

In any event, the coming senatorial race becomes more keenly contested.

The state legislature will meet August 20 to validate plans for building a new state office building. Governor Williams limited the subject matter to that one item with no present plan to open the session to any other discussion. In special sessions the legislature may consider only subjects opened by the governor.

Price news is fair to good. Newspapers are littered with ads stressing bargains and clearance sales. Food price predictions are optimistic. But some price cuts take a long time sifting through distribution channels.

Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson has given Detroit a verbal spat for farming out too many defense contracts. He says: "Too much of the military business placed in Detroit is being so distributed by the large industries as to leave Detroit for business as usual. This in turn accounts for some of the present unemployment."

Makes things look tough for a committee named by the governor to channel more government business to the state.

Sen. Blair Moody says, however, that a speed-up in war production contracts will cushion unemployment shock for most of the cities in the state.

Cass Hough, Daisy Air Rifle Company executive (Plymouth) says the "mental and physical aptness on the part of all our people" came closest to explaining the present economic difficulties of the nation. He was addressing the economic education workshop at Michigan State College.

The Public Relations Division of the State Highway Department costs the state \$120,000 each year. Now under a new "policy" all highway stories must be cleared through a \$7,400-a-year administrative aide, Elmer Hanna. The new "policy" came to light when Hanna objected to a news story quoting a department staff expert instead of Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler.

Fire damage to Michigan forests has fallen off this year. Thus far 536 fires have burned 3,613 acres as compared with 637 fires, damaging 4,218 during the same period a year ago.

This week 18 conservation officer trainees will be selected. They will take eight weeks of classroom instruction and four to six months of field training.

Archery is a favorite sport of many Michigan residents. In 1950 there were 14,670 residents and 815 non-resident bow and arrow hunters roaming the state.

The combined spring and fall Michigan pig crop is estimated at 106 million head—5 percent above over the same period last year—49 average.

Southern Michigan construction contract awards for the first six months of 1951 were up 6 percent over the same period of last year—all in the face of credit curbs. June total was \$153,798,000. Six-months total for 1951 is \$442,371,000 as against \$416,910,000 for that period in 1950.

Wrecked Cars In Sunday's Collision

Traffic on congested U.S. 12 became virtually clogged shortly after eight o'clock last Sunday evening when nine persons were injured in a head-on collision east of Watervliet in front of the Jonas farm. All occupants of the two cars were rushed to Community Hospital, Watervliet, although three of the victims were later removed to Mercy hospital, Benton Harbor.

The collision took place between a car driven by Alfred Hotchkiss 43, Augusta, in which his wife and four children were riding, and a car driven by George D. Lyons, 35, Benton Harbor, who was riding alone. Sheriff's officers investigating the accident attributed it to a tire blow-

out suffered by the Lyons car which was west-bound on U.S. 12 and which was, in consequence, thrown directly in front of the Hotchkiss car.

The injured besides the drivers of the two cars were: Louise Hotchkiss 33, wife of Alfred Hotchkiss and the Hotchkiss children, Robert, 14, Roland and Berlin, 12, Cedric, 10, Andreana, 13, and Clifford, 11.

Ambulances from Watervliet and Hartford were both summoned and was the Watervliet Fire Department which played a large part in extricating the victims and clearing up the wreckage. Although all the injured were first brought to the local hospital, Lyons and Clifford and Cedric Hotchkiss were later removed to Mercy Hospital.

Mayor Bridges Resigns As Maintenance Man For Watervliet City

"You can assign the reason for my resigning as maintenance superintendent to the press of other business, the need of a rest or—to being just plain tired of the bickering which goes on at the city commission meetings." So said Mayor Alden E. Bridges later when his resignation as superintendent, tendered at the regular city commission meeting held on Tuesday evening of this week. The dual job of the city's chief executive and head of the city's maintenance department has been a highly controversial one. Notwithstanding the fact that many thought the two jobs together wrong in principle, probably the majority of Watervliet residents were quick to admit that they thought Mayor Bridges rated a high average for performance.

The city commission adopted a resolution expressing the city's appreciation to Mr. Howard Kimball, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Kimball, Pleasant street, for his services to his community. Young Kimball is just home from Korea under the army's rotation plan.

Prospective consumers here of natural gas for home heating were given a set-back as a result of a letter received by the commission from Earl Coon, area manager for the National Utilities Company in which he advised that the Gas Company would be unable to accept any more customers locally for space heating as of August 3rd.

Commissioner Richard Rogers was appointed and confirmed as a member of the board of the Baldwin Field Corporation. He succeeds Clayton Rowe whose term of office had expired.

Commissioner Andrew J. Hutchins, his remarks pointed at Mayor Bridges and the water committee headed by Dr. Deane Fizzell, took exception to the manner in which the city had proceeded in driving new wells and spending some \$25,000 on what now appears to be Watervliet Paper Company property, in small part. The Paper Company has indicated, through its Attorney Charles Gore, that it would be willing to sell all of the property in question to the city for \$250,000. The Water Committee was instructed to confer with G. K. Ferguson, president and general manager of the company, regarding the acquisition.

Twenty-nine patients were admitted to the hospital during the week ending August 4th. Five of these patients were surgical, fourteen medical, nine obstetrical and one was an accident.

Miss Edith Harper, R. N., has joined our staff of nurses. Miss Harper is a graduate of the Baptist Hospital of Little Rock, Arkansas.

While delivering milk on his milk route last Tuesday morning, R. V. Russell slipped and fell cutting his right hand quite badly. He was brought to the hospital and taken to surgery. Mr. Russell will probably be in the hospital for a while.

By now, everyone knows of the horrible accident of last Sunday when the nine people were injured in a head-on crash just east of town on U. S. - 12. As most people are aware, our little hospital is almost always filled to capacity and nine injured patients is a terrible load on our facilities. However, we were able to care for six of these victims and the other three were given emergency treatment and transferred to Mercy Hospital.

There are always many incidents that occur when we have an accident like this — while not any of us want these terrible things to happen when they do, it gives us a warm feeling to know that we have so many good friends. When we were afraid that our supply of plasma would not be adequate, we called Richard Hocking, Administrator of Mercy Hospital, and asked if we might borrow plasma from them. We requested that he give it to Andrew Hutchins to be brought back when he took the three victims in — but Mr. Hocking did not wait for Mr. Hutchins, he delivered it in person and all were surprised to see him come walking into the emergency entrance with his precious burden.

Then too, many of our trained Watervliet friends called in when they heard the sirens. Mrs. Ruth Shimer came to the hospital almost immediately bringing her guest, who was a registered nurse, and they both worked far into the night. In fact, almost our entire staff reported for duty when they heard of the accident — those already on duty stayed many hours beyond their regular hours. Mrs. Orrial Bridges was visiting her mother and she too added a great deal by talking with the patients on the second floor who were upset by the commotion the accident caused.

The six members of the family who are hospitalized with us are doing fairly well with the exception of the mother — at this writing her condition is not too good.

High over a war-devastated peninsula, a giant weather-wheel is swinging. As winds reverse their direction, the steadily hand of the Asiatic monsoon breaks the grip of winter.

Korea's summer monsoons will last through September. The southerly winds normally bring about ten times as much rain in July as in January, wettest and driest months of the year respectively.

Waiting cyclonic storms roar down from Manchuria and east from central China. Fog rolls in from the Sea of Japan.

Summer Typhoons. In early June begins the critical season for great tropical typhoons. From the region of the Marianas Islands far out in the Pacific, these storms sweep west-northwest into the China Sea.

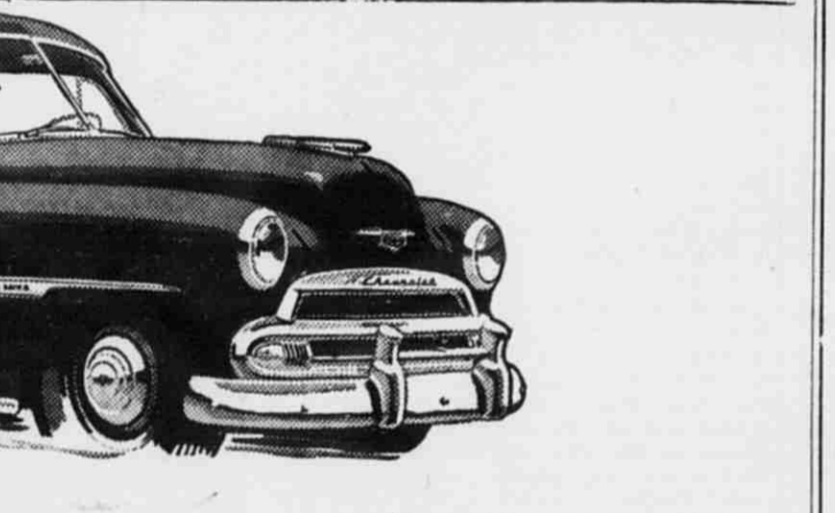

German Police Chiefs Visit Watervliet

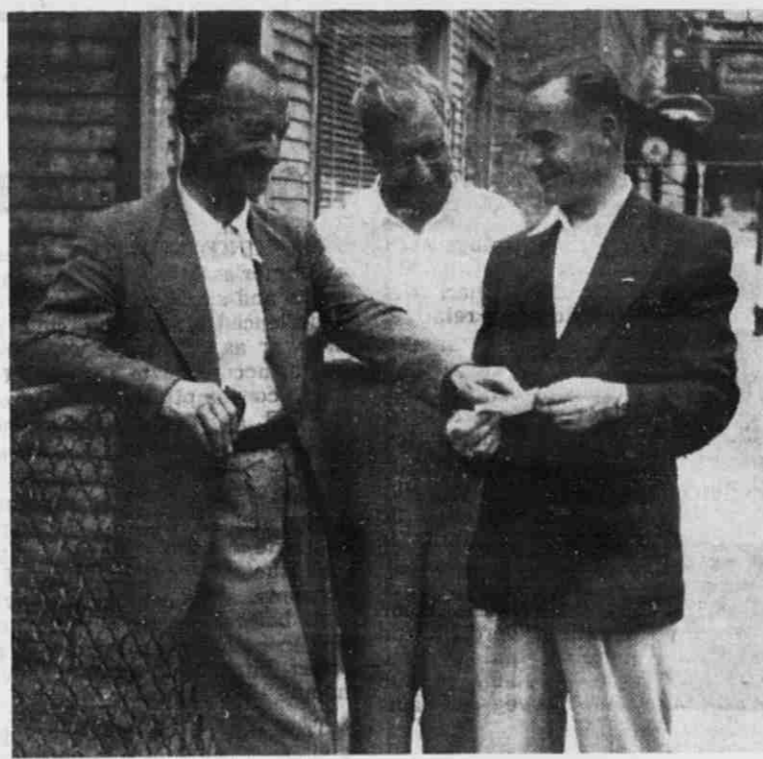

In the main they were in Berrien County to study the methods of Sheriff Erwin H. Kubath. They had just completed a five weeks accelerated course in police work at Michigan State College and had studied city police methods in Detroit and Flint. Their study here encompassed court procedure in circuit and probate courts with special reference to the juvenile division of the probate court. Chief Wehren explained that the juvenile work was of especial interest to them because in Germany all juvenile cases are handled by the judge. Of added local interest is the fact

that a visit was paid to Herman Epple. Chief Supper is acquainted with the local man's brother in Stuttgart, where the latter is engaged in business.

The German law enforcement officers returned to Lansing on Monday of this week for five days observation at the Michigan State Police Post. From there they will go to Toledo, Chicago and Washington, D. C. thence to New York for the return flight to Germany.

The German police chiefs, under their sponsoring organization were allowed plane fares both ways and \$10.00 per day expenses while in this country. All three were on Hitler's so-called black list and they feel that only the timely arrival of the American troops prevented their liquidation.

The trio of police executives expressed themselves as greatly impressed with Berrien County and its hospitality.
