DECEMBER, 1944.

In spite of adverse weather conditions, we participated in 20 combat missions against enemy communications in Italy.

The Holiday Season of Christmas and New Years was celebrated in the accustomed manner...a flood of gift packages from our families and friends at home came in.

Recreation was found in the form of movies in our outdoor "theater"...contests of pinochle, ping-pong and cribbage....rest-camp trips to Corte, Cairo, Capri and Rome.

Under the new Educational program, Orientation lectures were given every Wednesday evening, with guest speakers leading a discussion on topics of current interest.

The progress of the War in Western Europe was of primary interest to us all, especially in the face of the enemy's fierce counterattacks. But our Faith in an Allied Victory has never been shaken. Realizing that the Campaign is not yet over, we are sticking to our assigned tasks and looking forward to The Day when more than two years in a combat zone will bear fruit.

Combat men returned to the States after completing their tour of duty...new crews came in to add their efforts to the glorious record established by the 379th Bomb Sqdn...

So ended another month and another year of combat activity...1945 begins. This is the year of Victory we have been waiting for patiently!

Section II.Squadron Diary, Day by Day: DECEMBER.

- 1st None of our planes participated in the day's mission. Usual Squadron activities.
- 2nd Twelve of our aircraft participated on the mission to bomb the Ala Railroad Bridge, Italy. Flak was scant to moderate, heavy, inaccurate. Fire bombs and frags were also used to knock out enemy gun positions. Bets ran high on the outcome of the Army-Navy game. Movie: A good Wallace Beery flicker about a gold-mining town in the 1880's. Today marks two years of combat operations for the Group, and we are still going strong!
- 3rd Today's mission was abortive due to weather conditions over the Faenza front. We had fried chicken and ice cream for dinner.
- 4th T/Sgt. Terrence C. Bogue and T/Sgt. Eli Jaffe were assigned to the 7th Replacement Depot for transhipment to the U.S. The following Officers and Enlisted Men were also relieved from assignment to the Squadron and were assigned to the 7th Replacement Depot for transhipment to the U.S.:
1st Lt. Charles B. Robinson, S/Sgt. Marvin F. Creamer, S/Sgt. Vitold D. Gabys, S/Sgt. Fred D. Andrews, S/Sgt. Dennis O. Karraker, S/Sgt. Thomas M. Smith.
Twelve planes hit the enemy defense area at Faenza, Italy.
- 5th A formation was held to present combat medals.
No mission.
- 6th No mission. Xmas packages are starting to arrive.
- 7th T/5 Philip R. Jackson was promoted to the grade of Cpl. More Xmas packages are arriving. Immunization shots were given at the Squadron Dispensary.
- 8th No mission. One plane was sent out on weather recce.
A gun inspection was held with guns found to be generally in good condition. A big wind whipped through the camp during the night.
1st Lt. Charles T. Gilbo, 1st Lt. Richard C. King, 1st Lt. Joseph F. Longo, were assigned to the 7th Replacement Depot for transhipment to the U.S.
Sgt. Luther J. Burgess and Pfc Jean F. Patterson left on a 10-day furlough in the Mediterranean Area.
- 9th No mission. P.X. rations were sold. The 381st beat our basketball team, 26 to 20. Movie: A cowboy picture, "Tall In the Saddle."
- 10th Chicken for dinner. The foundation was started for our new Enlisted Men's mess-hall. Mission to bomb the San Ambrogio tunnel and fill, Italy.

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- 11th Laundry was turned in today. Steak for supper. No mission, with just the usual field duties.
- 12th No mission. Movie: "Hail The Conquering Hero," an Eddie Bracken comedy.
- 13th No mission. We were entertained by a U.S.O. stage show, with 3 guys and 3 gals putting on a good show. 2nd Lt. Daniel E. Sachs and 2nd Lt. Frank E. Sullivan, Jr. were appointed 1st Lts. 2nd Lt. John E. Jones was also appointed 1st Lt. 2nd Lt. Thomas I. Smith was appointed 1st Lt.
- 14th Twelve aircraft participated in the mission to bomb the Tortona ammunition dump, Italy. The Bridge at Parma was also hit by several of our planes. Chicken for dinner, and steak for supper. The Intelligence Section received a commendation from the Squadron Commander, Lt. Col. Wetzel, for a job well-done, which made each man in the S-2 section very proud indeed! Pvt. Joe Johnson was a proud poppa today...he received word that his wife gave birth to a baby girl.
- 15th Eighteen ships went on the mission to bomb the Cremona Ammunition Dump, Italy. A word of praise is in line for the men who worked on the construction of the new Enlisted Men's mess-hall...they included T/Sgt. Edward S. Davis, S/Sgt. Robert J. Awve, S/Sgt. Arnold V. Fort, and Cpl. Wilbur A. Anderson.
- 16th No mission. Movie: "Sensations of 1945," with W.C. Fields and Eleanor Powell.
- 17th No mission. A new type green "zoot-suit" field jacket and sweaters were issued to enlisted personnel by Squadron Supply. Several members of the Squadron were authorized to wear "air crew member" aviation badges. Major Rupert A. Nock, Group Intelligence Officer, formerly of the 379th Squadron, left on a well-earned furlough to the States. T/Sgt. Francis J. Beane was assigned to the 7th Replacement Depot for transhipment to the U.S. 1st Lt. Robert M. Lloyd and 1st Lt. Quentin McGaughan were also assigned to the 7th Replacement Depot for transhipment to the U.S. 1st Lt. Edwin R. Yarndley, of the Ordnance section, left for the U.S. on temporary duty.
- 18th No mission. Sgt. Luther J. Burgess and Pfc. Jean P. Patterson returned to duty after a 10-day furlough spent in the Mediterranean area.
- 19th A rainy day, and no mission. Several transports arrived with new combat crews. Fried chicken for dinner. New sleeping bags were issued by Supply. Lt. Zinberg of the S-2 section gave another lecture on aircraft recognition. Movie: "The Hairy Ape," with good acting by William Bendix.

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- 20th No mission. New combat crew members attended a Security Lecture in the Briefing Room. The boys are contributing candy to the Red Cross unit here, to be distributed to the French children in Ghisonaccia for Xmas. A series of cribbage, pinochle, and ping-pong contests are to be started to "pass the long nights away."
- 21st No mission. A rainy day.
- 22nd Eighteen aircraft participated in the mission to bomb the Pordenone Railroad Bridge, Italy. P.X. rations were sold today.
- 23rd No mission. A bitter cold day. More Xmas packages came in. Movie: A comedy with Olsen and Johnson, but the cold weather kept many away, snug in their tents by warm stoves.
- 24th No mission. The Officers Club has been renovated and a new War Room is being set up by the S-2 officers. Nine bottles of beer were issued to each Enlisted Man free, thru the generosity of the Officers in our Squadron. We all agreed it was a grand Xmas present. Parties were held in the Officer's Club and the Enlisted Men's Bar. Midnight mass was held in the Briefing Room, which had been redecorated for the occasion.
- 25th Christmas Day. No mission. The men just took it easy, recuperating from last night's indulgences! Turkey for dinner.
- 26th Sgt. Robert J. Awve, Sgt. Kenneth Baker, Sgt. Marvin G. Davis, Sgt. Martin J. Lawless were promoted to the grade of S/Sgt.... Cpl. Wilbur L. Anderson, Cpl. Edward J. Barndt, Cpl. Arch C. Harvey Jr., were promoted to the grade of Sgt.... Pfc Alfred H. Armstrong, Pfc Joseph Y. Bennett, Pfc Gerald V. Ellis, Pfc Raymond J. Morris, Pfc Edd H. Rhodes, Pvt. Boyce A. Brannon, Pvt. Arden E. Falk, and Pvt. Melvin R. Zimmerman were promoted to the grade of Cpl.... These were the first promotions among ground personnel in a LONG TIME! Eighteen aircraft participated in the mission to bomb the Bologna ammunition dump, Italy. Beaucoup hangovers from Xmas cheer! More packages came in.
- 27th Fresh eggs for breakfast. 2nd Lt. Noah T. Shirley, Jr. was promoted to 1st Lt. 2nd Lt. George P. Parry Jr., 2nd Lt. Thomas Van Arnam, 2nd Lt. Richard W. Wagner, were promoted to the rank of 1st Lt.... Eighteen aircraft bombed the Bologna ammunition dump, Italy.
- 28th Fourteen ships bombed enemy troop concentrations at Aulla, Italy.
- 29th Cpl. Paul A. Basso, Cpl. William H.M. Carr, Cpl. James V. Casconi, Cpl. Frank M. Faff, Cpl. James D. Nelsen, Cpl. George Prout, Cpl. Robert E. Stewart, and Cpl. Marvin R. Wedel were promoted to the grade of sergeant...

30th Six aircraft participated in the mission to bomb the Dolce Rail Fill in Italy. Flak was moderate, heavy, and accurate, and several ships were hit.

31st New Years Eve, and a dance was given in Corte for the boys of the motor pool and their guests. It was a great success. To celebrate the end of a year of Victories for the Allies, the men spent a joyous evening in visiting from tent to tent and sharing whatever beverages could be obtained for this occasion...On the whole, celebrating was orderly... Six aircraft participated in the mission to Canale D'Isonzo rail bridge, and six other planes hit the Bologna Ammunition dump.

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On the last day of December 1944, the 379th Bomb Squadron had 105 Officers assigned, and 365 Enlisted Men assigned...

1. The attached photograph was made by an alert photographer of 310 Bomb Group on 22 December, when a formation was detailed to attack Pordenone Rail Bridge. It is a very clear photograph of good scale showing a new rail diversion bridge 390 yards north of Motta di Livenza Rail Bridge. It was seen to be completed since 11 December, when photographs taken by 340 Group showed that construction on the bridge itself had not yet been started.

2. This photograph furnished the first information available to this headquarters regarding the completion of the bridge. Additional prints were made from the negative and were forwarded immediately to all Groups of this Wing. On the basis of information obtained from the print, the bridge was scheduled as a target for 340 Group.

3. The efforts of unit photographers to obtain recce-photographs enroute are proving to be worthwhile and their vigilance is praiseworthy.

On 11 November 1944, Lt Hacking led a twenty-four plane formation in an attack upon a railroad bridge at Casale Monferrato, Italy. Upon the commencement of the bomb run, shell fragments from intense anti-aircraft fire heavily damaged his airplane. Displaying great courage and determined leadership in the face of this accurate barrage, Lt Hacking maintained his crippled plane in the lead position for a perfect run over the objective. S E C R E T

Orientation lectures and discussions were held on Wednesday evenings in the enlisted men's Day Room...these constituted a great part of the Educational program organized in the Squadron by Capt. Philip M. Canale Jr., and 1st Lt. David M. Cohen.... The program for the month of December was as follows:

1. C.B.I. Theatre...the guest speaker was Lt. Suey Wong, pilot of the 380th Bomb Sqdn., who had lived in China until 1937.
2. Lecture on the Russian Front...the guest speaker was Capt. Witold Rodzinski, Communications Officer of the 428th Bomb Sqdn.
3. Lecture on the Pacific Theatre...presented by Capt. Henry Gilliam, G.L.D.
4. General War Review...by Lt. David M. Cohen and a talk on "Inside Germany," by Lt. Arthur D. Zinberg.

Following is an outline of an Orientation Lecture on the C.B.I. Theatre, given by Lt. David M. Cohen:

- I. Reasons for added importance of Discussions concerning C.B.I.
 - A. End of war with Germany is in view.
 - B. Most personnel will take an active part in C.B.I.
- II. How long will the war with Japan last?
 - A. War with Japan being lengthened by Nazi's stubborn stand.
 1. Estimates on how long Japan will last are based from the day that Germany falls.
 2. Best sober estimates now available say that an absolute minimum of 18 to 24 months.
 - B. Factors taken in account on Japan's position.
 1. Jap Army now numbers 4 million with another 3½ million available for duty.
 2. Japan's industry is capable of replacing all military losses.
 3. Jap fleet still potent with 12 battleships and 12 aircraft carriers.
 4. Geography is all in her favor.
- III. The C.B.I. Theatre.
 - A. China, Burma, and India.
 1. Includes an area larger than the entire European Theatre.
 2. All except China is known as the Southeast Asia Command and is under the command of Lord Louis Mountbatten.
 3. American forces would be under Gen. Wedemeyer in entire Theatre. He is also Chief of Staff to Chiang Kai-Shek and Deputy Commander to Mountbatten.
 4. The Japs have been fighting in this area for 7 years, and have inflicted great losses to the Allies.

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IV. India Situation.

A. Battle Scope

1. There is no battleground in India. In 1942 incessant Jap bombings had observers guessing that the Japs would launch a full scale attack.
2. The Japs launched a big offensive in the region of the Imphal Plain, but this was broken up.
3. India is a big springboard for the attack against Japan.

V. Burma Situation.

A. Battle Scope

1. Great and fierce battles being fought through the most difficult of jungle country.
2. Gen. Stillwell took the remnants of a Chinese Army out of Burma after taking a decisive beating.
3. Importance of Burma lies in the Burma Road which had been the supply line of the Chinese.
 - a. Burma Road.
 1. Route of the Chinese life-line begins at the Port of Rangoon, then by rail up through Mandalay to Lashio, and then by truck over the curves of the Burma Road to Kunming.

B. Allied offensives in Burma.

1. Offensive started last December to retake northern Burma and open a new road to India to join part of the Burma Road that we still hold.
 - a. New section of road called Ledo Road.
2. Allied troops fighting in Burma.
 - a. Two Chinese divisions, the 22nd and 38th. Both trained and equipped by America.
 - b. Attack behind enemy lines by a picked unit of American guerilla fighters under Gen. Frank Merrill.
 - c. British troops landed 200 miles behind Jap lines. American gliders under the command of Col. Philip Cochran.
 - d. Initial successes have only been fair.
3. British troops from India have also been exerting an effort against the southern and central position of the India-Burma territory.

VI. Chinese Situation.

A. Battle Scope

1. Japan started a big drive to split China in half. This drive had three objectives:
 - a. Occupy all Eastern China and strengthen control of the seacoast.

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- b. Capture or neutralize advanced bases of the 14th Air Force. The attacks from 14th Air Force bombers have cost the Japs almost one million tons of shipping.
- c. Establish an overland route from Manchuria to Singapore.

B. Internal China.

- 1. 10% of the Chinese 450 million are Communists. In the civil war with Chiang Kai-shek's armies in 1926 and 1927, they were driven to northwest China, which they now control.
- 2. A United Front was made by both factions to make a stand against the Japanese. These two factions have not yet combined their forces, and consequently there is much internal dissension in China.

VII. Air Forces in China.

A. Tenth Air Force.

- 1. Made up originally of personnel driven out of the Philippines.
- 2. B-17's made their first raid out of India on 2 April 1942, setting fire to a Jap cruiser and a troopship. Score after two years fighting: 282 victories... 98 losses...

B. B-29 Operations (20th Air Force) (Task Air Force)...

- 1. Based on secret fields in India and inland China.
- 2. More than 100 B-29's hit Jap installations deep in northern China and Manchuria on Sept. 26th... It was a great tribute to both pilots and mechanics that not one man was lost in this operation.

C. Operations of the A.T.C...

- 1. Get vital supplies from India ~~to~~ China by flying it over the mountain barriers of 15,000 to 20,000 feet.


