

Foodies will enjoy a visit to **The Village of Lyons** a restored historic village on the banks of the Grand Canal close to Celbridge, Co. Kildare. Relax and browse through the shops and choose from fine dining or a café experience in beautiful surroundings.

A Thoroughbred Experience

Nowhere better symbolises all that is great about Ireland's equine history, the beating heart of Ireland's thoroughbred industry, than the **National Stud**, one of the stops on Queen Elizabeth's visit to Ireland in 2011. This unique attraction of outstanding natural beauty is home to some of the most magnificent horses and beautiful gardens to be found anywhere in the world. You can learn about Ireland's horse racing industry on a tour of the stud and pay a visit to the adjacent Horse Museum.

Ireland has long been famed for the quality of its thoroughbreds and it's easy to see why. Few things match a day's horse racing for the winning combination of atmosphere and adrenalin rush. Whether you're there to enjoy the ambience, show off your style or make your fortune, this truly is the Sport of Kings. Aside from top quality racing, adults can relax and enjoy the atmosphere of fashion, fine dining and quality entertainment.

Kildare is renowned as the 'Thoroughbred County', with annual festivals and regular meets at the **Curragh, Naas** and **Punchestown** that offer horse racing at its best. In Meath, National Hunt and Flat racing are regularly held at **Fairyhouse** (home of the Irish Grand National), **Bellewstown** (for over 300yrs) and **Navan** which is one of the finest possible tests for National Hunt horses.

Also in Meath, Laytown Races occupy a unique position in the Irish and English racing calendar as it is the only race event run on a beach under the rules of the Turf Club. Usually held in early September, **Laytown** is one of the few remaining beach races in the world. 2015 will be the 148th running of the event which was first recorded in 1868. Don't miss a chance to experience something truly extraordinary!





Experience Movie Locations

Take a trip to Bettystown beach in county Meath, where filming for 'Into the West' took place. Movie Buff's will be in their element with a visit to Trim Castle where scenes for 'Braveheart' were shot, whilst there, why not enjoy a walk beside the River Boyne and enjoy the views, just be careful not to end up in the stocks!

Over the last 85 years, hundreds of films have been made in County Wicklow, known as 'The Garden of Ireland' but now also as the 'Hollywood of Europe'! The rolling mountains, picturesque villages, and the long sandy beaches are features that are recognisable in many film and television productions. The new historical drama 'The Vikings' starring Gabriel Byrne and Travis Fimmel, was also shot on location in County Wicklow.

Serious film fans can visit film locations in Kildare & Wicklow for more locations of 'Braveheart, Camelot, King Arthur, The Tudors, Excalibur, and Michael Collins' to name a few! Think of Killruddery House & Gardens, lately a location for movies like 'Becoming Jane' and 'The Count of Monte Cristo'. Fans of 'Ballykisssangel' can visit the actual village which is Avoca.

There are dedicated 'Braveheart, Excalibur and Michael Collins' film trails for fans to follow and enjoy. Wicklow was also the Irish location for the Hollywood adaptation of Cecilia Ahern's best-selling novel 'P.S. I Love You'.

Make sure to have a camera at the ready, as the scenery along the route is outstanding. A fun activity for children and 'bigger children' even, would be to act out their favourite scene on location. When you get home, you can share your own movie with friends and see if you need to make the Director's cut!





Experience Great Houses

Stately houses and sweeping country estates are a dramatic and often surprising feature of the Irish landscape... and you'll find the absolute highlights in Kildare & Wicklow.

One being Killruddery House & Gardens, Ireland's finest Elizabethan revival mansion or what about the home of Charles Stewart Parnell at Avondale House. Four fabulous statements of Irish Palladian-style architecture include Powerscourt House, Russborough House, Carton House and Castletown House which are all based on the classical temple architecture of the Ancient Greeks and Romans, an 18th century style whose elegance and symmetry reaches its highpoint on Dublin's Doorstep. Or pay a visit to Emo Court in County Laois designed by architect James Gandon in 1790; it is a magnificent example of the new classical style.

All are open to visit (check websites for times and seasons), revealing not just stunning interiors and formal gardens, but several surprises too. Carton House, built for the Earl of Kildare, is today a hotel. Russborough has some amazing artwork... and an absorbing maze. Powerscourt boasts tempting shopping and a terrace café, and Castletown even hosts concerts.

Visit some of the great houses and relive history, enjoy a concert or afternoon tea, or even better, stay for the night!

Experience Heritage

Get away from it all on a break with a difference in the Boyne Valley, Ireland's ancient capital and its most sacred and mythical landscape. The ancient sites and monuments are among the best examples of their kind in Europe and are all within a short distance of each other. In one day you can visit the great prehistoric tombs at the UNESCO World Heritage Site at **Brú na Boinne** (Newgrange), and also the site of the infamous **Battle of the Boyne**.

You can look out from the **Hill of Tara**, sharing the view with the ancient High Kings of Ireland, or be mesmerised by the detail of the **Celtic Crosses** at Kells. You can stand in awe at the gates of **Trim Castle**, the largest Anglo-Norman castle in Europe, or pay your respects at the shrine of **St. Oliver Plunkett**. The choice is yours, so go and experience the Boyne Valley!



Experience Country Gardens

Wicklow is known as Ireland's Garden County, you'll find formal gardens surrounding stately homes, like those at **Powerscourt Estate**, where cascading terraces and Italianate formations were the work of Daniel Robertson. Robertson, said to have suffered from gout, directed operations from a wheelbarrow, fortified by a bottle of sherry. Rumour has it that when the sherry was finished, work ceased for the day!

The Robinsonian gardens at **Mount Usher** recently voted favourite in Ireland by BBC Gardeners' World magazine, strikes a contrasting note to this elegant estate. Here, you'll find rusty-red Japanese maple, Himalayan magnolia and a dainty Wedding Cake Tree amongst other exotic highlights appearing to grow naturally along the banks of the River Vartry.

Or take the **Irish National Stud** in Kildare. Yes, the primary business here is bloodstock, but there are delicately manicured Japanese Gardens here too, created by the Japanese master horticulturist Tassa Eida. A century old, they are amongst the finest of their kind in Europe. Fittingly, here you'll also find a garden dedicated to **Saint Fiachra**, patron saint of gardeners. Little wonder this experience blossoms!

Isn't it time you took some gardening leave? With 11 historic gardens and 3 garden centres on the Boyne Valley Garden trail to navigate your way around! Also worth a visit is **Heyworth Gardens** in Ballinakill, County Laois. These formal gardens were designed by Sir Edwin Lutyens and completed in 1912.

Whether you like your gardens walled or wild, there are some gloriously green and verdant gems to explore all over Dublin's Doorstep!

Experience Walking


Situated close to the geographical centre of Ireland and tucked away in the heart of the midlands, the gentle rolling hills of the **Slieve Bloom Mountains** rise, forming a natural link between Counties Laois and Offaly. Exploring the Slieve Blooms on foot is a great way to immerse yourself in this lovely landscape, made up of forests, blanket bog and hidden valleys which will be of interest to lovers of archaeology and nature.

A hill walkers paradise, as the mountains are not so high as to be dangerous, but can still provide a challenge to every grade of walker with a wide choice of looped walks and long distance way-marked walks. For the more adventurous or experienced, the **Cooley Peninsula** or **Wicklow Way** offers fabulous scenery. Or the experienced rambler can simply take to the hills with a good map and a compass!

Large stretches of the **Inland Waterways** in Kildare have excellent paths for walkers, there are paths along the Grand Canal Main Line, Barrow Line, Naas Branch and part of the Corbally Branch, along the Royal Canal and in the Pollardstown Fen Nature Reserve. The canal towpaths also offer a natural rural walking experience.

The new **Blessington Greenway Walk** links the historic town of Blessington with the Palladian mansion at Russborough House offering splendid views of Blessington Lakes. Choose to walk or cycle and enjoy magnificent scenery, wildlife and natural woodland.

As for accommodation, eateries and pubs which cater to walkers, you'll have plenty to choose from in all of the surrounding areas. So put on those walking boots and take a hike around Dublin's Doorstep!



Kildare

Kildare is renowned as the 'Thoroughbred County', with annual festivals and regular meets at the Curragh, Naas and Punchestown that offer horse racing at its best.

The Irish National Stud is testament to the county's strong horse breeding tradition, where you can learn about Ireland's horse racing industry on a tour of the stud and pay a visit to the adjacent Horse Museum. If you fancy a thrill other than an equine one, motor racing at Mondello Park might be the ticket!

For those with more sedate activities in mind, the county offers a range of special interest activities such as golf, fishing, ecology, cruising and walking. This laid-back county is also popular with those interested in fine homes and gardens. Highlights include the magnificent Castletown House and the stunning Japanese Gardens.

If shopping is on your to-do list, then you won't want to miss Kildare Village's fantastic range of designer outlets, you'll be sure to pick up a bargain or two. Choose some Silverware in Newbridge, or get crafty in Crookstown Craft Village where beautiful handmade objects can be bought or just enjoyed!

As for places to stay, Kildare's many heritage towns like Monasterevin, Athy, Kildare and Leixlip which was home to Arthur Guinness's first brewery, welcome visitors and offer history buffs the opportunity to gaze into the county's fascinating past.

Did you Know?

- Kildare is the centre of Ireland's Grand Canal network built in the late 18th century.
- Christy Moore, the folk musician, was born in Newbridge.
- Ballymore Eustace was the film location of 'Hadrian's Wall Fortress' in the 2004 film King Arthur.
- The Curragh Racecourse is the headquarters of flat racing in Ireland.



Kildare Towns & Villages

Athy (G3) is a designated historic town on the Grand Canal with 3 historic walking trails. The original Market House, in the town centre is now a Heritage Centre which houses a remarkable collection of artefacts and memorabilia of Ernest Shackleton, the legendary explorer.

Ballitore (G4) is a charming village which was founded by Quakers in 1685. Visit the 18th century home of writer Mary Leadbeater which now houses a library and a museum of Quaker artefacts and writings.

Ballymore Eustace (F3) is an attractive town. In the churchyard of St. John's church are two interesting monolithic granite crosses.

Castledermot (G4) is a testament to the artistic work of Irish monks over 1,000 years ago; the old churchyard contains a pair of exceptionally beautiful Celtic crosses and a round tower, close by is the ancient castle of Kilkea.

The Curragh (F4) is a vast plain that has been a horse-racing venue from the earliest times. It is the headquarters of Irish racing today, and here the Irish Derby and other classic races are decided. For nearly a century the Curragh Camp has been an important military station and training centre and this is reflected in the military museum at the barracks.

Kilcock (E4) is a picture end to the banks of the Royal Canal. It is home to the Larchill Arcadian Gardens. The old bog road which is 4.5km west from Kilcock on the N4 road was the subject of poet Teresa Braydon's song 'The Old Bog Road'.

Kildare (F3) is an ancient cathedral town, located beside the Curragh Plains and famous Curragh Racecourse. Major attractions include The Irish National Stud & Gardens, which was included in HM Queen Elizabeth's tour, in 2011. The round tower at St. Brigid's Cathedral was built more than a thousand years ago and is one of the few that can still be climbed. On the outskirts of town is the Kildare Village, a designer outlet shopping village.

Kill (F4) is a pretty village which has won numerous awards in the prestigious Tidy Towns Competition. Behind the main street is a large earthen enclosure on Kill Hill and a motte, which offers the visitor an impression of the town's ancient past. Kill has been identified as the burial place of the Kings of Leinster. The famous Goff's Bloodstock sales ring, where over half of all Irish bred horses are sold, is located nearby.



Leixlip (E5) is located on the banks of the River Liffey. Points of interest are Leixlip Castle, St. Mary's Church (12th century) and an unusual 'barn', a five storey circular building with a winding stone stairway around it; it was built in 1743 to provide work for the poor.

Maynooth (E4) boasts a university and a 13th century castle. This castle has an exhibition during summer months in the keep of the castle. The 19th century university building has a bell tower, a spire, and the chapel is particularly interesting. There is a national science museum there which has two specialities: religion and physics, it opens during summer months. Just outside Maynooth is Carton House, built by the Dukes of Leinster, it is now a hotel and golf club.

Moone (G4) is a small village famous for its granite High Cross which is one of the finest examples in Ireland. This area was inhabited 6,000 years ago, which makes it one of the oldest inhabited areas in the country.

Naas (F4) is at the centre of the sport of kings – horse racing! The Irish for Naas is Nás na Riogh, the Assembly Place of the Kings. Its English form 'Naas' is pronounced so that it rhymes with race, and that is most appropriate because one of Ireland's busiest and best loved race courses is on the very edge of the town. The Kings in the name were the kings of Leinster and an earthen mound in the town is the site of the ancient royal palace.

Newbridge (F4) famous for 'Newbridge Silverware' has a visitor centre and museum of style icons, which has exhibited items belonging to the Beatles, Marilyn Monroe, Audrey Hepburn and Michael Jackson to mention a few!

Robertstown (F4) is a lovely canal-side village and is a great centre for exploring the Grand Canal and its neighbouring Bog of Allen. Close by is Pollardstown Fen, which is an important nature reserve.

Straffan (E4) is a small village home of The K Club which hosted the Ryder Cup in 2006. There is also a Steam Museum and Straffan Butterfly Farm. A visit to Straffan Antiques & Design Centre in the unique setting of the 18th century stone farm buildings of Straffan Courtyard comes highly recommended.





Laois

Home to the oldest mountains in Europe, Laois is imbued with myth and legend. The county has over 1,000 heritage sites which take you on a fascinating journey into its past!

Some of the places you shouldn't miss include the crumbling fortress at the Rock of Dunamaise, Emo Court House and Gardens and Ballaghmore Castle. Although sobering, the Workhouse Museum in Donaghmore provides vivid stories of families who lived and died here after the Great Famine.

Keep your eyes peeled while travelling and you'll see countless monastic ruins that date to the 6th Century, like Aghaboe Abbey and Timahoe's round tower. Durrow and Abbeyleix are also worth a visit as both are designated heritage sites.

For those looking to stretch the legs, there are off-road walking routes for the ideal hiking holiday. Anglers also have an abundance of options. And while we're on the mellow vibe, how about hiring a barge on the Grand Canal or the River Barrow, or a horse-drawn caravan at Kilvahan? These are sure-fire ways to guarantee the freedom of the countryside.

Did you Know?

- Laois does not border any other county which touches the coast.
 It is therefore considered to be 'the most landlocked county in Ireland.'
- William Russell Grace was born in Ballylinan on May 10th, 1832 and was the first Roman Catholic Mayor of New York City.
- The well known music festival Electric Picnic takes place annually in Stradbally.
- The Great Famine of 1845-49 devastated the county; by the time the workhouse opened at Donaghmore in 1853, many of the poorest had emigrated or died.
- Laois was originally known as Queen's County.



Laois Towns & Villages

Abbeyleix Heritage Town (G2) was planned and created in the 18th century by the landlord Viscount de Vesci. Today visitors can explore its distinct heritage & attractions, such as the award winning library, Abbeyleix Heritage House and the Abbey Sensory Garden situated in the old walled garden of the Brigidine Convent. Here you will also find one of very few Bowls Courts in Ireland, where the French game can be enjoyed.

Ballinakill (G2) is an example of a 17th century market town that can boast an outdoor swimming pool for summer use! The town's entrance from Abbeyleix is marked by two trees known as toll trees where a toll was paid by visitors to the town. Close by are the impressive Heywood Gardens.

Cullahill (H2) has an impressive early 15th century tower house, the principal stronghold of MacGillapatricks of Upper Ossory. The 'castle' has an interesting Sheela-na-Gig, and a medieval church.

Clonaslee (F2) village lies at the foothills of the Slieve Bloom Mountains. The name means 'way of the meadow', the way referred to, being the famous Slí Dála or Munster Way. The village is close to Brittas Lake, Slieve Bloom Forest Park, The Giants Grave and many forest walks with some beautiful scenery.

Donaghmore (G2) has attractive buildings and overlooks a river and old bridge. A former famine workhouse is open to the public all year. During the Great Famine, some 10 percent of the local population sought refuge here. Now restored, visitors can see many of the original features.

Durrow (G2) is a charming village; the name comes from the Irish 'doire', meaning an oak wood, and is a reminder of the great oak forests that covered much of Ireland in the past. Early in the 18th century Castle Durrow was built, this magnificent classical mansion is now a country club hotel.

Emo (F3) boasts the impressive Emo Court which was designed in 1790 by architect James Gandon. The house is surrounded by beautiful gardens and parkland that date from the 18th century and contain formal lawns, a lake and forest walks.

Killeshin (G3) village is located in the Rossmore Hills from which it is said that ten counties can be seen. Near the village are the ruins of Killeshin Church, this important medieval monastry was founded here in 545 AD.



Mountmellick (F2) is a bustling colourful town originally enterprised by the Quaker community. An old grain mill has been renovated and houses a Quaker museum. The main focus is to conserve and display original pieces of Mountmellick embroidery of which the town is renowned and to protect the memory of Mountmellick's rich Quaker industrial past. It is an attractive town with a fine square, architecturally impressive houses, shops and ecclesiastical buildings.

Portarlington (F3) was developed from a 17th century Huguenot colony; it is a charming riverside town with an interesting assortment of architecture. One of its most treasured possessions is the Church register with entries from 1694 to 1816. The park is presided over by the colossal granite sculpture of a reclining bather by Dick Joynt which celebrates 'the universality of women and the triumph of the human spirit'.

Portlaoise (G2) the county capital of Laois, is a vibrant town with shops, pubs and clubs, all sorts of places to stay and easy access to a wide range of things to do, including many festivals to keep visitors entertained. Recent years have seen its transformation from a rather sleepy town, into an exciting and rapidly growing centre, with branches of all the best shops, fascinating local sources of crafts and good food and the splendid Dunamaise Arts Centre, opened in 1999, with its theatre and art gallery.

Rosenallis (F2) is a village situated on the northeast end of Capard Ridge in the Slieve Bloom Mountains. Several viewing points in the vicinity provide a wonderful vista of the lush green central plain of Ireland. It is said that you can see six counties from the 'Stoney Man' on the ridge of Capard.

Stradbally's (G3) name translates as 'the village on the street' – which describes it very well. Stradbally Hall hosts a steam rally during the August bank holiday, also in the grounds is the Stradbally Hall Narrow Gauge Railway. The popular 'Electric Picnic' music event is held annually in Stradbally.

Vicarstown (F3) is an attractive village on the Grand Canal. Buildings of interest include the 1860's Grattan School and Grattan Lodge (built in 1882 by Henry Grattan's granddaughter Lady Pauline Grattan Bellew). Vicarstown is a good base to visit Fisherstown where one of the oldest pubs in Ireland is located.

Completed in 1912, the gardens are composed of four elements consisting of gardens, lakes, woodland and architectural features. Linked by a terrace that ran along the front of the house, which now no longer exists. The formal gardens form



the centre-piece of the property and were designed by the famous architect, Sir Edwin Lutyens (1869 - 1944) and probably landscaped by Gertrude Jekyll (1843 - 1932). It is one of four Gardens in this country designed by him, the others being in the War Memorial Park, Lambay Island and Howth Castle. In the sunken garden, circular terraces descend to an elliptical pool, where small statues of turtles gaze inquisitively at the grand fountain. An extensive replanting programme is currently underway.

The Rock of Dunamaise is an imposing and magnificent example of the remains of a Celtic fortification overlooking the valley of the O'Moores. It has a colourful history boasting ownership by Strongbow in 1170 and becoming the Norman's most important fortification. In the



fourteenth century it was burned at least twice by the Irish and later ownership went to the Earl of Thomond. It eventually fell into decay in 1795 leaving spectacular remains. Standing at over 45 metres in height, the ruin dominates the landscape.

19th century Quakers. Decades of women since have been connected by white cotton threads encrusted on White Satin Jean. Heirlooms of bed coverlets; pillow shams; etc. are on display in Mountmellick Museum. Group and one to one workshops are provided all year round on request.


decorate a second storey window. Built in the 1100s, Timahoe is a complete tower though now without floors or ladders. The tower rises almost 30 metres high and is more than 17 meters wide at its base. Its walls are nearly 2 metres thick. Inside there are five different floors, which were reached by ladders.





Louth

It is impossible to turn in any direction in Ireland's smallest county without stumbling upon something interesting!

Starting on Louth's northern border, the Cooley Mountains are not only stunningly scenic but are the mythical home of hurling as told in the Táin Bó Cúailnge. These mountains will lead you to the Viking influenced town of Carlingford. Carlingford's harbour looks out across its famous lough to the Mourne Mountains. The town's medieval streets are packed with cosy eateries and it's a Mecca for outdoor pursuits on land or sea.

Greenore is famous for its golfing, close by there are links courses at Seapoint and Baltray and there are few parkland courses as fine as Dundalk. Historical attractions in Louth include the beautiful high crosses at Monasterboice and Mellifont Abbey.

Louth is probably most famous for the Boyne River. Drogheda straddles its banks with its fabulous Arts Centre, Martello tower and a bustling centre. Further along the river the beautiful Beaulieu House and its motor racing museum. And if its fishing you're after don't forget that the Boyne is where the Salmon of Knowledge was caught, so there's no excuse not to become an expert on Co. Louth!

Did you Know?

- Co. Louth is the smallest county in the whole of Ireland.
- Clogherhead was used as a film location for 'The Devils Own,' 'Perrier's Bounty' and 'Captain Lightfoot'.
- The Kildemock Jumping Church is a famous local site, according to legend the church apparently 'jumped' to remove the burial place of an excommunicated church member!
- The annual Samba Festival is held in Drogheda and International Samba bands visit the town for a week of music, song, dance, drumming and parades.
- The actor, film producer and environmentalist Pierce Brosnan was born on May 16th 1953 in Drogheda.



Louth Towns & Villages

Annagassan (C5) is a coastal village with a surprisingly eventful past. Originally a small port with a busy harbour pier; the Norsemen captured the settlement in 831. It wasn't until 928 that the Vikings were eventually defeated by the native Irish and driven from the locality.

Ardee (C4) is an ideal base from which to explore the mysteries of the Boyne Valley and Cooley Peninsula. There are a number of places of interest in both the town and the hinterland of historic and recreational interest, including a 14th century Norman Castle and the strange tale of the 'jumping church' in Kildemock.

Ballymascanlon (B5) is a small parish situated 4km north-east of Dundalk on the road to Carlingford. This parish derives its name from the sept of the Scanlon's, its ancient proprietors. Visitors can visit Proleek Dolmen and a wedge tomb close by.

Baltray (CS) is an idyllic village on the shore of the Boyne estuary. The area is of considerable importance for its wildlife preservation, which includes frequent feathered visitors such as ducks, Brent geese, waders and ringed plovers.

Blackrock (B5) is perched on the very edge of the sea, with a promenade and wonderful views over Dundalk Bay to the mountains. When the tide goes out it reveals an immense area of sand flats, seeming to stretch all the way to the Cooley mountains, although interrupted by the narrow channel that leads to Dundalk Port.

Carlingford (B5) is an area of outstanding natural beauty surrounded by the Cooley and Mourne mountains, Carlingford Lough & King John's Castle. The medieval village of Carlingford is a delight to stroll around with its shops, restaurants, coffee shops, traditional pubs and crafts. Visitors can participate in a host of water & land based activities in Carlingford.

Dromiskin Village (C5) was an important ecclesiastical centre from the 5th century. A round tower from the early monastery still stands in the churchyard of the Church of Ireland parish church. There are also the remains of a ringed cross in the Celtic style and a carved spiral pillar from the 9th - 10th century close by.



Collon (C4) is a manorial hamlet which has medieval origins. The original settlement on the site was granted a Tuesday market by Henry III in 1229. The village is most famous for being the base of the Cistercian Abbey of new Mellifont.

Drogheda (D5) is a medieval town with a wealth of historical interest. The most venerated possession is preserved in St. Peter's Church, the head of St. Oliver Plunkett, Archbishop of Armagh, who was executed in London in 1681. The town contained monasteries of a number of religious orders and their ruins stand in various parts of the town, together with the barbican tower of the ancient walls. Close to it are some of the fine town houses built in the 18th century. The former St. Mary's Church has been beautifully restored to recreate the fascinating world of ancient Drogheda. High above the town is Millmount, where the 19th century garrison barracks and Martello Tower have been transformed to a Visitor Centre.

Dundalk (B5) is a thoroughly modern town in the midst of a land of ancient legend. Dundalk offers all the perks of city life, combined with easy access to the countryside, steeped in history and tradition. St. Nicholas' Church was built on foundations from the 13th century and rebuilt more than once. It contains some Dutch stained glass from the 16th century, a number of interesting medieval tombs and a memorial to Robert Burns, whose sister lived nearby. The modern Church of the Holy Redeemer has sculptures by some of the best contemporary artists. The prize-winning County Museum, in a beautifully restored late 18th century warehouse, offers an extensive programme of permanent exhibitions, temporary displays & performances.

Termonfeckin (C5) village is situated on the eastern shore of the county and has an extensive stretch of golden beach, only a stroll from its centre. The origin of its name dates to the 7th century when a monastery was founded here by St. Fechin.

Tullyallen (C5) is perched high above the Boyne. Human activity on the hill is shown to date back 6,000 years. A battle for control of the English Crown took place in the area in the 17th century - The Battle of the Boyne (1690). From the village, both the river and battle site are reached via the famous King William's Glen. Nearby Townley Hall Forest Park provides the opportunity for an invigorating hike.

In the 5th century, St. Buite founded a monastic community near Drogheda in County Louth and today, it is home to an impressive collection of ruins. On the site,





Monasterboice is most famous for its spectacular high crosses especially the cross of Muineadach an outstanding example of high crosses of the early Christian period, noted as being the tallest in Ireland. It is monolith, 5 meters high, which features many detailed scenes from the Bible. The crosses stand in the shadow of a magnificent Round Tower, about 300 meters high. Monasterboice was a thriving centre of religion and learning until 1142, when the Cistercians arrived at the nearby Mellifont Abbey.



The magnificent Proleek Portal Tomb is situated in the grounds of Ballymascanlon Hotel, just outside Dundalk on the legendary Cooley Peninsula. It is one of the finest examples of its kind in Ireland. Portal tombs have two tall stones at the front (portal stones) and a smaller stone at the back supporting a large capstone. A portal



tomb resembles a giant's table and is sometimes called a dolmen, which comes from the Breton word tolmen meaning stone table.

Proleek Portal Tomb is about 3m high and has a huge capstone weighing approximately 35 tons. Legend says that a wish will be granted to anyone who can throw a pebble on its capstone so that it stays there. The two front portal stones are 2m high. Known as the Giant's Load, it is believed that it was carried to Ireland by a Scottish giant named Parrah Boug McShagean.

Castle Roche Ruins (B5) Dungooley Rd, Dundalk www.discoverireland.ie Castle Roche is one of the most striking Anglo-Norman castles in Ireland, the seat of the De Verdon family in the 13th century. The legendry ghost appears at the 'Murder Window' to this very day, which strangely enough is bricked up

from the inside...

The De Verdon's built Castletown Motte and Bailey in the late 12th century. The motte comprises a large circular mound which rises to some 20m and is enclosed by a ditch with an external bank..

Cúchulainn's Stone (B4) Rathiddy, Knockbridge www.discoverireland.ie

Clochafarmore Standing Stone is an impressive monument standing at over 3 meters high and 1.3m wide. This stone is traditionally associated with the greatest hero of Irish folklore - Cúchulainn.

King John's Castle Ruins (B5) Carlingford www.carlingford.ie

The castle is located on the southern shores of Carlingford Lough. The lough was named by the Vikings and means 'bay of the hag'. Built by Hugh de Lacy, this dramatic fortress offers stunning views across the lough towards the Mourne Mountains.

Churches & Settlements

Kildemock Jumping Church (C4) Millockstown, Ardee www.discoverireland.ie

According to legend, the west gable of this building jumped almost a meter inside the wall of the original foundation to exclude an excommunicated church member who had been buried in the church. The ruin dates back to the 14th century, though the site also contains carved stones from the 13th century.

Magdalene Tower (D5) Magdalene St, Drogheda www.discoverireland.ie

The Magdalene Tower is all that now remains of the once important Dominican Friary. It is the belfry tower of the friary which Lucas de Netterville, then Archbishop of Armagh, founded early in about 1224.

Saint Brigid's Shrine & Well (B5) Faughart www.discoverireland.ie

The Hill of Faughart is one of the great historical sites of North Louth, scene of several incidents in the Táin Bó Cuailgne, the archaeology of which indicated remnants of an Iron Age hill fort, an early Christian ecclesiastical foundation associated with Saint Brigid, a Norman motte-castle and a medieval church ruin.

St. Laurence's Gate (D5) Laurence Street, Drogheda www.discoverireland.ie

St. Laurence's Gate, is not in fact a gate but a barbican, a fortified structure used to defend the gate, which was behind it. The barbican consists of two lofty circular towers, connected by a wall, in which there is an archway entry to the portcullis.

St. Peter's Church (D5) West St, Drogheda Tel: 041 9838537 www.saintpetersdrogheda.ie St. Peter's R.C. Church in West Street is world famous for housing the shrine of St. Oliver Plunkett. The facade is an imposing structure in the Gothic style, built of local limestone



Meath

There's no better place to visit if peering into the past makes for your perfect holiday. Top of the must-visit list is incredible Brú na Bóinne with the passage tombs of Newgrange, Knowth and Dowth. These burial places predate the pyramids so it's little wonder they are a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

In the heritage town of Trim, you'll find the largest Anglo-Norman castle in Ireland, with its beautifully preserved grounds. Meath has lots of more modern diversions too, like Sonairte, Ireland's national ecology centre, and the Solstice Arts Centre. Other options include the wonderful fishing and walking in the Boyne Valley, site of the famous battle. If you have kids, Tayto Park is sure to appeal!

For those in search of playgrounds with tees and greens, head for the famous golf links at Laytown and Bettystown. With their uninterrupted sands, fun parks and cosy eateries, these seaside villages have been popular holiday getaways for over 100 years.

Laytown Strand Races each September is a cracking day out! If racing tickles your fancy, you'll be pleased to know that you can also enjoy a punt at Fairyhouse, Bellewstown and Navan!

Did you Know?

- Newgrange (3000BC) is 400 years older than the Pyramids of Egypt.
- The Battle of the Boyne had the largest number of troops ever deployed on an Irish battlefield.
- The ancient Tailteann (Teltown) games provided the inspiration for the Olympic Games.
- Trim Castle served as a 'castle double' for York Castle in Mel Gibson's 1996 Oscar-winning movie, Braveheart.
- The greatest concentration of Megalithic art in Western Europe is in Knowth, which has over three hundred decorated stones.



Meath Towns & Villages

Ashbourne (D5) is a bustling market town close to Fairyhouse Racecourse and Tayto Park and hosts the Irish Women's Rugby Internationals.

Athboy (D3) village is the medieval creation of the Plunkett family. Overlooking the town of Athboy is the Hill of Tlachtga or 'Hill of Ward', an Iron Age ring fort, where the great Celtic feast of Samhain (Halloween) is said to have originated.

Bettystown (D5) is a thriving village with a fine sandy beach. The world famous 'Tara Brooch' was discovered on this beach! Close by the Laytown beach boasts horse racing on the beach! The only strand races held in Europe.

Kells (C3) is a delightful town and home of the Book of Kells one of the most beautiful books in the world, now preserved in Trinity College, Dublin. It is an 8th century manuscript of the Four Gospels painted by the monks of the monastery founded in Kells for the followers of the great St. Colmcille. The curving road around the church on the hill follows the outline of the ancient monastery. The highlights of ancient Kells are clustered around the protestant church, with its medieval tower and graceful 18th century steeple. There are three Celtic Crosses in the churchyard and a round tower. Across the road is a small, stone-roofed church, one of the oldest monastic buildings in Ireland. The Hill of Lloyd Tower nearby resembles a lighthouse! It also has a park from where wonderful views can be enjoyed.

Navan (D4) is a busy centre set on high ground where the River Boyne is joined by its tributary the Blackwater, close by are the ruins of Athlumney Castle. Navan's churches, shops and handsome town houses are mostly 19th century work. In the middle of some of the richest pasture in Ireland, it was an important market town. In the 1960s Navan became a mining town, with the development of Tara Mines, Europe's greatest source of lead and zinc.

Nobber (C4) is the birthplace of the blind harpist Turlough O'Carolan, composer, poet and the most famous of all Irish harpists. A monument in the town is a true testament to the popularity of this musican. Several 'high crosses' were discovered in the villages old cemetery (St. John's) dating from possibly the 10th century. Moynagh Lake west of the village is the site of a crannog which dates to Neolithic times.

Oldcastle (C3) is an idyllic village, five thousand years ago the affluent stone-age community, who lived where Oldcastle now stands, decided to commemorate their dead on the nearby hilltops.



Their legacy lives on with Loughcrew Cairns. Most of them are 'passage graves' built to the same design as the world-famous examples at Newgrange. Oldcastle is also home to Loughcrew Gardens. The demesne was once the property of the Plunkett family and the childhood home of its most distinguished member, the 17th century Oliver Plunkett, archbishop, martyr and saint. There can be no doubt that he worshipped in the old church that still stands in the gardens.

Rathcairn (D3) is a Gaeltacht area in Meath, where the Irish language is spoken and the traditional way of life is embraced through music and dance.

Ratoath (D5) is a focal point for horseracing at Fairyhouse and bloodstock sales and equestrian events at Tattersalls and has its own vibrant community theatre, The Venue, serving east Meath.

Slane (D4) is a beautiful manorial village built around a crossroads; the central focus of the village are the four fine Georgian Houses facing each other. The Conynghams, successors of the great Norman Lords of Slane, planned Slane. It was here, from the top of the hill overlooking the village, that St. Patrick lit the Paschal Flame on Easter Eve (in the second half of the fifth century), a symbol of the light of Christianity, which was about to sweep away the old pagan order. A short distance from the village on the Navan road is Slane Castle, famous as a concert venue; the surrounding grounds boasting a natural amphitheatre of immense size.

Trim (D4) with its magnificent castle by the River Boyne is one of the most spectacular medieval towns in Ireland. At The Ford of the Elder Tree – as its name in Irish translates - St. Patrick established a monastery and left it in the care of his nephew St. Loman. Great monasteries came to be built in the area and the towers and walls of some of them still stand, adding to the beauties of Trim's skyline. But the most important event took place in 1172 when Hugh de Lacy began the building of the castle. Declared a dangerous building in 1403, it has remained standing for seven hundred years and now, made safe and accessible, it welcomes visitors. The last sounds of battle were heard in 1994 when the castle took its place in the film Braveheart.

well as a full model of one of the smaller tombs at Knowth, interpretive displays and viewing areas. An audio visual presentation can be viewed in English, Irish, German, Italian or Spanish.

All admission to Newgrange and Knowth is through the Visitor Centre, there is no direct access to these monuments. Visitors are brought from the Visitor Centre to the monuments by shuttle bus.

St. Patrick's Cathedral (D4) Trim www.discoverireland.ie

St. Patrick's Cathedral, which was built in 1803 on an historic site boasts a 15th century stone tower. The church was given cathedral status in 1955 and is reputed to be older than Armagh or Canterbury.



Wicklow

Renowned for its scenery, Wicklow is known as the 'Garden of Ireland' and boasts many fine examples at the grand houses of Kilruddery, Russborough, Avondale and Powerscourt.

As for those whose idea of relaxation is to stretch the legs and not rest them, Wicklow is a haven for walkers. Choose from short strolls to the multi-day Wicklow Way, the longest self-guided walking route in the country.

Hidden around every corner are rich and interesting attractions including the 6th century monastic centre of Glendalough in the Wicklow Mountains National Park. Two popular seaside towns that vibrate with excitement are Greystones which offers beautiful cliff walks, boutique shopping and fine dining and Bray which has something for everyone from its rich heritage and splendid scenery to a vibrant arts scene, aquarium and bustling Main Street.

For the adventurous, there's an unparalleled range of activities including horse riding, mountain biking, kayaking and falconry. On the subject of eagles, the county has an amazing catalogue of golf courses. You don't have to have hawk eyes to spot the potential for fun in Wicklow

Did you Know?

- A village called Hollywood nestles in the Wicklow Mountains!
- Wicklow Gaol is proclaimed to be one of the most haunted places in Ireland.
- Poulaphouca was the second hydroelectric station to be built in Ireland after Ardnacrusha on the Shannon River. Poulaphouca means 'The Ghost's or Devil's Hole' in English.
- The films 'Excalibur' and 'Braveheart' among many others were shot in Ardmore Studios, in Bray.
- The 2004 comedy romance, Laws of Attraction was partly filmed at Humewood Castle, Kiltegan.



Wicklow Towns & Villages

Annamoe (G5) is small picturesque village in County Wicklow that is well known for its fishery. The small stone humpback bridge is a popular place for tourists to stop and view the beautiful County Wicklow scenery.

Arklow (H5) town is an excellent base to explore the Vale of Avoca and the Wicklow Mountains. The glorious sandy beaches of Brittas Bay and Clogga are well worth a visit. Activities include angling, golfing and swimming.

Ashford (G6) is a scenic village and home to the famous Mount Usher Gardens, which boast a famous collection of plants gathered from all corners of the world. Devil's Glen Woodland and Waterfall is located 4km west of Ashford on the road to Glendalough via Nun's Cross. The waterfall and pool at the head of the glen is called the Devil's Punchbowl.

Aughrim (G5) is famous for its granite and is often referred to as the granite village due to the large amount of buildings constructed using local granite. Liverpool Cathedral was also built using this stone. In Aughrim there is a commemorative memorial to honour the memory of those involved in the 1798 rebellion.

Avoca (G5) "There is not in the wide world a valley so sweet as that vale in whose bosom the bright waters meet". So sang Thomas Moore in 1807. The Vale of Avoca, already popular in his time, took on immortality. The popular series 'Ballykissangel' was filmed here.

Baltinglass (G4) is a place oozing in heritage. Bronze Age burial chambers (5,000 years old) have been excavated on the Pinnacle, a 383 meter hill. The Abbey, founded by the King of Leinster Dermot McMurrough in 1148, was built for the Cistercian order of monks, however only ruins remain today.

Blessington (F4) village is on the edge of the Wicklow Mountains and has the biggest manmade lake in Ireland and offers fantastic leisure activities and a beautiful lake drive (35 km). Close by is Russborough, one of the most beautiful of all the great 18th century houses of Ireland.

Bray (F6) is a quintessential 19th century town with a beautiful promenade, you can enjoy the splendid seafront, walk the magnificent Bray Head, visit Sealife or Killruddery House and Gardens.



Brittas Bay (G6) has a 5km stretch of beautiful white sand dunes and clean beaches. It has won & maintained the Blue Flag for many years now. It is ideal for bathing, sailing & walking.

Donard (G4) is an enchanting village at the northern end of the Glen of Imaal. The Dwyer McAllister Cottage, which is a few kilometers southeast of the town, is worth a visit to anyone interested in Irish history.

Glendalough (G5) and its Monastic site has been one of the most sacred Christian places in Ireland for over a thousand years. Today it still retains its haunting beauty with two silent lakes set between steep mountains. Ancient monastic ruins & round tower, rare and beautiful oak forest, exciting cliffs for rock-climbers and mining relics provide endless interest.

Kilcoole (F6) just south of Greystones was famous for being the film location of TV series 'Glenroe'. Fans of Glenroe can visit Glenroe Pet Farm. The shingle beach in Kilcoole is a paradise for birdwatchers. This nature reserve runs all the way to Wicklow town where it leads to the Broadlough.

Rathdrum (G5) town, situated high on the western side of the beautiful Avonmore valley, offers majestic views of the Avonmore River, which flows through the Vale of Clara. The town has been the location for films like 'Michael Collins', 'A Love Divided' and 'Durango'. Avondale House and Forest Park is set on 500 acres, it was the birthplace of Charles Stewart Parnell.

Roundwood (F5) claims to be the highest village in Ireland, and has a lovely setting on the edge of the Wicklow Mountains.

Shillelagh (H4) is a 17th century planned estate village, with attractive terrace stone houses and a handsome courthouse with a clock tower. Tomnafinnoge Oak Forest, standing just off the Tinahely road, is one of the largest standing oak forests in the country. The Irish shillelagh originates from this village.

Wicklow Town (G6) is built on the side of a great promontory overlooking the sea. Wicklow enjoys one of the most attractive settings of any Irish town. A centre for fishing, sailing and walking, it has easy access to many of the wonders of the surrounding county including Wicklow Gaol, Wicklow Head & the ruins of Black Castle.







At the coast, where the salty air meets the rolling hills, a day at a breathtaking beach can reinvigorate the senses. With plenty to chose from, some of the most popular beaches are mentioned below.

Shellinghill/Templetown Beach in Carlingford, County Louth fronts one of Louth's most popular but as yet, unspoilt stretch of coastline with smooth safe sands.

Clogherhead Beach in the small fishing village of Clogherhead in County Louth, is a popular tourist destination for its unspoilt golden sands and wonderful views. Port Beach is located a few short miles north and is fronted by a mature dune area which is perfect for picnics, and offers plenty of play space for children.

Bettystown in County Meath is a long established seaside resort with a fine, sandy stretch of beach from Laytown to the mouth of the Boyne at Mornington.

Brittas Bay is the most popular beach in Wicklow, it has a 5 km stretch of beautiful white sand dunes, clean beaches and is ideal for bathing, sailing & walking.

Greystones in County Wicklow boasts two beaches, the South Beach is a long sandy strip that follows on from the shingly North Beach at the harbour.

Driving Routes

We have chosen some great driving routes which will introduce you to many of the region's most famous sights and attractions and also to lesser known gems along the way.

Routes can be travelled in any direction and from any starting point, map illustrations are intended as a guide only, and routes should be used in conjunction with reference to a good road map of Ireland.

Take your car and explore the Boyne Valley in your own time and space!

The Boyne Valley is both Ireland's ancient capital and it's most sacred and mythical landscape. Moreover, its sites and monuments are amongst the best examples of their kind in Europe and are all within a short distance of each other. There is a signed driving route that will take you all around the Boyne Valley. This route brings you to the main towns and villages and to the many historic sites along the way where you can stop and explore in your own time. (See map on pages 88 & 89 for details of this route.)

Like coastal views? Then you'll love this scenic driving route!

Kicking off in Bray, where a Victorian promenade connects with a stunning cliff walk, it proceeds through Wicklow, throwing up mile after mile of remarkably underrated eastern coastline. Within a short distance of Dublin, you'll pass the 18th century Wicklow lighthouse on its headland perch. You can explore (and even surf) hidden beaches like Mahermore. You can break out the picnic blanket on sandy, family-friendly strips like Brittas Bay. Of course, driving along the coastline isn't your only route to stunning sea views. Returning north through the Wicklow Mountains, you'll ascend to some mouth-watering vistas over the Irish Sea. Climb the Great Sugar Loaf, and you might even see Snowdonia in Wales. (See map on page 90 for details of this route.)

Gordon Bennett Route, they did things differently in 1903!

Back then, the speed limit in Ireland was 12mph, and the prospect of The Gordon Bennett Cup, for which daredevil motorists would race each other around a 104-mile circuit of Kildare, Laois and Carlow, was enough to bring half the country to a standstill. It's easy to re-trace the route today in Kildare, the course runs through Athy and on to Kilcullen, before crossing the plains of the Curragh into Kildare Town. Who was Gordon Bennett? The flamboyant son of a New York Media Baron, whose passion for motor cars led him to sponsor the first-ever international motoring competition, which debuted in 1900, and arrived in Ireland three years later. Today, you can follow in their tyre tracks - at your own sweet pace. (See map on page 91 for details of this route.)

Get ready for the off! On the Great Plains of the Curragh!

This touring route, looping leisurely around Maynooth, the Blessington Lakes and the great pastoral expanse of the Curragh, takes drivers right to the heart of Irish horse country including the racecourses at Nass and Punchestown and the Curragh. The Curragh a 5,000-acre plain whose name means 'place of the running horse' lies at the centre of Kildare. Not everything about the Curragh is equestrian, of course. It's also home to the Irish Defence Forces, and the British Army trained men here to fight in the Boer and First World Wars. Newbridge, Kildare and Maynooth are three warm and welcoming towns along the route; places you can stop into for a slap-up meal, a heritage fix, or an overnight stay. (See map on page 92 for details of this route.)

Ireland's Garden County the Wilds of Wicklow!

Wicklow is Ireland's Garden County, but this is a garden as only nature could have made it, bursting with heather-clad mountains, gushing waterfalls, dramatic valleys and sparkling hidden lakes. At the core of this exhilarating drive lies Wicklow Mountains National Park. Wicklow's Military Road, begins north of Glencree, and is at its most ruggedly beautiful when passing through the Sally and Wicklow gaps. It's hard to believe such rawness of landscape could lie so close to a capital city. But wild and all as Wicklow gets, of course, you're never far from villages like Laragh, Roundwood and Blessington; the perfect places to overnight or to grab a bite whilst exploring the area. (See map on page 93 for details of this route.)

Picture it... Just you, the open road and a classic touring route that sweeps from the wilds of Wicklow to the horse-peppered plains of Kildare!

The Grand Tour is the quintessential circuit of Kildare and Wicklow, taking in the most spectacular scenery, the most beautiful big houses and gardens and the most intriguing Early Christian heritage sites... in a route as suited to a short visit as a long, leisurely meander. Just a short drive from Dublin, you'll find wild mountains, craggy coastline and horsey plains. You'll enjoy big welcomes in small towns. You can immerse yourself in Palladian mansions and ancient heritage, taste mouthwatering food and experience real Irish culture and craic. Skim the surface or discover in depth. Boyne Valley Driving Route



Walking

There are three designated 'Walkers Welcome' walking hubs on Dublin's Doorstep. There is Carlingford and the Cooley Penninsula, Co. Louth for day-long hikes or looped walks such as Slieve Foye, Barnavave, and Common's Loop. In Tinahely, Co. Wicklow you can access the Wicklow Way waymarked trail (and other walks in the area) and from the Slieve Bloom Mountains, you can access the Slieve Bloom waymarked trail (and other walks).

The new Blessington Greenway Walk links the historic town of Blessington with the Palladian mansion at Russborough House. The trail starts at Blessington and leads south along the shores of Blessington Lake, through forest and natural woodland. The Greenway commences at Avon Ri Activity Centre at the southern end of the town, along this walk you will have the opportunity to appreciate the magnificent scenery and wildlife in the area. Waymarked Ways

Linear Cycle Route

Dundalk and its surroundings in County Louth boast long sandy beaches, vibrant towns and legendary and historic sites. Cycling is a very popular way to explore and discover the area which has many tourist attractions and breathtaking scenery. This 54km route is easy to cycle and takes in much of the lovely coastline. It starts in Dundalk, County Louth and travels through the villages of Castlebellingham, Annagassan, Clogherhead, Termonfeckin and Baltray, ending in the medieval town of Drogheda. The final stage of the tour is along the mouth of the River Boyne and into the centre of the town.

Loop Cycle Route

This trail is based on the ancient Irish epic of the Táin Bó Cuailgne or the Catlle Raid of Cooley and follows (as closely as possible) the path of Queen Maeve and her army in her pursuit of the great Brown Bull of Cooley. As you cycle through this warm and welcoming landscape you will encounter the magnificent Cooley Mountains, breathtaking views of Carlingford Lough and the Mourne Mountains. At 587km (365 miles) in length, it runs from Co. Roscommon to the Cooley Peninsula and back again, with 152km (95 miles) of the total route in Louth.

The Park has 14km of purpose built mountain bike trails. Special consideration has been made to ensure the trails are weather proof and usable all year round. There are two loops to choose from, both of which are signposted by red cyclist icons. The terrain at Ballinastoe woods is a mix of wide double-track and narrow single-track, offering a challenge for any mountain biker.




