Dip:

A plunge dip is a construction that allows to completely immerse livestock in a liquid that contains a parasiticide. Plunge dips are either fix and made of concrete (typical for cattle and sheep) or portable (usually metallic, mainly for sheep and seldom for pigs).



- cats, popularly known also as **pipettes**, squeeze-ons or drop-ons.



Hand-spraying:


Hand spraying is an effective method of tick control for a few animals who do not justify the expense of a spray race or plunge dip eg on small-scale commercial dairy farms.




Spray Race (Spray dipping):

The cattle spray race is a gentler method of dipping and more suitable for dairy cows, as there is less chance of injury.

Insecticidal dusting powder:

It is designed to control insects on the skin and in the hair of dogs and cats, as well as for disinfestation of their bedding, baskets, kennels and other places of permanent residence. -Application onto the animal's skin and hair is easy and does not induce any resistance.



Insecticidal shampoos:

- They are designed to control insects on the skin and fur of an animal. In view of how they actually work, they are effective on application only.
- -The biologically active substance in their composition
- acts while applied onto the skin.
