'Witch' charged with swindling customer

A bona fide witch living in Canton Township is on trial in Wayne Circuit Court, charged with two felonies which could put her behind bars for 10 years.

Mrs. Lois Umerska (a.k.a. Lady Athena) is a 40-year-old mother of six who lives with her Roman Catholic husband on Shadowlawn Drive in Canton Township.

She is not on trial for her religious beliefs as a follower of the Church of Wicca and a member of the New York-based Temple of Pandora.

But Mrs. Umerska's professed psychic powers and Tarot card readings, at fairs and living rooms have been the subject of heated discussion by both the prosecution and defense counsels.

The trial is being heard without a jury before Wayne Circuit Judge Irwin Burdick. Further testimony will be heard today.

Attorney for the prosecution, Louis Gutter, claims Mrs. Umerska is guilty of larceny by conversion and obtaining money under false pretenses by taking \$4,500 from Anna Groves of Romulus last Dec. 30. The prosecution argues that Mrs. Groves was led to believe she was paying Mrs. Umerska a \$4,500 down payment on a mobile home, when the Umerskas had actually sold the trailer three days before.

Defense attorney Richard Monash claims his client was repaid for a \$4,500 cash loan that she lent to Mrs. Groves on Oct. 20—allegedly to help Mrs. Groves establish credit to buy a new car.

MRS. UMERSKA, as Lady Athena, is high priestess of a local coven composed of 13 females who meet at her home or a "sister coven" in Toledo or Finley, Ohio. She makes it very clear, at the outset, that "true witches" do not practice or believe in Satan worship. "The devil does not exist for us," she says.

"Since the Inquisition, we witches have had a tough time coming out in

the open," Mrs. Umerska said outside the courtroom last week.

"We've been portrayed as people who look very campy and wear funny little pointed hats. We're portrayed as evil, ugly people with no education and followers who are illiterate."

Mrs. Umerska claims to hold a degree in psychology from the University of Michigan and a double minor in philosophy and political science.

"What other religion has to endure a whole month of ridicule as we do? This is the month."

To supplement her income, Mrs. Umerska said she performs Tarot readings at carnivals. To stay within the law, she sells terrariums with the readings, she told the court.

One of the witnesses testifying in Mrs. Umerska's behalf was Roberta Lee Jackson, 25, a student at U-M who goes by the name Lady Sarankhesta among members of the coven.

MS. JACKSON amended the judicial oath by claiming to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, "so help me Goddess."

The Church of Wicca, explains Mrs. Umerska, worships a dual deity—the goddess Athena or Diana or Isis, as she is also known, and her male consort, Pan or Serumnos.

Ms. Jackson—a believer in karma and reincarnation—broke down crying at one point during intense cross-examination by the prosecution counsel.

She told the court that she had heard Mrs. Groves say she needed money because she had been swindled on a car and its repairs. She also testified that Mrs. Groves knew the mobile home had been promised to someone else, and was told by Mrs. Umerska that she could not afford the payments on the trailer.

Another witness for the defense was Mrs. Umerska's son, Herbert, 24, who wore a Navy Reserve uniform to the trial even though he was not on reserve duty at the time.

Patricia Williams, a woman who has gone to Lady Athena for Tarot card readings, testified that she saw her accumulate large sums of money at fairs—lending credence to the claim that Mrs. Umerska had \$4,500 in cash to lend to Mrs. Groves.

A LETTER FROM Mrs. Groves delivered to Bernard Umerska, husband of the defendant, was introduced as evidence in the trial. Umerska said he first learned "there was some kind of problem over money" around February of 1977 when he was stopped at a light at Ford and Lilley by a honking car driven by Mrs. Groves.

The letter said that Mrs. Groves would like to privately talk to him about money owed to her. "But nothing about a trailer."

Mr. Umerska said he refused to meet with Mrs. Groves unless his wife was present.

"If she wanted to talk, then talk right there in front of everybody concerned."

The husband of the defendant said his wife has a joint checking account at Bank of the Commonwealth that he has nothing to do with and that his wife doesn't know how much he makes a week because he deposits his earnings in his own account.

Mrs. Groves contends that she did not even know Mrs. Umerska-Lady Athena on Oct. 20, the day she was supposed to have borrowed \$4,500 from her. The first time she met Mrs. Umerska, Mrs. Groves said, ironically was on Halloween—the day an ad for the Umerska's mobile home appeared in the Detroit News.

THE MONEY for the mobile home downpayment, as Mrs. Groves claims, or the loan repayment, as Mrs. Umerska claims, was money Mrs. Groves obtained in December from the sale of her Romulus home to her mother-in-law. Mrs. Groves receives a

\$24 per month Social Security disability check and says she was forced to sell her home for equity. Mrs. Groves reportedly received \$7,000 in the sale of the house.

A carbon on a receipt book produced by Mrs. Umerska during the trial noted "loan" and was dated Oct. 20. But no receipt for repayment of the alleged loan was produced.

The defendant stated that the precepts of her religion are based on honesty and trust and since she was

repaid for the loan, she did not think she needed a receipt herself.

Wayne Bank officials testified that both women came in to the bank on Dec. 30 to convert a personal check of Mrs. Groves into a cashier's check. A deposit of \$4,500 was placed in Mrs. Umerska's Bank of the Commonwealth account later that day.

The judge will have to decide if that deposit was a loan repayment or a swindle. The trial is expected to end early this week.

Air gripes about roads before county Wednesday

Cussing under your breath won't improve the condition of western Wayne County roads.

But a public information meeting scheduled for Wednesday with members of the Wayne County Road Commission may somewhat lower your built-up blood pressure.

The question-and-answer period, sponsored by Canton Township for residents of Canton, Plymouth and other nearby communities, is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. in the UAW Local 735 hall, 48055 Michigan Avenue—one mile west of Beck.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein, moderator for the meeting, says WCRC members will explain the financial plight of their agency and the "why" behind the chuckholes, cracks and bumps which create so many motorist headaches.

Stein is expected to reveal a proposal he is formulating to "share" the cost of road maintenance with the road commission.

The plan could involve a millage increase, Stein said. But the supervisor only hinted about his proposal and refused to elaborate until the meeting.

Stein said he decided to request the meeting with the WCRC because of the numerous phone calls he has received over the condition of roads in Canton Township.

Scheduled to speak and answer questions at Wednesday's meeting are: Thomas O'Rourke, managing director of the road commission; Michael Berry, chairman; Charles H. Van-Deusen, assistant managing director; Robert Larson, director of transportation; Mitchell Zolik, deputy managing director; and Walter Meyers, county highway engineer.

Normally, in villages and townships, the county is responsible for road maintenance. Cities usually levy a tax on residents to cover road paving and upkeep.

Cancer research prompts a book and new lifestyle

Five years ago Dr. Thomas H. Corbett, an anesthesiologist at Wayne County General Hospital in Westland, became curious about the long-term effects of repeated exposure to the kinds of anesthetics he dealt with every day.

He found that nurses specializing in that field had a cancer rate three times higher than normal, and gave birth to an unusually high number of deformed babies.

Naturally, this disturbed him—but not nearly as much as the emergency just about that time of a far more widely spread, and far more dangerous outbreak of chemical poisoning.

The culprit was PBB, and if you lived in Michigan during 1973 and 1974—the odds are the half-gallon of milk, pound of hamburger and package of cheese you bought down at the corner store were all slowly poisoning you.

"We're never really going to get rid of all the PBB," he says. "It was probably the worst environmental disaster in history."

State officials "lacked the knowledge and the expertise to such a degree that they didn't even recognize that a problem existed," Dr. Corbett says.

Out of Corbett's work on the PBB scandal and other problems has come a new book, "Cancer and Chemicals," (Nelson-Hall, 1977)—and a new lifestyle for Dr. Corbett.

Nearly everybody has heard something about the ubiquitous presence of carcinogenic—cancer causing—substances in food, water and air. Few people do nearly anywhere near as much about it as Dr. Corbett.

He doesn't drink coffee from styrofoam cups, because hot liquids leach styrene out of the styrofoam, and styrene has caused cancer in laboratory animals.

He doesn't drink tap water unless it is passed through a charcoal filter, because the chlorine used in treating it chemically changes some substances and makes them carcinogens.

He bought a car with leather seats, because the vinyl more commonly used in the seats gives off particles

which are none too good for you, either.

Corbett isn't totally satisfied with the testing for PBB now being done on Michigan cattle.

"The FDA (Food and Drug Administration) testified at (state hearings) that PBB is in the soil on some farms and new animals can absorb it in a variety of ways, through their hooves, by inhaling the dust, or by rolling on the ground," he says.

Only cattle born before Jan. 1, 1976 will be tested—Corbett says some 10 per cent of the swine in Michigan are also contaminated and they will not be tested.

How does a person handle all this? Well, besides the listing above of things Dr. Corbett avoids, he doesn't eat Michigan milk or meat, and he doesn't eat in fast food restaurants, since he believes that's where a lot of those products end up.

Another thing he won't eat is fish from the Pine River. The Michigan Chemical Company, which manufactured Firemaster, the PBB-loaded product that contaminated much of Michigan's food chain, has its plant on that river. Michigan Chemical is "a very sloppy outfit," says Dr. Corbett, and fish in the Pine River are now "loaded with PBB."

Unlike fish elsewhere in the Great Lakes, which are loaded with PCB, Dr. Corbett won't eat those fish, either.

"You can't even eat the ducks around the Pine River because they eat the fish," he says.

All of this, of course, is profoundly depressing—all the more so because Dr. Corbett says there's literally nothing you can do about it now besides attempting to avoid contact with contamination.

For the future, he says, "We need tough toxic substance control acts with a lot of teeth in them."

"The reason the PBB thing got so out of hand in this state is that nobody knew how to handle it. You've got to have an environmental disaster control team, and you've got to have the best. We cannot rely on the state government and the usual bureaucracy to handle something like this. (The disaster control team) primarily has to

have the safety of the people in mind." Dr. Corbett is the father of four children, and of all the news he has to give, it's his view on that which is perhaps most depressing.

"I've been thinking that it's probably a good idea to have that many children."

"By the time they reach 30, I may lose one or two of them from these poisons."

Hospital rezoning decision due

Should a 200-bed hospital, nursing home and medical office complex be constructed south of Meijer Thrifty Acres on Canton Center Road?

Township residents may air their feelings on the \$30 million medical center proposed by developer Mel Stein at a public hearing scheduled for tonight (Monday) by the Canton Planning Commission.

The hearing is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m. in the township firehall at Canton Center and Cherry Hill.

Following the public hearing, the planning commission is expected to recommend approval or denial of Stein's request to rezone a 10-acre parcel south of Meijer Thrifty Acres from residential.

The rezoning, needed to construct the proposed medical center, must be approved by the Canton Township

Canton Twp. OK's '78 budget

In approving a \$2.5 million budget for 1978 on Tuesday night, Canton board members OK'd establishment of a community development department and the hiring of a township planner, engineer and grant coordinator.

Deputy Treas. Mike Gorman juggled line items in the original budget proposal to finance a portion of the com-

munity development department's \$115,000 budget.

The remainder of the department's budget will be financed by an additional \$81,000 in revenues from ambulance, weed-cutting, tree-planting and other fees. Those revenues were underestimated by \$81,000 in the original budget proposal, Gorman said.

Proposals to bolster bottle ban casualties

State Sen. William Faust (D-Westland), whose district includes part of Canton and Garden City, has introduced a package of bills designed to benefit labor and business adversely affected by passage of the 1976 bottle ban.

Although he supported the bottle ban, Faust said he was sensitive to the problems some labor and business groups would encounter once the ban passed.

All three bills deal with some aspect of taxation credit. One bill will provide credit, through revision of the Single Business Tax, for retraining of employees. The credit would cover up to \$300 of the costs for worker retraining needed by passage of the bottle ban.

A similar bill would grant the same amount of credit through amendment of the State Income Tax Act directly to persons needing new vocational training.

Quail hunt coming up

Hunters may shoot quail this fall in 23 southern Michigan counties between Oct. 27 and Nov. 25—which is four counties less than open for the season in 1976.

The Natural Resources Commission has authorized the 30-day season based on recommendations from the Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Division.

The final budget, unanimously approved by board members Tuesday night, balances revenues and expenditures at \$2,539,954. The original budget proposal for 1978 was set at \$2,458,954.

According to Gorman, employees of the new community development department will not be hired until the accounting firm of Seidman & Seidman completes its study of township personnel and prepares a job description list.

Other major differences between the 1977 and 1978 operating budgets include a 91 per cent increase for the recreation department in 1978 and a 62 per cent increase in the building and grounds budget. The latter was increased because of an expected jump in utility costs when township employees move into the new administration building.

"We have consistently made the point that hunters should be allowed to take quail when numbers build up over a period of mild winters because a 'hard' winter can reduce the population severely," notes David Jenkins, wildlife division chief. "Last year, that 'hard' winter came, and as a result, our annual June whistling counts were greatly reduced this year."

"We can only forecast a poorer than average season for the Michigan quail hunter in 1977."

Counties open for quail hunting this year are: Allegan, Berrien, Branch, Calhoun, Cass, Hillsdale, Ingham, Ionia, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lenawee, Monroe, Montcalm, Muskegon, Oakland, Ottawa, St. Clair, St. Joseph, Saginaw, Shiawassee, Van Buren, Washtenaw and Wayne.

Sales becoming brisk for local car dealers

The automobile industry is in for another banner year if activities in the Plymouth area showrooms is any basis by which to judge the future.

Every dealer has expressed optimism as sales have risen from 15 per cent to 75 per cent over the same period a year ago. And sales are still soaring.

"I was a bit disappointed at the time we were showing our new models," Lou LaRiche, the Chevrolet dealer, confided. "Most of the people just came to look. Now they are returning, and business has increased at least 20 per cent."

The greatest growth was seen by Don Massey Cadillac, where sales are up 75 per cent from a year ago.

"When we get into our new showroom and can really display the new models our sales may go even higher than that," Massey said with an air of confidence.

IT WAS THE SAME story at every other dealership—even American Motors, which, for one of the few times in recent years, has a waiting list for new models.

"Our Concord two-door is one of the most popular cars we have had in a long time," Bob Cann said. "And with the rush to new cars, our customers must now wait two and three weeks."

Buick Regal and the Turbo Charger V6 also are what Jack Selle, the Buick dealer, referred to as "hot items."

"If you want anything special," Selle said, "You must wait about six weeks."

Jim Seovitt, sales manager at the Lincoln-Mercury showroom, is brimming with confidence; he claimed business was up about 100 per cent over this period last year.

"Our Zephyr and the Cougar are the hot cars, along with the Mercury Marquis. The Zephyr can be had for \$3,800 and the Cougar for \$5,200. But they run much more as the purchasers are asking for all the extras."

THE LONE EXCEPTION to the vast increase in sales was at the Colonial Plymouth dealership.

Tony Marino, the sales manager, claimed that they have their regular customers for the Cordova and the Lebaron, the two most popular models,

and expect to sell the usual 1,400 to 2,000 new cars during the year.

"We are having a run on the big car—the Ford LTD—and our sales thus far are up about 10 per cent," Leo Calhoun, the Ford dealer, confided.

"The sticker price of the LTD is \$5,128, but I am surprised at the way the buyers are 'loading up' on all the extras.

"This is the last year for some of the extras, and the buyers are now getting all they can before it is too late."

One big surprise for LaRiche is the demand for the four-door Corvette. This model, ranging in price from \$10,000 to \$12,000, is in limited production and there is now a waiting list.

"With this demand, along with the popular Chevrolet, Caprice and the Monte Carlo, our business is up more than 25 per cent compared to this period last year, and the biggest surprise is the demand for trucks."

ANOTHER SURPRISE among the dealers is the demand for the big model Cadillacs.

The El Dorado model wasn't cut in size, and the demand for it is great. The most popular model is the Seville. This model was reduced in size a year ago and is now going strong.

And the Fleetwood Brougham still is one of the real "standbys."

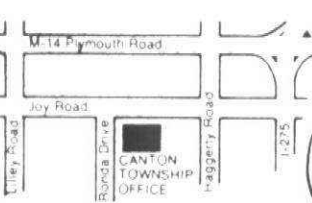

Train derails at Farmer, blocks traffic, dumps coal

Nine cars of a 106-car freight train rolled off the C&O railroad tracks behind the Plymouth Cultural Center early Wednesday afternoon. One of the cars tipped over, dumping 100 tons of coal on the gravel.

"At this point, I would not care to speculate about the cause of the derailment," said Plymouth-area trainmaster Lawrence Judd. "It could be any one of many things." He added that it could take several weeks before a cause could be determined.

The derailed cars blocked all traffic at the intersection of Thursday.

Plymouth police were called in immediately, according to Chief Timothy Ford. He said roadblocks were set up at Theodore and Amelia. Westbound Farmer traffic was re-routed to Amelia, and eastbound traffic was re-routed to Theodore.

Crews from the C&O worked around the clock clearing the coal and moving the derailed freight cars, Judd said. The broken track was replaced by late

Thursday afternoon and the crossing guard was repaired early Friday evening.

JUDD SAID the train, packed with coal for Detroit Edison, was heading west when one of the cars lumbered off the track, tipped over and slammed down on its side.

The eight other cars slid off the track but remained upright. The derailed cars were taken to the C&O repair tracks near Starkweather for examination and to check for possible causes of the accident.

Ford, who was on the scene shortly after the cars derailed, said it appeared to him that the tracks were in a poor state of repair. He said that some of the spikes holding the track to the rail bed were so loose they could be pulled out by hand.

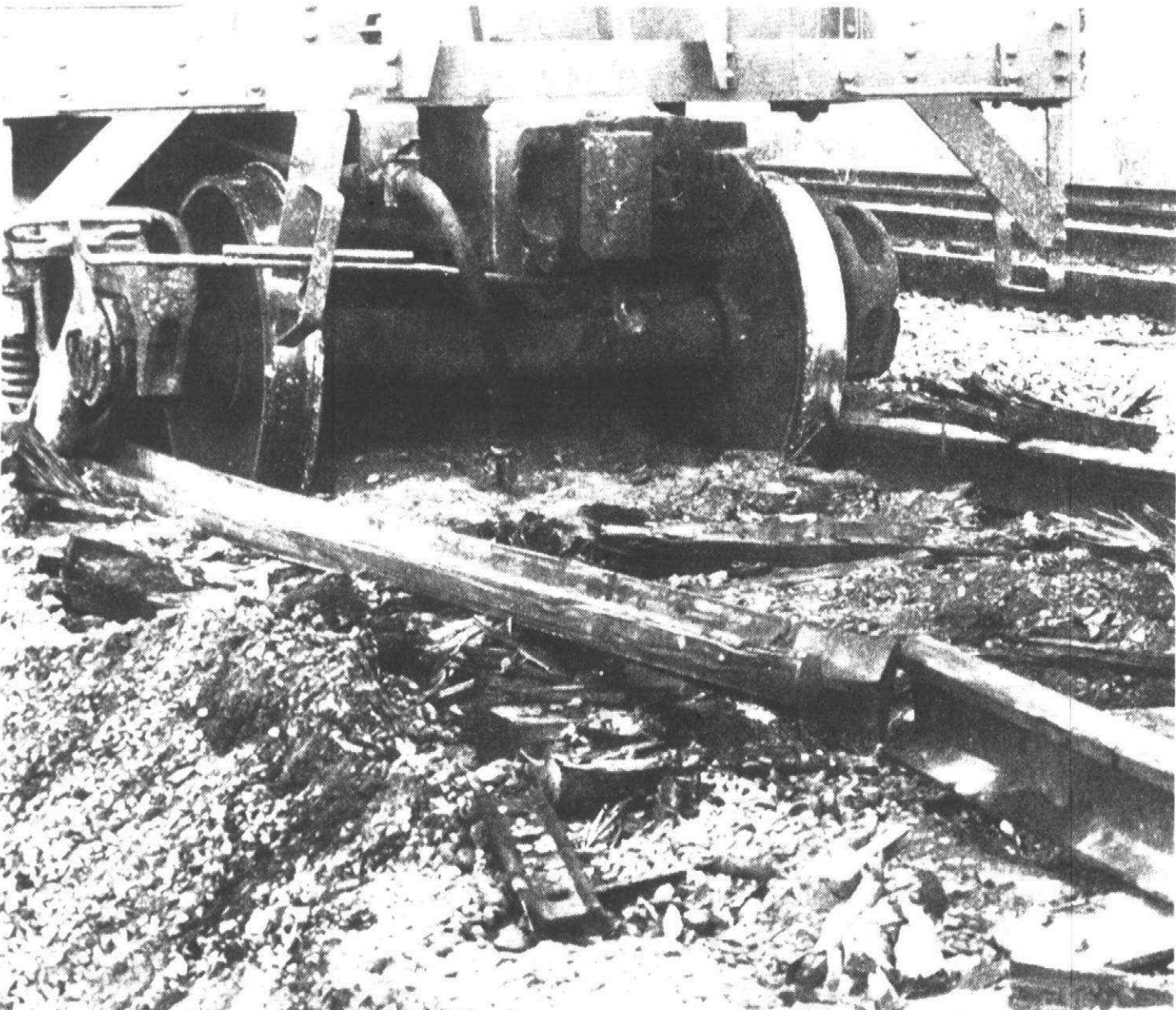
Although Judd declined to estimate the amount of damage, he said it would probably run into the thousands of dollars.

Halloween is creeping upon us and once again police agencies and various groups are issuing warnings to make this year's pumpkin festival a safe and happy one.

Halloween will be celebrated on Oct. 31 (Monday) this year. Tim Ford, Plymouth Chief of Police, recommends the following Halloween night safety rules:

- Try to trick or treat between the hours of 6 and 8 p.m.
- All porch lights should be turned on.
- Adults should accompany children.
- Cross streets only at the corner.
- Do not drive children around in cars and keep parked cars off the streets.
- Use battery-powered lights in pumpkins.
- Have children carry identification.

In recent years, local police agencies have received reports about dangerous and harmful treats being distributed to trick-or-treaters.

Ford strongly recommends parents to exercise careful control over the treats their children receive. Treats should not be consumed until they have been inspected.

THROUGH THE COOPERATION of the ITT Corp. in Plymouth, a metal detector will be in operation on Halloween night at the Plymouth City Hall, 201 S. Main Street in the first floor lobby.

The detector will be made available to the public from 8 to 11 p.m. Designed by Ray Lipan of ITT, the detector sounds a buzzer when any candy wrapper containing metals—pins, needles or staples—pass through the machine.

Some simple costume decorating tricks can do a lot to help protect children from accidental injury on Halloween night, according to the Michigan Optometric Association.

The key is for parents to make costumes that will be seen easily by drivers and will not block the child's view of traffic, steps, curbs and other hazards.

"Adding retro-reflective material to a costume is the easiest and best way to increase visibility to safe levels," said Dr. Robert L. Klein of the MOA. Retro-reflective material on shoes and clothing can make pedestrians safely visible to drivers at speeds of 70 and 80 m.p.h., according to studies at Indiana University.

Retro-reflective material can be purchased in iron-on, sew-on and stick-on varieties in most hardware and department stores. It should be applied to the front, sides and back of the costume, and can be incorporated into the costume design.

"THE OTHER SIDE of Halloween safety is to throw away those masks and use nonallergenic makeup instead," Klein said. "Masks can slip out of place or have eye holes so small they restrict children's vision."

Klein cautions parents that makeup should be applied carefully and to keep makeup particles and applicators out of children's eyes.

The Red Cross offers the following safety tips to protect trick-or-treaters from accident and injury:

- Make certain that costumes are flame retardant, including wigs, false beards and mustaches.
- Be sure costumes fit properly; oversized shoes, bulky capes, dangling sleeves and long skirts or trousers can result in injury.
- Do not carry dangerous accessory items such as swords, knives, broomsticks and metal or wood "fairy wands." Cardboard substitutes are just as fun, lighter in weight and less dangerous, the Red Cross said.
- Clear your yard of obstacles such as sprinklers, hoses, trash cans and bicycles.
- Do not allow children to bicycle from house to house.
- Do not allow children to carry a lit candle or lantern; provide them with a flashlight.

The costume dance will feature dancing to live music, beer, food and set-ups (bring your own bottle). Prizes will be offered in three categories for best costumes.

For shy goblins who don't want to don costumes but enjoy dancing, they can come in street wear. Non-costume attendees may enjoy the dancing, food, and drinks but, of course, won't be eligible for any of the prizes.

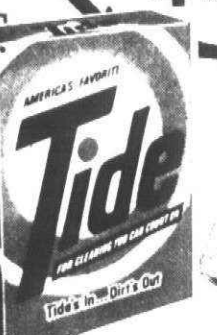

Region leads in know-how of labor force

When it comes to an educated and skilled labor force, knowledgeable about industry, the Great Lakes states are above the national average, says a Michigan State University manpower specialist.

According to Dr. Daniel H. Kruger, professor of labor and industrial relations, 21.4 per cent of the nation's civilian labor force in 1976 was concentrated in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin.

All but Minnesota had a higher proportion of its employed work force in blue collar occupations than did the nation as a whole.

"The importance of the region as a manufacturing center," Kruger stated, "is reflected in the proportion of craft workers in the labor force of these six states."

These ranged from 13.3 per cent in craft occupations in Minnesota to 14.8 per cent in Indiana. On the national level, 12.9 per cent of the labor force was classified as craftsmen.

"The high proportion of skilled workers in the region is an important factor for manufacturing activity," Kruger added.

Five of the six Great Lakes states also had a higher proportion of semi-skilled workers than the national average. Minnesota, at 9.5 per cent, was less than the national figure of 11.4 per cent.

Alternative school being planned

An alternative school is one step closer to reality with the presentation to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education of a status report from the alternative education committee.

Nearly a year of research, study and discussion went into the 24-page report submitted to the board Oct. 17.

The 14-member alternative education committee is composed of parents, teachers, administrators and residents concerned with youth. They have been meeting weekly to look at national statistics on alternative schools, needs of students here and a relevant philosophy of education.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES will be based on the needs of students in the plan proposed by the committee. Each student's program will be tailored to his or her unique learning style.

The teaching team is considered the key ingredient in defining the program and carrying it out. The committee, therefore, considers it essential that the staff selected to serve the alternative school develop the program in its final form.

The report lists the fundamental principles of the alternative of the alternative school which emphasize the importance of direct staff involvement.

•Commitment to a student-centered approach in developing the learning climate and determining the means to meet student needs.

•A student-teacher relationship characterized by partnership, coopera-

tive school management, and the development of learning strategies to meet the needs of individual students.

•A teacher-teacher relationship based on collective responsibility for teaching, planning, organizing, problem solving and decision making.

•Contracts between students and teacher based on joint planning of that student's work.

•A system of accountability for results based on standards of achievement and effectiveness measured by both formal and informal means.

•Gaining knowledge, basic skills and attitudes necessary to function effectively in a life role, make appropriate choices, provide for personal and family needs, and meet obligations to self, others and society.

STUDENTS WILL HAVE many different kinds of reasons for choosing to attend the alternative school.

Some may have difficulty adjusting to the academic or social climate of the 4,200-student Plymouth Centennial Educational Park. They may be dissatisfied with their activities or achievement, even though they appear to be successful. Parents or school counselors may encourage a student to choose the alternative school as a more appropriate setting for learning.

Because an alternative school is designed to meet the needs of a wide variety of students, a number of different approaches to learning have been included in the committee's recommendations.

These include, but aren't limited to,

large and small group instruction, one-to-one teaching, peer tutoring, individual contracts for learning and independent study based on a contract.

The community can be a classroom for students in the alternative school. Community learning experiences suggested are job placement, service projects, work experience, and cooperative programming with business or industry.

Special opportunities for alternative school students can include course work at the CEP, courses at other schools or training programs, summer school classes, evening school, seminars, workshops, group projects and specially scheduled classes at the alternative school site.

THE SUMMARY statement of the committee's recommendation notes:

"The point of a differential approach to programming in the alternative school is that the opportunities and

learning challenges should fit the situation and needs of the student population individually and collectively. In short, there is no one best program and, in fact, a variety of program approaches will be necessary.

"The alternative school, therefore, will be typified by involvement in varied forms including participation in the regular CEP program, community based experiences, on-site and off-site opportunities, and any combination of these forms. In any case, the form of involvement must be determined with respect to student need and based on joint teacher-student planning, decision-making and commitment."

Crane cuts power line

About 300 Lakepointe Village residents were left in the dark last week when a construction accident cut electrical power to the area.

According to John Harkness, a spokesman for Detroit Edison, the power was out from about 4 p.m. to after 6 p.m.

Almost alone in growing

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools is but one of five public school districts in Wayne County with increased enrollment for the current school year.

The official 1977-78 fourth Friday count—the day in which enrollment is counted for state aid computation—showed only Huron, Inkster, Gibraltar, Woodhaven and Plymouth-Canton with student enrollments higher than 1976-77.

Plymouth-Canton shows the highest enrollment increase of 866 students, followed by Huron, 367; Woodhaven, 150; Gibraltar, 47; and Inkster, 34.

Area school districts with declining enrollments are: Garden City, a loss of 985 students; Livonia, 2,178; Northville, 962; Redford Union, 428; South Redford, 508; and Wayne-Westland, minus 668 students.

Other school districts with enrollment declines of 300 students or more include Cherry Hill, Crestwood, Dearborn, Detroit, Grosse Pointe, Lincoln Park, Romulus, Southgate, Taylor, Trenton and Wyandotte.

For the entire Wayne County Intermediate School District, the student population has declined 18,758.

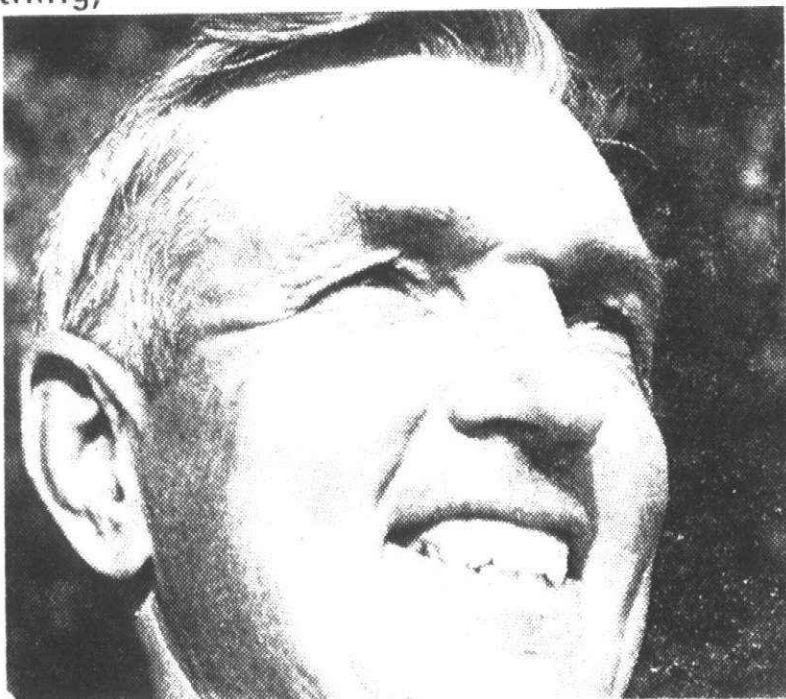

Quail hunt coming up

Hunters may shoot quail this fall in 23 southern Michigan counties between Oct. 27 and Nov. 25—which is four counties less than open for the season in 1976.

The Natural Resources Commission has authorized the 30-day season based on recommendations from the Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Division.

"We have consistently made the point that hunters should be allowed

to take quail when numbers build up over a period of mild winters because a 'hard' winter can reduce the population severely," notes David Jenkins, wildlife division chief. "Last year, that 'hard' winter came, and as a result, our annual June whistling counts were greatly reduced this year.

"We can only forecast a poorer than average season for the Michigan quail hunter in 1977."

VA burial funds available

The Veterans Administration has reminded former servicemen and women that their families should be made aware of the VA burial allowance available to eligible veterans.

VA provides up to \$250 toward the burial expenses of eligible veterans and an additional \$150 is available as a plot or interment allowance, if burial is not in a national cemetery or other government cemetery.

These VA payments will be reduced or eliminated in cases where the veteran's employer or a state agency has made such payments.

In cases where a veteran's death is service-connected, VA will pay an amount not to exceed \$800 in lieu of the usual burial allowances.

With the exception of Arlington National Cemetery, burial is available to eligible veterans at all national cemeteries having space, and may also be authorized for an eligible veteran's wife or husband, minor children and, under certain circumstances, unmarried adult children.

Eligibility requirements for burial at

Arlington National Cemetery may be obtained from the Superintendent, Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, Va. 22211.

VA will provide a headstone or grave marker for eligible veterans, and memorial markers are provided for certain members of the armed services who die on active duty and whose remains are not recovered, or who are buried at sea.

An American flag will also be provided upon request for use in covering the casket.

Veterans eligible for the VA plot and burial allowances and for burial in a national cemetery are those discharged under conditions other than dishonorable and who served in the Spanish-American War, Mexican Border period, World Wars I and II, the Korean conflict, or the Vietnam era.

Also eligible are peacetime veterans entitled to service-connected compensation at time of death or discharge or who were retired for disability incurred in the line of duty, it was pointed out.

Rocks win Sub-8 crown by beating Bentley, 28-6

Jean Jacques Rousseau, a French philosopher, once said, "Man was born free, but is everywhere in chains." That would have definitely applied to the Livonia Bentley football squad Friday night.

The Bulldogs offense seemed weighed down with chains while its defense was fleeced clean by the Plymouth Salem offense.

The final score of the Suburban Eight League football clash was 28-6, Salem. The Rocks literally came, saw and conquered the Bulldogs, who gave a good fight but were no match for Salem's offensive power.

ing a number of turnovers by both clubs.

The scoring series started on the Salem 24 yard line. Several plays moved the ball to the Bentley 21 yard line, where Hewlett scored on a keeper around the left end. The extra point kick by Dave Basierbe was good.

The Rocks again turned the trick with 8:34 left in the second period when Hewlett capped a 76-yard drive by scoring on a dive from three yards out. Hewlett set up the scoring play by running from the Salem 24 yard line to the Bentley nine on an option play to the right side.

The extra point kick was good.

The Rocks scored again three minutes later after tackling the Bentley

punter as he attempted to run after a bad snap from center.

Salem took control on the Bentley 14 yard line, and, four plays later, Hewlett kept the ball and bulled his way into the endzone from one yard out.

Basierbe's extra point kick was good, and the score at halftime was 21-0.

Salem scored again early in the third period, but from then on the Bulldogs stymied the Rocks' offensive maneuvers.

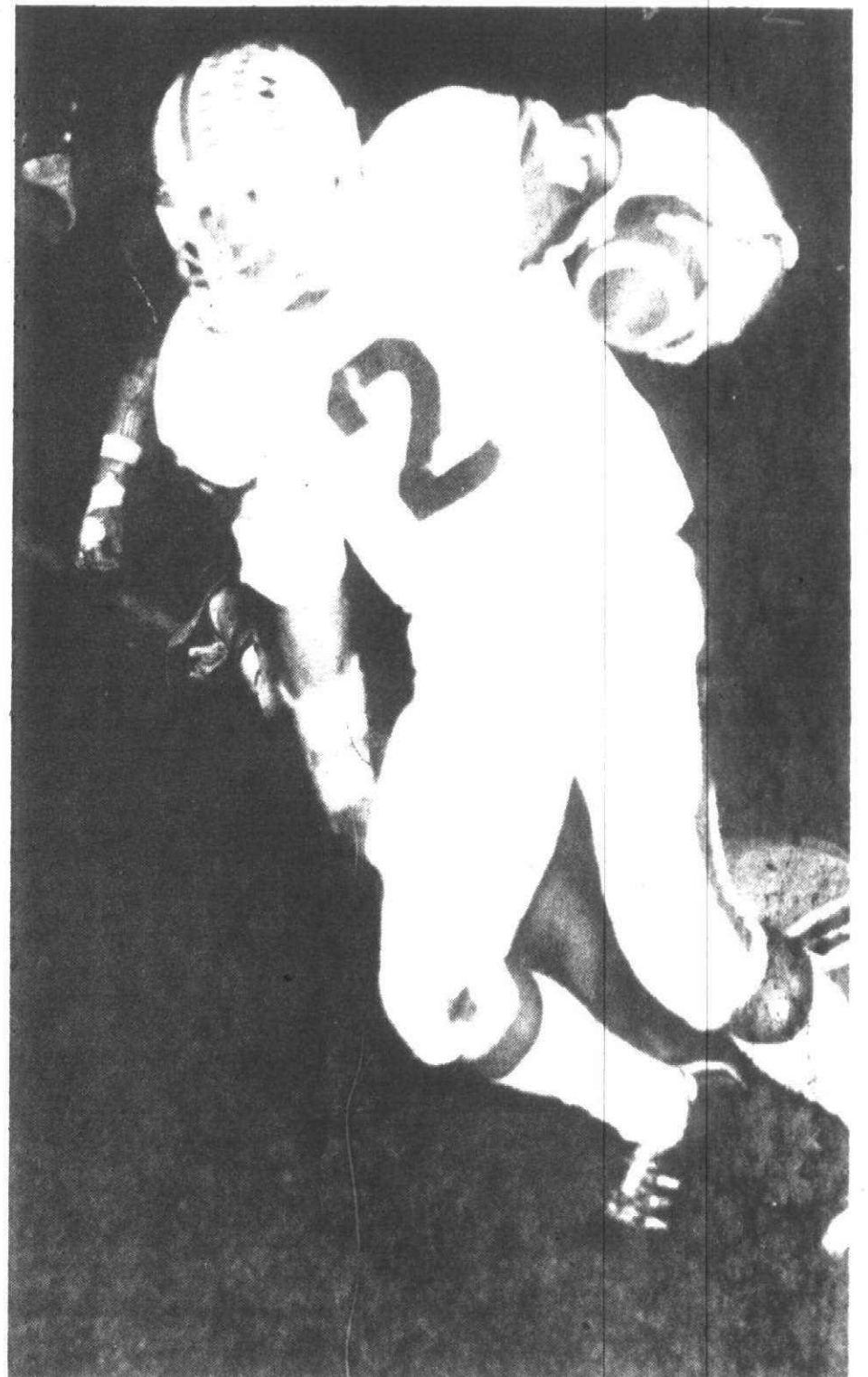
Hewlett led the scoring drive that started at the Rocks' 32 yard line. Curt Lewis scored the final touchdown when he caught a Hewlett pass all alone in the endzone. The play covered 27 yards.

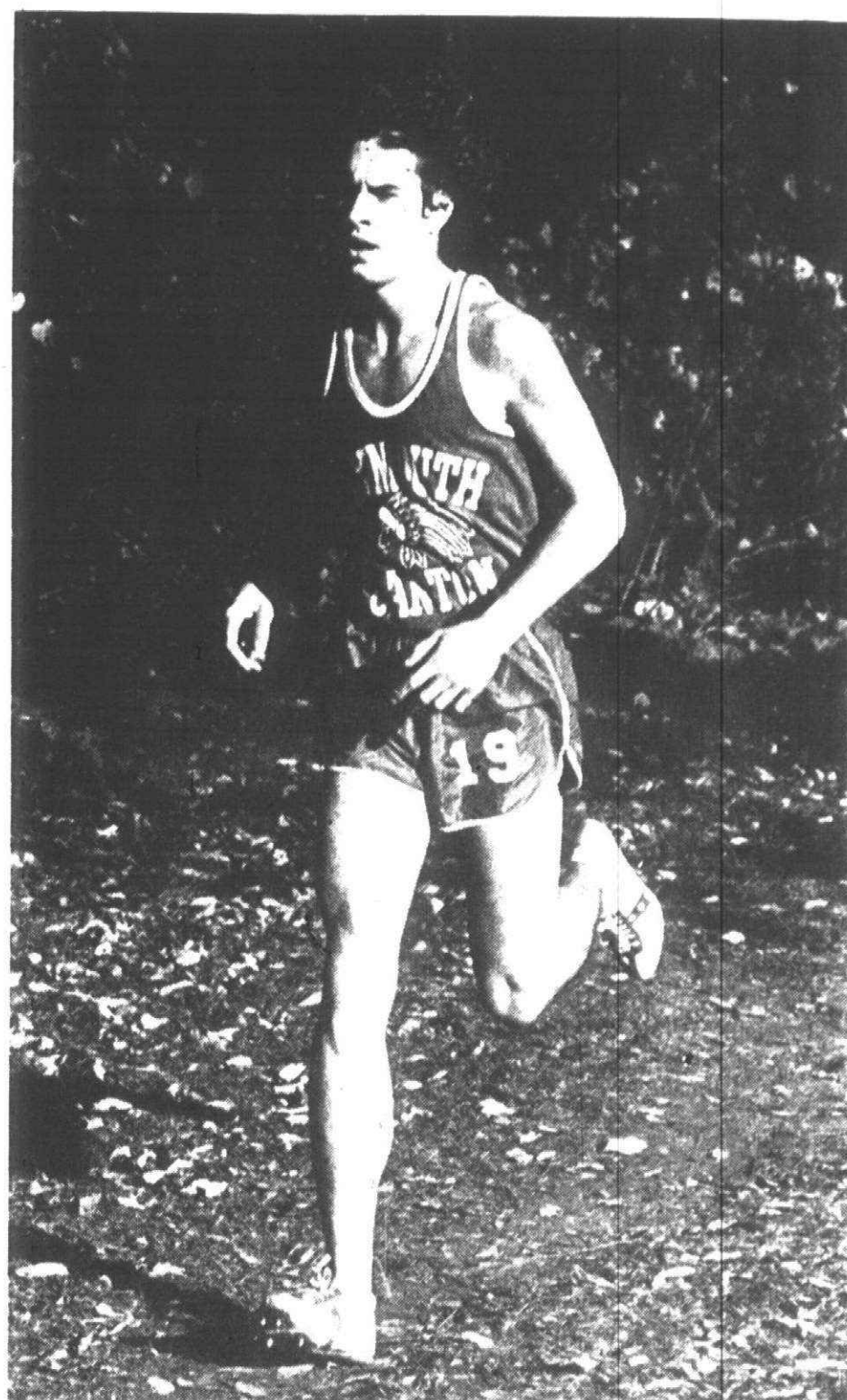
Franklin, which defeated North Farmington in a crucial late-season dual meet, won three flight titles at the league meet. North won flight

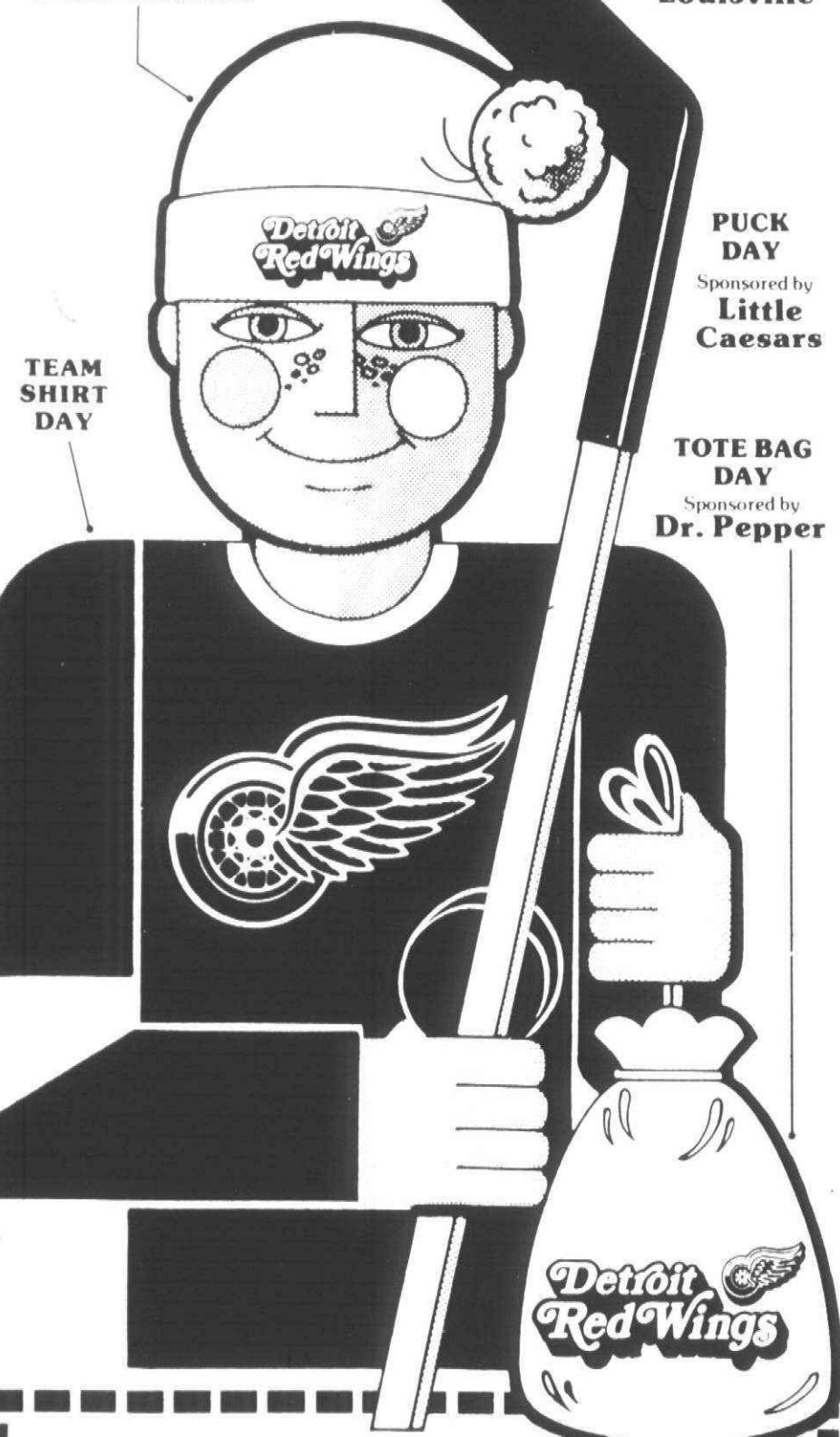

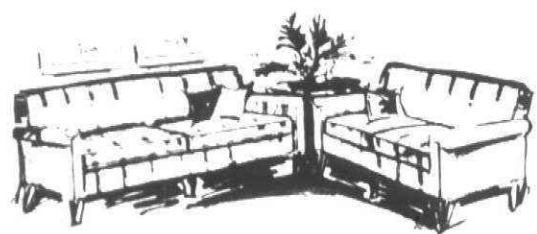

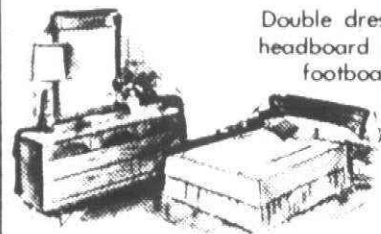

For 2nd straight year

Harrison cops Western-6 title

Farmington Harrison won its second-straight Western Six League football championship last Friday with a 28-6 victory over Waterford Mott in the league finale for both teams.

Harrison's accomplishment marks the first time in the nine-year history of the league that one team has won back-to-back grid titles. Harrison, which reached the finals of the state Class A playoffs last season, has a 6-1 overall record to go with a 5-0 league record this year.

"It's been a good year," said Harrison coach John Herrington, whose team lost its opening game to city-rival Farmington High School. "We'd be in great shape right now if we hadn't lost our opening game."

"But at least we won the league. That's always been our number one goal, and I'm glad to be there now."

Harrison, which has developed its passing game this season, has an excellent quarterback in Brett Homovec, a 6-0, 176-pound senior. Against Mott, Homovec completed five of 11

attempts for most of Harrison's 185 passing yards. He hit Brad Bache, a 185-pound end, with touchdown passes of 16 and 75 yards.

"We threw the ball well just about any time we wanted to," Herrington said. "Our running attack didn't go real well, though. We never could maintain a drive."

HARRISON'S FRED Blackmer, a 190-pound senior tailback, rushed for 48 yards, including touchdown runs of three and one yards. Harrison gained 95 yards on the ground to Mott's 73.

Mott, which couldn't mount much of a passing attack with quarterback Ron Anger, completed five of 23 attempts with two interceptions. Mott avoided a shutout when Anger passed seven yards to split end Joe Scarpelli for a touchdown in the last minute of play.

Harrison finishes its season by facing two rugged opponents—North Farmington and Plymouth Salem. Harrison plays at North Farmington on Saturday (Oct. 29) and then travels to Salem on the following Friday (Nov. 4) for an 8 p.m. game.

Franklin tops Glenn, 17-7

Livonia Franklin, with a devastating ground game, ripped the Rockets of Westland John Glenn, 17-7, Friday night to grab a share of the Northwest Suburban League football crown.

Tailback Jerry Cifor led the way with 200 yards, as the Patriots rolled for 302 rushing yards. They shredded the Rocket defense for 207 rushing yards in the second half alone.

"We found the trap, and they couldn't stop us," said Franklin coach Armand Vigna. "We played a great game on both sides of the line. We played our best game of the year offensively and we played our best game of the year defensively."

Glenn never really got untracked, showing signs of life only sporadically throughout the game.

But it didn't take long for the Patriots to find the endzone, as they took the ball in for the game's first score at 8:43 of the first quarter, only one minute after getting the ball on a 14-yard Glenn punt.

The Patriots took control on the 33 yard line, and quarterback Mike Fry immediately went around right end for 26 yards. Two plays later, Cifor broke over left tackle for five yards and the touchdown. Don Boka's kick for the extra point was good, giving the Patriots an early 7-0 lead.

That lead was in jeopardy in the closing seconds of the half, though.

Glenn quarterback Bill Lee, using the clock and the sidelines with great skill, led the Rockets from their own 30 to inside the Franklin 20 before time finally ran out.

It was the last time Glenn was to handle the ball for quite some time. Franklin took the second half kickoff and kept control of the ball for seven minutes and another score before turning the ball back over.

The Stroller

Fallen leaves, fallen idols

The sun was shining brightly on this beautiful afternoon. A gentle breeze was causing the golden autumn leaves to drift lazily toward the ground.

Sitting there in the back yard of his home watching this show of Mother Nature beautiful as it was The Stroller was in melancholy mood.

Only a few hours before he had been told of the death of Bing Crosby, one of his idols of the entertainment world. And as he sat there gazing at the falling leaves he got to thinking that, just like the leaves, his idols whom he had met during his strolls up and down the journalistic trail were departing, too, one by one.

Just a few months ago he was saddened by the death of Ethel Waters the great singer. Then came the passing of Groucho Marx, and now Bing.

As the falling leaves swirled around him, The Stroller couldn't help recalling each of them and how they had come into his life.

HIS FIRST MEETING with Ethel Waters was during her engagement at the Cass Theater years ago. The theater was owned by E.D. Stair, then owner and publisher of the Detroit Free Press. And it was through his good graces that The Stroller was introduced to Miss Waters prior to one of her evening performances.

A few hours after that introduction, he was in the theater audience and listened to her sing that old favorite, "Stormy Weather," with all the pathos and heartaches anyone could put into a song. It was a stage hit The Stroller never will forget.

Years later when he was at Joe Louis training camp at Pompton Lakes, N.J., Ethel came by to wish the Brown Bomber success in his fistic engagement of the following night. For a few moments we reminisced about our first meeting at the Cass Theater, and from those moments on Ethel always has been one of The Stroller's idols.

IT WAS THE SAME with Groucho Marx, the most famous of the Marx Brothers.

Few people knew it, but the Marx brothers—Groucho, Zeppo, Harpo and Chico—were just as adept at playing billiards as they were at going through their antics behind the footlights. The lone difference was that they were serious at the billiard table.

Any time they came to Detroit for a week's stay at one of the theaters they spent their afternoons in the now almost forgotten Recreation Building on Lafayette.

At the time The Stroller also was interested in "pocket" billiards and this interest enabled him to cross paths with Groucho and his brothers. Many a fine afternoon we had, and strangely, Harpo, who never spoke on stage, was the most talkative at the billiard table.

One of the fondest memories The Stroller has of the Marx boys is of the day when we journeyed over to what was then the Book Cadillac Hotel for lunch.

When we arrived, the host, not recognizing the celebrated Marx brothers, refused to serve Groucho because he was not wearing a tie. In fact he almost ordered him out. On second thought he demurred and brought Groucho a tie that he always had set aside for forgetful patrons.

He seemed delighted when Groucho graciously accepted the tie. But he almost swooned when Groucho wore the tie on his sleeve instead of around his neck.

"See, I'm wearing a tie," Groucho chuckled. And he was served.

THE MEETING with Crosby was another unforgettable moment. It came when The Stroller was traveling with the University of Detroit football team, then coached by "Gus" Dorais.

Prior to coming to Detroit, "Gus" had coached at Gonzaga University, and a young fellow named Bing Crosby tried out for the team but couldn't make it. Undaunted he became one of the college lads who always found a way to be with the team on its travels. Even though "Gus" didn't give him a place on the team, they were great friends even years after both left Gonzaga.

This friendship bloomed when Bing, then a household word, arranged a game with Santa Clara College on the West Coast as a favor to his old Gonzaga coach.

More than that, when the team arrived on the coast, Bing had the entire squad over for dinner. It was then that The Stroller crossed paths with him for the first time.

Later, when The Stroller was attending a convention in Honolulu, he took a weekend off to enjoy the island of Hawaii. On arrival, he checked in at the Cocoa Palms Hotel. It was just about lunch time and he was given a seat at a window. As he sat there awaiting service, he noticed all eyes were turned toward the entrance. Finally a cheer went up.

Bing and his family, who occupied a cottage across the lagoon, had arrived for lunch. As luck would have it, they were seated at the adjacent table.

It didn't take The Stroller long to renew acquaintance with the singer who took him and a football team to dinner.

For the next two days, The Stroller and Bing were companions at lunch and the talk was mostly about the time he failed to make the Dorais football team.

Now they are gone—Ethel, Groucho and Bing, but their memories will forever remain green.

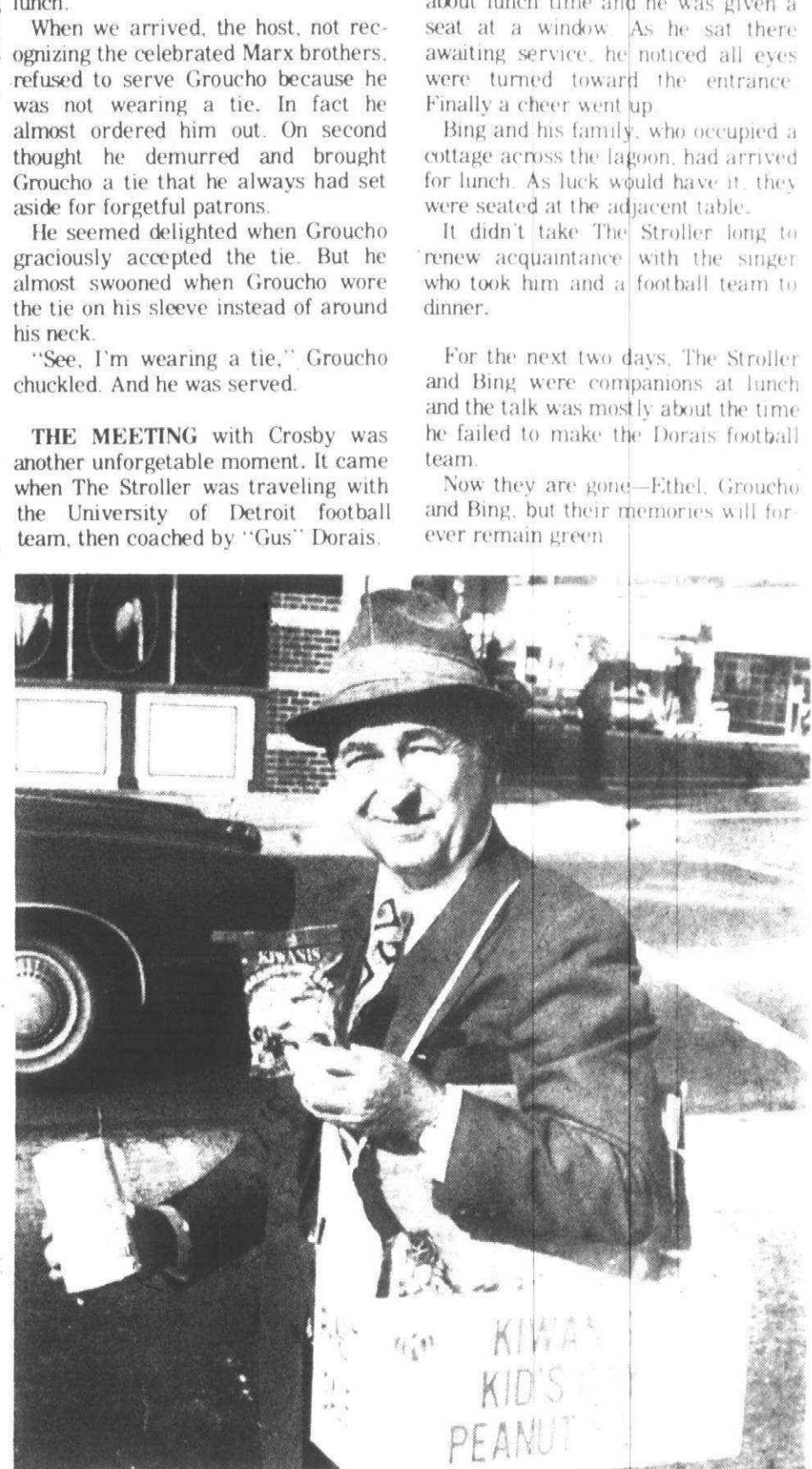

City has give away

The City of Plymouth has money to give away.

Well, not quite to give away. But you can have it pretty reasonably.

According to Mark Wollenwebber, assistant city administrator, there is \$20,000 left in the city's housing rehabilitation fund. The original federal grant was for \$53,000.

"About seven or eight people have borrowed money to fix up their homes. But we still need to get rid of what's left."

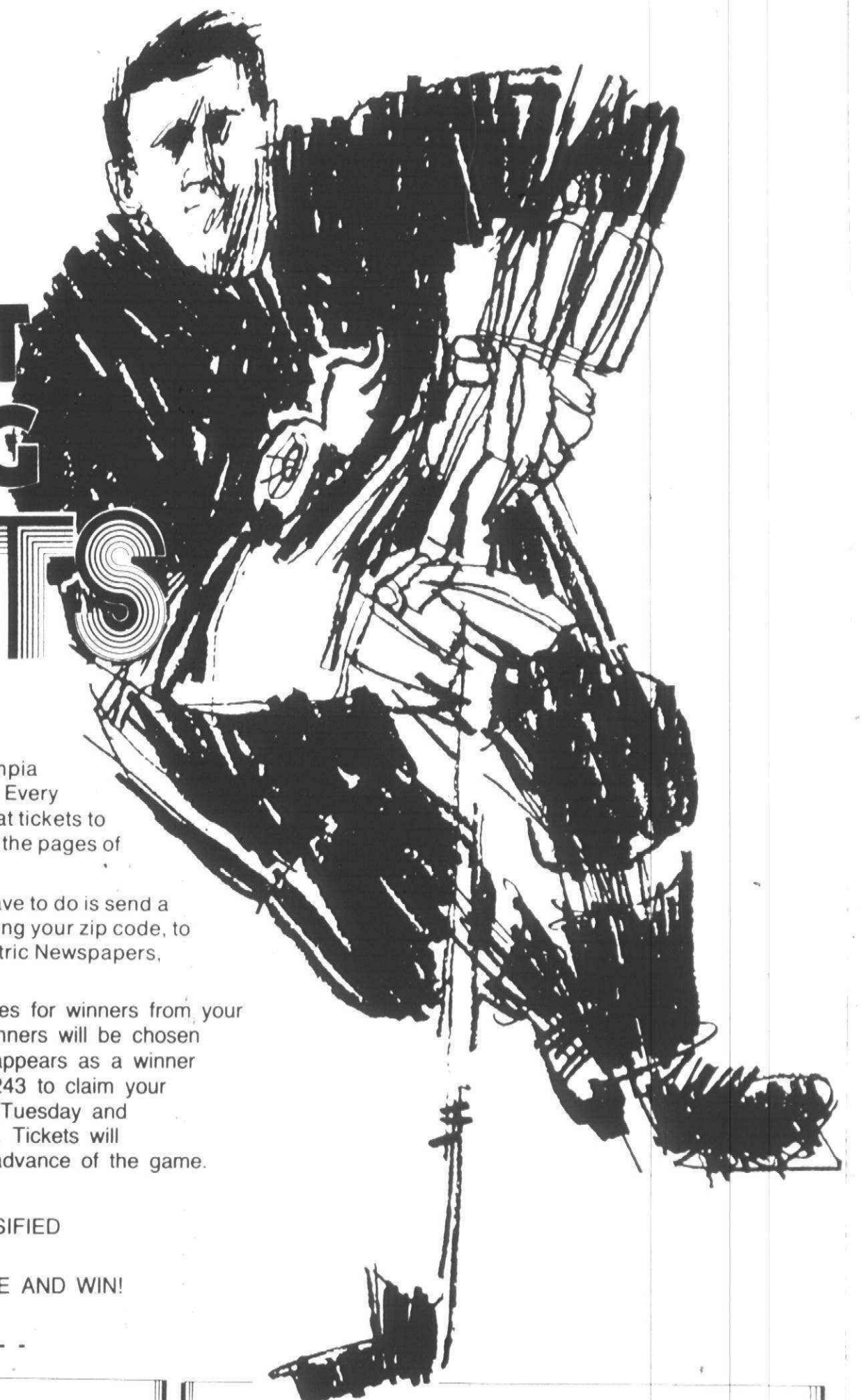
Any city resident is eligible to make application for the loan. The interest rates run from zero to three per cent, depending on the applicant's income.

There is a \$5,000 limit for each applicant. Wollenwebber said.

And, as an added bonus, once 75 per cent of the loan is paid back, the city will pay the final 25 per cent.

"It's waiting here," said Wollenwebber. "All we need is people to come and get it."

Editor: There has been considerable controversy over Plymouth Centennial Educational Park Marching Band. We've heard from the band members, a coach and the director of bands at U. of M. As the parent of a senior and hopefully a future band member, I'd like to make a few remarks.

I did not agree with the 170 musicians from PCEP about the "leftovers." In their business there are no leftovers if the bands are to be successful. (No excuse making, but in their zeal to get their point across mistakes are made.) Togetherness, comraderie, and a will to succeed are the important ingredients, and certainly the band has that. They are willing to practice for hours in any weather and at any hour.

Many a dinner has been late or missed, and many disgruntled parents have had their day off rearranged because of the band performing somewhere. The band members love it and are readily willing to sacrifice for it. Each bandperson (Salem or Canton) seems to "adopt" the other 188 as family for the two and a half months they are together, and that's what is needed if the schools are to remain together as a whole. This is a volunteer organization of students from the main stream of bands from both Canton and Salem; a unique group of musicians who believe in what they're doing and certainly should have their opinions considered.

THERE ARE MANY students now and to come who would join the marching band—so why not let them as an underclassmen unit No. 2? This unit would be made up of incoming Canton and Salem freshmen and first time marching band candidates.

The enrollment in the school system is on the rise and it certainly will not be hard to supply a second unit. (Perhaps the dropout rate of band I would be nil if a second unit were created.) This would allow the newcomers to learn to march and play without the pressure of having to be ready each Friday or when there is a special event.

Students are taught to play in the band on a graduated level, from year to year; why not march the same way? Students from Unit I could help the directors in teaching the newcomers. I'm sure Unit II would be ready and willing to take the field those few weekends when there were football games scheduled Friday and Saturday, whether it was for Salem or Canton. There would be no need to worry over who gets new uniforms because Canton and Salem would be represented in both marching units I and II.

UNFORTUNATELY, the athletic department is split along school lines and I'm aware of it because my band member also runs for the track team.

I feel it is important to have some link between the two schools if only for two and a half months out of the school year. It isn't all glory for band members because they wait until their senior year before receiving a music letter, while one year for a student in any sport field will give them the prestige of being lettermen.

I have been one of those disgruntled parents from time to time, but I'm very proud of how my band member has stuck to it, fulfilled her commitments to the band and PCEP.

Holly's gets license

The Plymouth City Commission awarded a Class "C" liquor license at a special meeting Monday.

By a 6-0 vote the permit was issued to Holly's by Golly at the corner of Harvey Street and Ann Arbor Road. Commissioner Norbert Battermann was absent.

"The first objective of our Suburban Caucus will be to analyze the extent of the problem nationwide, and develop programs for all of us to more effectively represent suburban concerns. I think a cohesive, bipartisan group can have that impact.

"I want to emphasize that this is in no way intended as an effort to downgrade attempts to aid cities and farming areas, which have and deserve strong voices in the Congress now. We're trying to make the suburbs more of a co-equal partner in cooperatively setting policy for the nation," Pursell continued.

"I'm working with the U.S. General Accounting Office, for instance, on a study of how federal funds can be used more effectively to revitalize our center cities. This is a problem which affects the lives of all our people. But I'm convinced that federal aid to the cities has not been used to the best advantage," Pursell maintained.

"I think the problems faced by suburban communities have a similar wide scope, and require additional federal attention."

Pursell said the eight-member organizing group would serve as a steering and policy committee, attempting to be catalysts for unified action by other Congress members with significant suburban constituencies.

Pursell represents suburban communities in northwestern Wayne County, as well as most of Washtenaw and Monroe counties.

Rep. Pursell joins suburban coalition

A bipartisan caucus formed in the U.S. House of Representatives hopes to stimulate consideration of the needs of the nation's suburban areas.

U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) is one of eight organizers who announced the effort at a Capitol Hill news conference.

Pursell will serve with Rep. Ron Mottl (D-Ohio) and Rep. Mark Hannaford (D-Calif.) on the Congressional Suburban Caucus which will define the group's goals. Mottl represents suburban areas around Cleveland, while Hannaford represents communities in the Los Angeles area.

"We estimate that there are some 108 million Americans living in suburban communities. Yet this is the first effort to provide a unified voice for their common concerns, which cut across party lines and committee jurisdictions in the Congress," Pursell said.

Pursell said there is a feeling among suburban citizens, local officials and congressmen that suburban communities tend to be passed over on many federal programs and receive a low return on taxes paid by their citizens.

"The overall impression is that suburban communities are the 'forgotten sector' in our national priorities, expected to put up the taxes and not anticipate any significant return on their contribution," the first-term Congressman charged.

"I do think it's true that worthwhile programs in suburban areas have suffered for lack of federal concern and federal dollars.

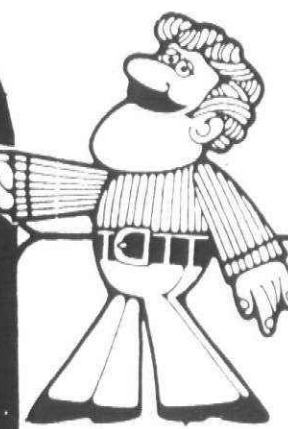

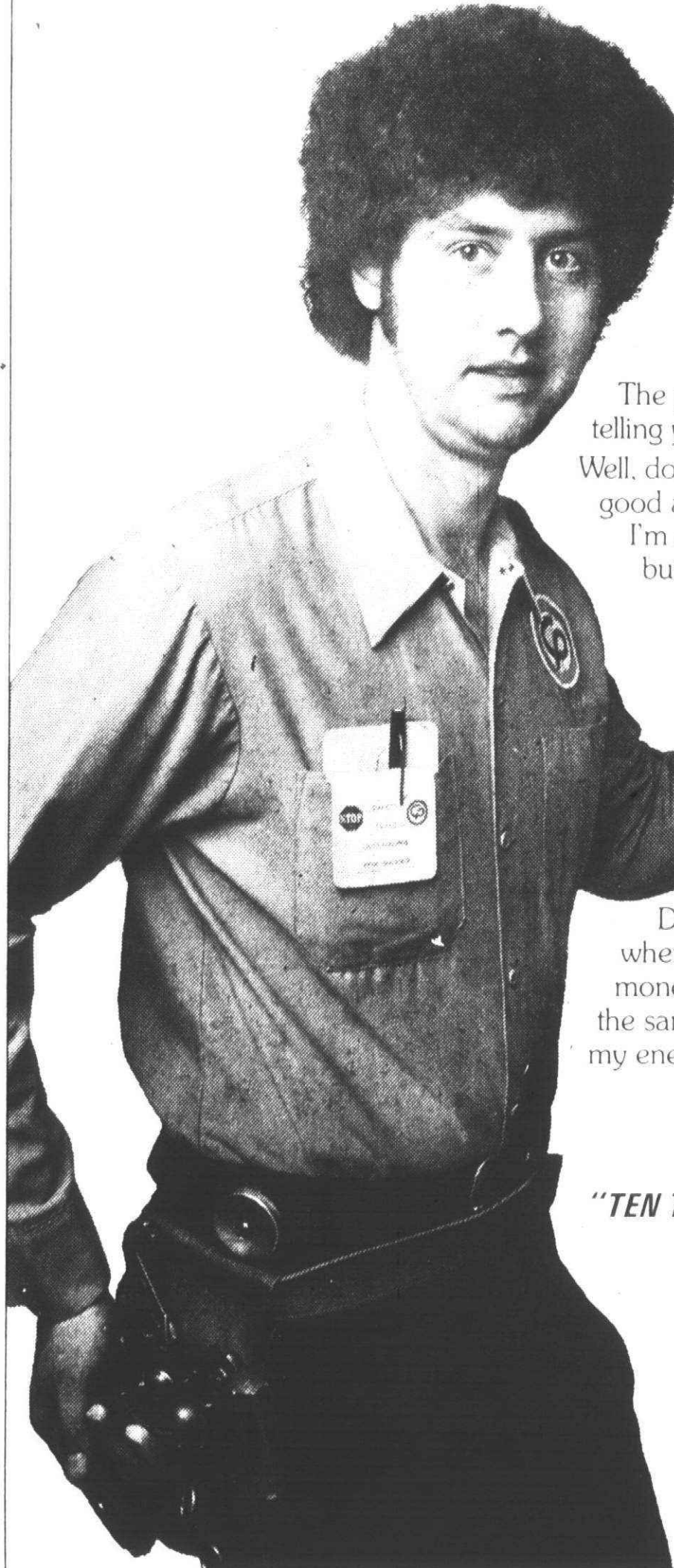

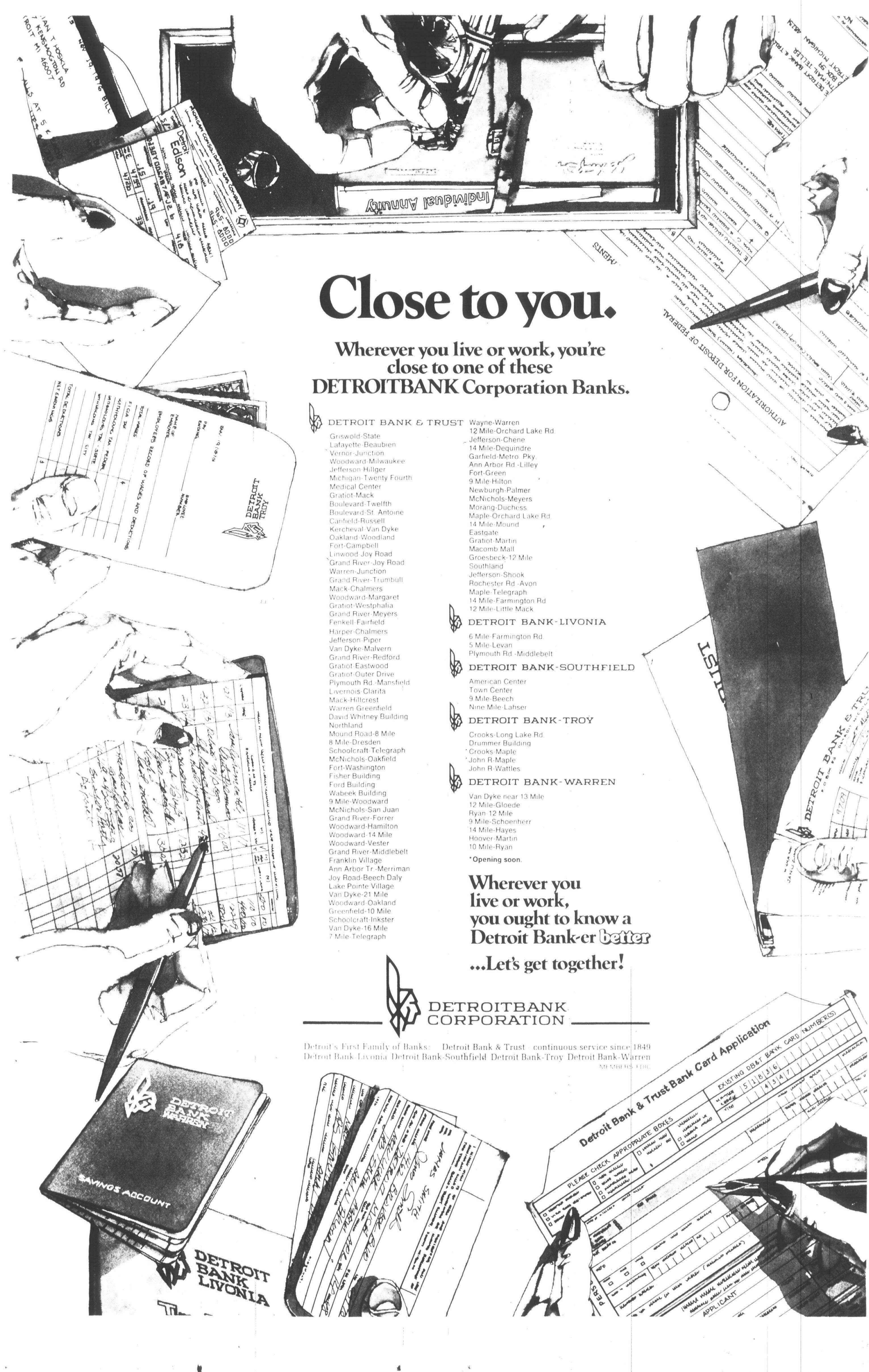

3 1/2 lb. shoulder venison cut into 2-inch cubes
2 teaspoons salt
3/4 teaspoon fresh ground pepper
2 quarts water
2 yellow onions, peeled and quartered
1 1/2 cups wild rice, washed in cold water

Place the venison, water and onions in a large, heavy kettle and simmer uncovered for three hours or until venison is tender. Mix salt, pepper, and wild rice; cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Add to venison mixture, stir, and then simmer uncovered for about 20 minutes more until rice is tender and most of the liquid absorbed.

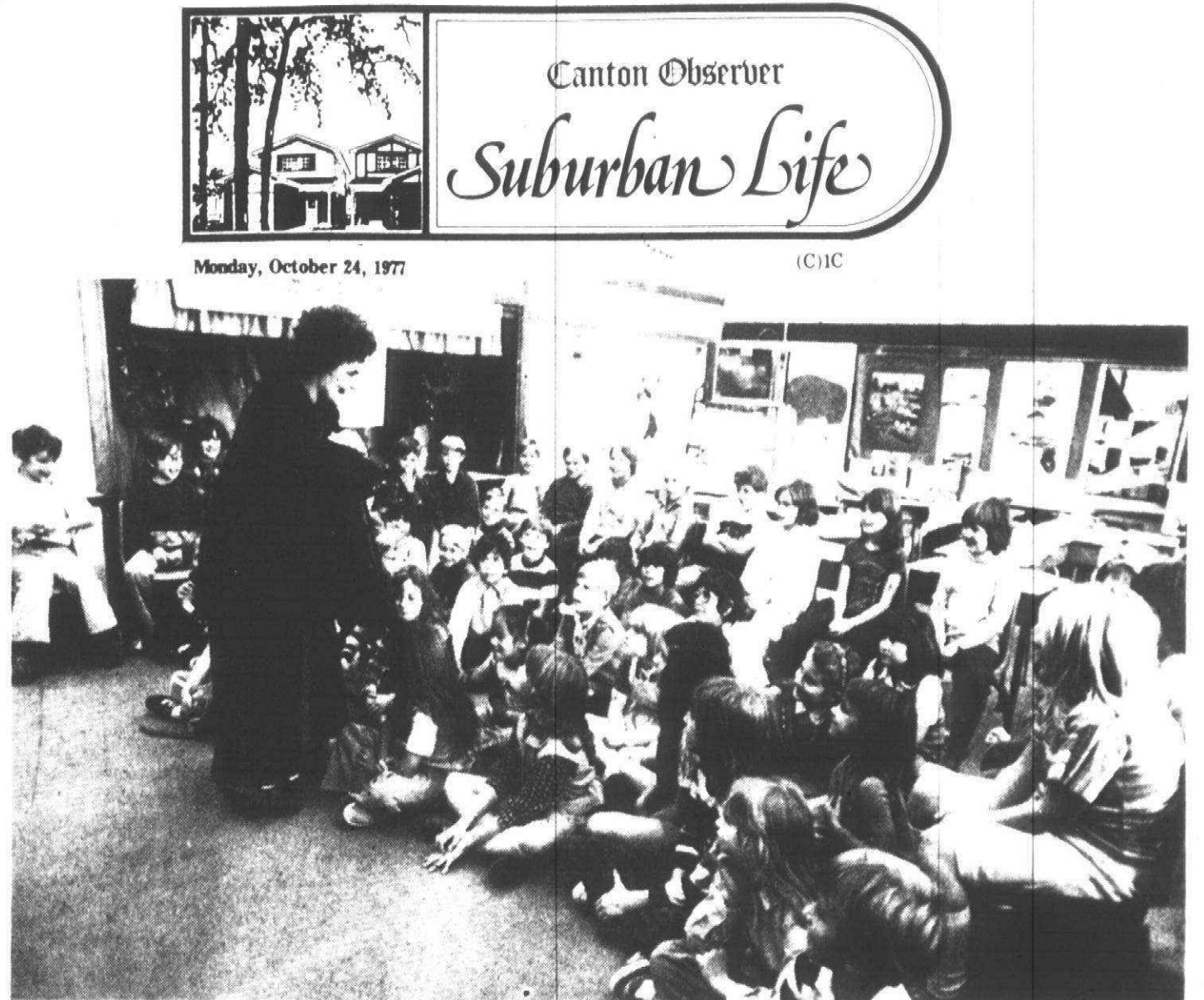

Patrice Munsel charmed by Plymouth

Patrice Munsel may sing opera, but she is no spoiled prima donna.

Coming into the area to present a speech and concert in the Livonia Town Hall series she found there was no room that night in the inn. The Plymouth Hilton had no record of her reservation. But no fuss, no tantrums.

The women who put on the Town Hall lectures for the benefit of the American Field Service international scholarship program went to work on the problem. But if proved difficult to find accommodations in the area.

Then the Mayflower Hotel came through, and it proved to be just what Miss Munsel was looking for. Although the hour had grown late, she proclaimed her delight with Plymouth as she was driven through Old Village.

She told her audience she was charmed by the hotel, and specifically mentioned the wallpaper.

Had anyone seen this star of opera and musical comedies at 7 a.m. the next day, he would have known for sure that she is no spoiled princess.

AT THAT DARK HOUR she was off and jogging near the Mayflower parking lot in the company of her accompanist, Paul Bogaev, in an ensemble worth bounding out of bed to see.

"I had on red tights, beige cutoffs, jogging shoes, a red and yellow wool turtleneck sweater and red suspenders," she laughed.

"Jogging is the only thing to do if you have to sing at 10:30 a.m. It gets the body going, and you see strange people. We were pretty strange ourselves." x

Bogaev, a 24-year-old musician and actor, was still in his jogging shoes when he sat down at the piano wearing also a conservative black Yves St. Laurent suit.

Once more the patience of the singer, who says she is "older than I look and younger than you think I am," was tried when the piano showed up late in the Mai Kai theater and had to be played without tuning or rehearsal.

But what was this to a woman who walked out on the Met stage as a teen-

ager to play the leading role in "Lucia di Lammermoor" without a dress rehearsal or an orchestra rehearsal?

"If you do the second performance of an opera at the Met, you don't get a stage rehearsal with costumes or orchestra," said Miss Munsel. "I walked onto that stage cold. Thank God, I was so young, I was totally cool. I got nerves later."

SO GUESS WHAT happened. "I walked on stage with a long train," recalled the singer. "Then I turned and walked in the other direction, right up my train."

In a long list of other theatrical mishaps that have come her way, she mentioned that once she had been trapped in a deep opera bow by the hoop on her full-length skirt, which held her in a crouched position on the stage—long after the audience stopped applauding.

Then there was the time she was playing theater-in-the-round in a musical about Elizabeth Barrett Browning. Robert Browning swept her up off her couch and carried her around the stage in a dance.

Laughter circled the theater as toy turned. She couldn't imagine why, until the actor set her down on the chair and she found it was cold.

"The rear of my costume and come open and I had mooned for the entire population of Philadelphia," she announced.

On her first date with her future husband a mishap almost turned to tragedy. Magazine photographers wanted a picture of her on the back of an elephant. While she was being helped up, the elephant tossed his trunk.

"I was flipped up in the air and came down on my head, luckily, in the only small pile of straw on a huge concrete floor," she observed. This moment is an important symbol for her and what she regards as a very fortunate life.

"I have always fallen on a small pile of straw," she said.

Later she confessed to her audience that after the lecture she was jetting to the town she grew up in, Spokane, Wash., to the bedside of her son, who fainted to find his small pile of straw when he fell from a skateboard. He

received a severe concussion and is now hospitalized.

COMMENTING ON HER VOICE, Miss Munsel said she is "vocally schizophrenic."

She added: "I sing opera and pop songs. But you can't sing pop songs with an opera voice, so I have to switch gears mentally."

She characterized herself as a soprano with a mezzo soprano range. She then pointed out that opera is a very sensual and physical art.

"It's like the Olympics, you use all your bodily strength," she observed. "I used to lose five pounds each time I did 'Lucia.' But I never heard of an opera singer who had a nervous breakdown. You get rid of everything before your audience."

Less easy to get rid of, however, were a few tenors who had bad breath. Because this made romantic closeness something of a trial, Miss Munsel took to eating garlic as a counter irritant.

Somehow during her busy career, Miss Munsel had time to marry and have four children, now of college age or older. In the early days the whole family rented a house in places where she was performing, taking along with them such pets as "snakes, hamsters and gerbils."

At later times the children appeared with her in "Sound of Music" and "The King and I." But now they have left the nest. When the singer learned that the foreign student exchange program was the beneficiary of proceeds from the Livonia Town Hall lectures, she said that she and her husband had been thinking of inviting into their home a foreign student.

IN THE MUNSEL FUTURE is the possibility of a starring role in a musical based on the life of humorist and short story writer Dorothy Parker. Miss Munsel's husband will be the producer.

Miss Munsel won from her audience considerable interest in Miss Parker when she reminded them that once when speaking with the press the witty Miss Parker was asked to make up a sentence with the word, horticulture.

"You can bring a whore to culture, but you can't make her think," replied the writer.

Sluggish driver stalls romance

Take one repressed American racing car driver (Al Pacino), add one beautiful but doomed European beauty (Marthe Keller), blend with visually rich scenes of Italy and Switzerland, and what have you got? "Bobby Deerfield" (PG), a movie with lots of promise but not much pep. (The movie opens Friday at area theaters.)

For a movie which has a Grand Prix driver as a hero, the pace is amazingly slow. The track scenes lack the sweaty tension and kinetic feel achieved so successfully in other movies with auto racing themes. The romance lacks—well, it just lacks everything: no sizzle, no vitality, no sparkle. Newman and Redford do it better—and they're just pals.

Pacino is so low key in this movie, as to be out of range. He plays an emotionally stunted, all-American race driver from Newark. The character would be a non-person, if he weren't number one on the Grand Prix circuit. He hides behind dark glasses and stony silence most of the time. He doesn't want to hear or know about anything that will disturb his kapok-filled mind.

When he visits a crashed-out driver in a sanitarium, he meets Lillian who is a patient there. Sick but full of joie de vivre, she busts out and hitches a ride with Deerfield. She's bright, unconventional and talkative. Filled with frenetic energy, Lillian is the opposite of Deerfield.

PROFESSIONALLY, Deerfield spends his time "driving around in circles," as she says. Conversationally, he's a dullard who seems to just repeat other people's remarks.

Here we have the two horns of the dilemma: one leading character is too passive and dull to catch our interest and the other is so outgoing as to mask feelings and thereby keep us at a distance.

To make matters worse, the thin, sentimental plot gets off to a false start by suggesting a line of development which never materializes. At the beginning of the film, Deerfield is concerned about a fatal crash that involved the same type Formula One car that he drives. He vows not to get in the car again until the cause of the crash is known.

For a while it looks as if there will be two parallel plots unfolding in a race against time: (1) Will the cause of the crash be discovered before the next big race? (2) Will Lillian be able to break through Bobby's reserve before she returns to the sanitarium?

The first line of development sputters out. As for the second, who cares? Lillian sums it up in one word when she tells Bobby he's "boring." That assessment stands for this whole film.

"BOBBY DEERFIELD" is supposedly a tear-jerker, but it hardly causes a gulp. Marthe Keller for once has a role that gives her more latitude than the paper cutout characters she's previously played (in "Marathon Man" and "Black Sunday"), and she does it well — the brave, laughing-on-the-outside heroine. But, unfortunately, that's not enough. It's simply that the characters don't ignite our feelings: one is too cosmopolitan, one is too repressed.

Now in the '40s, they really knew how to make tear jerkers. Betty Davis, Maureen Sullivan, Joan Crawford and a whole battery of actresses excelled at making you break out the Kleenex box. However, a movie that gives us sentiment without involvement, as "Bobby Deerfield" does, doesn't give us much.

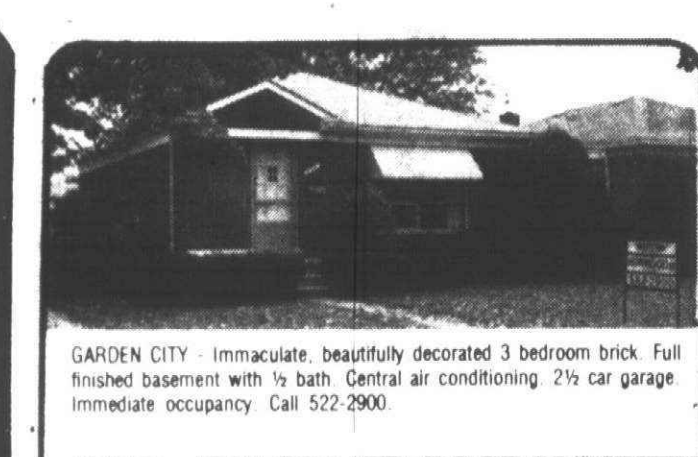

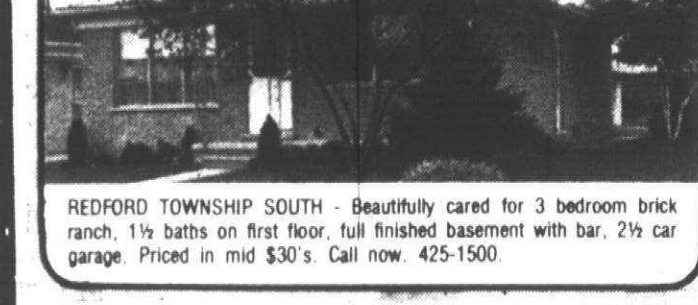

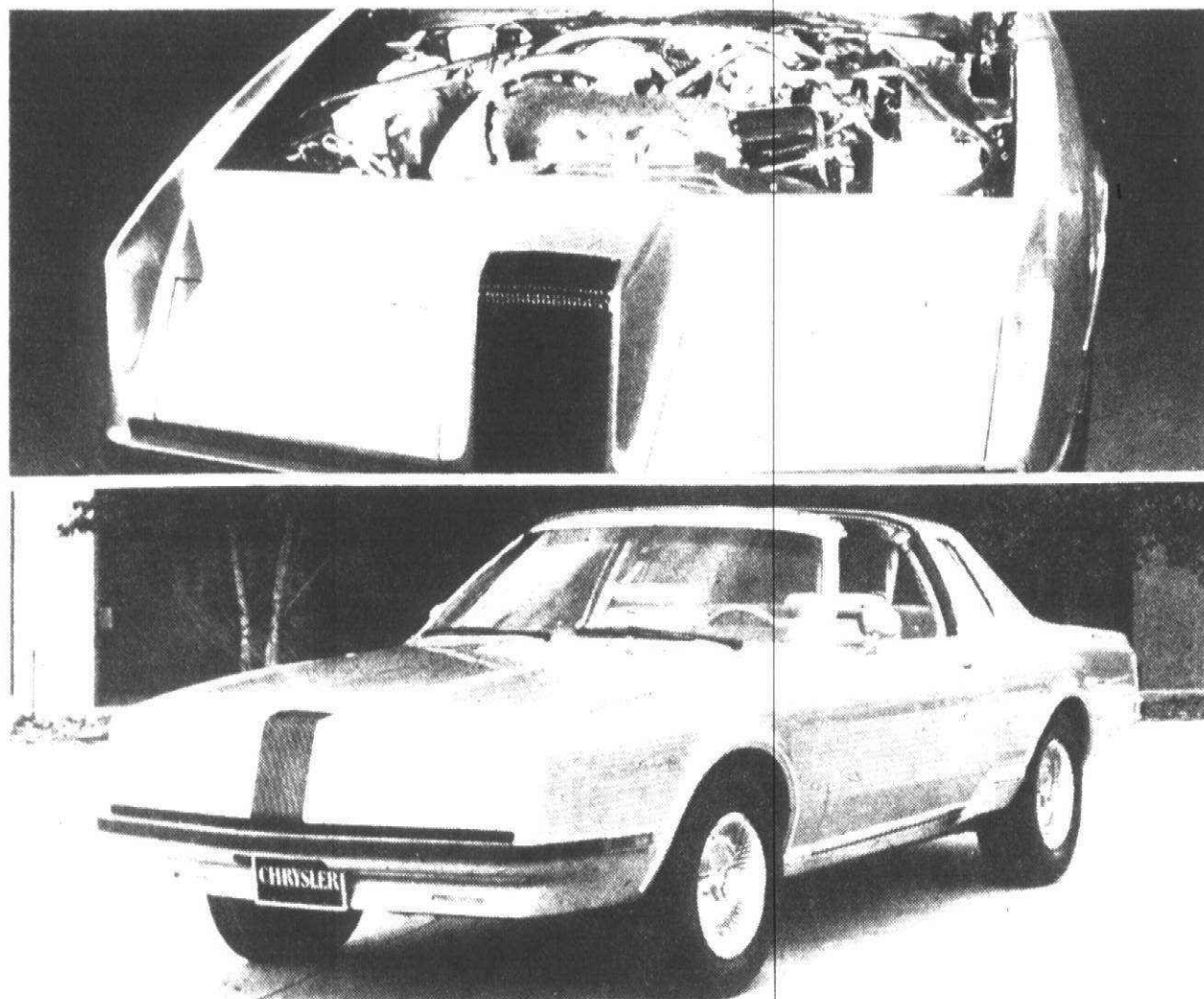

Save on maintenance

Motorists who spend hundreds of dollars every year maintaining their cars can save money on automotive parts and accessories the same way they save on groceries—by shopping the newspaper advertisements.

There are two ways motorists can save money. One is to do at least the simpler maintenance jobs at home. The other is to shop the automotive specials in newspaper ads.

Many car owners don't even think about buying a new battery until their present one dies. They get through two winters all right, but that third winter is the one to watch out for.

Because they want that last bit of power from their battery, car owners often end up paying for a road call and buying a battery without any chance for comparison pricing.

SO, THEY pay top dollar for a battery that might cost \$10 less if it had been bought elsewhere on sale. Who ever heard of a battery dying at a convenient time?

Tires are another example. Some car owners wait until their car has to pass a state inspection, then rush out to the nearest tire dealer when there are ads in newspapers offering tires at special prices all the time.

If it isn't a state inspection, it's an alert salesman who spots the bald tire... and makes the sale at present prices.

Tired don't get bald suddenly. Car owners have ample time to shop newspaper ads for tires.

ALL COMPANIES selling automotive products and services do not advertise in newspapers, of course. There could be many reasons for this, but a common one is that the advertisement could be used against them. If your prices are higher, would you advertise the fact in a newspaper where the consumer can compare?

On the other hand, the price might be suspiciously low. If an advertiser's price sounds too good to be true, don't be surprised if it is not true.

The price could be low for another reason—to get you into the store. Offering items at or below cost is common and, for consumers, desirable practice intended to get you to patronize the store or department.

Despite all precautions, you can still get taken. When that happens, help the next customer by informing the newspaper and the local Better Business Bureau office.
