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Boundary changes revealed to board

Proposed changes in school attendance boundaries will be made public tonight (Monday) by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

The changes, when finally approved, will result in some students attending different schools than they do this year.

The adjustments are made annually because of rising student enrollment in the district. The aim is to balance population among the individual schools and to make sure no single building exceeds capacity.

THE MEETING will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Little Theater of Plymouth Canton High, on Canton Center Road just south of Joy.

The meeting is a workshop study session for the trustees and was scheduled to allow the boundaries and growth committee to present its formal report to the board.

Tom Yack, board president, stresses that the purpose of this meeting is to allow the committee to explain its recommendations to the board, and give trustees a chance to ask questions about the proposed changes.

The public is encouraged to attend the workshop session to gain background information about the changes, but questions will not be accepted from the audience at this meeting.

Residents will have an opportunity to ask questions and make their views known at a public hearing from 7:30-9:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 6, in the Little Theatre of Canton High.

Before the public hearings, residents may ask questions or make comments by calling a special phone line, 453-0200, ext. 422, which will be operating starting today through March 6.

The board is scheduled to make decisions on the boundary changes at its regular meeting on Monday, March 12, at 7:30 p.m. in the board offices at 454 S. Harvey, Plymouth.

In recent years the majority of boundary changes have affected elementary pupils as that has been where the bulk of the growth has occurred. This year, however, and in future years more changes will be occurring at the middle school level.

The high schools are not affected by the boundary adjustment process as the population between the two schools is balanced by the random selection process.

Site chosen for housing

The Wayne County Planning Commission has selected a site for the possible construction of a low- to moderate-income housing development near the Canton Commons apartment complex on Haggerty south of Cherry Hill.

The county's action follows a refusal of township board members at their Feb. 6 meeting to select the site themselves. Township planner Jim Kosteva had recommended a 10-acre parcel on Warren east of Lilley.

The county's site selection will be included in a booklet it is preparing of low-income sites. The list will be used by potential developers.

The site selection is part of the county's requirements for administration of the Federal Community Block Grant program. Wayne County is administering the HUD program for 32 communities.

TOWNSHIP GRANT coordinator Terry Carroll said the multiple-zoned site the county selected last week is the same parcel that it chose in 1978.

But Carroll said that this year's site selection is more formalized since it will be included in a shopping list of low-income sites. This year, the county gave communities the opportunity to select the site themselves.

But the new township board balked at the county's order to select any site. Board members are questioning the county's authority to interfere in the local planning process.

"I'm not against low-income housing," said Trustee Robert Greenstein at a recent board meeting. "But I don't want anyone to plan this community except this board."

Supervisor Noel Culbert said he is reviewing community block grant regulations to determine Wayne County's authority on the matter.

"We're playing it cool to see what our rights are," he said. "We don't want to do anything and then look like idiots."

TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS hold that Canton already contains 12 times the number of low-income units reported by surrounding communities. Canton had 860 low-income housing units in 1974 when the last housing report was compiled.

Carroll said the low-income units are located in complexes that include Canton Commons, Fellows Creek and Canterbury Mews.

If HUD approves a mortgage subsidy to a developer, Carroll said Canton officials would be forced to approve plans for a low-income development on the site selected by Wayne County as long as the project meets zoning and site plan requirements.

The site selection requirement is attached to the federal community block grant program that is funding conversion of Dye Brothers Subdivision into an industrial park. Canton officials have already received \$80,500 for the project and expect to receive an additional \$350,000 over the next three years.

Police station has fire

Police officers usually go to the scene of a fire. In the case of the Canton Police Department, the fire came to it.

A fire, caused by a gasoline heater, was discovered in the department's security garage about 5 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 14, by Sgt. William Lehagan.

According to Chief Walter Macgregor, the Canton Fire Department responded to the call at once. Damage was minor, with some charring and destroyed insulation.

The security garage is in the building formerly occupied by the township administration, which is now being renovated to house the police department.

The area is used for officers to drive into and deliver prisoners.

The heater, Macgregor said, was one of the blower-type models and had been hooked up for the first time the day of the fire.

Township heating inspector Don Tilman said the heater will be replaced because it was defective.

Joyner promotes County exec drive underway

A petition drive to put a Wayne County executive proposal on the ballot is under way and aiming to get 75,000 signatures by July 4.

The drive's spokesman is County Commissioner R. William Joyner (D-Plymouth), who said an elected executive — similar to a city's mayor or the state's governor — can bring more efficient government sooner than could a counter proposal.

"The move to put a charter commissioner on the ballot is a blockade," said the first-term county board member.

"It will cost \$2 million just to hold special elections, and a total of maybe \$5 million to operate the charter commission. And there's no guarantee a charter commission won't recommend no changes."

A COUNTY EXECUTIVE is opposed by Detroit black and Polish political blocs. Several efforts by out-county commissioners to have the board put the executive proposal on the ballot have been shot down.

So Joyner and friends are using the petition route. He said they need 66,000 signatures and are out to collect 75,000 to be safe.

Attending a meeting he called last week in Plymouth Township were 20 persons, mostly from such western Wayne communities as Plymouth, Livonia, Canton, Sumpter, Allen Park and Brownstown, with one from Hamtramck. They include some local government officials and members of Jaycees and the League of Women Voters.

A Jaycee himself, Joyner is looking to that group to be a major part of the drive. Jaycees spearheaded an effort to

dump a number of county commissioners in 1968 and were a major force in calling for a state constitutional convention in 1961.

Jaycee chapters in Wayne, Plymouth and Canton are scheduled to consider the project soon, he said. Joyner added will make a presentation in two weeks to the Wayne County Jaycees board.

SUPPORT FOR a county executive has come from the Livonia Chamber of Commerce and the Wayne-2nd District Republican organization, Joyner said. He's hoping for endorsements soon from the Wayne-2nd Democrats and Livonia Interested Democrats.

The supporters of a county executive — the group has no name yet — will next meet at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 27 in the Livonia City Council chambers and March 13 in Dearborn City Hall.

Each group that joins the drive will be asked to contribute \$50 to cover the cost of petitions, Joyner said. Petitions will be ready by about March 15.

JOYNER'S CASE for a county executive goes like this:

"The department heads report to no one. All they have to do is line up 14 votes on the board of commissioners for whatever they want."

"The department heads get no management evaluation, no management review. They ride roughshod over the board of commissioners."

Supporters of an executive argue such an official could also exercise budget controls in a county notorious for its \$13 million deficit.

Presto, chango, checks cheapen

Beware, cashiers, there's a Franco-ophile in your midst.

Plymouth police are warning area merchants, including restaurant owners, to check out travelers checks before giving change.

It seems an unidentified plucky consumer has "made a killing," according to Officer Jerry Vorva, by turning in French franc travelers checks for payment of merchandise and meals.

The unsuspecting cashiers fail to notice that the checks are redeemable for French currency, valued at about 20 cents on the dollar, according to the Plymouth community service officer.

"He's just signing the check over, which is legal tender," Vorva says.

There's nothing illegal about not saying anything when a merchant gives him too much change, he adds, which means the responsibility for detecting

the currency difference rests with the merchant.

Because the man is not doing anything illegal, police cannot reveal his name. And apparently embarrassed merchants in the area, who have been stung for more than \$200 thus far, requested anonymity.

The travelers checks are identical to those made out in American currency, except for a small notation designating French francs, Vorva says. Apparently merchants are just looking at the numbers and failing to notice the currency difference.

The same thing happens frequently with travelers checks in checks redeemable in Canadian currency, he adds. However the currency difference represents a much smaller loss because the Canadian dollar is worth between 80 and 85 cents in American currency.

YOU KNOW that guy you always used to see jogging around Canton, day and night, winter and summer? His name is Bruce Rich, and you won't be seeing him jogging away anymore. The long-distance runner is moving to Kalamazoo, where he will undoubtedly continue haunting the streets. Rich, who has only been running 13 miles a day lately because of an injury, has participated in the Boston Marathon, the Detroit Free Press Marathon and the Northville-Plymouth Marathon.

FIRST THE good news: Farmers' Petroleum Cooperative, a Michigan Farm Bureau affiliate, plans to distribute a fuel called gasohol in Michigan. The gasohol is made from ethanol alcohol, which is in turn distilled from corn, sugar, beets and other dried grains. The alcohol is then blended with unleaded gasoline. Gasohol is going to be distributed to selected farmers to run tractors and the like. Now the bad news: Farmers' Petroleum Vice President Ron Sprinkel says gasohol will probably sell for eight cents a gallon more than unleaded gas.

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Earn \$25,000 per year while attending school

Want to earn \$25,000 or more a year while attending college? The way to do it is to enroll in Related Instruction classes while pursuing skilled trade apprenticeships, points out Ken Schultz, the program coordinator at Schoolcraft College.

At a time when some programs at Schoolcraft are experiencing enrollment decline, the Related Instruction program is booming.

hours generated at Schoolcraft. Participating students are enrolled in courses to improve job skills while working 40-60 hours per week. Most are on apprenticeship programs.

Under such a program, a company and an apprentice sign an agreement with the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training (BAT), a division of the U.S. Department of Labor.

THE AGREEMENT protects both the company and the apprentice who agrees to work toward program completion by working for 8,000 hours to learn a specified trade, and also agrees to attend classes in a Related Instruction Program (576 to 672 clock hours of classroom instruction) at a recognized institution.

The apprentice is protected because

the apprenticeship standards for the trade are spelled out. The apprentice is trained to perform a number of tasks required for the trade. Rates of pay and scheduled increases (usually five percent each six months) also are specified.

By the time the apprentices reach the 8,000 hour requirement, they are very close to the journeyman pay scale.

Upon completion of the program, the apprentice receives a certificate of completion from the BAT. Besides 8,000 hours of actual work experience, the apprentice has earned 36 to 42 college credits.

At Schoolcraft these credits may be applied toward an associate's degree in applied science in various career programs.

THERE ARE A number of senior colleges which will then accept the associate degree in their engineering technology programs.

"Many of the instructors teaching in our program followed this path for their degrees," said Schultz, "and one of the many reasons for the success of our program is the quality of its instructors. Many have come up through apprenticeships and give the students the most relevant and up-to-date instruction available."

"We have tapped industry for our drafting, machine shop, pipefitter, millwright, hydraulics, and machine repair instructors. One of our automotive apprenticeship instructors has experience ranging from mechanic to owning his own dealership. We also utilize as much as possible the expertise

of full-time instructors who teach in the technical career programs."

ANOTHER REASON Schultz cites for the growth of the program is the classroom success of the students.

"We provide courses which teach students relevant concepts to improve on-the-job skills. Seldom do apprentices complain that the course work is non-relevant."

"The growth of the Related Instruction also is a result of the services provided for the companies who sponsor students."

"We perform many functions companies appreciate, such as: development of special courses and curriculums; student advising; course scheduling including problems with shift changes; registration for classes each semester; and reporting grades and attendance to the companies."

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Couple faces culture shock during Iran visit

In March, the deserts of Iran burst into bloom for a brief, riotous moment of glory after the rainy season.

But all too soon, the flowers will fade and bake in the parched soil, and only the bloodshed of a country in revolution will remain.

A day seldom passes when the latest development of Iran's civil war doesn't hit the front page of the newspaper. The country's Shah is gone, its prime minister displaced and a once-exiled religious leader is now in power.

But three years ago, when Ernest and Flo Nolan agreed to go to the country to teach at one of its universities, Iran was still an unknown land of mystery.

The Nolans, who now live in Canton with their two-year old son, spent a year of their lives in Iran during the days when the Shah was still in power and the first student riots had already become part of history.

They consider their year in Iran an unforgettable experience. But their first impulse, after getting off the plane in Ahvaaz, about 80 miles north

of the Persian Gulf, was to get back on the plane and go home.

It was August, 1975, and the temperature was 130 degrees.

The Nolans were taken to the Jundi Shapur University, where Nolan had been hired by the Iranian government to teach in the college of literature and humanities.

The couple, on their first day in the country, were taken on a four-hour walking tour of Ahvaaz and ate dinner at one of the few places they were told was safe to eat in.

Nolan had an attack of food poison-

ing on the second day and was taken to the hospital.

"I think at that point both of us really wanted to go back home," Mrs. Nolan said.

"But Ernie had just finished graduate school at University of Notre Dame and we didn't have any money. The government paid our way there, but we still had to come up with money to pay for luggage and other expenses. Our tickets home wouldn't be paid until we were there two years."

Although at least one couple who arrived at the same time did turn around and go home after the walking tour, the Nolans decided to stick it out for at least a year.

Originally, only Nolan had been hired to teach. Eventually Mrs. Nolan also taught at the university's college of economics. While he taught literature to Iranian students, she taught English as a foreign language.

Neither of them knew more than a few words in Iranian at the beginning. "I think we developed a working Iranian vocabulary after a while," Nolan said.

AS THE COMMUNICATION gape closed, the Nolans got to know Iranian students and teachers, and began to understand the conflicts that set off the rioting against the Shah.

"The secret police (Savak) were very strong. We always felt its presence," Nolan says.

"Because I taught literature, we would often run across the theme of freedom, and the students would get into discussions of liberty. They would ask me what it's like in America."

Mrs. Nolan adds, "The Shah con-

trolled everything. The year before we arrived, there a lot of student unrest. We weren't threatened while we were there, but there were riots."

The Nolans say they knew students who had been harassed by the Savak. They also felt the power of the secret police.

"Our letters were censored," Nolan says. "Once we sent my mother a letter. Someone read it and crumpled it up in the envelope."

"My mother got the letter, which was also dirty, and wrote an angry letter to the Iranian consulate in Chicago. The consulate wrote to the postmaster in Ahvaaz, who called us in and asked us why we told my mother our letters were censored."

The Nolans had to be careful in what they said and did, but their life was luxurious compared to most of the country's populace.

Although the Nolans visited other parts of Iran, some employees of the oil and utility companies never found the need to leave their compounds.

The Nolans remember visiting the British Oil Company compound, which had a swimming pool, bowling alley and well-equipped store. Many of the foreign company employees could take free trips to Europe every few months and were allowed to return to their own countries frequently.

The Nolans found the contrast between the prosperity and poverty around them a difficult one to absorb, just as Iranian students did.

Even the poorer people, they discovered, owned the oriental rugs that are so coveted in this country.

"It was not uncommon to see rugs worth \$5,000 even in very poor homes," Nolan says.

"The rugs are kind of like a savings account to people. Sometimes there would be rugs piled one upon another in homes."

Throughout their year in Iran, the Nolans saw discontent and unrest mount at the university. In their discussions with Iranian students and teachers, however, they only heard the name Khomeini mentioned once.

Khomeini, who recently returned from exile in France to take over Iran, believes the country should be ruled by Islamic religious laws.

"I personally think many groups, such as the Marxists, rallied around Khomeini just to get rid of the Shah," Mrs. Nolan says.

The Nolans returned to the United States in August 1976. They became the parents of Ernest, Jr. shortly after their return. Now, Nolan is chairman of the communications arts department at Madonna College in Livonia.

Mrs. Nolan is a substitute teacher in the Garden City School system.

Their lives are different now. There are cultural events to attend, books to read other than ones stored in a trunk and electricity that works every time they flip a switch.

But they still watch the developments in Iran with avid interest. They believe they've gained something from their experience.

"If I learned anything, it was an appreciation of the culture. It's the first time I was able to understand why something so foreign can be so beautiful," Nolan said.

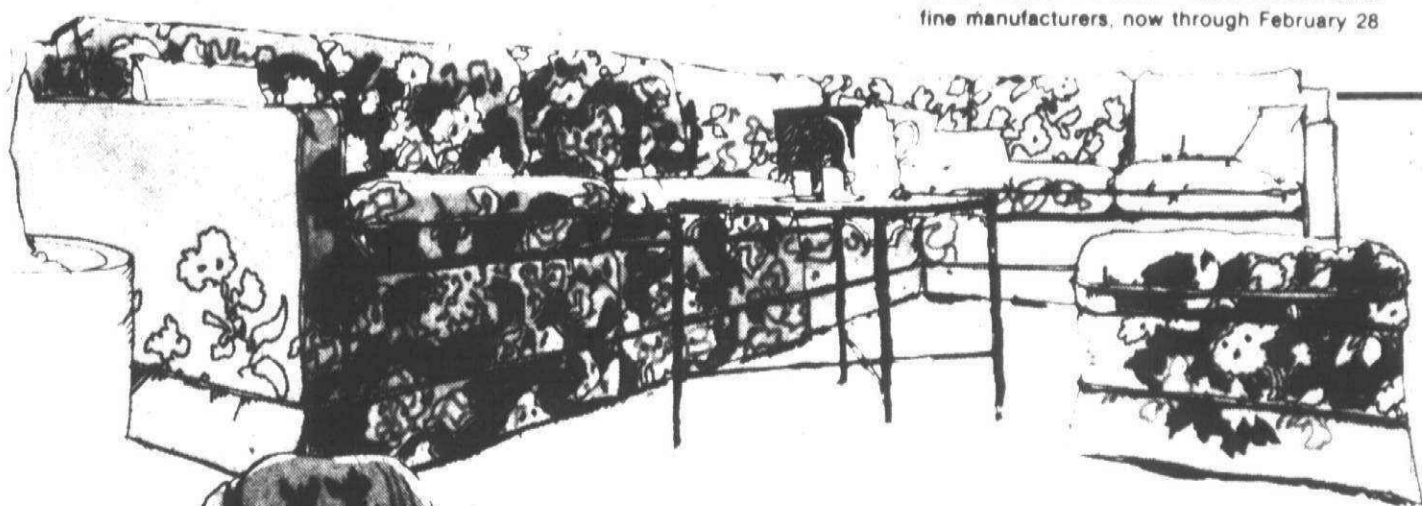

Strangely enough, that seems to work out fine for many people.

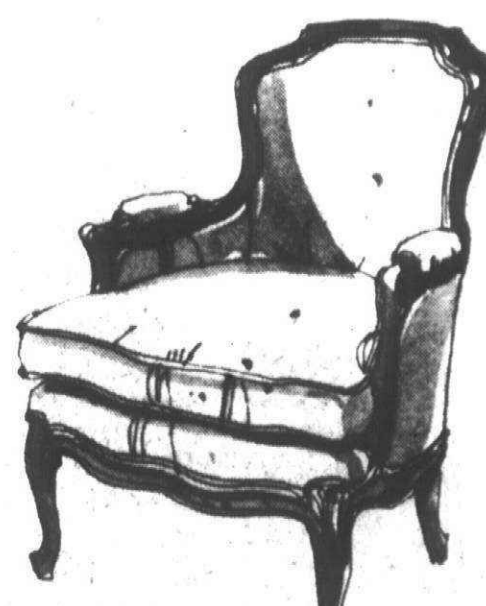
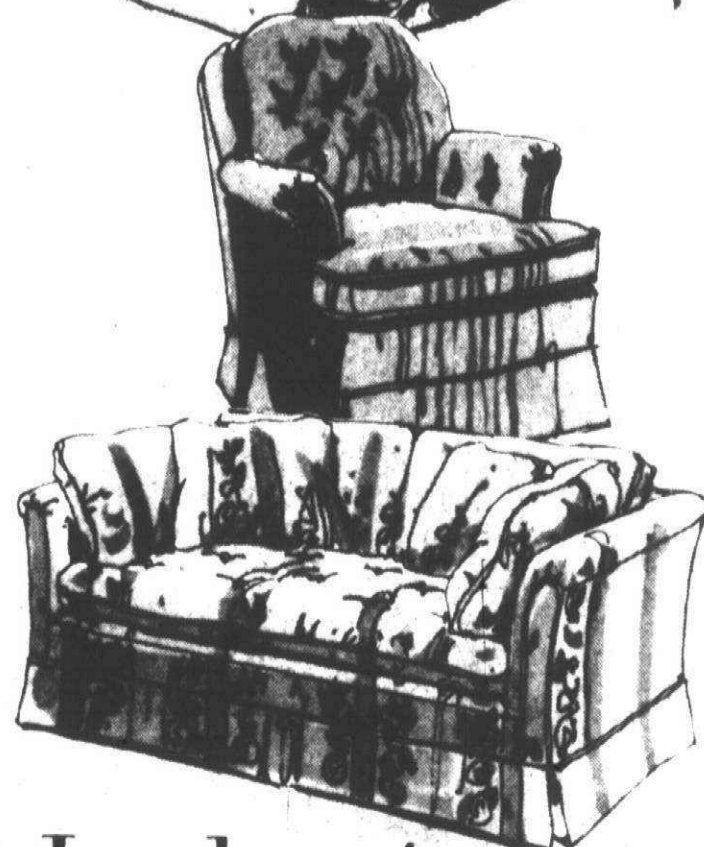
Perhaps I should just settle for a houseboy.

Training on tuning in to be led by Ms. Wade

help unlock the doors to inner awareness for other busy people during a noontime course offered by the Canton, Northville, Plymouth Family Y.

For those who want to take a short break during the day to energize their resources, Mrs. Wade, a Canton resident, will be on hand from 1:10-1:50 p.m., Mondays and Wednesdays, in the Plymouth Credit Union basement located on S. Harvey at Maple.

The course begins Feb. 26 and runs for six weeks through April 4. Y fees are \$6 for members and \$10 for non-members for one session a week, and \$8 for members and \$12 for non-mem-

bers for two sessions per week.

Senior citizens' fees are half-price. Business persons are invited to bring a sack lunch to the sessions designed for "tuning in," as Mrs. Wade says.

"It will be an informal type of situation, with discussion, prayer and meditation," she says.

Meditation, she explains, allows one to get in touch with his or her inner resources — whether that is defined as a god, creative force, psyche, or subconscious. It's a time to slow down and listen to the inner self.

"I feel there's a tremendous need for

people to recharge, to reflect on the day's activities and hear what's going on within themselves."

Her job as a leader involves demonstrating techniques that enable a person to get in contact with the inner guidance, she says.

The course is non-denominational and concentrates on such activities as positive thinking, balance of the inner life, and working with dreams. Topics to be discussed include "Get your communication going with God," "Detached loving," and "Following the inner-self with dreams."

Freeing yourself from the emotional

upheavals of others, she says, involves learning to sympathize without getting into emotional problems that drain your own energies.

FOR MRS. WADE, meditation has become a way of life since she started with prayer groups and in church work.

"Meditation is where you listen," she advises. "I can't cope with my day as well if I don't meditate in the morning."

As a self-described high-strung person, she was looking for meaning in her own life after personal traumas when she discovered that meditation brought

a successful way to cope with problems.

For the past 12 years, she's been working with various groups and teaching courses, such as "How to Cope without Copping Out," at Schoolcraft Community College. She is a graduate of Eastern Michigan University in special education and taught handicapped children in the South Redford School District.

The Y course will be the first time she's offered a class for a break in the middle of the day.

County executive petition presented

With an executive, Wayne County could team up with Oakland County to get the Michigan Legislature to pass major structural reforms. Two key goals: Eliminating Wayne County's Board of Auditors and the two counties' road commissions.

Left in place, however, would be such county officials as the clerk, treasurer, register of deeds and drain commissioner. Reporting to an executive would be such functions as public works, social services, youth services, employee relations and all other services not assigned somewhere else.

BLACK LEADERS, in particular, are vehemently opposed to a county executive, charging it would dilute their political power.

The black-Polish bloc is proposing

instead that a charter commission election be called to write a county home rule charter. The bloc last week said it would ask the legislature to appropriate the cost of the special elections and the charter commission's costs.

A charter commission proposal was on the 1968 ballot but lost. At that time, charter commissioners were to have been elected from the 27 county commissioner districts. Joyner said a county apportionment group would have to decide how to elect charter commissioners, but presumably would take the same path.

The political problem, Joyner said, is that Detroiters would control such a charter commission 14-13, based on the 1970 census. Since then, Detroit has lost population and the 1980 census is expected to show the suburbs have a majority.

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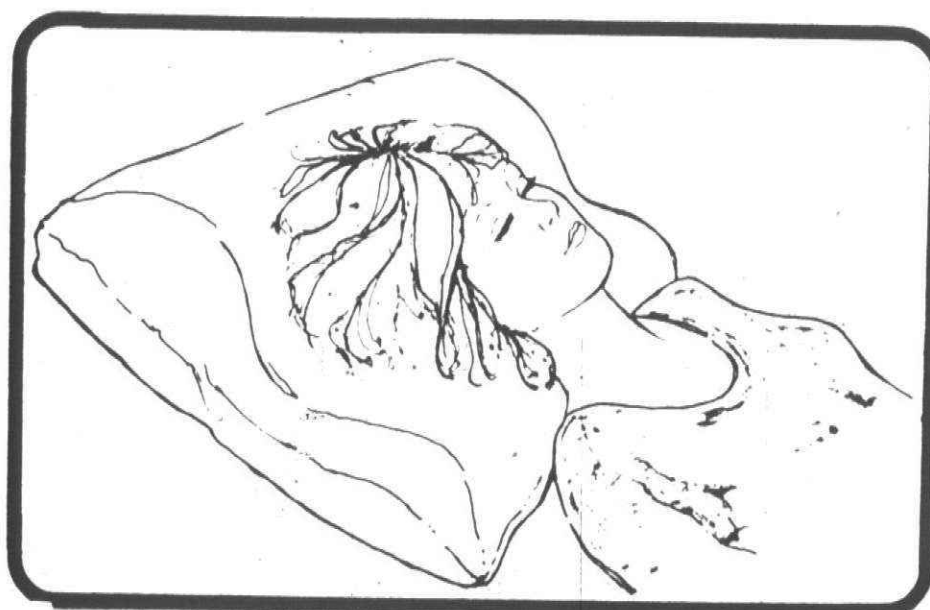
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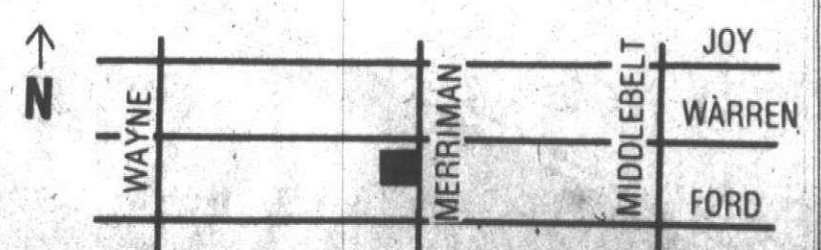


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Move over, youth, and make room for the working class

Shades of Rosie the Riveter! Now it's Lily the Lathe Operator.

Lily is one of the success stories of Ronald Cook, who works at the Michigan Employment Security Commission office in Livonia.

Lily, described as "a white-haired lady of about 65 whom you could believe taking bread out of the oven" decided several months ago that since she liked to spend money, she should get a job.

"Sure, she'd had experience — she ran a lathe at Ford during World War II. She'd been home since, but what are a few years? No, she didn't have any tools. They had been stolen."

Lily appealed to Cook and got his attention, his sympathy and his cooperation. "She had spunk, you know."

He got on the telephone to an employer who has hired older workers in the past. He would give her a try.

According to Cook, he's glad he did. Within a short time, Lily was keeping well ahead of the other workers. Inside a month, she was being paid \$7 an hour. She had started at \$4.50.

INSIDE OF two months she came back to visit Cook, driving a brand new Lincoln.

Lily is Cook's "star" in the role as an older worker specialist at the MESC office. For a little more than a year, the MESC has had older worker specialists in most of its offices throughout the state. The program was initiated by a federal grant administered by the Labor Department's Office on Aging.

Business for Cook and his counterparts in the Plymouth office, Mrs. Mildred Rady and Mrs. Anna Wilson, is growing. All say that with inflation many retirees are finding it extremely

difficult to get along on fixed incomes and are forced to seek work again.

Others are looking for something to do, some way to use their talents. At 65, they still feel they have a lot to offer.

But employers often don't feel this way. In fact, so strong is the emphasis on youth that an American becomes an "older worker" at 40 in the eyes of employers, according to MESC.

And older means obsolete. If you are over 40, you can't learn anything.

Wrong, says MESC, in the results of a survey it conducted in preparation for "Older Workers' Week" March 11-17.

EMPLOYERS THEMSELVES report that workers hired after age 40 attain a higher performance rating in a shorter period of time than workers who are hired before the age of 30, says the report.

Older workers tend to have a more positive attitude toward work than do the younger workers.

They have greater job stability and a better record of acceptance by employers... once they are hired.

They lose few days from work. The number of days lost for all reasons decreases as age increases.

"Ability is ageless," according to MESC.

Statewide, older worker specialists placed 2,346 workers last year, in everything from horse training to clerical, janitorial, factory and administrative work.

Older workers don't lack stamina either, according to Cook. "There are some jobs which are not suitable, of course, but for most jobs older workers bear up just beautifully. The 20-year-old gets bored.

"He doesn't have the same work ethic."

IN INTRODUCING the position of older worker specialist, the MESC endeavored to hire exactly that, older workers who had been there and know what it is like.

Cook, who had a stroke three years ago, had been active in several heavy equipment businesses and at one time managed a large sales force.

Both Mrs. Rady and Mrs. Wilson have backgrounds in business and in counseling.

Cook is proud of Lily because her performance proves it can be done. He and Mrs. Rady and Mrs. Wilson not only work hard to make sure the worker will "fit" the job, but also stress the importance of "trying harder."

"You have to talk straight to the older person before you send him out," said Cook, recalling a recent telephone conversation in which he told a reluctant employer:

"This man sitting right here before me can outwork any two 20-year-olds you have now."

Before the man left for his job interview, Cook told him, "You heard what I told him."

The job seeker replied, "Yeah, and that's right, too."

"Now when you go down there, don't you back up an inch," Cook said.

"He could wash out my whole pitch by going down there and being frail in personality, in spirit or in body. Now, if he will exude strength of personality, he'll get the job."

THE OLDER WORKER specialists try persuasion, but sometimes employers are reminded that it is against the law to discriminate because of age.

Not all of the stories have happy end-

ings. Sometimes older workers have what Cook calls "a warped view of the world of work and what makes the world go around."

They hear that union members are getting \$14 for a skilled trade, and they expect to make similar wages. But they are unrealistic about their skills.

Sometimes would-be workers have to resolve personal, medical and other problems before they can work. Mrs. Rady and Mrs. Wilson find that telling people where to get help is an important part of their work.

It might be someone who has a problem with alcohol, or a 47-year-old mother who has been divorced or widowed and has never worked outside the home before.

Even among older workers, some people are difficult. Such as the man who was in desperate straits with a sick wife, a leaking roof and no transportation. He turned down a job in which transportation was provided because it didn't pay enough for him.

COOK RECENTLY was able to find "a perfect job" for a retired department store executive of 70 who was bored with retirement. He is now happily employed in a jewelry store, only five minutes from his home.

But Mrs. Rady says that it is difficult to find suitable employment for retired teachers who still want to work with children, but not on a full-time basis.

In fact, it is not easy to find jobs for anyone looking for part-time employment. And with an eye to social security earning restrictions, many applicants are seeking these kinds of jobs.

Shared-time, sometimes suggested for working mothers, in which two persons hold down one job, is not being done much here.

Despite revisions, laws not equitable for all

(This is the third in a series of articles prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants offering advice on filing 1978 income tax returns.)

Tax treatment that is fair for everyone continues to elude even the most determined tax reformers. Once again, Congress has worked long and hard at reshuffling the tax laws. Still, no one would describe the results as a new deal, equitable to all.

An example of old inequities that persist is the "marriage penalty," which causes married couples to pay more taxes than two unmarried individuals with the same income, exemptions and deductions.

This was not an intended result. It was an inadvertent side effect of efforts to correct a previous imbalance resulting from still earlier adjustments in the tax code.

The chain of unsuccessful attempts

at achieving fair treatment for married and unmarried alike began in 1948, when it was decided that families should be treated as single economic units. Family income was then taxed as though each spouse had earned half of it, thus sharply reducing the tax rate in cases where one spouse earned the bulk of the income.

The income-splitting option gave such families an advantage over those in which both spouses earned roughly equal incomes, and an even bigger advantage over single individuals.

THE LATTER protested this treatment and continued to do so until 1971, when Congress granted a more favorable rate for the single individual, thus putting the shoe on the other foot once more.

Since 1971, it has been working couples' turn to protest, and they have been doing so as successive administra-

tions have wrestled with the problem, so far to no avail.

Congress has resisted various solutions that have been offered, partly because it feared they would lead to excessive loss of tax revenues, but chiefly because changing the rules would violate the principle of progressivity, which requires that taxes be levied according to the ability to pay.

With the issue unresolved, what can married couples who both have incomes do to minimize their taxes?

FORGET ABOUT filing singly; the marriage penalty for that is even worse than with a joint return.

Forget also getting a "quickie" divorce in December and then remarrying in January so that at year end you are "single." IRS has ruled such divorces, obtained solely for tax reasons, are a sham and has decided they do not alter a couple's tax status.

What, then, can working couples do?

First, they can be extra diligent in identifying business deductions. With two people employed in the family there is twice as much likelihood of job-related deductions, such as business travel and entertainment.

If you have young children or a disabled adult you have to hire someone to look after so that both of you can hold jobs, look into the child-care credit. With two or more qualifying dependents, this credit could be worth as much as \$800, depending on your income level.

This clinic is really a family show

A unique family-run business has been opened in a newly built professional building on Merriman in Livonia.

It's a chiropractic clinic owned and operated by Dr. L.E. Bowers and his son, Dr. Mark Bowers.

That in itself may not be considered unique.

The new clinic is established in a 2,000-square-foot structure next to the Merriman Professional Building.

Before the Bowers took it over, it housed the former Byrd Meat Market for many years.

The Bowers family remodeled the building extensively before moving in early in December.

"We bought four walls and a roof, essentially, and we remodeled it inside and outside," said the elder Dr. Bowers. The motif is modern and includes a mansard-type roof as one of the dominating exterior features.

Zone Contracting Co. did the bulk of the construction.

If one of you began working again in just the past year or so, it's possible that your combined incomes have taken a big jump in 1978. If so, you may be eligible for income averaging.

This permits you to calculate your tax bill for the current year by assuming that you earned the income over a five-year period — i.e., the current and preceding four years.

IF ONE OF YOU is self-employed, consider protecting part of your income from being taxed now by putting

it in a Keogh-type pension fund.

Or if either of you is not covered by a pension or profit-sharing plan, you might be able to defer until retirement the taxes on some income by setting up an Individual Retirement Account.

Give extra attention to the tax aspects of your investments. There is a world of difference among ways of financing your future.

Many far-out investment schemes do not really shelter you from taxes; they simply push the taxes into another year, when your tax rate may be even

higher than it is now.

But there are tax shelters that are perfectly sound — real estate and petroleum development ventures, for example, that offer tax breaks because Congress intended that they should. Talk over investments with your financial advisor in advance.

Working couples and other taxpayers with higher than ordinary incomes have reason to be concerned not just with their 1978 taxes but with those in future years, as well. For them, tax planning is a year-round necessity.

45 years later, Bill Knapp's still on the job at Chevrolet

He stood during the cold night for seven hours, from midnight to 7 a.m., shuffling his feet to keep warm. His mother brought him a sandwich so he could keep his place in the endless line.

The year was 1934, the height of the Depression, and the desperate men waiting for the employment office to open at Chevrolet's Detroit Forge Plant stretched a mile.

At 7 a.m., the office door opened and some heard a heartbreaking, "No hiring today!"

But Bill Knapp was lucky. He got hired his first time in the lineup.

He was Bill Ryan then, and lost his job after one day because he couldn't prove he was 19.

Next day, he came back as Bill Knapp, and got hired again.

Later, he had his name legally changed so his Social Security benefits would accurately list his date of service.

Now he's just celebrated 45 years with Chevrolet — as Bill Knapp — the last 25 at the Livonia Spring and Bumper plant on Eckles Road.

BILL'S TWO SONS also work for GM — one for Fisher Body and the other at the Tech Center. But Bill remembers when he was the only GM worker in the family and took quite a lot of ribbing.

"My answer to that was simple," Bill recalls. "I got 55 cents an hour back in 1934, and that put bread on the table."

"I wanted to quit the first day, but my supervisor told me, 'Bill, quit when you've got something better.' So I stayed. Jobs were hard to come by."

"Time went so fast," he continues, "what with World War II and all. The next thing I knew I was back at Chevrolet and transferred to Chevrolet Livonia in '54 when they started the plant. Twenty-five years!"

"I was working afternoons, then. But my wife was upset about that and wanted me to go on days. So, I took the first day job offered — sample springmaker. And, I've been doing it ever since."

A SAMPLE SPRINGMAKER has to take design specifications and hammer out a spring by hand. Bill's years of experience with metals at the Forge Plant make a difficult job seem simple. But there aren't many around who

Market Watch

Investors were greatly encouraged by the performance of the stock market during the first four weeks of 1979.

As measured by the Dow Jones Industrial Average, it gained approximately 50 points (six percent), compared to its year-end figure of 805, at its closing of 859 on Friday, Jan. 26.

Since then, however, it has been in a solid retreat. Most of the blame can be attributed to the situation that has developed in Iran.

The market seemed to ignore the early unfolding of events in that country. But from the moment of the Shah's departure, it became apparent that the situation was extremely serious, and the market began to reflect its concern by turning downward.

Investor concern is entirely justified.

IN ADDITION to the serious dent in the world's supply of oil that has resulted from the Iranian turmoil, contracts for American products (mostly military) have already been canceled to the extent of over \$9 billion.

And now that the power is in the hands of the Ayatollah Khomeini, who has made his dislike of the United States quite evident, the future of our relationship with Iran is extremely cloudy.

This is just another in a continuing series of international events that has affected the trend of American stock prices over the past several years.

The stock market hasn't always been so concerned with the problems of foreign governments, particularly those of the less important countries relative to our own economy. There was a time, not too many years ago, when the trend of the market was pretty much determined solely by the turn of domestic events.

Statistics such as automobile production, steel production, freight car loadings, retail sales — these were the

things that were the primary concerns of the securities investor.

Even interest rates were of relatively minor concern. They fluctuated in a narrow range of inexpensive cost to borrow money. A quarter-point boost or reduction in the Federal Reserve discount rate was headline material, while today it is accepted as a relatively minor change.

Prime rate changes used to occur once every two or three years. It is now almost a monthly occurrence.

THERE IS LITTLE doubt that today's investor is faced with many considerations that the complications of the modern world have forced upon him.

This undoubtedly accounts for the continuing growth of professionally managed portfolios. More and more investors, recognizing the long-term advantages of common stock investments, have chosen to place their funds in the hands of professional money managers rather than depending entirely upon their own investment decisions.

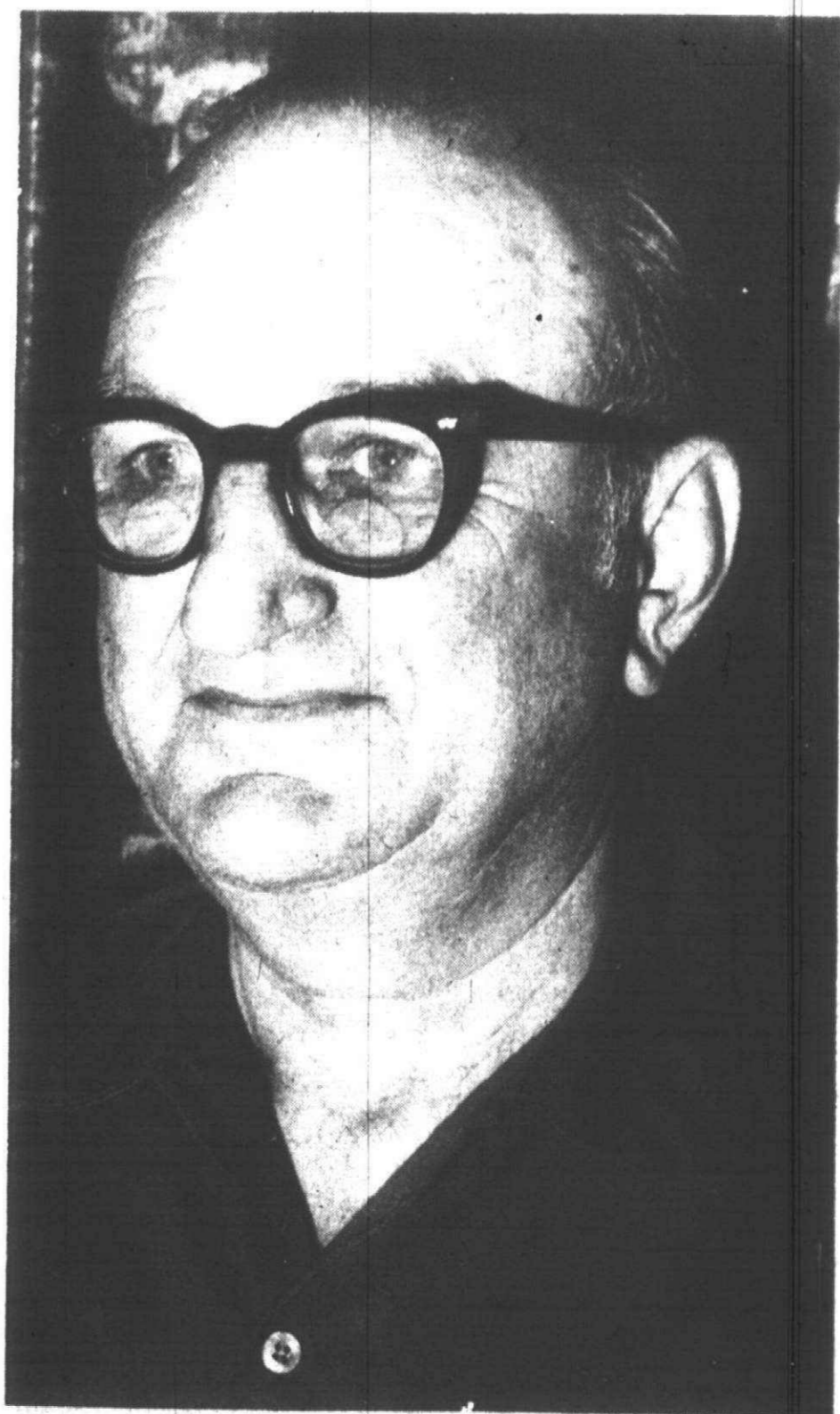

You'll be tearful as skating star faces adversity

"Yech!" is the greeting I received when I returned home after seeing "Ice Castles" (PG).

My tough-minded 12-year-old, who had not seen the film, correctly surmised its contents from the tone of the television commercials. "Just another one of those handicap pictures," he said. "You know, where someone has a terrible accident and then they win the Olympics or something."

Twelve years of television has made him a cynic or a realist. I'm not sure which, maybe they're both the same. He certainly grasped the general drift and emotional level of this film.

"Ice Castles" belongs to the wet handkerchief variety of movies, somewhere between "The Other Side of the Mountain" and "Slow Dancing in the Big City."

THE THEME IS braveness in the face of adversity. It's a theme everyone can relate to in some way. After all, many of us face adversity daily just driving in rush hour traffic. The film, then, is not without some appeal, especially to a younger audience because "Ice Castles" is also a teen romance.

Newcomer Lynn-Holly Johnson plays Lexie, a 16-year-old ice skater from a small town in Iowa. Lexie has great natural ability and tremendous potential as a championship skater, but she lacks expert coaching. She is also distracted by her cuddly boyfriend, Robby Benson. He drops out of pre-med to play professional hockey, then drops out of hockey to think about what he should do.

At a regional skating competition, Lexie is spotted by a top coach (Jennifer Warren) and whooshed away from small town to big city where she's given a socko publicity build-up. She leaves behind her childhood coach (Colleen Dewhurst), overprotective father (Tom Skerritt) and boyfriend as she succumbs to the attentions of sportscaster David Huffman.

Lexie gets as far as the cover of Sports Illustrated when the "terrible accident" occurs. You know the rest: Withdrawal, self-pity, hope, struggle and, finally, achievement.

To his credit, director Donald Wrye keeps the emotional pitch under restraint. "Ice Castles" might prompt a warm tear or two, no flood. Dewhurst as the eccentric old coach and Skerritt as the concerned father nicely balance the sweet young lovers and the aggressive, publicity-smart coach.

THE FREE SKATING scenes have a grace and beauty all their own, much like the ballet scenes in other recent movies. Little flaws in Lexi's character also help make her more of a real person and less of an ingenue.

The one element in this film that cannot be compensated by acting or directing is the ending. We're expected to believe that Lexie can fool everyone into believing that she has no handicap. Now that's a handicap for any film.

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S'craft tax campaign is aimed at yes vote

If you're looking for a lot of advertising and a lot of debate on Schoolcraft College's March 26 millage proposal — forget it.

"We're going to identify the positive voters and get them to vote," said Harry Greenleaf, vice chairman of the community college's board of trustees and one of the leaders of the campaign.

"We're going to seek endorsements from different groups and set up an off-campus telephone center," Greenleaf told the board of trustees last week.

The phone center is a technique that has yielded immense dividends for Greenleaf when he was vice-chairman and later chairman of the Wayne-2nd District Republican organization. The GOP's telephone centers, since 1972, have helped elect Republicans in a con-

gressional district, a state senate district and two house districts that were apportioned to be Democratic.

THE CAMPAIGN committee will conduct one major fund-raising effort from 3-5 p.m. Sunday, March 4, according to board Chairman Paul Y. Kadish.

It will be a wine and cheese social in the Waterman Campus Center, with tickets at \$25 a head.

"Corporate contributions are acceptable because we are a ballot issue committee," said Kadish.

The campaign committee got something resembling an endorsement and a promise of help from the Faculty Forum, bargaining agent for 160 full-time and about the same number of part-time instructors.

Forum President William Nickels, a chemistry instructor, said the Faculty Senate agrees with board decisions to seek funds for: a Culinary Arts addition

to the Waterman Center; expansion of the Applied Sciences Building (for vocational-technical programs); major maintenance of existing facilities; and new and replacement equipment for the 15-year-old campus.

But the Forum had no public comment on one other board priority: Conversion of the existing Bradner Library to office-classroom use and construction of a new Learning Resources Center.

VOTERS WILL be asked March 26 to raise the property tax limit by one mill (\$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) for five years.

Such a levy would cost the owner of a \$50,000 house, assessed for \$25,000, about \$25 a year minus the so-called "circuit breaker" feature in the state income tax.

One mill would yield about \$2 million a year or about \$10 million in five

years. The ballot proposal says the funds will be used for capital construction, maintenance and equipment (as distinct from operations) but doesn't specify projects.

Eligible to vote are registered voters in the K-12 districts of Clarenceville, Garden City, Livonia, Northville and Plymouth-Canton, plus a tiny portion of Novi.

New bill beefs up drunk driving law

Blood alcohol tests will be admissible as evidence in cases other than those involving drunk driving charges since the state senate approved the legislation Thursday.

The measure, sponsored by State Rep. Robert Law (R-Livonia), whose district includes Westland, amends the Michigan Vehicle Code. The code had limited the use of the test as evidence to cases of driving under the influence

of alcohol. The new bill extends that use to criminal prosecution cases arising from the death or injury of another.

"Police have been hamstrung in their prosecution attempts because they can't use this test in manslaughter cases to prove the driver was drunk at the time of the accident," Law said.

Road commission denies township's salt request

Plymouth Township's plan to salt roads on an emergency basis fell by the wayside last week, as the Wayne County Road Commission refused a request to supply salt for the operation.

To take care of some of the trouble spots on township roads, Supervisor Tom Notebaert had proposed a plan to obtain free salt from the road commission, which township employees would use on an emergency basis.

The road commission responded that

the supply of salt could run short before the winter is out.

"One sustained snow storm could deplete our entire reserve," wrote W. P. Meyers, county highway engineer.

The road commission does sand local residential roads that become icy and hazardous, he pointed out. Any specific locations that are ongoing problems should be reported to the road commission, he added.

New signal on Ann Arbor Rd.

A request for an emergency signal on Ann Arbor Road in front of the Plymouth Township fire station was granted by the Michigan State Department of Transportation.

Plymouth Township will pay an estimated \$2,400, about one-third of the

cost, for the signal, which will permit direct access to the road from the emergency building.

Wayne County Road Commission does not participate in the costs of installing or maintaining the signal.

REFRIGERATION SYSTEMS CODES**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. XXIV, (REFRIGERATING SYSTEMS) REGULATING THE SAFE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, INSTALLATION, ALTERATION, INSPECTION, TESTING, MAINTENANCE AND LICENSING OF REFRIGERATING SYSTEMS AND APPURTENANCES THEREOF IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES AND REGULATIONS INCONSISTENT WITH ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That Ordinance No. XXIV, known as the Refrigerating Systems Ordinance of the Township of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 5.8 - Fees, Refrigeration Permits and Inspections.
The fees for refrigeration permits and inspections are hereby established as follows:

PART II. **CONFLICTING PROVISIONS, REPEALED.** Any Ordinance or parts of Ordinances in conflict, herewith, are hereby repealed.

PART III. **VALIDITY.** Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

PART IV. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

PART V. This Amendment to Ordinance No. XXIV was adopted by the Township Board of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan at its regular meeting, duly called and held on the 13th day of February A.D. 1979, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 52 B**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE 1977 BUILDING CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE TEXT OF PART VII (H) SECTION 118.1 SCHEDULE OF FEES.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. The 1977 Building Code of the Township of Plymouth, Ordinance No. 52, is hereby amended by amending Part VII (H) Section 118.1 to read as follows:

SCHEDULE OF PERMIT FEES

(A) Building Permit Fee:

- 1) New construction, additions and alteration of less than \$20,000.00 valuation, fee of \$15.00 for first \$1,000.00 valuation, plus fee of \$5.00 for each additional \$1,000.00 valuation or fraction thereof.
- 2) New construction, additions and alterations of \$20,000.00 or more, fee of \$110.00 for first \$20,000.00 valuation, plus fee of \$3.00 for each additional \$1,000.00 valuation.

(B) Demolition Permit Fee:

- 1) Under 20,000 cubic feet in volume, fee \$20.00
- 2) 20,000 cubic feet in volume but less than 50,000 cubic feet in volume, fee \$30.00
- 3) 50,000 cubic feet in volume or more, fee \$50.00

Before a demolition permit may be issued, the applicant shall file with the Township Treasurer a cash or surety bond, in form and with sufficient sureties acceptable to the Township Treasurer, in the penal sum of not less than Five Hundred Dollars, saving and protecting the Township of Plymouth and all persons harmless from all damages to private or public property that may arise from such demolition and further conditioned that the applicant shall accomplish such demolition in accordance with the requirements of all applicable Ordinances, including without limitation the removal of all rubbish or waste from the site of the demolition at applicant's expense and the placement of the site in a safe condition with clean fill of all foundations or excavations in a manner preventing the accumulation, ponding or standing of water.

(C) Moving of Building Permit Fee:

Preliminary inspection to determine whether the building or structure is suitable for movement over and upon public property and whether the proposed location of the building or structure within the Township of Plymouth would be lawful and not injurious to the contiguous property and surrounding neighborhood:

- 1) From one location to another within the Township of Plymouth or from a location in the Township of Plymouth to another municipality, fee \$35.00
- 2) From another municipality to a location within the Township of Plymouth, fee \$75.00

(D) Special Inspection Fees and Additional Fees:

- 1) Inspection requested before work is ready, fee \$15.00
- 2) Owner or representative does not keep appointment for inspection with the inspector, fee \$15.00
- 3) When approved plans are not on the job during inspection, fee \$15.00
- 4) Violation notices requiring reinspection, fee \$15.00
- 5) Special inspections when requested, fee \$15.00
- 6) Temporary permit for parking of trailer, coach, or camper, fee \$10.00
- 7) Temporary Certificate of Occupancy, fee \$20.00
- 8) Fee for permits not obtained before work is started shall be computed double that for new construction, based on the estimated cost of construction.

(E) All residential maintenance and alteration contractors or all residential builders or both and who do work in the Township of Plymouth shall register with the Building Department of the Township of Plymouth and pay the following fee, or fees as the case may be, to the Treasurer of the Township of Plymouth:

- 1) Residential Maintenance and Alteration Contractors registration, fee \$15.00
- 2) Residential Builders registration, fee \$25.00
- 3) The Expiration of such registration fee shall be the 31st day of December of each and every year.

(F) V.A., F.H.A., and Conventional Mortgage inspection of residential buildings, and inspections to determine compliance of existing buildings, structures and sites to Building Code and other applicable code requirements, fee \$50.00

PART II. The 1977 Building Code of the Township of Plymouth, Ordinance No. 52, is hereby amended by amending Part VII (S) Section 1500.5 (xx), Article 1100 - Fees:

Moving of building permit requirements are that before a permit for the moving of any building or structure may be issued, the applicant shall file with the Township Treasurer a cash or surety bond, in form and with sufficient sureties acceptable to the Township Treasurer, in the penal sum of not less than Ten Thousand Dollars, saving and protecting the Township of Plymouth harmless from all damages to private property and to pay for all damages to public property that may arise from the use of any streets, alleys, boulevards, parks or other public places in the moving of said building or structure, and the applicant shall file with the Township Treasurer a public liability and property damage insurance policy, naming the applicant and the Township of Plymouth as the insured, and providing for the payment of any liability imposed by law upon such applicant or the Township of Plymouth to the extent of Ten Thousand Dollars for injury to or death of any one person and Twenty Thousand Dollars for injuries to or deaths of more than one person and for damage to property in the amount of Two Thousand Dollars, and the applicant shall file with the Township Treasurer a cash or surety bond in form and with sufficient sureties acceptable to the Township Treasurer, in the penal sum of not less than One Thousand Dollars, the condition of which bond shall be that the applicant guarantees to the Township of Plymouth that the moving of the building or structure will not cause, or allow as the result of such moving, the collecting of stagnant water or leaving of the land in a condition determined by the Department of Building and Code Enforcement to be unsuitable or to be unfit for the growing of turf or for other land uses permitted in the zoning district in which such moving occurs. In addition, the applicant shall file with the Department of Building and Code Enforcement a specification of the route over which the building or structure is to be moved and the time allowed for such moving as approved by the Fire Chief of the Township of Plymouth. The foregoing requirements shall not be applicable in the case of the moving of a building or structure within the limits of the property on which it is located.

Further, the applicant shall provide such security personnel and public safety precautions as the Building Official and the Fire Chief may direct or require. In no event shall a permit to move a building or structure be issued by the Department of Building and Code Enforcement unless and until the Department of Building and Code Enforcement finds that under the facts the applicant has sufficient knowledge, experience, equipment and facilities to properly conduct such moving and that the structure and the use thereof at the proposed location thereof within the Township of Plymouth would be lawful and not injurious to the contiguous property and surrounding neighborhood; provided, that upon denial of said permit and within thirty (30) days of such denial, the applicant may appeal such denial to the Board of Trustees, whereupon that body may approve the issuance of a permit.

The moving of building permit fee shall be a sum computed upon the basis of the cost of moving of the building in accordance with the schedule contained in subsection (A), Building Permit Fee, hereinbefore. In addition to the foregoing permits, requirements

It was a cold blustery afternoon in February down in the Dutch country. It was snowing. In many places the drifts were more than four feet high. It was right after World War II when the post war depression hit and a fellow couldn't even buy a job.

On this particular day the weather was worse than many The Stroller had endured since coming to Michigan. And, as usual, on a day like this the male members of the neighborhood families had gathered at the town's fire hall.

The members of Congress in the nation's capitol never enjoyed their Michigan bean soup more than we did back in the fire hall.

WHEN THE WIND seemed to be howling its loudest this day, the door opened to the stairs leading to the basement and a voice called out, "look who just blew in."

It was Rev. Peter White, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. None of us knew just how to react to his arrival when the hilarity seemed to be at its highest. "Often heard about the fun you fellows have," the good reverend said, "so I thought I would join you for the afternoon."

"Make yourself right at home," he was told, with the added thought, "we hope there isn't a fire call."

Rev. White smiled as he accepted a huge bowl of soup. He ate it with extreme pleasure and then asked, "Who made it? I'd like to have him come to our church bazaar and the duplicate the feat he just performed here."

Every one laughed, thinking that the

preacher of the gospel was having a little joke and would leave when his appetite was satisfied. We were fooled.

Throughout the afternoon he enjoyed the company of the firefighters. Not only did he engage in the pool games, claiming it brought back memories of his college days when he took part in the games in the fraternity house, but he was slick with the cue.

WHEN THE POOL playing ended he went from table to table watching the card games.

He looked over the shoulders of the players and had a difficult time keeping from giving tips of what he saw. He was particularly pleased at the five card stud poker game where the stakes were matches instead of money. He stood amazed at some of the gambles the players were taking in drawing for cards.

He seemed to enjoy himself to the utmost when The Stroller, then one of the players, connected with an "inside" straight and took all the matches. He didn't get in to the game himself.

Instead he went from table to table just watching. Only once that The Stroller recalls did he voice surprise. That came when one of the players stood pat on a pair of kings and kept raising the bet until he forced all the other players to lay down their hands.

"My," he said, "I never thought you were the kind of a fellow with nerve enough to do anything like that and especially with just a pair of kings."

FINALLY, AFTER what he termed a very pleasant afternoon, the good reverend announced that he was leaving.

"I thoroughly enjoyed myself," he said, "and I want to thank you for a relaxing afternoon. And now that I visited you fellows why don't you return the favor and visit with me on Sunday morning?"

That's exactly what we did — about 20 strong. And that first Sunday morning gathering started a tradition that still exists with the volunteer firefighters back home.

The minister's strategy worked.

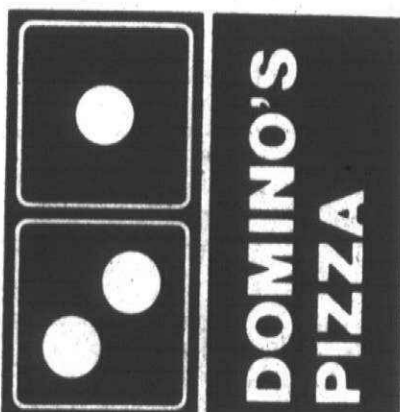

Reye's Syndrome:

A parent's nightmare

Brian Rowland has no recollection of his trip to the doctor's office, to Beaumont Hospital, and then to Children's Hospital in Detroit.

"When I woke up, it was like a dream," he said. "I didn't know where I was."

For his mother, Nila Rowland of Ross Street, Plymouth, her son's bout with Reye's Syndrome was a nightmare.

Life is back to normal for the 9-year-old now. He's playing junior basketball for the Mustangs and attending Smith Elementary School. When he dashes home for lunch at noon, he has time to give his dog, Candy, an extra hug.

BRIAN'S ILLNESS started last Nov. 21, the Tuesday before Thanksgiving.

He was very drowsy and although he didn't feel much like going to basketball practice, he went. But the pounding of the bouncing balls was an unbearable sound and he went home.

On Wednesday morning, he vomited — not violently, but his stomach was upset. He still was drowsy and listless. His mother took him over to his grandmother's house to spend the day while she went to work.

As the day progressed, his grandmother became increasingly concerned about his condition. He was displaying hostility and didn't seem to recognize his grandmother.

His mother left her office, picked him up, and headed for their pediatrician in Farmington. At that time, Brian was passive, but disoriented. He did not recognize his mother.

"Brian had been hit on the head with a basketball on Monday. It could have been a concussion, or spinal meningitis. The doctor sent us to Beaumont Hospital," Mrs. Rowland said.

IT WAS on the way to Beaumont that the syndrome entered a new violent phase. He showed unusual strength, tearing off his shirt and screaming.

"If my mother hadn't come along (to Beaumont), I don't know how I would have managed the drive," Mrs. Rowland said.

Brian added that he didn't even like to hear about that part of his sickness.

Doctors at Beaumont telephoned Dr. Edgardo L. Arcinue, director of the Reye's Syndrome Study Center at Children's Hospital. He suggested immediate treatment of Mannitol and Decadron, two drugs that halt brain swelling.

"There seemed to be an almost immediate calming reaction to the drugs. But the worst moment for me was when they asked me what last rites I wished for my son."

An ambulance was dispatched from Children's Hospital to pick up the patient. It arrived at Beaumont with a doctor, two nurses and two ambulance attendants.

Brian was rushed to the hospital and placed in intensive care where Dr. Arcinue and his staff took over.

At 6 a.m. Thanksgiving day, Brian's condition was reported as stable. His mother went home to change her clothes.

WHEN SHE RETURNED to Children's Hospital at 10 a.m., Brian recognized his mother. He was watching the Thanksgiving parade on television.

His speech was still slurred. But he was much better.

He stayed in intensive care until Saturday afternoon, when he was moved to a regular medical ward. He spent five days there.

"He started eating immediately and there was no more medication, once he was rational." He was tired and drowsy for a couple of weeks after he returned home.

His doctor advised getting back to normal as soon as possible, so he returned to school.

"We're still doctoring. He went to see Dr. Michael Nigro, his neurosurgeon, on Monday. His brain is still swollen but it's slowly getting down to normal size. We don't have to go back until June." Nigro headed the ICU at Children's Hospital when Brian was there. He is a research associate in the Reye's Syndrome Study Center.

"And we still go to Southfield for brain scans," Mrs. Rowland said.

Mrs. Rowland believes excellent and timely medication saved her son. "Any child with Reye's Syndrome symptoms can get immediate attention. Once the center is contacted, they can be transported immediately to the roof of Children's Hospital by helicopter."

Brian's case was an example of why the death rate from Reye's Syndrome

has dropped from a high of about 80 percent 13 years ago to 50 percent within the past two years. His illness did not follow the usual pattern in several ways.

The majority of cases of Reye's Syndrome are preceded by a viral disorder such as the flu or chicken pox, the effects of which last from a few days to a week.

Brian's was one of the rare cases. He did not have a viral infection. It started immediately.

VIOLENT, RELENTLESS vomiting is usually the first symptom. Brian

vomited once, and it could not be termed violent.

The vomiting, clammy hands and feet and dilated pupils are symptoms that may last 12 to 24 hours.

"With Brian, everything was speeded up," said his mother. He went through phases in 24 hours that usually take three days.

After the vomiting, the next phase is behavior change. The child becomes irritable and negative, wanting to be left alone and is unusually annoyed if anyone speaks to him or touches him.

He may want to sleep all the time, feeling very fatigued or simply "washed out." He may be glassy eyed with prolonged staring. Many parents describe a hostile look on their child's face. This condition may last 12-24 hours.

Disorientation often follows and the child becomes generally confused. For example, he may find his way into the bathroom but will not find his way out. He is able to carry out simple requests, such as "brush your teeth," only with the most deliberate and basic step-by-step instructions. This period lasts 12-24 hours.

THE NEXT PHASE is hostility. The child becomes generally hostile and unable to recognize family members and

familiar surroundings. He is frequently combative and aggressive, kicking and lashing out and biting.

He may moan and scream incessantly and abnormally, and no measure of reassurance will quiet him. He may demonstrate unusual strength, and it may take several adults to restrain him. This condition lasts only a few hours.

Brian reached this stage during the drive from the pediatrician's office to Beaumont Hospital.

Coma usually follows. Brian did not reach this phase.

The child usually enters the semi-comatose state, responding sluggishly and only after vigorous prodding. Soon, deep coma develops with no response. If death occurs, it is as a result of swelling brain tissue.

The above is the usual progression in cases of Reye's Syndrome. However, symptoms, time intervals and sequences may vary.

Reye's is thought to be primarily a syndrome of white suburban or rural children. In 1974, a study revealed that nearly two-thirds of the reported U.S. cases occurred in states bordering the Great Lakes. The cause is unknown, therefore there is no specific cure.

What to do if you suspect Reye's

The Reye's Syndrome Study Center at Children's Hospital, Detroit has prepared a guide for parents who suspect that their child may have Reye's:

- Don't panic. Even if one or more of the described symptoms do occur in your child or another's, the odds are that it is not Reye's Syndrome. Reye's strikes a very small percentage of the millions of children who contract the flu, chicken pox or some other viral infection.

- However, do consider Reye's. Quick action is imperative to give the Reye's child the greatest opportunity for recovery.

- Call your physician immediately and explain the symptoms. Tell him you are con-

cerned about Reye's Syndrome. This is important because Reye's can easily be mistaken for encephalitis or, in older children, for drug overdose.

- If you cannot contact your physician, go to a hospital emergency room immediately. The doctors will know quickly if Reye's is present and supportive therapy can be started immediately.

- If it is Reye's, you have done the right thing. Therapy has started, and you have maximized the child's chances of recovery by acting intelligently and swiftly.

- If it is not Reye's, your child still has had medical attention for his illness.

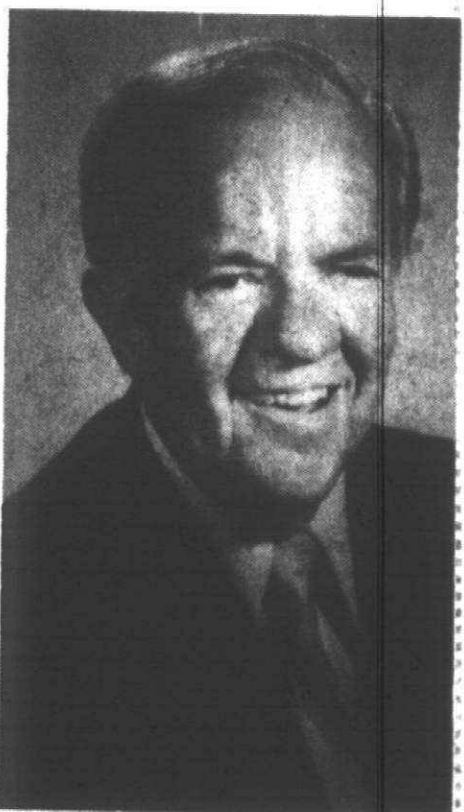

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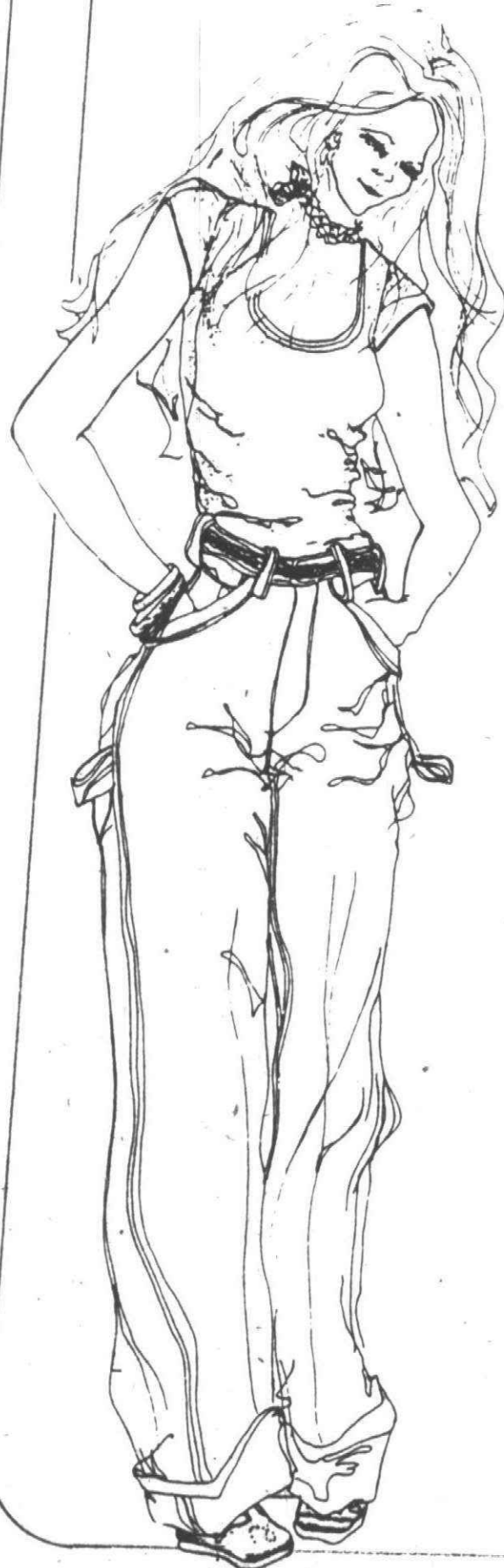
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'What do you mean you don't have my reservation?'

Here's a good traveler's motto: if at first you don't succeed, persist. If that doesn't work, scream bloody murder. The travel industry does not intend to cheat you, but sometimes it promises you prices and services occasionally not delivered. This happens because of human error, laziness, or the antics of a fouled-up computer.

It usually occurs because the employee who meets the public does not have the information necessary to deliver the goods.

What brings me to this going is that some Observer & Eccentric readers have tried, unsuccessfully, to get the Mini-Holiday rates quoted by the Chicago Convention and Tourism Bureau. Several readers phoned the Ritz Carlton Hotel for the rate I listed on this page Feb. 5 for one person for two nights on weekends, which is half the regular rate. They were told that no such rate was available.

Mini-holiday rates are available. If you have a problem at any Chicago hotel I listed, insist on the rate by name of contact Wayne Dunham, director of public relations, Chicago Convention and Tourism Bureau, 332 S. Michigan Ave., Chicago 60604, or telephone him at 1-312-922-3530.

THIS PROBLEM occurs often enough. The trick is to learn how to be assertive in demanding your rights.

Last fall, I arrived late and tired at the Holiday Inn in New York City. My reservation was made a week before, confirmed by telephone, and guaranteed. When I arrived, the desk clerk assured me there was no such reservation.

I believe him. In this case, I suspect the computer dropped my name somewhere between the interfaces. I had no intention of going elsewhere. I just kept repeating, much like a scratched record: "I made a reservation and I want a room." I got one.

You don't always win, but at least you know that somebody heard your complaint. That's what happened when I bought tickets, described as "two of the best seats in the house" for the play "Annie" at the Victoria Palace Theater in London last summer.

They were front-row-center in the balcony. It looked great on the seating plan. The hitch was that a double brass rail had been installed in front of the two seats on either side of the center aisle, probably to stop a careless customer from tumbling down the steep steps and over

the edge. I couldn't see over or under the rail. I didn't win that battle, because the seats were full, but I wrote to the manager and complained. He said that "half a million people had seen 'Annie' from those seats and nobody had complained before." Which, if true, certainly seems to prove my point.

FROM THE MAILBAG—"One call gets it all." That's the message on a T-shirt being handed out by the Southeast Michigan Travel and Tourist Association, 27777 Franklin Rd., Southfield, which wants to attract your attention to its telephone Snowline.

The Snowline, 357-1663, gives an updated-daily report on snow conditions and winter events in southeast Michigan.

TRAVELER'S TIPS, a brochure printed by the U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, will give you all kinds of information about the kinds of plant and animal diseases you can accidentally import when you bring certain plants and foods across the border.

It can also save you the heartache of carrying Irish shamrocks all the way from the Old Sod, and then having to leave them at the border because the Feds won't let you bring the plants in. Price is 25 cents.

Train trip across Canada a highlight of a lifetime

You are either a train traveler or not. You do or do not enjoy moving out of a cold station, steam on the windows and rails converging ahead as the railway car begins its rough and noisy rock.

Some people are aware only of the stopping and starting, the imperfect heating system in the roomette, where a bed takes every inch of space, the boredom of riding endlessly across lake, prairie and mountain country to the Pacific.

Train people perceive something else. They see the ride as a crossing of uncluttered land, where a solitary moose makes a yard by stamping the snow down with his feet on a lonely stretch of rock-and-tree country north of Lake Superior. Seeing the real countryside as history made it, in clusters of small towns with names like Sioux Look-Out and prairie cities like Winnipeg and Regina. Breathtaking views when the night train startles the wilderness in the Rockies.

If you are a train person, a trip across Canada is one of the travel highlights of a lifetime.

Canada has two major train lines, the Canadian National (CN) and the Canadian Pacific (CP) railways. Both run on parallel lines within 100 miles of the American border from the Atlantic

Ocean to Winnipeg, at the edge of the Great Plains. CP continues on a southern route through the mountain pass beyond Banff and CN turns north through Jasper before the two lines reunite at Vancouver on the Pacific Ocean.

In late 1978, the two train services were merged to form VIA Canada, a rail passenger service. VIA is a crown corporation which reports to the minister of transport in the Canadian federal government system.

VIA manages all customer service from information and reservations to on-board services and scheduling, making government contracts for these services with CN and CP.

The future for the venture holds 50 new coaches, 22 LRC (Light, Rapid, Comfortable) locomotives and a computerized reservation and ticketing system that will plug into Air Canada's reservation system, all by early 1980.

The computerized reservation system, called ReserVIA, will make Canada the first country in the world where a traveler can make airline, train, car rental, hotel and motel reservations from a single computerized source.

THE NEW SYSTEM was designed to eliminate overlapping service. CP and CN pioneered Canada in the 19th century, and have since offered two almost-parallel train routes from Montreal to

Vancouver. A passenger could choose between crossing the Rockies at Banff or Jasper, but otherwise the route was similar.

VIA now runs a daily transcontinental train from Toronto to Vancouver and another daily train from Montreal to Vancouver, with passengers opting to cross the platform at Winnipeg for a choice of routes. VIA will run variously on both CN and CP tracks.

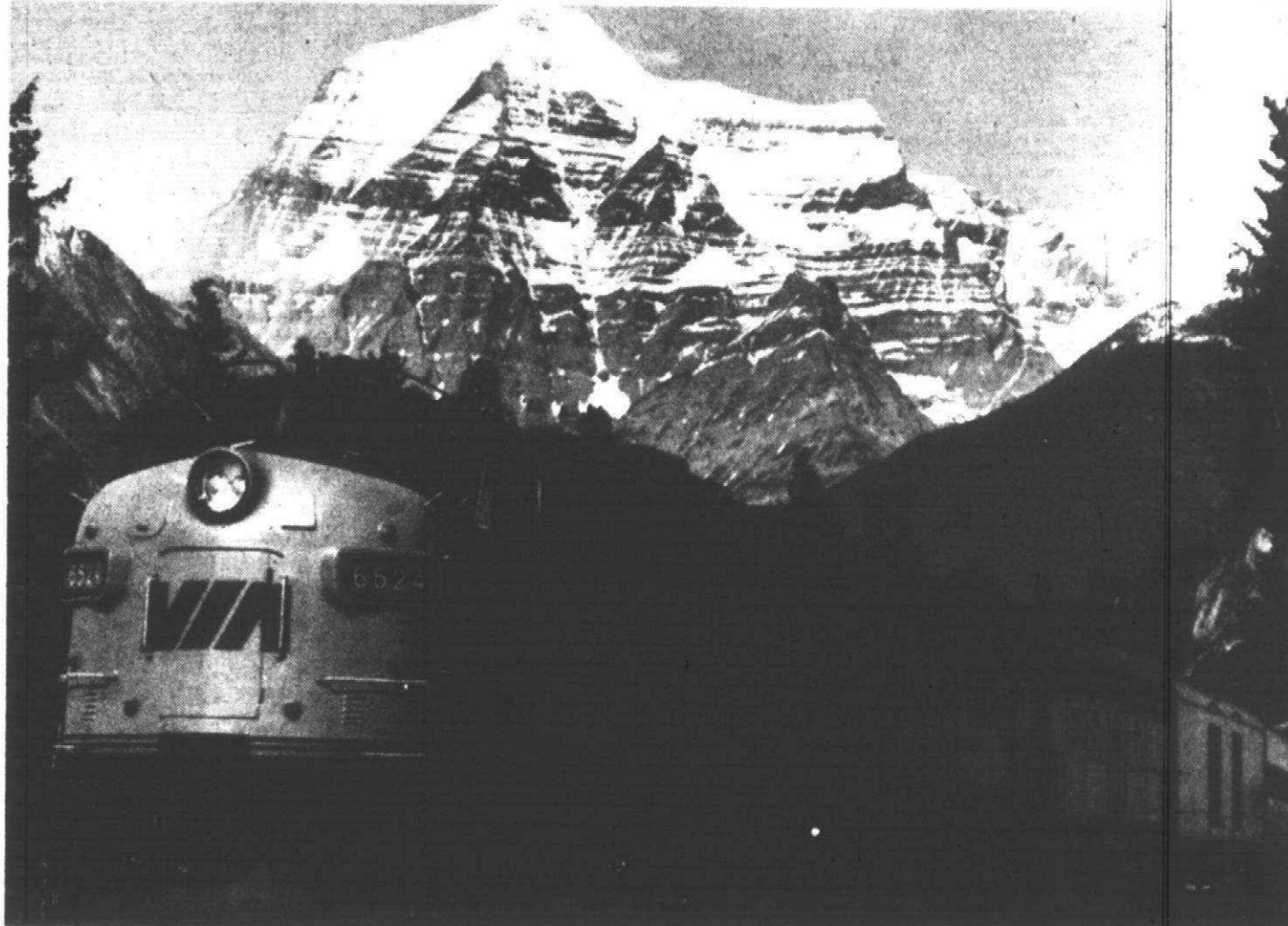
The new Fare-For-All plan includes round-trip rates at 1 1/2 of the one-way price. VIA passes within regions, and one-third off for senior citizens.

The rail corridor which runs from Windsor through Toronto and Montreal to Quebec City moves one-third of its business traffic.

One of the highlights of this run is the Turbo train which speeds from Toronto to Montreal.

Package deals offer round-trip club car passage from Toronto to Montreal on this train with a full-course meal, free parking at stations in Toronto and Montreal and one night's hotel accommodation at a choice of three or four top-notch hotels for \$99 to \$129, depending on the hotel.

Another unusual Canadian train package is called the Shaw Show Train, a 10-day cross-Canada journey complete with on-board performers from the Shaw Festival Company, a separate theater car with stage, piano and seats

for 50 passengers, and special theater stops at cities along the way.

The wheeled playhouse will run 10 times this year from Toronto to Vancouver for a package cost of about \$1,100 (U.S.) including first-class hotel accommodations and meals.

AMERICAN TRAVELERS often are surprised to learn of major differences

between traveling by train in the United States and Canada. Canadian trains are maintained and upgraded to offer good, reasonably priced service cross-country, so you will not see old train stations looking like broken down mausoleums. Canadian stations are alive and busy with traffic.

The second major difference is geographical. After crossing the American Rockies, you must cross several hun-

dred miles of butte and plains to the Pacific. In Canada, three ranges of glaciated mountains fold for 600 miles from the Rockies to the edge of the sea, running through spectacular mountain scenery for 24 hours.

Ft. Wayne has group programs

Even though historic Fort Wayne is closed for the winter, its education program continues.

"Yesterday-on-Tour," a "hands-on" living history program, is being offered to schools and community groups throughout the metropolitan area.

The response has been overwhelming, according to William Phenix, curator of military history at the fort.

"Yesterday-on-Tour" has been seen by thousands of school children in the tri-county area. The four participants in the program have traveled to many Detroit schools as well as schools in such suburbs as Royal Oak, Troy, Union Lake, Grosse Pointe, Mt. Clemens, Grosse Ile, Plymouth, Rochester, Warren, Wyandotte, Birmingham, Highland Park, Oxford, and Utica.

"EVERYWHERE THEY have gone they have created a greater interest in

local and national history and Fort Wayne as well," Phenix said.

Billed as a field trip without the cost, labor and expense of leaving school, "Yesterday-on-Tour" combines "Hard-tack and Coffee," last year's outreach program on the Civil War, with "Les Francais a Detroit," which deals with Detroit's 18th-century French period.

As in last year's program, Michael Jones and Nora White of the fort's interpretive staff play the roles of Jacob Genner, a Civil War soldier, and Lydia Hall, a woman of the 1860s, the two players demonstrate how people lived during that era of our history.

Their presentation includes discussions of Civil War army life, a typical soldier's uniform and equipment, and domestic life during the war (especially women's active contributions to the war effort).

This year two new characters have

been added to the program, Dennis Charboneau and Jeanne Godfroi, portrayed by Dennis Charboneau (no need to adopt a French name when one has a perfectly good one already!) and Jean LaViolette, both also from the interpretive staff.

Through artifacts and story they describe the life of the adventurous French "habitants" and "coureur du bois" (rover of the woods) in 18th-century Michigan.

"Yesterday-on-Tour" is available to school grades 3-8 and limited adult presentations. Each program lasts approximately 45-60 minutes and is adaptable to shorter lengths. There is a fee that is reduced when more than one presentation is scheduled at one location.
