Patients link hopes, fears to group home life

Robert is looking for a fresh start in life.

He is 29, divorced and currently a patient at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital. It is his third psychiatric hospitalization.

Prior to his admission, Robert (not his real name) had been withdrawn, talked to himself, suffered from insomnia and neglected his personal grooming. He also had expressed suicidal wishes.

In his patient profile, Robert is described as responding to medication and therapy. He now is tentatively scheduled to be placed in a small, group home for mentally ill on Rain-tree Court in Canton. The home is slated to open April 20.

The opening is being challenged. Three residents of Willow Trail subdivision have filed suit in Wayne County Circuit Court to try to block its licensing and occupancy.

The proposed home also is named in a township complaint filed last week with the Michigan Department of Social Services (DSS).

Robert's parents have been financially supportive. Now Robert wants to resume his college education, get a degree in business administration and start a new life.

He is soft-spoken, bright and cooperative. He asked that his real name not be used.

"I'm trying like hell to get going," said Robert, in a recent interview with the Canton Observer at the Northville hospital.

DORIS is a 55-year-old woman who has been in and out of mental hospitals since 1957. She is described as a manic-depressive, a person whose moods shift dramatically.

According to her patient profile, Doris is manipulative and expresses feelings of low self-esteem. She paces nervously and her hands tremble.

She also is friendly and enjoys talking with staff and visitors at the hospital. Doris has had had extensive experience working in clothing stores and is considered a good worker.

Doris is scheduled to be returned to a foster care home in Wayne, where she enjoyed going on outings to parks and ethnic festivals. But she prefers the security and familiarity of Northville.

"It's hard for me to get adjusted," said Doris. "I'm satisfied to stay right here."

AN OBSERVER reporter recently visited the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital where Robert and Doris



agreed to discuss their problems. Judith Shelden, director of the community placement program, selected the two as typical of patients who are being moved into community group homes.

"Robert has has potential," said Mrs.

Shelden. "We don't want him to settle in here."

Doris' preference for staying within the security of the Northville psychiatric hospital is "part of her problem," said Mrs. Shelden.

"I told Doris we were going to keep making a placement until we get it right," added Mrs. Shelden.

The state-run Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital has almost 800 patients at capacity. Virtually all come from Wayne County.

There are snack bars, lounges and a beauty shop, all of which are considered important therapy. Patients who have advanced beyond the acute, initial period of hospitalization are encouraged to get out of the wards and take part in recreational activities.

They may play pool, dance and learn crafts. They may have visitors and go outside on the grounds. They have individual and group therapy.

BUT STATE policies are prompting a drive to get recoverable patients, both mentally retarded and mentally ill, out of large institutions and back into the community for treatment.

Officials believe patients can receive

more individualized attention in small group homes, often of six residents or less. According to a community placement guidelines, the care and attention is aimed at encouraging emotional and social growth.

The homes are also intended to be a buffer between the hospital and return to community life.

The guidelines for placement of mentally ill patients in group homes rule out persons who are dangerous to themselves or others.

Group homes may take patients who have been hospitalized at least six months or who have a history of multiple admissions; persons who have become chronically dependent on the institution; persons who lack motivation to take part in programs.

Others may include persons who require encouragement and repeated instruction for daily habits such as hygiene, grooming and being sociable; persons who lack social skills and ability to function independently; and patients who exhibit some bizarre and/or delusional behavior.

Big state-aid loss expected in Wayne-Westland district

The tax cut plan on the May 19 ballot could cost the Wayne-Westland school district more than \$3.5 million.

That's the assessment of John Baracy, executive director of business and finance for the district. Baracy investigated the proposed tax plan Wednesday at a Lansing meeting of the Coalition for Property Tax Relief and Equitable State Funding for All Local Districts.

The coalition was initiated by Wayne-Westland Superintendent Timothy Dyer.

The \$3.5 million is an estimate of the money the district could lose if voters approve the tax plan, which recently was passed by both houses of the state Legislature. Officials won't know for sure how much money the district will lose for two-three weeks, Baracy said.

"Although the Legislature passed the proposal, it will take 15 bills to develop implementation language, which is very critical," said Baracy.

The board of education is expected to support or reject the proposal after learning how it will be implemented.

WAYNE-WESTLAND will lose money from both local property tax revenue and state aid, Baracy said, if the plan is adopted by the voters. School taxes would be cut by 50 percent up to a maximum of \$1,400 per resident under the bill.

The plan would cut property tax levied for operating purposes in half. The district levies 40.3 mills for operations. Voters will be asked to renew that tax rate in the June 8 school election. The renewal legally could be placed on the ballot under the proposed tax plan.

An additional seven mills levied by the district to cover bond issues wouldn't be affected by the tax plan since it is levied to repay a debt.

The growth of future tax revenue based on higher property values would be limited to six percent for each class of property. That figure falls far short of the current increases in property value.

But the real property value, which is also called the state equalized valuation (SEV), would be used in calculating the state aid granted the district.

"State aid is based on local and state match of funds. The inflated SEV per pupil would make it appear that the district is getting more local tax revenue per pupil than we really are," said Baracy. "So actually we would get less state aid."

Baracy estimates this would mean a loss of \$1.7 million in state aid, if the formula used to calculate the disbursements is the same. And that's "a big if," he adds.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS also

remain suspicious of the tax plan's pledge to make up revenue lost to the district.

"We're concerned that the state can't make up what it doesn't have," said Baracy. "If the state does try to, we have real concerns about when it will be paid."

"This could hurt our cash flow, which means we would have to borrow more money. The general consensus is that we would have to borrow an additional \$5 to \$6 million."

Baracy said the cost of that borrowing would amount to \$200,000.

How the tax cuts would be granted is yet to be determined, Baracy said. He is waiting for interpretation of the effect of the proposal on PA 114, which would have substantially raised the value of residential property in the district. The new proposal could limit that rise to six percent.

"People are going to want to think about some things. If they itemize, they'll be paying more on their federal income tax. So more money will be going to the federal government," he said. "But they'll also be able to itemize more for the increase in sales tax to 5.5 cents."

"Ninety percent of the people are expected to benefit. People will really have to look at their individual situations."

Organizers gear up for Canton summer festival

To most people, August probably seems like a long time away.

But to planners of this year's Canton Country Festival, three particular days in August seem just around the corner. Their thoughts have been turned to Aug. 7, 8 and 9 since the cold, snowy days of January.

Now that spring is here, planners are speeding up preparations for the annual festival in Griffin Park. They are seeking community participation on several fronts, including:

- Submission of festival logo drawings. According to one festival planner, Frank McMurray, the selected logo

will appear on banners and advertising materials for the 1981 and future festivals.

Drawings must be submitted by noon, April 27, to festival headquarters in the Wayne Bank, 44520 Michigan, Canton, 48188. For further information regarding a logo, call McMurray at 455-3200.

- Reservations for a festival booth or a float in a proposed parade must be made by May 1 by calling festival headquarters at 397-1604. Homeowner groups and civic organizations are invited to participate in this year's event.
- Help is needed on a variety of fes-

tival committees. Interested persons should call headquarters, 397-1604.

UNTIL THIS YEAR, preparations for the six-year-old festival were coordinated by the Canton Chamber of Commerce. But McMurray, former chamber president, said the event was growing too large for such an organization to handle.

Last January, a non-profit corporation was established for the sole purpose of festival planning. Rose Fowler, manager of the Wayne Bank on Michigan Avenue, volunteered office space to the group.

According to McMurray, the office is manned by festival planners and equipped with a telephone recording device.

Last year, approximately 5,000 Canton residents attended the summer event, formerly called the Canton Sweet Corn Festival. Numerous organizations, including the Canton Rotary Club, the chamber and township firefighters, sponsored dinners and other events.

New festival events which are proposed for this year include a parade, produce-growing contests, a pie and cake-baking contest and a bus tour to area historical sites.

LAST JANUARY, representatives of civic groups which participate in the festival elected officers of the first Canton Country Festival board of directors.

They include Flossie Tonda, president; Hank Johnson, first vice president; John Schwartz, second vice president; Bill Tesen, treasurer; and Sharon Palise, secretary.

Other board members are Robert Padgett, Art Winkler, Jim Davison, Greg Gatto, Walt McCrea, Jack Koers and Heather McLean.

Several persons already have been appointed to head festival committees. Chairpersons include McCrea, who will coordinate concession activities of civic, church and neighborhood groups; Davison, who will coordinate dinners; Arnie Williams, in charge of entertainment scheduling; Tesen, in charge of finances; and Koers, in charge of grounds; and James Gillig, charged with planning a proposed parade.

According to McMurray, chairpersons are needed for several other activities, including the planning of a photo contest.

Stephen Harper files for re-election

Stephen Harper has decided to seek re-election to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

Harper announced his candidacy last week after filing nominating petitions at the board offices on Monday.

The election clerk, Bernice Nichols, verified the validity of signatures on the petitions and certified Harper's candidacy that afternoon.

Harper, of 11835 Appletree Drive, Plymouth, was elected to a four-year term on the school board in June 1976 and presently is vice-president of the board.

Harper registered to vote in July 1973 and has voted in all of the elections held since for a 100 percent record.

Harper said he had considered not

running again, but had received a number of phone calls inquiring about his intentions and so he reached a decision and filed petitions.

The trustee said he had picked up nominating petitions many months ago but kept that information quiet because he didn't want to discourage other candidates from running for the board if their decision would be affected by an incumbents actions.

Before running for the board Harper had served served on citizen advisory committees and worked on two or three millage campaigns.

April 6 is the deadline to file nominating petitions and April 9 is the deadline for potential candidates to withdraw from the ballot. The election will

be held on June 8.

So far the five certified candidates are: Harper; Marilyn Rickard of Canton; Ernest Rumsby of Canton; William Decker of Plymouth; and Charles Washburn of Plymouth.

Residents who have taken out nominating petitions but have not yet filed include Judi Duerr of Plymouth, Christopher Clements of Plymouth, David Bone of Canton, Edyth Aninos of Canton, and Loretta Olson.

Mrs. Olson, of 365 Pacific, Plymouth, is the latest to pick up nominating petitions. She registered to vote in April 1965 and has voted in 26 school elections since then for a 100 percent record.

Candidates and persons picking up

nominating petitions with a 100 percent voting record include Rickard, Clements, Olson and Harper. Decker has voted in 96 percent of the elections since he registered and Washburn has a 94 percent record.

Mrs. Olson, a dispatcher and clerk for the school transportation department, is a regular school board attendee and probably has been at more board meetings than any of the other candidates.

Of the 10 residents picking up nominating petitions, four are from Canton and six from Plymouth. Of the five certified as candidates, two are from Canton and three from Plymouth.

K-C to help the retarded

The sixth annual fund drive to assist the mentally retarded locally and in Michigan will be conducted April 10, 11, 12 by Fr. Victor J. Renaud Council 3392 of the Knights of Columbus of Plymouth.

That announcement was made this week by Grand Knight Charles Dobry of the K-C post at 150 Fair Street near Ann Arbor Trail and Mill.

Last year statewide the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic men's fraternal society, collected a record \$664,621 in the three-day weekend drive.

In the Plymouth area \$3,500 was collected and donated to Plymouth Opportunity House at Deer and Wing in the city of Plymouth.

Under the program, which is carried out in most of the 230 K-C councils in Michigan, persons are asked to donate money for the mentally retarded and are given a Tootsie Roll candy in return as a gesture of appreciation for the gift.

Some 80 percent of the net income from the donations is retained by the Plymouth Council for distribution to area groups and agencies.

The balance is forwarded to the State Council of the Knights of Columbus to meet expenses of the program and to make donations on behalf of the 67,000 Knights in Michigan.

State Deputy Bernard G. Gerke of Rochester, the highest ranking elected K-C official in Michigan, said there are more than 265,000 mentally retarded citizens in Michigan.

The contributions from the public in the April 10-12 drive will go toward lessening the handicaps of the mentally retarded through training and professional service.

In the five years the Michigan Knights have been conducting the drive more than \$2.5 million has been collected for the mentally retarded.

Residents will be able to recognize the Knights and their helpers during the campaign because they will be dressed in colorful hats, carrying canisters resembling a Tootsie Roll candy and wearing bright yellow aprons emblazoned with "K of C Help the Mentally Retarded."

His methods help the handicapped

The Rotary Club of Plymouth recently donated equipment to a special gym program for handicapped youngsters and children with coordination problems.

The perceptual motor development gym program is run by instructor James Glasgow of Northville through the community education department of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The program, open to all residents of the school district, also is supported by the Plymouth, Canton and Northville chapter of the Michigan Association for Children with Learning Disabilities (MACLD).

The gym class is held each Thursday evening in the gymnasium of Farrand Elementary School. The spring session will begin on April 30 and run to June. A summer program will be offered from June until early August.

The first class runs from 5-6 p.m. and a second sessions is held from 6-7 p.m. each Thursday.

Glasgow currently is a special education gym instructor at the Burger Center in Garden City — a center for handicapped youngsters in western Wayne County, including Plymouth-Canton.

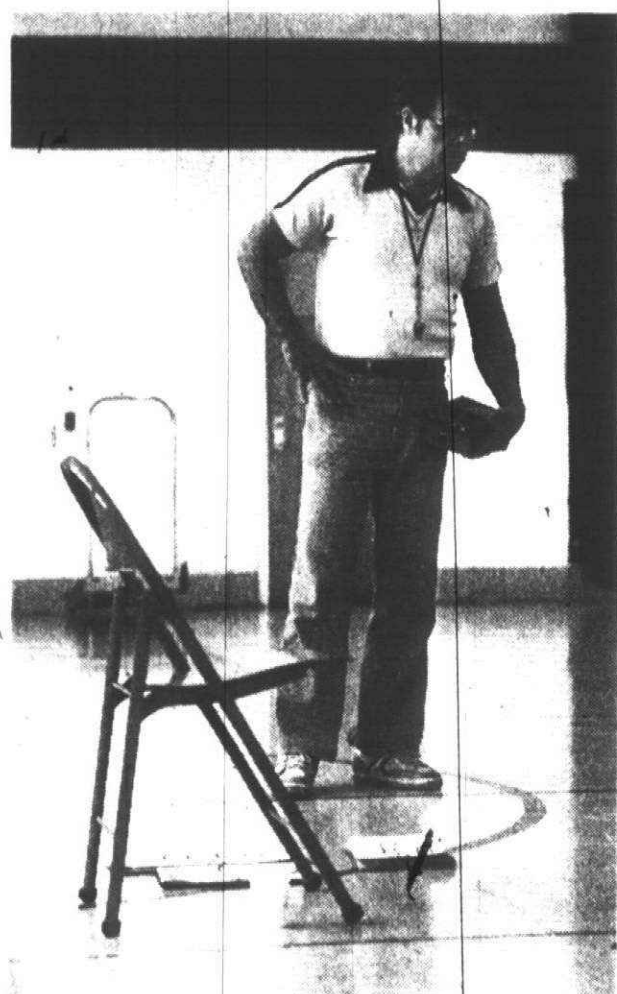
A teacher for 16 years, Glasgow has taught gym classes for the handicapped for 14 years and has written a manual on special exercises for youngsters gross motor development problems — children who, for whatever reason, are clumsy, awkward and have balance problems.

The class is aimed at developing better coordination, at improving the cardio-vascular system, at helping muscles develop, and at building in handicapped children a feeling of self-worth.

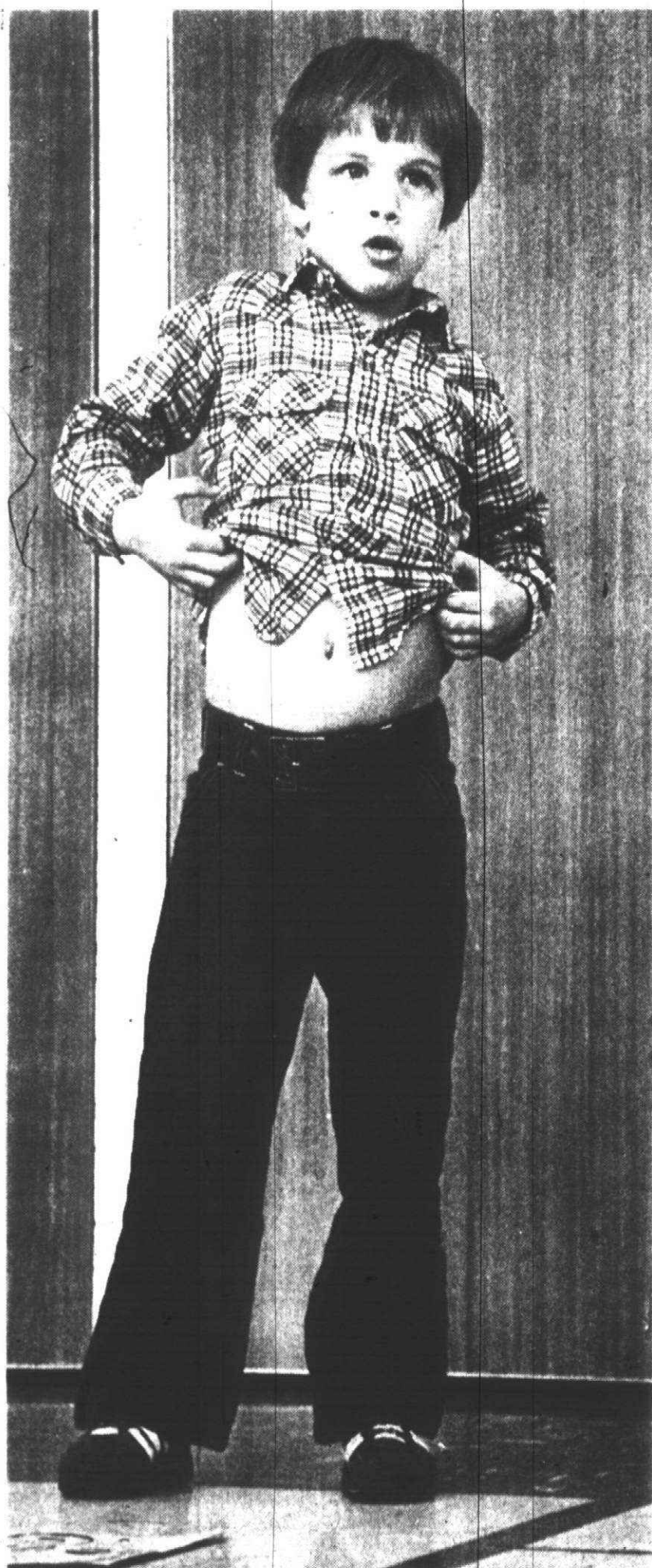
The instruction includes emphasis on helping a child know his right from his left, developing an awareness of body parts and their relationship to space, coordination of the senses with body movements, and on tuning in on signals from their immediate environment.

Students in the class include the blind, deaf, physically handicapped, learning disabled and non-handicapped children with body coordination problems.

The gym program has received equipment in recent years from the local chapter of the MACLD and recently the Rotary Club of Plymouth added to that inventory by donating an exercise bicycle and a rowing machine.

ACTIVITIES in the group homes include a daily routine of meals, chores, exercise, recreation and therapy with staff social workers and aides.

Psychiatrists and nurses visit at regular intervals and are on 24-hour-a-day call, according to Mrs. Shelden.

One of Robert's tasks will be to weave together his ambitions with realistic expectations.

"I can squeak by on youth for a little longer," said Robert. "I'm trying like hell to get going."

The hospital administrators are aware of opposition to community-

based group homes — particularly homes for mentally ill. They also are sensitive to the fears and concerns of neighbors.

"One of every 11 persons suffers some kind of emotional illness," pointed out Jean Bachelidor, of Plymouth, community relations director of the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital.

"Most of us don't know we won't be ill (sometime)," she added. "It becomes threatening."

"It isn't a mystery why they feel the way they do," continued Mrs. Bachelidor. "For many people a home is the major investment of their life. The mystery is how to placate those who fear."

Mrs. Shelden said she is convinced that neighbors become less resistant once a home has been open for several months.

As a result of the new residence hall rates, students sharing a room with two other roommates will pay \$1,860 for the 20-meal plan, \$1,830 for the 13-meal plan, \$1,800 for the 10-meal plan and \$914 for a room and no meals.

FLUORIDE'S FIRST BIG TEST

In 1945, New York's State health department conducted one of the first and most rigorously controlled research projects in medical history. Teams of dentists examined the teeth of thousands of school children in the Hudson River cities of Newburgh and Kingston which both had fluoride-free water. In both towns, they found the same high incidence of tooth decay. Then on May 2, 1945 a small feeder machine was turned on in Newburgh's filtration plant; from that moment on, Newburgh's water contained 1.2 parts of fluoride per million.

Over the next ten years, doctors and dentists repeatedly checked the children medically and dentally. When the decade ended, they had found only one difference. In Newburgh, children between six and ten — who had been drinking fluoridated water all their lives — had 60% fewer decayed, missing or filled teeth than youngsters from the same age group in Kingston.

Today, fluoridation is accepted and endorsed as a major public health measure in preventing tooth decay by virtually every scientific and health organization in the country.



County puts proposals on May ballot, won't pay for them

In spite of pressure from Gov. Milliken and state legislative leaders, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners will keep three county tax hike proposals on the May 19 ballot.

In complicated maneuvers last Thursday, the commissioners considered four different resolutions which would have affected the ballot.

The upshot of voting was that the county proposals will stay on the ballot and the county will not pay for the cost of putting them there.

The May 19 election was originally called by the state Legislature in an attempt to gain voter approval of a tax

reform plan. The plan calls for, among other things, cutting property taxes in half and raising the state sales tax from 4 to 5.5 cents per dollar.

On March 19, the last day for such action, the county commissioners jumped in with three tax proposals calling for one mill each for the county sheriff's road patrol, Wayne County General Hospital and mental health expenditures.

The one mill sheriff's department levy was proposed by suburban commissioners while the hospital and health measures were proposed by Detroit commissioners.

In Thursday's meeting, chairman Samuel Turner read a telegram from the governor and legislative leaders asking that the county board keep the May 19 ballot clear of county proposals.

AFTER MUCH discussion, a resolution to take the three county proposals off the ballot failed by a 9-11 vote.

The commissioners then approved a resolution to take two proposals off the ballot leaving the sheriff's department proposal on. The resolution, by Com-

missioner Richard Manning, passed 11-9 with the suburbanites generally for and the Detroiters generally against.

But to put this into effect, the commissioners had to approve the necessary funding appropriation. The resolution to allocate \$35,000 for the county cost of the election only got a 13-7 vote approval, one vote short of the two thirds majority needed for an appropriation.

The result was that all three tax proposals stay on the ballot with no money to pay for the costs — publishing of

election notices in various newspapers.

Commissioners also defeated another motion calling for moving the three county tax proposals from the May 19 ballot to the November 4 general election ballot.

Area commissioners voting on the losing end of the motion to pay the \$35,000 were Kay Beard (D-Inkster), Mary Dumas (R-Livonia), Richard Manning (D-Redford), Thomas Presnell (D-Westland) and R. William Joyner (D-Plymouth).

COMMISSIONER Joyner said the board's votes on the election and funding "once again put this board at the height of lunacy."

The board did allocate \$160,000 so that the state tax proposal election could be held. Under normal procedure, the county will be reimbursed by the state for this amount.

The board's failure to fund its own part of the election may be reconsidered if any commissioner asks before tomorrow afternoon.

Overhead in a local store:
"Last week we went to my son's college graduation and this week he moved back home — he's planning three years of law school in town and I lost my sewing room."
A friend who recently welcomed her divorced daughter and child home also had to readjust to living with a toddler after seven years in an empty nest.
Let's be honest, with all the bemoaning of the empty nest, one does adjust. It doesn't take long for Dad to take over a kid's room for his hobbies or Mom to move the sewing machine in.
More and more, some nests are turning into more cuckoo-like nests with "no vacancy" signs not evident but implied.

Now husband Jack and I rattle around in a four-bedroom house as we have for eight years. And we love it.

I've taken over extra closet space and so has he. And there's never a traffic jam in the bathroom.

Doors are always open for our son Bruce to spend a week of spring vacation from law school in his old digs, and daughter Tzyviah leaves the horses in Ann Arbor but brings her dog Shada when she visits. Best of all, married daughter Elaine and Alex bring Maya and Arik for their occasional visits.

DESPITE the fact the Iden household has been known to expand to the need of many extra guests, both temporary and semi-permanent, it looks as though our nest is empty for good.

Not so for many others. The phenomenon of the "not so empty nest" is happening all around us and for varied reasons. Author Phyllis Feuerstein, who has written a book about it, says some kids "have an emotional need to go back to where all good things come from."

Others, she points out, come home after losing a job, gaining a divorce, to get another degree, to save money until marriage or just because of hard times.

"The Not So Empty Nest" was written by Mrs. Feuerstein and Carol Roberts who interviewed 250 families nationwide. This was accomplished easily because Seymour Feuerstein is a traveling salesman and his wife travels with him.

The job ahead at Schoolcraft

Voters will need to be especially critical June 8 when they vote for two Schoolcraft College trustees.

One reason is that the seven-member board of trustees must pick a new president this year to replace C. Nelson Grote who is leaving for a big job in Spokane. Selecting a president is the most important decision a board makes, because the president sets the tone of the administration and recommends college policy.

Grote was selected in 1971 because of his strong vocational-technical background. The board saw a need to expand offerings in that area. Grote delivered, and also provided strong leadership in community services and state financing.

Trustee candidates, then, should be prepared to demonstrate they have both formal knowledge of, and experience in, picking personnel.

The selection process must be as open as possible, both because state law requires it and because public confidence must be maintained. Dick Headlee and the secretive bunch of trustees at Oakland University brought in President Joseph Champagne under a cloud with their clandestine dealings. No tax-supported institution can afford that.

A SECOND reason voters need to be careful is that program cuts may have to be made.

For several budget years, Schoolcraft has been scraping by, cutting the daylight out of non-essentials to save faculty and program.

At some point — if not this year, then next — there will no longer be any non-essentials to cut. It follows, then, that Schoolcraft will either have to reduce quality or else reduce the quantity of its offerings, preserving the best programs intact.

I suspect the same kinds of decisions will have to be made at Schoolcraft. Being a trustee will require tough decisions by persons who can look an unhappy audience in the eyes and politely say, "Sorry, no." A trustee who plays to the gallery will hurt the college.

WHAT KIND of persons would add balance to the current board?

Incumbent trustee Mark McQuesten, whose term is expiring, is a seminary student and will get flak from his religious superiors if he continues a political career. He could conceivably give up plans to be a priest, however, and seek re-election.

McQuesten is the only former Schoolcraft student on the board and was a student representative on the screening committee when Grote was hired. If he leaves, it will help to have a Schoolcraft graduate on the board.

Richard J. Hayward, whose term is also expiring, has a quarter-century in the structural steel business under his belt. He came onto the board when it was in need of industrial people to balance the high number of educators. Hayward is uncertain about seeking re-election.

AMONG THE FIVE holdover trustees, there are two educators, two from industry and one from small business.

The Michigan Education Association likes to see educators serving on elected boards, where budgets are made and contracts written. Without reflecting on the two Schoolcraft incumbents, I have serious reservations about educators moonlighting on school boards. Certainly the balanced Schoolcraft board doesn't require more educators.

Geographically, the five holdover trustees include four from Livonia and one from the Plymouth-Canton School District.

There's no one from Clarenceville (which includes southeastern Farmington Hills and a slice of Redford Township), Garden City or Northville school districts. Petitions are available now from college secretary Clara Rousseau to get on the June 8 ballot.

Candidates will need at least 50 but not more than 200 signatures. Filing deadline is 4 p.m. Tuesday, April 21.

Must men still live as beasts?

"Time was when men lived as did the beasts. In those days of man's beginnings, no vision of goodness, no dream of justice or mercy had as yet been born within the human heart."

Do men still live as beasts when a president is struck down in an assassination attempt, another fights for his life and his reason, a missionary is murdered — his body wrapped in a red and black guerilla flag.

Do men still live as beasts when a group of American Nazis protest the "despicable" Jew, a former American hostage says his mental scars will never heal, an 80-year-old man is felled and millions around the world are victims of poverty, hunger and despair?

"Israel's Quest" was often quoted in 1973 when a band of Arab terrorists wiped out 11 strong men in Olympic Village, Munich. They were 11 more martyrs whose blood soaked the pages of Israel's history.

BUT TERROR knows no boundaries. It is everywhere in the streets of cities and in nations. Terrorists are spurred to bold acts of violence by permissiveness and disregard.

It's not only up to world leaders to act decisively. It is up to every individual who cries out in protest against the tragic waste of human lives and erosion of human dignity.

Events of last week again shattered dreams of justice and visions of goodness and mercy.

On Monday, Southfield Mayor Donald Fracassi received a letter from the Security Services Action Group — a Westland and Dearborn Heights-based affiliate of the National Socialist Party of America better known as Nazis.

John Reich, leader of the group wrote that members will demonstrate against the May 10 Israel Independence Day parade in Southfield because "to allow the despicable Jew to steal the birthplace of the Palestinian people is a crime which should not go unpunished. Heil Hitler."

THE SS ACTION Group offered this quote, purportedly from Thomas Jefferson:

"There is great danger for the United States of America. This danger is the Jew. I warn you gentlemen, if you do not exclude the Jews forever, your children's children will curse you in their graves."

On that same Monday, Fracassi showed me a letter from his friend Ron Ravensbergen, a Wycliffe Bible translator in Bogota, Colombia. Bible translator Chet Bitterman was taken hostage Jan. 19 by a terrorist group called Coordinadora Nacional de Base of the M-19s, the letter said.

This happened when the band of heavily armed men and women broke into the Wycliffe Group House in Bogota, tied up the occupants, cut telephone lines and stole two-way radios, written records, mail and valuables.

On March 7, Bitterman's body was found in a hijacked bus wrapped in a red and black guerilla flag. "Let's pray expecting God to do great things and to bring ultimate good out of a situation originally intended for evil," Ravensbergen wrote.

On Monday, March 30, this nation was stunned and angered over the attempted assassination of President Ronald Reagan by a young, sandy-haired gunman waiting for him in a crowd outside a Washington hotel.

A radio in our office blasted the news that Reagan wasn't a victim of any of the six shots fired on that gray, rainy day. But we soon learned he was wounded by a .22 caliber bullet which missed his heart only by several inches.

WE COULDN'T help recalling the bleak November day when President John Kennedy was murdered. And with that dread feeling of *deja vu*, it was hard to believe favorable radio reports about Reagan's condition.

We shuddered when we heard affable White House press secretary James Brady was shot through the brain and his life was in danger. The hours of surgery on Reagan and Brady seemed interminable. Nobody got much work done that day.

John W. Hinckley Jr., accused of trying to kill the president, is reportedly a former militant member of a Nazi-affiliated group of the National Socialist Party of America.

A branch of that group plans to stage a protest against the Israel Independence Day Parade in Southfield in May. It's the same group that has popped up in Livonia, Plymouth, Westland and elsewhere in the metropolitan area.

At an awards ceremony I attended Tuesday night, former hostage Joseph Subic Jr. of Redford Township told us that Iranian terrorists held a gun to his head. He is under psychiatric treatment but claimed his mental scars will never fully heal.

AT THAT same dinner, Bishop Thomas Gumbleton talked about the destruction of human beings, violation of human dignity, ragged children with tiny heads, bloated stomachs, open sores and running eyes suffering the ravages of poverty, hunger and malnutrition, families eating the excrement of animals.

The hopelessness and suffering of these people in developing countries is the result of immoral political choices in America and man's inhumanity to man, Gumbleton said.

On Wednesday, 80-year-old Jacob Kofender of Livonia was struck down by an armed bandit at Northland Shopping Center when he refused to turn over his car keys. The divine within them stirred. They could not forever remain content with brutality. Slowly, falteringly, they groped toward a better way of life.

And so be it for all men.

SHIMMERING JEWELS FOR YOUR EASTER TABLE



Molded and jelled dishes are culinary delights. They bring shining color and flair to a holiday table, intriguing flavors, high spirits — and good nutrition.

Gelatin, an ingredient of most molded dishes, is an incomplete protein, usually enriched with meat, fish, eggs, nuts or milk in the recipe. Gelatin is one of the cook's most versatile ingredients, turning liquids into solids to produce molded foods and marshmallows, keeping delicate dishes in prime condition on the buffet, or used as a garnish, thickener or a texture smoother.

For Easter — even when ham, roast turkey or chicken may be your star — one or two lovely molded dishes make a charming addition to your table.

Take Molded Ham Jardiniere, for instance, a main dish ring-mold of ham, peas and pimientos, glistening jewel-like in a pale-potato and mayonnaise base, zippy and delicious for those who wish to eat lightly. Fill the center with tangy watercress or salad greens; for Easter use the greens as a nest for gaily colored Easter eggs.

Or you can offer an Easter-pink rice mold, Easter Glory Pudding, garnished with strawberries and kiwi fruit; or shimmering, individual vegetable salads which have been made ahead and molded in small plastic storage containers with seals, then safely stored in the refrigerator.

The best part about molded dishes is that they must be prepared ahead in order to set, so they can be done at your leisure. If you use plastic molds which have tight-fitting seals that prevent the gelatin from drying out and keep out odors, your refrigerated molds will stay fresh and bright until you're ready to serve them.

Rinse your molds well in cold water before filling them, advises the Tupperware Educational Services Department. Have your ingredients well drained and chilled. Unmold the dish onto a chilled plate which offers room for garnishes, or onto the chilled serving tray provided with some plastic molds. If necessary place a warm, damp cloth over the mold for a few seconds to help release it. And never freeze gelatin dishes, or use fresh pineapple as an ingredient (it prevents jelling).

MOLDED HAM JARDINIERE

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 chicken bouillon cube
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 tablespoons Dijon-style mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon dried dill weed
- Dash hot pepper sauce
- 2 cups coarsely chopped ham
- 1 cup diced cooked potato
- 1 cup cooked peas
- 3/4 cup thinly sliced cucumber, cut in quarters
- 1/2 cup diced pimiento
- Watercress
- Hard-cooked eggs, colored (optional)

In a large mixing bowl, soften gelatin in cold water. Let stand 1 minute. Dissolve bouillon cube in boiling water; add to gelatin mixture, stirring until gelatin is completely dissolved. With a wire whisk, blend in mayonnaise, vinegar, mustard, dill weed and hot pepper sauce. Chill until mixture is the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Meanwhile, combine ham, potato, peas, cucumber and pimiento; stir into gelatin mixture. Spoon into a 6-cup plastic Jel-Ring mold; seal. Chill until firm. Turn out onto serving platter. Fill center with watercress and hard-cooked eggs, if desired. YIELD: 10 to 12 servings.

EASTER GLORY PUDDING

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 2 cups milk
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup grenadine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
- Fresh strawberries, hulled (optional)
- Kiwi fruit, peeled and sliced (optional)

Soften gelatin in cold water. Let stand 1 minute. In medium saucepan, scald milk. Gradually stir some of the hot milk into the beaten eggs. Return egg mixture to saucepan, stirring constantly. Add sugar and softened gelatin; stir over low heat until mixture thickens slightly and coats a metal spoon. Remove from heat; stir in grenadine and vanilla. Chill until mixture is the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Fold in rice and whipped cream. Spoon into a 5-cup decorative plastic mold; seal. Chill until firm. Unmold on plastic serving tray; serve with strawberries and kiwi. YIELD: 6 servings.

SPRING JEWEL SALADS

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 2-3/4 cups boiling water
- 1/3 cup white wine vinegar
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 cup finely shredded cabbage
- 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup chopped scallions
- 1/2 cup shredded carrot
- Lettuce leaves

In a large mixing bowl combine gelatin, sugar and salt. Add boiling water; stir until gelatin is completely dissolved. Add vinegar and lemon juice. Chill until mixture is the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Fold in cabbage, mushrooms, scallions and carrot. Spoon into six 3/4 cup plastic containers with seals; seal. Chill until firm. Unmold onto lettuce leaves. Garnish with fresh vegetable pieces, if desired. YIELD: 6 servings.

TROPICAL LIME DESSERT

- 2 packages (3 ounces each) lime flavor gelatin, divided
- 2 cups boiling water, divided
- 1 teaspoon rum extract, optional
- 1 can (8 ounces) sliced pears, drained
- 1 can (11 ounces) mandarin orange sections
- 8 pecan halves
- 1/4 cup broken pecans
- 1 cup lemon or lime sherbet

In a medium mixing bowl dissolve one package lime gelatin in 1-1/2 cups boiling water. Add rum extract if desired. Pour gelatin into a 5-cup decorative plastic mold to measure 3/4 inch deep. Chill in refrigerator until almost firm. Arrange a pear slice in gelatin along every other ridge of the mold; arrange one pecan half between pear slices. Chill until almost firm. Meanwhile chill remaining gelatin until the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Cut remaining pear slices into chunks; fold pears, orange sections and broken pecans into partially firm gelatin. Spoon into mold. Chill until almost firm. In a medium mixing bowl, dissolve remaining package of lime gelatin in 1/2 cup boiling water. Stir in sherbet until dissolved. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Spoon into mold. Chill until firm. To serve, turn out onto mold's serving tray. YIELD: 8 to 10 servings.

Chinese astrological chart prompts party plan

"You are sensitive, creative."

That the context of these words is immediately recognizable is a testimony to the immense popularity of astrology in this country.

A fascination with astrology is not restricted to the United States. As we know from all the attention given recently to the advent of the Year of the Dragon, the Chinese have their own astrological system, one based on the year of birth, rather than the month and day.

Although not a believer, I recently found myself caught up in reading a Chinese astrological chart. There is, after all, a mystique about the wisdom of this ancient people. Their astrology might offer some crucial insights. The chart lists characteristics of those born in different years, compatible signs and signs to be avoided at all costs.

Even for a skeptic, this kind of thing is almost irresistible. It would be great fun at a party with a Chinese theme. The chart I was reading is available at Kitchen Stuff (330 Hamilton in Birmingham) and is only \$1.50.

It is printed on bright red, plastic-coated cardboard, much like the menu in a diner.

THE PLASTIC coating is a nice feature, protecting the chart from greasy fingers if the food being served is fried, as is the case with the recipes printed below. To keep the oil in the pot rather than in the food being fried, be sure that the oil is hot enough or it will be soaked into the food rather than forming a crispy crust.

It also helps to lift the food out of the oil with the proper utensil. Even a slotted spoon will take some oil with it, so that even food transferred to paper towels will be sitting in a pool of oil. Kitchen Stuff sells the proper utensil for this task. It resembles a stiff wire net attached to a long wooden handle. Because there is a smaller proportion of wire than holes, cooked food can be scooped out of the pan, leaving the oil behind.

The two recipes below are from "Cooking," a Cuisinart publication. As you might expect, they rely heavily on the use of a food processor. Anyone without a processor should, however, be able to adapt the recipes. When making the scallion bread, stir the wa-

ter into the flour and knead the dough by hand. This is basically what is being done with the steel blade — only much faster. Although I used a food processor to prepare the scallop balls, I believe that the step of pureeing the scallops and ginger could be done in a blender.

NO EXOTIC ingredients are needed for either dish (the scallops are exorbitant but not exotic). If you are not familiar with sesame oil, it has a distinctive, smoky taste. Used in moderation, it adds a fascinating, almost haunting flavor to foods. It is worth trying. I have also seen recipes for scallion bread which specify peanut or safflower oil, however, so feel free to substitute.

I also have read that scallion bread should be cooked just prior to serving or it will toughen. That toughness is not unlike that of a bagel, though — actually a pleasant chewiness. I can't vouch for the condition of scallion bread after sitting overnight because it didn't last that long. It's addictive!

The scallop balls also had an interesting, chewy texture, complemented by the crisp sesame coating. Served with a tangy tomato sauce, these were superb!

SCALLOP BALLS

- 1/2 lb. chilled fresh scallops
- 1 tsp. minced fresh ginger root, peeled
- 1 tsp. Chinese rice wine or pale dry sherry
- 1 tsp. coarse (Kosher) salt
- 1/2 tsp. white pepper
- 2 tsp. cornstarch
- 1 chilled egg white
- 3/4 cup untoasted white sesame seeds, approximate
- Oil for deep frying
- Sauce: 1 1/2 tbsp. white vinegar
- 2 tsp. sugar (optional)
- 1 tsp. soy sauce
- 1 tsp. catsup
- 1/4 cup hot water
- 1 tsp. vegetable oil
- 1/2 tsp. finely chopped garlic
- 1/4 tsp. minced fresh ginger root
- 1 tsp. cornstarch dissolved in 1 tbsp. cold water

Add the scallops and 1 tsp. minced ginger to the work bowl of a food processor fitted with the metal blade. Pro-

cess until the scallops are coarsely minced. Add the wine, salt, white pepper, cornstarch and egg white to the work bowl, and process until the scallop mixture is smooth. Remove to a small bowl.

Spread the sesame seeds on a plate. Using a tablespoon which has been dipped in ice water, measure out a heaping tablespoon of the scallop mixture. Moisten your hands in the ice water and roll the tablespoon of scallop mixture between your palms, forming a small ball. Roll the ball in the sesame seeds until fully coated.

Repeat this process with the remainder of the mixture. Chill the balls in the refrigerator.

Put a wok or deep pan over high heat, and add enough oil to deep-fry the scallop balls.

While the oil is heating, prepare the sauce. Combine the vinegar, sugar, soy sauce, catsup and hot water. Heat a small saucepan over high heat for 10 seconds, and add the 1 tablespoon of oil to the pan. Reduce the heat to medium, wait 10 seconds and add the garlic and ginger to the pan. Allow the garlic and ginger to sizzle in the oil for 1 minute and then add the combined liquids to the pan. Stir until the mixture is heated through. Turn off the heat and cover the pot tightly.

When the oil has a slight haze over its surface, remove the scallop balls from the refrigerator and try deep-frying one. The oil should be hot enough so that the ball rises to the surface of the oil within 7 seconds, but not so hot that the sesame seeds will pop.

When all the scallop balls have been fried, allow the oil to heat for another five minutes and then drop in all of the scallop balls at once to fry a second time. Fry for 1 to 2 minutes, or until the seeds brown and the balls swell. Remove them to paper towels to drain, and arrange them on a serving plate.

Quickly raise the heat under the

sauce to high. Stir the sauce once, stir the cornstarch mixture to recombine it and add it to the pan. Stir for a minute or so until the sauce thickens slightly and clears. Pour half of the sauce over the scallop balls. Pour the remaining half into a small bowl to serve on the side. Serve immediately.

Serve two or three per person as part of a Chinese meal, five if you are serving it as a main course. (adapted from "Cooking," January-February, 1979)

SCALLION BREADS

- 2 cups unbleached flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 2 1/2 tsp. coarse (Kosher) salt
- 2 1/2 tsp. oriental sesame oil
- Flour for rolling dough
- 3 heaping tbsp. thin-cut scallion rings, both green and white parts
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil, approximate

Combine 1 cup of the flour and the baking powder in the work bowl of a food processor fitted with the metal blade. With the machine running, slowly add the cold water through the feed tube in a thin stream, until the dough forms a ball around the blade. Let the machine run for an additional 10 seconds to knead the dough. Remove the cold dough from the work bowl and put aside.

Refit the work bowl with the metal blade, add the remaining cup of flour and 1 teaspoon salt to the work bowl, and proceed as above using the boiling water. Leave the hot dough in the work bowl.

Return the cold dough to the work bowl and process the two doughs together for 15 seconds. The dough should be soft and moist. If the dough is too sticky, add a bit more flour to the bowl and process until smooth.

Oil a glass or stainless steel bowl with 1 teaspoon sesame oil. Place the

dough in it, cover with plastic wrap or a damp towel, and let rest for 2 hours. Knead the dough for 3 to 4 minutes until smooth, flouring the board lightly only if necessary. With a sharp knife or cleaver, divide the dough into three even parts and form each part into a smooth ball.

On a lightly floured surface, roll out the first ball into a 7-inch circle. With your fingers, coat the top evenly with 1/2 teaspoon sesame oil. Next, sprinkle the top with 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 heaping tablespoon scallion rings, distributing them evenly over the surface with your fingers.

Roll the circle up into a cylinder and pinch the top and end seams shut. Pull the dough a bit to stretch it lengthwise as you hold it up from the board. Put it down on the board again and, using your fingers, roll the cylinder back and forth along the board. Pick the dough up once more to stretch it.

Put the dough back on the board again. Grasp one end of the cylinder with the thumb and forefinger of your right hand, and use your left hand to grasp the other end of the cylinder and wrap the dough around itself in a flat spiral. Tuck the outer end of the dough

under the spiral, and gently press the dough flat with your palm.

The dough will roll out more easily if it rests, so wait a few minutes. Flour the board lightly, and gently roll out the flattened spiral into a 6-inch circle. Don't worry if some of the scallions break through. Cover the finished flatbread with a dry cloth. Repeat this process for the remaining 2 balls of dough.

Heat a 9- or 10-inch skillet over high heat for 20 seconds. Add enough oil to evenly glaze the bottom. Let the oil heat for 2 minutes, and then reduce the heat to medium.

Cook the bread on one side until it is lightly browned and then turn over. Reduce the heat somewhat and brown the other side. Dry on paper towels.

Fry the remaining breads the same way, adding more oil if necessary.

Cut each bread into 6 wedges. Serve immediately.

Makes three 7-inch flatbreads.

Note: Scallion breads may be made by hand by kneading the cold and hot doughs separately and then combining them, kneading until smooth.

Here is perfect hot tea

Use a teapot, preheating it by rinsing it out with hot water, bring freshly drawn cold water to a full rolling boil, put one teaspoonful of tea or one teabag per cup of water (about five ounces) in the warmed teapot.

Pour the boiling water over the tea and let it stand for three to five minutes.

Remove teabags or strain before serving with milk (not cream) or slices of lemon and sugar, if desired.

'How to' movie gives lowdown on safecracking

Browse through a bookstore, check the best-seller lists, survey magazine contents and it's clear that people crave information (as opposed to ideas).

How to do it. That's what everyone wants to know. How to lose weight, grow mushrooms, beat inflation — you name it. What about "How to crack a safe" or "How to break into a vault"? If you're a layman seeking this kind of information, "Thief" is for you.

Scene after scene shows our anti-hero hard at work. Sparks from his torch fly through the midnight-blue shadows. Beautiful. Success. The vault is penetrated, its contents removed — hundreds of little white envelopes, each one filled with loose diamonds.

OF COURSE, you can't expect to learn everything from one movie. You do get a general idea of professional requirements, however.

You will have to be in good physical condition. You may not work regularly, but when you do, you must be capable of long hours of sustained labor under stressful conditions. Also, you should have some kind of combat training so you're prepared to protect your cache.

Finally, you're going to have to study electronics, industrial arts and metallurgy. Years of schooling and apprenticeship are involved.

James Caan, who plays Frank, the thief of this movie's title, got his education the hard way, 11 years in Joliet Prison. Still, he has something to show for it. He's a Ph.D. among thieves, a specialist who only goes after big scores in diamonds or cash.

His success proves his undoing. It's just so hard these days for the independent businessman. Develop a good track record and all those greedy outsiders take notice.

THE LOCAL POLICE muscle him because they want to make his operation a joint venture. The big crime-boss in the area is interested in a corporate takeover.

Frank throws in with Lee (Robert Prosky), the organized crime figure for a few big jobs, but once in, he finds he can't get out. In Frank's case, it's not stock options or pension plans that keeps him locked in. It's a baby.

Frank's wife (Tuesday Weld) couldn't have children. The couple went to an adoption agency, but the social worker frowned on Frank's prison record. Leo, however, saw a prison record as an asset, not a liability, and with his connections, he was able to get a lovely little baby for "straight-arrow, true-blue" Frank.

The charade ends when Frank wants to quit, and he finds that the mob owns him and his family. Leo tells him so in the movie's harshest, most riveting speech.

ROBERT PROSKY is wonderfully menacing as Leo, whose grandfatherly smile quickly turns into the set features of a vicious criminal. Tuesday Weld starts out in what appears to be a promising part that just never develops.

Willie Nelson is around for even less time. He makes a cameo appearance as an old prison inmate who befriended Frank.

James Caan is capable as Frank and manages to win some sympathy for the character. Michael Mann, who wrote and directed "Thief," has put together a well-paced, handsomely photographed movie. Now, if only he had something to say.





THE SUPER Book Bowl was started last November during Children's Book Week.

The volunteers help prepare and serve refreshments for celebrations. They participate in puppet presentations, they compose original music and direct their young performers.

Their involvement makes possible many extra efforts which could not be undertaken otherwise.

Blos notes new trends in books for children

Joan Blos opened her Children's Literature Series last Monday with a historical overview of children's literature from a humanistic approach. The award-winning children's novelist spoke to 50 persons — parents, librarians and educators — in Dunning Hough Library on Main Street, Plymouth.

"Children's literature is undervalued and under-recognized, but has much to offer parents and educators as a means of communicating. Children's literature doesn't just exist out there. It is as necessary as any other art form and is related to the period and the people who produced it," said Mrs. Blos.

She dispelled the common 18th-century myth that those who write for children "are not clever enough to write for adults."

During her presentation, she traced the development of works written specifically for children from mid-18th century to the present. She emphasized the changing attitude toward the children in the books. Earlier works were highly moralistic while current fiction is permissive, more frank, and deals with contemporary problems in society.

SHE STRESSED the fact that even though styles have changed, themes have stayed the same. They are basic to all human growth and development. To illustrate this point, she read several excerpts from representative selections.

Responding to questions about the radical frankness and self-absorption represented by much of contemporary children's fiction, Mrs. Blos said, "In examining current books, I find the characters are beginning to care more about others, and there seems to be an end to the intense preoccupation with self and self-awareness."

Her talk was witty and articulate. She did, however, admit to the bad habit of looking at the last page of each book before she reads or reviews it.

Joan Blos will continue the Children's Literature Series at the library at 7:30 p.m. this evening. The third segment will be at 7:30 Monday, April 16. Each segment is a complete unit and tickets may be purchased at the door for \$6.25.

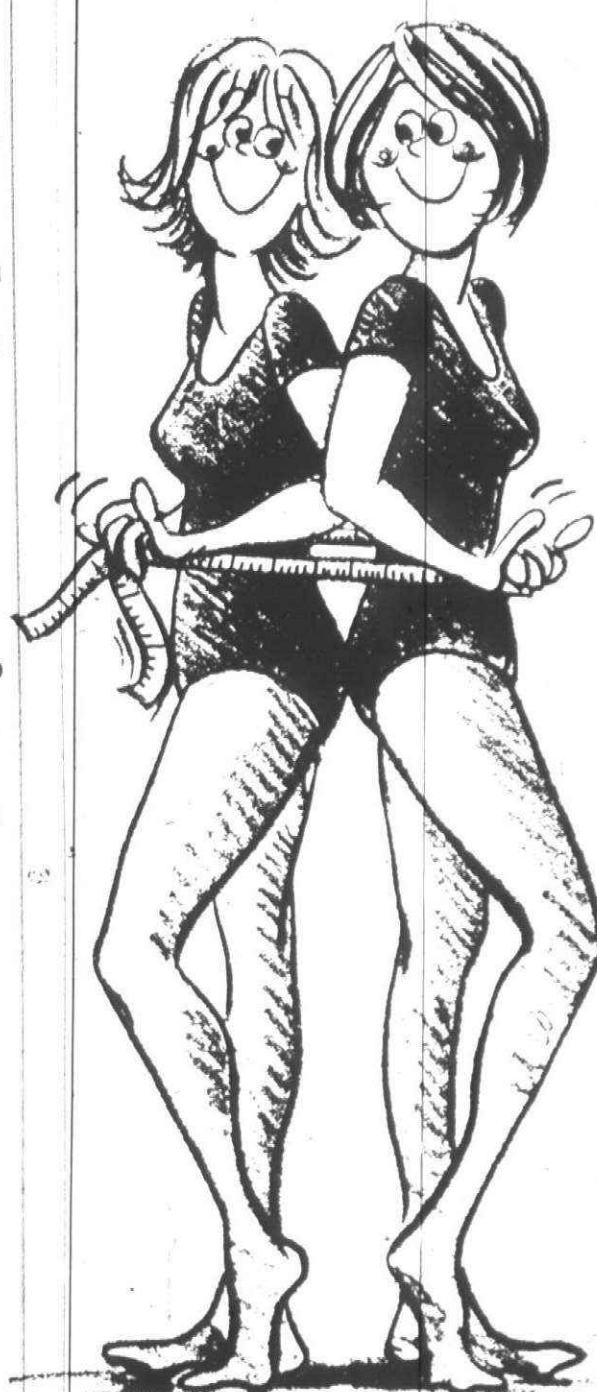

Pitching staff an uncertainty

Chiefs set sights on opener

Fred Crissey was storming around the field in his general-like manner. His varsity and reserve teams were playing an intra-squad game on a sunny Thursday afternoon.

The Plymouth Canton baseball coach was standing in the third base coaching box. He was then out on the mound, giving advice. He followed by huddling around a group of players, explaining what had happened with a hard hit ball to the third baseman.

Constant chatter spewed from wherever he might be. The season was only a week away, and Crissey had a lot to talk about before Saturday's opener.

"I think defensively we'll play real well," he said. "I think we'll be competitive, but we don't have a dominant pitcher."

"We'll hit the ball and make contact. Pitching is the key."

Canton is coming off an injury-riddled 16-10 season. The Chiefs didn't win the Western Six and did get out of their district tournament. Their regular starting lineup was together only six games.

The Chiefs will miss pitcher Al Lipinski, who won seven games during his senior year. He's at Washtenaw Community College now.

Pitching is the question mark. Danny Smith is the top returnee. He won four games last year as a sophomore. The junior righthander is joined by senior Dave Malek. Juniors Jamie Chilcoff and Billy Hanis will see action on the hill.

HANIS will be the team's catcher, and Crissey is excited about his progress.

"He's going to be outstanding," said the Canton coach. "He hasn't been a

catcher long, but he's got as much ability as the catchers we've had here in the past.

If Hanis pitches, Mike Wall, a junior, will do the catching.

The first base spot was all set until Jeff Sternberger broke his arm during an indoor workout.

He could be out as many as eight games. His bat will be sorely needed when the league games begin. He hit four homers last year and batted .344. The 6-foot-3 senior "outgrew" his third base position, according to Crissey, making it necessary to put him at first.

Malek, a fine defensive player, will play there until Sternberger comes back. Junior Mike Fifer is in reserve. Junior Fred Rumberger takes over at third as part of Crissey's reshuffling.

Behind Rumberger at third is another junior, Al Blascak.

Speedy senior Steve Schumacher takes over for Lipinski at shortstop. He played second base last year as a starter.

"That is key," said the Canton coach. "Steve is as good of glove as we've had. He hit real well for us last summer."

Battling for the second base job is Paul Dobry, the team's all-purpose player. Juniors Scott Bricker and Brian Chessman are also in contention.

THE OUTFIELD appears set with senior Shawn Hopper in left, Keith Stone in center and junior Steve Johnson in right.

Stone is coming off a banner junior year. He hit over .300 and was a first-team all-Western Six League choice.

"Keith has lettered three years for us," said Crissey. "He'll be our lead-off man. He sprays the ball around and makes the most of his ability."

Outfielders in reserve include Smith, Tom Wennerberg and Jeff Cousino, all juniors.

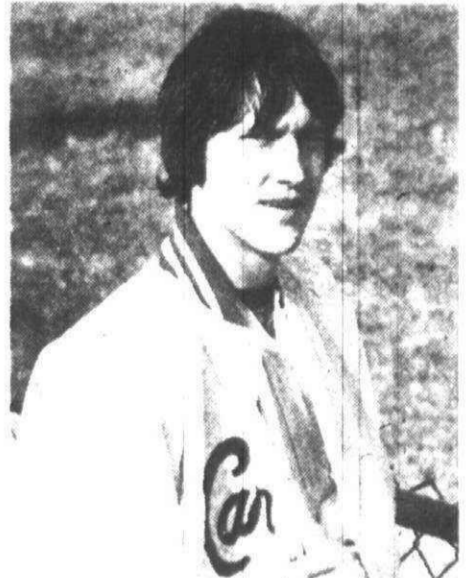

Tryouts set for cage classic

"THIS IS something new that we thought we should try out," said Sid Fox, a member of the Michigan AAU and the American Basketball Association (ABA).

"We want to give those players a chance who might otherwise have been overlooked in the selection process. We thought this might be a good idea because we've been criticized in the past. I don't have any idea what the turnout will be. We might have 500 kids show up." The preliminary game will be held at 5:30 p.m. followed by the Michigan-Quebec game at 8 p.m. Saturday, May 30.

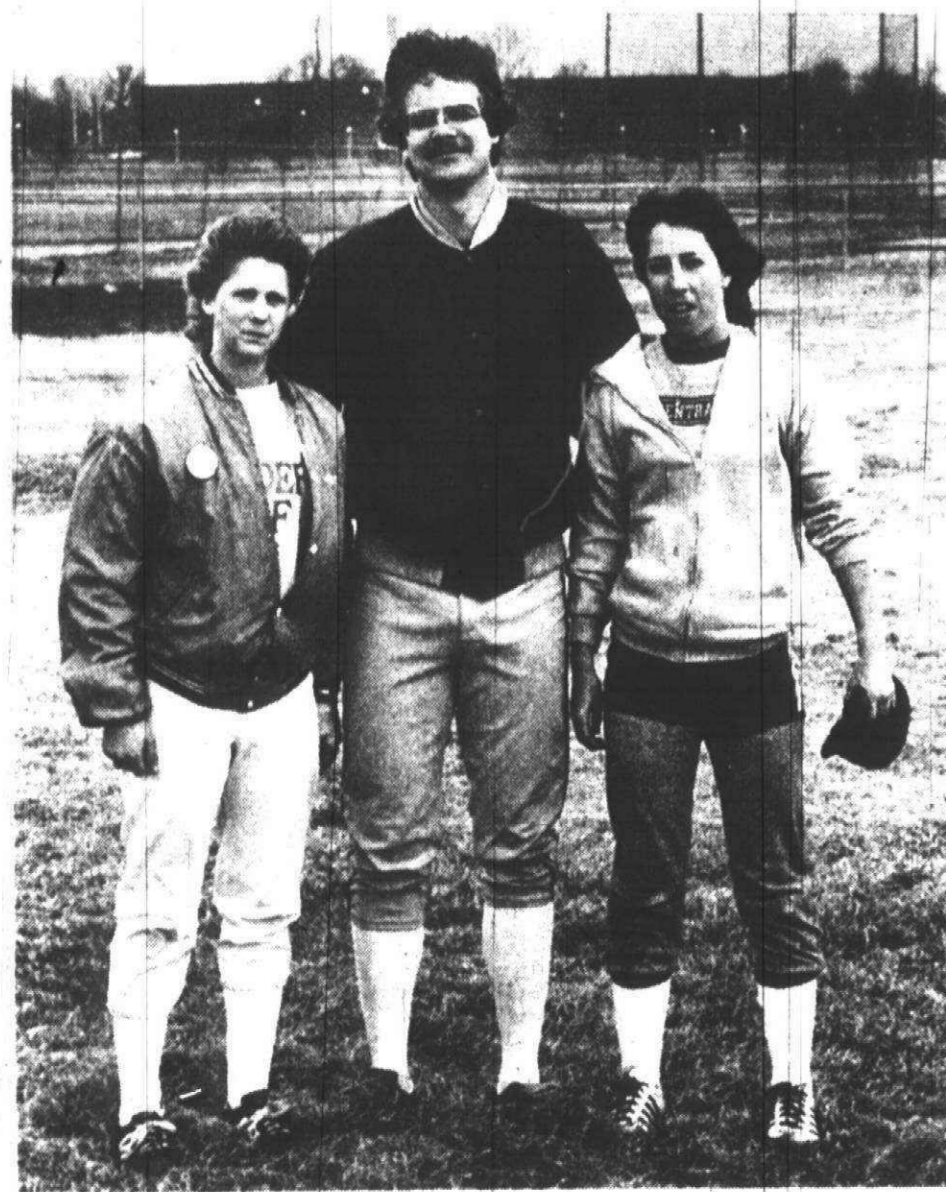
On Sunday, game times are 1 and 3 p.m.

"Bob's throw was a great one for this time of the year," said Balconi. "He had a good day."

Salem competitors gaining second-place finishes included Scott Rayer, high jump, 5-10; Tanski, shot put, 40-7; Bublin, long jump, 19-6; Mike Perkowski, pole vault, 11-6; and Schafer, 330 low hurdles, 42.1.

GAINING third-place spots for the Rocks were: Scott Fuller, high jump, 5-10; Lewandowski, 220 dash, 24.34;

Frank Brosnan, two-mile run, 10:51.0; and Arvinder Sooch, 330 low hurdles, 44.12.

Salem was shut out in the 880 and mile run events. The Rocks also settled for second place in the 440 and 880 relays.

"It looks like we got slammed in the distance races," said the Salem coach, "but I was pleased our times were better. I still remain optimistic. I know we'll improve."

If it's any consolation for the Westland Sparks, they defeated the Chicago





Palmer commits to event

Whether he is with or without his Penzoil, Arnold Palmer will be in Bloomfield Hills with his golf clubs this summer.

According to his agent, Palmer will be a contestant in the U.S. Senior Open at Oakland Hills Country Club July 9-12.

Sam Snead, Art Wall Jr., Charlie Sifford, Doug Ford and Jack Fleck are among 90 other seniors already entered, according to a spokesman for the United States Golf Association (USGA).

Doc Giffin, Palmer's agent, said the Senior Open "has been on Arnie's calendar since the first of the year. He sent his entry form into the USGA about 10 days ago.

"It's a first-rate event at an outstanding golf course, Palmer thinks highly of Oakland Hills," Giffin said.

"Anything the USGA sponsors is going to draw top rankings," he continued. "I'd have been very surprised if Arnie didn't enter, and I think other exempt players (who don't have to qualify) would be fools



to pass it up."

Palmer will be packing for both the Senior Open and a sentimental sojourn, his agent said.

"Palmer has a soft spot in his heart for Detroit," he said. "In 1954, he won the U.S. Amateur at the Country Club of Detroit. That was the springboard to his pro golf career. He turned pro shortly thereafter in '55.

"He finished second in the Carling World Championship at Oakland Hills in 1964, a PGA tour event, and gained so much respect for the 16th hole that he entered it in a TV show that involved what he considered the best 18 holes he'd ever played.

"He also has a major business interest in Detroit. For the better part of the last decade, he's had a contractual agreement with Cadillac, and he has a lot of friends from there. For those reasons alone, I'm sure he wanted to come."

There are others, though. "PALMER BELIEVES there's a place for senior competition," said Giffin, "because it provides a playing arena for the famous players of the immediate past.

"He and his contemporaries still play well enough that the public wants to see them. These guys are big names from the past, and unlike other athletes, golfers are still quite

competent in their 50s."

Palmer, who says "the mystery still remains, but I haven't stopped thinking that I can win," has seen positive thinking work.

Last year, he realized his first wins of any kind since '75. The 5-foot-11, 178-pound Pennsylvania native captured both the Canadian PGA title (not a seniors' event) in Edmonton, Alberta, and the PGA Seniors' Tournament at Turnberry Isle in North Miami.

He finished second to Gene Littler in the World Seniors' Invitational in Charlotte, N.C. and took third with teammate Dow Finsterwald in The Legends of Golf, a senior event played in Austin, Tex.

PALMER WAS PLEASED when the USGA lowered the qualifying age to 50 from 55 (for this year's tour), Giffin said. "It made quality players like Miller Barber, Gene Littler, Billy Casper and Ken Venturi eligible to play in this tournament.

"Past senior tournaments haven't been true tests for one reason or another. This year, for the first time, senior golf will have a real test," added Giffin.

Churchill runners strong once again

Livonia Churchill has won nine Western Six League boys' track titles in succession and if coach Fred Price and his Chargers have their way, it will be 10 in a row come May.

Churchill always throws quality and quantity at opponents. This season is no exception. One hundred twenty prospects including 35 freshman and 40 sophomores reported for practice.

"This looks to be another exciting season," Price said. "With the weather and turnout, it's been a very good start. I'm very pleased with what's happening."

Churchill has experienced people back in every event except pole vault and that has traditionally been a problem area.

Sam Khoury and Dave Luch will throw the shot and Bob Davis will hurl the discus.

Jeff Olweean is expected to come through in the 120-yard hurdles, the long jump and high jump. Brian Luelan is trying to pick up the slack in pole vault.

On the track side, Norm Recla, defending league champ in the 100-yard dash, returns. Other sprinters on whom Price said he will be counting are Steve Tracy, John Bielis, Fred Peters and Tom Pritt.

Pritt has been below par with a muscle pull. Distance runners include Mike

Blaies, Mark Blais, Jim Brodie and Jim Patterson.

Bill Dobson should help out in the 880.

STEVENSON

Livonia Stevenson climbed high on the ladder of success last season, but will have to start over at the very bottom this year after suffering heavy graduation losses.

"We going to be very, very young," said Tom Bills, coach of the Spartans. "I can't set the goals with the young kids that I did with the seniors last year."

Nineteen eighty was good to the Spartans. They won the Observerland and Elks Relays and placed second at the Stevenson Invitational and in their regional.

The fortunes of the Spartans may hinge a great deal on how six seniors perform.

Kevin Spala is a sprinter, Larry Gjernes, a distance runner, Tim Granta, 880; Gary Biermann, sprinter/pole vaulter; Larry Millen, pole vaulter/hurdler; and Dave Steinberg, hurdler.

Your habits, maintenance determine car's mileage

The driver controls the prime factors that determine how much gasoline he uses. A well-tuned, properly maintained car will deliver the maximum mileage of which it's capable. The easiest and best way to make sure a car is mechanically able to give its owner the best possible mileage is to follow the recommended maintenance schedule in the car's owner manual.

- Spark plugs should be clean, properly gapped and firing efficiently. Plugs that misfire only 2 percent of the time — a rate that most drivers don't notice — can harm fuel economy.
- The carburetor should be adjusted to manufacturer's specifications. A dirty or faulty carburetor or a sticking automatic choke wastes gasoline and contributes to air pollution.
- Tires that are underinflated increase rolling resistance. This requires more fuel to move the car.
- The air cleaner should be clean and checked frequently, especially if you drive dusty roads. A dirty air cleaner restricts the flow of air to the carburetor and causes the engine to run on a higher-than-normal ratio of fuel to air.
- The thermostat in the cooling system should be functioning properly. A faulty or improper thermostat can waste gasoline by prolonging engine warmup in cold weather.

on the amount of fuel you use. Usually, it's a simple matter of consciously thinking "fuel economy" when you drive.

- Slow down. Don't drive much faster than the bottom of each gear range.
- Avoid long periods of idling, such as waiting in a drive-in line. If you're in for a long wait at a train crossing or are waiting for a passenger, turn off the engine — when you're idling, you're getting zero miles per gallon.
- Look ahead and anticipate signal changes. Slow down to make the green rather than stop for a red light.
- Try to avoid streets with lots of traffic lights and/or stop signs.
- Avoid jack-rabbit starts. They're murder on gasoline mileage.
- Maintain an even speed, especially on freeways.
- Coast to a stop whenever possible. Sudden stops waste gasoline.
- Be sure the parking brake is fully released before pulling away.
- Don't ride the brake or clutch pedal or pump the accelerator pedal.
- Cut under the load. Store golf clubs or camping gear at home, not in the trunk of your car.
- Organize your trips. Chances are, you can make one trip and do the things that usually take two.

Once your car is tuned and properly maintained, how you drive probably has the greatest influence
