## Resident rejects group home lease

A Canton homeowner — bowing to neighbors' wishes — is dropping plans to lease his house for use as a group home for six retarded adults.

S.K. Gupta has taken his house on Somerset Square out of consideration for a foster-care home.

Gupta said he sent a letter dated Nov. 12 to the Northville Residential Training Center (NRTC). The residents of the group home would have been placed through NRTC.

"I have sent a letter telling (Northville) that I don't want (to lease the house)," said Gupta, an engineer. "It isn't a good idea to have that controversy."

NRTC officials had planned a meeting from 7-9 p.m. Nov. 18 in Canton Township Hall to answer questions about the proposed group home. That meeting has been cancelled because of the withdrawal, said Laima Starwas, director of community placement at NRTC.

**GUPTA** said his four-bedroom colonial house has been for sale about three months. He said he answered a newspaper ad seeking houses for lease as group homes.

Ms. Starwas said no lease had been negotiated with Gupta. No application for a license had been filed with the state Department of Social Services (DSS).

The opening date for the home was to be April or May 1982, according to Ms. Starwas.

Neighbors became upset when flyers were distributed last week announcing the meeting. Gupta told the Observer NRTC officials "deceived" him because he wasn't notified in advance about the meeting.

Ms. Starwas said any failure to notify Gupta was a misunderstanding — a "miscommunication."

Gupta requested a meeting late last week with neighbors and showed them a copy of his letter to NRTC. About 10 persons attended that session.

**JAMES KARR**, of Yorkshire, said neighbors were concerned about the impact of a group home on potential real estate sales. Others felt group-home workers don't get enough training.

Another neighbor told the Observer he was worried about "the safety of the kids" in the area.

Karr said Gupta has been cooperative. He added that the homeowners' group should set guidelines requiring permission from the association before leasing a house for a group home.

Ms. Starwas said she was sorry the Somerset Square incident resulted in "pressure" on Gupta. She said her plans had included holding meetings with the homeowners' association.

A meeting in late October at Township Hall about a proposed group home on Copeland Circle caused no controversy, she added. The NRTC officials also had worked through a homeowners' group, she added.

In the meantime, lawsuits filed by Canton Township and Forest Trails Subdivision challenging group homes in subdivisions are pending.

## Firemen approve contract

Canton firefighters overwhelmingly approved a new contract — which will expire in about seven months.

Firefighters voted 24-3 Wednesday to accept a new, 1½-year contract, which will expire in June 1982, when the police union contract also ends.

The previous, three-year firefighters' contract expired in December 1980. The township obtained an agreement from the firefighters to change its expiration date because of the possibility of police and firefighting duties being consolidated into a public safety department.

The township has been exploring consolidation plans.

**UNDER THE** new contract, firefighters will receive slightly more than 8 percent wage increase for 1981 (retroactive to Jan. 1) and 4 percent for the first six months of 1982.

A firefighter with four years' seniority will earn a base salary of \$21,989, said Personnel Director Dan Durack. That compares to \$20,550 under the old contract.

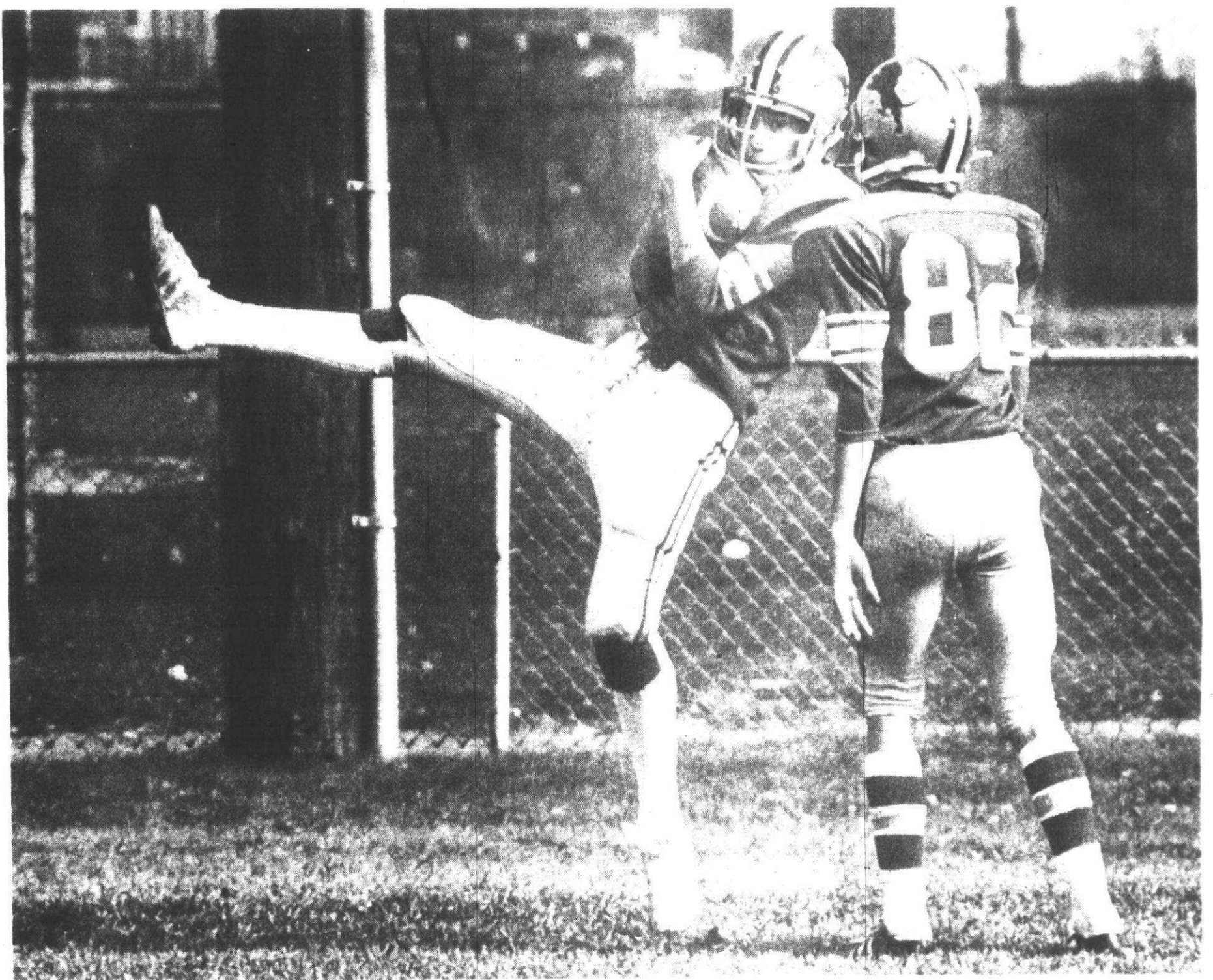
"The money isn't the greatest," said Harry Harrison, secretary-treasurer of the union. "But the Canton Fire Department was at the bottom of the list if you compare with communities around here. Hopefully, in June we will make it up."

Harrison said the new contract doesn't address the issue of firefighters' opposition, which he says most firefighters oppose.

The contract also includes increases in food and clothing allowances, and a lump-sum holiday pay benefit, said Durack.

One new benefit will be a \$300 annu-

## Teacher's 10-year appeal nears decision

After almost 10 years of litigation and hearings, the case of Jack Marts' firing for incompetence from the Plymouth-Canton Schools will return to the State Teacher Tenure Commission.

Meanwhile, the amount of back pay Marts could be awarded has reached the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Michigan's State Supreme Court sent the case back to the commission in a decision handed down earlier this month.

"I was fired back in 1971 after my case spent seven to nine months before the school board,"

said Marts, who now owns the Children's Farm and Riding School on Denton Road in Canton.

From the school board, the special education teacher's case was appealed to the tenure commission and then was appealed to circuit court.

Appealing the circuit court decision, the case went to the State Court of Appeals and then to the State Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court has sent the case back to the commission for findings of fact and conclusions of law.

"In essence, the burden of proof has been placed on the school district with this decision," said Daniel Hoekenga, Marts' lawyer.

Originally, Marts had the burden of proof, now the court has placed the burden of presenting facts on the school district, Hoekenga said.

"I think they have a terrible case, since there aren't any facts to find," said Hoekenga, whose fees are being paid by the Michigan Education Association.

"One of the questions of the commission will be the prejudice of the board," he said.

**SERVING ON THE** board at that time was Gary Mirto, who said the board was prejudiced in its decision proceedings.

"They had lived with this guy for a couple of

years and didn't like him, so they put together this shakey case and pulled the trigger," Mirto said.

"In my own mind, I didn't feel the case was substantiated enough to warrant termination. The punishment should fit the crime. In a labor case, termination is like capital punishment.

"There was differing testimony, lots of hearsay and foggy memories in the record," said Mirto, who wrote a dissenting opinion.

"The basis of my opinion was this: I didn't feel the board was competent in making a determination.

## Landfill lawsuit delayed

A scheduled hearing in Wayne County Circuit Court on a controversial landfill expansion in Canton Township has been delayed for three weeks.

The hearing, scheduled before Judge Charles Farmer, was moved from Nov. 13 to Dec. 4 to give attorneys more time to gather information.

Michigan Waste Systems, which operates a 97-acre Woodland Meadows North landfill in southeastern Canton, filed a lawsuit Oct. 30. Three days earlier, the Township Board had denied a request to expand the existing landfill by 105 acres. The board cited several violations of local landfill ordinances.

Woodland Meadows is bounded by Hannan, Lotz and Van Born roads, and the Conrail railroad right-of-way.

"I THINK everybody felt it would be a very good idea to give it more time, because we did move very fast (in filing the lawsuit)," said Lansing attorney Daniel Cooper, who represents Michigan Waste Systems.

Michigan Waste Systems recently received approval from the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) on its application for a permit to accept solid waste on the expanded site. An application for hazardous waste management is under investigation.

The landfill operators contend the DNR approval has higher authority than any local regulations. Michigan Waste expressed a desire to begin construction before the ground freezes.

"We feel this is strictly a state matter," said Cooper.

**THERE IS** a possibility that the Dec. 4 hearing also may be rescheduled.

Bert Burgoyne, an attorney representing the township, said last week's adjournment was prompted by an extremely crowded court docket on Fridays.

"The real point of the whole thing is Friday that Friday in Wayne County Circuit Court is a zoo," said Burgoyne.

"They (Michigan Waste Systems) have a very complicated position," added Burgoyne. "We (the township) have gone through our permit process. We aren't in any hurry to have the case heard. I don't worry about it."

# Cops study future computer systems

Police departments, like any business or profession, in order to improve their efficiency need modern technology.

In this era of the computers, more and more law enforcement agencies have adopted the computer to speed and simplify their work.

In the Detroit area, police departments have turned to the computer to file information on crimes, suspects, arrests, and a wide variety of other categories.

An example of the interest in computers by law enforcement agencies, was seen recently when 25 officers from 13 area police departments attended a computer seminar in Garden City's Maplewood Community Center.

Representatives from a computer firm in Milwaukee, along with Al Pearson from the International Association of Chiefs of Police, provided the officers on hand with information on what computers can do for them.

The prices range from \$10,000-\$12,000 for a small unit to \$50,000-\$60,000 for a larger unit that would be shared with other city departments.

AMONG THOSE attending the seminar were Garden City Police Chief Charles Wilmoth, who acted as host along with Capt. Richard Lawson and several other members of his department; Police Chief Michael Manooq of Redford; Chief William Relich of Westland; Insp. Thomas Godwin of Farmington Hills, and Sgt. Alex Wilson and Gerald Niezgod of Canton Township.

Also represented were officers from Warren, Dearborn Heights, Riverview, Oak Park and East Detroit.

The Canton Township police department has recently installed one of the sophisticated computer systems, a

Police Operations Support Systems Elementary, known as POSSE, which was one of the computer systems explained at the seminar.

The Canton Township Board earlier this year had voted to spend \$69,000 in federal revenue-sharing money to buy the equipment.

THE INTERNATIONAL Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), has been involved in the development of the computer systems that allow law enforcement agencies to improve their management and operations.

The IACP has provided police agencies with support in analysis of management and operational programs.

The IACP recognized that law enforcement agencies involved in the installation and operation of computer systems occasionally need help. To provide this help, the IACP has made its resources available either to its staff, outside consultants or cooperating computer firms.

Under the system, a police department seeking information on a type of crime, or the manner in which they were committed in other parts of the country, can contact the IACP, get their programmed information and use it.

A computer comes with a terminal, about the size of a 12-inch television screen, as well as a printer. Using these, a police department can store any type information it wants to and display it on the screen without having to go through draws of files. That information also may be printed.

WITH THE POSSE system, a police department can select the category of greatest benefit to them and have it on file. It can add components to the computer, rather than buy a whole new system.

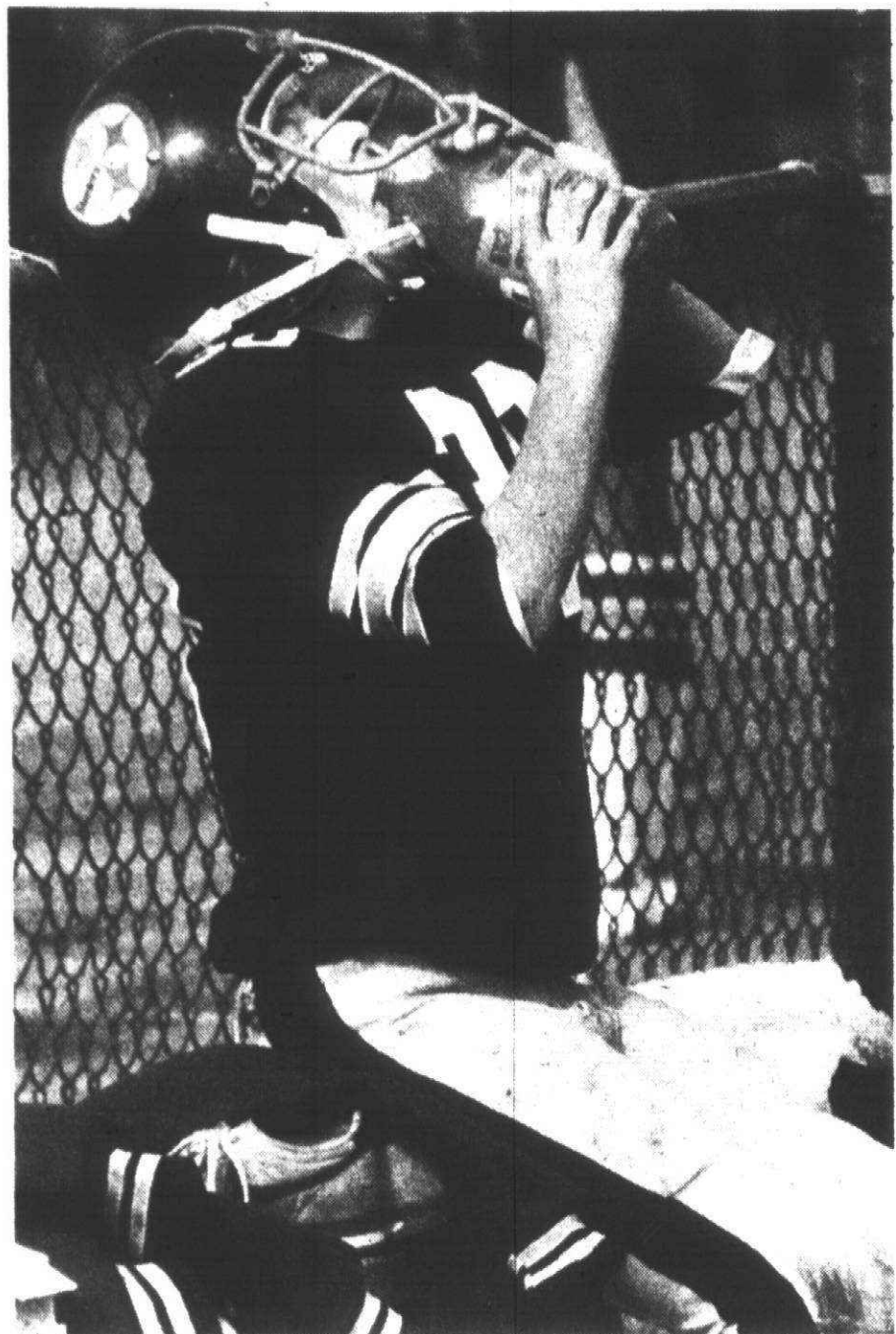

# Teacher's decade lawsuit nears end

"Here we are presiding over a man's career, acting in a quasi-judicial manner, and the board members weren't even paying attention. They were involved doing other things," Mirto said.

"I don't think it's a fair system anyway. The board is too close and put in a compromising situation with the administrative staff bringing the charges,"

"Having the superintendent in the board deliberations is like having the prosecuting attorney in with the jury."

**DURING THE** board's deliberations, there were lots of defaming and prejudiced statements being made instead of looking at the facts, Mirto said.

"One board member said to me, 'Gary, you know Marts is guilty.' I told

him I didn't know. He said, 'My God, there are plenty of stories in the district about him. There are lots of teachers who can't stand him.' This thing was rigged," Mirto said.

Mirto asked another board member if he was going to read the transcripts of the hearings before making a decision.

"He told me, 'I already know the guy is guilty. I don't need to read the transcripts.'"

Former board member Carl Berry said he sat in on every hearing and was satisfied with the proceedings.

"I feel Marts got a fair shake through the hearings," Berry said.

While refusing to comment on the case until it is finally decided, past board member Marda Benson said it is

interesting the case is being sent back to the tenure commission.

"I think the hearings were very fair and Marts was given his due process," said John Hoben, superintendent of schools.

**ALTHOUGH MARTS** claims there were half-truths and innuendo used against him, he said the real bother is the money being paid for school lawyers.

"The thing that is kinda bad is the amount of money it's costing the district for the attorneys."

"They're spending my money and everyone else's money on the attorney fees."

Hoben isn't sure how much the district has spent in legal fees for the

Marts case, but he imagines it is sizable, he said.

The board is the trustee of the people's schools, children and money, but in this case he put it in jeopardy, Mirto said.

"I told them from the minute the hearing started the meter was running," Mirto said.

"If the board loses this thing, I got to believe Marts is going to come at them for punitive damages on top of the back pay. You're looking at getting really socked here," Mirto said.

The schools would likely appeal any decision ab against the district, Hoben said.

"If there was a turn-around on it, I am sure we would son continue to pursue it."

**THE FIRE DEPARTMENT** has 29 firefighters, with one position unfilled. Prior to ratification, some firefighters had expressed concerns about minimum manning and the rate of pay when firefighters work in a higher classification.

The Township Board approved the new contract about two weeks ago.

**DENTAL EROSION**

Dental erosion is a peculiar disease that affects the teeth of some people. It begins on the outer surface of the tooth and causes the tooth substance to disappear. Erosion can affect any tooth and can be confined to one tooth or to a series of teeth. The surface most frequently involved are the cheek and lip sides near the gum line.

The disease usually goes unnoticed until the enamel is penetrated and the eroding process invades the underlying dentin. The involved teeth may become very sensitive to hot or cold food and drink and the eroded surface may be painful, even to the touch of a toothbrush.

The cause of dental erosion is not understood and is typically a human disease; it is not found in animals. However, it is likely that it is caused by a chemical action combined with friction. Contact with concentrated acid substances, such as undiluted lemon juice, may play some part in the erosive process. It is estimated that dental erosion affects from one to ten percent of our population. It can be diagnosed and treated. Another good reason for regular dental examinations.





# Police mistakes may lead to false generalizations

I can recall being a teen-age night person in Detroit and as such having the car I was in stopped by police. In those days such niceties as "probable cause" to stop a car didn't exist.

As often as not, the Big 4 — three plainclothes cops and a uniformed driver — roared up in a big black 4-door Buick, ordered us out of our car and threw everything, including the car seats, out on the grass next to the curb.

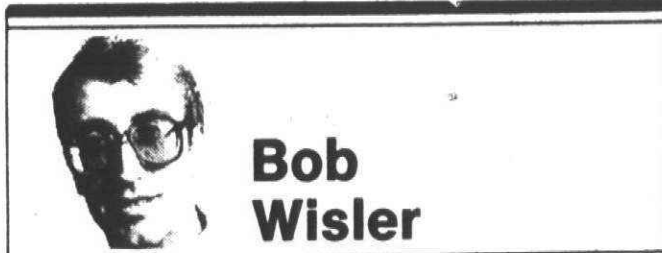
When they didn't find anything worth grilling us about, the cigar-chomping leader would warn us "punks" to be off the street within 15 minutes and the crew would go roaring off leaving us to repack the car with seats, spare tire, etc.

We accepted as a fact of life that cops were all-powerful and therefore had every right to order us around like stray dogs in need of discipline.

Times have changed. The right of police to dispense "street justice" came first under suspicion, then under attack. Too many mistakes were made.

A new era emerged. The conservatives say the pendulum has swung too far the other way — the defendants now have all the rights, the police are handcuffed, the courts have to bend over backwards for the defendants.

PROBABLY NOT, and even with all the rights that

are being debated, mistakes are still being made. The Prior case in Troy is one example. The case in Detroit where a family was awarded \$1.7 million because Detroit police shot an unarmed man who did not respond "properly" to officers' orders is another. There are many smaller mistakes that don't get the ink in the newspapers or time on the nightly newscasts.

It might be tempting to generalize and say that it is because police officers, by the nature of their job, become insulated from contact with others. They work, worry, plan, play, celebrate and commiserate with other police officers and not others of the general population.

They almost invariably deal with the most troubled segment of society and with people in times of torment and turmoil. It might be natural that they

would come to feel superior to those they deal with and even with the citizens they are hired to protect and work for.

AFTER ALL, are they not called on to deal with the bleakest, most dismal aspects of a society — the thieves, rapists, cheats, burglars, con artists; the worse family arguments; the drunks and the drunk and angry drivers; the screwballs?

And for what? Before arbitration, they had to fight and threaten strikes for every pay raise, they are hardly ever publicly praised, they are as often as not remembered as the guy who issued the ticket, or intervened where he had no business.

And from this feeling of isolation diffused only by relationships with the kindred souls of fellow police officers, might come the shared attitude that cops are always right, that whatever mistakes they make are somehow justified.

But this would be a generalization for only a segment and would not take into account the great majority of officers who manage to overcome and rise above the aspects of their work which tend to make policemen suspicious, haughty and aloof. The vast majority have outstanding character traits and are fair, sensible and stable contributors to society and our understanding of society.

THE MISTAKES are infrequent despite the current spate of court cases and publicity and they usually happen in departments which are controlled by command officers who insist that police officers who are in the trenches fighting crime are answerable only to other police officers and not to civilians in control of government.

When the civilians supposedly in charge abdicate their responsibility to provide leadership, direction and an insistence on proper training and behavior, then the mistakes will happen. When the leaders do not insist that the department weed out the bad apples whose unsatisfactory character traits somehow escape the scrutiny of the hiring and training process, then mistakes will happen. When a police department becomes more powerful than the government it is responsible to, mistakes will happen.

Although, it certainly isn't worth a life, the Prior case forced those in charge of police departments to think about what their departments are doing. Out of it should come some greater sense of what a department's goals should be in terms of service, training, control and methods of dealing with problems.

There is evidence already that some local governments are working to reassert control and that some departments are reevaluating their methods to avoid mistakes in the future. They should be complimented by their citizens.

# From junior to community colleges

My first recollection of a community college was riding the Third Avenue bus to downtown Detroit as a kid. The route went past Highland Park Community College. That's my only recollection. To this day, I have never had occasion to set foot on the HPJC campus.

My second brush with such an institution came when I was the education reporter for the Kalamazoo Gazette in the early '60s. Kalamazoo was considering establishing a community college. I did a story on Kalamazoo County kids who were attending Kellogg Community College next door in Battle Creek.

I remember two things about that story. One was how everything in Battle Creek is named "Kellogg," just as everything in Detroit and Dearborn is named "Ford."

The other is that the males attending Kellogg CC were doing so to avoid the draft and Vietnam and also because their high school grades weren't good enough to get them into Western Michigan University. They said so, in so many words. Having once donned military garb, I didn't have much use for kids at community colleges.

COMMUNITY COLLEGES have come a long way since then, and I am delighted to say my opinion of them has been revised — upwards. It comes from covering Schoolcraft and Oakland community colleges.

What jogged my memory was a communique from Dave Heinzman, PR honcho at Schoolcraft, that the local college was quietly observing its 20th anniversary.

On Oct. 24, 1961, voters in four local school districts approved establishment of Northwest Wayne County Community College. The board of trustees later renamed it Schoolcraft.

My distinguished colleague, the late R.T. (Tommy) Thompson, deplored the choice because "Schoolcraft" wouldn't fit into a one-column headline. So we widened our columns from 10 picas to 13, and that took care of that.

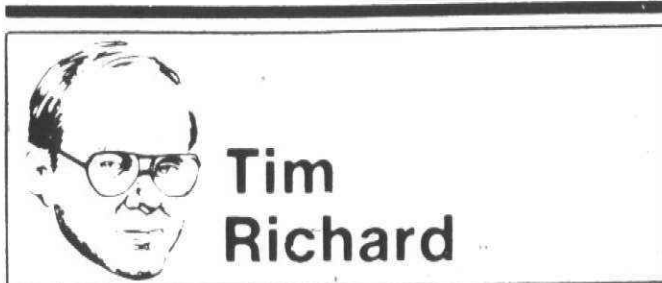
Besides, I always thought Henry Rowe Schoolcraft was a pretty outstanding American scholar.

The community college movement dates only to the '60s, when Schoolcraft, Oakland (1964) and 18 others were organized.

Grand Rapids set up the first "junior college," as they were called, in 1914, followed by Highland Park in '18 and a scattering in the '20s and '30s.

IN THE '60s, Michigan made a state-level decision that every person would be in one community college district or another, and today we have 29 such colleges.

From this point, the histories of our community colleges begin to sound alike.

No longer are they a haven for draft-dodgers. For one thing, there's no longer a draft, and for another, a whole new group of students has come along. Today the median age of a student at Schoolcraft or OCC is around 30.

Half, if not more, are women. Many want to re-enter the job market after raising kids. Community colleges give them the kind of specialized counseling and study help they couldn't get in Ann Arbor, and without all the parking tickets.

Others are folks who want to upgrade job skills. It's no accident that when K-12 and university enrollments are declining and government in Michigan is generally shrinking, the two nearby community colleges are setting enrollment records.

THE CONCLUSION is inescapable that Schoolcraft and OCC are doing something right.

Persons who weren't serious about learning in high

school can still go there to prepare themselves for four-year colleges, to be sure. And with higher education becoming so expensive, the community college is a cheaper alternative than going away to college.

Many university courses are taught by inexperienced graduate students who are more interested in research toward their doctorates than they are in teaching the frosh. Community college instructors, on the other hand, tend to be experienced and often already have their doctorates.

Curriculums today have been tilted toward vocational and technical. Two-thirds of Schoolcraft students are in voc-tech programs. OCC has been a little slower to move in that direction, but this year it added no less than nine voc-tech programs — at a time when universities are cutting out such departments as geography and urban studies.

There has been a lot of change since the old "junior college" days, and more is coming.

Michigan must re-industrialize. The auto industry will no longer absorb any warm body looking for a job, and new industries will be needed. When those industries are identified and recruited, it will be the community colleges which will train their workers in skills and their foremen in management.

And when you think that 20 of our 29 community colleges are less than one generation old, well, you have to join me in being impressed.

# China watchers find friendly faces

Ever since Marco Polo journeyed to China from Venice in 1271, travelers from the west have been fascinated by all that is Chinese.

Husband Jack and I were the same, eyeballing the ancient art, architecture and handicrafts, and working overtime to absorb what we could of the history and culture.

With some 4,000 years of history, China's civilization is one of the world's oldest. If there wasn't a China, would we have porcelain, printing, noodles, fireworks, paper, silk, gunpowder and so many other unique contributions?

Many things are awesome about China: the landscape, pagodas, majestic Buddhas carved into mountainsides, huge caves, archeological treasures, the Great Wall, rivers, water buffalo and pandas, to name just a few.

But like the song from "The King and I" — what I can't seem to forget is "the children, the children."

Chinese children are friendly, smiling and outgoing for the most part. Families are encouraged to have just one child and the government gives them a subsidy.

A SECOND offspring receives no subsidy at all, but since the Chinese have a traditional yearning for sons, often young couples will decide to try again if the firstborn is a daughter.

Pride in their children shines from the eyes of young Chinese parents. They encourage the little ones to smile back, pose for pictures and even accept a hug.

Understandably, some look at the strange Caucasian faces, and burst into tears, more scared than curious.

Little children in China are usually dressed in bright colors and even adults use more of color and western styles than we had expected to see.

Our first plane trip within China was a one-hour ride from Ghangzhou to Nanning via a vintage Russian turbo prop plane. There were few amenities offered, but we made it.

At Nanning, we were in a city opened to tourism in 1978. We were 38 air minutes from Hanoi and cautioned, as we were in Ghangzhou, to be careful what we photographed. There are still occasional border skirmishes between China and Vietnam.

WE SAW no small cities in China — only large metropolises and tiny villages. Nanning was no exception with a population of 530,000. The city is divided by a river and boasts a long row of Eucalyptus trees from Australia.

Industry dominates the southern end of the city, but seven universities and colleges are located there, including a medical college.

The Hotel Yuan Hotel is resort-like with lovely grounds outside, rooms with ancient plumbing inside.

Our first banquet in a restaurant introduces us to roast antelope, fried sparrows, rattle snake meat, and a number of other dubious delicacies. Even though I've always said chopsticks are not for left-handed people, it is suddenly natural to use them.

A bus ride takes us to the Institute for Nationalities, a kind of junior college. We are surrounded by students as we leave the bus. They each take one of us, speak with us, show us their books, tell us about themselves, ask questions.

Their English is wonderful but we feel sheepish about our lack of knowledge of Chinese. A people to people encounter we loved.

People alone and in bunches are always the best part of every experience.

Jack takes photographs of me, standing in a crowd of about 60 persons. They smile, speak to me, and look me over. They crowd close, examining me and my clothing carefully. Jack can hardly see me in the crush.

There's a great sense of friendship, none of fear.

# A catastrophe is overcome

You probably haven't heard about the day Paul Bunyan tried to smoke, the super chicken who baby-sat or the alligator in the waiting room.

But if you happened to visit the children's creative writing course at the Southfield Public Library a few summers ago, you would have heard all these stories and more.

You would have met James Goldwasser of Birmingham, then 31. He was a full-time English and arts teacher and a part-time creative writing instructor at Wayne State University.

Goldwasser, a slight and gentle man with glasses, impressed the kids in his eight-week course. His sense of humor, enthusiasm and vivid imagination were contagious.

He had a rare ability to bring out the creativity in the young writers.

Goldwasser said he loved to encourage kids to think so their ideas would flow. He enjoyed their imaginative characters and the freshness in their language.

His assignments were devised to make the young writers use their imaginations. One girl wrote about a dog who went to a psychiatrist. There were also stories about the day that Paul Bunyan tried to smoke, the super chicken who baby-sat and the alligator in the veterinarian's waiting room.

When the sessions were over, the kids agreed they wanted to come back to Goldwasser's creative writing class the next summer. And Goldwasser hated to say goodbye.

BUT THE popular teacher never returned. About a year later he came down with a near-fatal case of encephalitis. Goldwasser said he learned the hard way that getting close to a cripple threatens and scares people.

Acquaintances he used to consider friends checked dutifully with his wife during his four-month hospital stay. His wife was pregnant with their second child.

Goldwasser said when he returned home he was occasionally morose and often unable to converse intelligently. No way could he do what he told his creative writing class.

"Give details, characterize yourselves and always be specific," he taught his students. "The story must

be clear from the first word to the last, and the main idea must be related."

He said he had become a vegetable overnight. He spent two months at the Detroit Rehabilitation Institute learning to walk, dress and think.

There he met a young girl with a spinal wound which left her permanently paralyzed below the waist. He said he never forgot her smile.

EVERYONE loved the girl, who was the hospital mascot. But Goldwasser wondered how she'd feel in 10 years when she watched her high school dance from a wheelchair.

Goldwasser cried goodbye to his quadriplegic roommates when he left the institute. He suspected he wept because he thought the real world to which he was returning wouldn't understand them. Perhaps he was apologizing for his recovery, which would be more complete than theirs.

A year after he contracted encephalitis, Goldwasser began teaching writing again at the Center for Creative Studies at Wayne State University.

Goldwasser considers himself fortunate. Most victims of catastrophic illnesses find they've been replaced at work while they were recovering.

He remembers how excited he was when he could read, write and understand again after months of being unable to comprehend the words in newspapers and books.

Perhaps Goldwasser remembers a student saying, "It's hard to put a story together. Writing takes a lot of time. I never show my parents what I write because they'll say something is wrong."

"You have to be careful of language," Goldwasser told the girl. "You don't close your eyes and start writing."

Goldwasser knows you don't close your eyes and start living again after being in a coma for six weeks. Painstakingly he uttered his first word and relearned to sit up, walk, talk, dress and feed himself.

Maybe, like his 1971 creative writing class, he now believes in magic, the super chicken who baby-sat and the alligator in the waiting room.

## Hanna's collection:

# 450 penguins to remember them by

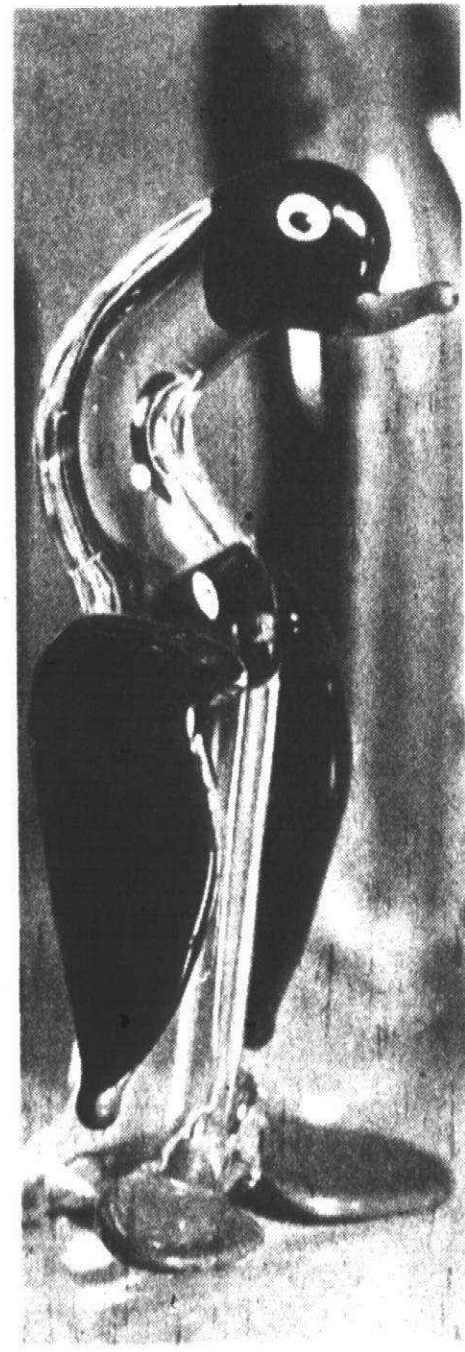
Hanna Strasen wants to be remembered for something other than her penguins.

The Plymouth piano teacher who has been collecting penguins for as long as she's been teaching — about 50 years — said, "One of my friends told me, 'Whenever I see a penguin I think of you.' I hope people think of me for my teaching too."

Most of Miss Strasen's 450 penguins are crowded into a red glass-front display case in the waiting room of her Union Street studio. They range in size from ¼ inch to 16 inches. The large ones overflow onto tabletops and shelves. Pictures of penguins hang on the walls, and a penguin mobile from the ceiling.

Miss Strasen says she bought only a few of the penguins herself. Most of them were given to her by her students over the years.

"The children still give me penguins for Christmas," she said. "They really love them. That's why I keep it up."



The glass penguins are the most graceful in her collection. Some of them are Christmas tree ornaments.

There are penguins in her collection to delight a child of any age. Her students range from 7 years old through adult. Many of the gifts were handmade by the children. Others were selected for her from around the world.

"This is my Polish penguin," she said, pulling out a fat, fuzzy three-inch penguin wearing a fur hat. "Dorie McCubbrey gave it to me when I was in the hospital five years ago. It meant so much to me to have it by my bed while I was sick."

**SHE EXPLAINED** a Poppin' Fresh Doughboy about an inch tall painted black and white. "This one was made of bread dough by Linda Dwyer who is now a well-known young actress. These pictures (a fat stylish penguin wearing a muffler and a penguin orchestra) were painted by Kent Culotta who's become quite an artist. Another penguin was made by a friend in Texas from a gourd she grew in her garden.

Other unlikely materials from which her penguins are made include eggs, soap, a Coke bottle, paper mache, candles, shells from Florida, and marble. A penguin only ½ inch high is carved from ivory.

"The kids are thrilled with the tiny ones," Strasen said.

There are lots of ceramic penguins, some made of pewter, others carved from wood. The most graceful ones are glass, including some delicate Christmas ornament glass penguins. Miss Strasen has a pencil sharpener, a pair of scissors, a pitcher and a perfume bottle in the forms of penguins. There are also several glass snow scenes containing penguins and a pair of penguin earrings. She says she has "gobs of penguin pins upstairs."

**HER INTEREST** in penguins dates from the time Admiral Byrd came back from exploring Antarctica.

"I love animals and all kinds of wildlife. I have books on wildlife for the children to read. I hate cruelty to animals.

"Penguins are so funny," she said. "They're like people. I think they must have a sense of humor. I read about a scientist who stayed six months on an island in the Antarctic where about 50,000 penguins live. He told of all the funny things they did. He noticed that every morning they took the same path down the beach, so he said, 'I wonder what would happen if I blocked the path?' He did, and the next morning they all stopped and just stood there. Then he tried putting a piece of string across the path and they all jumped over the string."

The piano teacher knows a lot about penguins.

"They have a community life and a leader," she said. "Their enemies are the killer whale and some kind of big fish. When they want to find out if it's safe to go in the water, they push a weak one in, and if it survives, they all go in. It's fun to watch them. They hop straight up out of the water onto the

bank, and they like to slide down into the water on their stomachs."

She can tell anecdotes about penguins that children love.

"One of the stories I read when Admiral Byrd was in the Antarctic was this: Penguins don't breed well in captivity, so they were trying to catch some to bring back. They dug a pit and the penguins all fell in, but in the morning there were only a few left. They wondered, how did they get out? So they stayed one night and watched. The penguins climbed up on each other's shoulders. The unlucky ones left behind were the ones that were on the bottom."

**MISS STRASEN** has plenty of other interests besides penguins, however. She loves to travel. On one of her trips to the Holy Land she rode a camel.

She said, "They're mean creatures, but one of my friends said, 'If you can go up in Bill Beiter's single engine plane, you can ride a camel.' So I did."

"I've taken four tours with a Lutheran group. I've been a member of St. Paul's in Northville for about 35 years. Last year we went to Europe and toured seven countries. I've also been to Mexico, the Hawaiian Islands and Cuba — just before Castro came to power. It was interesting reading about the revolution because I had seen all the places mentioned. Traveling makes everything you read more meaningful."

Hanna Strasen came to Plymouth with her family when she was 12. She was born in Chester, Ill., and lived in St. Peter, Ill., and Bay City before coming here. Her father was a Missouri Synod Lutheran minister, and she started playing the organ for his services at an early age.

"I worked my way through college playing the organ in churches, playing for gym class and teaching piano," she said. "You can't do that today, college is too expensive. I went to Eastern Michigan University. It was called Eastern State Normal College then (we always said we were all normal). I took music and art."

She has had as many as 50 piano students at one time.

"I wonder how many thousands of children I've taught," she said. "I taught at Hawthorn Center for 15 years. That really taught me patience. I loved it at first, it was such a challenge, but I got so I dreaded going there." She pointed out a mosaic cat made for her by a child at Hawthorn.

"I have only 15 or 16 pupils now," Miss Strasen said. "I'm on Social Security. Sometimes I get tired of being on a routine, but I think it's good for me. I don't think I'll ever retire. My old piano teacher in Detroit was 85. I have two

families with three in the family taking. They always say, 'You can't quit!'"

She brought out a little tray of Halloween goodies. "I always have a little treat for holidays. It's amazing how much it means to children. I have nice kids. When they get into high school they become just like friends. We confide in each other."

**AFTER PLAYING** the organ in churches for many years, she had to give it up when illness caused a partial paralysis in her legs. She played at Plymouth Presbyterian Church for eight years in the old building.

"When it burned down I stood there with tears in my eyes. That beautiful window — I still have a piece out of it.

I liked that old Moller organ. They they built the new church, the architect didn't know anything about organs, so the organ never sounded right in that chamber. The new organ they've got now seems too loud to me though."

Now, Miss Strasen's interest in pipe organs is being rekindled. She is on the organ committee to select a new organ for St. Paul's.

"We've been everywhere," she said, "and I've had the opportunity to try organs in Detroit, Toledo and Canada. I got to play the organ at St. Aloysius downtown. I don't like electronic organs. I've tried Allens and Rogers, but with all the advancements in electronics, I'm afraid what we would buy now would be much in 10 years. I've learned so much being on the organ committee."

There seems to be many things to remember about Hanna Strasen besides her penguins. Perhaps the reasons her students give her penguins is because they want to be remembered by her.

## Company Pork Loin Roast

4 to 6-pound boneless pork loin roast (double)

Place roast on rack in an open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so the bulb is centered in the thickest part. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325°F.) until the thermometer registers 165°F. Allow 30 to 35 minutes per pound. Allow roast to "set" in a warm place 15 to 20 minutes after removal from oven. Roasts continue to cook during this time, rising approximately 5°F. to reach the recommended internal temperature of 170°F.

### Microwave Directions

Place 4 to 5-pound pork roast, fat side down, on rack in microwave-safe dish. Do not add water. Shield edges of ends with aluminum foil. Cover with wax paper. Cook at 30 percent power (approximately 200 watts). \* Allow 18 to 20 minutes per pound. Cook roast for half the cooking time, rotating dish a quarter turn midway during cooking. Remove aluminum foil. Turn roast, fat side up, rotate dish a quarter turn and continue cooking, covered with wax paper, for remainder of cooking time, rotating dish a quarter turn midway during cooking. Cover roast with foil tent and allow to "set" 15 to 20 minutes after removal from oven. The internal temperature as measured with a meat thermometer centered in the roast should register 170°F.

\* To cook at 50 percent power (approximately 325 watts), allow 12 to 15 minutes per pound.

## Holiday Wedges with Creamy Dressing

Core, rinse and thoroughly drain lettuce; refrigerate in plastic bag. Place cottage cheese, sour cream, milk, lemon juice, salt, paprika and hot pepper sauce in blender container; cover. Blend until smooth. (It may be necessary to stop blender and scrape down sides occasionally.) Stir in chopped green pepper and pimiento. Cover and refrigerate at least 3 hours or overnight. Cut lettuce into wedges. Spoon dressing over wedges. 8 servings.

## Cranberry Trifle

Combine cranberry sauce, 1/4 cup port wine and cinnamon. Stir milk into instant vanilla pudding and pie filling and prepare as directed on package. Cover and chill. Cut pound cake into 8 slices. Break 4 slices of cake into pieces to fit bottom of bowl; sprinkle 2 tablespoons of port wine over cake. Spread cake with 1-1/2 cups cranberry sauce mixture; add layer of half the chilled pudding. Repeat layers, using remaining cake, port wine, 1 cup cranberry sauce mixture and pudding. Arrange remaining cranberry sauce mixture in center of pudding and chill 2 to 3 hours. Before serving whip heavy cream until stiff, stir in sugar and spoon on top of trifle. 8 servings.

## Ham and Spinach Souffle

Add cheese, horseradish and nutmeg, stirring until cheese is melted. Spread slices of bread with butter or margarine on one side; place spread side down in 13 x 9-inch baking dish. Beat egg whites until stiff. Beat egg yolks in large bowl, gradually stir in cheese sauce, chopped ham, spinach and onion. Fold in beaten egg whites. Pour souffle mixture over bread. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 25 minutes. Place ham squares on top of souffle and continue baking 10 to 15 minutes or until set and firm in center. 6 servings.

# Even Mother Hubbard needed her Betty Crocker

It is really no wonder that many people have a phobia about being good cooks. The media has created stereotypes of what a good cook looks like as well as cooks like. We have all been exposed to television ads of the gorgeous housewife preparing a gourmet feast for the hard-working husband. This lady is always dressed to the hilt with never a hair out of place nor a piece of silverware in the wrong spot. She glides around the kitchen (which by the way never has any dirty pots, pans, or dishes lying around) and will suddenly produce like magic a dish of food that is picture perfect and ready for the cover of Bon Appetit.

Excuse me for rambling, but television ads in general are not of my pet peeve. Most ad agencies must believe that they need to insult the audience for them to remember the product being sold. I must admit that it works, for I find myself remembering the names of some of the products advertised in this manner. But with me, remembering is negative response. I will usually go out of my way to avoid buying a product the advertisements of which I find demeaning.

Getting back to my original theme of stereotypes, it is not only television that projects an unreal image of food and cooking; the printed media also is often guilty of this same deception. Have you ever attempted to prepare and serve a recipe that you have seen in a magazine or newspaper where a photograph of the finished product was furnished? If you are like me, you are almost always disappointed with the way your finished product looks. The wonders of photography. The way some meals are portrayed in print it seems a shame to eat them. But my point is — food is to be eaten, not looked at. Don't worry so much about how nice a prepared dish looks, worry about its taste.

For those of us who have seen through the television and magazine ads and still have the desire to become good cooks, we must next face possibly the most disheartening experience in learning to cook. This is the job of buying a cookbook. Walk into any large bookstore and try to buy a cookbook. The shelf after shelf of titles to choose from is enough to drive a person to an endless life of TV dinners. I honestly do not understand how so many different cookbooks could possibly sell enough copies to make the printing of them worthwhile. From artichokes to zucchini, the list of specialty type cookbooks is almost endless. Could there really be several hundred good ways to cook a chicken? Ethnic cookbooks, vegetarian, seafood, pasta, cakes, pies, health foods, food for joggers, meals for singles, gourmet parties, cooking outdoors, crockery cookbooks, et cetera.

Most people will react in one of two ways. Either they will succumb to the pressure and feel they need one of every type of cookbook in the store in order to become adept at cooking. Actually if you are going to do one of these things, the first is probably the better of the two. I'm sure many of you own several cookbooks that you never even look at. I know Kathe and I do.

Owning good cookbooks is very important though. Here are a few hints that might help you sort through the mass of culinary offerings.

Start with one of the basic "How To" cookbooks that have been around forever and are the staple of any good kitchen. I am talking about a book that will give you more than just recipes. One that describes the utensils you will need, the staple ingredients and spices that should always be in your cupboards, how to measure ingredients, the meaning of different cooking terms that are common in recipes different equivalent amounts, special food terms, different cuts of meat, and types of vegetables and fruits. The book then goes on to provide you with recipes for all different occasions. Kathe and I have the "Good Housekeeping Cookbook," but there are others on the market that also serve this primary purpose.

Once you are familiar with your base cookbook, think about the types of cooking you will do the most. Will you be preparing many meals with very little time? Will you be doing a lot of entertaining? Are there certain types of food that you naturally prefer? What are your budget constraints? Are you cooking only for yourself or do you serve meals for a family.

Only after you have answered these types of question should you select your secondary, or specialty cookbooks. Kathe and I have several of these type books that we rely heavily on. One that has been put to work often is "Betty Crocker's Dinner for Two" cookbook. It has been great for helping gauge just how much to cook to avoid a refrigerator full of leftovers. Two more of my favorites are also Betty Crocker books — "Hamburger Cookbook" and "Easy Oven Meals." I have relied on these collections often when we were down to our last pound of hamburger before payday or

when a quick casserole was needed.

Whatever you do, choose your cookbooks only after you have given it some thought. Fancy is nice sometimes, but plain and easy is more practical and often more tasty, too.

### PORCUPINE MEATBALLS

(Adapted from "Betty Crocker Hamburger Cookbook")

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 cup uncooked regular rice
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 small onion, chopped (about 1/4 cup)
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. celery salt
- 1/8 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce
- 1 cup water
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Mix meat, rice 1/2 cup water, the onion and seasonings. Shape mixture by tablespoons into 1 1/2 inch balls.

To cook in skillet: Heat 1 tablespoon salad oil in large skillet; cook meatballs over medium heat until brown. Add remaining ingredients; heat to boiling. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 45 minutes.

To cook in oven: Place meatballs in ungreased baking dish, 8-x-8-x-2 inches. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over meatballs. Cover and bake in 350 degree oven 45 minutes. Uncover and bake 15 minutes longer. Serves 4 to 5.

### CHICKEN CACCIATORE

(Adapted from "Betty Crocker Dinner for Two" cookbook)

- Salad Oil
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/8 tsp. paprika
- 1 to 1 1/2 lbs. chicken pieces or 2-pound broiler-fryer chicken, cut up
- 1 jar (15 oz.) meatless spaghetti sauce
- 1 can (2 oz.) mushroom stems and pieces
- 1/4 tsp. instant minced garlic
- 1 tsp. parsley flakes
- 1/4 cup sliced pitted ripe olives
- 3 1/2 to 4 oz. uncooked spaghetti

Heat 1/8 inch salad oil in large skillet. Mix flour, salt, pepper, and paprika; coat chicken with flour mixture. Cook chicken in oil over medium heat until light brown, 15-20 minutes. Mix spaghetti sauce, mushrooms (with liquid), garlic, parsley flakes and olives. Drain fat from skillet. Pour sauce onto chicken. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat; cover tightly and simmer until thickest pieces of chicken are tender, about 30 minutes. While chicken simmers, cook spaghetti as directed on package. Drain. Serve chicken with spaghetti. Serves 2.

- 2 tbsp. melted butter
- 1 cup chopped onion

- ¾ (6-ounce) can tomato paste

- 2 bay leaves
- 1 lovage leaf
- 1 romabole scallion
- 1 diced carrot

Place peas and water into large soup pot. Heat to boiling. Turn off heat and let peas soak one hour. Chop herbs coarsely and add to peas along with carrot and bacon fat. Simmer for 2-3 hours. Salt and pepper to taste. Stir briskly with a potato masher regularly to keep from sticking to the bottom of the pot. When peas are soft, puree or mash. To serve, garnish with chervil and crumbled fried pork sausage. If company's coming, stir in ½ cup sour cream, heavy cream or yogurt just before serving.

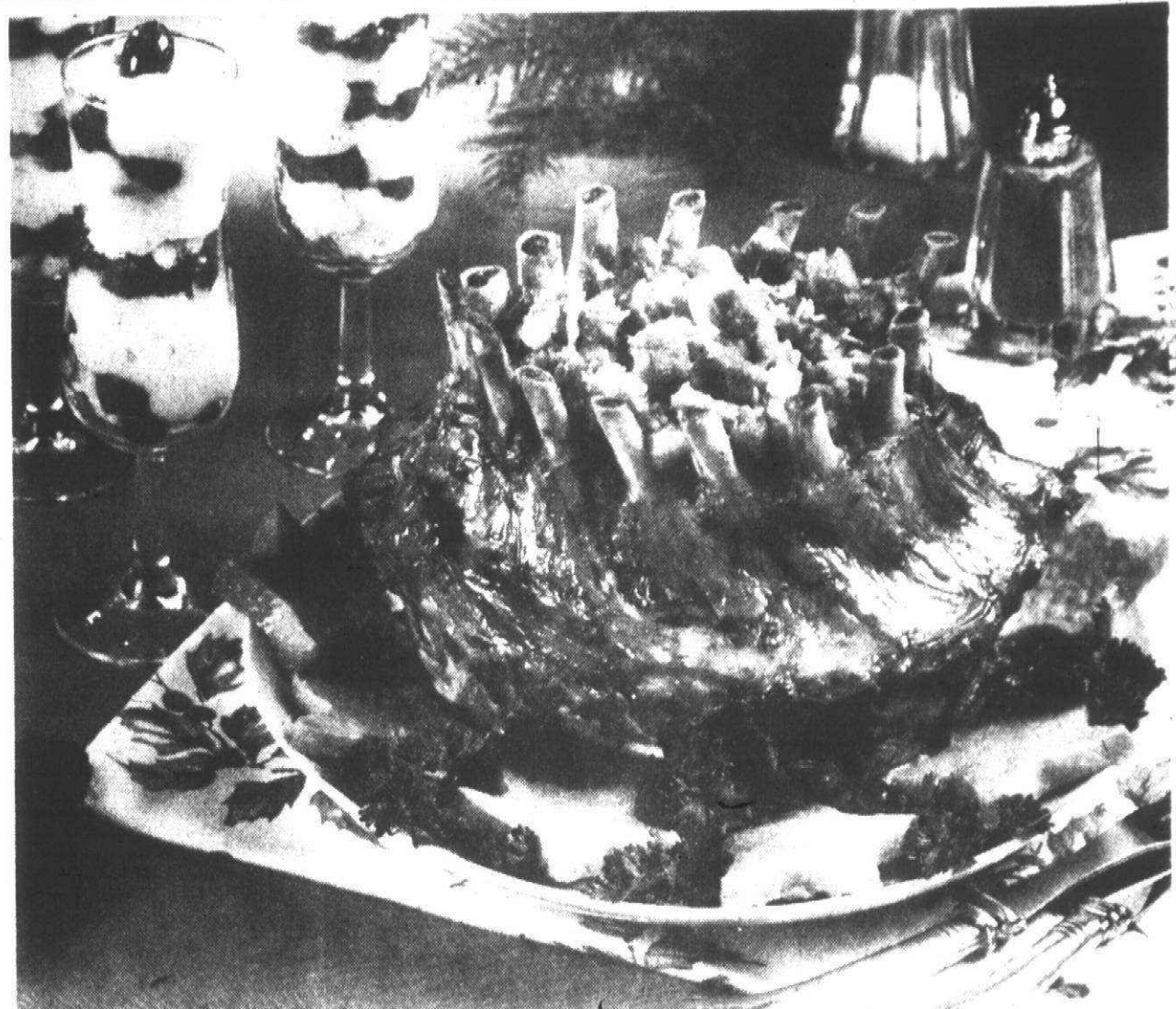

## Sweet potato pork roast does a porker proud



For a dinner sure to be remembered, serve a pork crown roast filled with bread stuffing

that's enhanced with sweet potatoes, apple and bacon.

Pork crown roast with sweet potato stuffing fills any mealtime role in delicious fashion. While diners appreciate the flavor and appetite appeal of this king of pork roasts, the cook will appreciate the relative ease with which it can be prepared.

The unusual stuffing, made by adding shredded sweet potatoes and chopped onion, celery and apple to bread cubes, is most complimentary to the pork. Crumbled bacon gives it a nice flavor boost as does the addition of sage.

The roast is first cooked rib ends down in a slow oven. Then it is inverted, filled with stuffing and returned to the oven until done, as indicated by a thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the meat. As with all pork roasts, a crown is at its juicy best when cooked to an internal temperature of 170° F.

The roast can be ordered from your meat retailer in advance. He will make it by tying together two center pork loins that have been Frenched; that is, the meat has

been cut away to expose the tips of the rib bones. If desired, frills can be placed on the rib ends after roasting to accentuate the crown effect.

### PORK CROWN ROAST SWEET POTATO STUFFING

- 14-16-rib pork crown roast (about 6 pounds)
- 4 slices bacon
- 2 tbsps. butter or margarine
- 2 cups shredded sweet potatoes
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 large cooking apple, cored and chopped
- 1 packaged (6 ounces) bread cubes for stuffing
- 1 tsp. sage
- 3/4 water

Place crown roast, rib ends down, on rack in open roasting pan. Do not add water and do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325° F) 2 hours. Remove from oven. Turn roast

so that rib ends are up. Insert meat thermometer so the bulb is centered in thickest part of roast, making certain that it does not rest in fat or on bone.

Meanwhile, cook bacon until crisp; remove to absorbent paper. Add butter or margarine to bacon drippings. Add potatoes, onion and celery; cook 5-6 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add apple and cook 4-5 minutes. Add bread cubes. Crumble bacon and add; (cook remaining stuffing in separate pan, covered, for 30 minutes.) Continue roasting meat until thermometer registers 165° F. Cover roast with foil tent and allow to set at room temperature 15-20 minutes. (Temperature usually rises to 170° F during this period. Carve between ribs.)

To decorate the roast, surround it with sweet potato stars that have been cooked until tender crisp in a small amount of sweetened water. Then round out the menu with Brussels sprouts, dinner rolls and a mixed green salad tossed with orange sections.

# Schoolcraft cagers optimistic

Most coaches would hate to deal with 19 players on one basketball team, but that doesn't bother Schoolcraft College's Quinton "Rocky" Watkins.

"They've all worked hard," he said. "That's one reason Dr. Gans (Marv), our athletic director, and I decided to keep them all.

"Anyway, it makes every practice that much more competitive."

Watkins predicts his team will improve on its fourth place league finish and 17-10 record of a year ago. "I know I putting them on the spot," said the friendly Watkins, "But I believe we can win our conference."

Watkins has a wealth of talent. He beams about players such as 6-foot-7 sophomore forward Phil Blevins,

who averaged 18 points and 10 rebounds per game last year while shooting 60 percent. "He's very advanced at this level," said Watkins. "He's smooth, doesn't make many mistakes, rebounds well and moves without the ball extremely well."

Blevins, who played two years ago for CSL power Detroit Central, is being courted by a host of NCAA Division I powers.

"I get calls about him every day," said Watkins. "Jim Boyce at Eastern Michigan would really like to have him. Michigan and Michigan State haven't called yet. U-D never calls."

Virginia Commonwealth, Purdue and Texas A&M would also like to sign Blevin.

WATKINS IS SURE Marion (Ind.) College transfer Sayligmen Staten, a 5-11 point guard, will start. But after that, the other three spots are up for grabs.

Staten, who helped Murray-Wright to a 19-1 record and Operation Friendship title, could team up with 6-3 Detroit Northeastern grad Kirk Croxton in the backcourt. Croxton averaged 14 points per game last year for Watkins.

And for the first time in years, some well-known western Wayne County residents are members of the Schoolcraft College roster.

Livonia Stevenson grad Bill Keyes, nicknamed by his teammates "Billy the Kid," will swing between guard and forward. The 6-3 Keyes, named first-team All-Observer last season, is a

good ball handler and seems to have a knack for being in the right place at the right time.

He will be joined by another familiar freshman, Scott Conrad, a 6-7 forward from Livonia Churchill, who toughened up his game last summer in the St. Cecilia League. Guard Mike Cavicchio, a Bentley grad, is another incoming freshman fighting for playing time.

Mike Frazier, a 6-7 forward from White Oak High School in Jacksonville, N.C., won't start right away, according to Watkins, but should figure in the Ocelots' title run.

OTHERS PRESSING for spots include 6-2 guard forward Phillip Cooper (Willow Run), 6-3 forward Pete Kennedy (Detroit Kettering); 6-1 guard George Meriweather (Detroit Northwestern), 6-3 guard Tom Niergarth (Brighton), and 6-5 forward Reggie Hendricks (transfer from Butler County (Kan.) CC).

Mott Community College in Flint is the defending champ in the 10-team Eastern Conference.

"I believe this team is comparable to our 1978 state championship team," said Watkins. "We had Cedric Olden (Wayne State) and Eric Watson (EMU) on that team."

"The attitude here has been great. We have some good students in this group. I think they can go along way."

Schoolcraft will be tested right away. The Ocelots meet defending state champ Jackson CC at 5 p.m. Saturday in the Pontiac Silverdome.

# DeBerry likes bit part

Jeff DeBerry, a 1979 graduate of Redford Bishop Borgess, is a big fish in a small pond, and that's fine with him. He has his doubts about whether he should have gone to a bigger school with a better football program, but, in his words, "I can't complain."

The fans at Adrian can't complain about DeBerry, either. Since he was installed as the starting quarterback early in his freshman year, the Bulldogs have won 22 and tied one of 25 games and captured their first championship of the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

That was last year. The 'Dogs looked like sure repeaters this season, running their unbeaten string to 16 games, longest in the nation, and their league record to 3-0. But then came a loss to Hope, and Adrian settled for second place in the league and an overall record of 8-1.

DeBERRY, A JUNIOR, was All-League a year ago and was a second-team pick this season. His stats are impressive — he was the league's leading passer most of the season, finishing second to R.J. Fabian of Albion, he averaged 18.2 yards a completion and totaled 890 yards passing on a running team — but it isn't the stats that tell his story.

"His strong suit is he's a heck of a leader and a competitor," said Tom Heckert, Adrian's long-time football coach. "His leadership and running our offense, automatics and those kinds of things, are what make him a heck of a quarterback."

"He was a leader right from the first day he ever stepped on campus. Some people might think he's cocky, but I think you have to have that to be a quarterback. . . . There's no doubt who's in charge in the huddle. The kids have confidence in him."

SO DeBERRY is a winner, a leader and an honored all-star. Still, there are those moments of doubt when he wonders just how good he really is, about what would have happened had he played in Division II or, in moments of fantasy, Division I, where the big boys play.

"I guess everyone thinks that when they're playing Division III," DeBerry said with a laugh. He has made his peace with playing before crowds of 5,000 instead of the 104,000 that Michigan draws; with playing in pretty little towns on tiny, scenic campuses; with playing in leagues where they still have 200-pound linemen and quarterbacks who lumber the 40-yard dash in 4.9 seconds; with playing where there are no full-ride scholarships, and spring practice is something you do only when you're on the baseball team.

The reason DeBerry made his peace with small-time football is because of a buddy who couldn't.

DeBerry went to Adrian with a teammate from high school, Joe English. English had a dream: to play at the University of Michigan. The dream wouldn't die, and so English transferred to Ann Arbor.

DeBerry became a star and big man on campus; English became a fifth-string fullback who has yet to letter.

"He's on the meat squad, you know?" said DeBerry, boiling it down to its essence.

# Graham wins high praise

Any high school track athlete would be delighted with winning a state title in one event, just missing a title in another and recording the fourth fastest time in the nation all in one year.

But if the state honors were icing on Westland John Glenn senior Kelly Graham's cake, then what she learned earlier this month was the candle that brightened the past season all the more.

The National High School Track All-America selection committee chose 375 boys and girls for the prep All-America team. Graham was one of those honored.

"Last summer I got a thing in the mail about it," Graham recalled. "It said I was being considered for the team, so I filled out the form and sent it in."

"I didn't think I'd get it — I just thought I had a little chance. I was surprised."

CALIFORNIA AND Texas headed the All-American list with 43 and 41 athletes picked, respectively. Michigan ranked 12th with 10.

Graham earned the accolades by winning the 100-meter hurdles at last year's state meet (13.7). She narrowly missed a second title in the 200-meter hurdles, running a 28.8 seconds to place second to Flint Northern's Judy Tucker, who was clocked at 28.7.

Graham also anchored Glenn's mile relay, which placed fifth in the state meet (4:00.0).

Right now, track isn't the sport Graham is concentrating on — it's basketball. When the season ends in another couple of weeks, Graham will turn her attention to her hurdling, right?

"Not really," the multi-talented athlete answered. "I play volleyball in the winter."

But it is her ability at track that has attracted the attention of several colleges — 17 have contacted her so far. She has made no decision yet, other than to say she will run in college and she would like to go to a warm climate where she can run outside all year

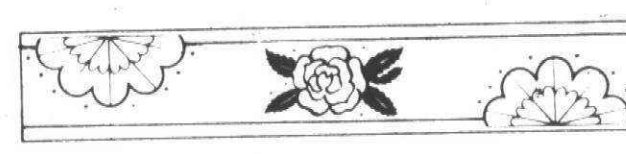

## Crazy tattoo artist has weird designs on fashion model

He used to disinfect telephones. That made him privy to the horrors of such sights as bacteria and fungi colonizing in the receivers. Now, whenever he talks on the phone, he has to put a handkerchief over the mouthpiece — even for a local call.

It's enough to drive a man berserk, and that's just what happened to Bruce Dern as Karl Kinsky, the central character in "Tattoo" (R).

After his stint as a phone disinfectant, he became a tattoo artist, apparently a trade for which he was destined all along. References to his childhood suggest he used to draw a lot of pictures.

This aroused the anger and censure of his father, who thought drawing was for sissies. What do you think, Dr. Freud? Maybe all Karl's hangups don't come from telephones.

WHEN KARL meets Maddy (Maud Adams), a fashion model whose magazine photos he's been oggling for some time, he becomes obsessed with her. He is a rigid, intense person for whom there can be no intimacy without a total body and soul commitment.

She is the noncommittal type whose philosophy, if she has one, is take your pleasure as you please and forget about it.

How can this strange, brooding, ill-tempered man ever hope to win the love of this fast-living, beautiful and sophisticated model? He can't, so he figures he will kidnap her and love will follow.

He breaks into her apartment, sedates her with injections of Seconal and carries her off to his house in Hoboken. There, he keeps her prisoner while he puts his "mark" on her, nothing less than a full-body tattoo.

She cries and whimpers. He keeps buzzing away with his needles. Soon, she's a pulsating tangle of dragons, birds and exotic flowers. At last he has created a creature worthy of his love.

ROMEO AND Juliet they are not. Bonnie and Clyde they are not. In fact, they are not anything but a psychotic artist and a self-indulgent, not excessively bright model.

Since Karl is only capable of a kinky relationship, and Maddy is only capable of a transient one, does anyone really care what kind of relationship they finally achieve?

Movie-goers who enjoy a bizarre drama would do better to watch theater and television listings for an oldie, a fascinating film called "The Collector," adapted from the novel by John Fowles.

In it, a psychotic butterfly collector becomes obsessed with a lovely young art student. He kidnaps her and keeps her locked up in his home, a living addition to his collection of beauties.

"Tattoo" mines this same territory but without the inner magic of the Fowles story or the splendid make-up effects, stunning photography or splendid acting.

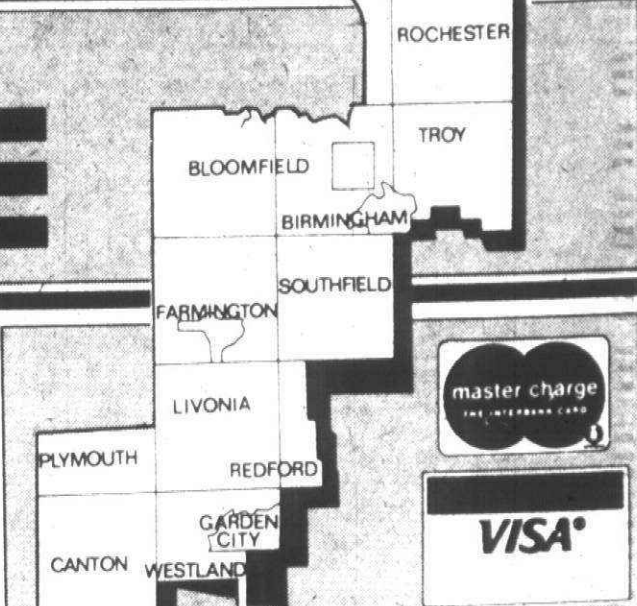

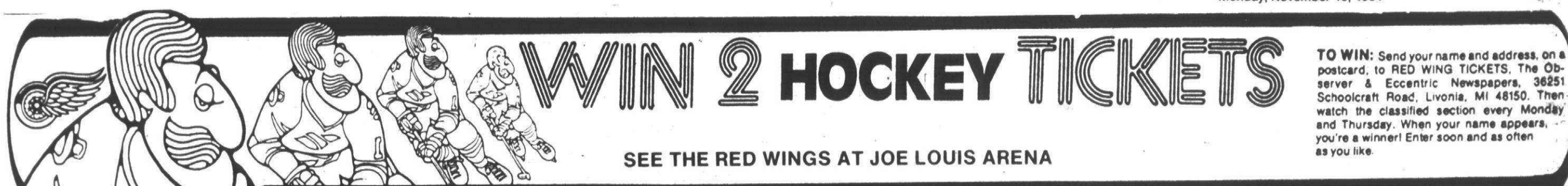
