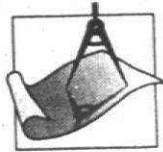

## Time to get down(town) to work



Canton Township has been looking to create a downtown area for about 10 years. But the talk has stopped and the work that includes trees and sidewalks is going to be put in place.

Construction is scheduled to begin on Canton's downtown after almost 10 years of discussion, debates and a lawsuit.

Plans call for adding trees, sidewalks, a sprinkling system and low walls around the perimeter of the area including Sheldon to Morton Taylor, mostly south of Westminister Way to just south of Ford Road.

Construction begins in March on the design by architects Haley, Ellington, Pierce, Yee Associates.

"We're finally making some real progress," said Canton Supervisor Tom Yack. "You can see the end."

The project had been delayed by a number of hurdles including a lawsuit by Dayton Hudson and Norman Newman who owned 40 acres of the 85 acres in the proposed district.

The plan was downsized during lawsuit negotiations. Today, the

changes only include the public property on the perimeter and some private property changes were included with the owner's approval.

"Anything in the interior will be delayed," Yack said.

One of the reasons communities develop a downtown development authority is to improve the appearance of a shopping area and to encourage businesses to invest in change.

## A ring goes out for help

Because more families than ever are showing need this holiday season, the Salvation Army is making an emergency call for help.

"There's an urgent need for businesses, churches, civic groups or families to become sponsors or adopters

for a our Adopt-A-family program," said Howard Matthews, program director.

The emergency is sparked by a record number of families seeking help this holiday season.

"We already have about 250 (families) that have been screened and we are trying to match up," Matthews said.

That number, reached before Thanksgiving, already surpasses the 240 families helped through the program last year.

"We feel there's going to be a lot more, maybe 300 families or more than that," before Christmas, Matthews said. "We need as many adopters as possible."

Matthews stressed that interested families should not ask about the program when calling the Plymouth Salvation Army.

"If they're interested, call 453-5487 and request an information packet," he said, adding workers don't have the time to explain the problem to everyone who calls.

Why so many? "I think the economy, one, and aggressive work on our part getting the word out to the families," he said.

"We can keep their names confidential if they request it - In this area there's a lot of people that don't want it known if they need help."

Families seeking help through the program are screened to determine if their need is real. The Salvation Army follows government guidelines on what constitutes poverty level, but Matthews said these aren't strictly followed.

Those seeking to adopt a family are told clothing sizes, gender and ages of family members.

"We treat people with respect and dignity and as much as possible guard their privacy," he said.

While the Salvation Army is a Christian organization, Matthews stresses that people of all beliefs get help if they meet financial guidelines.

### Deer problem

It was an "out and out disgrace," according to Canton resident Russ Pyle, who found a gutted deer on Koppernick between Haggerty and Hix roads last week.

"I'm not an anti-hunting advocate," said Pyle who has hunted deer himself.

He was angered by the disregard of a hunter killing and gutting a deer and leaving the meat to rot in rural Canton.

"I feel disgusted," he added. "This is a crying shame to me. When I rolled him over, he was field dressed and with the warm weather the meat has to be spoiled. There's no sense in taking a life like that if you're not going to use it."

# Charges expected in fatal accident

Canton police are waiting to serve a warrant against a 21-year-old Plymouth man who has been charged with causing his brother's death in a car accident last month.

"Our department does not intend to serve the warrant while he's hospitalized," Canton police information officer Tammie Colling said last week.

The prosecutor's office issued a one-count felony warrant against the Plymouth man for operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol and causing a death.

The suspect is recovering from injuries sustained in the Oct. 23 one-car accident. He was listed in good condition last week at the University of Michigan Hospital, Ann Arbor.

His brother, William Tustian, 26, was killed after the 1985 Dodge convertible the suspect was driving left the roadway and rolled over on Warren Road just east of Lilley where the road curves. It was approximately 3:50 a.m.

Police believe the convertible top was closed at the time of the accident. The brothers, however, were not wearing seatbelts.

The accident occurred, apparently after the brothers were at a bachelor party in honor of William Tustian who was to be married the day after the accident. Initial studies indicated the car was traveling an estimated 64 mph.

As in all accidents where a death is involved, Canton police conducted a thorough investigation and gave results to the Wayne County Prosecutor's office. Canton police declined discussing details of the investigation until the warrant is issued.

# New planner expected in January

After 18 months of searching, Canton officials have finally hired a new township planner, scheduled to begin Jan. 4.

Jeff Goulet, 34, will replace former planner Dave Nicholson who left Canton Nov. 1, 1991. Goulet is a planner in Brevard County in the Cape Kennedy region of Florida.

"He's really been able to demonstrate he's got an enthusiasm for the planning process," said Aaron Machnik, director of township municipal services. "Planning is a priority function. In a developing community, it's a very important job."

Despite years in Florida, eight to be exact in Brevard County, Goulet isn't totally unfamiliar to midwestern winters. Goulet is originally from Ohio and received his bachelor's and master's degrees in planning from Ohio State University.

After Nicholson left, township officials began their search for a new planner — twice. In the first go-round, 200 planners applied. "We were unsuccessful in finding the person we felt met the needs of the community," Machnik said.

So they started all over again. This time, 178 people applied. The applications were boiled down to six people, who were put through plenty of jumps to prove they knew their stuff. That included finding out what type of planning philosophy applicants had.

"He did a fine job in presenting himself as a person and a planner," said Machnik, who went to Florida to check up on Goulet.

# Canton man charged in marijuana bust

A 41-year-old Canton man was arrested Nov. 14 on felony charges of possession of marijuana with intent to deliver.

He pleaded not guilty during an arraignment in Qut Wayne County Circuit Court.

Bond was set at \$10,000 cash or a 10 percent bond. A preliminary examination was in 35th District Court before Judge John McCartney. The case was bound over to Wayne County Circuit Court.

Police executed a search warrant for the man's car Nov. 12 at the Ford Motor Company plant on Sheldon at M-14.

The man, who was reportedly in the vehicle, was arrested by the Western Wayne County Narcotics Team and Van Buren Township police.

Police reported the man had five pounds of marijuana.

The charge carries up to four years in prison and or a \$2,000 fine.

"You create something with a spin-off benefit," Yack said, adding that Canton has already seen reactions from Ramco-Gershenson, the owners of the nearby strip mall anchored by Kmart.

"They're going to remodel the entire center this spring," Yack said. "I shared with them what will be done with the DDA area, and they said they would like to do the same thing on their property."

Before the plan was developed, the architects talked to all 19 businesses in the area — Grapevine Wine and Deli, Dino's Pizza, D'Avanzo (attorney), Remerica, Master Lighting, Standard Federal Savings, Valvoline Instant Oil, House of Woo, Rusty Nail, Pinter's Flowers, Grand Central Station, which has ABC Warehouse as its anchor store, Frank's Nursery, Cinema 6, Security Bank, Target, the Canton Dental building, Arby's, Firestone Tires and the entire Harvard Square complex.

"They went around before they did a final design and talked to

the folks and showed them what work would be done, and basically got them to sign-off with minor modifications," according to Ken Voyles, Yack's administrative assistant.

The improvements are estimated at \$2.1 million, which will be taken from DDA funds. Once the DDA is established, taxes from rising property values pay for district improvements.

# Plymouth Thanksgiving festival drums up fun

The "Plymouth Thanksgiving" celebration in Kellogg Park was surely fun for lots of folks who attended on Friday and Saturday.

But it's hard to imagine that someone could have enjoyed the event more than one guy hanging out in the park Friday.

This fellow — named Tom and distinguished by a well-formed plumage, pointy beak, three-toed feet and roundish body — was surely happy to have survived the cutting block on Thursday.

Tom the turkey was so happy to still be around that he calmly endured the petting of all kids who approached him.

But owner Jay Richards of Plymouth Township offered another reason. "I raised him from little ones," Richards said, adding Tom was seven months old.

Just beyond the pen kept by Richards, with ducks and another turkey on display, the centerpiece of "A Plymouth Thanksgiving" was taking place.

That of course is the first Thanksgiving dinner re-enactment, complete with folks dressed as pilgrims and native Americans and a table laden with the reputed first Thanksgiving fare — wild game, corn, squash, bread and more.

About 200 onlookers watched as the third annual event unfolded in Kellogg Park.

Organizers touted the event as a reaction to the over-commercialization of Christmas, and as an opportunity to celebrate a great American holiday.

While the crowd Friday may have been down slightly from last year, event founder Fred Hill said, "We have more people in costume this year."

The event opened Friday with an all-denominational service headed by Salvation Army Lt. Jeffrey Beechum.

"Thanksgiving is not just a holiday. Thanksgiving is an attitude of gratitude," he told onlookers, from the covered park fountain.

The park was decorated with hay bales, Indian corn and corn stalks.

"Wouldn't it be sad if Thanksgiving were simply a day off work?" Beechum asked, adding the holiday provides "the opportunity of saying 'thank you God.'"

Looking on were Helen Kwiatkowski and husband Walter, both of Plymouth. "I think it's absolutely beautiful," she said of the event.

Betty Grabowski of Livonia was getting ready to snap a photo of granddaughter Samantha, with her head in the stocks set up in the park.

"Look like you're in pain, quit laughing," Grabowski told her grandchild.

Of the event, she said, "I like it, it's different."

As Mike Dashner MC'ed an Indian dance demonstration before onlookers in Kellogg Park, across the street in Fred Hill's former shop wood carver Robert Dluzen described his Windsor charis.

"All the pieces start out as an actual log," he explained.

# Utley inspires those who are physically challenged

Bob Moore, 19, paralyzed in a car accident two years ago, convinced his dad to drive him to Plymouth from Hillsdale Friday afternoon. Michael Hudy, 12, of Redford also got here thanks to his dad, Mike Hudy. Michael has spina bifida and is in a wheelchair.

Sophie Ethans drove from Benton Harbor, picking up her dad, Gus Ethans, in Livonia on the way.

Beth Stephens, 11, has dwarfism and came with her father, Leland Stephens, from Dearborn. What inspired them, and hundreds of other folks, to come to Plymouth's Blackwell Ford Inc. was Mike Utley.

Utley, formerly a right guard for the Detroit Lions, was in town for the Oilers-Lions Thanksgiving Day game at the Silverdome. Paralyzed in a freakish accident in the Nov. 17, 1991, game against the Los Angeles Rams a year ago, Utley was honorary captain in Thursday's game.

As a thank you to Blackwell, which gave Utley and his girlfriend, Debbie Riddle, of Rochester, use of a 1993 Thunderbird for 10 days, Utley offered to sign autographs for a few hours in the dealership showroom.

The affable Utley smiled, joked, visited and posed for photos with fans who arrived in such a steady stream he really didn't get a break.

Utley autographed 8 x 10 action photos of himself and sold

for the Lions. "I want to see how Mike is doing and ask him if he thinks he'll ever walk again."

"I was at the game where he got paralyzed," said Tom, a running back with the Lions. "I saw him give the thumbs up sign."

Bob Moore broke his neck when the car he was riding in flipped on the field on a local bar. Moore and his buddy were going to meet friends after a high school basketball game.

"I've read articles about Mike Utley, and he says a lot of the same things I say. So I decided to come see how he's doing," said Moore.

A quadriplegic, Moore says his philosophy is, "Day by day, life's OK. Inch by inch, life's a cinch." Len Gossman is Blackwell's general sales manager. "Mike Utley is an excellent role model, not just for kids, but for life in general," he said. "He's a very strong-willed, determined person."

**A lesson**  
"We could all learn a lesson from Mike, and that's commitment to yourself. Give yourself 110 percent. Decide what you want out of life and what you want to do, and you can overcome just about any obstacle."

Canton's Barb Kilgore brought her three children, Mike, 11, Sherrill, 9, and Kevin, 7, to meet Utley. "I guess to show what you can accomplish if you're down and out and really work at something. Look at what he's done," Kilgore said.

Utley took a short time out to

say he hopes people remember "the Thumbs Up Program is No. 1. We need the money for research, so purchase the shirts. "The second thing is, just to be aware what's going on. If you see restaurants and buildings that aren't wheelchair accessible, mention it to the person in charge. Make people aware. "And support every kid out

there, regardless of whether they're in a chair or not. Make sure they stay straight. It's half their job to follow their parents, or a role model. But it's 50-50. Kids have to do their part. Kids and parents have to make time for each other."

Thumbs up merchandise is for sale at the Silverdome, Kmart, Crowley's, Foot Locker and Dun-

ham stores. Gus Ethans is among those who plan to support Utley's efforts. "He's a wonderful football player and I love his appeal," said the Livonia resident. "It's too bad he got injured, but I believe he will be back within two to three years. He'll get himself well. I respect that man."

# Drunken-driver victims' testimony stirs crowd

The Wayne County chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving eased into its holiday campaign last week with a press conference that began with boilerplate speeches by various officials and finished with two poignant stories by victims of drunken drivers.

The contrast was startling. After digesting the routine talks of Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano, Wayne County chief assistant prosecutor George Ward, state police Capt. Anthony Phillips and Dearborn Mayor Michael Guido, spectators felt their guts tighten as Speed and Joyce Gant poured out their story in a restrained emotional manner that would have filled a collection plate with 10s and 20s if one had been passed.

The Gants were driving 25 miles per hour in Detroit in March 1990 when a drunken driver doing 70 mph without the benefit of license, insurance or headlights hit them head on.

"Neither one of us saw him coming," Speed said. "I thought (Joyce) was dead and I'd just breathed my last breath."

As the two of them lay there — half in and half out of the car,

Speed with seven cracked ribs and a crushed hand, Joyce with a broken neck, fractured wrist and severe bruising — two men attempted to rob them. Luckily, the police arrived in time to prevent that final indignity.

"To tell you that I'm lucky is a major understatement," Joyce said. She wore a halo traction brace for three months thereafter, a device that "works on the principal of a vice. The pins were bolted to my skull. For three months I was unable to take a shower or a bath."

"The worst part of the whole thing was I didn't have any control over this. As long as there are drunken drivers on the road you don't have control over your own life. The next time you take a drink I want you to remember

this thing (the brace) and I want you to remember me."

Livonia resident Darlene Hodges had a similar story to tell about her son Craig.

Newly graduated from Franklin High School in 1989, Craig was on spring break in Florida with friends. Craig and one of his buddies were struck and killed by a drunken driver blowing a red light at 70 miles per hour.

"The man who killed my son was found four hours later, and at the time was found to have a blood alcohol level of .21," Hodges said. As it turned out, the drunken driver was on parole from a sentence served for killing two people in a previous accident.

"That pain will continue with me for the rest of my life," Hodges said. "My son's life is gone now forever, but hopefully not in vain."

The purpose behind all this testimony is to heighten popular sensitivity to how tragic a drunken-driving accident can be, particularly around the Christmas and New Year's holidays when folks tend to imbibe to excess and then some.

The severity of the punishment for drunken driving in Michigan has increased over the years, in part due to MADD's efforts.

A first offender can get up to 90 days in jail and a two-year suspended license.

Second offense: Up to one year in jail and revocation of license.

Third offense: Up to five years in jail and revocation of license.

In a drunken-driving accident causing death, one can be jailed up to 15 years and have his or her license revoked.

Of the 1,425 traffic fatalities in Michigan in 1991, 44.6 percent occurred in accidents where alcohol

played a part.

On the national level in 1990, there were 44,529 traffic accident deaths. It's estimated that 22,083 of them (49.6 percent) occurred in alcohol-related crashes.

MADD encourages Michigan residents to put red ribbons on their cars to show that they're opposed to drunken driving. Businesses all over town are distributing the ribbons. For more information, call MADD at 422-6233.

# Parents question policy on films shown in class

As a negligence lawsuit involving the death of Plymouth-Canton student winds its way through court, some parents are questioning whether films their children are shown in class are potentially harmful.

Stephen Nalepa, 8, of Canton Township hung himself March 24, 1990, the day after viewing "Nobody's Useless" at Gallimore Elementary School.

Attorneys for his parents, Larry and Debbie Nalepa, allege the schools were negligent in showing the movie about a handicapped boy who decides life is worth living after trying to take his own life. The main character first attempts to kill himself by jumping off a bridge, then by hanging himself with a belt.

"From what I know about the movie, I don't see any merit in it. If they think kids are going to get the whole point, that's making an awfully big judgment."

Teachers work hard, but "sometimes we don't always use a lot of common sense, and kids get lost in the shuffle," she added.

"At times, decisions are made that aren't in the kids' best interest. It's not the teachers' fault; it's a 'trickle-down' education. From a clinical standpoint, yes, they're right; the schools didn't do anything. But my kids have 30 students in their class. How is the teacher to know if something is having a negative effect?"

Wayne Circuit Judge Samuel Turner ruled recently that school officials were not negligent in Stephen's death. The decision is being appealed. "Nobody's Useless" hasn't been shown in the district since Stephen's death.

**Policy not followed**

The Nalepas' attorneys say that contrary to school district policy, parents were not informed of their right to challenge the use of the film.

"I heard about the movie on the 12 o'clock news the Monday after Stephen died," said Debbie Nalepa. "They were interviewing kids at the bus stop, and they said they knew the reason Steven died; they said he was just doing what he saw in the movie Friday. I thought, 'What movie?' I'd talked with the principal (Joyce Reeder) twice on Sunday and didn't hear a word about it."

Nalepa said Reeder later told her she hadn't seen the movie herself, but that it had redeeming qualities and wouldn't be banned.

Dr. Michael Homes, Plymouth-Canton assistant superintendent for instruction, declined comment because of the lawsuit.

The district's community relations director, Richard Egli, said teachers are "well-advised, certainly," to preview films; "it's just good basic teaching."

While parents do have recourse, "letters don't go home in advance of every movie being shown," said Egli. "If you did it for every resource, book or slide, it would be a difficult task."

**Policy defined**

School policy says: "In recognition that at various times there may be areas considered as controversial, the selection policy shall ensure that resources shall be... suitable to the age and intellectual capacity of the potential users, and avoiding sensationalism for its own sake. Standard review sources will be used as selection guides, beyond those evaluations made through actual examination or preview."

Egli said any film can be reviewed or challenged "by anyone who has concerns. Parents are certainly encouraged to work with teachers. We recognize the value of the teacher and the parent collaborating on a child's education."

"If parents have any questions about the kinds of resources in any class or grade level, they're welcome to ask teachers, and teachers will let them know what is being used." That's one of the reasons for parent-teacher conferences, he added. "It's not as though there is an inability to ask what is happening."

Judge Turner earlier held that the district's administrators and school board members are not entitled to governmental immunity in the suit. School district attorneys have appealed.

# Families strive to survive in homeless shelter

If it weren't for the Wayne County homeless shelter in Westland, Gail Zander and her family would be living in a car.

"This was our last resort, according to Zander's husband, Perry Looper.

"It's a great place for people to try to get their lives back together. It gives people a second chance."

Everything started to unravel for Zander, Looper and their three children, Natasha, 5, Bradley, 4, and Leonard (Fuzzy), 3, last December when a pipe-bomb went through a window in the Inkster home they were renting.

**Tough times**

Fragments of the bomb shattered Zander's jaw and penetrated her cheek. Almost a year later, her face is scarred and she continues to undergo surgery.

"I've been going downhill ever since that happened," Zander said.

She lost her job as a waitress. The family moved out of that house and into a Michigan Avenue motel where Looper had a job as maintenance manager.

It wasn't the best place to live, according to the couple, but at least it was somewhere to sleep. Even that fell through when Looper was fired.

Evicted from the hotel, the family went to live with a friend until

the house became too crowded. They had no money, and nowhere to turn. Zander said that the thought of living in a shelter made them nervous.

"We heard a lot of bad things about shelters," Looper said. "It's really much better than we imagined. I can't say enough good things about it."

Zander and Looper talked about their misfortunes inside a spacious shelter room with a large bed and three smaller cots for the children.

**Looking ahead**

They have 60 days - the maximum stay allowed in the shelter - to turn their lives around. It might be just enough time.

Looper, who has experience as a jeweler, recently went on a second interview at a jewelry shop in Southfield.

"Basically, right now, we're taking it day-to-day trying to find a house we can afford to rent," Looper said.

They came to the shelter during the height of a dispute between Wayne County and the agency hired to run the shelter - Wayne Metropolitan Community Services Inc.

Judge Gail McKnight of Westland's 18th District Court recently signed an order to evict the agency from offices on Henry Ruff and Michigan Avenue. Wayne Metropolitan is charged with

**BLOATING AND DISTENTION: A Distressful Abdominal Complaint**

Many people attribute bloating and distention to excessive bowel gas which is not necessarily the case. These individuals are suffering from a variation of the Irritable Bowel Syndrome that affects primarily the small bowel which gives them the sense of overdistention.

# New condominium to be raffled off

Lot 93 in the Lagoons of West Bloomfield subdivision now sits empty, nothing more than an empty parcel of land covered with construction debris.

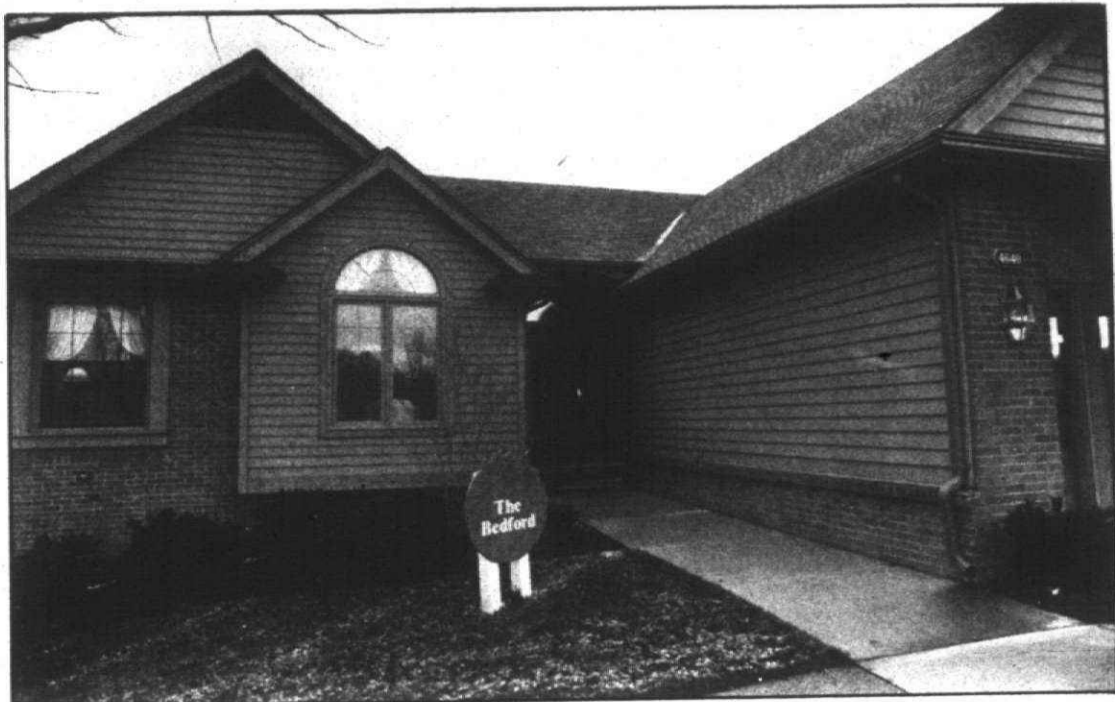
Highlights of the lot along Sandpiper Lane now include two mounds of frozen dirt, wood scraps and miniature red and orange flags placed to signify where electric and telephone cable wires are buried. Laying flat on the hard ground is a blue-and-white lot marker, with the number 93 painted on it.

But by this time in 1993, the debris probably will have been replaced by a sparkling new 1,570-square-foot condominium — compliments of the "Michigan Dream Sweepstakes House Raffle" fund-raiser.

Through the effort, sponsored by nonprofit Concerned Citizens for West Bloomfield, 5,000 raffle tickets priced at \$150 will be available beginning early in December. The goal is to sell at least half of them and raise \$500,000 for the proposed recreation activities center.

"If they don't sell 2,500 of the 5,000 tickets then there won't be a home made available, then it (fund-raiser) would revert to a 50-50 raffle," said Norm Finkelstein of Irvine-Jacobson Development, the company which is building the Lagoons subdivision near Pontiac Trail and Halstead.

But Finkelstein, a member of the activities center organizing committee, said he and others are optimistic the "Dream" raffle —

slated for 3 p.m. Feb. 21 at Pals restaurant, on Maple east of Orchard Lake Road — will succeed.

"Everybody seems to be very confident (about it)," Finkelstein said. "So much interest has been expressed already."

A barometer of that interest will be held 7-9 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 3, when an advance ticket

sale kickoff party will take place at the Lagoons model home. Tickets subsequently (on Dec. 7) will be made available to the public.

After the raffle, if it brings in the necessary amount of money, the home would be completed in about five to six months, Finkelstein said.

Meanwhile, people wanting to know what they might get for

their money can stop by the Lagoons to view the Bedford, an attractive brick-and-wood home featuring vaulted ceilings, walk-in closets and wide-open spaces.

"We're happy to show the home to anyone who is interested in buying a ticket," Finkelstein said.

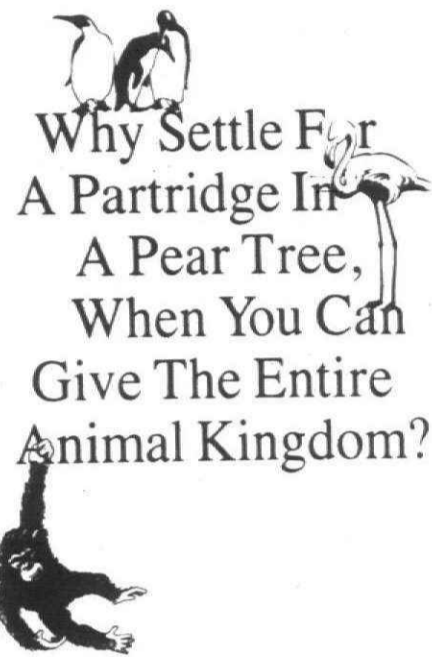

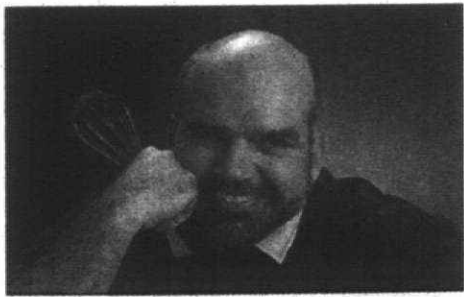

## Bring out the flavor of pasta with cheese

When Italian food is mentioned, the first to come to mind is pasta. The second? Cheese. Not just any old cheese or heaven forbid, something out of a shaker can. Something nutty, something sharp. Something to bring out the flavor of the pasta.

Ah, but what is good pasta without the customary grating of a fresh block of Parmesan, Asiago or Pecorino Romano cheese. A simple dusting. A complex outburst of taste.

Of course, too much of the so called "simple dusting" of cheese and you can undo all the good. No sense dwelling on the salt content, cholesterol and fat contents of these cheeses. Why spoil such a delectable experience? Let's face it, you don't want to mask the flavor of the pasta, but simply improve upon it.

If you haven't already guessed, good, aged cheese is as important as a fine grade of pasta. This wouldn't make a cake from scratch and top it off with canned icing? Why even consider doing the same with shaker-can Parmesan cheese and a plate of steaming pasta?

### Imported cheese

Unfortunately, imported grating cheese like Asiago, Parmesan and Romano aren't readily available in most markets and must be searched-out, usually in small local Italian groceries or gourmet-type food shops.

Every now and then, I stumble on one of those super "supermarkets" that have a deli with imported cheeses, but true Italian cooks look for the seals present on all imported cheese indicating its type and origin. Ask to see labels and rinds of the block. There are many varieties of grating cheese, both imported and domestic. The flavor difference always stands out.

Take Asiago, for instance. Asiago cheese is golden, nutty, and in my opinion, has more flavor than Parmesan and Romano. When I want to toss a simple pasta not covered with a flavorful sauce, I choose Asiago because it complements the pasta rather than covers it. Asiago can be purchased two ways, Stravecchio (very old) and Vecchio (old).

Of course, the best is the very old variety but in some markets, I've seen this priced as high as \$9.00 per pound. Look around and you should be able to find it in the \$6 per pound price range.

Don't think you have to purchase a pound. Four ounces will grate one cup of cheese. Be careful, once you try this flavorful and nutty variety, you'll be hooked.

### Perfect Parmesan

When it comes to Parmesan, the best variety available is called Parmigiano Reggiano, made the same way as it was in the 10th century. This is a finely textured, golden cheese and is very hard and aged to perfection. If you want the best, this is it. There is no other in comparison. Other dependable brands include Polenghi, Salbani and Locatelli but purists seek out the Parmigiano Reggiano.

Contrary to popular belief, imported Parmesan should have a light sweet flavor and be slightly nutty, and have almost no trace of saltiness. You'll pay even more for imported Parmesan than you will Asiago so shop around and check out the market deli areas for the best prices and trendy little Italian markets like Alcamo's in Dearborn for availabilities.

Romano is a hard white cheese that is somewhat salty in flavor, and has a tendency to be very sharp. Pecorino Romano is the best Romano available and when you see it called for in a recipe, I suggest using half Romano and half Parmesan or Asiago for an improved, less sharp flavor. Remember, you want to compliment, not overpower simple pasta.

### Great graters

Enough said about cheese, now a simple word on cheese graters. Every kitchen has (or should have) the standard hand grater with four sides and available at local houseware stores for about \$4. However, if you really want to get the best, search out the Mouli hand grater.

Now you're cooking Italian. Food processors such as the Cuisinart and mini-grinders can handle small chunks of cheese but because these grating varieties are best aged more than three years (and some for up to 10 years) they are extremely hard. Trying to cut them up into small chunks in a food processor is senseless. (I think this is the first bad word I've ever said about my Cuisinart).

When it comes to storing grating cheese, keep them tightly wrapped as they can impart flavors to other foods and vice versa. I've found that the freezer works best for long storage. (Just allow the cheese to come to room temperature after grating and before serving).

You have probably heard the old adage "they broke the mold when you were born." This doesn't hold true after spending a few hours with Lynne Rossetto Kasper, author of "The Splendid Table," (Copyright 1992, William Morrow Publishers, \$30, hard-cover).

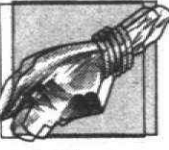
Kasper recently visited Kitchen Glamour in West Bloomfield, and prepared several recipes from her book.

Undoubtedly, you have heard me speak many a time of my Wyandotte upbringing and Kasper bears a very close resemblance to Mrs. Kopernick, a neighbor on Sycamore Street who shares Kasper's joy of cooking.

Mrs. Kopernick's claim to fame didn't come from writing the definitive cookbook of recipes from the Emilia-Romagna region of northern Italy like Kasper's, but her baked goods were the first to be snapped up at St. Joe's bake sales. Her zest of food, and it's many offerings were evident when, at Halloween, neighborhood goblins and pirates were treated to homemade popcorn balls. As her old Detroit Times carrier, I was treated to homemade fudge and cookies all tucked neatly among shards of tin foil in an Armstrong's shirt box.

Mrs. Kopernick was undoubtedly Kasper's precursor. An ardent traveler to Alcamo's Italian grocery in Dearborn, the Oaza Bakery and Ko-

walski's, she would arrive home carrying two of those French expanding string bags filled to the gills with ethnic goodies after the 30 minute bus ride on the Schafer express. Mrs. Kopernick passed away about 10 years ago but there's little doubt her spirit lives on in the likes of Lynne Rossetto Kasper.

A Brooklyn native with roots in the Emilia-Romagna area of northern Italy, (before arriving in New York) Kasper's culinary explore of recipes from the region explore the rich heritage from one of the best known food areas in the world.

Dubbed "The heartland of Northern Italian Food," this region is the home of real Parmesan-Reggiano cheese, Balsamic vinegar and the famed Prosciutto de Parma ham.

Kasper's roots are from the region, and after spending five years

there researching and learning from the locals, she compiled her book of recipes and basic information.

The book, and I hasten not to call it a cookbook because of the pages of stories about the region, is a compendium of recipes and cooking tips featuring the best of what any Italian would require to enjoy his or her last meal.

"Ask any Italian where to take only one meal in Italy, and, after recommending his mother's house, he will more than likely send you to Emilia-Romagna," writes Kasper.

Unlike most cookbooks, in addition to sharing the recipes of her homeland, Kasper incorporates stories from the region. For example, a short three paragraph story on the history of pasta claims that "it (the pasta) may have been born of crusts of bread discarded after Medieval

banquets... Once the bread was soaked with meat juices, they were thrown away to be gathered by peasants who waited eagerly for leftovers."

The book dissects nearly all forms of Italian pasta including colorful stories of Strozzapreti or "priest stranglers" thickly cut and hand twisted pasta and Sarganelli which are cut, placed on combs and rolled around quilled pens, the theory being that pasta not rolled smooth and instead is 'rough' holds the sauce better.

The recipes also include tips on "working ahead," wine and menu suggestions and the seldom seen "cook's notes" that end the recipe with those secret little tricks of the trade that separate a cook from a food preparer.

If learning more about the regional cooking of northern Italy intrigues you then Kasper's book should be a de rigeur addition to your kitchen library. Even if you don't choose to spend the time cooking, the short stories about the birth of prosciutto, balsamic vinegar et al are worth the price alone.

Mrs. Kopernick would have loved living next door to Lynne Rossetto Kasper and you will love Kasper's book.

Dust off the rolling pin, grease the cookie sheets, and find the cookie cutters — the holiday baking season has begun.

Seasons greetings — "Bah humbug" some people say, but if you like to cook, this is one of the best times of the year. If you're searching for ideas, one place to look is the newly published "An Edible Christmas: A Treasury of Recipes for the Holiday Season" by Irena Chalmers, (William Morrow & Co., \$23 hard-cover).

Beautifully illustrated with color photos, and easy-to-read type, this is a book any cook on holiday shopping list would treasure. It's also a good gift to buy yourself.

There are recipes for "Gifts in Jars" including Five-Alarm Salsa, jams and chutneys, crock of simmering potpourri spices, flavored vinegars, oils and vodkas.

Of course, there are cookie recipes — Apple and Nut Pockets, Cranberry-Orange Crunchies, Cinnamon Crisps, and Puff Angels to name a few. There are candy recipes, fun kitchen projects for the whole family like salt-dough Christmas ornaments, and party menus.

From the "Little Kitchen Collection," are two new cookbooks that make perfect stuffing or holiday hostess gifts — "The Chocolate Cookbook," by Patricia Lousada and "The Christmas Cookbook" by Marilyn Bright. (HarperCollins Publishers, hard-cover, \$7). These little books, 3 1/2 inches by 5 1/2 inches, are filled with delicious ideas. Illustrated throughout with four-color pictures,

"The Christmas Cookbook" includes 20 recipes to help celebrate the holidays in style with old-world tradition.

There are recipes from all over the world including Roast Goose with Apple Stuffing, Plum Pudding and Oyster Stew, and some lesser-known treats like Caramel Potatoes, Cranberry Chutney, and Homemade Marzipan.

Chocolate lovers are to enjoy "The Chocolate Cookbook." Surprise chocoholics in your family with one of the 20 wonderful treats including Black and White Terrine, Chocolate Cookies, Chocolate Fudge Pie, and White Chocolate Ice Cream.

When selecting a recipe, take into consideration your child's age and skill level. A preschooler will have a short attention span, but can enjoy simple "hands on" tasks such as breaking eggs into a bowl, mixing the dough with a spoon and decorating.

A school-age children, on the other hand, will be able to assist with measuring, rolling and cutting, and more elaborate decorating.

## OATMEAL GINGERBREAD COOKIES

- 1 cup (2 sticks) margarine or butter, softened
- ¾ cup firmly packed brown sugar
- ½ cup molasses
- 1 egg
- 3½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1½ cups Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger

½ teaspoon ground nutmeg  
 ¼ teaspoon baking soda  
 ¼ teaspoon salt (optional)  
 Decorations  
 Prepared frosting  
 Assorted candies

For cookies, beat margarine and sugar until creamy. Add molasses and egg; beat well. Add combined flour, oats, spices, baking soda and salt; mix well. Chill 2 hours.

Heat oven to 350 F. On floured surface, roll dough out to ¼-inch thickness for a chewy cookie or ½-inch thickness for a crisp cookie. Cut with 5-inch gingerbread man or woman cookie cutter. Bake on un-

greased cookie sheet 8 to 10 minutes. Cool 1 minute on cookie sheet; remove to wire rack. Cool completely. For decorations, frost and decorate with candies as desired.

Store loosely covered at room temperature. Yield about 20 five-inch cookies.

To make cookies into hanging ornaments, cut hole near top of cookie with drinking straw before baking. Repeat immediately after baking if hole closes.

## CHOCOLATE COOKIES

- 4 egg whites

2½ cups confectioner's sugar  
 ½ cup cocoa powder  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 1 teaspoon powdered instant coffee

1 tablespoon water  
 Scant cup of whole walnuts, very finely chopped

Preheat the oven to 350 F. Line a baking sheet with baking parchment. Using an electric beater, whisk the egg whites until frothy. Add the sugar, cocoa, flour, coffee, and water to the bowl and beat first at a slow speed and then at a higher speed for a few minutes until the mixture thickens.

Fold in the walnuts. Place tablespoons of the mixture on the prepared baking sheet leaving a 1 inch space between each spoonful. Bake for 15 minutes. The top will be firm and cracked, but the inside still soft. Lift off the cookies and place them on a rack to cool. Yield: 18 cookies.

## CINNAMON CRISPS

- 8 tablespoons (1 stick) unsalted butter, softened
  - ½ cup plus 1 tablespoon sugar
  - 1 large egg yolk
  - ½ teaspoon vanilla
  - ¼ cup all-purpose flour
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
  - ½ teaspoon salt
  - 24 walnut halves
- Preheat the oven to 375 F. Butter 2 baking sheets.
- In a medium bowl, using a hand-held electric mixer set at high speed, beat the butter until creamy, about 1 minute. Add the sugar and continue beating until the mixture is light in color and texture, about 2 additional minutes. Beat in the yolk and vanilla.
- Sift the flour, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt onto a sheet of waxed paper. Using a wooden

spoon, work the dry ingredients into the creamed mixture to form a stiff dough. Scrape the dough onto another sheet of waxed paper and form into a thick log about 8 inches long. Wrap the log in waxed paper and refrigerate until chilled and firm, about 1 hour.

Using a sharp knife, cut the chilled dough into 24 slices, each ½ 16 inch thick. Arrange the slices about 2 inches apart on the prepared baking sheets. Flatten the slices slightly with a fork, and top each with a walnut half.

Bake until golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes. Let cool on the baking sheets for 2 minutes, then transfer to wire racks to cool completely. The cookies will keep, stored in an airtight container, at room temperature, for 3 days. Makes 24 cookies.

# Grated cheese enhances flavor

## HOT ARTICHOKE SPREAD

- 1 cup fresh grated Parmesan or Asiago cheese
- 1 cup mayonnaise (not salad dressing)
- 1 can artichoke hearts (not the marinated variety)

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Place in a small ovenproof casserole and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Pop under broiler till golden. Serve with crackers, bread-cubes, cornichons or fresh vegetables. (Grate in a small onion for different flavor)

## PARMESAN BAKED CHICKEN

- 3 lbs. chicken thighs and drumsticks
  - 2 cups milk
  - ½ cup plain breadcrumbs
  - ½ cup fresh grated Parmesan or Asiago cheese
  - 1 egg, beaten
  - 3 tablespoons olive oil
- Place chicken in a bowl with milk and refrigerate at least one hour. Combine breadcrumbs with par-

mesan cheese. Pat chicken dry, then dip in beaten egg and coat well in breadcrumb and Parmesan cheese mixture. Place skin side up on a lightly oiled pan and drizzle with olive oil. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Serves 4.

Chef's suggestion: Try this with some finely chopped seafood instead of the bacon or with simple steamed and chopped vegetables for a vegetarian treat!

## CAESAR SALAD DRESSING

- 1 clove garlic, finely diced
  - 2 anchovies (optional)
  - 1 coddled egg
  - the juice of ½ lemon
  - dash tobacco
  - dash Worcestershire
  - ¼ cup wine vinegar
  - ½ cup imported Italian olive oil
  - ½ cup fresh grated Parmesan or Asiago cheese
- Mash garlic with anchovies. Add the egg and beat. Add the juice of the lemon and beat until well mixed. Stir in tobacco, Worcestershire and vinegar. Mix well. While beating, slowly add the olive oil in a slow, steady stream. Just before serving, add grated cheese. Mix well and toss with fresh greens and homemade croutons, if desired.
- This dressing is great with all greens.

## BAKED TOMATOES FLORENTINE

- 4 strips cooked bacon, diced
  - 4 medium tomatoes
  - 1 package (10 oz.) frozen spinach, thawed
  - ¼ cup fresh grated Parmesan or Asiago cheese
  - ½ cup breadcrumbs
- Chop bacon, set aside. Slice tops off tomatoes and scoop out centers. Squeeze as much of the water out of spinach as possible. Place spinach in a bowl. Scoop out center of tomatoes and place in bowl with spinach and remaining ingredients. Mix well.
- Stuff tomato shells with mixture and bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Serves 4.

## INSALATA DI PROSCIUTTO E ACETO BALSAMICO

- Salad of Tart Greens with prosciutto and Balsamic Vinegar
- 1 medium red onion, sliced, into rings
- ½ cup red wine vinegar
- 1 small head each of romaine, radicchio, red leaf lettuce and curly endive
- ½ cup (2 oz) toasted pine nuts
- ¾ whole scallions, thin sliced on the diagonal
- 3 ounces Italian Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese shaved with a vegetable peeler into thick curls
- 3 ounces thinly sliced Prosciutto di Parma, cut into bite-sized squares
- 1 cup lightly packed fresh basil leaves
- 1 cup parsley leaves
- 8 large cloves garlic, diced about ½ cup extra virgin olive oil
- 3-6 tablespoons Balsamic vinegar
- 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- about 1 tablespoon dark brown sugar
- salt and fresh ground pepper to taste

the olive oil over very low heat for 8 minutes or until barely colored. Remove with a slotted spoon and reserve. Turn the heat to medium high and add the vinegars to the oil. Cook a few moments or until the acid has diffused slightly. Add brown sugar to taste and allow the mixture to bubble slowly 1 minute. Taste for sweetness and allow to cool slightly. Stir in extra virgin sugar or Balsamic vinegar if needed.

If the dressing is too sharp simmer briefly to boil off the vinegar's acid. Set aside till ready to serve.

To serve: Top with drained red onions and scatter the rest of the scallions pine nuts, cheese and prosciutto over the salad. Reheat

## PATATE MESE

- Basil and onion mashed potatoes
- 5 pounds small red skin potatoes
- 1 to 1½ cups milk
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 2 large onions, minced
- ½ cup minced Italian parsley
- 2 large cloves garlic, minced
- ½ cup fresh minced basil leaves
- ½ cup water
- salt and fresh ground black pepper to taste

oil 1 cup (4 ounces) fresh grated Parmesan-Reggiano cheese

Scrub the potatoes and place them in a 6-quart pot with enough cold water to cover. Put the lid in place and set the pot over high heat. Bring the water to a lively bubble. Adjust the heat so that the potatoes do not boil over and keep the pot partially covered.

Cook potatoes 15-20 minutes or until easily pierced with a fork. Meanwhile, pour 1 cup of the milk, the butter and 1 tablespoon of olive oil into a bowl. While the potatoes are cooking, heat the remaining three tablespoons of oil into a 12-inch skillet over high heat. Add the

onions and all but 2 tablespoons of the parsley. Turn the heat to medium low and cover. Cook 15 minutes or until the onions are soft and clear. Stir occasionally. Uncover and cook over medium high heat, stirring frequently for 8 minutes or until the onions are golden brown. Then stir in the garlic and basil and cook another minute. Add the water and scrape up any bits left in the skillet. Season with salt and pepper. Turn into a large bowl. When the potatoes are tender, drain and peel them. Pass the hot potatoes through a coarse blade of a food mill set over a large bowl or mash them with a potato masher. Blend the potatoes with the ingredients in the bottom of the bowl. Season to taste. If the potatoes seem dry, add

more milk. The mixture should be like very thick whipped cream, but not so loose that it will not hold a high mound on a spoon.

Lightly oil a shallow 2½ quart baking dish. Spread half the potato mixture over the bottom of the dish. Top with half the cheese and then spread the remaining potatoes over this. Sprinkle with the rest of the cheese.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly cover the potatoes with aluminum foil and bake 30 minutes or until hot in the center. Just before serving, sprinkle with remaining parsley. Serve hot.

## Some women's mags are thick as a brick

A while back I was sitting at a dentist's office waiting to get a tooth pulled. As usual in the world of medical professionals, it was going to be a little wait.

The dentist motioned to a small rack with three magazines in it—“Money,” “Time” and “U.S. News and World Reporting.”

“Oh,” he said. “I’ll get you a women’s magazine.”

A women’s magazine?

In a blinding flash of bad judgment, since this man was about to be yanking a tooth out of my mouth, I said in what I hoped was a withering manner, “These look like women’s magazines to me.”

The dentist sort of laughed nervously, probably mostly concerned with getting away from this evil feminist woman.

It’s not that I haven’t read a few women’s magazines in my time, it’s just that the dentist seemed to think I couldn’t trouble my little self with such weighty matters as world affairs and money management.

Hey, maybe I would sometimes rather read “10 Ways to Make Your Man Your Love Slave” than “10 Promising Money Market Funds,” but I don’t want anyone assuming anything.

My main problem with women’s magazines is that they assume that women are seriously dense, weight-obsessed and desperate for a man. OK, I admit it, at some point during my life, weight-obsessed and/or desperate for a man have been my main personality traits, but it was a passing thing.

Women’s magazines assume this is a constant state. This might be because most women’s mags are controlled by men. (“Sassy” is an exception). Knowing this, it becomes less surprising that women’s mags were the first to trumpet the supposed man shortage and the last to give up the idea that women should pretty much do anything to get a dude.

I know this sounds really paranoid like Oliver Stone or something, but it seems like women’s magazines are designed to make women think about stupid things. It all starts with “Seventeen” and “YM” (Young Miss). You are supposed to start with those, move on to “Glamour” and “Mademoiselle,” graduate to “Redbook” and “Women’s Day,” then finally progress to “L’Esprit.”

So far no one has yet to hit

upon the idea of marketing to boy-crazy 80-year-olds. Feature: “He Offers to Share His Creamed Peas With You... Is It LOVE?”

I picked up a copy of “YM” at the library. In one of the many quizzes about boys scattered throughout the magazine, there was one called “Are You Girlfriend Material or Always a Pal?” Question two says, “You’re meeting your best friend’s boyfriend for the first time. You: A. grin and slap him on the back; B. smile and shake his hand; C. purr behind and drape yourself over him like a new suit.”

Now, about this answer C, one of the two “correct” answers. Just how is it that you drape yourself over someone “like a new suit” anyway? I should be trying things like this? On my friend’s boyfriend?

Then there’s this weight-obsessed thing. Take a look at “Better Homes and Gardens,” “Women’s Day” or any of the other mags for the 25-44-year-old—I guarantee that every single one of them will have something about losing weight on the cover and something about a fattening chocolate dessert.

Here’s what the cover of “Good Housekeeping” says: “Exclusive Diana’s Exercises” and “Sweets, Savories and the World’s Best Brownies.” Don’t these stories cancel each other out?

Finally, there’s the women-are-dense problem. In a household tips column, the writer said we should be solving the problem of chipped dishes by wrapping each and every dish in a towel. Isn’t this sort of expensive, not to mention a waste of time? In a “Most Admired Women” poll, “Good Housekeeping” gives the choices in most of the magazines, the articles are short; the words small; and the subject matter limited.

This would be OK except no men’s magazines are this insane. Compare “Esquire” to “Rampage” or “Details” to “Glamour.” The men’s magazines talk about the mags, entertainment and living a life. The women’s talk about tips to keep a man interested and how to make the perfect pot holders.

And somehow, that doesn’t seem fair.

Few have bothered to listen or acknowledge Clarke’s success here despite Warrior Soul being number one on many metal charts with its 1991 album, “Drugs, God and the New Republic.” At the time, Clarke was irate at what he

perceived as an oversight by the print media and radio.

He’s obviously mellowed since then. Warrior Soul is in the midst of its first headline to after succeeding opening slots for Metallica, Soundgarden and Queensryche.

“Once the ball is rolling, Detroit will jump on it,” Clarke said.

Not at all. Grows the Livonia native on his latest release on David Geffen Records: “We stack the courts and we tax the poor/Got Johnny Lurchbox to fight our wars... Tax him to his knees and make him love the flag/We got corporate freedom. He gets a body bag.”

At times, the onslaught of apocalyptic visions of disintegration, hopelessness and despair on “Salutations from the Ghetto Nation” become overbearing especially when weighted down by pounding metal guitars. There’s no rainbows here.

“There’s some definite throwing up your arms in the air on this album,” said Clarke, whose band performs Friday, Dec. 4, at the Ritz in Roseville. “Sometimes that’s just the way you feel.”

“Other parts of the album I’m 18 and I don’t know what I want... It goes through all the emotions.”

Clarke’s musical career has spanned more than 10 years and includes everything from slaying punk to blistering hard rock. He performed in local outfits such as L7 (not the California all-female outfit) and Trial before venturing to New York to form Warrior Soul.

His musical journey has been marked by candor. He speaks his mind, spilling bile indiscriminately and never apologizing for its messiness.

Social commentaries about himself can be equally oblique. He carves up bitter introspection in songs such as “Punk and Belligerent,” which was written in anger after a brief separation from his wife.

Declares Clarke on the power chord proclamation: “I’m going out tonight/And I’m going out drinking/Don’t bother waiting up/Cause I’m coming home stinking.”

# Aladdin' rekindles Disney's classic spell

A new golden age for Disney animation? The artistic and popular success of "Beauty and the Beast" and "The Little Mermaid" certainly hints at it. Though not of the same caliber, "Aladdin" provides a good-natured blend of rollercoaster adventure and non-stop gags.

Aladdin, a handsome young thief, lives off his wits on the mean streets of Agrabah. When he saves the life of a young maiden in the marketplace, he realizes only later that she is the Sultan's daughter Jasmine.

The Sultan's advisor Jafar — tall, black-robed, and bearing more than a passing resemblance to an older Joan Crawford — uses

Aladdin to acquire a magical lamp that will grant three wishes. The sand-monster who possesses it insists that only this noble boy can enter his gaping mouth to retrieve it.

There's plenty of adventure along the way, especially involving a flying carpet brought alive through the magic of computer animation. You can count on it to swoosh beneath Aladdin when he's falling deep into a chasm or playfully toppling off Jasmine's veranda.

Disney made one of its best moves ever when recruiting Howard Ashman and Harold Menken to score these pictures. Lyricist Ashman contributed three clever songs to the project before his death last year. Tim Rice, collaborator with Andrew Lloyd Webber on "Jesus Christ Superstar" and "Evita," added another two.

The tunes range from thoughtful to raucous, from jivey Broad-

way tributes to modern Whitney Houston-style ballads. Best are the spirited ones, including "One Jump Ahead," as Aladdin outwits palace guards, and "Friend Like Me," where the Genie from the lamp unleashes a garish display of his powers.

Robin Williams, who provides the Genie's voice, dominates "Aladdin's" second half. You'd almost think he directed the animation, since the nonstop barrage of rapid fire gags completely plays into his over-the-edge comic style.

He appears as a game show host telling Aladdin what he can and can't order from the lamp. In the flash of a second, he transforms his gassy physique into caricatures of Groucho Marx, Jack Nicholson, commentators at Macy's parade, and even Disney's Pinocchio.

And while he is truly outrageous, the craziness make it hard to focus on the movie's underlying

message. Be yourself, "Aladdin" says, and keep your word, including Aladdin's broken promise to the Genie that one of his wishes will be used to release the spirit from slavery.

Disney cartoons thrive on their timelessness. "Pinocchio" and "Snow White," from Disney's original Golden Age in the 1930s and '40s, can be reissued from here to eternity because they exist in their own unique world.

How will future generations view "Aladdin's" topical gags during the film's 2012 re-release? Probably the same way we look today at the vintage Warner Brothers cartoons, where animators tried to outdo each other with the most gags per minute.

"Aladdin" doesn't possess the emotional clarity and meticulous eye for atmosphere that distinguish the best Disney features. But don't let that stop you from having a great time on this well-crafted magic carpet ride.

## Film offers an insightful look at lives of 2 brothers

Garbage man Dominick Luciano goes through life with a smile on his face, eagerly planning a birthday outing to Wrestlemania and dreaming of the day his brother Eugene becomes a successful doctor and they move to a nice house on a lake. The brothers are fraternal twins, older by 12 minutes Dominick has been "slow" since he was injured in a childhood fall.

The fine 1988 film "Dominick and Eugene" looks at the lives of the brothers, very well played by Tom Hulce and Ray Liotta, at a time when some changes are likely. Dominick holds his job and is pretty independent, if gullible. He tends to believe the outrageous stories spouted as gospel by a co-worker.

Dominick supports his brother, who is finishing his internship and wants to do his residency at Stanford, far from their home in Pittsburgh.

The brothers, whose parents are both dead, have been inseparable for years but their relationship isn't ideal. Strained by the

demands of medical school, Eugene can blow up at his brother when he forgets to walk his dog or won't stop talking in the middle of the night. Eugene is quick-tempered but saves his real fury for a guy who takes advantage of Dominick.

Hulce is very good as Dominick, who is concerned that maybe he is stupid, not just slow. Without being maudlin or overwrought, he makes Eugene a real person who is dealing with some extra challenges and basically doing pretty well.

Dominick has befriended a boy who lives along his trash collection route and shares his love of

comic books. For his trouble, Dominick is berated by the boy's abusive father.

When Dominick witnesses his young friend being abused by his father, the shock and terror on his face reaches far beyond what he has just seen. It's a heartbreaking scene, as the painful memories flood over Dominick who is too distraught to speak. Hulce plays the scene very well, making Dominick's subsequent action noble and completely well intentioned.

Director Robert M. Young keeps the film on a steady course that avoids the pitfalls of melodrama. These are people who care deeply for each other but some-

times inflict the most damage on those they love most.

## Kickers caused game to change

Walt Bazylewicz, a long-time football coach in the Detroit Catholic League, has never been too fond of placekickers.

He didn't even need one when his coaching career began about 40 years ago at Detroit St. Thomas High School.

"When I first started coaching at Lodge Park on the east side, we didn't even have goal posts," he said.

To hear 'Bazy' tell it, he could still do without goal posts.

As football modernized, Bazylewicz hesitated to accept field goals — especially from a converted soccer player who didn't play offense or defense.

Bazylewicz had no problem with a 200-pound lineman trying a point-after-touchdown kick but watching a guy half the size of his teammates come in on fourth down to attempt a long field goal wasn't his idea of football.

"It's a foreign part of the game," said Bazylewicz, currently an assistant at the University of Detroit-Jesuit High School after spending the previous three seasons as Redford Bishop Borgess coach.

Now, you must understand 'Bazy' is a great guy — as friendly as they come — he just comes from the old school and thinks it's a crime to see a defensive team do a good job, stop the offense on the 40, then have "some guy who is not even an athlete kick a 50-yard field goal."

(Bazy probably doesn't watch too many soccer games because those guys are pretty good athletes.)

Bazylewicz began really turning on placekickers after hearing former Miami Dolphins kicker Garo Yepremian describe a winning kick on television.

"He said, 'I kick a de touchdown,'" Bazylewicz recalled. "He didn't even know it was called a field goal."

Redford Catholic Central's Adam Borchert speaks fluent English and is a good athlete, but like Yepremian, only handles the placekicking and kickoffs. His other after-school duty includes playing soccer for CC coach Phil LaJoy.

CC coach Tom Mach used to be against the idea of having a placekicker on loan from the school's soccer team.

But after watching Borchert make field goals to beat Troy and Utica Eisenhower in the playoffs, he's glad he changed his mind.

"I always felt if you weren't on the team, doing things you're supposed to do every day, it would be hard to step in and kick it," Mach said. "But with time and age, you get a little smarter in some ways."

Kerry Zavagnin was the first soccer/football player Mach used, beginning in 1990. Mach was leery at first about having a part-time kicker.

"Not after I saw him kick," said Mach.

Bill Lelich, who owns a franchise for Scouting Report, a recruiting service that markets high school athletes to colleges, is trying to make up for the mess a colleague made.

Two months ago, I wrote a story about how Scouting Report's Jeff Silverman allegedly left Michigan after taking \$650 from several families in the area. Silverman, who according to sources is working for a weight-loss company in San Diego, Calif., left without coming close to fulfilling any of his obligations to clients.

"Every industry is going to have a 'bad apple,'" said Lelich, a 1974 Birmingham Brother Rice graduate who makes his home in Birmingham. "My objective and our industry's objective is to weed out these people. We don't need any unscrupulous, unethical operators."

Lelich bought a Scouting Report franchise in April, 1992. He has spent the last couple months trying to make up for Silverman's unannounced departure last spring by contacting some of Silverman's clients and following through with the original promises.

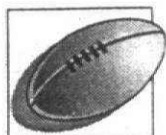
"I feel it's my responsibility to come to their rescue," Lelich said. "We're dealing with athletes who have devoted their lives to academics and athletics. Silverman has destroyed dreams and it's very disheartening to them. I felt it was terribly unethical and promptly contacted the media and all the families."

Lelich played on Rice's '74 Class A basketball championship team and he was a letterwinner for the University of Michigan in 1977 with Rickey Green and Phil Hubbard. He earned business and speech degrees at U-M and a master's degree in business administration at the University of Detroit.

"I can empathize with the thousands of non-blue chip athletes who are interested in playing college sports," Lelich said.

# Shamrocks regain state crown



Redford Catholic Central captured its third state football championship under coach Tom Mach with a thrilling 21-20 victory over Saginaw Arthur Hill in a rematch of last year's final.

Redford Catholic Central's football team carried out its season-long credo that "the magic is in the believing."

The Shamrocks willed their way to the school's third state championship, capping a 13-0 season Saturday with a spellbinding 21-20 victory over Saginaw Arthur Hill before 15,404 at the Pontiac Silverdome.

The game pitted two unbeaten teams that were ranked No. 1 and 2 all season long.

It was a virtual replay of last year's Class AA final, with a slightly different twist. It was only a year ago that Arthur Hill upset the Shamrocks, 13-12, but this time it was CC's turn for redemption.

"I've been in a lot of big games, but this is one of the greatest because it went back and forth," Catholic Central coach Tom Mach said. "We didn't want to go through the whole season like we did last year and not win the 13th game."

"Our team showed tremendous determination. They were down three times and wouldn't be beat."

Mach, noted over the years for his smash-mouth, ball-control style offense, orchestrated a game plan that kept Arthur Hill's defense off balance.

The eventual game-winning touchdown came with 1:09 left in the third quarter and the Shamrocks staring at 20-14 deficit.

Junior Freddie Taylor, who had 90 yards in 19 carries on the day, surprised Arthur Hill when he completed a 37-yard halfback pass to Brady Pankow for a touchdown.

Adam Borchert drilled through the extra point, his third of the day, to give CC a one-point lead.

CC then dug in defensively, stopping the Lumberjacks' last-ditch drive in the final quarter.

With only five seconds remaining and Arthur Hill on the CC 47-yard line, senior quarterback Marvin Wright, who was brilliant in defeat with 286 yards total offense, zipped a pass over the middle to a wide-open Kedrick Redeemer just inside the 20.

The ball, partially deflected by CC's Ken Rys, bounced into the hands of Redeemer, who could not hang on for the grab despite a clear path to the end zone.

"I'm sure this is as difficult for me to be in this position as it was for Catholic Central last year," Arthur Hill coach Jim Eurick told the press gathering afterward. "We played it hard and we played it fair, but we got beat by one point and we have to accept it."

"They (CC) just hit the heck out of you. I was impressed with their offensive line. They left tread marks on our backs and at the end of the game our kids were dog-tired."

It would seem, however, that the Lumberjacks would never get tired running or throwing out of their option attack.

They racked up 393 total net yards to CC's 286.

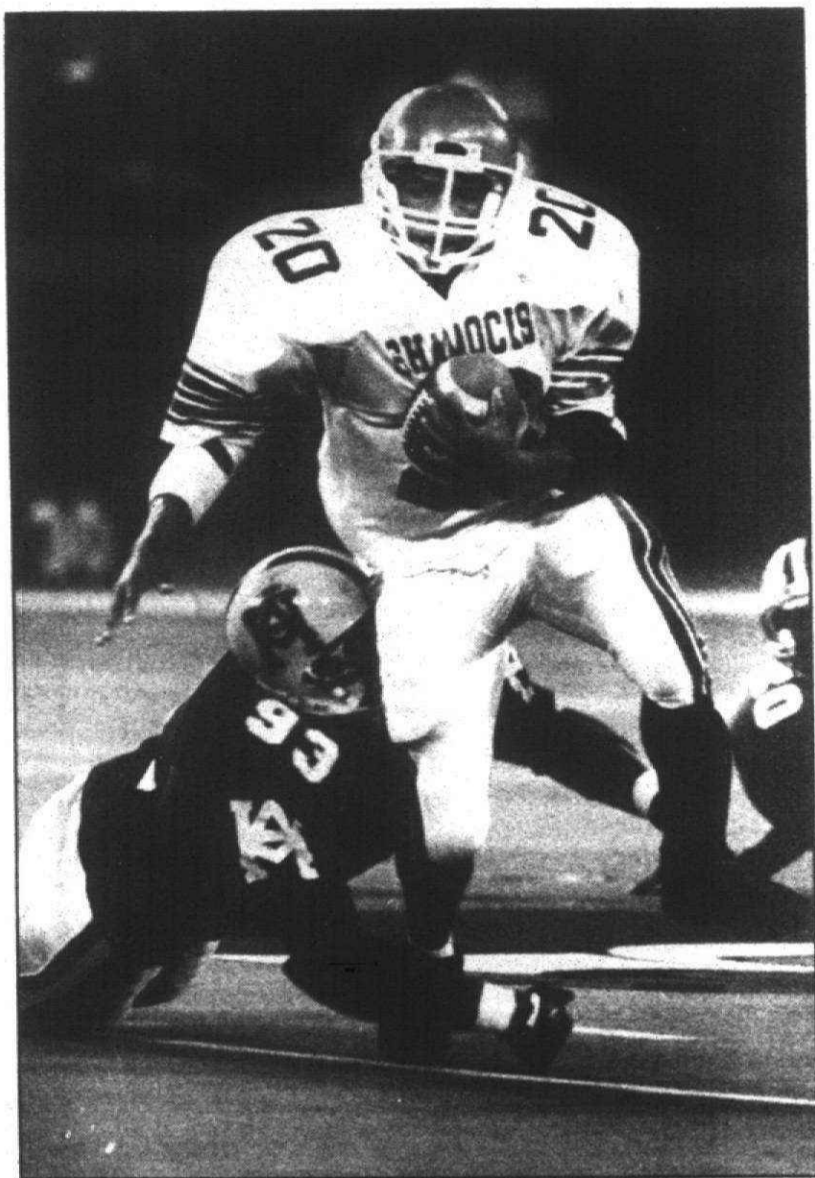
Speedy tailback Howard Foster, who led all rushers with 108 yards in 12 carries, scored on a perfect pitch from Wright from 5 yards out with 4:03 left in the opening quarter, capping an 80-yard, 11-play drive.

But Wright, a 6-foot-2, 197-pound senior, missed the extra point, a play that would loom large the rest of the way.

CC took a 7-6 lead early in the second quarter when Taylor broke the plane of the goal line from 2 yards out. The drive covered 72 yards in 10 plays.

Wright, dangerous at both running (89 yards) and passing (170), then burst through the heart of the CC de-

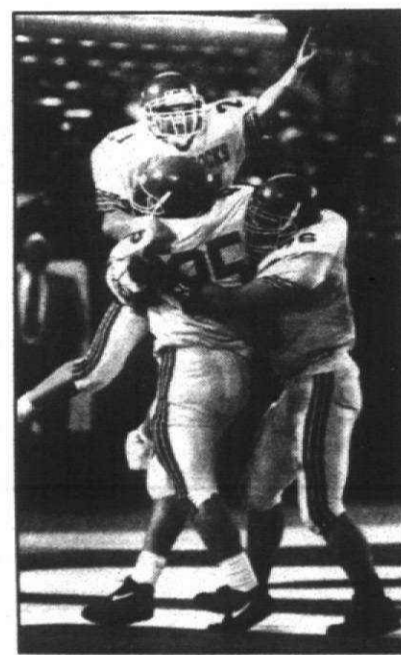

## Forward pass key to CC victory

Brady Pankow contributes in many ways to the Redford Catholic Central football team, but rarely on offense.

His forte is defense, where he plays in the secondary, and he also returns punts and kickoffs.

Pankow added another role Saturday when he became a star wide receiver in the Class AA championship game at the Silverdome.

The Livonia senior caught three passes for 99 yards, including the game-tying touchdown, as the Shamrocks opened their offense and defeated Saginaw Arthur Hill 21-20.

"If you follow us, you know we don't throw too many passes," said Pankow, who understated the usually conservative CC offense.

"We were working on the pass all week and it hit me: Oh, my gosh, I have to be a receiver, too. I have to make something happen on offense."

CC coach Tom Mach told Pankow on Friday that he would catch two passes, but Pankow didn't anticipate the big plays that kept CC in contention with the explosive Lumberjacks and eventually propelled it to victory.

Fred Taylor threw a 37-yard, halfback-option pass to Pankow, who got

behind the defense and ran the final 15 yards to the end zone. The TD tied the score at 20 late in the third quarter, and Adam Borchert kicked the decisive extra point.

"It was mostly adrenaline that helped me put in there," Pankow said. "I was so tired because I usually don't play offense so much."

The play was all the more amazing because Taylor threw the ball with a sore right shoulder, which he hurt when he landed on it diving for a pass in the Catholic League title game.

"(Mach) said he was going to try it," Taylor said, adding the Shamrocks had only practiced the play but never completed it. "I was concerned because of my shoulder. (Mach) said 'Don't worry about it. You won't feel any pain in the game.'"

Taylor had trouble getting the ball ready to launch at first, which might have helped cause the deep defender to take the run fake.

"There was a rush and I thought

someone was going to get me," he said. "Brady was supposed to hesitate, and I didn't know if it was going to get open. I was kinda scared, but he got open."

Pankow, who had three receptions for 18 yards in the first 12 games, also caught a 60-yard pass from quarterback Chris Barbara, putting CC on the Arthur Hill 4 in the second quarter. That helped the Shamrocks take a 14-12 lead.

"I knew Chris could get it out to me; he has the arm to get it there," Pankow said. "I told Chris to 'do something with it. If you get it to me, I want the big play.' I was kicking touchdown all the way."

That pass made possible one of the fastest drives in CC history. How the Shamrocks got 80 yards plays? The last TD also was a quick strike for CC — eight and 91 yards.

Barbara completed three of four passes for 75 yards. The Shamrocks rushed for 182 — swingback John Raasch was an effective runner with 75 yards on nine carries — but complemented that with 112 passing yards.

## Blazers coast into 'A' hoop quarterfinal

"The key was to take their guards out of the game," Kavanaugh said. "We wanted to double-

team and trap them into the sidelines. We knew the Baileys would get their points, but if you can't get the ball to them, they can't score."

Ladywood, which led 43-23 at intermission, outscored the Bears 20-7 in the third quarter before going on a 24-7 run in the final period.

It turned out to be a night of fun and frivolity as 12 of Ladywood's 14 players who saw action scored, led by sophomore forward Tara Overatitis, who pumped in a game-high 17 points.

Tracey Mocon, a 5-11 senior, came off the bench to score 12, while 5-6 junior guard Sara Kavanaugh contributed nine, including a pair of three-pointers in the final period.

"There are a lot of personalities on this team," Kavanaugh said. "It's a fun group. It's a big part of playing in this program. If they're not having a good time, then something is wrong."





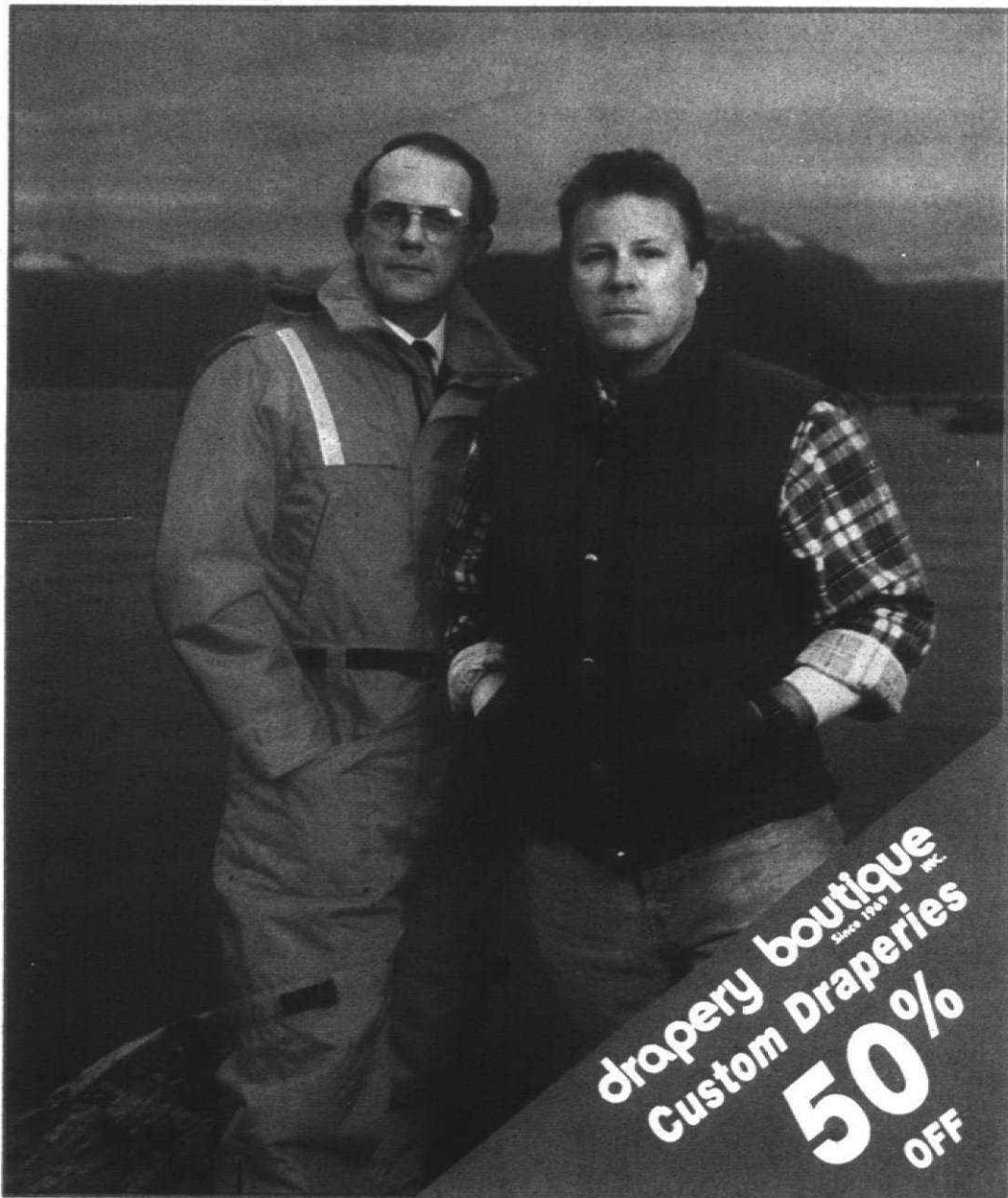

Liza Minnelli says she inherited her drive from her mother, Judy Garland, and her dreams from her father, Oscar-winning director Vincente Minnelli.

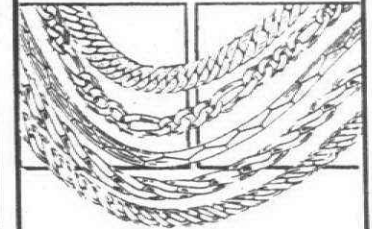

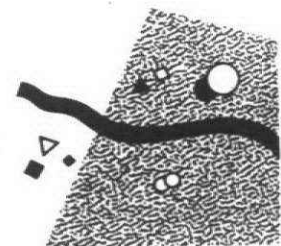

# 'Dead Ahead' a powerful indictment

## HBO chronicles Exxon Valdez oil spill

Moments after midnight on Friday, March 24, 1989, Exxon's oil tanker, The Valdez, ran aground on a reef in Alaska's Prince William Sound. The accident ruptured several of the ship's storage tanks and eventually spilled 11 million gallons of oil into the sea. Over 1,000 miles of previously pristine shoreline were affected and the impact on the area's wildlife was colossal, killing nearly 400,000 birds and thousands of fish and land animals. The most conservative scientific estimates say the true toll of the event will not be sufficiently appreciated until well into the next century.

On Saturday, Dec. 12, HBO unveils *Dead Ahead: The Exxon Valdez Disaster*, a dramatic chronicle of the event and its aftermath.

Christopher Lloyd stars as Frank Iarossi, an Exxon executive in charge of shipping. Within hours after the Valdez accident, Iarossi is awakened in his Houston home and

dispatched to Alaska to ensure the safe containment of the tanker's remaining oil and oversee Exxon's role in the massive cleanup. What follows, however, is day after day of finger-pointing, name-calling and argument, as Exxon, the Alyeska pipeline consortium, various environmentalist groups and even the Coast Guard squabble over who's to blame, who should do what and whose head(s) should roll.

*Dead Ahead* producer Leslie Woodhead says the real problem became shockingly clear as he and his staff did their 18 months of research. "What was going on," he says, "was an attempt on all parts to clean up their own image, rather than clean up the oil spill." The result, he charges, was a "devastating inertia" in mobilizing cleanup efforts, making the disaster far worse than it had to be.

John Heard co-stars as environmentalist Dan Lawn and David Morse plays outraged fisherman Rick Steiner. Rip Torn appears briefly as Adm. Paul Yost.

Each of the film's principals, as well as the supporting players and many extras, contributes to the film's urgency. Director Paul Seed keeps the story moving swiftly and makes effective use of archival footage of the actual event.

The actor frequently tours with his band, Manly Moondog and the Three Kool Kats (they appeared on the ABC in Concert: Halloween Jam at Universal Studios special), and other than in a surprise speaking engagement at his alma mater, this is probably the best way to catch him in person. 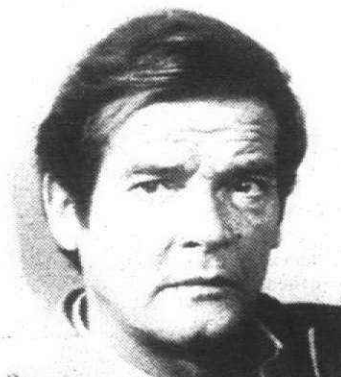

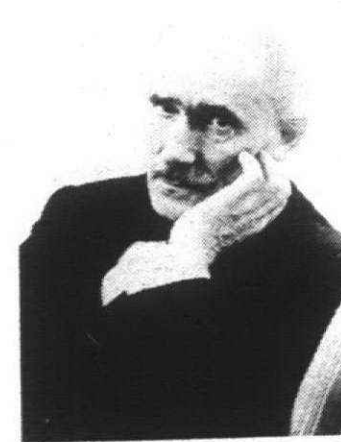
The movie marks the first TV project in 16 years for Moore.
