# IKEA rumors not confirmed by company

What some have called "the worst kept secret in history" that IKEA, the Swedish-based furniture retailer - is coming to Canton surfaced again this week with a published report quoting a state official as saying the company is definitely going to build in the township.

While such rumors have been circulating for over a year, IKEA has yet to confirm them.

Joseph Roth, an IKEA

spokesman, said he wasn't sure of the source of the most recent story.

"Perhaps the statement was taken out of context and she (a state official) was just referring to companies who were considering Michigan," he said. "We haven't submitted anything to any municipality in southeast Michigan yet."

Canton Township Supervisor Tom Yack referred telephone calls about the report to Bryan Amann, a Canton attorney who is the local counsel for IKEA. Amann said he had "no comment" about the published report. "They're hoping to make an announcement about something before the end of the year," he said. "From all outward appearances it appears they're close to a decision," Yack said Wednesday. "To my knowledge they still have not submitted an application to the planning department. That usually triggers the process."

IKEA reportedly was originally looking at a site east of I-275 and Ford Road, although more recently the site has been changed to that of the old Super KMart, west and north of the

intersection. "They've been in and out of our building for a long time," Yack said. "They've been gathering information, looking at the ordinances we have, doing their due diligence. We usually see that as part of a large project, not a small one." Yack said he thought other

retailers would welcome the addition of IKEA to the community.

"I've talked to a fair number of commercial people, big and small alike, and they almost uniformly would welcome a retailer like IKEA.



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# Marchers brave the elements

Inclement
weather no
problem as band
claims
first-place trophy



The U.S. Postal Service doesn't have anything over the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park Marching Band when it comes to dedication and determination.

The P-CEP marchers delivered their dynamic and powerful eight-minute performance, "The Train Man Cometh," at Jenison High School near Grand Rapids on Oct. 16, during some of the worst weather in recent marching season history.

Rain, sleet, wind and even a few flakes of snow didn't deter the hometown award-winning performers from capturing the Flight I first-place trophy, all three Flight I captions for Best Marching, Best Music and Best General Effect along with the highest score of the 24 competing bands. And it definitely didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the diehard band fans pounding out muffled ovations through gloved hands.

"They did a great job," said a pleased Brad Green, assistant marching band director. "It was really the first week we experienced a consistency of cold and wet weather and this whole week they worked really hard and exceeded our expectations in the way they rehearsed. Then they came

out here and had a great performance."

And that great performance took place even after a last-minute decision was made to pull the 36-member colorguard from the field due to the physically challenging nature of their program.

"It was decided because of the extremely high demand of their performance, complicated by the wind and the rain," explained Green.

"It was a wise decision since it would have been a danger to them as well as the musicians."

Also missing from the icy rain-soaked field was the electronic equipment and the plumes from the marchers' hats.

"Tonight was really, really cold," said Canton freshman Sarah Hallinen, who plays the clarinet. "It was so cold we couldn't feel our fingers."

"This is the worst weather we've ever seen," said mellophone player Blake Belden, a Salem junior.

"It was very hard to focus. We had to keep away all the thoughts that were telling us our bodies were hurting and just focus on doing the show. Our fingers were numb and felt like they were going to explode. I felt like I didn't really want to be there, but as long as I was I decided I might as well throw down and do my best."

That's exactly what senior Kavita Srivastava, one of three P-CEP drum majors this year, witnessed of the entire band.

"The past two days have been the best two days of rehearsal of the season so far,"

she said. "We had a great rehearsal even today and that's exactly how the show was too. We decided we had to do our best in spite of the awful weather."

And that was no easy task.

The 187 marchers practiced six hours in the icy rain and wind before boarding the buses for the west side of the state where conditions worsened after nightfall before the P-CEPers performed.

To complicate matters, the cold makes wind instruments go flat while it causes percussion instruments to go very sharp according to Green.

"Taking everything into consideration," said Green, "they did an amazing job. We're very proud of them."

Next up for the P-CEP marchers are the state championships at the Pontiac Silverdome Oct. 30, featuring 40 of the state's top marching bands.

# Hulsing remembered for her civic contributions

Esther Hulsing, along with her husband Ken, wanted to leave Plymouth a better place than they found it after moving from Chicago in 1942.

Over the next 59 years,
Hulsing was the president of
more than 20 local organizations and a member of many
more as she found her life's
calling as a civic and community leader. Hulsing, 89, died
Oct. 2 at an adult foster care
home in Aloha, Ore., after
struggling the past 18 months
with Alzheimer's disease.

"She really had a strong view that you should give back to the community, and leave a place better than how you found it," said her daughter, Mary Hulsing Fehrs, who resides in Aloha.

Hulsing's civic contributions included being involved with her three daughters in the Girl Scouts for more than 30 years, serving as troop leader and on the national board.

She served on the committee that established Schoolcraft Community College in Livonia, was a charter member of the American Association of University Women and a founder of the Plymouth Community Arts Council.

"Esther attended all events at the Arts Council until she moved out of the area," said Stella Greene, PCAC executive director. "She was always available for advice and mentoring, and you could always depend on her to give sound, intelligent, insightful advice and direction. She was a class act."

Hulsing was elected Plymouth Township clerk in 1980, and held that position

years.
Like her husband, Hulsing served on the Plymouth-Canton school

board. She was

elected in June
1954 and served 18 years,
including six as president.
Hulsing was board president
when Salem High School, the
first of the three high schools at
Centennial Educational Park,
opened in September 1970.

Hulsing Elementary in Canton Township was named for Esther and Ken, the first school in the district to be named for someone other than a teacher or principal.

Charlie Jones, the media specialist at Plymouth High School, was the first media specialist at Hulsing Elementary when it opened in 1976. He invited the Hulsings to a book fair in Feb. 1978, where they signed books for students.

"They went into each classroom and visited with the kids,"
remembers Jones. "They even
went out in the playground, in
the winter, and the kids pushed
them on the swings. They both
told me they enjoyed it."

In recognition of her work in conservation, Hulsing was honored at the White House where President George H.W. Bush presented her with the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Award.

A memorial service will be held at 11 a.m. on Saturday, Feb. 19 at St. John's Episcopal Church in Plymouth, with remembrances to the Hulsing Fund, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, 454 S. Harvey, Plymouth, MI, 48170.

allowed one sign per candidate. "We took down the two little. ones and left the big one up." she said. "My husband went to church on Saturday night and when he came back that one was painted over."

# Stabbing case goes to prosecutor

Canton Police received and responded to a 911 call to the Windsor Woods Apartment Complex at Warren and Morton Taylor Roads shortly after 9. p.m. Oct. 18 on a report of a woman screaming.

Officers arrived and saw fresh blood in and around an apartment building.

Subsequent investigation located an uninjured woman hiding nearby in the bushes. The officers were able to trace the woman back to a specific apartment and upon entering that apartment they found a white male bleeding profusely from the neck area.

Canton Fire and Advanced Life Support were called and

transported the victim to St. Mary hospital where he was treated for his wound. The wound, although serious, was determined not to be life threatening.

The investigation by the detective bureau concluded that the victim and the woman had an argument that ended up with the woman stabbing the victim in the neck with a broken liquor bottle narrowly missing the victim's artery.

The case remains under investigation and will be forwarded to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Officer for review at the conclusion of the investigation.

# partner for services

As the holiday season approaches, many community groups and churches will be collecting food, toys and clothing for those who are less fortunate and need a helping hand.

And, while that is all well and good, the fact remains many of those same people need help the remainder of the year.

As a result, the Plymouth Community United Way and the Plymouth Salvation Army, are the main anchors of nearly 30 human service agencies, churches and service organizations that are pooling their money and services into a Human Services Collaborative serving Plymouth and Canton.

"We kept hearing about duplication of services, and people going from church to church seeking services," said Marie Morrow, president of the PCUW. "Some people have needs that weren't being met because they couldn't find who had the services. Some groups and organizations have more than others."

The clearinghouse for the money and directory of services will be the Salvation Army. Bill Moritz, social services director, said many times those in need don't know where to search for help.

"When someone is in need or desperate for help, they don't want to hear call this number or call that number, or go here or go there," said Moritz. "It will be nice for them to go to one place to get the help they need without going all over the place."

The idea, still in the planning stages, is for the groups involved to give money from their budgets to the collaborative so that small amounts of money will grow to one large sum for those who need help.

"All the money will be used to help people, not for administration costs," promised Moritz.
"We're trying to get churches and organizations to donate to one account from line items in their own budgets."

The PCUW has already stepped up to the plate with a \$15,000 donation to help pay utility bills until The Heat and Warmth Fund (THAW) is replenished next month.

"We don't have any other commitments monetarily, yet," said Mortiz. "But, the groups seem excited to be part of the whole communication process and using each other as a resource."

Chris Distelrath, pastoral minister at St. John Neumann Catholic Church in Canton Township, attended the initial two meetings.

"I think this is a fabulous idea, and one that needs to happen," Distelrath said. "We tend to live in our own little islands, but we need to connect with each other to provide better services, stop the abusers and get help to people who need it."

Distelrath said there are some who know how to "work" the system, getting help from a number of groups and using up valuable resources.

"Some go from church to church or agency to agency and know the system, getting help one time from each," she said. "We need to give people a helping hand and not necessarily just hand outs, to fix the core problems and get their lives straightened out."

And for those who need a helping hand, Distelrath said, "Paperwork tends to swallow people up, causing them major headaches. The collaborative can help give hope to people."

Morrow believes there's a lot of future potential in the Human Resources Collaborative.

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
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



"And I check their voting record," Kirchgatter said. As a local official, she's especially concerned that people elected to office are in tune with local concerns.

Fedus, also an AAUW member, will vote no on both the gambling and marriage proposals, and is more negative on the marriage proposal as a bad precedent. to vote Democratic more often, but has campaigned for local Republicans. "Things start at the grassroots," said Fedus, who considers local races important as well.

"I hope that we don't have a problem like we did in 2000," she said.

Women didn't win the vote nationwide until 1920 with a constitutional amendment, so Kirchgatter, Edell and Fedus agree it's important for women, and all voters, to head to the polls and make informed decisions.

"Even if they don't vote for my candidate, I want them to get out and vote," Fedus said.

"It's important to look at each candidate and vote your conscience," added Kirchgatter, who has no Democratic opponent in her township race. "They need to you with an open mind.





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# McCotter discusses school aid plan in Iraq

U.S. Rep. Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, is scheduled to return today from a trip

to Iraq. McCotter, who left with a group of five other members of Congress Sunday, said in a teleconference from Dublin that he wanted to assess progress in the war since his visit last Halloween. He will also be meeting with Iraqi education leaders about a program with the Northville school district to provide assistance for a school for special needs students in Baghdad.

Leonard Rezmierski, superintendent of Northville Schools, said he asked McCotter to investigate whether an exchange of ideas and assistance would be possible under the current war circumstances.

Rezmierski said the Northville district has a long history of providing education for students with multiple needs. The district helped set up a special needs school in Afghanistan in the late 1990s and has assisted schools in other countries.

The first thing you want to do in terms of the school system is to see what the school structure is like over there and see if schools have been harassed or intimidated by the situation and the problems over there," McCotter said. "I want to see if they have programs and what their special needs are if any and then see how we can facilitate if possible with Iraqi education ministry and Northville Public Schools to do it."

McCotter said he wants to see if the education ministry is in a position to handle funds and that the funds are properly applied.

Rezmierski said he was concerned that the situation was safe enough so that district personnel could work with Iraqi officials. He said the

district would be supplying its expertise in working with special needs children and working with prosthetic equipment

to assist students. "I would hope that once we get the green light that we could have something set up in

two to three weeks,"

Rezmierski said. McCotter and the other members of Congress will meet with Interim Iraqi Prime Minister Iyad Allawi. McCotter said he wants to see if any progress has been made in building more grassroots support and he said they will be allowed to venture outside the protected Green Zone.

"I want to see if town councils have been utilized, have they been given projects, have they been targeted by terrorists, what have we done to develop the building blocks of democracy," McCotter said.

McCotter said he will also be meeting with Michigan service personnel as he did on his last



Callahan: Sentencing guidelines are helpful to society so that it is assured that people who have been convicted of crimes, will generally receive the same sentence. This also assists a judge so that there are no gross disparities between the sentencing of one individual as opposed to another based upon identical facts. They do however, limit a judge in taking into account special or mitigating circumstances and, therefore, reduces, to a large part, a judge's



discretion in sentencing. Pierce: When used

properly, sentencing guidelines can be very helpful to a judge. They are a useful tool to make sure all relevant factors are considered when sentencing a defendant. However, they should not take the place of a careful, independent evaluation of each

Callahan: A trial judge is sworn to uphold the Constitution of the State of Michigan, of the United States, the Statutes of the State of Michigan and Court Rules applicable to litigation, as well as, precedence setting case law. Although all of the above is subject to interpretation, interpretation of the aforementioned should closely follow previous Court of Appeals and Supreme

Court's Decisions. The Court

of Appeals and the Supreme

Court of the State have the luxury of modifying law based on the will of the public. A trial court does not have that

Pierce: My philosophy is that every person who comes in contact with the judicial system is entitled to be treated with dignity and respect. Whether you are a litigant, a victim, a criminal defendant or a witness, the judge should do his or her best to be courteous, timely and fair.

3. Do you think election of judges serves the best interest of the judicial system?

Callahan: Election of judges does serve the best interest of the judicial system and the public. If Judges were chosen by appointment as opposed to being elected, party favoritism would overwhelm the judicial system and the public as a whole would have its franchise diluted.

Pierce: I strongly believe in the election of judges. Judges should be accountable to the communities they serve. I would like to see a change in how we finance judicial campaigns. Our current system affects the independence of the judiciary and erodes public confidence in the system.

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# Six trustee hopefuls comment on Canton Patterson group

The six candidates for Canton Township trustee four Republicans and two Democrats - spoke to about 125 audience members at Monday night's candidates' night sponsored by the Canton Chamber of Commerce

Here's a summary of some of the comments by the candidates:

Karl Zarbo, an incumbent in his first term who was appointed 21 months ago, on

Bill Rice, Democrat, a GM production worker and a former member of the Plymouth Symphony board, on growth:

"I'm not sure we can continue to build and build and build. How do we generate funds to maintain services? It is a tricky situation. People want some (development) slowdown. I think we can make Canton even better."

Rice also said we should explore regionalization of the Detroit water system.

Godfrey Aguwa, the other Democrat and a longtime state rehab counselor who has lived in Canton five years, on diversity:

"I can be an asset to Canton. I was born in Nigeria but I've been in Michigan 24 years.'

Aguwa admits Canton is diverse but "what puzzles me is the entire township doesn't have diversity in government. Everybody's voice needs to be heard."

On becoming a city: "Canton should be a city ... because we are growing a lot," the state. We must pay

Todd Lajoy, a 27-year resident of Canton, Salem High grad and current Chamber president, on diversity:

The Liberty Fest is a celebration of Canton's (various) people." Lajoy said the township's 11-member Human **Relations Commission helps** with diversity issues.

."We can try to a better job getting more people involved" in government. It is important for trustees to be out in the community," LaJoy said.

On the city vs. township issue, Lajoy said:

"I favor Canton remaining a township. Canton has trained for the long marathon. Things like roads will take some time." Fixing the intersections is "being proactive," he

"I love this hometown and I understand Canton."

Melissa McLaughlin, the veteran of the group with 12 years as a trustee and 13 years as a planning commissioner. on Canton's challenges:

'We are addressing issues on Ford Road. Canton funding will be a challenge because we are losing millions in revenue sharing from attention to maturing neighborhoods to keep them

attractive to young families. "We are raising the bar" for developers and businesses coming into Canton, she said.

'Quality breeds quality. Canton is a forward-thinking community. This is not an accident. It is part of good management."

Todd Caccamo, a former Marine and a businessman, was the final speaker:

"I believe there are things worth fighting for. I am not a politician. I don't owe developers or lawyers or politicians a thing. I would have a conservative slant on spending. Canton is involved in running golf courses and theaters. We should fund these with private funds. We need to grow at a reasonable

"Governments need to get out of the way. The Big Boy (sign) hassle could have been avoided?

There has been "extravagant spending" in Canton Caccamo said.

"Is Canton a great place? You bet."

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# studies electric choice issues

Senator Bruce Patterson, (R-Canton), chairman of the State Senate's standing committee on technology and energy, had a group of "critical thinkers" he appointed earlier this fall explore electric choice and reliability.

Their study was to look at "electrical deregulation" in the state after passage of the laws in 2000 that allowed consumers to shop for electricity.

"These (2000) laws were just a step in a process," Patterson said Tuesday.

"Otherwise, we would not have asked for annual reports from the Michigan Public Service Commission. The laws were an experiment. The struggle is not to put the burden on residential customers. The question is: Do we have a level playing field?"

Only a handful of residential customers ever benefited from the "shop around for power" law, Patterson said. No one could deliver cheaper electricity to homes.

The big beneficiary was smaller businesses, schools and light industry, Patterson said. Some would call the savings these business and governmental customers have found "smart shopping," while others would call it "cherry picking" by the alternative electrical suppliers, he said.

DTE thinks that if it loses enough of these middle tier customers - as many as 6,000 to 8,000 — "then it has a business model it can not sustain" Patterson said. The cap on residential rates comes off in 2006 and on small business commercial rates in 2005; both groups could see an increase in rates.

The issue will be before the committee when the legislacure reconvenes after the elec tion. They will look at Senate Bills 1331-1336, a series of six laws which would change again how electricity is bought and sold.

DTE Energy is supporting the new Senate bills; alternative energy companies like Dillon Energy Services of Grosse Pointe are not. Dillon is an 18-month-old company that counts the Plymouth-Canton schools among its customers.

"These bills are totally unnecessary. Senate Bill 1331 destroys the ability of Alternative Electric Suppliers (AES's) to provide competitively priced power to Michigan customers by requiring them to pay DTE a charge equal to the amount that customers save," Gary Dillon of Dillon Energy said in a written statement.

"According to all credible independent organizations, including the well-respected Senate Fiscal Agency, these bills will increase electric bills for Michigan families, schools and businesses, at a time when Michigan needs lower rates, not higher. DTE charges its customers some of the highest rates in the Midwest, and the only way Michigan's ratepayers have been able to get relief has been through competition," Dillon said.

A group of alternative suppliers is mounting opposition through their organization (www.customerchoicecoalition.com). Spokesman Dave Waymire said DTE energy "needs to be more efficient. "These (Senate bills) do

nothing to cut rates. The proposed legislation means higher rates for everyone," Waymire said. "DTE rates are well above regional averages. Their rate for big manufactuers is 40 percent higher than the rate you'd get if you moved to Indiana."

Waymire said the Patterson hearings were helpful in exploding myths about the reliability of Michigan's electrical service. The Patterson work group

studied several issues including "Return of Retail Open Access" and the benchmarking of progress to precise goals and objectives already existing in law.

The group discussed the annual report required of the MPSC by Public Act 141; it performed an analysis of the interim order entered in the currently pending Detroit Edison rate case; it received a detailed presentation of transmission over the Midwest Grid from industry experts; and, it reviewed various matters relative to the implementation by the MPSC of P.A. 141/142 of 2000, the Electric Choice and Reliability Act.

Patterson observed that specific action might now be taken at the next regularly scheduled meeting of his

However, he went on to say that action would depend on the individual committee members.

"There is a certain criticality to the commodity we know as electricity. The Legislature, the governor and the MPSC must do the very best job possible to devise a long-term plan to ensure the greatest level of reliability in the system, as well as the affordability and availability of this energy source to the widest range of consumers because of the fact that our society and civilization are dependent on it," Patterson

The one thing no one wants is a repeat of the August 2003 blackout, Patterson said.

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

However, when it got to Gov. Jennifer Granholm's desk. she vetoed it because, she said, she was already considering other human resources consolidation.

Still, that bill, as much as the others he's taken on, show LaJoy is learning quickly how to become a relevant legislator. We recommend he be re-elected.



# It should be no surprise country is bitterly divided

ike all of us, I've been swamped by the torrents of fact, opinion, spin and diatribe surrounding this presidential election. And I've been trying to figure out just why we as a nation are so deeply and narrowly divided. I've concluded there is something important — but little noticed — going on that is shaping the very structure of our politics in a profound way.

For the past 70 years or so, America has operated under a kind of consensus social contract. The parties have squabbled about the details a bit, but the core has largely kept us together as a nation. Ever since they came in,

however, President Bush's administration has mounted a comprehensive, powerful, well-organized and utterly focused national effort to restructure that. They would revise:

The distribution of the tax burden among our citizens. (Namely, via the tax cuts for the wealthy.)

Power

Which generation pays
our common debts. (The current record deficits will be
paid down not by us, but by
our children and grandchildren, if ever.)

■ The legal status of sexual preference (reflected in support for a Constitutional amendment forbidding gay marriage).
■ The definition of life itself (through oppo-

sition to a woman's right to choose an abortion).

Our traditional reliance on a network of

alliances and support for the existing international system (jeopardized by the administration's unilateralism and willingness to advocate a doctrine of preventive war).

The underlying truth is that not only is it far

from being particularly "compassionate," the Bush administration is most certainly not "conservative." Instead, it is proposing the most radical set of social, economic and legal changes this country has seen at least since the days of Franklin D. Roosevelt, substituting the events of 9/11 for the Great Depression.

Given the extraordinary reach of this

Given the extraordinary reach of this attempt to undo our traditional social contract, is it any wonder the nation is so profoundly divided, that our politics are so acidly partisan and that President Bush is widely regarded as the most polarizing president of modern times?

Sure, Karl Rove's brilliant political machine and national grief and rage at 9/11 have been big contributors to this administration's success. Beyond these, however, lie two fundamental facts: Major developing changes in national demography and the reality of direct democracy for all people, regardless of where they live or go to college.

The great demographic shift in America over the past 70 years has been the enormous population growth in the South and West at the expense of the Eastern seaboard and the Midwest. Back in the 1970s, Michigan had 19 seats in the House of Representatives; today we're down to 15, and may lose more. Florida, on the other hand, had eight congressmen in 1960 and has 25 now.

It's always hard to make generalizations, but people who live in the South and West are unlike those who live in the East and Midwest. They're inclined to be more religious, and their religion tends to be more socially conservative. They're less likely to have attended elite universities like Harvard, Yale and even the University of Michigan. And historically they've been left out of the "Eastern Establishment" that has largely run the country for generations. But now there is a steady and undeniable influence of these rising regions on our politics.

Consider the trajectory from Franklin D.
Roosevelt (a WASP aristocrat from New York)
to Richard Nixon (a lawyer from small-town
California) to Jimmy Carter (a sometime
peanut farmer from Georgia) to Bill Clinton
(Arkansas by affect, Oxford by education) and
George W. Bush (assertively Texan, despite his
heritage.) The political center of gravity of the
country is shifting.

And to their surprise and chagrin, members of the Eastern Establishment, accustomed to governing, now find themselves in competition with folks from the South and the West. And this gives rise to feelings of class: Eastern elites (snobs, to southerners and westerners) vs. populist folks (lower-class rednecks, to Eastern elitists). And when you add the emotional energy of class conflict to a far-reaching policy agenda, it's no surprise our politics are as divisive and nasty as they are.

So perhaps the largest and most puzzlingly unspoken issue in the current campaign is not who would be best at winning the war on terror or providing jobs, but who can bring our nation back together. Neither George W. Bush nor John Kerry has done more than dance around that very important issue.

Too bad the debates are over. Wouldn't you just love to hear what both men would really say about that?

# Proposal 1: A reluctant 'No'

On Election Day, voters will be asked to approve Proposal 1, a state constitutional amendment that would make it much harder to start new forms of gambling anywhere in Michigan.

If enacted, it would require both a local and a statewide vote in every case before any new gambling would be allowed. That means, for example, that if Hazel Park wanted to add video gaming — the so-called "racinos" — to boost the dwindling revenues of its racetrack, it could only do so after both a local and a statewide vote on the matter.

Practically speaking, that would mean no new gambling would ever be approved. And that seems highly sensible at first glance. We've got casinos, racetracks, various lotteries and scarcely need more ways for people to throw their hard-earned money away.

Yet there is more to this than meets the eye. What this is, in fact, is a crass attempt by

the casino interests to stifle any potential competition. One of the Detroit casinos, MGM Grand, has donated more than \$3.5 million to the drive to pass Proposal 1.

million to the drive to pass Proposal 1.

The Chippewa Indians, who own Soaring
Eagle in Mount Pleasant, have tossed in \$3.2

million, and the list goes on.

Nobody wants more gambling. But locking the casino monopoly into our constitution would be both a tawdry precedent and a dangerous one. Gov. Jennifer Granholm worries it might hurt the state's ability to do creative things with the lottery. The Michigan

Education Association has similar fears.

New gambling should usually be severely limited, if not prohibited. But doing so is the job of local officials and our state legislators, who get paid to make tough decisions. We don't need the casinos making our decisions for us.

Vote no on Proposal 1.

# Warren Evans earns support for full term

Wayne County voters have a choice between two sheriffs Nov. 2.

Warren Evans, appointed in January 2003 to replace Robert Ficano when Ficano became county executive, is being challenged by Bill Lucas, Wayne County's sheriff from 1969-82 and the first Wayne County executive from 1982-86.

Both candidates have long careers in law enforcement, both have extensive administrative experience and both have law degrees. At 76, Lucas is still energetic and

offers perceptive criticism of current department operations. Evans, 55, is the first to say that age is not a factor and that he welcomes his former mentor's interest in remaining an active citizen.

While we respect Bill

Lucas' service and enthusiasm, we endorse the election

of Warren Evans to a full term as sheriff.

In 18 months as sheriff Evans has put an emphasis on programs that help county police forces fight crime. He has worked with local police agencies to develop programs to centralize fugitive apprehension, created the Last Call unit to apprehend drunken drivers who have failed to appear in court, created a missing and exploited children's program and restored the Internet crime program to target sexual predators. He continues to advocate for

creation of a central crime data base and more cooperation and coordination with local police departments. He has been aggressive in pursuing state and federal grant money for innovative crime fighting programs.

The \$115 million budget continues to be

a point of contention between Evans and Ficano. Evans has made extensive cuts in positions and reduced overtime at the jail. Still, there needs to be more communication between the sheriff and the county executive and less political maneuvering.


Evans maintains that morale in his

Evans maintains that morale in his department is generally high. He faced opposition from several deputies in the primary, but he said they do not represent the majority in his department.

We like Evans' theme of collaboration with the sheriff's department being a central service agency for county police operations and believe he has made the right moves in that direction.

We support Garrett and Youngblood for re-election against their token opposition.





# Keep air clean throughout house

Every winter homeowners look for ways to maintain their health.

Robert Bowers, owner of Cool Run Environmental Systems in Canton and instructor at Northwestern Institute of Technology in Southfield, has a few pointers for them, but what he has to say doesn't direct attention to an individual's physical health.

It has to do with their homes and how to keep the indoor air

cleaner. Homeowners should activate their humidifiers for winter once the temperatures hit the 40 degree range. The additional moisture in the air help dust particles get bigger, which helps them collect in the furnace's filter, Bowers said.

"The filter needs to be replaced once a month,' Bowers said.

Humidifiers can save as much as \$15 a month on gas bills, as the moister air retains heat more efficiently than dry air, Bowers said. "If a home is properly humidified at 70

degrees, you might have to heat it to 74 without the humidifier" to maintain the same level of comfort, Bowers said.

Without a humidifier on in the winter, a home's air can be drier than the Gobi Desert, Bowers said. That dryness creates large gaps in wood flooring. "Wood flooring will shrink, paint and drywall can crack and nails pop," Bowers said. A 35-40 percent range of humidity is ideal during the cold win-

ter months. The temperature should be maintained between 68 and 70 degrees. Microorganisms can double or triple when the temperature is outside that range, Bowers said.

When you dust and vacuum, be sure to turn on the fans. Bowers said. That's a detail often overlooked by homeowners, but the dirt and dust will more likely to enter the furnace's air intake ducts. "All the dirt and dust will be retained by the filter," Bowers said.

The ultraviolet light system on a furnace is another new household trend. Bowers is installing 10 of them next week. "They kill micro-organisms in the duct system," Bowers said. The system can cost in the range between \$400 and \$1,000.

Homeowners should check their furnaces, air ducts and their home's overall air quality because it is critical to home maintenance and comfort, and family members' health, Bowers said. Many calls deal with de-activated pilot lights and shut off furnaces due to dirty air filters.

"They should make sure their humidifier is ready to go and the chimney doesn't have any obstruction," Bowers said. "A lot of people think it's a scam, but that's not the case." Pilot lights will not stay lit if carbon dioxide levels are too high, so homeowners can get their air checked for carbon dioxide levels."

# Decorating great room presents a challenge

We've just moved into our dream house. A two-story great room and hardwood floors are what we've always wanted, but accessorizing and hanging artwork on those 18 feet high walls is much more challenging than we expected. How do we warm up this room and create a homey feel?

-Randy and Elaine, Canton. You've just described a common question raised by the owners of newer homes. A beautiful, open floor plan with soaring ceilings has


tremendous drama and presence. When decorating these rooms, you must consider many more factors than with rooms that have standard 8foot ceilings. These factors include color, acoustics, scale and proportion.

Color: A large, open space tends to dilute the intensity of a wall color. Some people will choose the same pale beige color that they loved so much in their older home. When applied to the large, open space, it just looks white.

Intensify your color choice by a couple of shades. When choosing your wall color, don't forget the ceiling color. A ceiling that is 18-feet high doesn't call for the standard ceiling white. There is no need to

make the ceiling look higher. The ceiling color can be the same as the wall color, or two shades lighter than the wall color. Remember that you are trying to make the space look warm and cozy. By sticking to the same color palette, or paint card throughout the entire room, the room will look uni-

Acoustics: This category is too often overlooked. When dealing with high ceilings and hardwood floors, sometimes you'll get the gymnasium effect. You need textiles to prevent the sound from bouncing all over the room.



Simple picture molding can be added on the upper half of the walls in squares or rectangles mimicking a large-scale, raised panel look.

That means obtaining area rugs, upholstered furniture pieces, and draperies. Avoid vertical blinds as a stand-alone window treatment. They offer almost no acoustical benefit and they will heighten an already tall room. Large tapestries work wonderfully in these rooms as they provide additional drama while absorbing much of the noise.

Scale and proportion: These items are important when decorating large spaces. Resist the temptation to hang your artwork 10 feet off of the floor. Standard size sofa paintings are far too small when hung individually. Instead think about groupings of several pieces of art or larger paintings that are scaled for these tall walls.

Another idea is to visually shorten a wall with architectural detail. Use a built-up crown molding along with a hefty base molding. Simple picture molding can be added on the upper half of the walls in squares or rectangles mimicking a large scale, raised

panel look. (See photo.) Take advantage of these tall

walls to display creative art. I've already mentioned tapestries, but sculptural reliefs and metal scrollwork are a couple of options to consider.

Scale and proportion should be a consideration in your accessory selection as well. Many small knickknacks will only add confusion and clutter. Large rooms require large pieces. A few, carefully selected, large accessories are preferable to a hodge-podge of small knickknacks.

When decorating your new great room, be deliberate in all of your selections. Use the guidelines of color, acoustics, scale and proportion to achieve your goal of warmth and hominess. You'll both be thrilled with the results and your new room will have the drama and pizzazz you had hoped for.

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

If you think "fine china" and "everyday" don't go together, think again.

Tableware designer Annie Morhauser encourages you to take your china out of the closet and put it on the table, and to do so more often.

"My credo is dining should be a feast for the eye as well as the palate," Morhauser said Saturday at Studio 330 in Bloomfield Hills, before she gave a free presentation called Updating Your China Closet.

Morhauser is owner and creative director of Annieglass, a business based in the beachfront town of Santa Cruz, about 90 miles from San Francisco.

Her designs are in more than 200 world-class restaurants. hotels and spas, as well as in the Smithsonian Institution and Corning Museum of Glass.

Among the celebrities who own Annieglass pieces are\ Barbra Streisand, Oprah Winfrey, John Grisham, Robin Williams, Bette Midler, Tim Allen, Gloria Estefan, Dustin Hoffman, Darvl Hannah and Jennifer Aniston.

Morhauser travels around the country teaching the public how to mix treasured china with contemporary items.

She said she often hears about tableware that was a wedding gift or inherited and doesn't match the owner's personality.

"In my travels and when people come to me, I've seen new brides bring things still in the box (and say) 'I felt pressured into (keeping) this, it's not me.' ... and people who had something for 20 years and say 'It doesn't reflect my personality," Morhauser said.

"A lot of people don't know how to set a table. They think it has to be the way they were taught."

Morhauser puts little decoration on the surface of the pieces she designs. That way. they can be easily dressed up or dressed down, paired with antiques or contemporary items on the table.

Annieglass could be called art for the table. The designs include Aquaverde (platinum on icy blue, or gold on frosted green), Santa Cruz Modern (solid black or opaque white with a black, drizzled pattern), Copper Tangle (green frosted glass embellished with coppery swirls) and Russet (appetizer dishes with a leaf shape and gold rim).

### **BACKGROUND**

Morhauser was studying art in college when she saw glassmaking for the first time. She wanted to learn how to do it.

She made a plate out of thick glass and painted the rim with gold, and took it to a trade show. The plate was a big hit, and her career was launched.

Shapes for Annieglass are cut by hand from sheets of flat window glass. The glass is melted over a ceramic mold in a process called slumping. Metals and colors fuse permanently to the glass, making the pieces resistant to tarnishing and chips. Decorative edges are painted by hand.

"My process is very unique, using gold at high temperature," Morhauser said. "Permanent fusing keeps (pieces) dishwasher safe, long lasting."

After 10 years, in 1993, Morhauser started her retail store in downtown Santa Cruz.

It offers all Annieglass collections and flatware, stemware, candlesticks, serving preces, vases and jewelry by vell-known craft artists.

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
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

houses larger," said Ken Michlin, designer with Sherwood Studios in West Bloomfield.

The room is relaxing, said Bill Wolf, chief executive officer of Newton Furniture of Livonia and Bloomfield Hills. They use that room most of the time, besides the kitchen and bedroom. They use it for reading, entertaining or watching TV."

Homeowners will put in a seating area and sometimes a table and chairs for casual eating, Michlin said.

The family room characteristics of a generation ago have been inherited into this generation's great room. "A popular piece is the entertainment center with the large screen or plasma television to go along with that sectional, or theater seating unless they have that on the lower level," Michlin said.

Chairs chosen are very comfortable one, Wolf said, and the other options are open to the imagination. Homeowners will install library shelves in there, too, with the big television and large chairs, Wolf said.

"They're looking for sectionals," Wolf said. Sectionals can be built to order in a variety of sizes and styles, cornered or halved.

Wolf said ottomans, created as cubes, serve a dual purpose: they become seats when larger crowds inhabit the room, but a glass top will transform them into a table base.

"The cubes are very decorative," Wolf said.

"When you've got company over, you've got two to four seats on it." Other ottomans can store magazines and newspapers inside them.

Leather remains prominent for seating in the great room, Michlin said. "If there's a separate chair and ottoman, usually a microfiber will complement the leather," Michlin said.

Choice of colors of the leather and fabrics, of course, depends on the other colors in the room in carpet, walls, area rugs and wood floors.

Many large screen televisions will be housed in custombuilt wall units in laminates or woods. "We've had a few clients who've liked the stainless steel or laminate steel as opposed to wood or metal or glass," Michlin said.

Natural maple is a nice light wood for the room, Michlin said. That also is a popular trend in today's home, he added.

"The sectional is the most prominent piece in the room," Michlin said. "Sometimes people have a chair-and-a-half and an ottoman."


Michlin encourages people to talk to a designer first.

"Sometimes we've had clients who started to do it themselves, then we've had to correct some things," he said.

He recommends using light furniture, not dark, and leather. "Leather is the best product to use in the great room," Michlin said. "It outlasts fabric four to five times."

Homeowners should look at size, scale and versatility (ability to move the furniture) when shopping for the great room, Michlin said.

"If the sectional can only be in the great room one way, you're stuck with that," Michlin said.

Put a little light on a romantic meal Michigan Design Center in

Set the stage for a romantic, relaxing meal with intimate, warm lighting. That's what Terry Ellis believes works in the dining

Ellis, owner of Room Service Interior Design in the Troy and ASID member, said there should be two sources of light; a light over the dining room table and a light over a feature in the room, like a buffet table.

"For a dining table you want intimate, warm lighting," said Terry Ellis, ASID professional member and owner of Room Service Interior Design, located in the Michigan Design Center in Troy. "So you should use a chandelier or something decorative because it's more intimate."

Ellis said placing candles on the table, in addition to the chandelier, enhances that intimate feeling. And in some more modern homes, Ellis said people sometimes put two or three pendant fixtures over the dining room table.

As for lighting features in the room, Ellis suggests putting a recessed light over a buffet table, if you have one, or putting decorative wall sconces near a picture or piece of art.

She said wall decorative wall sconces add a nice soft glow to the room. But, she adds, you don't need both a recessed light and wall sconces.

"Keep in mind that you don't really want to have any lights in the room that takes away from the focal point of the room, which is the dining room table."

Carmen Wald, manager of House of Lights in Utica,

Rochester, Farmington, Roseville and Grosse Pointe, agrees that chandeliers and wall sconces are excellent choices for dining room light-But unlike Ellis, she said

many lighting sources in the room is OK.

"A lot of people light their

dining room from a single light source, like a chandelier, but you need more light than that, such as wall sconces or buffet lamps," she said. "The more sources make the room come to life."

Ellis agrees that chandeliers are nice in great rooms, especially in those formal. traditional settings. But her view of ceiling fans is quite

different. "My rule on ceilings fans is to make them disappear," she

said. "Make them the same color as the ceiling and don't put decorative features on

In a great room, Ellis said you need overhead lighting, such as recessed lighting, and some lamps for task

lighting. "In a great room there is such a huge volume of space between the ceiling and the floor, you want to make sure you have lighting on both lev-

els," she said. And if you want, Ellis said you can create another level of lighting with torchieres, which are floor lamps that direct light upwards.

Ellis said another thing to keep in mind is that because great rooms are so large, you may need more floor plugs.

She suggests putting one under the sofa so it can accommodate lamps near the middle of the room.

Overall, Ellis said there is no rule for how many lights to put in a great room, especially when it comes to overhead lighting, such as recessed lighting.

"Recessed lighting is for the furniture below it," she

"The lighting addresses the furniture so it really depends on the furniture you have."





Topping a dining room floor with an area carpet is another popular selection.

A wool carpet is best for the room, said Azar Alizadeh, owner of Azar's Oriental Rugs in Birmingham.

"It cleans very well and is a very durable rug," she said.

The size of the area carpet is determined by the number of chairs at the table, Alizadeh said. If there are six to eight chairs, the rug should measure 8 by 10 feet; if there are more than eight chairs, it should measure 9 by 12 feet.

### OTHER OPTIONS

Chills from tile and stone floors can be eliminated with the installation of such elements as NUHEAT, a mat system made up of thin heating wires embedded in durable material.

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



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

The sun has not yet risen most mornings when Canton resident Chris Balch straps a Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) around her wrist, laces up her running shoes and heads out the door to meet other members of the Canton Connection running group for a multi-mile run.

At a time of day when it's hard enough to push yourself out of bed to make coffee, Balch is motivated to run several miles by the camaraderie and friendship she has developed with the running club's members, all women

who live in Canton. "It's difficult getting out of bed at 5:30 or 5:45 in the morning to run, but we push each other to do it," Balch said. "It's so helpful to run with the friends I've met through this group. Everyone is very supportive and moti-

vating. The club was formed by Christine

Hughes, an avid runner and veteran of two marathons who moved to Canton from Grand Rapids in 2002.

"I always had friends to run with in Grand Rapids, but that wasn't the case when I moved to Canton because I didn't know anyone," Hughes said, explaining the club's origins. "I met a neighbor, Lori Shaw, who started running with me. After a while, I decided to start a running club, so I recruited new runners through the Canton Newcomers and through people I met at Lifetime Fitness.

"Last spring and summer the group really started to grow. I send e-mails out to about 20 people every week now, and we get at least nine or 10 runners out every time we meet."

A GPS is a device used by runners to measure their time, the distance they've run and their pace. One thing it can't measure is the bond that has grown between the Canton Connection's members.

"Running with this group is great for

staying in shape and relieving stress, but the best things about it are the relationships I have built with the other members," Hughes said. "Some of my best friends are in this group. One of the marathoners will be Anne Russell, who has been running regularly for the past five years. Sunday's event will be her first full marathon.



# Churchill victory guarantees first winning season since '86

Moments after Livonia Churchill overwhelmed Plymouth, 40-7, Saturday night to run its record to 5-3, coach John Filiatraut delivered a significant history lesson to his victorious team.

"This is the first time Churchill will have a winning season in football in your lifetime," Filiatraut announced, drawing an enthusiastic cheer from his players.

The lopsided win ensured the Chargers their first plus-.500 record since 1986, when Churchill finished 6-3. The next milestone on the team's agenda: reaching the state playoffs for the first time since 1978, which will be realized if Churchill can defeat cross-town rival Livonia Franklin Friday night.

"A winning record is great, but I told the kids that our job is not done," Filiatraut said. "We will have our work cut out for us against Franklin because any time we play them, it's a huge game. They'll be up for it.'

Filiatraut said his team's effort against Plymouth was the best he's seen since taking over the head-coaching duties seven years ago.

"That was the most complete football game we've played since I've been here," Filiatraut said. "In the past, it seems like we've always waited for something bad to happen, but this season, we're making positive things hap-

Jay Blaylock couldn't have been more disappointed in his Wildcats, who dropped to

"First of all, I'd like to give a lot of credit to Churchill," Blaylock said. "They came to play football tonight. That's as good as I've seen them play all year. We had a chance to reach our goal of three wins tonight, but we weren't sharp.

"If we ever want to be a winning team, we have to learn to come from behind. We fell behind tonight and then we struggled. We didn't execute."

Churchill established momentum on its opening possession when Joe Bargerstock scored from 22 yards out to cap a three-play, 47-yard drive. The extra point was wide, but the Chargers led, 6-0.

Bargerstock scored again from 3 yards out with 16 seconds left in the first quarter. Quarterback John Thomas ran in the two-point conversion to increase the lead to

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

# Players cheated in Schoolcraft hoop debacle

hen Carlos Briggs came up seven years ago from Waxahachie, Texas to interview for the Schoolcraft College men's basketball job, I met him for lunch at what was then Bill Knapp's on Six Mile Road.

I tried to persuade him not to take



The former **Emons** Schoolcraft All-America guard and

Baylor University standout, howeven had other ideas. And what turned out was bigger than any high-ranking administrator ever envisioned.

Despite a 199-32 record, five state

titles and three trips to the National Junior College Athletic Association Division I tournament in Hutchinson, Kan., Schoolcraft has apparently filed papers for a divorce from Briggs and wants to turn back the clock to its old Haggerty High

days. For a variety of reasons and circumstances, I've sensed that the Briggs-Schoolcraft marriage has

been deteriorating at a rapid rate. Sounds of "We've got a Bobby Knight on our hands," have echoed through the McDowell Center.

Briggs certainly has brought some problems upon himself, but the way Schoolcraft handled this latest episode regarding NJCAA sanctions, which includes one-year's probation and a ban from post-season play hurts only one entity - the 12 players Briggs recruited.

They've been rented like a cheap

Even with their futures in doubt, Schoolcraft didn't have the decency to appeal the rules violation, which is only short of the death penalty in the eyes of the NJCAA.

In a nutshell, Briggs was cited for using a college van last summer to transport nine players to-and-from the JUCO All-American Challenge in Indianapolis. Schoolcraft also got nailed for submitting receipts to be reimbursed for stop at Burger King on the way down.

The NJCAA also charged that Schoolcraft and three other Region 12 schools with violating rules while competing at the same Indianapolis prospects camp. But the other three schools requested an appeal and asked for a lesser penalty.

Schoolcraft also had to answer NJCAA allegations that the school paid for the nine players' camp entry fees. The school investigation, however, revealed that charge was untrue.

Ironically, no appeal followed. It appears the transportation issue alone, in the eyes of the kangaroo court - interim athletic director Bill Tolstedt, Dean of Student Services Cheryl Wright and **Executive-Vice President John** Tomey — was sufficient enough in their eyes to ban the men's basketball program, ranked No. 4 in one preseason national poll, from getting another shot at Hutchinson.

Yet, every question about a possible appeal of the first-time NJCAA offender was referred to Schoolcraft Director of Marketing Marty Heator, who obviously enjoys taking the heat for other people's mindboggling actions.

I could sense that the sometimes combative Briggs' days were going to be numbered late last spring when he lost two of his closest allies, including the man who originally hired him, part-time athletic director Ed Kavanugh (he resigned and went back to his job as a full-time mathematics instructor), and slain Schoolcraft trustee Richard DeVries, an ardent supporter of athletics.

Another sign was when Briggs and his team failed to show up for orientation night for Schoolcraft's SASS (Student-Athlete Support System) program.

Tolstedt, who coaches the

NJCAA's No. 1-ranked and unbeaten women's soccer team, agreed to take Kavanaugh's estimated \$15,000 part-time job on an interim basis at least through November. And while he continues to fatten his record by playing JV and club teams from four-year schools, his actions in this men's basketball matter signal he is simply out of his element.

There's another sticky issue, however, the interim A.D. is dealing with. Word is already out that the men's soccer team is under an internal probe for using a ineligible player who reportedly played this fall for the Windsor Border Cats of the Canadian Professional Soccer League.

Can't wait to read how Marty Heator's Web site will put a spin on

Cheryl Wright also pleaded the fifth when I questioned her about the men's basketball probe, referring all inquiries to Marty.

Wright, who has had stops at Central Michigan University and that noted sports power, Cleary College, admits she has no athletic background. Shades of the days when Schoolcraft athletics was ruled by a registered nurse.

So why try and get some answers from John Tomey, or Schoolcraft president Conway Jeffress, when Marty is just a phone call or e-mail

All sarcasm aside, this is a sad time for Schoolcraft athletics, which had captured the MCCAA's All-Sports Trophy during Kavanaugh's

Right now it's a ship without sails,

a car without an engine. When things were going right with Briggs and men's basketball, the school loved the positive publicity. They went along for ride and now want to pull in reins on coach they deem is out of control.

I told Briggs, following a 35-1 season and third-place finish at Hutchinson, that he should take that Western Michigan University assistant coaching job and leave while he's on top. If he had done that he'd be in Tampa right now as Robert McCullum's assistant at the University of South Florida.

If Schoolcraft is going revert to its past when Jeffress, then a vice-president, clashed with former athletic director Mary Gans about a proposal to convert the school's auxiliary gym into a computer lab, then it's time to take one more drastic step.

If you don't want to do athletics right, then drop sports all together and get out of the National Junior Collegiate Association, at least in Division I and II.

Everybody would be better off, especially the school's mouthpiece, that poor guy named Marty.

"Most of Steve's saves were routine, but he's at a level where his routine saves are great saves for another goalie."









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
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
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# CC gridders capture final game at Kraft

A win over Mott would enable Catholic Central to compete for the division championship, 7 p.m. Friday at Berkley.


The Shamrocks' collective speed and playmaking skills kept the ball in the Cowboys half of the field most of the game.

"Sometimes when you are building something, you take a step back. We did that on Sunday."



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# Future is bright for ex-Chief McKinney

Even though former Canton gridiron standout Travis McKinney was redshirted by Eastern Michigan University's football team this fall, the freshman's future with the Eagles is

McKinney is making a solid first impression on EMU's coaching staff, but not at his customary running back position. Prior to the team's second preseason practice, the 5-foot-10, 173-pound speedster was switched from wide receiver to defensive back, a position where the team lacked depth.

McKinney, who can't partici-

pate in games this season due to his redshirt status, said he had no problem with the shift to the other side of the ball.

"I'll play wherever the coaches want me to play, as long as it helps the team," said McKinney, who walked on at EMU after passing up opportunities to play regularly at several Division II schools. "I like defense and I'm definitely not afraid to stick my nose in there. I didn't play defense in games at Canton, but I practiced at defensive back all the time and I was an emergency cornerback.

"I go up against our team's top receivers every day in practice. They beat me a few times early on in the season, but I've been

holding my own lately. I've even had a couple of interceptions in practice."

As a redshirt player, McKinney can practice and work out with the Eagles, but he can't participate in games. The bright side is he'll have an additional four years of eligibility after this season.

"My goal is to earn a scholarship," McKinney said. "At least one of our starting corners (Chris Roberson) is a senior, so it could open up a spot for me next season."

McKinney said the weight-lifting regimen in college is intense.

"The workouts we go through here are a lot tougher than the ones I went through in high

school," McKinney said. "The first couple of days, I was shocked how difficult they are. But it's paying off — I've already gained 12 pounds (of muscle) in a few months."

Former Canton player Jerry Gaines, a senior at EMU, has been an unofficial mentor for McKinney.

"Jerry has really helped me out since day one," McKinney said. "I don't know how I would have done it without Jerry. He's done everything from helping me around campus to helping me with my footwork on the field. He's been like a big brother to

### Hills couple create worldly chili, salsa

🐃 hili. It's what's for dinner - sometimes lunch and fills the bowls for thousands at a slew of cookoffs.

The cookoffs' - and chili's - popularity was evident Oct. 10 with the Great Lakes Regional Chili and Salsa Cookoff and Ride-in Motorcycle Bike Show in Kellogg Park in Plymouth. Chili cookoff organizer Annette Horn estimated that more than 10,000 chili lovers attended the event. Laurin Staley of Lexington, Ky., won the red chili competition, while Leo Buk of Trenton took first place for his chili verde (green chili) and William Parker of Rockwood won the salsa competition.

When it comes to cooking up chili, salsa or chili verde, it's hard to beat the husbandand-wife team of Jim and Georgia Weller of Bloomfield Hills.

Between them, they've won 49 cookoffs. Jim was the world champion for red chili in 2000; Georgia won in 1996. (See inside Taste for their winning recipes.) For the second consecutive year. Jim placed second and Georgia third in Plymouth

But they will compete in Las Vegas -- as will Horn -this weekend for the 2004 International Chili Society's World Championship Chili and Salsa Cookoff.

Horn qualified in September by winning a salsa cookoff in Brighton and chili cookoff in Taylor. Jim Weller will compete for winning the Ontario Regional Chili Competition in June in the red chili category, and for his winning salsa in Plymouth in 2003. (Regional winners in Plymouth compete in the World Championship the following

year.) But Georgia one-upped Jim, and will compete in the coveted "hat trick" of chili cookoffs: Red chili, green chili and salsa. She won this year's Ohio state competition in red; a salsa cookoff in Clinton, Ill.; and verde competition in Brighton last


Jim has fired up stoves in cookoffs since 1983, Georgia stewed up her first fiery pot in 1990. They were the first husband and wife to win world championships. Georgia has qualified for the world championship cookoff for 15 consecutive years. Jim has reached it 12 times.

The couple competed in 28 cookoffs this year, but they love participating in Plymouth's event. "It's really one of the best cookoffs in the country," Jim said. Last year, 62 cooks participated; this year, 53 cooks fired up pots. "That's a great turnout, and the Horns do a marvelous job organizing it (Annette's husband Ken Horn oversees the judging). It's well-recognized, with cooks competing from as far away as Texas and Nevada."

The Wellers even open up their home to a couple from Illinois and another from Indiana. "We help them out and they do the same for us," Jim Weller said.

Weller said winning a championship puts a cook in an exclusive club, but he doesn't forget the fun he has at all the cookoffs, either.

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
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
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### Recipe wins in lower calorie category



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# Stir up colorful, simple soup with corn and shrimp

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) -Corn and shrimp soup probably evolved from the fresh vegetable stews cooked in a skillet that were prepared in many Southern kitchens.

The stews, which were basically pan-sauteed corn, cut directly off the cob into the skillet to capture the juice or milk of the corn, tomatoes, onions, bell peppers and sometimes okra, were quick and inexpensive since the ingredients came right out of the garden.

Cooks liked making the simple and budget-friendly skillet stews, and families apparently liked the taste of these freshfrom-the-garden vegetable dishes, too.

Skillet stews varied accord-

ing to region. In Mississippi and Alabama, the corn mixture was often seasoned with a bit of rendered salt pork, according to Damon Lee Fowler's Classical Southern Cooking.

In southern Louisiana, the skillet stew, which was known as maque choux, was usually prepared meatless, but - and this is pure speculation - what if a skilled hand at the stove on a whim stirred a few shrimp into the corn and tomato stew one day? Would that family have enjoyed the very first corn and shrimp combination?

The Advocate's food-section research failed to trace an authoritative origin of corn and shrimp soup. Recipes for the colorful soup started showing up in community cookbooks in the late 1970s.

The earliest recipe for a tomato and broth-style corn and shrimp soup the food-section staff located was in the River Road Recipes II cookbook published in 1976. This version starts with the cook making a golden-brown roux and browning finely chopped onions in the roux to create a caramel-colored base for the shrimp, tomatoes and sweet corn added later.

Given the appealing taste and familiarity of the soup's basic ingredients, shrimp, tomatoes and sweet corn, it was inevitable that corn and shrimp soup would be a hit. Restaurants began offering it as "soup of the day" and home cooks started tinkering with the ingredients to develop recipes of their own.

Today, new cooks will find recipes for corn and shrimp

soup that make stewlike soups. These soups are often thickened with the addition of potatoes as well as the usual corn, tomatoes, onions and bell peppers.

There are also recipes for broth-based soups. More often than not, the broth is flavored with canned chicken broth or a chicken stock. And, returning to the origins of the soup with its characteristic fresh corn milkiness, some corn and shrimp soup recipes have added creamed corn, milk or cream to the ingredients.

Because corn and shrimp soup started out simple, it's best not to over-engineer its preparation. Let the ingredients impart their unique fla-

In testing recipes, the staff found it's easy to overseason corn and shrimp soup. Many recipes call for canned stewed tomato and chili pepper combinations; use only the mildest version of these. The testers also discovered that using chicken base, a commercial product, which is a concentrated chicken stock, produced a golden, rich-tasting broth that complemented the flavors from the sweet corn and shrimp.

The broth-style corn and shrimp soup versions freeze well. Milk or cream-enhanced soups don't freeze well, breaking down while being reheat-

The recipe testers say cooks needn't worry about leftovers; there won't be any.

This version of the soup can be the meal itself, especially on a cold night.

#### CORN AND SHRIMP SOUP

1 red onion, chopped 4 stalks celery, chopped 1 green bell pepper, chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 16-ounce bag frozen sweet corn 10-ounce can chopped tomatoes and green chilles (use the milder variety)

6-ounce can tomato paste 2 pounds shrimp, peeled 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Coat a large pot with nonstick cooking spray and saute onion, celery, green pepper and garlic until tender. Add corn, tomatoes and green chilies, tomato paste, shrimp and seasonings. Add chicken broth and bring to boil, lower heat and cook for 1 hour, adding water as needed to keep the consistency soupy. Add green onions, simmer for 15 minutes.

#### CORN AND SHRIMP BISQUE

4 ears fresh corn 1 small onion, finely chopped 1 medium yellow-flesh potato, peeled and cut in/z-inch 4 cups cold water

Strain soup into bowl, reserving cooked vegetables; there should be about 4 cups of broth. Take out 1/2 cup of the vegetables and reserve. In a blender, puree remaining vegetables with 2 cups of broth (about half) until mixture is creamy and smooth. Return puree to the pot. Mix in 1/2 to 3/4 cup evaporated milk, depending on thickness of puree. Reheat until hot. Season to taste with cayenne, salt and pepper. If the sweet taste of fresh corn seems weak, add up to 1 teaspoon sugar, if desired.

Divide bisque among 4 bowls. Garnish each with reserved vegetables and scallions. Garoish soup with cooked, shelied shrimp. Serve. (Refrigerate or freeze remaining corn broth to use in making vegetable soup.)

Note: I really prefer the chicken base mixed with boiling water in any recipe that calls for chicken broth. It seems to have a lot more flavor than the canned broth. I rarely add a lot of salt when cooking. I like the flavor of the liquid crab boil, and that is enough `heat" for me. However, you can certainly add Cajun seasoning, salt, black and-or red pepper and Tabasco to your own taste.

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
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# 'Homemade' can be Emily's raises funds to battle MS

Another great plus: The book is handsomely designed, with luscious color photographs by Jim Smith that further tempt the reader's appetite.

Homemade: Delicious Foods to Make and Give (Potter, 2004, \$25) is by Judith Christi, the award winning

author of many cookbooks. Her introductory chapters deliver general advice and tips on gift wrapping and packing. ackages and pres entation ideas are also evident in the color photos by Lyn Hughes that illustrate the book.

Choate's wide selection of recipes includes cakes and cookies, candies and chutneys, appetizers and drinks.



he other day, I visited an assisted-living home and met Michael. I brought him a bread we make at the Give Thanks Bakery called a Kugelhopf. We got to talking

and milk used to be distributed years ago. Michael (who is 92!) told me that he began work as a milkman and he made his rounds with a horse and buggy. Sometimes, "the folks

about how bread

wouldn't be home so I had their permission to walk right into their kitchen and put the bottles of milk in their refrigerator," he said.

"Why," he said, "oftentimes there would be a nice slice of cake waiting in the refrigerator with my name on it. Those were the days!"

I told Michael that I can remember when I was a boy in a country town in England, the baker would arrive at our house, in his van and walk up to our front door with a big basket full of loaves of all kinds. Selecting two or three was something that I loved doing.

The baker's van was motorized (I'm not that ancient!) but my ancestors in England distributed their bread with horsedrawn carriages. That was done all the way up to around 1935. And I have a photo of Matthes horse-drawn carriages framed and hanging in The Give Thanks Bakery today.

One of the breads brought to our front door, was a small brown loaf, with the name "Hovis" imprinted on the side

So, imagine my amazement (and delight) when I came across tion on E-bay. I bid on it and a few days later it was mine - a happy piece of nostalgia from many decades ago. All made possible by cyberspace. Incredible! Even more incredible was when a lady in Singapore came across our Web site (www.givethanksbakery.com) earlier this year and wrote to us, inquiring about a job at Give Thanks in little old Rochester, Michigan.

Jiong Wah is a bread aficionado. She wanted to intern in a true Artisan bakery to learn the craft of bread-making in the Old World way - with time, no yeast and a lot of TLC.

So we invited Jiong to join us. all the way from Singapore. If you can swing by one morning you will see Jiong shaping dough and learning. She has made her own sourdough starter already and is ready to create her own loaves. Judging by the care she

takes, they will be very good. The opposite of 21st century technology is the discovery of 5,000-year-old bread! A while ago, I was in Egypt and decided to check out the King Tut exhibition at Cairo's Museum. I took a guide with me because my time was short. Imagine the guide's puzzlement when I gave King Tut ten minutes and a display of ancient bread over an hour! I was enthralled. The bread was still intact and all the primitive implements looked remarkably similar to the ones we use today.

I guess that's one of the reasons I like bread making so much. In a world of breakneck speed and bewildering change, the essence of bread making remains the same, year in and year out. Today, we are making bread much the way my ancestors did in Germany a hundred or more years ago. No commercial yeast, lots of time to ensure wonderfully complex flavors, and the ability to stay fresh for several days without preservatives.

It's hardly the most efficient way to go. But when Jiong Wah returns to Singapore the response from her friends should make it all worthwhile.

## Realtor image continues to improve BENEFITS OF REALTOR

Politicians aren't the only ones waging positive image campaigns. Realtors are also concerned about their public image, and are working to improve it.

"In the past, people thought of Realtors as another salesperson trying to sell you something," said Douglas Whitehouse, partner, Hannett, Wilson & Whitehouse of Birmingham and presidentelect of the Michigan Association of Realtors. "I consider myself to be someone who helps people change their lives in a way that they want to change. When you change your home you change your lifestyle. The sale is an integral part of helping people accomplish their goal."

Chris Courtney, an associate broker with Remerica Hometown in Plymouth and president of the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors, says his job is a people helping people business.

"We care about people, we care about personal property rights," he said. "We're not just in it for the money. I like to help people succeed."

Public opinion of Realtors

has improved significantly for the second straight year, according to a survey conducted to measure the effectiveness of the seventh season of the National Association of Realtors multimillion-dollar Public Awareness Campaign.

The survey's composite score, which provides an overall picture of consumers' opinion of Realtors, improved four points over last year. Over the past two years, the score has improved 11 points, from 48 percent in 2002 to a new high of 59 percent today.

Consumer opinions about Realtors improving the most this year were that Realtors use the latest technology (up 14 percent), that Realtors are a good source about what sellers can do to ready a home for sale (up 9 percent), that Realtors are a good source of information about services related to buying and sell a home (up 9 percent), and that Realtors are professionals you can trust (up 5 percent). Of the 16 opinions and beliefs measured in the survey, 11 improved and none declined during the year.

The survey found that more consumers than ever are likely to select a Realtor to help them buy or sell a home, an increase of 8 percent in the past year. Preference for Realtors has

increased from 58 percent in 2000 to 72 percent today.

A real estate agent is someone licensed to sell real estate. To become licensed in Michigan, you must complete 40 hours of training and pass a state licensing exam. Once real estate agents become licensed, they must take a certain number of continuing education credits to stay current. Agents in Michigan must take 18 credits every three years, and every year they must take two hours of education relating to changes in real estate law.

Realtors are licensed real estate agents who are members of the National Association of Realtors and subscribe to a strict code of ethics which binds them to fair and ethical treatment for both buyers and sellers. They also belong to state and local Realtor associations and boards and pay membership dues.

Realtors are also encouraged to participate in continuing education to increase their knowledge and enhance professionalism. To keep their competitive edge, many members of the Michigan Association of Realtors pursue professional designations in real estate specialties.


He was an exceptionally skilled artist, so I asked him to go home and sketch for me a sequence of pictures that depicted what he would expect to see as he landed the plane perfectly. I was stunned the next day as he proudly presented an artist's portfolio of images perfectly portraying a pilot's perspective of perfect landings power settings, windscreen view, angle-of-attack, air speed.

We discussed each drawing in detail as we prebriefed our training flight. I marginally "passed" him that flight and - to my commander's surprise - asked to fly with him for several more training missions. His landings improved very quickly and I soon handed him back to his regular instructor pilot so he could graduate on time with his

I'll never forget his smile as he was awarded his wings, and I just knew how proud he would be upon his return to his homeland. He learned a little from me about flying, but I learned a

lot from him about life. This may seem like a crazy story to tell in a weekly mortgage column. ## Rates on 30-year mortgages fall

Mortgage rates fell, erasing most of the previous week's big increase, Freddie Mac reported Thursday, Oct. 14.

The mortgage giant reported in its weekly survey that 30-year mortgages retreated to 5.74 percent, after climbing to 5.82 percent last week, which had been the highest level in a month.

Rates on 30-year mortgages hit a high this year of 6.34 percent the week of May 13. Then during the late spring and early summer, rates slowly drifted downward as economic activity cooled, easing fears about inflation. However, since late August, rates have been exhibiting a seesaw pattern as markets responded to a variety of mixed signals on economic growth.

Economists said the drop in interest rates reflected market disappointment about the latest unemployment report, which showed a lower-than-expected 96,000 payroll jobs were added in September.

"The decline in mortgage rates was primarily due to a weak employment report for September, which suggested economic growth is still a bit subdued," said Freddie Mac chief economist Frank Nothaft. "As a result, we expect mortgage rates will continue to stay quite affordable over the next few months, benefiting future homebuyers."

For 15-year, fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates dropped this week to 14 percent, down from 5.24 percent the previous week.

Rates on one-year adjustable rate mortgages declined to 4.01 percent, down from 4.08 percen the previous week.

The nationwide averages for mortgage rates do not include add-on fees known as points. E mortgage type carried a 0.6 poin

Home sales are expected to hi record highs this year, aided by low mortgage rates.

A year ago, rates on 30-year mortgages averaged 5.95 percent with 15-year mortgages at 5.26 percent and one-year ARMs at 3.69 percent.

## House ad turns into ghost story

(AP) - People tend to leave out some of the negatives when they try to sell a house.

Take Charlotte Brady's ad in a recent Register-Guard in Oregon. It mentions the bedrooms, the bathrooms and the formal dining room. In a surprising bit of honesty, Brady even includes that the house has a ghost.

But Brady did hide one negative. The ghost likes to play ball in the house.

"We haven't seen anything; we mainly hear noises," said owner Charlotte Brady, who lived in the two-story, 80-year-old house on Fillmore Street for about 30 years intil moving a couple of months ago. "We often hear a ball bouncing. It sounds like a hard rubber ball and it starts at the top of the stairs and seems to hit every step on the way down."

### Thursday DriveTime

One thing I hadn't done in about two years of writing this column was drive and review a Korean-made vehicle. And yet the Koreans continue to nibble away at the U.S. automotive market in much the way that Japanese companies did a generation ago. So recently, I got myself into the vehicle that arguably is the flagship of the Korean "fleet" in the American market-place: Hyundai's Sonata.

And in the space of a week, I understood why the Korean incursion here has become such a phenomenon – and why it is only likely to continue to build. Sonata, now in at least its third generation, is an exclamation mark on what Korean auto makers have accomplished here in the space of just 15 years. Back then, their shoddy build quality and powertrains compared quite badly with the best Japanese and even American models. But not any more.

The bottom line not only is that the 2004 Sonata LX that I drove delivered an overall highly satisfactory performance but also that, for buyers, it does so while grandly fulfilling the other two increasingly important criteria in vehicle purchases these days: price and fuel economy. This premium entry in the mid-level sedan market prouduces 27 miles a gallon on the highway and 19 mpg in the city. And it delivers all of the above for the amazing sticker price of under \$20,000.

Hyundai has other premium models, including a near-luxury sedan called XG350 and representative SUVs in the Santa Fe and the new, 2005 Tucson. But Sonata demonstrates perhaps best of any of Hyundai's line-up the attractiveness of a satisfying vehicle for such a relatively small price.

Sonata creates a great first impression with an organic handsomeness that is more redolent of European sedans and of some of the best American designs than of Japanese-like spareness. Believe it or not, Sonata's overall form reminds me a bit of the feline shape of a Jaguar. Rich details include a wrinkle

at the door-handle level that runs from the front of the vehicle to the back – a nice touch, just right, and not too much. And Sonata's front end, sophisticated headlight treatment and even wheel covers almost exactly look like a Mercedes-Benz sedan.

The exterior style comes standard on all three Sonata models, which range from list prices of \$16,000 to \$19,800. Even the base model comes well equipped for its price, standard with air conditioning, side-impact air bags, AM/FM/CD audio system, rear defroster, power mirrors, power locks with keyless remote, power windows, cruise control, remote fuel door and trunk releases, 60/40 split folding rear seat, variable intermittent wipers, four-wheel disc brakes, gas-charged shock absorbers and 15-inch all-season tires.

The problem with that model is that even \$16,000 might be better invested in a small car with more amenities and better gas mileage than in a vehicle with only a four-cylinder engine and a five-speed manual transmission.

But as you move up the Sonata lineup to LX, the top of the line, the price-value equation gets dramatically better. At that level, Hyundai includes a 2.7-liter, 24-valve, dual-overhead cam, six-cylinder engine that

churns out 170 horsepower. (And the V6 is available in each of Sonata's versions.) The car accelerates smoothly and authoritatively from a standstill, cruises effortlessly and idles quietly. The automatic transmission is complementarily responsive, with smooth and almost unnoticeable shifts.


The ride as well is impressive for a car of this price and in this segment, gliding effortlessly even at top highway speeds with a minimum of wind and tire noise. Steering, too, is responsive. In fact, Sonata's power, ride and handling arguably are as agreeable as its exterior design.

Interior amenities are where some patches appeared in Sonata's price-value proposition. In the LX model, there's a leather interior with some nice touches such as luxuriously folded padding on the inside of the doors, a leather-wrapped shift knob and faux wood accents. The plush seats provide driving comfort. The dashboard is attractive, and climate and audio controls are logically arranged. Trunk space is highly adequate, a cargo net handy.

But I missed things like a sunroof that you can get in competing models. Twenty thousand dollars, even in this car, goes only so far, I guess. But it's still a long, long way.

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
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
