

June 1 - 4, 1987

FIRST SESSION - MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 1, 1987

Executive Session - Bishop John Russell called the conference to order. Gary Whitbeck led the conference in a devotional time.

The conference met in executive session for clergy in full connection. Bishop Russell reminded those present of the membership of the executive session.

Bishop Russell then called for the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Tim Russell, chairperson, presented the Board of Ordained Ministry report. He made a motion that the executive session invite all persons whose names appear in the printed report of the Board be included at this session during the time when they are considered, and that they be given voice but no vote. The motion was approved.

Tim Russell responded to Question 17 concerning ministerial character. He reported "all ministerial members were blameless in their life and official administration".

Conference Committee on Investigation was elected.

Joint Review Committee members were elected.

Tim Russell was assisted in the report by Barbara Gaugl Lucas, Eric McKinney, Jim Porter, and Robert Lindsey.

Bishop Russell spoke concerning those permitted to vote on clergy matters.

Probationary members were approved. Each was elected to deacon's orders. Members in full connection were elected. Each was approved for elder's orders.

Tim Russell addressed the Policy of Record Keeping for the Board of Ordained Ministry as printed in the preliminary report.

Tim Russell then referred to the printed report of the Board. He pointed out areas of particular concern about candidacy requirements, mentor program, Board membership. He then pointed out Policy Statements of the Board of Ordained Ministry which were adopted by the Board during the year. He asked the deletion of policy statement on "Deadlines". He reminded the session of steps into Ordained Ministry pointing particularly to the expansion of section L. to include Probationary, Associate, and Full Membership.

Tim Russell concluded this portion of the Board of Ordained Ministry report; the full report will be approved at a later time.

Barbara Lucas presented Curtis Lee to the conference. Curtis was presented for Probationary Membership and Deacon's orders. The relationship was approved.

Tim Russell instructed the session concerning lunch. Russell announced that the Board of Ordained Ministry would meet at 5:00 p.m. on Monday afternoon. The session continued during lunch with Charles McClure leading us in the General Conference Ministry Study. He was assisted by Margaret Tarr from the North Texas Conference, Bill Longsworth, John Holbert, and Tim Russell.

Charles McClure moved that the executive session grant Margaret Tarr the privilege of addressing the session. It was granted. Mrs. Tarr then addressed the session concerning the Ministry Study mandated by the 1984 General Conference.

Ben Feemster, chairperson of the Fort Worth-Dallas "G.R.E.A.T." group addressed the session concerning the Ministry Study working documents. Bill Longsworth addressed the session in a theological assessment of the working documents of the Ministry Study. John Holbert also spoke to the session concerning the working documents of the Ministry Study. His remarks concerned the impact of the Ministry Study on ministerial education.

Tim Russell spoke to the session concerning the practical impact of the Ministry Study for ordained ministers. Charles McClure led the session in a time of discussion concerning the Ministry Study documents.

Tim Russell called on Robert Lindsey who announced a change in the Local Pastor's report.

Bishop Russell expressed his appreciation to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry for their report, and to the persons who led the presentation concerning the Ministry Study.

Bishop Russell adjourned the executive session at 1:45 p.m.

SECOND SESSION - MONDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 1, 1987

Opening Worship Service - was a combined Communion and Memorial Service at the Waco Convention Center at 2:30 p.m. The prelude was provided by a brass choir. Dr. Louis Shambeck, pastor of First United Methodist Church of Euless, brought the message. Those presiding were Bishop Russell and Dr. Mike Young. Music leader and pianist were Gene Lorey and Dr. Homer Kluck. The extended cabinet, Ervin Gathings, Michael Patison, Ben Feemster, Luther Henry, Sidney Roberts, H. F. Meier, Ed Otwell, Gene Robertson, Gordon Dennis, and James Shuler participated in the service. Those who served the elements of Holy Communion were those who are to receive ordination as Deacons and Elders at this Annual Conference.

Bishop Russell called the conference to order at 3:50 p.m. in the Waco Convention Center. He reminded those in attendance concerning those qualified to vote on the various matters of the conference.

Organization of Conference -

1. Bishop Russell called on Luther Henry, chairperson of the Agenda Committee. He suggested that the Wednesday afternoon session begin at 2:30 p.m. He then moved that the printed agenda be the official agenda of the Annual Conference with the understanding that changes can be made and that Robert Herzig and Luther Henry will coordinate any changes. Approved.

2. Gordon Dennis led the Conference in registration of the delegates.

6. Cordon Dennis moved that Leonard Radde be elected Conference Statistician. He then moved the election of the statistical staff: Ben Tibbs, Charles McClure, John Shipman, Don Johnson, Delbert Taylor, John Dirk, and Robert Lindsey. The motion was approved.

Gordon Dennis moved approval of the bar of the conference. It was approved.

Committee on Nominations Report - Luther Henry gave the report and called attention to several resolutions that will be before the conference.

Board of Diaconal Ministry - Dorothy Dahl was called to present part of the report of the Board of Diaconal Ministry. The following persons were elected to the Office of Diaconal Minister: Frankie Jeanne Adams, Charles R. Gee, Linda Ray Miller, Melissa A. M. Nichols, and Eric Vaughn Rothe.

Election of Delegates - Bishop Russell instructed the conference concerning the election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conference. Central Texas Conference will elect six clergy and six lay delegates to General Conference. To Jurisdictional Conference, Central Texas Conference will elect 12 lay and 12 clergy delegates (including those elected to General Conference). Ballot #1 was cast for lay and clergy delegates.

Ministers' Wives Report - Tanya Rice made a presentation for the Conference Ministers' Wives. Mary Jean Russell was escorted by Charles Rice and introduced to the conference; she was also presented a bouquet of flowers.

Personal Privilege - Don Pike moved that the conference members give \$5 per person and that monies received be given to Bishop and Mrs. Russell and that they use it to take a vacation. This motion was received with a round of applause.

Bishop Russell called on Spurgeon Dunham who addressed the conference on behalf of the United Methodist Reporter. Mr. Dunham presented the "U.M.R. Headliner" award to Sidney Roberts for his contribution in assisting the work of the United Methodist Reporter.

ACCOM Report - Bishop Russell called on John Lukert to present the ACCOM report. Part of the report was presented. The staff was recognized. He referred to the Resource Center, Glen Lake Camp, and Fall University as outstanding functions within the Annual Conference. Recommendations made by John Lukert were approved.

Announcements were made by Eldon Mahon concerning the Rules Committee; by David Mosser concerning the Perkins Alumni breakfast; and by Mike McKee concerning Clergy Women meeting, COSROW hospitality room, Committee on Christian Unity meeting, and Board of Ordained Ministry.

Personal Privilege - H. F. Meier moved that the conference send greetings to Ernest Roper hospitalized in Brownwood.

Bishop Russell announced that the Evening Worship Service would be at Austin Avenue United Methodist Church at 7:30 p.m. Bishop Russell closed the session with prayer.

THIRD SESSION - MONDAY EVENING, JUNE 1, 1987

Evening Worship Service was held at the Austin Avenue United Methodist Church, Waco, Texas, at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Williams Hinson, Conference preacher, brought the message. The Methodist Home Choir brought special music. Those presiding were Bishop Russell, James Abel, Luther Felder, Jane Lovett, and H. Brown Loyd.

FOURTH SESSION - TUESDAY MORNING, JUNE 2, 1987

Bishop Russell called the conference to order at 8:30 a.m. at the Waco Convention Center. Gene Lorey led the conference in singing "We're Marching To Zion". Judith Sands led the devotional time, speaking on the theme, "Childlikeness". The Children's Choir of the Laura Edwards Center sang "This Little Light of Mine", and led the conference in singing "If You're Happy and You Know It".

Report of Laity Ballot #1 - was announced by Bishop Russell. 332 ballots were cast with 162 being necessary for election. No one was elected. Laity Ballot #2 was taken.

Report of Clergy Ballot #1 - was reported by Bishop Russell. 233 ballots were cast with 5 invalid; 115 were needed for election. No one was elected.

Texas Wesleyan College - Bishop Russell called on Dr. Jerry Bawcom, President of T.W.C. who spoke concerning Wesleyan's current condition in terms of academic performance and financial stability.

ACCOM Report - was continued by John Lukert. Donna Paustian reported on the Committee on Planning and Research. The Pilot Project for Local Church Planning Facilitators was presented. The project was approved. John Loggins assisted by presenting the Board of Church and Society report. Dean Posey spoke on state-sponsored paramutual gambling. John Lukert moved the adoption of six program items in the report. This was approved. The adoption of the resolutions against paramutual betting was approved. Mr. Lukert requested a lifting of rules to allow consideration of three resolutions. This was approved by 2/3's vote. John Lukert moved the adoption of each resolution. The adoption of each resolution was approved by the conference.

The fourth resolution entitled "The Arab-Israeli Crisis" was presented by John Loggins. Mr. Lukert moved the adoption of this resolution. Ken Schultz moved deletion of items 8 and 9 of the resolution. The conference gave approval for that action. Edward Smith moved to delete items 5 and 6. The amendment was approved. The vote was 289 for and 241 against. The Bishop called for a vote on the resolution. The resolution was approved. A motion was made by Sherry Wright of Cisco to approve removing the rights of abortion by request. Scott Youngblood moved to refer this to the Board. The motion was approved. Ken Schultz moved that the Board of Church and Society be requested to study both the issues of abortion and poronography, and bring recommendations for action to the next meeting of the Ammual Conference. This motion was approved.

The Board of Global Ministries Report was presented by Buddy Stegman, chairperson of the Board. He called upon Hiram Johnson to remind the conference of the Refugee Resettlement Program. He urged churches to have greater involvement. Stegman introduced the Board's media presentation.

Ken Schultz was introduced on behalf of the Committee on City, Town & Country Work. Presentations of the City, Town & Country Awards were made to: John Fiedler and Lake Worth UMC, Charles Cox and Florence UMC, and Richard Hetzel and Graford UMC. The report of the Committee was approved.

The reports of the Committees on Aging, Education and The Advance, and Urban Ministries were approved. The entire report of the Board of Global Ministries was approved.

Eric McKinney, chairperson of the Committee on Evangelism, presented the Board of Discipleship Report. He introduced Bewin Caswell and Karen Greenwaldt both of the General Board of Discipleship.

Clergy Ballot #2 - was reported by Bishop Russell. 212 ballots were cast with 2 being invalid. 106 votes were needed for election. Ben Feemster was elected on this ballot with 118 votes.

Laity Ballot #2 - was reported by Bishop Russell. 331 ballots were cast with 3 being invalid. 160 votes were needed for election. Ken Smith with 188 votes was elected.

Motion - Dick Jenkins moved that on future clergy ballots, names with fewer than 10 votes not be read. Approved.

Motion - Hollis Trietsch moved that on future laity ballots, those names receiving fewer than 10 votes not be read. Approved.

The conference was then returned to the ACCOM and Board of Discipleship Report. The Committee Reports of Camps & Assemblies, Education & Leadership Development, Evangelism Stewardship, and Worship were approved. The Conference Council on Youth Ministries was approved.

The total report of the Board of Dsicipleship was approved.

The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry report was presented by Martha Harris. McMurray College was recognized. Lon Morris College was also recognized. The motion was made to approve the report. It was approved.

Committee on Communications and Interpretation report was given by Robert Lindsey. John Lukert moved adoption of four programs presented in reports. This was approved.

The Constitution and By-laws of the United Methodist Communications Council were presented. These were approved.

Luther Henry presented to John Lukert as chairperson of ACCOM a plaque in recognition of his service. Robert Lindsey, Sandy Bartee, and Donna Paustian were also recognized for their service as chairpersons of committees.

Announcements - Gordon Dennis instructed the Committee on Minutes to meet upon adjournment. Dennis asked for assistance in passing material throughout the conference in the absence of the tellers who are counting votes. Tim Thomas announced that the Brite Alumni Dinner will be at 5:30 p.m. at Austin Avenue UMC.

Chaplains, Skip Blanchett, Mike Curd, Lamar Hunt, Jim Durham, and Dean Coultas, were recognized and presented to the conference. Greetings were given from Glen Sammis.

The session was adjourned.





FIFTH SESSION - TUESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 2, 1987

Edward Smith led the conference in singing 'Open May Eyes That I May See". Mike Phillips led in a devotional time speaking on "Fasting and Spiritual Commitments".

Bishop Russell announced the proposed agenda for the session: Personal Privilege, Cabinet Composite Report, Board of Diaconal Ministry, Board of Pensions, Commission on Christian Unity and Inter-Religious Concerns, Inter-Conference Taskforce on Hispanic Ministries, and presentations of persons.

Laity Ballot #3 - Bishop Russell reported the results of Laity Ballot #3. There were 338 ballots cast with 7 being invalid. 167 votes were necessary for election. Three persons were elected: Nelda Barrett - 193 votes, Hank Carroll - 176 votes, and Eldon Mahon - 168 votes. Laity Ballot #4 was taken.

Clergy Ballot #3 - Bishop Russell reported on Clergy Ballot #3. 225 ballots were cast with 1 being invalid. 113 votes were necessary for election. Homer Kluck was elected with 122 votes. Clergy Ballot #4 was called for.

Cabinet Composite Report - Dr. Michael Patison presented the composite report of the Cabinet. The highlight of the report was the announcement that for the first time in our Conference a black preacher, Dr. J. D. Phillips, will be appointed to the predominately white church of St. Andrews, Killeen. The report was adopted.

Bishop Russell asked Dr. & Mrs. J. D. Phillips and the delegates from St. Andrews, Killeen, to come to the front of the conference in order that the conference might celebrate the Conference's first cross-racial appointment.

Personal Privilege - Don Pike asked that everyone make their contribution for Bishop and Mrs. Russell. Jim Sanders led a small group in a renditon of "The Eyes of Texas".

Lay Employee Benefit Committee - Fred Woerner made the report which was approved.

Committee on Christian Unity Report - Rev. Janice Cain presented the report which was approved with applause.

Board of Pensions - Dr. Richard Millsap, chairperson of the Board of Pensions, made the report. The printed report #2 became report #4, and reports #3 and #4 were presented. Report #1 was approved.

Laity Ballot #4 - Bishop Russell announced the results of Laity Ballot #4. There were 324 ballots cast with 2 invalid. 161 votes were needed to elect. No one was elected.

Clergy Ballot #4 - Bishop Russell announced the results of Clergy Ballot #4. 225 ballots were cast with 3 invalid. 112 votes were needed to elect. No one was elected.

Board of Pensions (continued) - Vidette Bullock was presented to the conference. She will serve as the General Board of Pensions new representative to our Conference.

Report #2: 1961 Supply Years Correction Report was read to the conference by Richard Millsap. This is an editorial correction to a prior year's mistake. It was adopted. Report #3 was presented by Richard Millsap and was approved. The Insurance Committee report was given by Glen Whitley. Proposal #2 was approved to replace line 63-68 on pg. 30 of the preliminary report. A change in the report was approved. This report will be continued tomorrow.

Laity Ballot #5 - Bishop Russell reported on Laity Ballot #5. 322 ballots were cast with 4 being invalid. 160 votes were needed for election. Barbara Wendland was elected with 172 votes.

Clergy Ballot #5 - Bishop Russell reported on Clergy Ballot #5. 215 ballots were cast with 3 being invalid. 107 votes were needed for election. Elected were: Charles McClure - 123, and Don Pike - 116.

Armouncements - Bishop Russell announced that the Service of Consecration will be held at Austin Avenue UMC at 7:30 p.m. Bishop Russell announced that the devotional periods would be better served if they are not interrupted. Gordon Dennis asked that the Committee on Resolutions meet following adjournment. Gordon Dennis informed the

conference that tapes of the worship services are available for purchase. Bishop Russell dismissed the conference with prayer.

SIXTH SESSION - TUESDAY EVENING, JUNE 2, 1987

Service of Consecration - The service was held at the Austin Avenue UMC in Waco, Texas, at 7:30 p.m. Those who provided leadership were: Bishop Russell; William Hinson, conference preacher; Nelda Barrett; Rosalind Shirley; Dorothy Dahl; and Gene Lorey. Special music was presented by the choir of Genesis UMC of Fort Worth. Five were consecrated as Diaconal Ministers: Frankie Jeanne Adams, Charles R. Gee, Linda Ray Miller, Melissa A. M. Nichols, and Eric Vaughn Rothe.

SEVENTH SESSION - WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 3, 1987

Bishop Russell called the conference to order and instructed that the doors of the Convention Center be closed at 8:30 in order for the devotion to be conducted without interruption. Gene Lorey led the conference in singing "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing". Al Gregory presided at the devotion time and led the conference in singing the hymn, "My Hope Is Built". Barbara Lucas read the scripture lesson. J. D. Phillips spoke on the theme "Loving In Order To Win"; Cheryl Phillips sang "To God Be The Glory".

Bishop Russell announced a revised agenda for the morning: reporting of ballots, taking of ballots, Committee on Minutes, Board of Pensions, Interconference Committee on Hispanic Ministries, Capital Funds, Board of Laity, Board of Diaconal Ministry, Area Director of Professional Ministries, Commission on Religion and Race, Retired Ministers Homes, Equitable Salaries, and Hymnal Revision Committee.

Laity Ballot #6 - Bishop Russell reported on Laity Ballot #6. 294 ballots were cast with 1 being invalid. 147 votes were needed to elect. There was no election. Laity Ballot #7 was called for.

Clergy Ballot #6 - Bishop Russell reported on Clergy Ballot #6. 213 ballots were cast with all being valid. 107 votes were needed to elect. Ruth Huber-Rohlfs was elected with 112 votes. Clergy Ballot #7 was called for.

Committee on Minutes - Babe Goad reported that the committee had reviewed the minutes from June 1 and the morning of June 2 and they were in order. The report was approved.

Board of Pensions (continued) - Insurance - Glen Whitley moved that the Standing Rules be suspended so that a motion concerning insurance might be considered at this time. The rules were suspended. Richard Freeman moved that the Central Texas Annual Conference enroll its current and future retired ministers in the Death Benefit Plan, Plus, of the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church, beginning as of this session of the Annual Conference; Further, that the basis for the determination of rates and benefits be the average salary of the Central Texas Annual Conference; Further, that annual funding for our participation in D.B.P., Plus, be taken from the Conference insurance reserve. The motion was approved.

Richard Millsap moved the adoption of the Board of Pensions resolution on p. 32, lines 20-35. It was adopted. The entire report of the Board of Pensions was adopted.

Interconference Committee on Hispanic Ministries - Wanda Kile presented the report for the Committee. Report #1 (p. 47 in preliminary report) was adopted. Wanda Kile introduced Mr. Fred Vidaurri, Fraternal Delegate from the Rio Grande Annual Conference, who brought greetings from Bishop Dixon and the Rio Grande Conference. He introduced consideration of Report #3. Fred Vidaurri introduced Jim Porter who recognized the outstanding cooperation of two congregations for their work during the past year: First UMC of Temple, and First UMC of Moody. Lay delegates and pastors from these churches were recognized. A banner was presented to both congregations to symbolize the affirmation of

our Conference for their outstanding cooperative ministries. The pastor and lay delegates from Joshua UMC were also recognized for their outstanding support in regard to the

renovation of the La Trinidad UMC parsonage in Fort Worth. The Joshua Church received a certificate of appreciation.

Fred Vidaurri called on John Valles who presented Report #2 which was adopted. Report #4 was adopted. The entire report of the Interconference Committee was adopted.

Laity Ballot #7 - Bishop Russell reported on ballot #7. 319 ballots were cast with all being valid. 160 votes were necessary for election. Pat Stroman with 185 votes was elected. Laity Ballot #8 was called for.

Clergy Ballot #7 - was reported by Bishop Russell. 215 votes were cast will all being valid. 108 votes were necessary for election. There was no election. Clergy Ballot #8 was called for.

Capital Funds Report - Ken Smith presented this report. He was assisted by Dana Sullivan, Director of the follow-up campaign. A "Progress Report" was distributed to the conference. Richard Millsap expressed appreciation to the Conference for the support given to the Board of Pensions through the Capital Funds Campaign. Claus Rohlfs spoke concerning Glen Lake Camp's progress and benefits facilitated through the Capital Funds Campaign. James Shuler expressed appreciation for the Commission on Church Growth and Development's support through the Campaign.

Dana Sullivan called on Bishop Russell who spoke concerning the Conference Capital Funds Campaign and urged renewed support for the Campaign. Dana Sullivan spoke concerning the current status of the Campaign. Ken Smith thanked the conference on behalf of those who had given leadership to the Campaign. The report was adopted.

Council on Planned Giving - Michael Heiskell gave the report which was adopted.

Board of Laity Report - Ken Smith, chairperson, began the Board of Laity Report and introduced Helen Marshall, Conference President of United Methodist Women. She referred to the U.M.W. report and to upcoming events. She reported that the Conference U.M.W. units overpaid their missions pledge. There will be a Conference-wide U.M.W. Day on the 4th Sunday of September each year. The report of the U.M.W. was accepted with deep

Troy Chapman, President of the Conference United Methodist Men, gave their report. By announcing the activities and program of the Methodist Men, it was seen that they are quite active. This report was approved with appreciation.

Clergy Ballot #8 - was reported by Bishop Russell. 217 ballots were cast with 3 being invalid. 108 votes were necessary for election. There were no elections. Clergy Ballot #9 was called for.

Board of Laity Report (continued) - Ken Smith called on Troy Chapman who made presentations of Life Membership Awards to Mike Pinson and Louis Pitcock. The awards were presented with appreciation for their long hours of work on behalf of the United Methodist Men. Ken Smith then called on LaSchwanna Stevenson, President of the Conference Council on Youth Ministires, who reported for C.C.Y.M. She expressed gratitude to persons serving as District Youth Coordinators, and to Eugene Robertson, Cabinet representative. Miss Stevenson presented a gift of \$2000 for the Challenge Grant from the Mabee Foundation for the construction of a small group lodge at Glen Lake Camp. Art Husband gave the report for the Committee on Lay Speaking and recognized all Lay Speakers within our Annual Conference. He moved the adoption of this report.

Ken Smith made the presentation of the Morris Walker Laity Scholarship Award to Ross Senter of First UMC, Crowley. The clergy recipient of the award was Richard Penna, pastor of Genesis UMC, Fort Worth. Mr. Senter and Rev. Penna addressed the conference. The entire report of the Board of Laity was adopted.

Clergy Ballot #9 - Bishop Russell reported on ballot #9. 216 ballots were cast with all being valid. 109 votes were necessary for election. There were no elections. Clergy Ballot #10 was called for.

Area Committee on Professional Ministry – Rev. Ron Henderson was called upon by Bishop Russell to give the report. Rev. Henderson called on Ervin Gathings, the Area Director of Professional Ministry, who addressed the conference. The report was adopted.

Southwestern University - Dr. Roy Shilling, President of Southwestern University, brought greetings from the college.

Texas United Methodist College Association - Dr. Joe Elmore, President of the association, spoke to the conference expressing gratitude for their support. Dr. Elmore also expressed gratitude on behalf of Dr. John King, President of Huston-Tillotson College, for the Annual Conference offering to benefit Huston-Tillotson.

S.M.U., Perkins School of Theology - Beverly Sawyer, Associate Dean of Student Life, and Jim Lewis, Developmental Officer at Perkins, brought greetings to the conference on behalf of S.M.U. and Perkins School of Theology.

Ministerial Education Fund Report - Tim Russell and Dorothy Dahl presented this report and expressed gratitude for the support of the Conference for the fund. Dorothy Dahl read a resolution from the Council of Bishops concerning the 20th anniversary of the Ministerial Education Fund.

Clergy Ballot #10 - was reported by Bishop Russell. 220 ballots were cast with all being valid. 111 votes were necessary for election. Barry Bailey was elected with 112. Thus all delegates to General Conference have been elected. Bishop Russell called for ballot #11 to elect six persons as Jurisdictional delegates.

Laity Ballot #1 for Jurisdiction - was reported by Bishop Russell. 324 ballots were cast with 8 being invalid. 159 votes were necessary for election. Two persons were elected: Dorothy Dahl - 202, and Bill Auvenshine - 165.

Hymnal Revision Committee Report - Ruth Huber-Rohlfs presented the report. Ann Burnett, Minister of Music at Colleyville UMC, sang for the conference as part of the presentation. She was accompanied by Susan Ramsdell. The conference joined in singing "We Are Marching To Zion". The report was adopted.

Announcements - were made by Tim Russell and Eldon Mahon.

Bob Briles moved that the conference send greetings to Dr. Bob Evans who is gravely ill. The motion was approved. Joe McAfee asked that the conference send greetings to Rev. & Mrs. Harvey Raines. The motion was approved. Jim Porter asked that the conference keep the mother of Gene Lorey in prayer as she is gravely ill.

The session was adjourned.

EIGHTH SESSION - HEALTH & WELFARE LUNCHEON, JUNE 3, 1987

Ed Otwell led the conference in prayer. Bishop Russell called the conference to order and called on Elden Traster for the Health & Welfare Committee report.

Methodist Home - Dr. Jack Kyle Daniels gave the report for the Methodist Home and expressed appreciation for the continued support of the Conference. He reported that the Methodist Home has been examined for accreditation during the year and received the highest rating possible. Andy McDonald, a former resident of Methodist Home, spoke to the conference. McDonald, a pre-medical student at Baylor University, told the conference of his high appreciation for the Methodist Home.

Elden Traster introduced the statement of relationship (on p. 17 of the preliminary report) concerning the Methodist Home. He moved its adoption. Approved.

Elden Traster introduced Bill Bishop, the new director of U.C.C. in Fort Worth. Chris McCormick, Director of Development of Wesleyan Homes, Inc. in Georgetown, Texas, was introduced and gave the report, particularly noting the expansion of the Nursing Home facility. He gave recognition to 27 churches who met or exceeded the goal of giving 35¢ per member. He called upon E. B. Baker, a nursing home administrator from Austin, whose mother was a resident of Wesleyan's Nursing Home. Baker offered expressions of praise and appreciation The Wesleyan Home Report was adopted.

Methodist Mission Home - Elden Traster introduced Larry Watson to present the Methodist Mission Home Report. He introduced Fred and Kathy Rector, a couple who had adopted through the Mission Home's Maternity Services Adoption Program. The Rectors spoke to the conference. Steve Slagger, Director of the Mission Home's Southwest Center for the Hearing Impaired, was introduced, and he spoke to the conference. The relationship statement (p. 21-22) concerning The Methodist Mission Home was presented by Elden Traster. It was adopted. The Methodist Mission Home report as a whole was approved.

Harris Methodist Hospital System - Ron Smith, Administrator of the Harris System, was introduced to the conference and presented the report. He recognized Julie Brown and her work on behalf of Harris with local churches. He then called attention to the media presentation. Mr. Smith expressed gratitude for the Conference support of the Golden Cross Program. The report of Harris Methodist Hospital System as a whole was adopted.

The Committee of 18 Report - Elden Traster called Mike Pinson who introduced "The Miracles", a choir from the Baddour Center for the Mildly and Moderately Retarded in Sentobia, Mississippi. They sang "He Is Jehovah", Not By Might, Not By Power, But By The Spirit, Says the Lord". Thornton Chisholm of the Miracles, who grew up in the Mexia State School, soloed for the conference. He sang "You've Done It Unto Me".

Elden Traster introduced the resolution (p. 55) to establish a center for the mildly and moderately retarded persons. On behalf of the Health and Welfare Committee, this resolution was recommended to the conference. Don Pike moved that the report be referred back to the Committee of 18 for continued study and reporting back to the 1988 session of this Annual Conference, with the report to include the following:

 a documented statement of need to include names of verified potential clients and the names of verified potential donors of fiscal support.

2. a detailed operating budget for the first two years of operation.

A request was made for prayer before a vote on this matter was taken. The Bishop assured that this request would be granted. The call for the question on this and all that is before the conference was made by Mary Weathers. The call for question was supported. Bishop Russell asked the conference to pray silently about the matter before the conference. A vote on the motion to refer was taken. The motion to refer was defeated. A vote was taken on the resolution (p. 55), and it passed.

Gary Turner moved that the poem read by Mrs. Rector be included in the Health & Welfare report under the report of the Methodist Mission Home and be printed in the Conference Journal. The motion was approved.

The Articles of Incorporation for the Aldersgate Enrichment Center (p. 55) were adopted by the conference. The entire report of the Health & Welfare Committee was adopted. The entire report of ACCOM was adopted.

The luncheon was adjourned.

NINTH SESSION - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 3, 1987

Bishop Russell called the session to order. Jane Lovett led the devotional time, speaking on the theme, "We Have This Moment To Hold In Our Hands". Roger Wood led the conference in the prayer for the people.

Bishop Russell asked those to be ordained Elder to meet with Tim Russell immediately.

Laity Ballot #2 (for Jurisdictional Conference) - Bishop Russell reported on this ballot. 317 ballots were cast with 8 being invalid. 155 votes were necessary for election. Two were elected: Wesley Sears - 191, and Hiram - 176. Ballot #3 was called.

Clergy Ballot #1 (for Jurisdictional Conference) - was reported by Bishop Russell. 218 ballots were cast with 1 being invalid. 109 votes were necessary for election. There were 3 elected: Luther Henry - 141, Eugene Robertson - 114, and J. D. Phillips - 109. Clergy Ballot #2 was called for.

Black College Fund - Mary Gean Cope introduced Demitra Stewart who is representing the Black College Fund.

Cokesbury Presentation - Jeff Hobbs of Fort Worth Cokesbury Bookstore was recognized by Bishop Russell to address the conference. On behalf of the Methodist Publishing, he presented to Bishop Russell and the Central Texas Conference a check in the amount of \$10,011.13 to be applied to the Board of Pensions.

Committee on Conference Relations - Tim Russell called on Barbara Lucas to present those elected as Associate Members of the Conference: Bill R. Easley and Herb C. Marlow. Those elected as Deacons and Probationary Members were introduced to the conference.

Newly elected Elders in full connection were introduced. Jim Porter addressed the Conference and presented those in full connection who are retiring at this session of the Annual Conference. Each retiree and spouse addressed the conference. The conference joined together by standing in applause to express appreciation.

Board of Ordained Ministry - Tim Russell presented question #66 (last page of BOM report) and amended the time for Cecil Reed to 3/4 time, and Joe D. Worley to 3/4 time. These corrections were approved. Tim Russell addressed the conference concerning changes in Board of Ordained Ministry policies. The entire report of the Board was approved.

Laity ballot #3 (for Jurisdictional Conference) - was reported by Bishop Russell. 306 ballots were cast with 3 being invalid. 152 votes were needed to elect. No one was elected. Bishop Russell called for Laity Ballot #4 for Jurisdictional delegates.

Clergy Ballot #2 (for Jurisdictional Conference) - was reported by Bishop Russell. 219 ballots were cast with 5 being invalid. 108 votes were needed to elect. Tim Russell was elected with 127 votes.

Commission on Religion and Race - Bob Briles presented the report for the Commission (p. 43 of preliminary report). He expressed appreciation to the Bishop and Cabinet in making the first appointment of a black minister to a predominately white congregation. The appointment of J. D. Phillips heralds a new beginning for our Conference. The report was adopted.

Report from Agenda Committee - Luther Henry presented the resolution concerning the determination of site for future Annual Conferences. The resolution was approved.

Personal Privilege – Ben Feemster moved that the conference send to Rev. Hubert Taylor our concern and prayers during this difficult time, and to Dr. Walker Railey 'Our prayers and thoughts are with you and your family in these difficult days'. Approved.

Stephen Soulen invited Candler alums to breakfast at Tanglewood Farms on Thursday, June 4, at 7:15 a.m. Michael Patison introduced Gerald Kajogo Iguna from Kenya who is a member of the Kenya Annual Conference. David Leach asked that greetings be sent to Freida Stroup, lay member from Whitney.

Bishop Russell dismissed the conference with prayer.

TENTH SESSION - WEDNESDAY EVENING, JUNE 3, 1987

Service of Ordination - was held at Austin Avenue UMC, Waco, Texas, at 7:30 p.m. Those presiding at the service included Bishop Russell, Tim Russell, Barbara Lucas, and Al Pitts. Dr. William Hinson, conference preacher, offered the sermon. The choir of First UMC, Round Rock, brought the choral anthem. Special music was presented by Terri Wallis, harpist, and Cynthia Felder, soloist. Eleven persons were ordained Elders. Sixteen were ordained as Deacons.

ELEVENTH SESSION - THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 4, 1987

The Bishop called the session to order. Jim Chandler led the devotional period. Ben Marney led the conference in singing "In Christ There Is No East or West". Jim Chandler spoke on the theme, "Called To Make a Difference".

Committee on Minutes - Babe Goad reported that the Committee on Minutes had reviewed the minutes and found them to be in order. She moved that the Committee on Minutes be authorized to approve final minutes after adjournment of conference. Approved.

Robert Linnstaedt moved that the conference send greetings to Sue Thomas, wife of Rev. Tim Thomas, on the event of her birthday today.

Ervin Gathings moved that, for all the remaining reports that are printed in the pre-conference reports, where there are no legislative items involved, the presenter identify the page # of the report and move its adoption without amplification by the presenter. The motion was passed.

The report of the Annual Conference offering received for Huston-Tillotson College totaled \$10,187.09 (not including the Wednesday p.m. offering). The announcement was met with applause.

Laity Ballot #4 (for Jurisdiction) - Bishop Russell reported that 294 ballot were cast with all being valid. 148 votes were necessary for election. Elected were: Donna Paustian - 181, and Helen Marshall - 148. Bishop Russell called for Laity Ballot #5. Hollis Trietsch moved that the three persons receiving the most votes on the next laity ballot be declared the reserve delegates to Jurisdictional Conference, in the order of their vote talley. It was approved.

Clergy Ballot (for Jurisdiction) - Bishop Russell reported that 202 ballots were cast with 2 being invalid. 101 were needed to elect. Elected was Tom Robbins - 120 votes.

Ethnic Minority Local Church Report - Rev. Dolly Scott presented the report calling attention to the printed report. She introduced a children's program sponsored by St. John's UMC. The program called "Talent Alive" is financially supported with EMLC funds.

The Talent Alive children's choir sang. Juliet Hall of Mt. Zion UMC, Waco, reported on EMLC work in that church. Jane Mathis and Johnny Longthall spoke about the Voice of Calvary program. Jeannie Trevino-Teddlie reminded the conference of the way the Interconference Hispanic Ministries works through this church. Kell's Branch UMC spoke words of thanks for EMLC funds. Robert Campbell of Pelham/Brushy Prairie U.M. Churches offered appreciation for EMLC funds. Demetria Stewart gave thanks to the conference for paying 100% of the Black College Fund. The report was approved.

Laity Ballot - 256 ballots were cast with all being valid. The three persons elected as reserve delegates to Jurisdictional Conference were: Mary Gean Cope, Nell Ramsey, and Patricia Stroman.

Clergy Ballot - Bishop Russell reported that 187 ballots were cast with 3 being invalid. 93 votes were necessary for election. Elected was Sidney Roberts with 102 votes. Bill Boyd moved that the three top vote-getters on the next ballot be named as reserve delegates, in the order of number of votes received. Approved.

Motion & Resolution - Luther Felder introduced a resolution concerning "The Sullivan Principles" and "The Apartheid Policy of South Africa". Jake Shelley moved that the rules be suspended and consideration be allowed on this resolution. There was a second. Suspension was not granted, and thus the resolution could not be considered.

Board of Diaconal Ministry - The report began with a solo by Cynthia Felder. Dorothy Dahl presided over the report. This is the 10th birthday of the Board. Dorothy Dahl expressed special appreciation to H. F. Meier, who has served as the Cabinet representative to the Board. The printed report was reviewed by Dahl, who moved acceptance of Report #1. It was approved. Report #2 was presented and approved. Reports #3 and #4 were presented by Rosalind Shirley and Jeannie Trevino-Teddlie. Certification and Renewal were granted for those listed in the reports. Diaconal Ministers retiring at this Annual Conference were: Alice Johnson, Mary W. Teal, and Lee M. Vance. Leaves of absence were granted for Clifton Dobbins III and Brenda Wier. Those in process of candidacy and continuing in candidacy were noted. Receiving certificates as Diaconals are Frankie Jeanne Adams, Charles R. Gee, Linda Ray Miller, Melissa A. M. Nichols, Eric Vaughn Rothe. Report #3 was then adopted. The report as a whole was adopted.

Homes for Retired Ministers Report - Edis Sluder called attention to the printed report. With one correction the report was approved.

Equitable Salary and Clergy Benefits Committee - Patricia Stroman, chairperson, presented time report and moved its adoption. The conference gave approval to the report.

Church Growth & Development - Wes Sears introduced the report and called on James Shuler, Executive Director of Church Growth and Development, who spoke of their work during the past year. Homer Kluck spoke of the new Korean congregations in Killeen, Copperas Cove, and Harker Heights. Ed Otwell spoke of the new Korean congregation being formed in Waco. Ben Feemster reported on a new Korean congregation in Fort Worth which is utilizing the old St. John's property. James Shuler spoke appreciation to Clyde Zellers for his work with the congregation of Minters Chapel UMC, and to Norman Bruner and his work with the new congregation at Lake Brownwood.

Clergy Ballot (for Jurisdiction) - Bishop Russell reported that 181 ballots were cast with 4 being invalid. Elected as reserve delegates were: Michael Patison, Henry Radde, and Ervin Gathings.

Conference Statistician - Leonard Radde presented the report as amended. Approved.

Status and Role of Women Report - Jane Lovett presided over the report. She expressed appreciation to H. F. Meier who has served as the Cabinet representative to COSROW. The report was approved.

Committee on Conference Office Complex - Hank Carroll presented the report. He called the names of the Committee members and informed the conference of progress made. The report was approved.

Committee on the Episcopacy - This report (p. 46 in preliminary report) was presented by Hank Carroll. The report was adopted.

Committee on Nominations - Luther Henry gave the report. It was approved as amended. Luther Henry made a motion authorizing the extended cabinet to nominate to fill vacancies which occur during the year. The motion was approved.

Ministry to U.S. Laypersons Overseas - Mary Weathers presented the report and spoke of the work being done in Germany in ministering to U.S. citizens living there. This report was approved.

Conference Credit Union Report - Walter Black presented the report. It was adopted.

Clen Lake Camp Report - Claus Rohlfs presented the report and presented a resolution concerning reconstruction of the cabins at Glen Lake Camp. It passed.

Glen Lake Camp Trustees' Report - W. C. Taylor gave the report which was approved.

Council on Finance & Administration - Jake Shelley called attention to the C.F.A. report #1 and made a date correction. This report was adopted. Report #2 was given and adopted. Shelley introduced the proposed 1988 budget which was corrected to reflect the actions of this Annual Conference. After discussion the budget was adopted. The entire report of C.F.A. was adopted.

Personal Privilege - Michael Patison presented the Conference Lay Leader, Ken Smith, who gave a check of \$2278 to Bishop Russell. The gift is to be used for a personal vacation.

Bishop Russell led the conference in prayer and adjourned the conference until 2:00.

TWELFTH SESSION - THURSDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 4, 1987

Bishop Russell called the conference to order. He announced the agenda for the session. He expressed gratitude to the Annual Conference for the love offering given to him and his wife, and for the love, support, and prayers they have received during the past months.

Ben Feemster moved that greetings be sent to three ministers of the Fort Worth West District: Dr. Gaston Foote, Rev. Ken Edwards, and Rev. John Shipman. It was approved.

Ben Feemster informed the conference that the General and Jurisdictional delegation had met, had considered the motion spoken to earlier by Luther Felder concerning the "Sullivan Principles" and apartheid; and had voted unanimously to support that resolution.

Warren Green was recognized by Bishop Russell to express a matter of concern...the Hymnal Revision. The concern deals with the exclusion of hymns which refer to "space". Addressing local churches, Green urged the following:

1. that we commend the Committee for its dedicated work.

 that we request the Committee to refrain from using its good work as a platform to advocate the personal political views of some; and further that the Committee leave the selection of hymns that can be sung in Methodist churches up to the local congregations of the Church.

Mt. Sequoyah Report - Ken Smith presented the report as printed in the preliminary report. It was approved.

Conference Board of Trustees - Elden Traster reported for the Conference Trustees (p. 32-33). The three resolutions were considered. Resolution #1 was approved. Resolution #2 was approved with the addition of the address of the property, 1600 Circle Park Drive, included in the resolution. Resolution #3 was approved. The resolution concerning Bell Plains Cemetery Property was considered by the conference and approved. The report as a whole was approved.

The conference agreed to send words of comfort to Mrs. J. W. Sellers and Mrs. McIver, lay delegate from Santa Anna, upon the death of Mrs. McIver's mother and Mrs. Sellers' grandmother. The conference agreed to send get-well greetings to Katherine Young, a patient in Harris Hospital.

Lydia Patterson - Dr. Ted Grout presented the report and expressed appreciation for the support of the Central Texas Annual Conference. He invited persons in attendance to visit Lydia Patterson when they were in El Paso.

Commission on Archives and History Report - Jean Traster presented the report (p. 33-34). The report was corrected by Mrs. Traster. It was adopted.

The Bishop recognized Rev. Andrew Fowler who presented a report on the Advance Special giving for 1986. This Conference is now fifth in our Jurisdiction in this giving.

Personal Privilege - Don Kingman made a motion to send greetings to Rev. W. F. Smith, a retired minister in our Conference. The motion passed.

Property Reports - A resolution was made by Eugene Robertson concerning Hillsboro's Brown Chapel declared abandoned. It was approved.

Personal Privilege - Gordon Dennis offered words of thanks to the tellers, secretarial staff, Barbara Vaughan, and Sharon Conger. The Bishop included in that list, Gordon Dennis, Conference Secretary. Personal privilege was given to Bishop Russell. Richard Millsap thanked Bishop Russell for helping with the Capital Funding Campaign.

Resolutions and Courtesy Committee - The report of the Committee was presented by William Horick. It was approved.

Bishop Russell closed the conference with the reading of the appointments. The conference joined in singing "God Be With You Till We Meet Again".

VI. REPORTS

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE CABINET

Bishop Russell, colleagues of the Cabinet, clergy and lay members, and friends and visitors at this one hundred twenty-first annual session since founding of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church; grace to you and peace from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

In accordance with the tradition of the Central Texas Conference, I, as Dean of the Cabinet, make this report on behalf of the Cabinet. Such reports are to add to the historical record of the life of the Conference and to provide some insights into some of its actions, accomplishments. and dreams.

From the cutset of this report the leadership of Bishop John W. Russell must be praised for it has been integral to the success of this Conference. It is obvious that he has been able to lead us only because he first has been willing to follow the leadership of the Holy Spirit himself. He has been much involved in dealing with and finding solutions for crisis situations in United Methodist institutions and in clergy matters and in local church affairs. Despite the fact that these have been burdens added to the already heavy demends of the episcopal office, he has never made hasty or harsh judgmants, never complained of the responsibilities, nor done anything other than face each issue honestly, openly, and with Christian grace. The Letter To Titus sets forth the qualities expected of the episcopacy: "For a bishop, as God's steward, must be blameless; he must not be arrogant or quick-tempered or a drunkard or violent or greedy for gain, but hospitable, a lover of goodness, master of himself, upright, holy, and self-controlled; he must hold firm to the sure word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to confute those who contradict it." We who work most closely with him have found Bishop Russell to exemplify every one of these virtues, and we admire him, we respect him, and we love him.

United Methodism believes in evangelism, and our annual conference is emphasizing the winning of people to Christ. Each district has a task force on evangelism and is stressing this vital Christian work, striving to provide leadership in this cause. But evangelism is not a program. Rather, it is a matter of will. We believe that this will is being demonstrated, and we are trying to provide the tools to enable those with the vision to accomplish it. Again this year our Conference has had a net gain in membership, which though far smaller than we would like, yet testifies to the commitment of our primary task.

At last June's Jurisdictional Bishops' Week, Bishop Russell delivered a series of lecture/sermons on the subject of "Your Church as Evangelist." These were so dynamic, so challenging, that the Cabinets of the Central Texas and North Texas Conferences directed that they be edited into a study series, and the study will be available this fall. The Cabinet strongly urges that it be used in every congregation through church-wide sessions, in Sunday School classes. by home-study groups, and any other effective means.

in Sunday School classes, by home-study groups, and any other effective means. Our Conference continually is seeking revitalization, and such a process now is actively involving our churches and pastors. As a part of this, the Cabinet is sponsoring a major event in Fort Worth November 20-21 for all ministers, both diaconal and ordained. Two nationally recognized leaders from Chandler School of Theology will be present; Dr. George Morris will be our leader in evangelism, and Dr. Fred Craddock will be our leader in preaching.

A major reason for Christian growth in our Conference has been the eagerness of its members to establish new congregations. The money designated for new church sites already coming in from our three-year capital funding campaign has enabled us to purchase property on which to build a new church. The continuing generous support of Church Growth Shares has made it possible for us to place two new full-time pastors. When the appointments are read, you will note that a pastor is assigned to establish the new church in southeast Arlington.

Last year two Korean Missions were begun, one in Fort Worth West and the other in Harker Heights. Both of these already have been chartered as churches, and now two more such congregations are in the process of organization, one of them in Copperas Cove and the other in Waco. The establishment of new churches now is an annual and continuing activity of this Conference.

The Central Texas Conference is as determined today as it always has been to extend the gospel of love and service around the world. We know that as the Body of Christ we are called not to be ministered to, but to minister. We do not exist to serve curselves, but to serve those who need conversion and compassion, wherever and whoever they are. As Jesus went about doing good, so do we try to do, going into all the world to make disciples. We are engaged in a world-wide ministry with many of the local churches of the Conference engaged in second-mile missionary programs which they have adopted over and above the minimum expected of them. Once again this past year our Annual Conference has paid one hundred percent of its apportionments. Despite difficult financial conditions in some areas of the Conference, the United Methodists of Central Texas have made sure that they put their most important benevolences first, and they have done it not because it is a tradition that our Conference always does so, but because this is what being the Church is all about. We expect to be just as Christian in our benevolence in this new year.

One of the primary responsibilities of the Cabinet is to assist the bishop in making pastoral appointments, and this is a task which we take prayerfully and seriously. Consultation with local churches to understand their needs and with pastors to understand their needs is an important ingredient in this process. We strive to be sensitive to the desires of the clergy in making the appointments. Special family concerns always are given consideration. The particular requirements of clergy couples are taken into account. In all these matters we try to fulfill the desires of those involved.

At the same time, we know that pastors exist to serve the Church, not the Church to serve the clergy, and that we are called to find pastors for churches, not to find churches for pastors. Our primary concern is to appoint pastors who can meet the needs of the churches to which they are sent. Since District Superintendents of the entire conference and not of seven autonomous districts, we strive to make the appointments with the welfare of all the churches of the annual conference in mind rather than in a narrow parochial fashion. We have dedicated ourselves to do our best to do this without favoritism or prejudice.

We rejoice that there are so many able and dedicated clergy serving in the Central Texas Conference; ministers of integrity who are compassionate, articulate, diligent, intelligent, talented, and persons of true piety. Their records bear witness to their call and their commitment. These have submitted themselves to serve the Lord wherever they are most needed, and they willingly go where appointed. Their ministry invariably has borne good fruit.

As in all other areas of life, particular gifts and graces differ within the clergy, and ministers meet the needs of some churches better than they do those of others. The Conference's Board of Ordained Ministry has the responsibility for qualifying persons for ministry, and the Cabinet has the responsibility for appointing those so qualified. This Cabinet is active in cooperating with this Board in assisting those clergy who have proved to be inadequate in several pastorates either to improve the quality of their ministry, or to find some other area of service outside the realm of ordination. We are dedicated to do all we can to improve the competence of ministry.

The Cabinet has an intentional commitment to open itinerancy, particularly as it relates to women and minorities in ministry. As a part of this concern, we have met during the year with Black clergy members in order that we might hear their concerns. Our Annual Conference already has been served by a Black district superintendent, who currently still serves on the Extended Cabinet. And the time is coming when a woman likewise will serve on

the Cabinet. The appointment of a woman to the position of Senior Pastor already has taken place with excellent results. This session of our Annual Conference is historic because for the first time one of its ablest Black members will be appointed as Senior Pastor of a predominantly White congregation. The St. Andrews Church of Killeen and the Cabinet have taken the initiative in seeking such an appointment, and Dr. J.D. Phillips, a most appropriate minister to fill this position, will fill the appointment. This is the first step in the direction of what we believe will become a normal part of the life of the Conference. Yet, all first steps are momentous occasions, and we celebrate this one.

This has been a significant year in the life of the Central Texas Annual Conference, one which has been built on the heritage of the past and which hopefully will provide a firm foundation for the future. Like Paul we know that we have not yet "arrived", but like him we intend to press on toward the mark for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. In good Methodist terms, then, let us intend to go on to perfection. Respectfully submitted,

ANNUAL CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Report No. 1

1. The Council on Finance and Administration commends the members of the Annual Conference, the churches and the membership of the churches for their financial response and responsibility in 1986. Our conference has a long tradition of such financial responsibility and the Council on Finance and Administration looks forward to continuing that tradition.

2. The salary for the District Superintendents shall be an amount equal to 110% of the average of the salary and allowances paid to pastors of the top twenty (20) churches of the Conference. It shall be computed on the basis of salaries approved by the Charge Conferences which appear on the Episcopal work sheets as of February 1 or as soon as possible prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference. The figures will be compiled by the Assistant to the Bishop and sent to the President of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference Director of Finance and Administration within five days. (The 1988 salary for a District Superintendent will be \$57,000.) The Ministerial Pension Plan Ourrent Service amount of 12% of the Denominational Average Compensation, billed directly to the Conference, will be added to the above salary for apportionment to the districts. An allowance of \$3600 for travel outside the bounds of the district is included in the salary for the District Superintendent.

3. The Conference offices of Director of Finance and Administration, Director of the Council on Ministries, and Director of Church Growth and Development will receive a salary equal to that of the District Superintendents. For 1988 that salary will be \$57,000. This amount includes an allowance for utilities and maintenance of \$4,000 for the above named three offices. Travel allowances may be part of the respective Council's or Commission's budget.

4. The district committees on finance are authorized to prepare budgets for presentation to the District Stewards. An amount equal to 10% of the salary for the District Superintendent may be included in the district budget to defray the utility costs of the district parsonage. In addition, an amount equal to 10% of the salary may be included in the district budget for travel expenses of the District Superintendent. District Budgets shall not include a discretionary fund, but may include a District Operations Expense item with a parenthetical explanation of its intent. The district budget shall be submitted to the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration for approval each year. The District Stewards are authorized to apportion a Connectional Contingency Fund to be used for paying in full apportionment items which may fall short within the respective district. The apportionments will not include the traditional cushion. The Connectional Contingency Fund will be administered at the district level in the same means as the District Work Fund. It is understood that if a portion of the Connectional Contingency Fund is not used in any given year, it will remain in the fund and future apportionment funds will be reduced. Any adjustments for unusual local church situations will be made in the apportionment of the Connectional Contingency Funds only. All other apportionments will be distributed to every local church on the basis of the decimal.

5. In 1988 the Conference Claimants Fund will include the Ministerial Pension Plan Past Service amount of \$966,501.

6. The Connectional Ministry amount will be \$516,998. Included in this amount is the Episcopal Fund \$97,258 and the District Superintendent's Fund \$419,740. The District Superintendent's Fund includes the salaries and the Ministerial Pension Plan Current Service amount.

7. The Council recommends the request from the Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry that the amount for the Texas Methodist College Association be \$1.60 multiplied by the total Conference local church membership. The Council also recommends the request from the Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry that the amount for the Wesley Foundation Fund be \$1.05 multiplied by the total Conference local church membership. Both funds shall be apportioned to the districts and to the local churches on the decimal authorized by the Annual Conference.

8. The Council recommends that the Equitable Salary Fund be drawn from monies deposited with the Texas Methodist Foundation.

9. We recommend the appointment of Dr. Gordon Dennis as Director of Finance and Administration of the Central Texas Conference.

Report No. 2

1. The Conference Council on Finance and Administration approves and recommends the following offerings be taken in all local churches of the Central Texas Conference on or near the dates designated:

2. While no special day is designated for an offering for the Texas Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc., we approve this special cause for either an appropriation from the budget in the local church, or a special offering taken at such time as the local church determines.

3. In keeping with the requirements of the Discipline, the apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences will be combined into one fund, namely, World Service and Conference Benevolences. This fund, along with Connectional Ministry, Conference Claimant's Fund, Minister's Insurance, Texas Methodist College Association, Wesley Foundation Ministerial Education Fund, Black Methodist College Fund, Missional Priority Fund, and Lydia Patterson, will be apportioned to the Districts on the decimal figure, established annually, as authorized in the Standing Rules of the Conference.

4. The Director of Finance and Administration is authorized to distribute each month the receipts from local churches for World Service and Conference Benevolences among the funds included in the annual budget of the conference in proportion to their apportionments. Any deficit in remittances from the churches will be covered by payments from the Operating Reserve, upon approval by CFA or its Executive Committee.

5. All boards, commissions and agencies shall have prepared in writing by January 31, 1988 their detailed budget requests for the ensuing year. The program agencies shall present their requests to the Committee on Coordination and Budget by said date. The nonprogram agencies shall present their requests to the CFA by the same date. A copy of all budgets must be sent to the CFA President, Director of Finance and Administration, and Director of the Council on Ministries. Requests will not be considered if received past the due date unless time extension has been requested and approved.

6. No board commission or agency of the Central Texas Conference shall expend any money for any purpose which has not been included in the original budget, as amended and approved by CFA and the Conference and printed in the current Journal. Exceptions to this rule can only be made by CFA or its executive committee.

7. The fiscal year of all boards, commissions and other agencies operating through the Central Treasury shall begin January 1 and close on December 31. 8. The Director of Finance and Administration is authorized to pay from the Operating

Reserve the following items:

a. Expenses of printing the Journal, which may exceed budget appropriation. b. Expenses of the Conference Session Secretarial Staff.

c. Expense of Fidelity Bonds for the Director of Finance and Administration and others who handle Conference Funds, as determined by CFA.

d. Expense of auditing the books of the Director of Finance and Administration, the treasurers of boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference as may be ordered by CFA. Such audits are to be made by the auditors selected by CFA.

e. The moving expense of ministers of the Conference in accordance with the formula adopted by the 1982 Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission on Equitable Salaries and Clergy Benefits. When the next Annual Budget is prepared, the CFA is authorized to place the total amount in the budget to repay the Operating Reserve for past year spending.

f. Other expenditures may be authorized by CFA. Expenditures not to exceed \$500 may be authorized by the Executive Committee of the Council.

g. The Conference Director of Finance and Administration shall pay from Operating Reserve an amount equal to 50% of the General/Jurisdictional Conference per diem or reimbursement for actual expenses above the per diem, whichever is less to each elected lay and clerical delegate and to the first lay and clerical alternate delegates representing this Conference at General/Jurisdictional Conferences. An additional amount equal to the General/Jurisdictional Conference per diem shall be paid to the first lay and clerical alternate delegates to the General/Jurisdictional Conference.

9. The Director of Finance and Administration is authorized to:

a. Consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of the agencies into one or more bank accounts.

b. Write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency and in keeping with approved Conference Budget. He is also authorized to transmit to the authorized treasurers all other funds that are raised by the local churches in response to General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference askings that have been approved by the appropriate body.

c. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Director of Finance and Administration will honor the requisitions for all necessary expanses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

d. To invest the funds of the Conference in Government Securities and Federally Insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and to borrow on and dispose of investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the Conference under the guidance of the Council on Finance and Administration.

e. To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes in federally insured depositories under the joint control of the Central Treasury and the agency concerned, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

ACCOM EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Recommendations:

1. That there be one conference-wide training event, "Fall University," September 11-12, 1987. This does not bar us from having an orientation session for selected district officers.

2. That we use the policy established by ACCOM, Spring of 1978, to present our budget.

Policy, Spring of 1987

"The Annual Conference Council on Ministries will meet to:

a. Evaluate completed programs and those still in process;

b. Develop suggested goals for presentation to the next session of the Annual Conference;

c. Develop a "bottom line" budget request to be presented to CF&A. (By "bottom line" we mean simply a total figure based on the experience of the prior year, anticipated needs and the inflationary/projected goal of the CF&A.) The only budgetary breakdown at this point will be a division of the funds into three basic categories: ALMINISTRATIVE, SUPPORT and ENABLING. "Administrative" has to do with the operating costs of the boards and committees; i.e., meetings, postage, telephone, etc. "Support" has to do with those funds we presently contribute to causes or institutions which are ongoing or under the direction of directors which are not under our control; i.e., Laura Edwards, etc. "Enabling" has to do with the funding of events and enterprises which specifically equip persons and local churches to more effectively carry out ministry in their respective settings."

3. That ACCOM be a clearing house for meeting dates. It is suggested that conference events be planned for odd-numbered months and district events for even-numbered months. 4. That the mileage be set at 18 cents per mile for one; 21 cents for two; 23 cents for three to six; 35 cents for seven to fifteen persons in an appropriate vehicle.

Committee on Planning and Research

The Committee on Planning and Research recommended to the Agenda Committee that we continue to develop the quadrennial theme for Annual Conference, "Let the Church Obey God's Voice — Giving, Growing", by adding the word "Discipling" to the theme for the 1987 Annual Conference.

The Committee encouraged the Ethnic Minority Local Church Coordinating Committee to celebrate with the Annual Conference the accomplishments of the committee. It also encouraged the continuation of this emphasis after the end of the current quadrennium.

The Committee continues to look at numerous consultative type programs to strengthen local congregations and to empower them to utilize their resources and talents, and to make them more aware of existing resources available within the Conference.

Proposed Program:

1. Pilot Project for Local Church Planning Facilitators

Goal: Two local churches in 1987 and two in 1988 will participate in a pilot project which will serve as one method of enhancing the Central Texas Conference quadrennial emphasis on local church revitalization.

Financial Arrangement: The 1987 projects will be financed out of the existing ACCOM reserve funds. A request to ACCOM will be made for a line item in their budget in the amount of \$2,000 for 1988 to cover the project.

Goal:

- a. Encourage each local church to sponsor a marriage and family enrichment event.
- b. Provide a resource table at Annual Conference displaying a variety of support resources.
- c. Provide a list of resources to local Church and Society chairpersons through the Conference Coordinated Mailing.
- d. Encourage each local church to observe National Family Week.

Financial Arrangement: \$250.00 from the Board's programming budget.

- 3. Study the need for and feasibility of providing community drug abuse after-care programs and conduct a trial program in cooperation with area professionals. Goal: To provide this need if feasible.
 - Financial Arrangement: No need.

4. Continue support of United Methodist Seminars on National and International Affairs for conference youth sponsored with the Conference Council on Youth Ministry. Goal: To help provide for these seminars.

Financial Arrangement: \$1,500.00 from the Board's programming budget.

5. Establish a Disaster Committee similar to other Annual Conferences which will assist with disaster preparedness and response. The committee will be made up of a representative from each district named by the district superintendent.

Goal: To have a system available in case of disaster.

Financial Arrangement: No need.

6. To work through the Texas Anti-Crime Council and interested church bodies to continue opposition to State-sponsored or -supported gambling.

Goal: To oppose state-sponsored or -supported gambling (See attached Resolution on Gambling.)

Financial Arrangement: \$100.00 from the Board's programming budget.

Resolution:

WHEREAS "gambling is a menace to society, deadly to the best interest of moral, social,

economic, and spiritual life, and destructive of good government.....;" and, WHEREAS "Christians should abstain from gambling, and should strive to minister to those victimized by the practice;" and,

WHEREAS, "community standards and personal life styles should be such as would make unnecessary and undesirable the resort to commercial gambling, including public lotteries, as a recreation, as an escape, or as a means of producing public revenue or funds for support of charities or government (United Methodist Social Principles, par. 73G):"

support of charities or government (United Methodist Social Principles, par. 73G);" BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Texas Conference, meeting in session June 1-4, 1987 in Waco, Texas, upholds its responsibility for social witness by calling upon all local churches and United Methodist institutions to refrain from the practice of raffles or lotteries for any cause.

Recommendation:

The Annual Conference Council on Ministries goes on record as supporting the statement of the Texas Bishops' Committee concerning legalized gambling.

The support of the Annual Conference is requested for the following resolutions as recommended by the Conference Board of Church and Society.

- One: We commend our Council of Bishops for their extraordinary, Spirit-led witness In Defense of Creation, and request continued imaginative initiatives from the Council In addressing concerns which include: church revitalization, congregational renewal, and the relationship between racial/economic injustice and humanity's quest for peace. We, therefore, urge the General Conference to equip our Council of Bishops with the resources necessary to offer further initiatives in relating the Gospel to a suffering world.
- Two: We urge the Commission on the General Conference in its planning for worship and special programs to emphasize our United Methodist witness to abundant life in Ourist against the powers of death embodied in the twin demons of racism and nuclear arms testing and build up.
- Three: We unge the General Council on Ministries to coordinate initiatives in preparation for General Conference that make plain the interlocking issues of racial justice and world peace.

(An article, "Racial Justice and Peace Require

Annual Conference Actions" from the May 1987 Circuit Rider addresses an important dimension of these concerns.)

RESOLUTION: The Arab-Israeli Crisis

Since 1948 the Arab-Israeli conflict continues to be one of the most serious issues facing the international community. Although the region has been important to the three major religions - Judaism, Christianity and Islam, the problems are not primarily religious, but center on conflicting national interests and ethnic distinctions. The creation of the state of Israel in 1948 was due to the United Nations Partition

The creation of the state of Israel in 1948 was due to the United Nations Partition Resolution, but since then it has lived in a state of war with most of its Arab neighbors. Furthermore, the Arab-Israeli wars have contributed to the displacement and homelessness of thousands of Palestinian peoples.

Since 1967 Israel continued to occupy Arab lands and institute governmental policies detrimental to indigenous Palestinian people. In the Occupied Territories - the West Bank, Gaza, and the Golan Heights - the Israeli government continues to condone the establishment of Jewish settlements on expropriate Arab lands without regard for or compensation to its rightful owners which contradicts American foreign policy. Palestinians continue to live under the military rule of Israel and consequently suffer legal, political, and economic discrimination.

The Palestinian peoples aspirations to self-determination and statehood have all but been ignored. Palestinians who have taken the initiative to speak on behalf of human rights of their people have been arrested and imprisoned without due process of law. Any initiative taken to speak on areas concerning Palestinian peoples economic, human and political rights have been barred or outlawed. Thus, the Israeli unwillingness to compromise with the Palestinian Arabs for an amicable and just settlement will continue to contribute to the uneasy peace and security for the region.

Integral to the Middle East solution is the need to recognize Palestinian Arabs' right to self-determination, and the Arab states recognition for the right for the State of Israel to exist. Terrorism and violence on both sides must be condemned. The peace initiative should continue under the auspices of the United Nations and the major world powers. The continued injustices and occupation of Arab lands by Israel does not contribute to true peace and tranquility in the region. All states in the area are urged to make major sacrifices and offer bold and creative initiatives for a peaceful resolution of the conflict.

We, therefore, unge the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church to take the following actions:

- 1. Pray for the peaceful settlement of the Arab-Israeli conflict, world peace and the reduction of nuclear annaments.
- Request that the governments outside the Middle East region seek equity and evenhandiness for all parties involved in political, social, and economic disputes.
- 3. Affirm respect for the integrity of the Palestinian Arabs, including no degrading or

inhuman treatment, discrimination, arbitrary arrest or detention, imprisonment and invasion of the home and property.

- 4. Encourage respect for and promotion of freedom of speech, press, religion, assembly, travel within the country and foreign countries, and the right to life and to a fair trial.
- Reject Israeli arguments to the exclusive claims to the Occupied Arab Territories, especially the West Bank and the Gaza.
- 6. Request that the Israeli government freeze the Jewish settlements in the Occupied Territories and return expropriated land to its rightful owners.
- Encourage all the nation-states in the region, including the Palestinian Liberation Organization (PLO), to engage in an international conference for the purpose of resolving the Arab-Israeli conflict.

RESOLUTION Camp and Assemblies Committee

WHEREAS, we have persons who are laity of our Annual Conference and experts in the several disciplines of engineering and construction. They are providing the Camps and Assemblies Committee guidance by serving on the Camp Construction Committee. These persons were introduced to the Annual Conference at the 1986 session.

WHEREAS, they have combined their expertise and have done a thorough evaluation of the existing cabins.

WHEREAS, their unanimous recommendation to the Camps and Assemblies Committee is to replace the existing cabins. Stewardship of the Annual Conference funds would be better accomplished by building adequate new facilities rather than renovating the existing units. Although the cost will be somewhat higher, the benefits will include additional space, modern shower and restroom facilities, adequate lighting, central heat and airconditioning, and lower maintenance. The new cabins would be designed to continue the character and flavor of the present facilities, including native stone exteriors. THEREFORE, be it resolved, that the Camps and Assemblies Committee be authorized to proceed with planning for and reconstruction of the housing units at Glen Lake Camp as monies are available.

THEREFORE, be it further resolved; that if changes are necessitated by conditions unknowable at this time, that the Camps and Assemblies Committee be, and they are hereby authorized to expend up to \$100,000.00 for additional changes upon recommendation of the Construction Committee. Any such expenditure shall be within the \$2,500,000.00 approved as a part of the Capital Funds Campaign.

Trustees, Glen Lake - Rainbow Camps

The trustees of the Central Texas Conference camp properties are privileged to report that the central-site, 55 acres and improvements located in the city of Glen Rose, plus the adjacent, recently acquired 308 expansion acres, are receiving extensive, year-round program use. Details of the programming were heard earlier in the report of the Committee on Camps and Assemblies. It is our full and honest intention that this usage, under the auspices and governance of the Central Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church shall continue to entitle these properties to <u>ad valoren</u> tax status provided in the Texas revised Tax Code.

The sale of the Rainbow Camp property and the purchase of the expansion property transactions are progressing satisfactorily.

Your Board of Trustees command the Committee on Camps and Assemblies and its Construction Committee on their work toward the renovation and expansion of our Conference's Outdoor Christian Education program, and applaud the generosity of our people in the Capital Funds Campaign which is bringing the collective dreams of many through several years to fruition.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

A Decade of Diaconia

Diaconal Ministry celebrates its tenth anniversary! In these ten years there has been:

- GATHERING of several varieties of specialized ministries into one body of committed servants of the church,
- DEFINING the role of this form of ministry in The United Methodist Church,
- establishing structures of preparation and ACCOUNTABILITY for those in specialized ministry and,
- discovering NEW FORMS in which specialized ministries can serve the needs of the church and the world.

As the decade of the present form of diaconal ministry is celebrated, there is awareness that the roots of diaconia are deep into the traditions of the church and the seeds of its conception lie in the New Testament. Throughout its history, diaconal forms of ministry have flourished, faded, and flourished again and again in response to needs of the world and the church which called for service in the name of Jesus Christ.

As servants of Christ, diaconal ministers in their ancient and their contemporary forms, have used their varied gifts to enable congregations to respond to their call to be servants in the world:

- by equipping persons to fulfill their own call to service; by facilitating the work which the church must do; and
- by their own serving, presenting again the ministry of Jesus Christ.

Report 1

The Board of Diaconal Ministry has accomplished these tasks through its work this year:

- provided support for the seventeen diaconal ministers serving within the Central Texas Conference, reviewed their work, recommended their recertification where appropriate, and recommanded to Bishop Russell and the cabinet their renewal in the office and appointment to service,

- reviewed the work of eight certified persons, in addition to the above, and recommended renewal of certification,

- encouraged and supervised the progress of twelve candidates for diaconal ministry, - received an additional six persons into candidacy,

- arranged for the mentoring of seven persons in process of candidacy,

- recommanded five persons to be consecrated as diaconal ministers by the Annual Conference of 1987 and recommanded their service appointment to Bishop Russell and the cabinet.
- In addition to these tasks, the board has:
- met in joint session with the Board of Ordained Ministry in August,
 designed and implemented a Time of Growth and Reflection for ordained and diaconal ministers which was held at Glen Lake in March,
- conducted interviews for candidates and persons in process in March, - recruited persons from across the conference to serve as mentors for persons in-
- quiring into ministry and provided training in April,
- assigned inquiring persons and candidates for diaconal ministry to a mentor,
 approved funding to assist candidates and certified persons to participate in The National Conference of Christian Educators and The Fellowship of Church Musicians,
- recommended the request for funds from The Division of Diaconal Ministry to support the innovative diaconal ministry related the Inter-Conference Hispanic Ministry of Central Texas and Rio Grande Conferences,
- explored the procedures for psychological testing for beginning candidates into diaconal ministry,
- reorganized the work of the Registrar and Assistant Registrar to the board for delineation of procedures and standards and dissimenation of information,
- were represented by one or more participants in the jurisdictional training of offioers sponsored by the Division of Diaconal Ministry, the consultation on Ministerial Education Funds sponsored by the Division of Ordained Ministry, and the bi-conference GREAT group whose purpose was to review and respond to the reports of Commission on the Study of the Ministry.

GOALS FOR 1987-88

Provide information on diaconal ministry to persons, agencies, or groups, throughout the conference.

Search for additional creative settings in which diaconal ministers may serve the needs of this conference, with special attention to the varieties of emerging forms of servant ministry.

Implement a program of psychological testing for beginning candidates in the diaconate.

Develop ways in which diaconal ministry can be presented to ethnic minority groups within the conference and discover and encourage potential diaconal candidates from within those groups.

Seek means of cooperative dialogue with District Committees on Ordained Ministry regarding persons inquiring into forms of ministry.

Plan a continuing education event for diaconal ministers and persons in candidacy to be held within the next conference year.

Encourage and support participation of persons from the conference in the first National Convocation of Diaconal Ministers in November 1987.

Report 2

A major emphasis of the Board of Diaconal Ministry this year has been the recruiting and training of persons to serve as mentors to persons inquiring into ministry careers. Dr. Bill Boyd has directed this activity. In April, a training program was held at Texas Wesleyan College. Linda Vogel, a diaconal minister from Iowa, was the resource guide. With the Division of Diaconal Ministry, she had prepared the research and materials which went into the Candidacy Journal.

Twenty persons participated in the training and from that group there are sixteen qualified mentors, one or more located in six of the seven districts in the Central Texas Conference. They are:

The purpose of the mentoring program is to provide a mature, caring, informed, Christian companion for persons inquiring into a career in ministry. It is not intended to be exclusively used by those considering diaconal forms of ministry. In its early phases it looks at God's calling upon one's life irrespective of form or function of ministry. Its aim is for spiritual growth of the inquiring person and in the latter stages is designed to facilitate the decision as to the form of ministry befitting one's calling and gifts.

All persons seeking consecration as diaconal ministers must have been through a mentoring process. Not all persons who have been through the spiritual journey with a mentor will choose consecration. Some may become enriched servants in general ministry; others may be led to ministry as an ordained minister.

In addition to the Candidacy Journal, persons in mentoring programs will study The Christian as Minister, prepared by the Division of Ordained Ministry, and <u>Celebration</u> of Disciplice, by Richard Foster.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

In 1986, the Annual Conference Board of Global Ministries linked Central Texas to mission, not only within the bounds of the Conference, but throughout the world. In March, the Board helped represent Central Texas at the General Board of Global Ministries' Consultation on Mission in San Francisco. Later, Volunteers in Mission from Central Texas worked in Haiti and the Phillippines.

At the request of the Conference United Methodist Men, the Board helped form a committee to work for the establishment of a center to provide needed assistance for mildly to moderately retarded adults in our area.

Also in 1986, the Board of Global Ministries became a full partner with the United Methodist Women in the Cooperative Schools of Christian Mission.

As for the work of the Standing Committees, the Committee on Aging successfully carried out a workshop called "As Parents Grow Older," providing training for leaders of support groups for persons with aging parents.

The Committee on Health and Welfare continued its work by defining in formal statements the Annual Conference's relationship with its health and welfare agencies: Harris Methodist Health System, the Methodist Home of Waco, the Methodist Mission Home of San Antonio, and Wesleyan Homes of Georgetown. Among its other accomplishments were the Committeesponsored course on "The Health-Care Maze" at the Fall University, and the sponsorship of persons preparing for the hospital chaplaincy through the Harris Methodist Health System.

The Committee on City, Town and Country Work presented its annual awards to the three outstanding congregations and to their pastors, while the Committee on Urban Ministries worked with the North Fort Worth Cooperative Parish, Southside Area Ministries, and United Community Centers of Fort Worth, as well as Inner City Ministry and the Laura Edwards Christian Early Learning Center, both of Waco. These two committees also co-sponsored the Revitalization Workshop for representatives from twenty-one churches in the Annual Conference and Kennon Callahan's presentation at the Fall University of "Twelve Keys to an Effective Church."

In 1987, other great events are planned. The first fully cooperative School of Onristian Mission will be held with the Week-and School scheduled for July 10 through 12 at Southwestern University in Georgetown and the Week-day School July 13 through 16 at Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth.

The Committee on Education and the Advance has planned two Mission Awareness Tours for 1987: June 21 through 28 and October 18 through 25. This year the Tours will be to the Southeast, visiting the work of the Church in Mississippi, Alabama, North Carolina, Kentucky, Tennessee and Arkansas. It will be another chance of a lifetime. There still is

opportunity for you to sign up for one of these tours.

The Board of Global Ministries will continue to offer vital information and training through the Fall University and other events, all of them in an effort to fulfill the challenge of being sure that our Annual Conference continues to be an extension of God's love to the world for which Christ died.

The Committee also planned and sponsored the Annual Conference's Mission Awareness Tour, which visited the McCurdy School in Espanola, New Mexico; the Navaho Methodist Mission School in Farmington, New Mexico; The Four Corners Native American Ministry in New Mexico, Utah and Arizona.

Then the Tour traveled on to El Paso, Texas, to visit Lydia Patterson Institute, Houchins Community Center and the Newark Maternity Hospital, as well as the volunteer work on the border of Christian Hands in Action. The Tour also crossed the border into Juarez, Mexico, to see some of the work of World Division missionaries in that area. The Committee on Education and the Advance continued its promotion and support of mis-

The Committee on Education and the Advance continued its promotion and support of mission in a number of ways. Joyce Brown was engaged to report on mission projects in the Conference edition of the United Methodist Reporter. The Refugee Resettlement Committee (a sub-committee) helped to relocate at least two families within the Conference. The Committee as a whole undertook the training of District Secretaries of Global Ministries.

Advancements in technology, new strides in patient care, a commitment to professionalism and community awareness — 1986 has been a year of achievement for the Harris Methodist Health System, its members and employees. Ninety-seven years ago, the Methodists of Texas began a ministry to families through the Methodist Home. Today, on behalf of the United Methodists of Texas and New Mexico, the Home is a resource for these families who need a period of separation of the parent and the child while they try to work out their family problems. We respectfully call upon the annual conferences to re-affirm that covenant relationship with the Methodist Home as an institution owned and operated by the seven annual conferences of the United Methodist Church of Texas and New Mexico.

Methodist Home has always charted a course to meet the highest standards possible. The seven annual conferences of Texas and New Mexico of the United Methodist Council continue to stand with Methodist Home in upholding minimum standards of care for children needing care by other than their parents, and sustaining the principle of state licensing. We are committed to an openness with the general public and accountable to the United Methodists of Texas and New Mexico. Going beyond minimum standards, the Methodist Home has for the 12th straight year received a CERTIFICATE OF ACCREDITATION from the Council on Accreditation of Services for Families and Children.

The December Christmas Church Offering was established before the turn of the century to help care for the children of Methodist Home. Your support and efforts will be of special importance to the Methodist Home this year. We were able in some instances to predict the downturn in the economy and substantial cuts in budget and staff were made in an effort to balance our budget with income. We reduced budget and staff by \$350,000 in an effort to keep budget expenses in line with income.

Local church contributions for Methodist Home for 1986-87, still short of offering goals, appear to be 2% ahead of last year's offerings. While the financial picture is not as bright as we would like for it to be, I can assure you that the quality of oare at Methodist Home has not suffered. We continue to improve our program to meet the needs of those children and young people who come to us for care.

those children and young people who come to us for care. MORE THAN EVER HEFORE, the Home reflects a family-oriented child care program. Last year the Home cared for 641 different children providing 107,367 days of care. Our average length of stay for a child at the Home is now 15 months with many of our children returning to a rehabilitated family. The Howard Family Center, the Settoon Family Education and Therapy Center and dedicated social work staff are examples of this concern to relate to the total family unit.

We are looking toward our second century of service. We will celebrate on November 2, 1990, the 100th birthday of the Methodist Home. We are looking as a staff to complete studies of our program so that we can have in place on November 1, 1990 our ongoing long range plan and our blue print to begin the second hundred years of service. We request your continued prayer and support.

STATEMENT OF COVENANT RELATIONSHIP CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH AND

METHODIST HOME

This is a statement of the relationship between Methodist Home and the Central Texas Conference. This agreement was signed on the 3rd day of June in the year of 1987.

I. PURPOSE AND OWNERSHIP

The corporate name for the institution is "The Methodist Home" and for legal purposes Methodist Home is to be identified as an institution owned and operated by the seven United Methodist Annual Conferences in Texas and New Mexico. The relationship between the Methodist Home and the <u>Central Texas</u> Conference is stated in ARTICLE ONE of the By-Laws as follows:

Section 1. The purpose of Methodist Home is the charitable care and ministration for children residing within the bounds of the patronizing Annual Conferences of the United

Methodist Church. To carry out this purpose the Board of Directors shall have the authority and responsibility to develop and direct a program of child care which shall effectively meet the needs of the children served. This program may include institutional care, foster home care, adoption services, group home services, residential treatment for emotionally disturbed children and youth, social services for children in their homes, and any other services which the Board of Directors shall deem appropriate in meeting the needs of children and youth. The name of this corporation, its corporate purpose and terms of its existence are set forth in the restated Articles of Incorporation of this corporation as filed with the Secretary of State of the State of Texas, on the 13th day of May, 1968, as the same may from time to time be amended. All provisions of these By-Laws are subject to the provision of the Articles of Incorporation.

Section 2. This corporation shall be owned and controlled by the following patronizing Conferences of the United Methodist Church, to wit: Texas Conference, North Texas Conference, Northwest Texas Conference, Central Texas Conference, Southwest Texas Conference, Rio Grande Conference and New Mexico Conference. All references herein to "patronizing Annual Conferences" shall be to those seven Conferences, and such other Annual Conferences as may hereafter become patronizing Annual Conferences.

Section 3. Should any of the patronizing Conferences at any time desire to withdraw as such, then such patronizing Conferences shall cease to have any interest or control in the affairs of this corporation and cease to elect representatives as members of the Board of Directors. Should any additional Conferences desire to become patronizing Conferences, they may become such by making application, in the manner prescribed by the Board of Directors, providing a majority of the Board of Directors shall vote to accept such Conferences.

II. BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND MANAGEMENT

The business of the corporation, herein known as the Methodist Home shall be managed by its Board of Directors. The Board of Directors of the corporation shall be constituted or elected as prescribed in the By-Laws:

A. Directors by virtue of their offices. The following persons, during their tenure in such offices, shall be directors of the corporation.

1. The presiding Bishop of each patronizing Annual Conference.

2. The Health and Welfare Chairperson of each patronizing Annual Conference or other Representative designed by the Annual Conference.

3. The District Superintendent of the Waco District of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

4. The Chairperson of the Methodist Home Commissioners.

Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors by virtue of a vacancy in one or more of the above offices shall not be filled, but shall remain vacant until the successor to such vacant office is duly qualified, at which time such successor shall become a member of the Board of Directors.

B. Directors elected for a term of three years:

- 1. One minister and one lay person from each patronizing Annual Conference, to be elected by such patronizing Annual Conferences, and certified to the President of the corporation by the Secretary of the patronizing Annual Conference. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors with respect to one or more of the members elected by the respective patronizing Annual Conference shall be filled for the unexpired portion of the term by the Annual Conference with respect to which the vacancy has occurred.
- 2. Twelve Directors-at-Large from the territory of the patronizing Annual Conferences, ministers or lay members of the United Methodist Church, who shall be nominated by the Board of Directors of the corporation, but subject to confirmation by the vote of a majority of such Annual Conferences. Such nominations shall take place at the last regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the corporation prior to the first Annual Conference to be held in the calendar year in which the terms of the Directors-at-Large expire. All Directors elected by the respective Annual Conferences and all Directors-at-Large shall hold office until their successors have been elected.

IV. MISSION AND GOALS OF METHODIST HOME

METHODIST HOME MISSION STATEMENT

As an institution of the <u>Central Texas Conference</u> of the United Methodist Church, Methodist Home offers a multiple service Christian child care ministry to children and their families in Texas and New Mexico. The program facilitates normal growth and development with the goal of enabling children and their families to enhance their wholeness and freedom in order to achieve and to become more productive individuals of greater dignity and worth.

METHODIST HOME GOALS

In order to accomplish the above stated mission, we have an obligation to recognize and share the spiritual values that make Christian child care unique. Therefore, we must develop the following:

- 1. A professional staff that is supportive of and dedicated to Christian values. 2. Children, youth and families who sincerely feel that Methodist Home has their
- best interest at heart.
- 3. An atmosphere of caring.
- 4. A spirit of unity and purpose.
- 5. An understanding of the need for responsibility and accountability. 6. The sharing of God's grace through acceptance and affirmation that allows chil-
- dren and their families to build on existing strengths.

V. PERIODIC REVIEW

The provisions of this Covenant Relationship shall be reviewed and revised if needed every four years or more frequently if needed.

Ownership and/or Relationship to the United Methodist Church:

The Methodist Mission Home is owned and operated by a Board of Directors whose election is confirmed by the seven participating Annual Conferences. The Relationship Statement with Central Texas Conference is before the Conference this 1987 Session.

Services Available:

The Methodist Mission Home is the umbrella for two distinct ministries:

A. SOUTHMEST MATERNITY CENTER

1. The Center gives option counseling for the pregnant unwed young woman, in both resident and non-resident settings; for those who choose to release their child for adoption we keep a reserve of some 60 approved couples who are ready to be chosen by our licensed agency as "the home the child needs."

2. OUTPOST offices with part-time maternity counselors are located in various cities throughout the Conferences. Information regarding maternity services is always available through a toll-free call any time of the day or night at: 1-800-292-5103 in Texas, and 1-800-255-9612 in other states during office hours.

3. In 1986, we had contact with 262 maternity clients, 83 came into our care; we cared for 63 infants and placed 59 of them and 7 older children for adoption. We served 130 adoptive parents and 190 other parents in process.

4. For information regarding adoption, call on Wednesdays and Thursdays between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at 512/696-7021.

B. SOUTHMEST CENTER FOR THE HEARING IMPAIRED

This residential rehabilitation program, organized in 1974, served 213 residents in 1986, maintaining about 74 on campus at one time. Services are for young adults, 16 years of age and older, who are handicapped by a hearing impairment. The program includes evaluation of work abilities and aptitudes, personal social adjustment, counseling, structured residential living, life skills training and work adjustment training. Toward the end of the 18 months residential period, there is on the job training and experience in independent living. Clients served were from 8 different states.

Thanks to the Central Texas Conference

Of the 321 churches in the Central Texas Conference, 183 gave the Mission Home \$28,124.78 in 1986. We thank you for this and urge all churches to participate in some way toward this vital ministry. Our total giving from the Conferences was \$266,789.29, down \$19,910.85 from 1985. Thirteen percent (13%) of our income comes from church giving, 8% from individual gifts and 4% from Endowment. The remaining 75% must come from fees for services rendered. In 1986, expenses were \$2,215,198.00 and income was \$2,090,229.00. The Methodist Mission Home has no outstanding debts, and has an Endowment of about one million dollars.

An outside audit is performed each year, and is available to the Conference leadership as requested.

A RELATIONSHIP STATEMENT Between The Methodist Mission Home of Texas, Inc.

and the Central Texas Annual Conference

I. INTRODUCTION

The Methodist Mission Home in San Antonio, Texas is a ministry of social, habilitation, and rehabilitation services for those persons with special needs. It began in 1895 as a refuge for the unwed mother and her child, which service continues to this day. In 1974 a residential habilitation and rehabilitation service for deaf young adults was also initiated, and operates on the same campus with mostly separate facilities and program staff.

The Methodist Mission Home is chartered by the State of Texas as a non-profit corporation created for the purpose of owning and continuing to support a benevolent, charitable, educational, and missionary undertaking in the areas of:

- 1. Maintaining a residence and services for woman experiencing unplanned pregnancies.
- 2. Caring for infant children in licensed foster homes.
- Placing children for adoption with persons approved through our licensed adoption agency.
- 4. A residential habilitation and rehabilitation service for persons (both male and female), with handicapping conditions which seeks to help them live independently in our society and be competitive in the job market.

It is in the Spirit of Christ who said "In as much as you have done it unto the least of these, you have done it unto me" that this ministry is offered to those with special needs.

- C. No Director or Director-at-Large elected shall be eligible to serve more than four consecutive three-year terms as a Director. Following a period of maximum service under this provision, the duration of that former Director's ineligibility shall last for two years. Provided that there should be no interruption of eligibility for service of those persons who are Directors by virtue of their offices under A(1)(3) of this Section. Provided further, that all retired Bishops who presided over such patronizing Annual Conference and all former presidents of Methodist Home Board shall serve as members, ex officio, of the Board of Directors at all meetings, but without vote. Provided also, that any former Director or Director-at-Large may be elected by action of the Board of Directors to either an honorary or advisory membership upon the Board or to membership upon any standing committee of the Board without tenure limitations.
- D. Should any patronizing Conference cease to be such, as is provided for in these By-Laws, then the representative from each Conference shall immediately cease to be Directors, and the affairs of the institution shall be governed and managed by the remaining members of the Board.

III. IMPLICATIONS OF RELATIONSHIP

The formal relationship between Methodist Home and the <u>Central Texas Conference</u> is carried on through representation of the Conference by members of the Methodist Home Board of Directors, the Commissioner's program, and through an annual report made at Annual Conference and published in the Conference Journal. Informally, the relationship is enhanced by the Sunshine Radio Program, the <u>Sunshine Monthly</u> magazine, tours of Methodist Home facilities by local church groups and appearances in local churches by Methodist Home staff members and residents.

The <u>Central Texas Conference</u>, recognizing Methodist Home as an institution of the Conference, annually authorizes and promotes a special offering in each local church for support for the Home. In return for the encouragement of financial support for the Methodist Home by the Conferences, the Home submits an annual audit to the Conference and agrees to abide by the Conference rules on fund raising. Any gift that is designated for credit to a local church is forwarded to the Conference treasurer's office by Methodist Home to ensure proper recording of the gift.

Methodist Home seeks accreditation of its program by outside accrediting bodies in order to assure the Conference of the quality of its program. Currently the Home is accredited by the Council on Accreditation of the Child Welfare League of America and licensed by the Texas Department of Human Services and the Human Services Department of New Mexico. The Methodist Home Children's Guidance Center is licensed by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

The Distribution of Assets on Dissolution is set forth in ARTICLE TEN of the By-Laws of Methodist Home revised April, 1982, as follows:

In conformity with the provisions of ARTICLE NINE of the Articles of Incorporation of Methodist Home, all assets of the corporation are pledged for use in performing the corporations's charitable functions, and upon discontinuance of the corporation by dissolution or otherwise, the assets that remain after the satisfaction of all liabilities and obligations shall be divided proportionately among the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church that are patronizing Annual Conferences of Methodist Home at the time such distribution is made, and are also recognized as charitable organizations under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, such distribution to be based upon the membership of each conference at the last annual report preceding the dissolution. Any assets so distributed shall be dedicated for use by each patronizing Annual Conference for the charitable care and ministration for children. Provided, however, that if any patronizing Annual Conference is not, at the time of such distribution, an organization that is qualified as a charitable organization under Section 502(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, then its share of such assets shall be distributed to one or more charitable organizations, recognized under Section 502(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1954, engaged in child care or ministration, and owned or controlled by, or affiliated with, the United Methodist Church.

IL. GEOGRAPHICAL AREAS OF SERVICE

- Our primary service area is in the states of New Mexico and Texas although:
 - 1. Clients with handicapping conditions may come from any state or country. 2. Maternity clients may come from any state. Those choosing out-patient care in Texas, New Mexico, and Colorado are served by field workers.
 - 3. The Home is licensed to place children for adoption and may provide this service in states other than Texas and New Mexico.

III. RELATIONSHIP WITH THE ANNUAL CONFERENCES

The Methodist Mission Home has a relationship with seven annual conferences which are: Central Texas, Texas, Southwest Texas, Northwest Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, and Rio Grande Conferences. The Methodist Mission Home looks to the Annual Conferences as a source of education as to the mission goals of the Methodist Mission Home. Each Annual Conference encourages the receiving of a special offering annually and other systematic ways of providing financial support for the Methodist Mission Home.

- There are 46 members of the Board of Trustees, and they are of three types: 1. EX-OFFICIO:
 - a. Bishops of Texas and New Mexico or their representative rotation of four (4), each to serve one (1) year out of each four (4) years.
 - b. Health and Welfare Chairperson from each Conference seven (7).
 - c. District Superintendents two (2) The District Superintendent of the San Antonio District, Southwest Texas Conference, and the Rio Grande Conference District Superintendent who resides in San Antonio.
 - d. Pastor, Travis Park United Methodist Church, San Antonio.
 - 2. Elected ... these persons are elected by the Board of Trustees:
 - a. Representative: One lay person and one Clergy for each Annual Conference. Two such Trustees are confirmed by the Central Texas Conference.
 - b. At Large: (To a maximum of twenty) are elected by the Board of Trustees and confirmed by all seven of the Annual Conferences.
 - 3. Honorary: Those persons who are past seventy years of age, and/or physically incapacitated, and who have shown meritorious service to the Methodist Mission Home.

The Board of Trustees elects its own officers, and has exclusive authority over and responsibliity for all corporate activities of the Methodist Mission Home. The Central Texas Annual Conference, or its local churches, has no authority over or responsibility for the legal or financial obligations of the Methodist Mission Home of Texas. Neither shall the Methodist Mission Home have any authority over or responsibility for legal or financial obligations of the Central Texas Conference, or its local churches. According to the Charter of the Methodist Mission Home of Texas and the laws of the

State of Texas, upon dissolution of the corporation, all remaining assets, after paying or making provisions for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, shall be transferred to an education, religious, charitable, or other similar organization within the State of Texas under Section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amend-The Charter and By-laws may be amended by the Board of Trustees. ed.

The Methodist Mission Home shall report to the Central Texas Conference in writing each year, indicating services rendered, income and expenditures, amount of indebtedness, amount of endowment, and plans for the future. A Staff or Board member may also attend the annual session of the Conference to give portions of this report orally. The Central Texas Conference may receive this report and urge the support of the Methodist Mission Home by individual United Methodists.

Likewise, the Conference may make suggestions, inquiries, and assist in spreading the information regarding the needs and services of the Methodist Mission Home.

IV. CONCLUSION

The Methodist Mission Home operates its ministries with high professional standards, acquiring the appropriate and required licensing of facilities, programs and persons, as dictated by the various civil regulatory bodies. Further in-service training is afforded staff members in order to improve their service to its clients.

Religious services are held regularly, by our Chaplain and the ministers on the staff, and they provide pastoral counseling as well. The Methodist Mission Home began because of the ministry of the church and its caring for persons with special needs, and it continues to share its beliefs, goals and mission with the Central Texas Annual Conference, in the tradition of John Wesley and the Christian faith.

WESLEYAN HOMES, INC.

The year 1987 marks the 25th anniversary of the Central Texas Conference program of ministry to the aging through the sponsorship of Wesleyan Homes. From humble beginnings and early years of struggle, Wesleyan Homes has risen to become a shining example of ministry through Retirement Living and Nursing Care.

The Wesleyan Retirement Home serves 107 residents. The Retirement Home provides living quarters, three meals per day, a game room, exercise area, library, and a beauty shop. Most of all, the Retirement Home provides a place to retire in comfort while providing a caring staff, friends and neighbors who share similar interests, and activities to keep the residents involved and leading active lives.

The Wesleyan Nursing Home, opened in 1978, provides 24 hour a day, intermediate care nursing. The year 1987 has been an exciting time. The original 98 bed facility was ex-panded to 180 beds. The expansion added 30,000 square feet of space and includes a physical therapy area, and a hospice type room for the terminally ill. Consecration of the new facility was May 17, 1987, with Bishop John Russell leading the service. The Wesleyan Nursing Home is an exemplary facility having received a Superior Rating from the Texas Department of Health for the seventh year in a row.

Funding:

As an agency of the Central Texas Conference, Wesleyan Homes is committed to offering quality care to all persons regardless of race, religion, or financial situation. Expendiditures for 1986 totaled over \$2,5000,000.

The cost of nursing care for one resident is over \$19,000 per year. Because of these rising costs and our commitment as a church agency, a large system of Benevolent Care is needed. The Mother's Day Offering taken in the churches of the Central Texas Conference is dedicated to Benevolent Care. The offering for 1986 totaled \$12,004.00. During 1986, Weslevan Homes gave Charitable Benevolent Care in the amount of \$179,541.05. The Need is Great! We need the help of the churches in our conference if we are to continue to provide this care and ministry to the aging.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Proposed Programs:

1. Campus Ministry Projects

Goal: To continue support of those projects now in existence - Ranger Junior College, Hill County Junior College, and Texas Wesleyan College - and to make at least two intentional contacts to establish new projects.

Financial Arrangement: \$2000.00 granted as start-up money to approved projects; continuation and increase based on reports and evaluations.

2. Distribution of Wesley Foundation Apportionment

Goal: To re-evaluate and determine a fair and equitable distribution of funding among the 5 Wesley Foundation units within the conference.

Financial Arrangement: Apportionment of \$1.05 per member of each local church. 3. Maintain relationship with United Methodist Colleges and Universities Goal: Maintain effective, ongoing, supportive relationship between conference and United Methodist institutions of higher education.

a. Financial support.

b. Written communications.

c. Secure from local churches names and addresses of high school juniors and seniors and make these available to these institutions.

Financial Arrangement:

a. Apportionment for Texas Association of United Methodist Colleges and Universities of \$1.60 per member.

b. Apportionment for Black College Fund.

c. \$200 for Campus Ministry Day - Board Budget.

4. Conference Merit Award Program

Goal: To provide \$500 in financial aid to at least one student from Central Texas Conference while at the same time promoting the Student Day Offering which provides funds for Methodist Student Loans and Scholarships.

Financial Arrangement: Money collected through Student Day Offering: Offering sent to General Board of Higher Education and Ministry; 10% rebated to conference for Conference Merit Award.

5. Training of new Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry members Goal: To provide training opportunity which will help each BHECM member become more informed and responsible.

Financial Arrangement: \$500 from board budget.

6. Maintain contact and relationship with local Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors Goal: To restructure the Central Texas Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to make it a more effective agency of the conference; expanding membership to

include a representataive from each local Wesley Foundation Board of Directors and a student from each compus.

Financial Arrangement: Conference BHECM budget.

Report No. 1

WORK OF THE BOARD

Below are areas in which the Board is working and/or will begin work this year.

Preaching: Through the Conference Office the Board has purchased the series of video tapes by Fred Craddock for use by ministers of the Conference.

Recruitment: The Analysis by the Division of Ordained Ministry of supply-demend statistics for ministry in our Conference has been completed. The Board is presently analyzing this data to determine needed entry level personnel for our Conference.

Grant-in-Aid: Current level of support to seminary students continues to be \$95.00 per senester hour for students in United Methodist related seminaries and \$35.00 per senester hour for students in non-United Methodist related seminaries based on cost levels and need. Due to increased demand on MEF funds the reserve in these accounts is shrinking rapidly and the Board may need to re-evaluate its policy concerning use of MEF funds., The Board has appointed a task force to work with the Board of Diaconal Ministry to coordinate the two boards' policies regarding access to MEF funds.

District Training: The District Training event for District Committees on Ordained Ministry has been extremely successful and will become a continuing aspect of the work of the Board.

Candidacy Requirements: Paragraph 414.1 of the 1984 <u>Discipline</u> requires a person be a certified candidate (as opposed to an inquiring or declare candidate) for at least one year prior to being eligible for probationary membership. Added attention to the work of the District Committees has helped this paragraph be implemented. All persons working with others interested in ordained ministry should work out a time line utilizing the <u>Discipline</u> and the policy statements of the Board before informing a person seeking admission as to when and under what conditions they will qualify for particular steps. When questions arise, please contact the chairperson of the Board for clarification.

Diaconal Ministry: The Board met with the Board of Diaconal Ministry in a joint session on August 25, 1986, with Mike Murray serving as our process person.

Mentor Program: The Board is presently designing a program that will seek to make the entire supervisory process from Candidacy through Probation to Full Membership a united effort to emphasize the nature of United Methodist ministry as connectional and accountable. The program will seek to coordinate the variety of supervisory programs already in existence and give the entire program a common and unified thrust as well as try to evaluate and improve certain parts of the supervisory process, especially the intern program.

Board Membership: In accord with paragraph 732.1.a the Board established a committee to evaluate the workload of the Board in carrying out the requirements of the Discipline and has recommended to the Bishop that the membership be expanded and that the membership of the Board include persons in the retired relationship.

Ministry Study: The Generative, Reflective, Educative and Theological group has been working diligently this year and much of its recommendations to the General Commission has been adopted there. The Board is including in its report to the Executive Session this year a special report on the Ministry Study from this group for your information and feedback.

General Conference Legislation: The Division of Ordained Ministry in Nashville has provided your Board with the recommended legislation to General Conference in 1988 and your Board has studied the legislation and is making response.

Retired Ministers Association: In its efforts to help establish a retired ministers association in the Conference the Board discovered a group already in existence and will work with this group through the meeting of retired ministers at the Conference "luncheon" to officially establish the group already in existence as the official retired ministers association in the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Pre-retirement Seminars: Dawn Hobbs will present a class at the Fall University which will meet much of the needs of this area of concern. In addition the Board is negotiating with Robert B. Crocker to present "Doorway to the Future" a pre-retirement planning seminar in the Spring of 1988.

Clergy Wamen - Clergy Couples: The Board in cooperation with the Cabinet has completed the $\overline{C-4}$ study in a joint session on December 12, 1986. At that time plans were outlined for the continued work of the Board and Cabinet in this area.

Ethnic Concerns: In October the Board met with the Black ministers in our Conference to discuss mutual concerns and issues around the qualifying policies and procedures of the Board.

Report No. 2

POLICY FOR RECORD KEEPING OF THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY.

The heart of the work of the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church is the keeping of complete and accurate files and records which meet the church's legitimate need for information and guarantee both an individual's right to privacy and accessibility to information kept in his/her name. The following policy statements are provided by the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Central Texas Annual Conference to meet these demands and the requirements of paragraph 732 of the 1984 Discipline (cf 732.2g,1,k; 732.3a,b,d,etc.).

A. Rationale

1. Both records and files are mandated by the <u>Discipline</u> because of the church's legitimate need for gathered information.

Records and files are kept as a service to both candidates for ministry and conference members.

 a. They help a person see where he/she has been and is going.
 b. They help protect an individual against arbitrary judgment or inaccurate innuendo and help assure rights to special considerations.

c. They assist and give direction to decisions about continuing education and facilitate the choice of growth-producing experiences.

3. Records and files are also kept as a service to the United Methodist Church. a. They provide data for decision making.

b. They give protection against legal liability resulting from undocumented decisions not based on fact.

c. They provide longitudinal data for research and study.

B. The purpose for record keeping

The purpose for record keeping and files used by the Board shall be to qualify persons for ministry in the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church under provisions of chapter 3 of the Book of Discipline 1984. Its further purpose shall be to meet the requirements of paragraphs 704, 732, 2620-2626 and other applicable paragraphs of the 1984 Discipline. Parallel chapters and paragraphs in subsequent books of Discipline shall apply in future quadrennia. The files shall contain materials expressly required by these paragraphs. They shall also contain other documents deemed necessary by the Board in order to execute its role of qualifying candidates for ministry and/or maintaining records of persons in categories other than full membership or associate membership (e.g. local pastors, persons on leave, etc.). These materials shall meet the purposes and rationale above and shall be added to a file under the guidelines of this policy statement below.

C. Definition of terms

1. Record

a. The official minutes of the Board of Ordained Ministry and/or the Journal and minutes of the Central Texas Conference with regard to a specific minister or ministerial candidate shall serve as the official record of ministerial standing and/or status.

b. Any official document contained in the file of a referent received on a specific occasion from a known and verifiable source.

2. Referent: The subject of a record or file.

3. Source: One who places material in a file.

4. File

a. Any collection of related records which serves an identifiable purpose with an explicit referent, owner and custodian.

Files are originated by a District Committee on Ordained Ministry or by the Board itself.

b. A collection of records in which the referent, sources, owner, and custodian have vested interest.

c. That set of records which may be open to third parties with the implied or written consent of those with vested interest.

5. The records and files of the Board of Ordained Ministry are kept on behalf of the Annual Conference and shall be maintained under guidelines provided by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry and the General Board of Pensions. All files in the possession of the Board of Ordained Ministry and/or a District Com-

All files in the possession of the Board of Ordained Ministry and/or a District Committee are owned by the Annual Conference. Through these guidelines the Board authorizes, collects, maintains and has primary access to a set of records or files. 6. Custodian: The registrar of the Board is the custodian of all files. The registrars

6. Custodian: The registrar of the Board is the custodian of all files. The registrars for local pastors, candidacy and conference relations assist the registrar in maintaining the files. The Board Representative to the District Committees on Ordained Ministry assists the registrar in maintaining the files of the District Committee.

7. Vested Interest: The owner, custodian, referent, and sources have vested interest in a record or file.

8. Third Party: One who desires access to information in a record or file but has no vested interest.

D. Stewardship of Information

1. Those with vested interest in specific information (sources, referent, owner, custodian) have access to the information under the criteria established by this policy statement.

Any person with vested interest may inquire concerning how this information is being used by making an official inquiry in writing to the chairperson or registrar of the

Board.

3. Any person with vested interest may correct and/or amend an inaccurate record by writing the chairperson or registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry, supplying the corrected and/or amended material and providing verification of its validity as determined by the executive committee of the Board.

4. The contents of a file are confidential information and shall not be improperly disclosed or prematurely destroyed. Neither shall they be used for unauthorized purposes (outside these guidelines) without consent by the Board unless required by law.

5. The custodian shall be responsible to see that the information contained in a file is reliable and is not misused. The custodian has the responsibility to maintain and administer the files in accordance with established policy and with the assistance of others designated by the Board and/or employees of the Annual Conference operating under this policy statement.

6. Content of a file must be consistent with the stated rationale and purpose above. Records not consistent with the stated rationale and purpose are inappropriate and shall be removed from the file by the custodian.

7. The existence of a file shall be known to the referent, the Board and to the sources contributing to the file. The Board shall notify each referent and source of the existence of the file when it is originated and/or when material is placed in the file. The Board shall not notify any other person of the existence of the file without the written per-mission of the referent and the source unless required by law.

E. Content

The scope of the content of a file shall include items listed in the check lists attached to these policy statements. These check lists shall be established by the requirements of the Discipline and/or by vote of the Board. Any record generated outside the Board and not listed on the official checklists may be placed in a referent's file at the request of the referent or a source. Records other than those in the check lists may also be placed in a referent's file by vote of the Board under the guidelines of these policy statements. The referent shall be notified of this action.

F. Accuracy

1. All information included in a file should be accurate. The custodian shall check all information placed in a file for accuracy before it is placed in the file.

2. Information which is not verified (e.g., rumor or innuendo) is not acceptable as part of a file. No record shall be entered into a file without a signature.

3. Inaccurate information discovered in a file is to be corrected and the correction noted and signed by the person making the correction. The correction may be by addition or by deletion.

G. Source of Information

1. The Board shall maintain with each file an index of records which identifies the material, its source and the date of entry.

2. Sources of information shall be determined by action of the board and shall be competent with respect to the nature of the information supplied.

H. Access

1. Right of Access

a. The officers of the Board shall have access to all files at all times through formal request to the custodian. The members of the Board may have access to files of certain candidates for preparation for interviews and during decision making periods of time.

b. Contents of a file must not be divulged outside the Board of Ordained Ministry by word of mouth or by any other methods and conditions outlined in these policies.

c. Parties having access to information about the existence of a file do not necessarily have access to the content of the file. Access to the content of a file shall be at the discretion of the Board acting through its own vote or through its executive committee. Any person requesting a file other than the normal and proper procedures outlined in these policies shall make the request in writing stating the purpose for the access. d. Those with vested interest shall be notified by the Journal of the access poli-

cies before date is included in the file.

e. Normally, the referent shall have access to all information in the file. Any exception to this shall be determined by vote of the Board upon consultation with legal counsel.

f. The referent has the right to waive access to information in advance of its placement in the file. The waiver shall be in writing and shall be included in the file. Whenever the Board is aware of the need of limited access by the referent to the file, it shall request that the referent waive his/her right to access. When a referent refuses to waive his/her right to access the Board may or may not require limited access to the file by the referent. The Board maintains the right to determine access to its own files unless otherwise required by law.

g. The Board may request access to the files owned by other parties (e.g., the bishop, district superintendent, conference office, theological seminaries, or psychologists) through disciplinary provisions or contractual relationships.

2. Third-party access

a. Third-party access shall occur only with the written consent of the file referent

and with consent of the owner except when required by the <u>Discipline</u>. b. Whenever a bishop, board of ordained ministry, district superintendent or conference representative from another annual conference request information from a file as documentation for a transfer or other suitable cause, the board shall require the written consent of the referent.

c. The Board shall determine whether or not a request for information from a third party is proper in light of these policies and whether or not the information shall be supplied.

3. Modes of access

a. Open access shall be limited to the referent and owner. Access by sources and third parties shall be for specific information and requests for specific information shall be made in writing.

b. Photocopies of specific information in a referent's file shall not be permitted unless specifically requested by a referent or unless it is necessary for the work of the Board. When the specific work for which the photocopy was made is completed all photocopies shall be destroyed.

c. Access through indexes, anonymous or disguised data or tracts shall be allowed only with the written permission of referents involved and through request and approval by the Board.

d. A record of access including names of persons receiving access and the specific information accessed and the date of the access shall be maintained with every file. I. Retention and Disposition

1. Files shall be actively maintained so long as, and only so long as, they fulfill the conditions of the rationale and purpose for record keeping stated in this policy. This includes files for persons in the qualifying process, persons exiting from the qualifying process before reaching associate membership or full membership, local pastors, and files originated when persons receive a change in conference relationship after being received into associate or full membership.

2. The active life of a file shall be five years after a person exits during the qualifying process (certified candidates, local pastors, probationary members) and one year after a person is received into associate or full membership. A file generated when a person receives a change in conference relationship after having been received into associate or full membership shall be permanent as required by the <u>Discipline</u>, except, it shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions below if the person is readmitted into associate or full membership.

3. Within one year of a person's being elected into associate or full membership the custodian shall review each referent's file and make recommendations to the executive committee of the Board for disposition of each file. Each referent shall be notified that he/she may request specific information from the file. The conference secretary shall also be notified that biographical and other date may be available for the conference records and/or archives. Any source who may desire the return of information must make the request in writing and release shall be subject to waiver by the referent and at the dis-

cretion of the executive committee. After requests have been made concerning the disposition of each file, the executive committee shall dispose of the file as it sees fit. It may release records to the referent, conference secretary and/or sources at its discretion as specifically requested. All other information in the file including notes, lists, etc. shall be destroyed. A file or any material in a file may be sealed by vote of the Board at the request of the executive committee and kept for an indefinite period as determined by the Board.

4. A local pastor's file is maintained as long as the local pastor receives an appointment. If a local pastor moves to preparatory membership the file continues through the process. If a local pastor is elected to associate membership, the file is disposed of under the provisions outlined above. If a local pastor no longer receives an appointment, the file is maintained for four years and then is submitted to the executive committee for disposition under the terms outlined above.

5. When a file is destroyed because a candidate has been granted associate or full menbership in the annual conference, the biographical information (e.g., educational background, awards, publications, military service, prior employment, interest, etc.) mentioned above and any other data requested by the referent shall be included in a permanent file owned by the annual conference under the custodianship of the conference secretary or any other office or agency so designated by the annual conference and may be used in press releases, references, and the conference journal.

6. When an associate or full member applies for a change in conference relationship, the board of ordained ministry shall create a new permanent file for the referent. J. Security

1. Files shall be preserved from unauthorized access and accidential destruction. This is the responsibility of the owner and custodian.

2. Files are to be kept in a fire proof cabinet.

K. Guidelines for psychological assessment record keeping

1. Psychological assessment reports prepared by a psychologist, psychiatrist or pastoral evaluation specialist with proper credentials and released to the board with the written permission of the referent shall become a part of the files owned by the board.

2. Test scores and other data from psychological assessment, interview notes, and copies of reports shall be owned by and retained in the files of the psychologist, psychiatrist or pastoral evaluation specialist.

3. Access, disposition, reproduction, dissemination, and other use of data from psychological assessment shall be governed by contractual arrangement between the Board and/or other relevent agency, and the psychological consultant. This contractual arrangement shall be established prior to the gathering of psychological data and be consistent with the general guidelines of record keeping above.

4. With the written permission of the referent, blinded copies of test scores and other relevant assessment data may be released for research, archival entry, or longitudinal study.

5. Specific contractual arrangements shall conform to "Pastoral Evaluation of Candidates for Clergy Careers, a Manual," by John E. Hinkle, Jr.

Guidelines for keeping district committee on ordained ministry records. 1. The Board shall be the owner of all files maintained by the DCOM. 2. The board representative to the DCOM shall be the custodian. Files may be kept in the District office. The District Superintendent and his/her secretary have access to them.

3. Policies of content, access, security, cross-referencing, etc. shall follow the outline of the guidelines stated above.

4. The District Committee on Ordained Ministry shall maintain one file on each candidate. When a candidate moves to another district that file shall be sent to the District Committee in whose district the candidate is serving.

5. The DCOM shall continue to maintain files on all ministerial candidates until they become associate or probationary mambers, at which time all material shall be forwarded to the Board for disposition according to guidelines and policies above.

6. Copies of file material, reports and minutes from the DCOM with action concerning referents may be sent to the Board along with recommendations without written permission from the candidate.

Nominations Process

1. At Annual Conference one year preceding General Conference the Board Chairperson shall appoint a nominations committee consisting of three persons.

2. These persons shall come solely from the continuing class of Board members. 3. The committee shall collect names of nominees by two methods:

a. Persons interested in an office may declare their intentions to the Nominating Committee.

b. The Committee may recruit persons to be nominated.

4. The Committee may nominate more than one person for each office. 5. The following officers should be nominated by August 31st:

a. Registrar

b. Local Pastors Registrar (by August 1st.)

c. Mentor Registrar

6. Persons nominated shall meet with the appropriate bodies on the Board including the Executive Committee in order to begin orientation to the office to which they are nominated.

7. The Bishop will be asked to give the Board of Ministry the names of the persons he/she intends to nominate for the new class of Board members at Annual Conference by January 1st.

8. The Board of Ministry chairperson shall appoint three additional persons from this class to serve with the first three persons appointed to serve as the Nominating Committee.

9. The Nominating Committee shall meet and make additional nominations by February 1st, including: a) Chairperson, b) Vice Chairperson, c) Candidacy Registrar, d) Conference Relations Registrar, e) Secretary 10. The Executive Committee of the Board shall meet with the nominees for orientation

and identification of issues.

11. Outgoing officers shall meet with nominees for orientation and to identify issues prior to Annual Conference.

12. Election of Officers shall take place at the meeting of the Board within two (2) weeks following Annual Conference where the new class is elected.

Report No. 3

TRANSFERS

1. In the transfer of persons into the Central Texas Conference we shall use an interview process. This interview process shall be at the initiation of the Bishop and convened by him/her or his/her designate.

2. Members of the interview team shall be two cabinet members including the D.S. where this person is to be serving, the cabinet representative to the Board of Ordained Ministry (where these two persons would be the same person, another D.S. shall be designated by the Bishop), and two persons from the Board. These two persons shall be the Conference Relations Registrar and the Registrar.

3. Associate and full members transferring in shall be interviewed in an orientation manner as to their history in their former annual conference including any changes in their conference relationship during that time. They shall also be interviewed in terms of the nature and spirit of the Central Texas Annual Conference in order to help them adjust and feel at home in our conference.

4. Probationary members transferring shall be required to have their Board of Ordained Ministry files forwarded to our Registrar prior to the interview. These files will be compared to our requirements for the contents of the files. If there are items we require for probationary membership that are not in the file, a time line shall be negotiated to see that those items are forthcoming. The interview shall include an overview of the Board policies for qualifying for full membership including the attendance at Licensing School and that one full conference year of full time service in the Central Texas Annual Conference is required by the Board before the person will be considered for full membership. The interview should also include background information and history of the person including his/her steps into ministry and any delays along the way or changes in relationship. The interview shall also include discussion of the nature and spirit of our Annual Conference in order to help this person adjust and feel at home in our conference.

OTHER POLICY STATEMENTS

The following policy statements do not appear in previous journals, but are in the minutes of the Board; therefore, they are printed here for your information:

Local Pastor Transfers: When a person licensed as a local pastor in another conference Is appointed to serve in the Central Texas Conference this person shall be listed in the appropriate category as approved and appointed in the Board's report provided: 1. The person provides the Board with documentation of his/her certificate of

candidacy.

2. The person provides documentation of his/her current license as a local pastor. 3. The person be enrolled in the Central Texas Conference Licensing School for orientation.

Leave of Absence

1. The Cabinet and Board usually recommend the Southwest Career Development Center for persons requesting a leave of absence. In some circumstances this may be a requirement for granting a leave of absence.

2. Any probationer on leave of absence shall come before the Board each year for an interview.

Probationary Transfers: Probationers transferring into the Central Texas Annual Conference shall serve one full conference year in the Central Texas Annual Conference before being eligible to be received into full membership in the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Full Connection

1. All written requirements for elders' orders and/or full connection are to be submitted the first year under full-time appointment.

2. At least one year under supervision must be served in the Central Texas Annual Conference before admittance into full connection regardless of where internship was served. 3. Persons previously approved for full connection but who do not receive an appoinment shall be continued as a probationary member.

Continuing Education - Travel Seminars: In the Board Policy in the 1981 Journal, page 165 under E. Funding Policy delete #4. dealing with travel seminars. Re-number #5 as #4 and #6 as #5. Persons going on travel seminars will qualify for continuing education funds on the same basis as all other continuing education events.

Notification: All candidates seeking admittance into the conference are to be sent written requirements by certified mail.

Deadline: All materials required for Associate Membership, Probationary Membership, Continuation under Probation, and Full Membership must be postmarked or received by the Registrar by February 1.

MINISTERIAL CONDUCT

The Annual Conference of 1972 adopted a set of "Guidelines for Ministerial Conduct" and mandated that they be reprinted each quadrennium, assigning the task of reprinting them to the Board of Ordained Ministry. The last time they were reprinted was in 1982. Therefore, the following is a reprint from the 1972 Journal, page 110:

The United Methodist clergy person of today considers himself/herself a professional of equal stature with the other professionals of our society. This professional image is produced by the degree of educational attainant and the competency with which the clergyperson fulfills his/her responsibilities both within the Church and community. In view of this, the following "Guidelines for Ministerial Relationships" are offered in an effort to provide the clengyperson with a definable boundary of conduct, with the intent and purpose being the strengthening of the bonds within the ministerial community, in order that all involved might render a more meaningful service within this ministry of love.

I. It is understood that the minister designated as "Pastor-In-Charge" (hereinafter referred to simply as "Pastor" and referring to that individual who has primary ministerial leadership responsibility while the term "minister" shall apply to any other clergyperson) shall perform or shall be in charge of all Sacraments, Acts of Worship and Rituals carried out within the parish unless circumstances prevent him/her from fulfilling this

responsibility.

A. A minister shall not perform any ministerial function for a member of a congregation without the express permission and direct personal invitation of the Pastor. 1. If a family in a crisis situation desires the ministry of a minister other

than the Pastor, said minister must be requested through the Pastor, who will arrange for his/her presence.

2. In the case of funerals, weddings or other ministerial functions, if mambers desire the ministry of a minister other than the Pastor, said minister is to be requested through the Pastor, who will contact the desired member.

3. Visiting ministers will assist the Pastor in a manner mutually acceptable to the member family and Pastor. The Pastor will be in charge of the service, NOT THE VISIT-ING MINISIER, However, the Pastor shall retain the right not to assume direct charge as a matter of personal preference, or if he/she deems such an action as pastorally unnecessary.

4. The Pastor shall assume the responsibility for the fulfillment of all disciplinary requirements listed in Paragraph 438.2 of The Discipline (1980 - "Duties of a Pastor"), in those instances where a visiting minister is involved.

5. When a family which is not a member of or related to a local Church in their city calls a distant minister to conduct some ministerial function in a facility other than the local church, the minister out of loving care and concern should contact the local Pastor before conducting the service.

B. If a family contacts a potential visiting minister prior to consulting with the Pastor, the family shall be instructed by the potential visiting minister to consult with the Pastor, and no commitment shall be made until such a time as the visiting minister is contacted by the Pastor.

C. If the Pastor is unavailable to minister to the needs of a family due to illness. vacation or other extenuating circumstances, the visiting minister shall conduct himself/ herself on the highest level of ethical behavior so as not to impair or injure the future ministry of the Pastor. D. The Pastor is to inform the Funeral Director regarding all arrangements for a

service.

II. While realizing that ministers tend to build meaningful and lasting relationships with persons and families wihin a parish, visits in a previous pastorate should be held to a minimum especially during the first year. In turn, no minister should make suggestions as to what should or should not be done within the program or policy of a local church of which he/she is not the Pastor.

III. Retired ministers should abide by the same rules of conduct established for visiting ministers. They should accept the responsibility for the performance of any ministerial function only upon direct invitation of the Pastor.

IV. In the interest of assuring a smooth pastoral transition, the outgoing Pastor has the following obligations to his successor:

A. Introduce him/her in a positive manner, utilizing the church newsletter and other means which are at his/her disposal.

B. Arrange for responsible Lay Persons to meet with and acquaint the new minister with his/her new parish assignment.

C. The outgoing Pastor should make it clear that the newly assigned Pastor will have the responsiblity of ministering to the congregation, and that he/she will no longer be available for such services.

D. The outgoing Pastor shall explain to the local congregation, in a tasteful manner, the circumstances which produced his/her new assignment, i.e., if he/she had actively sought a new pastorate he/she should be honest enough to say so, or if he/she had agreed a move which he/she had not sought, this, too, should be explained. to

E. In the area of finances:

1. All church finances should be current and fiscal data file available for the new Pastor.

2. A new Pastor moving to a new appointment following Annual Conference shall not receive salary from the local church for service after May 31.

3. It is the Pastor's responsibility to see that all funds are expended only for the purpose for which they are contributed.

F. All records should be in an orderly and up-to-date status.

G. The parsonage shall be vacated by noon on "moving day." The incoming Pastor should not arrive prior to noon. The outgoing Pastor shall work with the Parsonage Committee to see that the parsonage is thoroughly cleaned inside and out, and that needed repairs are called to the attention of the committee prior to his departure. H. All utilities shall be paid through the departure date in those instances when

H. All utilities shall be paid through the departure date in those instances when the Pastor is directly responsible. In those instances where this creates a problem, the outgoing Pastor shall make arrangements with the incoming Pastor to pay his fair share.

outgoing Pastor shall make arrangements with the incoming Pastor to pay his fair share. V. If a Pastor is to be absent from his/her parish for an extended period of time, he/she should inform the congregation as to which minister(s) will be performing his/her pastoral duties. If no previous arrangements are possible due to sudden calamity, the District Superintendent should be consulted.

WI. The Pastor shall keep in confidence any privileged information which he/she should obtain.

VII. A minister shall have those rights and privileges of citizenship which are common to other citizens.

A. A minister may hold elective or non-elective public offices of honor and trust if there is no time conflict between the holding of such office or positions and his/her relationship with his/her appointed ministry. The decision as to whether or not such a conflict does exist should be made by the minister in consultation with the Administrative Board (or equivalent governing body), the District Superintendent, and the Bishop. B. A responsibility of the minister is to give leadership on moral and social is-

B. A responsibility of the minister is to give leadership on moral and social issues; and his/her leadership should not be circumscribed by the congregation to which he/ she is assigned except in those instances where there is a direct conflict with the Discipline. Because of this leadership role, the minister should familiarize himself/ herself with character-building institutions, social and professional service institutions and governmental resources in the community.

C. In exercising citizenship rights and privileges, the minister should follow these suggestions:

 Be careful to identify personal positions taken on public issues as personal positions.

2. If he/she presumes to speak for his/her congregation, he/she should be certain that his/her position is supported by action of the Administrative Board. VIII. Although it is recognized that a certain amount of competitiveness promotes a healthy spirit of effort between local congregations, no Pastor should make himself/ herself party to an activity or undertaking which injures or detracts from the efforts of the Pastor of a nearby local church. A Pastor's discreetness at this point should forbear his/her calling upon members of a nearby church who are actively involved or scheduling programs or activities which tear down or hinder similar programs or activities of a nearby church. In short, local church pastors serving in immediate proximities should seek to cooperate and complement each other, rather than hinder or interfere with each other's programs.

The responsibility was given to the Board of Ministries to see that the "Guidelines for Ministerial Relations" be published in the Annual Conference Journal once each quadrennium and that a copy of the "Guidelines for Ministerial Relations" be placed in the hands of each minister who transfers into this Annual Conference and each minister who is received into Probationary Membership of this Annual Conference.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. 1

The work of your Conference Board of Pensions continues to be one of great interest as we continue to keep abreast of the changing economic climates across the Conference. We owe a great debt of gratitude to the fine lay persons and clergy who make up the Conference Board of Pensions. Their dedication and willingness to give of their valuable time to see that the responsibilities of the Board are met continues to be one of special pride. We are delighted to report that the Board has set the past service rate for Minister's service years prior to 1982 at \$267.00. We are mandated by the Discipline to always main-

tain a rate of .9 of one percent of the Conference average salary. The Conference average salary is \$29,601. This we recommend to the Annual Conference for your action.

Report No. 2

1961 Supply Years Correction Report

It has been discovered that at the 1961 session of the Central Texas Annual Conference Board of Pensions, Report No. 3 was withdrawn relating to the removal of Supply Years' credit for certain ministers. This report was withdrawn and has so been attested to by the then Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, the Vice-Chairman and the Secretary. The Report was never pulled from the preliminary reports and was thus printed. It was accidentally found during our studies of the Supply years question and thought to have been the action of the Annual Conference. Most thought it odd that no one remembered it being presented. The Report is No. 3, page 141, and the Minutes showing the withdrawal is found on page 36 of the 1962 Conference Journal. Therefore, let this report be the correction report for the 1961 Conference as printed in the 1962 Journal.

Report No. 3

Supply Ministers Pension Credit

For three years your Conference Board of Pensions has been involved in a study of the problems related to Pension credit for Supply Pastors. It has not been an easy task; we have heard from many pastors with Supply years to their credit and with questions about their Pension credit for those years.

At this past session of the Annual Conference a Supply years study committee of outstanding lay persons and ministers was appointed to study and evaluate the problem. This Committee met many hours and labored over the problem. The General Board of Pensions was asked to give us the cost of putting all Supplies on credit at one time and be done with the problem. But, with the economics being what they are the Committee felt the sudden cost of \$58,000 per year would be too much for the CF&A budget.

It was decided that by asking each minister at retirement time with a Supply years problem to come before the Executive Committee of the Board of Pensions with his/her request. The Executive Committee would evaluate his/her request and make a recommendation to the Conference Board and to the Annual Conference concerning their recommendation. The Annual Conference in accordance with the Book of Discipline would have the final say. The criteria to be used by the Committee would be based on the following:

A. An error discovered to have been committed by the Conference record keeping basis of the then extant copy of the Discipline,

AND

B. Creative tension between the Discipline and the minister having served as the Pastor in Charge for a full calendar year. The "use of life" principle is a viable consideration for determining credit.

I move that the Central Texas Annual Conference enroll its current and future retired ministers in the Death Benefit Plan, Plus of the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church, beginning as of this session of The Annual Conference; Further, that the basis for the determination of rates and benefits be the average salary of the Central Texas Annual Conference;

Further, that annual funding for our participation in D B P, Plus be taken from the conference insurance reserve.

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ormained or incensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Central Texas Annual

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Central Texas Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister, and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefits payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 1988 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Central Texas Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability;

2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church. Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or har housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107 (2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

At present the Conference Board of Trustees holds title to 4 pieces of property: 1. St. John UMC, 311 University, which the Annual Conference has authorized the Board to sell. The property is currently on the market.

2. Cogswell UNC, 5201 Libbey St., which was acquired under the directions of paragraph 2546.4 of the 1984 <u>Discipline</u> of the United Methodist Church. This property is listed for sale.

3. The parsonage of Boulevard UMC, 1608 Circle Park Blvd.. Due to the lack of direction by the Annual Conference to the Conference Board of Trustees as prescribed by the 1984 Discipline of the UMC, the Conference Board of Trustees has been leasing the parsonage to the La Trinidad UMC to cover insurance and minimal repair costs.

4. Boulevard UMC, 1600 Circle Park Blvd. In accordance with the direction of the Annual Conference NICA has been occupying the property by paying the utilities. Until February 10, 1987 the property was uninsured because no company would write the insurance. As of Feb. 10, Frank B. Hall agreed to write the insurance with the understanding that they wrote all the insurance for the holdings of the Central Texas Conference including the office furnishings and equipment.

The Conference Board of Trustees requests the conference affirm the following: Resolutions:

1. Be it resolved that the Central Texas Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to sell the property known as 1608 Circle Park Boulevard for the best possible price and that the net proceeds from such a sale be invested with the Texas Methodist Foundation and yearly interest be used for mission activity sponsored by the Ft. Worth West District.

2. Be it resolved that the Central Texas Conference Board of Trustees be given authority to explore with the Metropolitan Board of Missions of the 2 Ft. Worth Districts the possibility of using the Boulevard Church property for mission endeavor. Should the trustees determine such an endeavor is not feasible to continue to the satisfaction of all parties, that they be authorized to sell the property at the best possible price or trade or dispose of the building and property most expeditiously. Be it further resolved that the proceeds from such sale be invested in the Texas Methodist Foundation and that the interest be used for mission activity sponsored by the Ft. Worth West District.

interest be used for mission activity sponsored by the Ft. Worth West District. 3. Be it resolved that the Conference Board of Trustees be given authority to sell all furnishings, windows or other property belonging to said Boulevard Church at a price they determine equitable or give it to a church if they determine. All proceeds would be invested with the Texas Methodist Foundation and the yearly interest be used for mission activity sponsored by the Ft. Worth West District.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

1. The Commission emphasizes its continuing commitment to the location and preservation of the records of all closed, abandoned, and/or merged churches. If your church records should include those records of a church no longer in existence, please bring those particular records into the Archives Depository for safe-keeping and preservation. The Depository will also care for local church records which exceed 75 years of age, and, in the case of churches with no adequately safe storage, those records which exceed 50 years of age. The following are some of the local church records received within the past year: Boulevard UMC, Ft. Worth; Wedgwood UMC, Ft. Worth; Turnersville UMC; Ben Hur; Ireland; Keener Chapel; Peden; Knob. Also received were the Ft. Worth West District Charge Conferference Reports, 1976-1979.

The Commission is equally committed to the preservation of records of ministers and spouses and of lay people of the Central Texas Conference. Among records received in this category this year are papers of Dr. Albert Christopher Fisher and Ethel Shirley Knight Fisher, a minister and his wife. Also received is a unique first-of-its kind in the South Central Jurisdiction, to the best of our knowledge: a biographical account of Mr. Erskine Williams, an architect, by his daughter, Lois Williams Huckabee. 2. The Union List of Deceased Ministers and Spouses of our parent Northwest Texas Con-

2. The Union List of Deceased Ministers and Spouses of our parent Northwest Texas Conference and the present Central Texas Conference, 1866-1986, is a very valuable aid to the work of the depository and to researchers. Copies of this 1200 page volume of work are located at General Archives (Drew University), Jurisdictional Archives (Bridwell Library, SMU), Northwest Texas Conference Archives (McMurry College), Texas Conference Archives (with archivist Rev. Bill Hedges), and Central Texas Conference Archives (Polytechnic UMC). The Union List was compiled by Mrs. Gene Allen (Pat) and by members of the CTC Commission. Work is continuing on the Union List to retrieve information on all Local Preachers and spouses.

An interesting aside is that the Central Texas Conference Union List is the first of all the Union Lists across United Methodism to be entered on the new computer at General Archives, Drew University.

3. The Central Texas Conference Archives and Emory University in Georgia are cooperating in a joint endeavor to microfilm a complete run of Journals of this Conference from the earliest of our Journals, an 1878 copy, to 1939. Bridwell is assisting in the project by supplying four of the Journals which are not among the combined Journals of The CIC and Emory.

Within the next eighteen months the depository will have a microfilm reader; and we dream of having a copy of the early <u>Texas Christian Advocate newspapers</u>, which are available on microfilm through Bridwell Library. With these tools research will be greatly enhanced by giving access to information relating to the early Texas circuit churches and to many Local Preacher names and responsibilities. The Commission would welcome any special gifts which would enable this dream to become reality.

4. The Texas State Historical Commission maintains very exacting standards for the granting of State Historical Markers in Texas. Two State markers have been granted to United Methodist entities within the Central Texas Conference during the past year:

located in Waco on Jackson Street at the Brazos River is the Historic Site of the First Church Building in Waco; located at 600 S. 2nd Street in Waco is St. James United Methodist Church.

5. The Archives Commission will present a 6-hour seminar/laboratory on September 12, 1987 at the Fall University in Hillsboro. Each person who attends will work with an array of materials, learning to describe, list, process, cross-reference, do routine preservation techniques, and store historical records for safe-keeping and for retrieval when needed.

6. The Rev. John Johnson, pastor of Bethesda UMC, Weatherford District, is the president of the 2-State, 7-Conference Texas United Methodist Historical Society. This organization functions as a connectional thread through the archives depositories of each of these annual conferences, enabling each to do a more adequate job. The programs of the Society educate, entertain, and inspire. Papers of historical value are presented at each annual meeting. New, as well as time-tested archival techniques, are discussed and shared. Membership in the group is open to all who are interested in church-related history and in the preservation of historical materials. The Texas United Methodist Historical Society meets on the Thursday and Friday immediately following Ministers Week, the first week in February.

7. The depository of the Central Texas Conference Archives is located at the Polytechnic United Methodist Church. We are much indebted to this church for providing us with so marvelous a space in which to work and to preserve the records of the Conference. The depository is open routinely on Wednesday of each week for the systematic indexing, crossreferencing, and preservation-storage of records received. You are invited to come to the depository to research or to get a glimpse of the scope of the on-going work of archives. Please call me through the Conference office or through St. Barnabas UMC, Arlington. Archives is history in Action in All our lives.

COMMISSION ON CHURCH GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

Report No. 1

The year 1986 was of major importance to the Commission on Church Growth and Development. Our original assignment - to initiate, direct, and sponsor a conference-wide plan of membership growth and church extension - was joined with the responsibilities of the Waco District and Fort Worth District(s) Boards of Mission(s) and Metropolitan Board. Previous commitments, funding, and implementation have been an obligation and ministry shared with the new endeavors of the commission since 1980. The year 1986 marks the successful completion of these projects. Two acress of excess property joining the Covenant United Methodist Church were sold and the proceeds applied to that congregations's indebtedness. It is now "free standing" with all debts paid or with cash resources equal to indebtedness. This marks the completion of all "carry-over" obligations including the complete repayment of note(s) held by the Metropolitan Board.

The year 1986 also saw two new Korean congregations consecrated - Harker Heights, Temple District; Fort Worth, Fort Worth West District. A new congregation started its formation at Lake Brownwood in the Brownwood District. Additionally, eight previously established and/or relocations continue to flourish and contribute to another year of net growth in our Annual Conference membership.

Perhaps the most significant event for Church Growth in 1986 was the receiving of income from the Capital Funds Campaign. This has enabled us to purchase a new church site in Southeast Arlington, clear enough indebtedness on the new St. John the Apostle Church property so they may build and move "on site" ahead of schedule.

In 1987, our current year, we see the establishment of a new congregation within sight of the largest elementary school in the state of Texas. We are also securing the church site at Lake Brownwood (Brownwood District) and St. John the Apostle (FWE District); assisting in the formation of another new Korean congregation in Waco (Waco District). We further continue support to the projects at the Korean congregation in Killeen (Temple District), Fort Worth (FWW District), and Waco (Waco District). Also Campus Drive, Watauga, St. Philip's (Round Rock), Grace (Arlington), and St. John the Apostle (Arlington) continue to receive congregational development support.

The Commission on Church Growth and Development continues to stress the related importance of the Share (Partners in Growth) Program and the Capital Funds Campaign portion that comes to us. Proceeds from Capital Funds are used exclusively to purchase new church sites and/or clear title to same. Proceeds from the Share Program are used for both property purchase and congregational development. As more Capital Funds are received, then more share funds are available to start, form, and nurture new congregations to a "free standing" and self-supporting position. This time-line must be as brief as possible. In 1986 our 6,331 shares generated \$284,915.32 to secure our ministries. It is imperative that we continue to strive toward our goal of 10,000 shares. A new church site is essential within the growth areas of our conference. Capital Funds will aid in this acquisition. Share receipts make it possible for us to put a minister in the field with succeed in matching growth in discipling with growth in population, then it is important that both Capital Funding and the Share Campaigns succeed. Our report is your report. It is your faith in response to the Commission of Christ to

Our report is your report. It is your faith in response to the Commission of Christ to make disciples. It is your positive accomplishment in terms of people worshipping, studying, fellowshipping, and growing in numbers and deepening faith in new and relocated churches that did not exist six years ago. What will our report be ten years from now? May it be said that we have been found faithful.

Report No. 2

CHURCH CROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT GOALS BEING MET

The Commission on Church Growth and Development was launched by the Central Texas Conference in June 1980 with some specific tasks to accomplish. These tasks had to do with a conference-wide plan of church extension and revitalization and growth of our existing churches.

With these tasks in mind, the commission organized and set some specific goals. Now after six years we can say that our goals are being met.

The following is a brief summary of Church Growth and Development's accomplishments during the first half of this "Decade of Decision."

SIX NEW CHURCHES IN THIS DECADE: 1) Genesis UMC in southwest Fort Worth; 2) Campus Drive UMC in southeast Fort Worth; 3) Korean UMC in Killeen, Texas; 4) St. Philip's UMC in Round Rock, Texas; 5) Grace UMC in Arlington, Texas; and 6) St. John the Apostle UMC in south Arlington.

PLAN OF FINANCING CHURCH EXTENSION: The "Partners in Growth" Share Plan was instituted conference-wide in February 1981. This plan, providing about \$1,800,000 in five years, has made church extension projects possible.

Now, we have seen the launching of the Capital Funds Campaign in 1986 in order to buy priority sites where we know new churches will be needed in the next two decades.

CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP GROWIH: A plan of Church Growth Seminars was launched in the summer of 1980. At the end of 1985, 169 local church seminars had been experienced. These seminars, along with the establishing of new congregations, and a conference-wide awareness of our possibilities has brought a membership growth of 10,000 new members to the Central Texas Conference after two decades of no growth.

REVITALIZATION OF LOCAL CHURCHES: A plan wherein a small amount of money can enable an existing congregation to revitalize with new development or relocation has helped the following churches: Watauga UMC, St. James UMC in Temple, Oakdale UMC, Early UMC, and First UMC in Round Rock.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES AND CLERGY BENEFITS

Report No. 1

Equitable Salary and Temporary General Aid Fund

There shall be a program of Equitable Salary Support in the Central Texas Conference under the management of the Commission on Equitable Salaries and Clergy Benefits. This program shall be patterned after paragraph 722 of the 1984 Discipline. Based on these guidelines, the following paragraphs shall compose the operating procedure for the Equitable Salary and Temporary General Aid Program.

1. The commission recognizes the necessity of coordinating all salary subsidy; therefore, the Conference Treasurer shall inform the commission on any salary grants by other conference or general church agencies, so it may coordinate salary supplements through the Commission on Equitable Salary and Clergy Benefits for that portion not covered by any other source.

2. A prerequisite for consideration of salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund shall be the filing with the commission of a written application by the District Superintendent. The District Superintendent shall certify classification of the pastor and the salary (salary, travel, and utility) set by the charge. The application form will be supplied by the commission.

3. Salary grants shall be made for a calendar year with payments made monthly. In cases of appointment changes at or between the Annual Conference session, the District Superintendents shall file a written request with the commission. Approved supplements shall then be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year actually served. 4. The following conditions must be met by the pastoral charge before its pastor can

4. The following conditions must be met by the pastoral charge before its pastor can become eligible for consideration to receive salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund.

a. The pastoral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass for the local church budget of each of its churches during the previous conference year.

b. All apportioned items shall have been paid in full for the previous conference year.

c. The charge must have at least 100 members.

In unusual situations the Commission on Equitable Salary and Clergy Benefits may waive any or all of these conditions.

5. The Commission on Equitable Salary and Clengy Benefits will pay any amount up to 1/3 of the minimum salary as set by the Annual Conference for each applicant according to his/her ministerial classification.

If any exception under paragraphs 4 or 5 is sought, the request must be endorsed by a 2/3 vote of the Cabinet before it can be considered by the commission.

6. Beginning in calendar year 1984 an "Incentive Plan" was used in figuring equitable salary payments within the following clarifications and guidelines:

a. The objective of this plan, as with all minimum salary support, is to strengthen the work of the local church. The goal of this plan is to allow and encourage local churches to increase ministerial support of their pastors, allowing the pastor in the appointment to receive the benefit of increased income from the local church without losing the support from the Minimum Salary Fund.

b. Ministerial support increases by the local church during the tenure of one pastor shall be added to the total allowable income for the pastor during the duration of the appointment relationship of that pastor with that church, subject to renegotiation with the commission at the end of a three year period.

c. Whenever a change in pastoral appointment occurs, or at the end of the Incentive Plan agreement, the charge is to maintain their local church's existing level of ministerial support. With regard to equitable salary support, at such time as a change in their appointment occurs, the charge will return to the base minimum salary for which the new minister qualifies, if such support is still below the minimum salary base.

7. Persons of the following ministerial relationships are eligible for consideration for salary supplements at the level indicated for 1987. Rates of adjustment will be considered annually by the commission, rather than establishing automatic adjustments.

a. Elder, Full Connection b. Associate Member c. Full-Time Local Pastor.	14,700
 d. Probationary Member 1) Non-Student living on charge. 2) Student living on charge. 2) Student living on charge. 	13,125
 3) Student not living on charge e. Student Local Pastors Living on charge Living away from charge 	11,760

8. Pastors who are appointed to less than full-time service as addressed in the 1984 Discipline, (p442.2) shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund. The amount of salary supplement for which the pastor is eligible will be determined by the Cabinet's interpretation of time actually spent in pastoring the charge. For example, if the pastor is deemed as serving 1/4 of full time, his minimum salary eligibility would be 1/4 of the minimum of his conference relationship classification. The categories of 1/4, 1/2, and 3/4 will be followed in determining less than full-time eligibility for salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund.

9. Seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Equitable Salary Supplements are eligible to receive \$1.00 per mile, round trip each quarter, for the distance from the seminary to the pastoral charge. This extra allowance shall be computed by the commission, and paid quarterly to the seminary student pastor.

10. Ministers who are not eligible for salary supplements are:

a. Those whose appointment is other than pastor of a charge.

b. Those classified as part time local pastor.

c. Retired ministers.

d. No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in a present appointment.

Report No. 2

Moving Expenses

1. We recommend that the conference pay the greater of \$200 or \$3.00 per mile for the first 100 miles and \$1.00 per mile additional after the first 100 miles with no maximum within the bounds of the Annual Conference. The receiving charge is expected to pay any remaining balance of the actual moving expenses.

2. We further recommend that the procedure of filing correct forms with the Conference Secretary/Treasurer be continued.

3. We do, however, expect every receiving charge in the Annual Conference to pay the moving expense of the new minister in excess of the allowance and it must be the responsibility of the District Superintendent at the time of consultation to inform the church of its share of this obligation.

4. We recommend that the conference pay the moving expenses of a retiring minister within the boundaries of the conference. This reimbursement will not exceed \$500.00 over the amount paid in Article #1.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The Commission on heligion and have functions within the Central Texas Annual Conference for purposes of monitoring and advocacy on issues related to religion and race. The Commission endeavors to help the Annual Conference be sensitive to membership on Conference boards and agencies as well as encouraging persons to be responsible for religion and race within the local church.

During the past year the Commission has encouraged local churches to have cross racial worship services as well as celebrate Black History Month. Some of the districts have had district celebrations lifting up the theme of "Our Oneness in the Faith."

In addition to this report the Central Texas Conference Commission on Religion and Race in response to a mandate given it by the General Conference is attempting to fulfill not only that mandate, but the mandate of the gospel to become an inclusive church. Christ's Body, that is the Church, is weakened by the division that racism inflicts upon us. Whenever we make decisions on the basis of the color of one's skin or on sex we are turning aside from the unity of oneness of our Biblical and historical faith. To bring division to Christ's Body is not a case of bad judgment, but is a sin before God and the world we are called to serve.

The Commission hereby recommends the following strategy to move the Central Texs Annual Conference from a position of stagnation to one of being alive to the oneness of an inclusive fellowship:

1. The Commission asks that the Bishop and Cabinet make cross racial appointments as soon as possible, recognizing that where faith lives so does risk.

 That the seminaries include in their training process inter-racial experiences thereby conditioning candidates to be available to serve the church in a multi-racial background.

3. That the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry include in their qualifying process for ordination those conditions that would equip a candidate to serve in a cross racial experience.

4. That the Central Texas Conference Council on Ministries provide training experiences in each district for Pastor Parish Relations Committees for purposes of equipping each local church PPR committee to prepare their congregation for a cross racial appointment.

5. That the Central Texas Conference Council on Ministries provide training in each district for pastors to enable them to prepare their congregations for cross racial appointments. Attendance at these training events may not be considered optional.

6. That each District Council on Ministries provide a training and conditioning experience for local church Work Area on Religion and Race equipping these persons to lead their congregation in a comprehensive program in the area of Religion and Race. Local church nominating committees should be sure their church has a person elected to this office.

Media Coverage

"WHEREAS the 1986 Annual Conference session recognized the need for a United Methodist presence in telecommunications and established a \$20,000 special program; and whereas the Annual Conference Council on Ministries wholeheartedly supports the continuance and routine establishment of such a ministry; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Annual Conference reaffirms its support for an ongoing communications ministry by (1)funding a \$20,000 special ministry during 1988, and (2)placing this program within the Annual Conference Council on Ministries program and budget in ensuing years."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS THE UNITED METHODIST COMMUNICATIONS COUNCIL.

- I. NAME: The name of this organization shall be The United Methodist Communications Council of Texas and New Mexico, hereafter referred to as the Council.
- II. PURPOSE: The purpose of the Council shall be to envision, foster, coordinate and oversee cooperative communications activities of the United Methodist Church in Texas and New Mexico. Functions within this purpose shall include:
 - A. Trustee oversight of the publication, editing and fiscal integrity of the United Methodist Reporter, a weekly newspaper, and its subsidiary operations.
 - B. General oversight of the production of special print, sound and video resources for annual conferences, local churches, and church agencies and institutions.
 - C. Envisioning and implementing other communication strategies that the seven annual conferences determine may be carried out more effectively together than separately. This function may include, but is not limited to:
 - 1. Fostering more effective use of communications media by annual conferences, local churches and church agencies.
 - 2. Development and coordination of ongoing strategies to enhance United Methodism's public image through relations with the public media.
- III. MEMBERSHIP: Membership of the Council shall be drawn equally from the seven United Methodist annual conferences in Texas and New Mexico, and shall include:
 - A. The bishops who are assigned to provide episcopal leadership in those annual conferences.
 - B. Each conference's Communications Committee Chairperson.

 - C. Each conference's Council on Ministries Director. D. The chairperson of the UMR Governing Board if that person should come from a conference outside of Texas and New Mexico, ex-officio without vote.
 - IV. OFFICERS: Officers of the Council shall consist of a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, and Secretary.

- A. The duties of the Chairperson shall include calling the annual meeting and any other meetings of the Council as may be needed during the year, and presiding over those meetings.
- B. The Vice-Chairperson shall perform the duties of the Chairperson during his or her absence.
- C. The duties of the Secretary shall be to record the proceedings of Council meetings. Minutes of meetings shall be distributed to all Council members.
- D. Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Council. No one may serve in the same office more than four (4) years nor as an officer of the Council more than eight (8) years.

V. COMMITTEES

- A. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, one presiding bishop, and one other person from membership, with no two from the same annual conference.
- B. The Council Chairperson shall appoint annually a Nominating Committee to submit a slate of officers to the Council provided that additional nominations may be made from the floor at the time of election.
- C. The Council may create such other committees as it may determine are needed to carry out the Council's work.
- VI. OWNERSHIP: The Council and each of its subsidiary parts are wholly owned by the seven annual conferences of the United Methodist Church located in Texas and New Mexico and are answerable to them.
 - A. The Council and its subsidiary parts may not be sold, transferred or terminated except by vote of two-thirds of the annual conferences. Each incorporated unit within the Council shall have authority to buy and sell property as needed to maintain its existing functions.
 - B. Should any subsidiary unit or division of the Council cease to exist, all of its real and acquired assets shall be proportionately divided among the United Methodist annual conferences of Texas and New Mexico.
 - C. Should the entire Council cease to exist, all of its real and acquired assets shall be proportionately divided among the United Methodist annual conferences of Texas and New Mexico.

VII. SUBSIDIARY UNITS

A. The United Methodist Reporter Governing Board

- The United Methodist Reporter and its subsidiary operations shall be governed by a board composed of a Chairperson elected by the Council in consultation with the UMR Board's Executive Committee, Vice-Chairperson and a secretary elected by the UMR Board from that board's members, and the two Council members from each of the seven annual conferences of Texas and New Mexico. No one may serve in the same office more than four (4) years.
 - a. Each additional annual conference that publishes an edition of the United Methodist Reporter or the United Methodist Reveiw shall be entitled to designate one voting representative to the UMR Board.
 - b. One of the four bishops of Texas and New Mexico shall be designated by those bishops to serve on the UMR Governing Board.
 - c. Up to five additional at-large members of the Reporter Board may be nominated by the UMR Executive Committee and elected by the Council if such persons are needed to enhance the board's lay, racial, ethnic and/or sexual inclusiveness, or to insure inclusion on the board of at least two practicing professionals in the field of communication.
- 2. The UMR Governing Board shall be empowered to oversee and conduct the business of the United Methodist Reporter and its subsidiary operations which may include, but are not limited to, publication of annual conference journals, publication of the United Methodist Review, a bi-weekly tabloid version of UMR, publication of a weekly ecumenical newspaper, the National Christian Reporter, production and printing of publications for other denominations, operation of Agency Services, and ownership and operation of Religious News Service.

- 3. Governance of The Reporter and its subsidiary operations shall be consistent with and guided by the editorial and administrative policies and operational by-laws that have been adopted during previous years. Those policies may be changed by a majority vote of the UMR Governing Board.
- 4. Minutes of the meetings of the UMR Board shall be sent to each board member and each member of the Council promptly after each meeting.
- 5. Decisions of the UMR Governing Board shall be reported to and reviewed by the Council at its meeting in order to protect the integrity of the Reporter's purposes and the interests of the annual conferences which own the Reporter and its subsidiary operations. The Council retains the authority to reverse a board decision deamed contrary to those interests. Such an action shall require a 2/3 majority vote of those Council members present and voting.
- 6. A meeting of the UMR Governing Board shall be held annually in the fall. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairperson of the UMR Board as needed. Any board member may request a called meeting. A quorum of at least one-half of the voting members shall be required to conduct business. 7. The UMR Governing Board shall have an Executive Committee composed of the
- board's officers and seven at-large members, one of whom may be the immediate past president of the board. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to conduct the business of the Reporter and its subsidiary operations between sessions of the UMR Governing Board, with minutes of its meetings communicated to other members of the board. Executive Committee decisions are subject to subsequent review by the whole board.
- 8. Other committees and task forces may be created as needed to insure the effec-
- tive operation of the Reporter and its subsidiary operations. B. Additional units similar to the UMR Governing Board may be created as needed by the Council to oversee the development and implementation of specific cooperative communications functions. Oversight of such additional communications functions may be assigned in consultation with the UMR Governing Board or its Executive Committee for implementation as part of UMR's operations.
- VIII. FINANCES: Each operating unit of the Council shall be designed to have its own budgetary integrity. New functions shall not be implemented without prior provision for their support being made with annual conferences. local churches, church agencies or institutions.
 - A. Travel expenses to meetings of the Council shall be provided by each participating annual conference for its members.
 - B. Meeting space and incidental meeting expenses shall be provided by the United Methodist Reporter unless alternative arrangements are made by the Council.
 - C. Any proposed new cooperative communication function requiring financial support from the annual conferences shall first be approved by the Council and then presented by each conference's Council members to the appropriate annual conference agencies for consideration.
 - IX. STAFF:
 - A. The Council annually shall elect the chief executive of the United Methodist Reporter following consultation with the UMR Governing Board.
 - B. New functional units of the Council that may come into existence in the future may employ a staff executive provided the need is demonstrated and sufficient financial undergirding is available. Such executives shall be elected by the Council following consultation with the employing unit.
 - C. The Council shall elect a chief executive officer.

X. MEETINGS:

- A. The Council shall meet at least annually. Notices of the time and place of meetings shall be sent to all members at least thirty (30) days prior.
- B. Special meetings of the Council may be called by the Chairperson or the Executive Committee. Notice shall be sent to all members at least one week prior to such meetings.
- C. A quorum of at least one-half of the voting members of the Council shall be re-

quired to conduct business.

XI. AMENIMENIS:

- A. Amendments to this Constitution, and the creation or amendments of By-Laws, may be adopted at any regular meeting of the Council, provided notice of such amendments is sent to each member of the Council at least one month prior to the meeting at which such amendments are to be voted upon.
- B. The vote required to adopt such changes shall be two-thirds of those present and voting, provided that there is a quorum present.
- C. Amendments to the Council Constitution shall also be ratified by majority votes in two-thirds of the annual conferences of the United Methodist Church in the states of Texas and New Mexico.

COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE OFFICE COMPLEX

As a result of the action taken by the 1986 Annual Conference, Bishop Russell appointed a building committee. Members of the committee are Walter Elliott, James Nader, James Patterson, Hank Carroll, Gordon Dennis, Sidney Roberts, and Ben Feenster. At our first meeting we read the recommendation approved last year. This committee certainly had been given great responsibilities, in effect, to plan, execute, and oversee the building project - an office building for the conference offices not to exceed a cost of \$700,000.

There were, however, a couple of strings attached. First, the St. John's property on University Drive in Fort Worth was to be sold for not less than \$400,000. Second, the building would be located at the Harris Hospital-Methodist site in southwest Fort Worth, provided a donor was found to purchase the land. This committee has been most anxious to carry out your directives.

Unfortunately, we have not been able to get rid of the strings. Our committee has urged the trustees to sell the property. They do now have the property listed with realtors, but as yet, have received no offers.

The committee has been in close contact with the officials at Harris Hospital, but there is no donor for the land at this time.

As you are aware, we have been through very unfavorable economic times and those same conditions continue.

Your committee realizing that possibly the property might be sold but no donor found for the land has been studying other options. At the present time, there is a glut of office space in Fort Worth. Occupancy rate is lower than it has been for many years. Buildings have been built and foreclosed on before they could even be occupied. In order to know the market, various members of this committee have looked at 16 office buildings for sale in Fort Worth with the thought in mind that at this time, it might be less expensive to buy a building than to build one. Out of these 16, we have found one that possibly would be acceptable.

This one is in an excellent location just west of downtown Fort Worth. It is in very good condition with 11,500 square feet, a security system, landscaped, with a parking lot for 43 cars. The price is \$625,000. Tuesday evening I called my home and found I had a message about another building with a foreclosure pending, and the realtor wanted our committee to look at it. There are buildings becoming available to buy almost everyday.

committee to look at it. There are buildings becoming available to buy almost everyday. Most buildings available have approximately 10,000 to 11,000 sq. ft. Our conference office space now is 5,000 sq. ft. In talking with building owners, we have found that the taxes, insurance, utilities, and maintenance on a building of 11,000 sq. ft. now total about \$32,000. We sometimes tend to forget that even if we own our own building, there is still a yearly cost involved.

There is one bit of good news I'm happy to report. Our lease in the Mallick Tower expires June 1, 1987. The building manager knows we are looking for our own building, and has been asking if we will be wanting to renew our lease. Gordon Dennis was told last week that if we would renew our lease for one year, the owners would reduce the rent from \$12 to \$11 per square foot, saving the conference \$5,000 in rent for the year. The committee would like to make the following recommendations:

 The conference reaffirm its desire to own its own building for the conference offices. 2. This conference building committee continue in existance with the hope that the property on University Drive be sold and a donor for the land be found. 3. The conference continues to lease office space in the Mallick Tower in Fort Worth

for the conference offices with a one year lease.

The purpose of this committee is similar to that of the Pastor-Relations Committee of the local church, only this committee's responsibility is to the Bishop of the conference and his wife. Following dimmer, discussion between members of the committee and the Bishop included several areas of interest members wished to share with the Bishop.

Bishop Russell continues to give excellent leadership to our conference. In addition to the work in this area to which he is assigned, he also devotes time outside the conference and area. He now serves on the General Council of Finance and Administration. an extremely important council of the church, and in all likelihood will serve as its president in 1988.

The committee, as always, welcomes input from lay and clergy regarding any area related to the work of this committee.

INTER-CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON HISPANIC MINISTRY

Report 1

The purpose of the Committee is to initiate, coordinate, and enable inter-conference ministries within the bounds of the Central Texas and Rio Grande Conferences. Both annual conferences adopted the "Strategic Plan for Inter-Conference Cooperative Hispanic Ministries" last year (see pages 222-223 of the 1986 Journal of the Central Texas Conference or page 159 of 1986 Actas Oficiales Conferencia del Rio Grande). The Committee's attention has been directed to the implementation of the Strategic Plan. Priority has been given to the development of resource teams comprised of persons from both conferences. These teams would enable local congregations in communities with an increasing Hispanic population to be in ministry with their community-especially the new arrivals. At least two resource teams will be recruited, trained and deployed in 1987.

Goals for 1987-1988:

1. Contact each district missionary secretary in the Central Texas Conference encouraging their inviting someone from the the Rio Grande Conference to interpret the mission and ministries of the Rio Grande Conference to at least one of their district ministers meetings during the year. Contact the Rio Grande Conference for a list of persons willing to accept such invitations.

2. Encourage local church chairpersons of Missions, Religion and Race, and Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns in both conferences to provide opportunities for their local church to learn about each other's conference.

3. Encourage and enable dialogue and fellowship between Latin American UMC, Waco, and a Central Texas Conference Church in the Waco District.

4. Continue to enable and encourage the extended cabinets of both conferences to meet

together to dialogue and strategize about inter-conference cooperative ministry. 5. Using resource teams, begin consultation with at least two more local churches in transitional communities (those which are becoming increasingly Hispanic) enabling them to respond to changes which are occurring in their surrounding communities and to organize their mission and ministry accordingly as mandated in paragraph 207 in The Book of Discipline.

5. Continue providing consultant assistance to churches who are involved with ocoperative ministry with Hispanics: i.e., Polytechnic, Diamond Hill, La Trinidad (all of Fort Worth); El Divino Salvador and First (both of Temple); El Buen Pastor and First (both of Moody).

7. Develop at least one model of joint ministry using shared facilities. 8. By the end of 1988 identify persons who have particular skills (bilingual—Spanish/ English) and/or training (cross-cultural sensitization) and are interested in serving target cooperative ministry areas.

9. Encourage local churches and districts to support the Advance Special goal for San Pablo, Fort Worth.

10. Plan and carry out an inter-conference celebration of worship which will celebrate the inter-conference cooperative efforts begun during this quadrannium.

Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986

Report 2

Background:

In April, 1987, the United Methodist Committee on Relief sponsored a conference which reviewed the details of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 and the crisis and impact it will have (see attached article from the United Methodist Reporter). Local churches are being urged to be imformed about this issue and to respond to critical needs of undocumented residents in their communities. The purpose of this resolution is to sensitize the conference to this issue, to urge local churches to provide volunteers for the United Methodist agencies who will be establishing annesty counseling programs or referral centers for undocumented persons, and asking local churches to provide an Advance Special Offering designated to support the immigration Annesty Counseling Programs.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 was enacted into law on November 6, 1986, and full implementation of the law became a reality on May 5, 1987; WHEREAS, the United Methodist Committee on Relief in conjunction with appropriate units of the National Division has seen the need to support United Methodist Churches and agencies already working with provisions of the new immigration law and as a result has formed the "Immigration Amnesty Counseling Program";

WHEREAS, agencies and community centers supported (at least in part) by The United Methodist Church have applied and have received the status of Qualified Designated Entities (QDE);

WHEREAS, these centers will be engaged in the preparing and filing of applications for undocumented people with the expressed end of obtaining legalization of undocumented people;

WHEREAS, the actual cost of these services is undetermined at this time; BE IT RESOLVED, that the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church urge all churches in the Central Texas Conference to support the efforts of the United Methodist Committee On Relief and Immigration Amnesty Counseling Program in the following manner:

- 1. Provide volunteers to be trained as helpers in the application process.
- Provide initial counseling and referral to certified agencies in the area as well as follow-up counseling for those individuals or families who may not qualify for amnesty.
- Provide education about the new law to the general public, their congregation, undocumented people, and employees.
- Be vigilant and act as advocates regarding discrimination arising from employer sanctions.
- Take an Advance Special Offering to directly help the efforts of the immigration Amnesty Counseling Program. Advance # 901250.

Report 3

The Inter-Conference Committee has been active in the implementation of the "Strategic Plan for Inter-Conference Cooperative Ministries" which was adopted last year by the Central Texas and Rio Grande Conferences. Since last year, the Committee has accomplished the following:

- 1. Secured Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority grants from the following sources: Central Texas Conference, General Board of Discipleship, General Board of Global Ministries/National Division, and General Board of Higher Education and Ministry/Division of Diaconal Ministry. These grants have enabled the Committee to contract with a consultant for data gathering, curriculum writing, resource teams development and training, and consultation. These National Boards agreed that the work of the Inter-Conference Committee is unique by enabling, developing, and promoting interconference cooperative ministries between churches in the Central Texas and Rio Grande Conferences. Funding affirms the potential for the Committee's work to become a model of inter-conference cooperation for the rest of the nation.
- 2. Completed the curriculum to be used by the resource teams. The resource teams, which will enable congregations to develop inter-conference cooperative ministry with His-panics, are currently being recruited. Training of the teams is set for Saturday, July 18, 1987.
- Resourcing of Diamond Hill, Fort Worth, will begin this summer. They are beginning to explore a shared ministry with the Rio Grande Conference by sharing their facilities.
- 4. Coordinated and promoted emergency assistance to La Trinidad for pastor's housing. Promoted La Trinidad parsonage renovation effort which is being coordinated by Metropolitan Board of Missions of Fort Worth.
- 5. Encouraged, enabled, and promoted dialogue, fellowship and cooperation among churches in both conferences. Four churches within the bounds of the Temple District have established on-going dialogue, fellowship and cooperation: First and El Divino Salvador of Temple, and First and El Buen Pastor of Moody. Their cooperation includes joint fiestas, dinners, vacation church school, and pulpit exchanges. Within the bounds of the two Fort Worth Districts there has been cooperation between several churches, especially Joshua and Smithfield, and La Trinidad in their parsonage renovation. Sunday Vesper Services are held jointly once a month with San Pablo, La Trinidad and Diamond Hill. Joint Bible study is being planned. Polytechnic continues outreach ministries with Hispanics in their neighborhood through English-as-a-second-language classes, immigration referral, neighborhood fiestas, and vacation church school. Diamond Hill is planning to open a day-care center for neighborhood children.
- 6. Advocated and secured approval in the Central Texas Conference for an Advance Special goal designated for San Pablo. 7. Facilitated the scheduling of a joint meeting in August, 1987, of the cabinets of the
- Rio Grande and Central Texas Conferences.

The Central Texas Conference continues to lead all other annual conferences in Texas and New Mexico in inter-conference cooperation with the Rio Grande Conference. The sending of a fraternal delegate to the Rio Grande Annual Conference celebrates the close relationship which has developed between our conferences. Therefore the Inter-Conference Committee on Hispanic Ministry recommends that Wanda Kile be designated as the fraternal delegate to the Rio Grande Annual Conference which will meet June 11-14, 1987, in Georgetown, Texas. . Training for annual conference leadership that focused on racism, pluralism, and

inclusiveness.

- . Meeting to discuss and fund proposals submitted by local churches in the Central Texas Annual Conference.
- . The development of a sub-committee to work with such issues as "The Future of EMLC in the Central Texas Conference," and a monitoring committee to ensure inclusiveness in the structure of our Annual Conference.

To be sure, we have much to celebrate as our efforts have touched on at least six of the seven priorities of EMLC, including witness, discipleship, outreach, leadership, structures, and facilities. We have found it necessary to renew some ministries so that the revitalization of those particular local churches would continue. The committee's creativity extended to providing nine scholarships for summer camps to encourage children and youth of EMLC congregations to attend and participate in Annual Conference or District Camps.

2. That one-half of the present apportionment for EMLC be continued through the 1988-1992 quadrennium, provided it is not a continued general church apportionment item.

The hand-out of all proposals that have been funded this quadrennium is clearly indicative of the variety of projects that we have funded. The lives that have been touched and enriched are numerous. May these efforts be continued in the life of the Central Texas Conference.

And as all of us give thanks for the tellers of the Conference, both lay and clergy, we are likewise grateful for some other "tellers" who have helped compile this ballot. They are: Mrs. Charles Cole, Johnnie B. Jones, and Annette Sowell. Along with the one making this presentation, they have computed the following tally.

This ballot duly records the name of Dr. William H. Hinson, that warm and inspiring Georgian, who came to us as our conference preacher from First Church, Houston. Dr. Hin-

son's sermons, so forcefully and magnificently presented, have brought us closer to God and the underlying meaning of Christian discipleship.

THE CHURCH AND ITS MINISTRY

Introduction

The triune God is the ultimate source of the Church and its ministry. As Greator, God is the author and power of life itself. God created out of love and intends that all creation be in harmony with God and with itself. God wills salvation for all that has been created.

In Jesus Christ, God took human flesh and made known an intention to love all creation and make it whole. In Jesus Christ God has made an irrevocable promise to be present in the world. In the death and resurrection of Jesus, God has given humanity the possibility of forgiveness, salvation, and eternal life. In Christ, God calls all human beings to participate in God's own mission in the world.

The Church is founded through God's Holy Spirit, on the witness of the apostles to the resurrection. As a community in which the Spirit of God dwells, the Church is the Body of Christ, the manifestation of God's presence in the world through the preaching of the Word, the celebrating of the sacraments, and the serving in mission.

The People of God

From the beginning, God has dealt with the human family through covenants: with Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Hagar, and Moses; with Deborah, Ruth, Jeremiah and other prophets. In each covenant, God offered the chosen people the blessings of providence and commanded of them obedience to the divine will and way, that through them all the world should be blessed (Gen. 18:18; 22:18).

In the new covenant in Christ, yet another community of hope was called out and gathered up, with the same promise and condition renewed that all who believe and obey shall be saved and made ministers of Christ's righteousness. John Wesley and our other spiritual forebears stressed this biblical theme of covenant-making and covenant-keeping as central in Christian experience.

The biblical story is marred by disregarded covenants, disrupted moral order, sin, and rebellion; with the resulting tragedies of alienation, oppression and disorder. Indeed, the Bible describes a cosmos gone awry. But in the gospel of the new covenant, God in Christ has provided again a basis for reconciliation—justification by grace through faith, and birth into a new life in the Spirit, which is marked by growth toward holiness.

The Scriptures tell us how the Church came into being by the loving act of God. God provided a new covenant through the sending, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus. As he had been sent by God, so Jesus sent out disciples, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to continue what he had been sent to do. The Church is therefore a called-out holy people, created to be an instrument of God's will and a sign pointing to God's presence, in and God's act for all creation. It is a continuation of the work of love which God began in creation and brought to expression in salvation through Jesus Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit.

God brought, and continues to bring the Church into being as a community of faithful people. It is both a grace-receiving and grace-sharing community, continuing to live by God's grace, which is the impetus and foundation of its ministry (Eph. 2:8,9). Indeed, all life in Christ is based on God's immeasurable riches toward us in Christ Jesus (Eph.2:7).

The Church is called to proclaim that same grace by offering Christ, and to participate in the reconciling and redeeming ministry inaugurated by Christ and continued by the apostles. Standing in covenantal relationship with God, the Church is the new community of those who, repentant and justified by grace through faith, are both heirs to, and ministers of, Christ's righteousness.

As a worshiping community the Church bears witness to this grace—the same grace that was revealed in the ministry, death, and resurrection of Christ, inviting all people to believe and be baptised as disciples. The Church is apostolic both in tracing its origin through the first apostles, and in its continuous faithfulness to the apostolic witness today.

This Body of believers, the People of God, are an anticipation of God's bringing all creation to fulfillment in God's Kingdom (Eph. 1:10), and thus it is catholic, reaching out to all creation. It exists to bear witness to God's saving activity in Christ through worship, prayer, and works of love: justice, peace, and liberation. The Church, a community in mission, is a pilgrim people who are called to a journey whose goal is God's reign to embrace all creation. This is an instrument and foretaste of God's purpose to reconcile all in Christ to God, and the Church's life evidences the same.

Although members of the Church are always beset by sin, the Church offers a foretaste of the peace, wholeness, and the unity God wills for all of creation. It is further called to discover and manifest its unity in Christ. Thus the division of the Church betrays its mission and contradicts its nature.

The Church is called to be a praying community, raising thanks and petitions to God, both for itself and all creation. In its worship new members are engrafted into it in the sacrament of baptism, and Christ's redeeming sacramental presence is invoked and celebrated in the Lord's Supper. As Christ's Body, the Church also proclaims God's salvation in Christ by ministering to the world in mercy, on behalf of justice, reconciliation and liberation, as Jesus did.

Thus the Church is the community in which by faith, new life, reconciliation, justification and peace are received, lived, and communicated to humanity.

God's Gift of the Spirit

The Holy Spirit is a gift of God through Christ, constituting the Church, empowering its ministry in the present, and anticipating the age to come. The risen Christ promised the disciples that the Spirit would be with them and guide them (John 14:25,26). The Spirit comforts, convicts, and convinces; bestowing both the gifts for ministry and the enabling grace by which these gifts are discerned, claimed, and utilized.

God gives such gifts for ministry to all members of the Church. Through the guidance of the Spirit, in prayer, reading of the Bible, and in conversation with the community of faith, all members are helped to discover their gifts and to put them to work. These gifts are given for the building up of the Church and for the fulfillment of God's plan of salvation for all creation.

The Ministry of all Christians

A. The Ministry of All.

The Church is that Body of believers through which God makes salvation present and real. It exists to witness to the presence of God in the world and the purpose of God for the world; making visible in the world love, salvation, peace, and reconciliation, as these are known in Jesus Christ. Ministry describes the service to which all the People of God are called, whether individually or corporately. To be a follower of Jesus Christ is to be in ministry. Each Christian's life is to be a conscious and intentional expression of the ministry of Jesus Christ in all dimensions of living. This ministry is carried out through witness, worship, and service to others, both in the Christian communion and in the world. It is lived out in various ways:

-telling others the good news of Jesus;

-helping and serving those in physical or material need;

-studying the Bible and praying regulary;

-participating in the life and worship of a congregation, by giving energy, talents and money;

-living responsibly in family, vocational and political

relationships:

-striving to live a holy life, and standing for the right in the commitv:

-working for peace with justice, after the mind of Onrist. B. Ministry in Word and Deed.

Inasmuch as God's mission, as embodied in Jesus Christ, shapes the ministry of the Church and all its members, the Church needs to witness in word and deed to what God is doing and wants done, proclaiming and living the love of God in priestly service to all creation.

All the members are given gifts for ministry through the Holy Spirit, all gratefully pattern their lives on Jesus' servant ministry. The redeeming, reconciling and liberating ministry of Jesus Christ defines the nature of the Church's ministry. The Church ministers most authentically as it continues and completes the work of Christ (Col. 1:24), in suffering and self-giving.

This means that all Christians witness to Christ, inviting others to believe the gospel, calling sinners to repentance, faith, pardon, and scriptural holiness in a reconciled relationship with God and neighbor. It also means that the Church itself is continually called to repentance and renewal.

The ministry of the Church is in deed as well as in word. It acts as a living witness to Christ who has come, who is present now, and whose coming again is partially known whenever its members make visible their hope in deeds of caring wherever there is human need. As the Body of Ohrist, the Church is to share in the joys and sufferings of humanity, as servants of Onrist and stewards of the mysteries of God, engaging with integrity in the struggle for justice, freedom, and peace-against poverty, oppression, and fear.

Such ministry is possible only by God's grace. It is this grace which continues to call Christians into ministry and empowers and sustains them in its practice. The sacraments are a sign of such grace. The United Methodist Church celebrates two sacraments-baptism and Holy Communion. Both are fundamental to the ministry of the Church.

1. Baptism and Ministry.

Baptism is a gift of the Holy Spirit. It is an incorporation into Christ, marking the entry of persons into the Church and its ministry (Rom. 6:3,4,18). In baptism God acts to unite the new Christian with the person and priestly ministry of Jesus Christ, by incorporating that person into the priestly fellowship of the Church. Such incorporation is a visible menifestation of forgiveness and new birth (Titus 3:5), overcoming all distinctions and inequities of the human situation (Gal. 3:27,28).

The new life of membership in Christ and His Church needs to be responsibly reaffirmed by the baptised persons so that they may fulfill the responsibilities of being called in Christ as ministers and witnesses in the world (Rom. 6:4, 12-14). For those baptised as infants, this reaffirmation takes place in confirmation.

Baptism signifies both a gift and a task. The gift is God's unmerited grace; the task is unstinting service. In this sacrament the Church claims God's promise, the "seal of the Spirit" (Eph. 1:13). God, through the sign of baptism, brings persons into the community of faith, incorporates them into the Body of Christ, and gives them an individual and corporate indentity and ministry.

God gives different gifts, in diverse forms, to all those baptised. The Body is one (Rom. 12:4-6), and the gifts of all are needed for the health and building up of the Body. The common bond is the unity present through Christ and the presence and work of the Holy Spirit in the community (Eph. 4:4-7).

Baptism contains both mystery and mandate. The mystery arises out of God's prevenient grace, marking an individual, whether infant or adult, as part of the Body of Christ, and

the mandate is for lifelong servanthood. 2. The Lord's Supper and Ministry. Like baptism, the Lord's Supper (Holy Communion) is a gift of God, a work of the Spirit (I Cor. 11:23-25). As baptism sets persons apart for ministry in the Body, the Holy Communion renews and sustains them in their service. In the Methodist tradition it is a

thankful commemoration of God's saving work in creation and redemption, as well as supplication for the completion of God's work. It is thus a means of empowerment through which God's grace is remembered and God's People are nurtured and strengthened.

The Holy Communion is also an effectual calling in mind of God's saving act in Onrist in response to which the Church offers its act of praise and thanksgiving. This Communion (also called Eucharist) represents, for United Methodists, the community of faith being made one Body in union with Christ's sacrifice, the action of the Holy Spirit in present time and space, and the bringing forward of the final consummation of all things in Christ as we share already in God's just Reign.

Thus the Lord's Supper is also a sign of the future, a foretaste of the new age God is briging forth. As such a sign it lifts the vision of a world made whole and a People united in peace, justice, and love.

united in peace, justice, and love. At the same time, the Eucharist is a means through which God's grace is received and God's People nurtured and sustained for ministry. As a renewal of the covenant, the Lord's Supper affirms and anticipates the Kingdom as it convinces and convicts the community of faith in the present age. Manifesting the mystery of God's love, it mandates God's ministry in the persons who gather at the Table.

The nature and ministry of the Church are thus grounded in the triune God who creates, calls, and who gives the grace and gifts necessary for ministry. In whatever way ministry is ordered by God's People, it must grow out of this fundamental understanding. For the Church as the Body of Christ is from God to God's People for God's world. Ultimately it must be shaped and fashioned by the mind of Christ, the guiding of the Holy Spirit, and the needs of the world.

C. The Ordained Ministry

Within the Church God has, from the beginning, called some members of the Body of believers to particular kinds of ministerial leadership for the sake of the Body. The entire Church received Christ's commission, but the Scriptures make clear that the Church has never been without persons holding specific authority and responsibility. These persons are called, and authorized by the Church, continually to point the Church to its dependence on, and its identity in, Jesus Christ. In an accountable memorr they proclaim God's Word, articulate the community's thanksgiving, confession, and its offering of itself to God.

These persons are particularly called to manifest (make visible and audible) the ministry of Jesus Christ to the Church and the world. In this respect they may be called representative. In them the Church seeks an example of the holiness and loving concern to which the entire Church is called. People with such a call are ordained by the Church, 1. Ordination and the Apostolic Ministry

The apostles were witnesses to and proclaimers of the resurrection of Jesus. As they

gave testimony to this mighty act, God, through the Holy Spirit, brought the Church into being as the People of resurrection faith and love.

As the apostles died and the community grew, the apostolic ministry was continued in the Church by setting apart persons called by God to this service. Through the laying on of hands the Church invested these people with authority to preach and teach, to nuture and heal, to gather the community in worship, to send it forth in witness, and to provide for the stewardship, transmission, and proclamation of the gospel to succeeding generations of the faithful. Likewise, the Church set apart others to care for the physical needs of the people, reflecting at the cutset its concern that the gospel address the totality of humanity's needs. Paul wrote (I Thess. 5:12) that gifts and ministries were differentiated at the very beginning of the Church; those set apart are to equip and enable the servanthood of the entire People (Eph 4:11-13). Although the ministry of these leaders was distinct, it was never separate from the service of the entire Body of believers. Important as ordained ministry is, it has no existence apart from the community of faith.

2. The Purpose of Ordination

The ordained ministry is a gift of God to the Church.

This gift enables the Church to more effectually fulfill its ministry in the world. Through ordination, God brings a person into this ministry. Ordination is both a gift and a task. This gift is a recognition that within the larger ministry of all, God calls some persons to a set-apart ministry. The Church's understanding of the purpose and meaning of ordination has, however, changed through history. The continuing task of the Church is

both to take this historical foundation, and recent development seriously, and to respond faithfully with the ordering of ministry for the present and future needs of mission.

In the act of ordination, the Church affirms and continues the apostolic ministry as it recognizes and authorizes, those persons whom God calls, to minister as ordained servants. Ordination is a sign that sets the person apart for particular public and accountable ministry within the People of God, giving that person the responsibility to represent the gospel of Onrist which founds and continues the Church. It denotes an action by God and the community by which the ordinands are empowered for their task by the Spirit, and are upheld in the acknowledgment and prayers of the community of faith.

In their priestly and prophetic service, ordained ministers remind the entire People of their commission, through baptism, to be engaged in the ministry of evangelism, reconciliation, nuture, and liberation. In this manner the ministry of lay people and ordained are held in an inseparable linkage to the mission of the Church in the world. As the grace of God is communicated to the world through the Church, so ordained ministers witness to this grace in the Church.

Ordained persons are authorized to engage in various serving ministries, such as preaching and teaching the Word of God, celebrating the sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper, equipping the People of God for ministry, exercising pastoral care, alleviating human need, administering the discipline and order of the Church, and ordaining other ministers. Ordination, according to its original meaning and purpose, "orders" the gifts received through the Holy Spirit, setting persons apart for particular tasks to upbuild the Body of Orrist and fulfill the mission of the Church in the world.

3. The Act of Ordination.

Ordination is a public act of the Church which recognizes that a person had been called by God, prays God's power on the person's ministry, and authorizes the ordinand to fulfill a particular ministry. It is carried out in a service of worship at the Annual Conference. Precedents for ordination are found in the Scriptures, but its meaning has evolved in the history of the Church. By the laying on of hands and prayer, the Spirit of God acts in and through the community of faith to create a new relationship, conveying a commission, based on the recognition of individual gifts and enpowered by the Spirit's self-giving love.

The ordination prayer is an invocation of the Holy Spirit, asking for the gift of God's continuing power upon the ordinand for the exercise of a particular set-apart ministry. By praying that the ordinand may receive God's Spirit, the Church acknowledges God's initiaitve and the Church's continual dependence on God to bless its ministry.

Ordination is also a sign of God's gift and power being given through the Holy Spirit, and therefore the Church. The laying on of hands, marks a person for a particular ordained ministry. Therefore the Church, in confidence that God answers the prayers of the people in the service of ordination, does not ordain a person a second time for the same ministry.

Ordination is also a commitment by the Church and the person to be faithful to the new covenant established between the person ordained and the Christian community. The ordinand's commitment includes an expression of readiness to live one's entire life in a way suitable to this ordination, and a commitment to the responsibility and opportunity of the new authority and relationship.

THE ORDERING OF MINISTRY

The mission of the Church calls for participation in God's divine action and mission, and it is fulfilled through various ministries, all patterned on the servanthood of Jesus Christ. How should the ministry of the Church be ordered so that the mission of the Church may be faithfully fulfilled?

To be authentic the ministry of the Church needs to provide for faithful participation in the purposes of God, thereby upholding the integrity and identity of the Church in an obedient manner. As a people "on the way," with a hertiage and hope, the Church expects to "grow up in all things." As a diverse People with a reconciling faith, it recognizes the need to manifest visible unity. Thus the Church must continually reform the ordering of its ministry to be faithful to its understanding of God's purpose. For United Methodists this ordering has evolved through the vision of spreading scriptural holiness. Furthermore, the various ministries of the Church meed to be carried out in a complimentary and collegial, rather than a competitive manner. As with the persons of the Trinity, each ministry is fulfilled in relation to, not isolation from, the others. All the members of the Body of Christ are given gifts for ministry. The fundamental impulse for ministry is that of service, not status.

An important dimension of mission and ministry in the history of the United Methodist Church has been the reaching out to the world so that all, through grace, might experience the creative and saving mercy of God. God, through the Spirit, calls and enables all in the Church to spread the news of grace by word and deed. Each has a gift that is needed, and no one goes away empty. Some within this People are called and ordained to specific ministry in both Church and the world. We turn to these ministries.

Service (diakonia) underlies the existence and identity of the Christian community. It is basic to all ministry. A willing self-sacrifice is the calling of all who are baptised in Christ's name; it is integral to the ministry of all believers. This New Testament understanding of voluntary servanthood is the foundation of the ministry of each member of the Christian community.

From among the entire People, God, from time to time, calls persons into representative ministry. From the era of Abraham and Sarah, God has identified persons with particular gifts to fulfill a servant leadership responsibility within the People.

The Ministry of Deacon

Deacons are baptised members of the People of God ordained to represent to the People, their own identity in Christ as a Body of persons who are in service to the Church and the world. It is the particular ministry of a deacon to struggle with the myriad needs of societies and persons in Christ's name, and so to exemplify the interdependence of worship and mission in the life of the Church.

Early in the Church's history, deacons embodied in their ministry Christ's own service to humankind. Such a servant ministry was not meant to be a substitute for the service responsibility of all Christians. Rather, it was intended to represent Jesus' ministry of service, and to intensify and make more effective the self-understanding of the entire Church as servant. In the early Church, though the forms of service were diverse, the forms were always inclusive of both the outreaching service to human need and the liturgical-cultic service to the Christian community.

Although the diaconate can be traced back to the very beginning of the Church, there are no clear biblical mandates as to either function or the status of deacons, just as there are not clear mandates as to what constitutes a presbyter or bishop. Although the Bible offers a rich source for imaging diaconal ministry, it does not prescribe a blueprint that can be reconstructed.

But even as late as the Council of Nicea, the diaconal functions centered largely around service to the poor and sick, and service in the eucharistic liturgy. Both functions were performed in assistance to the bishop. And as the presbyter took the place of the bishop in the local congregation, the deacon's assistance in the service of worship was more closely connected with the ministry of the presbyter. Nevertheless, as in the New Testament Church, diaconal ministry was both in the world and in the Church.

In the renewal movement of early Methodism, diaconal ministry was carried out faithfully by a large variety of people-members of classes and societies, most not ordained.

The deaconess and home missionary movements of United Methodist history represent a form of dedicated service possibly more akin to that of the early Church. These services link a dynamic proclamation and practice of the Christian faith, underscoring the relationship between work and witness, and liturgy and life-style. The deaconess and missionary are called no less than one who is ordained. This call (as it was in the early Church), has been to self-sacrifice and service in the world on behalf of Christ and the Church.

In more recent years more and more women have entered the ordained ministry, and the diaconal ministry has been established as a vocation for both women and men. The present ministry of diaconal minister continues to incorporate and extend meny of the emphases of the deaconess movement, especially those related to service and the inter-relationship of Church and world.

The Church has lived for some time with a division between those who concentrate on one or another parts of its ministry. Thus it is appropriate, for the sake of the mission of the Church, to reclaim the traditional ministry of deacon, which tended to exemplify the inseparability of the service of Christians gathered for worship and that of Christians

scattered in the world. The mission of the Church would be aided by having available to it a lifelong deacon, an ordained minister, who intentionally personifies the servanthood every Christian is called to live, in both community and world, who embodies the interdependence of the congregation's worship and its life in the world. To speak of embodying is to state that God, through the Church, calls and sets apart those who will intentionally and continually represent to the community that distinct part of its identity and purpose. These persons may be ordained deacons.

This lifelong diaconate would be both representative and particular in its ministry. It would be representative in that this deacon aims to embody, in every part of her/his being, the life of worship and work that Jesus called all to live. It would be particular in the sense that a deacon's training and ministry would be for a specific ministry in the Church and world, on behalf of Christ.

The ministry of a deacon serves as a visible and conscious reminder to the Church of its mission in the world, and will also be a minister of this mission. Rooted in the worship life of the congregation, the deacon's ministry also visibly and continually reminds the Church of the why and how of its service, holding together in one ministry leadership in worship (in the body of believers) and service (in the world).

The thrust of the deacon's service is missional. It may be set primarily within the context of a local congregation or in a service appointment beyond the local church. In either case it needs to hold together what so often is separated—worship and witness, proclamation, prayer, and practice. The model is that of servanthood; the method is that of outreaching love.

The deacon's ministry is a sign to the Onurch, exemplifying and enabling the servanthood of all Onristians. In the local church this may involve special emphasis in such areas:

-preaching/evangelism, education, music, nurture and counseling;

-assisting the elders in administration of the Lord's Supper and in leadership of the worship of the congregation.

In positions beyond the local congregation, this task might include:

-community development, rural, campus, and urban ministry;

-teaching;

-other forms of service-related ministry, such as medicine and the law. Thus deacons share with the elders the task of equipping, encouraging, and enabling all God's People in their ministry of service.

At this point the Commission invites creative response from those studying this draft. The Commission itself affirms almost unanimously the concept of two kinds of lifelong, ordained deacons; one itinerate and one nonitinerate. Such flexibility would embance the mission value of the ordained deacon. If bishops could appoint such persons to fill areas of need

the system could respond, (much as it did on the frontier), with greater speed and usefulness.

Questions emerge however, on which we invite reflection. How would such persons find their place of service, and could any be "guaranteed" appointment?

Clearly the bishop should annually review and authorize the work of deacons. Since they will be ordained to service, they may constitute a third grouping in the annual conference beside ordained elders and lay persons. Deacons and Elders would be considered together for the election of delegates to general and jurisdictional conference and for the equalization of lay and clergy annual conference members. This would allow deacons and elders to vote separately on such matters as the admittance of candidates into membership.

to vote separately on such matters as the admittance of candidates into membership. There will need to be an "in-training" period for candidates for the diaconate which will allow for training, supervision, and evaluation. Qualification for ordination should include specific theological educational requirements, as well as the specialized educational requirements in the particular area of service for which the deacon is preparing.

Certified Personnel

Certified Personnel are those persons called to service within the church but not to ordination. These persons are not ordained. Like the deacon, their ministry will be that of nurture, training, support and assistance. They will be expected to have theological training for their ministry, as well as specialized training in their area of service. In order to retain certification, they will need to participate in a program of continuing education in their specific field.

Positions for Certified Personnel will not be guaranteed but will be arranged between the individual and the employing agency. These persons may be elected as lay members of the annual conference.

The Ministry of Elder

Elders are baptised members of the People of God, who continue in the witness and service common to all the People of God. In their ordination, they are set aside for the ministry of Word, sacrament and order. Through this ministry they make evident to the members of the Body of Christ their role in renewing, equipping, and strengthening each other of service so that the world may believe (Eph. 4:11-16).

The community's integrity is in a unity which is able to comprehend diversity, and that unity is basic to its identity. The Church sets apart persons to embody and effect such unity in the community of faith. They are called to lead in the ministries of Word, sacrament, and order. These persons are ordained in the ministry of elder (presbyter); their ministry includes several dimensions:

—as preacher, the elder proclaims the message of redemption and salvation in Christ; —as prophet, she/he calls the Church to be faithful to Christ's authority; —as teacher, the elder communicates knowledge of the Christian Tradition; —as pastor, the elder, with Jesus as the Chief Shepherd, assembles, prays for, and suffers with the People;

- —as priest, the elder lifts to God the concerns of the people, and in celebrating the Lord's Supper, offers them forgiveness in Christ's name, in union with Christ's sacrifice;
- -the elder has the task, as minister, of "ordering" the congregation, of building it up in Christ, by equipping, encouraging and enabling all the People of God in their ministry;
- -the elder assists the deacon in the ministry of care and love to the Body of believers and to the world.

Upon ordination, elders are eligible to be elected as full members of the annual conference, and if elected, have membership in the annual conference rather than the local church. Elders in good standing should normally be guaranteed appointment by the bishop, provided that the elder has effectively demonstrated quality ministry. In view of the need for a variety of ministries which ordained persons can occupy, (retired elders who would like to volunteer for continued part-time service for example), a wide variety of arrangements may be worked out between elder and bishop/cabinet/congregation.

In the United Methodist tradition elders normally provide the pastoral oversight of local congregations. They itinerate under the authority and appointment of a bishop, thereby matching a variety of gifts in ministry with the needs of the various congregations. Missionally, the practice of itinerancy has the potential to provide for and encourage a great diversity in the deployment of elders. A true "covenanted connection" is one in which the members experience joy and suffering as "members one of another." Therefore, to be true and effective, itinerancy needs to address present inequilies in the itinerancy system, such as the great disparity in salaries throughout the conferences.

The Church is continually called to new forms of ministry in, and for the world. Such forms must always be faithful to the integrity and unity of the faith and mission of the Church. At the same time, the Church needs to be responsive to the renewing and recreating work of the Holy Spirit and to the needs of the world. Again at this point the Commission invites and seeks counsel. It is clear and agreed that elders normally itinerate under the appointment of a bishop. But, some who have traditionally served in appointments "beyond the local church" have, for all practical purposes, ceased to itinerate. The commission feels that there is a place for this kind of ministry, and that it needs to be approved and affirmed by the bishop, but that such appointment should not be guaranteed. Can we affirm such a person as a "non-itinerating" elder?

In order to meet other needs in specific situations of ministry, and to assure responsible pastoral care, lay persons with particular gifts, abilities and skills, may be set apart for pastoral service for a particular place and time. These persons are designated "licensed lay pastor." They may be licensed to provide ministry for specific missional needs that might not otherwise be met in that situation. Their ministry should be localized in the context of a specific setting. Preparation for this ministry and continuing education will be required; it will focus on the special needs of the ministry to which assignment is made.

Each lay pastor should be assigned a counseling elder, who will supervise and support the licensed lay pastor's work in the ministerial course of study, assist with specific pastoral functions as needed, and give counsel on matters of pastoral responsibility as assigned by the cabinet. Lay pastors could become elders after completing appropriate training.

Qualifications for ordination to the ministry of elder are those cited in the 1984 <u>Discipline</u> under the category of "elder." In order to provide for greater inclusiveness and to meet particular needs of mission, educational steps toward elder's ordination in addition to a seminary degree need to be established. These steps need to include theological education as well as other training appropriate for unique contexts. The current deacon's ordination preceding the ordination of an elder will not be required. However, an appropriate "probationary" period for training, evaluation, and supervision will be necessary prior to ordination. There will be probationary conference membership during this time. Probationary elders may be licensed as licensed lay pastors to

administer the sacraments in the charge to which they are assigned. With both deacons and elders who are serving in "secular" ministry, it is appropriate that they be related to a local congregation and participate visibly and regulary in worworship leadership.

Once more the Commission seeks the counsel of those who study this document. There is first the question of annual conference membership for licensed lay pastors, probationary elders, and elders who have used the "appropriate training" track that would exist alongside the seminary degree program.

Should present associate members be "grandparented" into full conference membership? Should licensed lay pastors under full-time appointment remain associate members? Would associate membership be retained or eliminated as a separate catagory?

The Commission expresses appreciation for reflections and suggestions made by the Council of Bishops and various GREAT GROUPS on questions such as the three groups we have blocked out.

LYDIA PATTERSON INSTITUTE

A warm greeting to each of you from the staff, faculty and student body of Lydia Patterson Institute. The following is our report for the academic year 1985-1986:

Due to a lack of interest, Spanish classes for church leadrship were not held this past summer. This initial program under the Center for Cross-Cultural Educational Ministries involved participants over a two-week period in language instruction, cultural awareness workshops, lectures, city tours and an excursion to Chihuahua City, Mexico. It was very successful but had to be dropped because not enought ministers signed up for the program. It will again be offered in 1987. Twenty-five students received LPI High School diplomas on June 4. Ceremonies were conducted at the Chamizal National Theatre in El Paso. Mr. J. Ambrose, Editor of the El Paso Herald Post, a civic leader in El Paso, was the commencement speaker. One hundred and fifty students enrolled in a six-week ESL summer session. In addition, fifty students from various El Paso County Public Schools attended an eight-week educational compensatory program. This program was sponsored by the Private Industry Council and held at Lydia Patterson Institute.

The total number of students who have enrolled for the school year 1986-1987 are 283: 149 are High School, 23 are in the 8th. grade and 109 are in ESL Department. This enrollment is slightly smaller than last school year. Twenty-two FTE teachers, seven support staff and three administrative staff are giving leadership to the Institute program. Fourteen faculty members have bachelor's degrees, nine have master's, and one has a doctorate.

This year only forty-eight per cent of our teachers are certified. We lost a few certified teachers and this trend casts doubt on our goal of having all teachers certified by 1988. Significant curricular accomplishments have been made and strong improvement has taken place in student academic achievement during the last year as evidenced by grade point averages. Mr. Gonzalo LaFarelle is the school principal.

Major renovations and additions have been made to our facilities. We have added six (6) new air conditioners to our gymnasium and class buildings. The gymnasium floor has been completely refinished. We have repaired several of the major appliances in our cafeteria kitchen. Five computers have been added to our business component in the High School. Mr. Gonzalo LaFarelle supervises the repair and maintenance of all major facilities.

As we work together to shape the future of this historic institution, it is imperative that we do so with courage and with vision. We shall continue to work for the development of a high quality preparatory Christian school, a model for public and private educational institutions alike. Both the need and the potential for such a ministry are still present in our LPI context.

Lydia Patterson is the only remaining Hispanic academic institution of the United Methodist Church in the United States. Its future as an academic institution must be preserved and developed. There are many needs among the Hispanic peoples of our country and Mexico. But certainly one of the most vital is the need for development of the human mind. The growing educational needs in our part of Texas and Mexico tell us that literally millions of minds are being wasted because these needs are not being met.

We have a crucial secondary school academic mission, and a very significant ministry is taking place presently with young persons every hour of every day. Ours is a commitment to the development of Hispanic young lives.

Yet we have a special calling and responsibility to care for the minds of these youths, to teach them the intellectual love of God, and that they are to love God with all their minds and with the fullness of that intellectual potential which God has given to them.

Furthermore, we are moving forward to further develop the Center for Cross-Cultural Educational Ministries at LPI. We believe that the church needs leaders who have that rare combination of knowledge and vital piety; leaders with passion for the souls of Hispanic peoples and with the knowledge and skills to affect Christian ministry among them. Those two elements, so seldom found together in our individual and collective life, will be integrated in the curriculum and mission of our new Center.

While many of the concepts that describe Lydia Patterson Institute's ministry must remain constant, in faithful keeping with what you have read before, we also see a bright, new day with new horizons that challenge us to respond in terms of expanded program, service to the immediate community which we serve, and a constant openness to new opportunities to serve our General church. The offerings for the past two years have exceeded \$19,000.00, for which we are most grateful. The offering for 1986 was \$15,380.00. You readily see a considerable drop. If it were not for the contributions from the residents of the homes, we would be hard pressed to function. The residents contributed \$11,353.00 for which we are thankful.

The Trustees are truly grateful for the support of the conference through the many years of ministry performed by the Homes for Retired Ministers. Please continue to keep us in your prayers as we strive to meet the needs of those placed in our care.

I attended the public school in Prosper, and I graduated first in my class. "I have been associated with the Methodist church my entire life. My parents are men-

"I have been associated with the Methodist church my entire life. My parents are members of that church and I have been for the past seven years. I adhere to the church's beliefs, therefore it is a real privilege for me to able to attend a school that is assoclated with the Church. PERKINS SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

SMU's 75th Anniversary year also marked the 40th anniversary of naming Perkins School of Theology for the family whose support initiated changes leading the school toward its present level of excellence. Continuing developments this year have provided additional scholarships for students, enhancement of faculty, increased quality of research resources, and improved continuing education opportunities for ministers in service.

Another fine group of honor award scholars was included among 131 new students enrolled in the Fall, 1986, including 98 in the M. Div. degree, which elevated the numbers in that degree to 298, with a total in all degrees of 481, compared to 507 the year before. Of these, 32% are women, and 15% are ethnic or international students.

Churches in the various Annual Conferences have responded to rising costs of educating future ministers through significant contributions to the "Fair Share Goals" campaign authorized by the South Central Jurisdictional Conference, which creates endowments and capital improvements at Perkins and St. Paul Schools of Theology.

The Ministerial Education Fund, the Conference program to channel gifts from individual churches that are applied to Perkins' annual operational budget, provided 66% of annual gifts and grants. The total of over \$800,000 constitutes about 20% of the total Perkins budget support for training seminary students.

A banner year of giving has been recorded by Perkins Alumni with Loyalty Fund pledges and gifts exceeding \$100,000, most of which is designated to meet needs of students and the teaching program of the school, with direct impact on the quality of our work for the church.

Perkins students and faculty have shared a concern over the difficulties experienced by SMU during this year, and many have provided leadership and hope, regarding this as an opportunity to review and more effectively arrange priorities for the University with a renewed sense of the values and direction appropriate to it.

The high priority of building a strong faculty for the future has seen three strong appointments this year, with Dr. Jouette Bassler coming from Georgetown University to teach New Testament, Dr. Theodore Walker from Bethune-Cookman and Hood Seminary to teach Ethics and Society, and the Rev. Mary Lou Santillan Baert from the General Board of Discipleship as Associate Director of the Intern Program. In addition, Dr. Robert Maloy assumes his appointment on June 1 as Professor of Church History and Director of Bridwell Library, following a research and study leave in France.

Upon the retirement of Dr. W. Richey Hogg this year, we plan to bring a third world theologian to enrich Perkins' commitment to the globalization of theological education. Internationalization has expanded to include the first exchange student going this year to the seminary in Costa Rica and the first intern assignment in Mexico.

Responsibilities of the Perkins faculty in the life of the church at large include Dr. Richard Heitzenrater's leadership in the Commission to revise the Doctrinal Statement, while the Rev. Roger Deschner, Dr. John Holbert, and graduate student Scott Jones serve on Hymnal Revision Committees, Professor Victor Paul Furmish continues as editor of the prestigious Journal of Biblical Literature and Dr. Schubert Ogden serves as Chair of the Council on Theological Scholarship and Research of the Association of Theological Schools.

Continuing theological education opportunities have expanded, with the second class to begin the new Doctor of Ministry curriculum this summer. The third year of the Spiritual Formation Certificate program continues to attract full enrollment. The second Senior

Pastors Seminar met in Orlando, Florida, and the third will go next January to San Diego. The Mentor program for young pastors enters its second year. A series of Lay Academies have extended the Laity Week pattern to several cities in the surrounding area. Perkins continues its exemplary reputation in the Foundational Courses for diaconal ministers, seminars in Christian Education and Church Music, and Courses of Study. James E. Kirby, Dean

SOUTH GENTRAL JURISDICTION

The purpose of the South Central Jurisdiction is essentially the same as that of a local church: to reach out and receive people as they are; relate individuals to God through the redeeming power of Jesus Onrist; develop persons as Christian Disciples; and, send them back into the community to make life more loving and just for all who live there.

In 1986 the Jurisdiction sought to achieve this purpose in the following ways: Evangelism and Church Growth - We hosted a National Consultation of Pastors of Growing Churches at St. Louis. Sixty pastors of local churches experiencing dramatic growth in membership attended and shared their experiences. From this event have come specific recommendations to the Council of Bishops regarding Evangelism and Church Growth. Youth Ministry - The Jurisdictional Youth Ministry Organization annual meeting was held at Mt. Sequoyah In July with an excellent program and attendance.

Student Conference - For the first time in more than 20 years a Jurisdictional Student Conference was held in San Antonio, Texas, with over 200 college students in attendance. Dr. John Holbert was the Bible teacher. A group of 20 students from Central America attended.

The Farm Crisis - The initiative taken by our Jurisdiction last year has resulted in the formation of an Ecumenical Farm and Eural Orisis group. Made up of representatives of eight denominations from a ten state area, it is first of its kind in the nation. The consultation held in Kansas City last fall gave birth to this ecumenical approach. Leadership Development - Sacramento, New Mexico and Mt. Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas were the sites of Laboratory Training Schools and Seminars for Church School teachers and leaders. Our goal to train 1000 Sunday School teachers for this quadremnium has already been reached.

Volunteers in Mission - This rapidly growing outreach ministry has necessitated a full time VIM Coordinator. She is Jo Ann Small, former missionary to Malaysia and graduate of Perkins School of Theology. A spot check of several institutions, camps and mission projects reveals that in 1986 there were 315 work teams involving 4,973 persons serving as Volunteers in Missions. This report is incomplete and does not reflect our total involvement in the VIM Program.

Retiree Events - Seven retiree events were held in 1986 at Mt. Sequoyah. This is a ministry with, by and for older adults that has had a tremendous response. Camp Leaders Workshop - This workshop was held at Camp Canyon, Oklahoma, for camp administrators and program directors. Over 70 leaders met for 4 days seeking ways to solve manage management problems, improve planning skills, and to explore ways to relate camping to the gospel.

- 3. The United Methodist Men's Foundation sponsored a national "Bowl-a-thon" during February to raise \$1,000,000 for the endowment of the Upper Room Prayer Ministry, the Moving Methodists Program and the Scouting Ministry. Reports are not in yet, but

our conference had several fellowships participating in the national event. Final figures will be announced during the week of March 16.

4. Our main project objective has been to make all United Methodist Men's Fellowships more aware of our Central Texas Conference project for the retarded. Our theme is: "CATCH THE SPIRIT WITH THE DREAM OF CENTRAL TEXAS UNITED METHODIST MEN". The project has been accepted to be sponsored by our men as a Christian service to mankind. Programs on the project have been conducted all over the conference by the District Presidents, Conference Officers and the Committee of 18 members. Several of our men have flown to Mississippi to see the model facility "Baddour". The approval of this project by the Annual Conference will bring a great deal of unity and togetherness to our organization. We will have a real purpose in Christian service, building men of hope for the present and the future. Our Fellowships are currently in the process of raising \$7500.00 for a preliminary study to be conducted during April-May 1987 and completed in time for the required report to Annual Conference in June. Our Men are very interested in the project and dedicated for its success as an outstanding center for mildly to moderately retarded adults. The proposed name for the center is "Aldersgate Enrichment Center, Inc.", A Community for Mildly to Moderately Retarded Adults.

Three of our District Presidents received training at the National Conference for District Presidents held during October 1986 in Irving, Texas. Additional skills were gained through this training in Leadership and Stewardship areas. Our Ft. Worth East District President is scheduled to attend the conference held during March in Nashville. I will be attending the National Conference Presidents Meeting in Nashville the week of March 16 and the South Central Jurisdictional planning meeting for the Lakeview United Methodist Man's Congress. The Congress will be held May 1 through 3 at Lakeview United Methodist Assembly in Palestine, Texas. We are expecting upward to 2000 men at this meeting.

Our 1987 Annual Man's Retreat will be held August 14-15 at Glen Lake United Methodist Camp. The Retreat is not just for registered United Methodist Men, but for all men of our conference. Bishop Russell will be our Keynote Speaker Saturday afternoon. The retreat is an opportunity for the men of our conference to come together and share our faith and enjoy good fellowship.

The Central Texas United Methodist Men's Scouting Ministry is in full swing. Our Scouting Coordinator, H. D. Keller has worked hard in all our Districts to increase and promote Scouting Ministry. Our recent Bishops Dinner, held in Brownwood, received five (5) commitments to establish new Scouting units. Genesis United Methodist Church, Ft. Worth, recently received the Award for Excellence for their outstanding program of Scouting in their church.

The Central Texas United Methodist Men have a long way to go to ever compete with the United Methodist Women, but we believe they will begin to hear more about us in the future. We appreciate all the work they do for the Lord. The United Methodist Men only want to be half as great as they are today in their mission work. WHEREAS the committee has reported its finding and activities to the 1987 Central Texas Conference; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Texas Annual Conference approve the project of the Central Texas Conference United Methodist Men for the establishment of a Center for Mildly to Moderately Retarded Adults to be located within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in accordance with the charter and bylaws herewith attached the Annual Conference elect a Board of Directors through the process set forth in the rules of the Conference concerning related institutions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that funds for the establishment and operation of the center shall be raised from sources outside conference apportionments.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, with the endorsement of the Health and Welfare Committee, that the center be approved and recommended for Advance Special Offering.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF ALDERSGATE ENRICHMENT CENTER, INC.

We the undersigned natural persons, who are citizens of the State of Texas and who are the age of eighteen (18) years or more, acting as incorporators of a corporation under the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation for such corporation:

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of the corporation is Aldersgate Enrichment Center, Inc.

ARTICLE II

Non-Profit Corporation

The corporation is a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III

Duration

The period of its duration is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

Purposes

The purposes for which this corportion is formed are:

1. The specific and primary purpose is to develop, own, operate and maintain a residential community to provide education, vocational training, charitable assistance and residential services for mildly to moderately retarded adults, with the aim of promoting the physical, mental, social, religious, educational and charitable development and habilitation of such persons.

2. The general purposes and powers are:

a. To purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, improve, construct, own, hold, use, maintain, operate, exchange, encumber, sell or convey or otherwise dispose of real and personal property of every kind, nature and description, as may be necessary and desirable to promote the primary purpose of this corporation.

b. To construct, own, maintain and operate facilities located at the residential community, including residence buildings, educational and training facilities and buildings, recreational facilities and buildings, and all usual and necessary accessories thereto.

c. To make and perform contracts of every kind for any lawful purpose without limit as to amount, with any person, firm, association, corporation, municipality, state, government, or municipal or political subdivision to promote the primary purpose of this corporation.

d. To encourage and promote the physical, mental, social, and religious training and education of mildly to moderately retarded adults, and to provide ministry and counseling to the families of such persons so as to enable them to cope with their family situation in a constructive manner, all under the guidance of the various boards and agencies approved by the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, so as to assure that the services and programs will measure up to the highest standards of care in this highly specialized field.

e. To have and exercise all the rights and powers conferred on non-profit corporations under the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, as such law is now in effect or may at any time hereafter be amended.

f. To do all other acts necessary or expedient for the administration of the affairs and obtainment of the purposes of this corporation, including all of the powers of a purely charitable, non-profit eleemosynary organization within the definition of Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States of 1954, as such law is now in effect or may at any time hereafter be amended.

3. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing statements of purposes and powers, this corporation shall not, except to an insubstantial degree, engage in any activities or exercise powers that are not in furtherance of the primary purpose of this corporation as set forth in Paragraph 1 of this Article IV, and nothing contained in the foregoing statement of purposes shall be construed to authorize this corporation to carry on any activities for the profit of its trustees, officers or any private person.

ARTICLE V

Authority of Corporation

The corporation may take and hold any donations, grants, devises or bequests which may be made in the support of its purposes. All funds of the corporation, whether from donation or otherwise, in excess of the expenditures necessary for the proper administration of such funds, shall be used exclusively for carrying on and promoting the charitable, religious, education and other non-profitable purposes for which the corporation is formed as herein set forth.

The corporation shall make distributions at such time and in such manner as not to subject it to tax under Section 4942 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954; the corporation shall not engage in any act of self-dealing which would be subject to tax under Section 4941 of the Code; the corporation shall not retain any excess business holdings which would subject it to tax under Section 4943 of the Code; the corporation shall not make any investments which would subject it to tax under Section 4943 of the Code; the corporation shall not make any investments which would subject it to tax under Section 4945 of the Code; the corporation shall not make any investments which would subject it to tax under Section 4945 of the Code; and the corporation 4945 of the Code. These directions shall apply to such Sections of the Code as now written, or as hereafter amended at any time.

Anything to the contrary herein notwithstanding, the corporation and the directors shall not engage, participate, or intervene in any activity or transaction which would cause the corporation to lose its status as an exempt organization under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or corresponding provisions hereafter in effect; and the use, directly or indirectly, of any part of the corporation's assets in any such activity or transaction is hereby expressly prohibited. Furthermore, no loans shall be made by the corporation to its trustees or officers.

ARTICLE VI

Initial Registered Office and Agent

The street address of the initial registered office of this corporation is 166 North Elm, Graham, Texas 76046, and the name of its initial registered agent at such address is Louis Pitcock, Jr.

ARTICLE VII

Trustees of Corporation

The affairs of this corporation shall be managed and directed by the Board of Trustees of the corporation. The Trustees of the corporation shall be fifteen (15) in number, six ex-officio, and nine elected Trustees. At least 3/4 of the Trustees, elected and exofficio, shall be members of the United Methodist Church.

The six ex-officio Trustees shall be as follows:

1. One Trustee shall be the resident Bishop of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

2. One Trustee shall be the Chairperson of the Health and Welfare Committee of the Board of Global Ministries of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

3. One Trustee shall be the District Superintendent of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church serving the District in which the residential community is geographically located.

4. One Trustee shall be the Conference President of the United Methodist Men's Organization of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. 5. One Trustee shall be the Conference Lay Leader of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

6. One Trustee shall be the Conference President of the United Methodist Wamen's Organization of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

In addition to the six ex-officio Trustees, there shall be nine Trustees elected by the Central Texas Annual Conference. Each Trustee elected hereafter shall be nominated by the Board of the Trustees of the corporation, approved by the Health and Welfare Committee of the Board of Global Ministries and then presented to the Central Texas Conference Nominating Committee for their nomination and presentation to the Annual Conference. All Trustees so elected shall be elected for a term of three (3) years.

The nine Trustees initially elected by the Central Texas Annual Conference and their addresses are listed below, with three having been elected for a term of one (1) year, three for a term of two (2) years, and three for a term of three (3) years.:

ARTICLE VIII

Bylaws

The corporation shall have the right to establish Bylaws through the action of the initial Board of Trustees of the Corporation. Those Bylaws shall be controlling as to the time, place and frequency of meetings, determination of quorum, voting, how vacancies may be filled in the membership of the Trustees, and other such details of parliamentary practices, management and operation of the said corporation. The Board of Trustees shall be authorized, pursuant to guidelines contained in the Bylaws, to establish committees to fulfill its duties and responsibilities, the details of the selection and function of such committees shall be determined by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE IX

Dissolution

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Board of Trustees shall, after paying or making provisions for the payment of all of the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operating exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations of any future United States Internal Revenue law, as the Board of Directors shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be conveyed to and assumed by the Board of Trustees of the Central Texas Annual Conference of United Methodist Church to be used for and distributed to such organization or organizations under Section 1954, or the corresponding exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, or the corresponding exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

BYLAWS OF N P CORP. A NONPROFIT CORPORATION

ARTICLE 1

OFFICES

1.01 Principal Office. The principal office of the corporation in the State of Texas shall be located in the City of Fort Worth, County of Tarrant. The corporation may have such other offices, either within or without the State of Texas, as the Board of Trustees may determine or as the affairs of the corporation may require from time to time. 1.02 Registered Office and Registered Agent. The corporation shall have and continously maintain in the State of Texas a registered office, and a registered agent whose office is identical with such registered office, as required by the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act. The registered office may be, but need not be, identical with the principal office of the corporation in the State of Texas, and the address of the registered office may be changed from time to time by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE 2

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

2.01 General Powers. The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by its Board of Trustees. Trustees need not be residents of Texas, but at least 3/4 of Trustees in office at any time shall be members of the United Methodist Church.

2.02 Number, Tenure, and Qualifications. The number of Trustees shall be fifteen (15). The manner of determination of six (6) ex-officio Trustees and nine (9) elected Trustees and their terms of office are as designated in the Articles of Incorporation of the corporation.

2.03 <u>Annual Meetings</u>. An annual meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be held on the <u>day of</u> in each year beginning with the year 1987, at the hour of 2:00 o'clock p.m. If the day fixed for the annual meeting shall be on a legal holiday in the State of Texas, such a meeting shall be held on the next succeeding business day.

2.04 Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Board of Trustees may be called by or at the request of the President or any two Trustees. The person or persons authorized to call special meetings of the Board may fix any place, either within or without the State of Texas, as a place for holding any special meetings of the Board called by them.

2.05 Place of Meeting. The Board of Trustees may designate any place, either within or without the State of Texas, as the place of meeting for any annual meeting or any special meeting called by the Board of Trustees. If no designation is made or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of meeting shall be the registered office of the corporation in the State of Texas; but if all the Trustees shall meet at any time and place, either within or without the State of Texas, and consent to the holding of a meeting, such meeting shall be valid without call or notice, and at such meeting, any corporate action may be taken.

2.06 Notice. Notice of any special meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be given at least five (5) days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or sent by mail or telegram to each Trustee at his address as shown by the records of the corporation. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Trustee may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Trustee at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Trustee attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convended. Neither the business to be trans-

acted at, nor the purpose of, any regular or special meeting of the Board need be specified in the notice or waiver of notice of such meeting, unless specifically required by law or by these bylaws.

2.07 Quorum. A majority of the Board of Trustees shall consitiute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board; but if less than a majority of the Trustees are present at said meeting, a majority of the Trustees present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

2.08 Manner of Acting. The act of a majority of the Trustees present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Trustees, unless the act of a greater number is required by law or by these bylaws.

2.09 Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Trustees for an elected Trustee, and any Trusteeship to be filled by reason of an increase in the number of Trustees, shall be filled by the Board of Trustees. A Trustee elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

2.10 <u>Compensation</u>. Trustees as such shall not receive any stated salaries for their services, but by resolution of the Board of Trustees a fixed sum and expenses of attendance, if any, may be allowed for attendance at each regular or special meeting of the Board; but nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Trustee from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefore.

ing the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefore. 2.11 Informal Action by Trustees. Any action required by law to be taken at a meeting of Trustees, or any action which may be taken at a meeting of Trustees, may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing setting forth the action so taken shall be signed by all of the Trustees.

ARTICLE 3

OFFICERS

3.01 Officers. The officers of the corporation shall be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, all of whom shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees may elect or appoint such other officers, including one or more Assistant Secretaries and one or more Assistant Treasurers, as it shall deem desirable, such officers to have the authority and perform the duties prescribed, from time to time, by the Board of Trustees. Any two or more offices may be held by the same person, except the offices of President and Secretary.

3.02 Election and Term of Office. The officers of the corporation shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at the regular annual meeting of the Board of Trustees. New offices may be created and filled at any meeting of the Board of Trustees. Each officer shall hold office until his successor shall have been duly elected and shall have gualified.

3.03 Removal. Any officer elected or appointed by the Board of Trustees may be removed by the Board of Trustees whenever in its judgment the best interests of the corporation would be served thereby.

3.04 Vacancies. A vacancy in any office because of death, resignation, disqualification or otherwise, may be filled by the Board of Trustees for the unexpired portion of the term.

3.05 President. The President shall be the principal executive officer of the corporation and shall in general supervise and control all of the business and affairs of the corporation. He shall preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Trustees. He may sign, with the attest of the Secretary or any other proper officer of the corporation authorized by the Board of Trustees, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the Board of Trustees have authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the Board of Trustees or by these bylaws or by statute to some other officer or agent of the corporation; and in general he shall perform all duties incident to the office of President and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees from time to time.

3.06 Vice President. In the absence of the President or in the event of his inability or refusal to act, the Vice President shall perform the duties of the President, and when so acting shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the President. The Vice President shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the President or Board of Trustees.

3.07 Treasurer. If required by the Board of Trustees, the Treasurer shall give a bond for the faithful discharge of his duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties as the Board of Trustees shall determine. He shall have charge and custody of and be responsible for all funds and securities of the corporation; receive and give receipts for moneys due and payable to the corporation from any source whatsoever, and deposit all such moneys in the name of the corporation in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as shall be selected in accordance with the provisions of Article 5 of these bylaws; and in general perform all the duties incident to the office of Treasurer and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the President or by the Board of Trustees.

3.08 Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Trustees in one or more books provided for that purpose; give all notices in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws or as required by law; be custodian of the corporate records and of the seal of the corporation, and affix the seal of the corporation to all documents, the execution of which on behalf of the corporation under its seal is duly authorized in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws; keep a register of the postoffice address of each Trustee which shall be furnished to the Secretary by each Trustee; and, in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary and such other duties as from time may be assigned to him by the President or by the Board of Trustees.

3.09 Assistant Treasurers and Assistant Secretaries. If required by the Board of Trustees, any Assistant Treasurer shall give bonds for the faithful discharge of their duties in such sums and with such sureties as the Board of Trustees shall determine. Any Assistant Treasurers or Assistant Secretaries, in general, shall perform such duties as shall be assigned to them by the President or the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE 4

COMMITTEES

4.01 Committees of Trustees. The Board of Trustees, by resolution adopted by a majority of the Trustees in office, may designate and appoint one or more committees, each of which shall consist of two or more Trustees, which committees, to the extent provided in said resolution, shall have and exercise the authority of the Board of Trustees in the management of the corporation. However, no such committee shall have the authority of the Board of Trustees in reference to amending, altering, or repealing the bylaws; electing, appointing, or removing any member of any such committee or any Trustee or officer of the corporation; amending the articles of incorporation; adopting a plan of merger or adopting a plan of consolidation with another corporation; authorizing the sale, lease, exchange, or mortgage of all or substantially all of the property and assets of the corporation; authorizing the voluntary dissolution of the assets of the corporation; or amending, altering, or repealing any resolution of the Board of Trustees which by its terms provides that it shall not be amended, altered, or repealed by such committee. The designation and appointment of any such committee and the delegation thereto of authority shall not operate to relieve the Board of Trustees, or any individual Trustee, of any responsibility imposed on it or him/her by law.

4.02 Other Committees. Other committees not having and exercising the authority of the Board of Trustees in the management of the corporation may be designated by a resolution adopted by a majority of the Trustees present at a meeting at which a quorum is present. Except as otherwise provided in such resolution, members of each such committee shall be Trustees of the corporation, and the President of the corporation shall appoint the members thereof. Any members thereof may be removed by the President whenever in his judgment the best interests of the corporation shall be served by such removal.

4.03 Term of Office. Each member of a committee shall continue as such until the next annual meeting of the Trustees of the corporation and until his successor is appointed, unless the committee shall be sconer terminated, or unless such member be removed from such committee, or unless such member shall cease to qualify as a member thereof.

4.04 <u>Chairperson</u>. One member of each committee shall be appointed chairperson by the person or persons authorized to appoint the members thereof.

4.0 <u>Svacancies</u>. Vacancies in the membership of any committee may be filled by appointments made in the same manner as provided in the case of the original appointments. 4.06 <u>Quorum</u>. Unless otherwise provided in the resolution of the Board of Trustees designating a committee, a majority of the whole committee shall constitute a quorum and the act of a majority of the members present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the committee.

4.07 Rules. Each committee may adopt rules for its own government not inconsistent with these bylaws or with rules adopted by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE 5

CONTRACTS, CHECKS, DEPOSITS, AND FUNDS

5.01 Contracts. The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or officers, agents or agents of the corporation, in addition to the officers so authorized by these bylaws, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the corporation. Such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

5.02 Checks and Drafts. All checks, drafts, or orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the corporation and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the Board of Trustees. In the absence of such determination by the Board of Trustees, all such instruments shall be signed by the Treasurer or an Assistant Treasurer and countersigned by the President or a Vice President of the corporation.

5.03 Gifts. The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the corporation any contribution, gift, bequest, or devise for the general purposes or for any special purpose of the corporation.

ARTICLE 6

BOOKS AND RECORDS

6.01 The corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of account and shall also keep minutes of the proceedings of its Board of Trustees, and committees having any of the authority of the Board of Trustees, and shall keep at the registered or principal office a record giving the names and addresses of the Trustees entitled to vote. All books and records of the corporation may be inspected by any Trustee or his agent or attorney for any proper purpose at any reasonable time.

ARTICLE 7

FISCAL YEAR

7.01 The fiscal year of the corporation shall begin on the first day of January and end on the last day in December in each year.

ARTICLE 8

SEAL

8.01 The Board of Trustees shall provide a corporate seal which shall be in the form of a circle and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the words "Corporate Seal of N P Corp."

ARTICLE 9

WAIVER OF NOTICE

9.01 Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation or the bylaws of the corporation, a waiver thereof in writing signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice.

ARTICLE 10

AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

10.01 These bylaws may be altered, amended, or repealed and new bylaws may be adopted by a majority of the Trustees present at any regular meeting or at any special meeting, if at least five (5) days' written notice is given of an intention to alter, amend, or repeal these bylaws or to adopt new bylaws at such meeting.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

The United Methodist Women in Central Texas are blessed with "Roots and Wings" through a heritage planted in faith and commitment to God. Our predecessors were pioneers on the frontiers of impossibilities yet they accepted the challenge and took action to respond as cries of anguish and distress were heard.

The "Roots" provide us in the 1980's with resources and courage which become the wings to carry United Methodist Women into the second century of mission and ministry.

With 100% reporting from the seven districts, Central Texas now has 211 local units with total membership of 9,956. Although reports indicate a slight decrease in membership, the Conference overpaid their Pledge \$7,602.97. The Pledge originally was \$164,600.00. We are grateful to the local units for this generousity which will enable additional help for needs of others.

To be involved in the United Methodist Women provides opportunities to develop and improve leadership abilities. The Conference Executive Committee reaped great benefits from an "In Conference" Workshop in November 1986 led by a team from the Women's Division. Officers and members of our organization utilize their learning experiences as they participate in the constant functions of United Methodist Women.

The program time-table offers numerous events for education, fellowship, Bible study, Schools of Christian Mission, study of current social issues, and program resources.

Central Texas sent their new officers to New York Dec 4, 1986, to receive training available through the Women's Division; two members of the Nominating Committee spent two and one half days in Chicago in January, 1987, to learn the proper method of serving as competent officers.

The basis for action within the United Methodist Women has been prayer, Biblical study, and reflection on theology. To receive this spiritual enrichment, the annual Day Apart March 21, 1987, will be led by Marry May at Glen Lake.

The highlight of 1987 comes through planning and preparation for the cooperative School of Christian Mission again to be available in two locations: Week-end School July 10,11,12 at Georgetown and Week-day School July 13,14,15,16 at Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth. This is a joint cooperative venture of the Conference Board of Global Ministries and the United Methodist Women.

The Studies are: 1. Toward Health and Wholeness.

2. Acts of the Apostles.

3. People and Churches of the U.S.S.R.

We extend a cordial invitation to clergy and laity to take advantage of this learning experience and receive credit for continuing education.

A noteworthy event is the Annual Meeting to be held at First UMC Waco on Oct. 3, 1987. A superb speaker, Pat Callbeck Harper, a director of the Women's Division, has been invited to give the key-note address.

The United Methodist Women's organization is an original without a duplicate. Perhaps one of the greatest contributions we will make in the future stems from our roots, emphasis on the whole person as we affirm the worth of each person. We will be around when some one cries out for help and wants to know if any one is listening - the United Methodist Women will hear and work toward eliminating the cause for the cries. BISHOP WALTER UNDERWOOD



August 9, 1925

April 15, 1987

"Heaven is not likely to be quite as tranquil following the arrival last week of a new saint, Bishop Walter L. Underwood. Chances are Walter hasn't slowed down long enough yet to ponder the thought of sainthood," wrote Dr. Spurgeon M. Dunnam III, Editor of the UNITED METHODIST REPORTER. The episcopal leader of United Methodism's Louisiana Area died April 15 at Methodist Hospital in Houston. He was buried in Dallas April 18.

Funeral services were held April 17 at St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Houston. Bishop Underwood earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1945 from the University of Virginia and a Master of Divinity Degree in 1948 from the Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University. He was ordained a deacon and an elder in the North Texas Conference.

Bishop Underwood, 61, is survived by his wife, the former Billye Kathryn Whisnand, and three sons: Donald, Ronald, and Walter Π .

He was closely associated with recent efforts to strengthen the United Methodist Church through a revitalized Sunday School. Officials at the General Board of Discipleship credited him with the idea for last January's Rally '87 in Houston. That national three-day rally, aimed at strengthening the denomination through the Sunday School, attracted more

than 2,000 people. The bishop, a member of the Discipleship board, was to have given the rally's keynote address, but health problems prevented his attending.

Bishop Underwood made the development of stronger Sunday Schools one of his first priorities following his assignment to the church's Louisiana Area in 1984. During his first year as bishop, he led an effort to start some 300 new Sunday School classes across the state.

"I'm absolutely convinced that the way to revitalize the church is to revitalize the Sunday School," he said at the time. "The old Board of Education in Nashville proved that churches grow on their Sunday Schools. All the churches where I was pastor have shown this."

During his 39 years of ordained ministry, Bishop Underwood served churches in the North Texas, Memphis, Central Texas, and Texas Conferences.

He was a delegate to three General Conferences, the denominations's highest governing body. Also he was a delegate to the 1976 World Methodist Conference in Dublin, Ireland.

At the time of his election as bishop, the Murray, Ky. native was senior pastor of St. Luke's UMC in Houston. His other appointments included First United Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas, from 1972 to 1976 and First United Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, Texas, from 1967 to 1972. From 1976 to 1984, he was a member of the board of directors of the General Board of Pensions.

Earlier Bishop Underwood had agreed to serve on the Board of Directors of the new United Methodist Reporter Foundation, whose first task will be raising funds for construction of a new \$2.5 million United Methodist Reporter Communications Center in Dallas.

The following by Dr. Spurgeon M. Dunnam III is a beautiful tribute to the late Bishop Underwood and the way many will remember him:

> "After working under the tutelage of the late Bishop Robbert E. Goodrich Jr., a master preacher and promoter at First Methodist Church Dallas, Walter went on to serve briefly at an early age as a district superintendent. However, he was frustrated almost from the beginning by the 'interminable meetings' and the one-step-removed proximity of that task from his first love: local congregations. One of his favorite sayings was: 'Until it happens in the local church, it hasn't really happened.'

> As a bishop Walter Underwood was one of a vanishing breed of church leaders. He had strong convictions, and he expressed them boldly. At the same he had a rare combination of ingenuity, a willingness to take risks, and the tenacity required to translate strong convictions and bold visions into blueprints for action.

> All who knew Walter Underwood could cite examples of these qualities. My favorite occurred when he was pastor of First United Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas. The largest congregation in the largest Protestant denomination had for years televised its 11 a.m. Sunday service on the Dallas-Fort Worth area's major independent TV station. Most people would never have imagined an alternative possibility, much less dared to propose it. Pastor Underwood set up an appointment with the sta-

> Pastor Underwood set up an appointment with the station's manager and said: "The Baptists have had that slot for years. When are you going to give the Methodists a turn?"

> Before the meeting ended, Walter had persuaded the station manager to give that 11 a.m. time-slot to First UMC, Fort Worth, if the church could provide the necessary on-site equipment and labor to televise the services.

> Within days, Walter had convinced key leaders in the congregation of the great opportunity that was suddenly available to them. Within weeks, more than \$200,000 was raised to purchase the needed equipment. More than a decade later

the Sunday services of First UMC, Fort Worth, probably reach as many people as any in United Methodism because of that continuing TV hookup.

Until his last days, Bishop Underwood continued to plan for the future and look for new ways to 'make things happen' that might revitalize our denomination.

Less than two weeks before his death, we talked at length following a meeting of the Bishops' Committee investigating problems at Southern Methodist University. Walter had to miss that meeting because of emergency surgery earlier that week, but he wanted a detailed briefing so he could be prepared for the next meeting. 'Can't' and 'impossible' are words Bishop Underwood, in

his 61 years, never adopted as part of his vocabulary. I spoke by phone with Walter's son, Don, a ministerial

colleague in the North Texas Conference, shortly before his father's death. His voice breaking slightly, Don said: 'Dad's going out as a champ.'

To which I would only say 'Amen' and express the hope that God might raise up within our church more leaders with similarly strong convictions, bold visions and the ingenuity necessary to translate them into blueprints for 'making good things happen.'"

BISHOP CHESS LOVERN



August 21, 1909

April 23, 1987

Retired United Methodist Bishop J. Chess Lovern, Bishop-in-Residence and Professor of Religion at Texas Wesleyan College, died April 23. He was 77. Services were held April 25 at First United Methodist Church in Fort Worth with Bishop John W. Russell (Dallas-Fort Worth Area) and Dr. Barry Bailey, senior pastor, officiating. Burial followed in Fort Worth.

Bishop Lovern, a native of Morgan County, Georgia, was one of nine childen. After finishing high school in Georgia, he attended Emory University for two years. He graduated from Southern Methodist University and Perkins School of Theology and was awarded a Doctor of Divinity degree in 1951 from Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas.

He was married to Faye Pressley on June 5, 1953; Mrs. Lovern died in 1982. They are survived by two children: Mark Edward and Lindy Lue.

Lovern served local churches in San Angelo, LaFeria, Edinburg, Harlingen, San Antonio, and Lubbock while serving in the Southwest and Northwest Texas Conferences between 1935 and 1964. He transferred in 1964 to the Oklahoma Conference and served at St. Luke's Methodist Church in Oklahoma City. In 1972, he was appointed to Boston Avenue United Methodist Church in Tulsa where he served until he was elected to the episcopacy in 1976 at the South Central Jurisdiction Conference in Lincoln, Nebraska. He led the church's Southwest Texas and Rio Grande Conferences from 1976 to 1980.

Bishop Lovern has served on the General Board of Missions of the United Methodist Church; Board of Trustees, Scarritt College; President of Board of Trustees, Oklahoma City University; and the Oklahoma Conference Board of Education. He was elected as a delegate to the General Conference of the United Methodist Conference in 1966 (London) and 1974 (Denver).

"Bishop Lovern was, in every sense of the words, a 'Christian gentleman,'" said Jerry G. Bawcom, president of Texas Wesleyan College. "He brought a serenity and a feeling of quiet confidence to everyone with whom he had contact. He was everyman's grandfather. We will miss him tremendously because he was not only a knowledgeable and well-liked professor of religion, but he was a counselor and, more importantly, a friend to the students and other members of the campus community."

REVEREND ERNEST CLIFTON HEWITT

Funeral services were held for Ernest Clifton Hewitt at Lewis Chapel Church near Kirbyville with burial in the church cemetery. Rev. Hewitt died August 8 at his home after an illness.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Rev. Hewitt lived in Glendale eleven years. He was a retired minister of St. Paul United Methodist Church in Breckenridge, and was a World War II Navy veteran.

Survivors include: his wife, Arbelle Lewis Hewitt of Glendale; two daughters, Vivian Ellerbeck of California and Elizabeth McPhail of Florida; two sons, E. C. Hewitt, Jr. of El Paso and Michael Hewitt of Glendale; a sister, Victoria Lambrides of Florida; a brother, J. H. Paaske of Glendale; eight grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

REVEREND ALLEN A PEACOCK



December 17, 1902

November 24, 1986

Allen A. Peacock was born on December 17, 1907, in Oklahoma and died in Houston, Texas, November 24, 1986. Allen grew up with five brothers and a sister on a farm near Sulphur Springs, Texas. There he met and married Mary Iona Holder on August 15, 1920. Dr. Peacock attended East Texas State Teachers College and Bethany Nazarene College, and received a Doctor of Divinity degree from Texas Wesleyan University in 1957. He received his license to preach from the Sulphur Springs Methodist Episcopal Church in 1923 and after a brief time as a teacher, began his full-time ministry in 1931. He was ordained Deacon in 1932 and Elder in 1934. He served churches in Oklahoma (Tyrone and Baker circuits) and in the Northwest Texas Conference (Muleshoe, Hart, Silverton, and Knox City) before transferring to the Central Texas Conference in 1939. There Allen served Eleventh Avenue in Corsicana, Seventh Street in Tample, Cisco First Methodist, Riverside Methodist in Fort Worth, St. John Methodist in Waco, the Cisco District as District Superintendent, Central Methodist in Fort Worth, Brownwood First Methodist, and Aldersgate Methodist in Arlington. In 1968 he retired, having served 37 1/2 years in the itineracy.

In his various churches Dr. Peacock was known as an energetic builder and organizer. He founded and guided the building of Eleventh Avenue Methodist in Corsicana. He also supervised the construction of the sanctuary at Riverside Methodist, the education building at St. John, and the district parsonage at Cisco. Near the end of his career he helped the Brownwood church develop their plans for a new sanctuary.

Dr. Peacock served on numerous boards and agencies including the Board of Trustees for Texas Wesleyan College. He served as Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, and as Vice-Chairman of the World Service Committee. He was elected as a delegate to the Jurisdictional Board of Social Concerns and as Chairman of the Entertainment Committee. He was a delegate to the World Methodist Conference in 1960 at Oslo, Norway, and again in 1964.

REVEREND HORACE W. WILLIAMS



July 1, 1895

January 28, 1987

One of the longest-serving ministers of Central Texas Conference has finished his earthly course in the death on January 28, 1987 of Horace Whaling Williams. He did not serve for many years in the bounds of Central Texas but as a member of the conference he served the whole church, in America and overseas. Most of his ministry was dedicated to stimulating Methodists to take or send the Christian gospel to all the world. He was descended from a long line of Methodist preachers, named Munnerlyn, beginning in the era of Francis Asbury.

He was born in the village of Elm Mott in McClennan County of which Waco is the center. His parents were Joseph Henry and Lula May (Walker) Williams. He attended Baylor University for three years, then transferred to Southern Methodist University where he received the B.A. degree in 1921 and the B.D. degree in 1923. His B.D. thesis was a study in weekday religious education. Shortly before he received the latter degree he was married to Agnes Mae Vaugin of Memphis, Tennessee. He served pastorates in Central Texas in 1921-1925, first at Lakeview Church, Waco, and then at Boyce near Waxahachie. He transferred in 1925 to the Memphis Conference, where he spent two years as pastor and two years as Conference Sunday School superintendent. He then moved to Nashville, Tennessee where he became supervisor of training schools for the General Sunday School Board. In 1934 he became director of the Department of Missionary Education, a work he continued until he retired in 1964.

His service to Methodist causes was broad in scope and lengthy in duration. While his years as pastor were short, he was always active in the local churches he and his family attended - primarily Belmont Church in Nashville. He moved his conference membership back to Central Texas in 1929, and always attended the annual sessions when he could. When Methodist Union came in 1939, he served for ten years as Associate Director of Missionary Education for the denomination, and in 1949 he became the Director of that work until he retired. He served interdenominational groups such as the Missionary Education Movement, the International Council of Religious Education, the World Council of Christian Education, and the National Council of Churches, where he held positons of leadership from time to time.

He was also active in the Methodist Council of Secretaries, of which he was secretary from 1949 to 1964. Of this service, the Council reported that he "had proved to be a most 'profitable servant' in maintaining continuity and a dependable and insightful record of the work of the Council". He was also president of the Council in 1964-1965. He was honored at the time of retirement when the Methodist Board of Education met in annual session on January 3-5, 1966 for "his contribution to Christian education through the years". He was related to both the Board of Missions and the Board of Education, and visited several mission fields oversees. He was a representative of the church at the World Convention on Christian Education at Tokyo in 1958.

He is survived by his wife, who has shared in and supported his many endeavors; and by

their children, Mary Elizabeth Williams and Horace E. Williams, both of Nashville, and Joseph M. Williams of Houston, Texas. Truly, he has been "a good and faithful servant" in the Kingdom of God.

Born September 28, 1903 in Frenstadt, Austria, Frank J. Bartos, Jr. came to the United States as a youngster and spent the remainder of his life in Central Texas. He attended Waco public schools, Baylor University, Southern Methodist University and Toby's Business College, Waco. In August, 1926, he and Rose Massman were united in marriage.

Frank was licensed to preach in 1929 at Colcord Avenue Methodist Church (now Trinity United Methodist Church) in Waco, and was ordained a local deacon in 1950. He was a local pastor for 43 years, serving churches (sometime without salary) in McLennan County. They were often struggling congregations, revitalized by his commitment and energetic leadership. Pastoral visitation, emphasis on lay participation and good preaching were constant characteristics during his ministry. Rev. Bartos was chosen by Dr. Chet Henson, District Superintendent, to be the organizing pastor when Service Memorial Methodist Church was established (1945) as a memorial to several young men who were killed in World War II. He served as Associate Pastor at Herring Avenue Methodist Church and at Austin Avenue Methodist Church where he was also interim pastor for 3 months. He taught a Sunday School class for 55 years and preached twice a month at the Regis Retirement Center for 13 years.

Frank and Rose Bartos were in ministry together. They will be fondly remembered for their personal warmth and genuine interest in church members, friends and all who were touched by their love. They served Christ with bold dedication and untiring effort.

The Reverend Frank J. Bartos, Jr. died May 7, 1987, in a Waco hospital. X. GENERAL SECTION CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

As amended June 4, 1986

I. ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Conference Procedure

- The Central Texas Conference shall be organized according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 36 and Para. 67) and shall meet anually at the time appointed by the bishop (Para. 702.2) and the place chosen by the conference (Para. 702.3).
- 1.1 Adjourned or special sessions shall be called in the manner set forth in the Book of Discipline (Para. 702.4).
 - 1.2 The business of the Annual Conference shall be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.
 - 1.3 Lay members and alternate members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at the charge conference for a one year term to begin on January 1, following their election, subject, however, to paragraph 701.3 of the Discipline.
 - 1.3.1 To equalize the number of Lay and Clerical members of the Annual Conference the following will be members by virtue of the office held: each District United Methodist Women's President, each District United Methodist Men's President and Conference Board, Commissions, or Committee Chairperson who is a lay person not otherwise a member, the Diaconal Ministers of the Conference not otherwise members, and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, General Council on Ministries and General Church Board and Agency representatives not otherwise members of Annual Conference; and one additional lay member from the Charges of the Conference whose membership is above the number, set annually by the Conference Secretary required to equalize the ratio between clergy and lay members. This figure will be revised annually. The Conference Secretary will notify the District Superintendent as to the churches that will elect additional members by January preceding the next Annual Conference.
 - 1.3.2 Each charge of the Annual Conference is responsible for defraying the expenses of its lay and clerical members while in attendance at the conference.
 - 1.4 All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference which pertain to the work of one of the conference boards, commissions, committees, or councils before action can be taken by the Annual Conference, shall be reported back to the conference for action prior to the close of the conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
 - 1.5 All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports coming to the conference, not included in the Pending Report book, must be typewritten in triplicate and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the secretary before they are presented to the conference. Any reports requiring approval of the Annual Conference, not in the Pending Report book, shall be reproduced for members of the conference so that they may follow the report as it is being presented.
 - 1.6 Perdiem allowance for each day in actual attendance at Annual Conference will be granted retired ministers, retired deaconesses, and pastors, any of whom are receiving a total salary of, or less than the minimum salary of the conference. It shall also be granted to the aforementioned ministers' spouses and students appointed to attend school.
 - 1.7 There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the secretary of the conference and the secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of the deceased ministers and wives or widows of ministers. The ministers in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing it with the committee immediately after the funeral.

 Any of the standing rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference, provided that any motion to amend the Conference Standing Rules must lay on table at least one day before the conference can vote to amend.
 Vacancies on all Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall

- Vacancies on all Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall be filled by nominations by and selected by the appropriate body. Those persons elected to fill vacancies shall serve the reminder of the tenure of the original member. However, when the chairperson of the committee has been transferred to another district and, in the opinion of the appropriate body, unusual circumstances require the continued services of such chairpersons, the body shall have the right to retain that person in its membership for the remainder of that person's tenure. Such persons shall not be counted as district representatives.
- 1.9.1 Any member of the Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions, and Committees who is absent without excuse from any two consecutive meetings of the Board, Council, Commission, or Committee shall thereby forfeit membership on the agency and their vacancy shall be filled in accordance with 1.9 above.
- 1.10 Members of General Boards, Councils, Commissions or Committees within the Annual Conference shall be ex-officio members of corresponding Conference Agencies.

II. CONFERENCE ORGANIZATION

Annual Conference Council on Ministries:

- There shall be an Annual Conference Council on Ministries as recommended in the Book of Discipline (Para, 717).
- 1.1 The purpose of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall be: (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district agencies, the annual conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program; and (c) to provide implementation for an administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the conference.
 1.2 The Conference Council on Ministries shall be composed of the presiding bishop:
 - The Conference Council on Ministries shall be composed of the presiding bishop; a chairperson; vice-chairperson; secretary; and treasurer; the district superintendents; the president of the United Methodist Women and one additional representative from the United Methodist Women; the conference lay leader, the conference director-president of the United Methodist Men; two youth representatives, two young adults, and two representatives of United Methodist Men; the chairperson of the Board of Discipleship, Board of Church and Society, and Board of Global Ministries, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, the Commission on Religion and Race; and the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church, the chairpersons of the Committees of the ACCOM, three district representatives from each district, one clergy, one lay woman and lay man, divided into three classes, one of which shall be elected each year for a three year term; members of the General Council on Ministry; Jurisdictional Council on Ministry, and General Church board and Agency representatives not otherwise members of the Council, and additional members at large as needed to assure minority representatives and equal lay and clerical membership.
- 1.2.1 The conference council staff, the director of Finance and Administration, conference statistician, the assistant to the bishop, and a representative from the Council on Finance and Administration shall be members of the Council without vote. District representatives shall serve one three-year term and shall not succeed themselves and at-large members shall be elected annually and shall serve no more than three consecutive years.
 - The officers of the Council shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and a treasurer, nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations

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and elected by the Council for a two-year term. If the chairperson is a lay person, the vice-chairperson shall be a minister, and vice versa. No office is eligible for re-election to the same office.

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, consisting of the officers, the bishop, a district superintendent chosen by the cabinet, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women, the president of United Mesthodist Men, the conference representative on the General Council on Ministries, and the Conference Council director who shall serve without vote. The chairpersons of program boards and committees on Coordination and Budget, Communication and Interpretation, and Research and Planning shall also be members of the Executive Committee in consideration of all agenda matters except matters of personnel. The Council shall nominate and elect such additional members from the Council as may be required so that the Executive Committee is composed of one-half lay persons and one-half clergy. The officers of the Conference Council on Ministries shall fill the same office on the Executive Committee.

1.5 The Executive Committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall: (a) receive reports and recommendations from the conference boards and agencies to the Conference Council on Ministries; (b) serve as the Personnel and Budget Committee for the Conference Council on Ministries and its staff; and (c) propose the agenda for the meetings of the Council.

Conference Council on Ministries (ACCOM) Committees:

- 2. There shall be the following Council (ACCOM) committees: a Committee on Research and Planning; a Committee on Coordination and Budget; a Committee on Nominations; a Committee on Communications and Interpretation. The Council (ACCOM) shall appoint such other committees, task forces, and consultants as it deems necessary in the performances of its duties, provided that the appointed members shall serve no more than four consecutive years.
- 2.1 The (ACOOM) Committee on Research and Planning shall (1) engage in planning and research on behalf of the council in the continuing ministry of The United Methodist Church within the conference; (2) serve as an advisory group in planning and research for the Annual Conference and its agencies; (3) serve as the clearinghouse for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies; (4) relate to and cooperate with the planning and research projects of the General Council on Ministries.
- 2.1.1 The members of the committee shall be, the chairperson of the four Boards, the Conference Lay Leader or his representative from the United Methodist Laity (same person through the year), the President of the United Methodist Women or her representative from the United Methodist Women (same person through the year), the President of the United Methodist Momen (same person through the year), the President of the United Methodist Men or his representative from the United Methodist Men or his representative from the United Methodist Men or his representative from the United Methodist Men (same person through the year), a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet, the chairperson of the Commission on Religion and Race or chairperson's representative (same person through the year), chairperson of the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church. Members without vote; chairperson or chairperson's representative from the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (same person through the year), the Conference Council Director.
- 2.1.2 The officers, a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary, and such additional persons as needed shall be nominated and elected by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- 2.2 The (ACCOM) Committee on Coordination and Budget shall (a) receive program recommendations from the local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies,

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and the Juridictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) evaluate these recommendations and propose a coordinated conference program to the Conference Council on Ministries. It shall also study and coordinate the budget askings of the conference agencies as they relate to the conference program and make recommendations regarding the same to the Conference Council on Ministries.

2.2.1 Members shall be chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and eight members nominated and elected by the ACCOM. The membership shall be one-half clergy and one-half laity. The Conference Council Director shall be a member without a vote.

- 2.3 The (ACCOM) Committee on Communications and Interpretation shall (a) recommend policies that will enable the conference, the district, and the local churches, and their agencies, to make use of all communications help; (b) make available to the conference specialized communications resources, especially in the fields of broadcasting and audio-visuals; (c) promote principles of good communication within the conference to provide two-way channels of communication between Annual Conference agencies, district Councils on Ministries and local churches, and to lead the conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by modern media, including conference and general church periodicals and resources; (d) provide communications training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conferences and local churches; (e) interpret the programs of the General Church and the Annual Conference to the local churches and promote all general and conference benevolent causes in cooperation with United Methodist Communications.
- 2.3.1 Members shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson and a secretary; the District Communication Co-ordinators, and eight additional members at large. The Conference Council Director shall be a member without vote.
 - 2.4 The (ACCOM) Committee on Nominations shall make nominations as the Council on Ministries may determine necessary for fulfilling its program requirements. The ACCOM shall elect three clergy and three lay persons by ballot without nominations. The Committee shall elect officers from within its membership.

Conference Agencies:

Program Boards

- There shall be four onference program boards within the Annual Conference Council on Ministries: The Board of Discipleship; the Board of Church and Society; the Board of Global Ministries; and the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry.
- 2. The Boards of Discipleship, Church and Society, and Global Ministries shall be composed of the officers, one lay man, one lay woman, one clergy representative from each district divided into three classes, one of which shall be elected each year for a three-year term by the District Conference, a district superintendent chosen by the cabinet, and no more than five members-at-large who shall be nominated and elected by the board as it may determine necessary to assure minority representation. The district representatives and at-large members shall be eligible for re-election for an additional three-year term, with a maximum of six years.
- 2.1 The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry will consist of ten members. They will be selected on the basis of interest and willingness to work. The membership will be one-half clergy and one-half lay. The officers will be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary, and chairpersons for two committees. A resource and support group will consist of one youth and one adult from each campus unit with representation from both campus ministers and board members. 2.2 The Conference Council Director shall be a member of each board without vote.

2.3 Each board shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who

shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a four year period to coincide with the quadrennium, (officers elected in 1981 will serve three years only and thereafter such terms will be four years). If the chairperson is a lay person, the vice-chairperson shall be a minister, and vice versa. Officers of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office and shall not be counted as district representatives.

- 2.4 Each program board will have an executive committee composed of the officers and at least two additional members elected by the board from its district representatives.
- 3. The following Boards shall have additional members:
- 3.1 The Board of Discipleship; the conference lay leader, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, and one additional representative from the Board of Laity; and the Mission Coordinator of Christian Personhood of the United Methodist Women.
- 3.2 The Board of Church and Society: the Mission Coordinator of Christian Social Involvement of the United Methodist Women.
- 3.3 The Board of Global Ministries: the president of the United Methodist Women; the Mission Coordinator of Global Concern of the United Methodist Women; and one additional representative from the United Methodist Women.
- 3.4 The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry: the chairperson, the registrar, and one other representative from the Board of the Ordained Ministry; the chairperson and one other member of the Board of Pensions; and the Mission Coordinator of Supportive Community of the United Methodist Women.
- 4. The Conference Boards will provide consultative service and re- sources to the local churches, the District Council on Ministries, the Annual Conference, and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. Each Board will be responsible for the essential function of the area of concern assigned to it and will be related to the objectives and scope of work set forth for its general board in the Book of Discipline.

Board of Pensions

- 5. The Board of Pensions shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 726). A cabinet representative shall be selected by the cabinet as an additional member. The Board shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.
- 5.1 The first elected body shall be divided into two classes. One class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible to serve for the remainder of the quadrennium and for an additional quadrennium. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for an eight year term.

Board of Ordained Ministry

- 6. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 723). The board shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.
- 6.1 Members shall be nominated by the bishop and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each. The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes with one class serving for the remiander of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible for re-election for an additional four year tenure. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four year term of office and

shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium.

Council on Finance and Administration

- 7. There shall be a Conference Council on Finance and Administration which shall be composed of five ministers and six lay persons, nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Council shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the members of the council. The Council shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (Para. 709) and such other responsibilities as may be delegated to it by the Annual Conference.
- 7.1 Members shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each. The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class serving for the remainder of the quadremnium and the other class shall be eligible for re-election for the additional four year tenure. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members, shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium.

United Methodist Women

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The United Methodist Women shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Global Ministries and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Board of Laity

9. The Board of Laity shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Discipleship and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Commission on Archives and History

- 10. There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay person and one clergy elected by the District Caucus, for a four year term. Four at-large members shall be added by nomination of the chairperson of the Commission and elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and secretary who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (Para. 727) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference. No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms.
- 10.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter, one-half of the members shall be elected annually for a full four-year term.

Commission on Religion and Race

- There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race following the general guidelines and structure of the General Commission on Religion and Race as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 729).
- 11.1 The membership shall consist of the bishop, a district superintendent selected by the cabinet, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist

Women and twenty-six additional members. It is recommended that the twenty-six additional members be: four minority clergy; four minority lay men; four minority lay women; three youth under 18 (two minority and one white); three minority young adults, four white clergy; and four white lay persons. The additional members shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms.

- 11.1.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter, every two years one half the members shall be elected for a full four year term.
- 11.2 The Commission shall have the responsibilities and duties as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para, 1280.3).

Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church

- The Commission on Status and Role of Women in the church shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline.
- 12.1 The membership of the Commission shall consist of the following: three clergy, at least one of whom shall be a woman; three laymen; and three laywomen; two representatives from Conference United Methodist Women; and six members at-large, two of whom shall be under 18, one representative from each district, and all selected for their interest, expertise, and with concern for ethnic and age balance in representation. They shall be elected for a four-year term. Members are eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years.

Board of Trustees

- There shall be a Conference Board of Trustees with duties and responsibilities as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 251012).
- 13.1 The membership shall consist of twelve persons who must be at least 30 years of age. Six shall be ministers in the effective relation in the conference and six shall be lay persons in good standing within local churches within the bounds of Central Texas Conference.
- 13.2 The Board shall be incorporated, unless the conference is incorporated in its own name; should the Board be incorporated, the above twelve persons shall be directors of the corporation. These persons shall be elected by the conference for a term of three years, except as to the first Board, one-third of whom shall be elected for a term of one year, one-third for a term of two years, and one-third for a term of three years, and shall serve until their successors have been elected and qualified; provided, however, that existing incorporated trustees of the Annual Conference may continue unaffected by this subsection unless and until such charter is amended.

Board of Diaconal Ministry

 There shall be a Board of Diaconal Ministry which shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 724).

Committee on Rules

- 15. There shall be a Conference Committee on Rules to develop and interpret the rules for governing Annual Conference action and to propose new rules as needed for Annual Conference guides.
- 15.1 The membership shall be three lay men, three lay women, and three clergy, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected quadrennially by the Annual Conference with a limit of one four year terms.
- 15.2 There shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the membership of the Rules Committee. The first person

named to this committee each quadrennium shall convene the committee for the purpose of organization.

Committee on Investigation

- 16. There shall be a Committee on Investigation to make inquiry into accusations against ministerial members of the Annual Conference and, where necessary, to make recommendations to the bishop for further action as per Para. 2623.3, the Book of Discipline.
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1 The membership shall be seven itinerant elders as permanent members and three itinerant elders as reserve members who shall be nominated by the bishop and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions

17. There shall be a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions to extend courtesy to all visitors to the Annual Conference sessions and to prepare appropriate resolutions to be read and adopted at the conference sessions. The committee shall be composed of two clergy and two lay persons nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

The Committee on Minutes

18. There shall be a Committee on Minutes to read and approve the Daily Proceedings of the Annual Conference. The members shall be two clergy and two lay persons who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

Committee on Agenda

- 19. There shall be a Committee on Agenda to prepare the agenda of the Annual Conference and submit it to the conference for adoption.
- 19.1 The membership shall be composed of the bishop, the assistant to the bishop, the district superintendents, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women, the president of the United Methodist Men, the Conference Secretary, the chairpersons of the conference boards, the chairperson of the conference Council on Ministries, two youth representatives from the Conference Youth Ministries, and the Conference Council director who shall be without vote.

19.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect its own officers.

19.3 The Committee shall present to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, prior to the conference session, a detailed estimate of the expenses of the conference, including per diem allowance.

Annual Conference Committee on Nominations

- 20. There shall be an Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. It shall be the purpose of the committee to seek out and enlist the services of the best qualified persons available within the annual conference to fill various positions for which it is to make nominations.
- 20.1 The membership shall be the bishop, who shall be the chairperson, the district superintendents, the conference lay leader, the conference presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference Council on Youth Ministries; the District Lay Leaders: the District presidents of United Methodist Women, one other youth representative recommended annually by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, two minority representatives recommended annually by the Conference annually by the Conference annually by the Conference annually by the Commission on Religion and Race, one of whom shall be a woman, and three clergy at large elected annually upon nomination by the Conference Committee on Nominations.
 - 20.1.1 The nominating procedure shall be as follows:

a. Prior to February 1st of each year, the Conference Office shall make available to each district superintendent a listing of all offices for which nominations will be made at the ensuing Annual Conference session;

b. Prior to February 10th, the district superintendents of the respective districts shall distribute to the pastors of the respective districts the listing of all offices for which nominations will be made at the ensuing Annual Conference session for the purpose of soliciting suggestions from the local church nominating committees relative to the Annual Conference offices in question;

c. Prior to March 15, the District Committee on Nominations will meet for the purpose of preparing district nominations for all offices in question, taking into consideration the names submitted by local church nominating committees. The representatives, however, shall make nominations of only persons they feel are adequately equipped for the task and may elect to not make nominations in these cases where they feel minimum qualifications for the offices in question are not present.

d. <u>Prior to April 15</u>, the District Committee on Nominations shall submit to the Conference Council Office the list of their nominations for the purpose of compilation and circulation to the members of the Conference Nominating Committee at least ten days prior to its initial meeting.

e. Prior to May 10, the Conference Nominating Committee shall meet for the purpose of preparing a list of nominees for all officers which must be filled by the next Annual Conference session.

f. All persons being considered for an office in the Annual Conference shall be contacted before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibilities of the office and whether or not they are willing to serve, if nominated and elected.

- 20.1.2 The Annual Conference Council on Ministries Director and the Director of Finance and Administration shall be members without vote. The ACCOM Director shall serve as secretary.
- 20.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect a vice-chairperson from within the membership of the committee.
- 20.3 The Committee shall make such nominations to the Annual Conference as may be necessary for the following positions: the Conference Lay Leader, the chairperson, the vice-chairperson, secretary and the treasurer of the Conference Council on Ministries; the chairperson, the vice-chairperson, the secretary, and additional members of the Conference Board of Discipleship; the Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry; the Conference Commission on Archives and History, the Conference Commission on Religion and Race, Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church, the Conference Board of Trustees, the Conference Committee on Minutes, the Conference Board of Pensions, and the Conference Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions. It shall nominate such other persons as may be required or requested by the annual, jurisdictional or general conferences and related ecumenical bodies.
- 20.3.1 Prior to April 15 all agencies and institutions related to the Annual Conference shall submit to the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations their nominations of persons to be elected by the Central Texas Conference to serve on their Boards of Directors or Trustees.
- 20.4 Insofar as possible, the membership on councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third lay women, and one-third laymen in keeping with the policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Commission on Equitable Salaries and Clergy Benefits

- 21.1 There shall be a Commission on Equitable Salaries which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (para. 935).
- 21.2 The Commission shall be composed of ten members, five lay and five clergy persons, including at least one lay and one clergy from churches of fewer than two hundred members, all of whom shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 21.3 The initial body shall be divided into two classes of three and one class of four persons with the first class of three serving for one year, the second class of three serving for two years and the class of four serving for three years. New members shall be elected for a three year term and shall be eligible for one additional three year term, except those members of the first two classes who shall only be eligible to serve one three year term after the expiration of their initial.

Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns

- 22.1 There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 728).
- 22.2 The initial elected body shall serve for the remainder of the quadrennium. Thereafter, each quadrennium, members shall be elected for a four year term. Members are eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years.

United Methodist Men

23.1 The United Methodist Men shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Discipleship and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Council on Youth Ministries

24.1 The Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 732).

III. CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

Administrative Personnel:

Administrative Assistant to the Bishop

 There shall be an Administrative Assistant to the Bishop whose office shall be without tenure.

Administrative Personnel of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries

- The tenure of office for a Clerical member of the Conference on the ACCOM staff shall be limited to eight years.
- 2.1 Any proposal to increase or change the structure of the executive staff of the Annual Conference shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference. No appointment predicated on the creation of such new or changed staff position shall be made, tentatively or finally, until the same is approved by the Annual Conference.

Conference Director of Finance and Administration

- 3. The Conference Director of Finance and Administration shall be nominated by the Council on Finance and Administration, after consulting with the bishop and his cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 3.1 The Conference Director of Finance and Administration shall be under the supervision of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. He shall

serve as the treasurer for the Board of Pensions, for the Commission on Equitable Salaries, and shall be coordinator for the Conference pension program.

- 3.2 The term of office of the Director of Finance and Administration shall be for a quadrennium and shall be limited to eight years. A newly elected Director of Finance and Administration shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference.
- 3.3 All bonds required by the law of The United Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the secretary of the conference. The bond for the Conference Director of Finance and Administration shall be approved by the bishop and his cabinet and filed in the bishop's office.
- 3.4 The Director of Finance and Administration shall nominate to the Annual Conference such staff as needed to conduct the daily proceedings of the Annual Conference.
- 3.5 The job description of the Director of Finance and Administration may be modified upon recommendation of the Conference's Council on Finance and Administration and approval of the Annual Conference in regular or called session.

IV. FINANCIAL

- The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1st to December 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or district superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.
- 2. Remittances from a pastoral charge to the conference treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which the remittance is made. The conference treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the district superintendent for each remittance. The pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the conference treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference Report as verification of items reported in Table II.
- 3. After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, with three liaison representatives selected by the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, meeting, with the Council on Finance and Administration in all budget discussions, shall recommend all allocation for the major categories in the total conference financial program; ministerial support, conference claimants fund, administration, World Service, conference benevolences, and capital funding. The Annual Conference Council on Ministries, being charged by the Discipline to study and coordinate the budget request of the several conference agencies as they relate to the conference program, shall formulate and present an itemized conference benevolence budget providing for the support of these agencies to the Council on Finance and Administration. If, for any reason, the Council on Finance and Administration decides that the total of the requests for the conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, it shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the conference benevolence budget.
- 3.1 If any program agency feels its cause has been neglected, jeopardized, or excluded, it shall have the opportunity to represent its cause before the Council on Finance and Administration as provided in Para. 710 of The Book of Discipline.
- 3.2 Once a budget line-item has been approved by a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, the line-item amounts cannot be changed, re-allocated, or exceeded without approval from the Council on Finance and Administration.

- 3.3 Any proposal to create a new apportionment, or to change the purpose for an existing apportionment shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference.
 - All budget items allocated to the districts and local churches of the conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula. Determine the base amount for each district or church by taking the total of the following items; (35) current expenses for program, (36) other current operating expenses, (38) pastor's salary, (39) associate pastor's salary, (40) utilities and cash allowances paid pastor and associates, (41) travel paid pastor and associates, (42) pensions and benefit funds (MPP) paid directly to the General Board of Pensions.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to compute the decimal annually, using the latest statistics (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. The district superintendent and the district stewards shall distribute the askings to the local church on the same basis.
- 6. Items to be distributed under the formula are the Connectional Ministry Fund, Conference Claiments Fund, World Service and Conference Benevolences Fund, Conference Projects Fund, Ministerial Education Fund, Black Methodist College Fund, and the Ministers Insurance Program Fund. Others may be added by the action of the Annual Conference.
- 7. The auditing firm appointed by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall audit all books of treasurers of boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Book of Discipline, and report the results to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, which Council will send a statement of these audits to the conference secretary for inclusion in the minutes.
 - Annually, each board, commission, agency, or special interest, shall make request to the Council on Finance and Administration through the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for any special day offering, except where set by the Book of Discipline. No such day shall be recommended by to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause, or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed conference calendar, unless such agency, cause, or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit, including current annual income and expense, together with its report to the appropriate board.
- 9. All boards, commissions, committees and councils of the conference shall allow eighteen cents per mile, twenty-one cents per mile when two members ride in the same car, and twenty-three cents per mile when three or more members ride in the same car, for necessary travel to conference meetings.
- 10. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by C.F.A.) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

District Conference

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V. DISTRICTS

There shall be a District Conference in each district to the Annual Conference which shall meet at least two weeks prior to the Annual Conference after notice is given to all local churches by the district superintendent, who shall be the chairperson, and on call by the district superintendent, during the Annual Conference session.

- 1.1 The purpose of the District Conference shall be: (a) to elect district representatives to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries; (b) to elect district representatives to the conference agencies; (c) to elect members of the District Council on Ministries; (d) to elect two persons under age twenty-five to serve as members of the Annual Conference; and (e) such other business as it shall determine.
- 1.2 The membership of the District Conference shall be the lay and clerical delegates from that district to the Annual Conference and the lay pastors serving within the district, the district lay leader, and the district president of the United Methodist Women, and all members of the Annual Conference residing within the district.
- 1.3 The District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference.

District Committee on Nominations

- There shall be a District Committee on Nominations in each district of the Annual Conference for the purpose of nominating to the District Conference the best qualified persons within the district for the various positions as required by the Annual Conference.
- 2.1 The membership shall be the district superintendent, who shall be the chairperson, the district lay leader, the district president of United Methodist Women, and such other persons as determined by the District Council on Ministries.

District Council on Ministries

- There shall be a District Council on Ministries in each district of the Annual Conference. It shall be liaison to the local church and the Annual Conference in all matters of program.
- 3.1 The District Council on Ministries shall be composed of the District Superintendent, the president of the district United Methodist Women, the district lay leader, a youth not over 18 years of age, the members of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries residing in the district, one laywoman, one layman, and one clerical representative to each conference board, one district representative of the Commission on Status and Role of Women, and such other persons as the District Council may determine. Interim vacancies may be filled by the District Council on Ministries in lieu of the District Conference.
- 3.2 The officers shall be a chairperson and such other officers as the council shall determine who shall be elected by the Council upon nomination of the District Committee on Nomination.

VI. LOCAL CHURCHES

- Each congregation shall annually give attention to its vacation policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement contained in the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee Manual as issed by the General Church.
- In the event of death of a minister residing in a parsonage, the family of the deceased minister will be allowed thirty days to find other housing and vacate the parsonage.

VII. DISCONTINUED OR ABANDONED CHURCHES

1. When a local church has been discontinued or abandoned and the property disposed of as directed by the Book of Discipline in accordance with Paragraph 2441, the proceeds derived therefrom, if any, shall be first applied to the retirement of pension deficits, and the satisfaction of any claims against ministerial pension annuities which may have arisen out of failure of that church to make propor-

tionate payment for ministerial support. The Trustees of the Conference shall recommend to the next session of the Annual Conference the disposition of any remaining proceeds.
