DAWLEY MAGNA is a town and parish on the road from Wellington to Bridgnorth, with a station at Horsehay in this parish on the Wellington and Severn Junction branch of the Great Western railway, 4 miles south-east from Wellington, about 21 north-west from Madeley and 5 south-west from Shifnal: it is in the Wellington of the Great Western railway. 4 miles South-east from Wellington, about 23 north-west from Madeley and 5 south-west from Shifnal: it is in the Wrekin division of the county, in Wellington division of South Bradford hundred, Madeley county court district, petty sessional division of Wellington, rural deanery of Shifnal, archdeaconry of Salop and diocese of Lichfield.
