
O'Brien Twins **Selected To Hall Of Fame**







For those of us who were children half a century and more ago, life had surely been different than how it is for kids today. In fact, looking back, that time seems like ancient history.

We had worn no helmets when riding our bikes, nor did we have any knee pads when we roller skated outdoors. We had no thermal wear to keep us warm in cold weather, and no flame retardant night clothes to keep us safe when sleeping. We had gone to schools with asbestos in the walls, and had lived our lives breathing pollutants emitted daily from nearby factories. We had gone swimming in the contaminated water of the Raritan River, and had never heard of sun blockers. Our school lunches had been stored for hours without refrigeration, often in the stifling heat. If we had forgotten to bring a lunch in those days before school lunches were provided, we had to go hungry. If we had forgotten our milk money, we'd drink from the water fountain or go thirsty. We had played with toys often made with sharp metal pieces, and waved lit sparklers in our little hands on the Fourth of July. We had ridden in cars without seatbelts, had played baseball without protective gear, and had taken our sleds down the steepest and iciest places we could find. We had no air conditioning

When we had wanted something, and couldn't have it, we'd "suck it up" and pretend we hadn't really wanted it anyway. We had ridden the Marathon Bus with Red the Bus Driver to go to the movies in Perth Amboy without chaperones, and never had to call home to let our parents know we were safe once we got there. The coldest weather had never kept us indoors, and the hottest temperatures had never sent us home. Back then, when "children should be seen and not heard," and corporal punishment was "administered liberally" in raising children, our friends had known us better than our families ever did, creating bonds to last a lifetime.

Somehow, most of us survived to remember how it used to be...in that time of long ago when we had done what we had wanted to do, just as long as we were home in time for supper.

Chet's 90's

Locals will never forget the outstanding thin-crust pizza pie served at The Gay 90's Bar on First St. in South Amboy, and its kitchen, on the Church St. side, where you picked up your takeout pizza order.

The bar was initially established and owned by the Borbely family, although the year it began is unknown, but possibly in the 1950's. The family later sold it to a man named Stanley (Last name is not available) and his brother (unknown), who had it for quite some time until selling it to South Amboy brothers Tom "Chet" Wortley, and his older brother Chet Wortley in 1984, who changed the name to Chet's 90's.

Tom said that, "We had a lot of old and new friends that would stop in and swap stories, and the biggest reason they came was for our pizza. It was everybody's favorite!" Chet's 90's sponsored softball and basketball teams in the South Amboy Men's Senior Leagues, and also had a team that won the Sayreville Summer Basketball League title.

The Wortley brothers sold Chet's 90's in 1987, and according to Tom, "It was quite an experience. Owning a bar is a lot more work than people realize, and it really is hard finding people you can trust to hire."







Bridges Of The Raritan River-Part 2 The Victory Bridge By Fran Fitzmorris

The story continues with the building of the Victory Bridge, which opened in 1926, and was something that the people of Sayreville, South Amboy and Perth Amboy could be proud of. By the early 1920's, it was evident that the "wood" bridge wasn't the answer to the local area's traffic problems, and that a steel bridge was necessary. By 1922, a deal had been made, and the new bridge would be funded jointly by state and federal government for the enormous amount of \$4 million dollars.

At the time of its construction, this original 360 ft. bridge was the longest in NJ. The name for the bridge came from State Assemblyman Harold G. Hoffman from South Amboy, to honor all the soldiers who fought in World War I from our state. This bridge would become the connecting link between North and South Jersey, and hopefully eliminate or at least lessen the traffic congestion crossing the historic Raritan River, especially going to the Jersey shore during the summer months. According to reports, it was believed, at the time, that it would be seen or traveled over by more than any other memorial bridge in this country, except for the memorial bridge heading in or out of Washington, DC to Virginia.

Originally, the Highway Commission was planning to open the bridge in April 1924. However, a 2-year extension was given. The state condemned land at both ends of the bridge approaches. The roads would be widened by 50 ft. near the base of the bridge, especially the north bound traffic, to create a better flow. The connecting points for the new bridge would be at Convery Blvd. and Smith St., and at the Pennsylvania Railroad right away, at lower Main St., and would be widened by 50 ft. to make the flow of traffic move easier.

Finally the date for the opening of the bridge was set for June 26, 1926. As the date drew closer, the route for the parade was set, and then at the last minute, changed. In researching, I still can't figure out why it was changed, see what you think. The parade route was as follows: Start at the Luke A. Lovely American Legion located on David St., turn onto Stevens Ave. to Main St. Originally, it would turn right and travel down to lower Main St., but at the last minute, it was rerouted at Main St. up Fourth St., through the Hole-In-The-Wall to Scott Ave. over the bridge to Smith St., where the reviewing stand was located, and where the Perth Amboy American Legion was stationed.

As for the parade, the South Amboy American Legion was given the honor of being the honor guard for the Governor of NJ, A. Henry Moore. The locals had about 100 men marching, led by Post Commander Chris Mulrain in full uniform. The parade was divided into divisions. The first division was composed of only military units from all over NY and NJ. The second division was composed of veterans organizations, including about 20 American Legion posts and members of the Grand Old Army of World War I. They rode mainly in cars. In charge of this division was John C. Conlogue, who fought in the war. He was a well-known figure in South Amboy. The Civil Division was the largest, and included city, state, police, and firemen from all over the state. South Amboy was represented by several fire companies from town including Protection. There were numerous bands and floats which added to the joy and happiness of the day.

Even though a little rain fell, there were various amusements on the bridge and a fireworks display that surpassed anything seen in the area up to that time. The amusements continued to a late hour, and a banquet was held in the Perth Amboy Auditorium, with many speeches given to praise the people responsible for the bridge. Mayor Hoffman received special recognition for leading the fund raising necessary to make this event work. All three towns, South Amboy, Sayreville, and Perth Amboy should all be proud of what was accomplished for a bridge that stood until 2005.

Last but not least, I would like to inform you that my grandfather John Fitzmorris worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad for 35-40 years and all those years were spent on the Railroad Bridge—the same one that still stands today. That's pretty incredible! We are proud of what he did!

Fishing Flashes By Teo "Weebles" Weber

Salt Water

The winter Mackerel run never got started. The party boats that went out to look for them caught very few fish. There was nothing behind them to follow it up. The only fishing now is on the wrecks in the Mud Hole for mostly Ling, some Blackfish and a few Cod. Inshore Blackfish fishing on party boats is still spotty. There are still a few big Blackfish around at 12 to 14 pounds. Surf fishing for Striped Bass is getting slower and slower due to dropping water temps. There are still a few Bass being caught on plugs at night in the area above Shark River and on LBI. Using clams, you will catch a few during the offshore special Sea Bass trips. Trips are excellent with many limits being caught if you can stand up to the rough seas and inclement weather, there are big Porgies and some Pollock mixed in. There are a few Weakfish and Bluefish still out there too. A surprise catch of a Bonito on the Big Jamaica was caught by someone trying to jig for Pollock. Striped Bass season opens in the bays and rivers on March 1st. This fishing will be slow at first so don't expect any great catches.

Fresh Water

Cold frigid weather resulted in ice on all upstate lakes. The ice is safe for now. The warm spell we had in January lead to the death of two teens drowning when they fell through the thin ice on Bud Lake. Lake Hopatcong is the best bet for fishing. Safe ice is in all the coves there. Perch and Pickerel can be caught on shiner baited tip ups. Some trout have been caught from shore at Round Valley near the boat ramp, but it has slowed up. Holdover Trout are still lurking in the Pequest and other upstate streams if you can find them.



Ice Or Heat, That Is The Question!

Whether to use ice or heat can be a vexing question for those of us coping with acute injury, morning aches, or chronic pain. First, use caution. Ice and moist heat therapy can both interfere with circulation, especially in the elderly, the immune compromised, and those with circulatory problems, or who suffer from serious diseases (including cancer). When in doubt, check with your chiropractor. Never use any form of ice or heat unless you are certain it's appropriate to do so.

What To Do First!

Have you ever seen an athlete with a bag of ice lashed to his ankle wearing an ace bandage? That player is practicing athlete injury first aid. It is called R.I.C.E., Rest, Ice, Compression, and Elevation. This can be done for 24-48 hours. If pain and swelling persists, heat can be applied.

Ice is best when an acute injury has resulted in acute inflammation in the area of injury. Signs of acute inflammation include swelling, redness, or heat in the surrounding area. Ice should be used for 10-30 minutes depending upon the thickness of the damaged part; for example, an elbow for 10 minutes, and lower back for 30 minutes. Wrap ice packs in a towel and apply it to the injured area. You can expect to feel a little cold discomfort in the area before any numbness or pain reduction takes place. Check the skin temperature frequently to prevent damage.

Heat is best used with chronically stiff muscles or joints, or if your pain increases as the weather becomes colder. Persons with circulation problems should use neither heat or ice because they can't reliably tell if the area is warming or cooling properly. Wrap hot packs in 4-8 layers or thick toweling to start with. Adjust towel thickness as needed. In general, you may use commercial hot packs in either boiling water or the microwave. Follow the instructions that come with the pack or consult your chiropractor.

As for electric heating pads- never, never, use them. Heating pads can overheat quickly and burn you before you know what's happening. There are safer and easier ways to apply heat. I urge you again, DO NOT use electric heating pads for any reason. If the injury persists for more than a week, consult your physician.
