One of the Games People Play in Niles is "Whose Going to Knock Nick Blase Off His Throne?"


Judith Ann Nelson Weds

District 63 Takes On Leadership Roles At Illinois School Board Meeting

Several representatives of East Maine School District No. 63 assumed roles of leadership at the recent annual joint conference of the Illinois Assn. of School Boards and Illinois Assn. of School Administrators held at the Sherman House in downtown Chicago.

William Gurolnick, president of the District 63 board of education, chaired a panel discussion "What Do We Mean: Individualized Instruction?" Monday afternoon, Nov. 20.

Theodore Davis, member of the District 63 board of education and representative from Maine Township serving on the Advisory Committee of the Tri-County Division of the Illinois Assn. of School Boards, presented a resolution to the resolutions committee Saturday afternoon, Nov. 18.

Hugh McGuigan, superintendent of schools for District 63, discussed "Making the Administrative Structure Functional" in a panel discussion held Monday afternoon, Nov. 20.

Such legislation would permit school districts of offer in-service training for teachers (such as District 63's current Project Interweave program) during the school day.

"If you look upon a school administrator as a major dome, charge d'affairs, who will oversee the smooth operations of your buildings and your payroll and your bus schedule and your cafeteria, you're wasting your money." Superintendent Mc Guigan told panel members discussing administration.

He went on to describe the administrative structure in District 63 and to recommend the securing of "a solid executive core for an entire district."

"In East Maine School District No. 63 we conceive of our principals as executive officers of the district. They have many responsibilities within the school system assigned to them, one of which is the operation of a particular school. The emphasis, however, is on the total excellence of the educational structure of the district, rather than on the smooth operation of several separate islands within a confederation," Superintendent McGuigan said.

Edward Solomon, recently appointed to fill the unexpired term of Arnold Kapp on the board of education of District 63, also attended the conference as an observer.

Mr. Davis presented a resolution to the resolutions committee at the Saturday conference in support of legislation which would permit shorter school days on those days when approved in-service programs are being conducted.

Although the resolution failed to receive a vote of approval by 75 per cent of the 500-some voting delegates, not having appeared with other resolutions in a pre-conference book, chances for support at the next conference (prior to the next State

Legislative session) appear much better, Mr. Davis indicated.

Members of a board of education, Mr. Gurolnick said, can by their own enthusiasm develop an enthusiasm for change in a community and can cause teachers to be aware of their interest in progressive change.

District 207 Board Adopts \$2,000,000 Bond Sale Resolution

The adoption of a resolution providing for the issuance of \$2,000,000 in General Obligation bonds and levying the required taxes to pay the principal and interest due thereon was the principal item of business of the Township High School District #207 Board of Education during the November 27th "special meeting" of the board, called by Mr. E. Roy McConnell, President.

Salient points of the resolution indicated that: (1) a valid election was held in Maine Township on March 13th, 1967, which reflected a positive vote approving the sale of \$15,000,000 in bonds for Township High School District #207 to renovate, and to build and equip additions to Maine East, South and West, and to build and equip a new high school on the Maine North school site and to improve said site.

(2) It is in the best interests of Township High School District #207 to borrow \$2,000,000 at this time so as to continue the renovation, addi-

tion and/or construction program.

(3) That 400 bonds, in the amount of \$5,000 each, be sold to Glorie Forgan, William R. Staats, Inc., and Associates, who recently submitted the best bid.

(4) That, for payment of bonds and interest, levies be made on all taxable property within Township High School District #207.

(5) That copies of the resolution as presented (upon adoption) be filed with the Township High School treasurer and the County Clerk of Cook County, Illinois, to insure payment and proper levy against taxable property.

The resolution, as stated, was adopted unanimously.

Other business of the evening related to Mr. Roy O. Ma-

kela, chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee, who stated that complete preliminary plans for additional construction at Maine East were not yet ready. He also requested approval for a second change order for the expenditure of \$198,000 for the installation of water pipe insulation in the new Guidance and Counseling area at Maine East.

Mr. L. Wesley Hartzell, board member, reminded the attendees of a meeting of the Education Committee to be held in conjunction with staff members of the Cooperative Education Department of the Maine high schools on Monday evening, 7:30 P.M., in the faculty lounge at Maine East. The purpose of this meeting is to hear reports and further discuss the Cooperative Education program of the three high schools, and to evaluate reactions to the sex education meeting held recently.

Dr. Short stated that business personnel from the high school district would be welcome to attend the December

4th meeting to learn more about, and possibly participate in, the "Study-Work" Cooperative Education program.

Ten Basic Pointers On Christmas Mailing

1. Mail during CHRISTMAS CARD WEEK END - December 9 thru 10.
2. Use ZIP Codes and separate your letters into Local and Out-of-Town bundles.
3. Address mail fully and clearly. Write legibly or print plainly. Do not use abbreviations since they lead to confusion.
4. Pay the 5-cent letter rate of postage on Christmas cards and letters; and use the new 5¢ Christmas Stamps. Be certain a return address with ZIP Code is printed in the upper left corner of both Christmas cards and parcels. This will prevent undeliverable mail from ending up in a dead letter office.
5. Do not enclose coins or hard objects of any kind in letters or cards. Cancellation machines cannot process such mail, and often damage the envelope and contents.
6. Do not mail money in Christmas gifts, cards or letters. For safety's sake use postal money orders or checks.
7. Make certain that parcels are well packed and securely wrapped in strong containers, cushioning material, such as excelsior, shredded newspaper or tissue paper should be evenly and firmly placed on all sides of the Christmas gift. The carton should be wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong twine. McGee also stressed the importance of an extra label on the inside of a package in addition to a listing of the contents. Both will assist if necessary in proper delivery.
8. Gifts of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, radios, and musical instruments MUST be marked "Fragile" by the mailer. Food stuffs should be marked "Perishable" if subject to spoilage.
9. Insure parcels. Register letters of real value. Where only proof of delivery is required for letters of no intrinsic value, use Certified Mail. Use Combination Mail where a letter or message, other than a gift tag -- is to be enclosed inside a Christmas package.
10. Mail Christmas cards and parcels early to avoid the last minute rush and waiting in line at the Post Office. The best times to avoid crowds at stamp windows in most Post Offices are before 10:00 AM and between 4:30 and 5:30 PM.

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
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
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Sparky In State St. Parade

On UNICEF

Dear Editor:

In examining Mrs. Levinson's assumptions regarding UNICEF, she touches five main points. Let's look at each.

Before so-doing, however, we should briefly consider the parent UNO, of which UNICEF and WHO are merely spawn.

This parent - this alien bureaucracy headquartered in New York has, over 21 years of its unproductive existence spent nearly 6 billion dollars. Of that amount the gullible American taxpayer has been tapped for 2.69 billion dollars or 45% of the total. All this allegedly for peace and brotherhood - and there is neither. Nor will there be until we cast off the shackles of this con-spiratorial leach and reintroduce time-proven American principles and values.

Of the more than 2.6 billion dollars, UNICEF had received through 1965, \$228,040,000 in U.S. tax dollars. Thus, by 1967, UNICEF's graft is over a quarter of a billion dollars. Trick or Treat?

3. Under economic sanctions imposed by the leach parent, and illegally supported by Executive Order of the President of the United States, how could the children of Rhodesia get their "4 cents per child - even if their government asked for it, which to their ever-lasting credit, they didn't.

4. "Let's set the record straight once and for all..." Quoting from a letter from U. S. Representative H. R. Gross, (1a) to a constituent dated January 2, 1962.,

"Regardless of the 'facts' offered by C. Lloyd Bailey, (Exec. Director of UNICEF) I can tell you that money most assuredly was taken from the Children's Fund (UNICEF) to finance the United Nations Congo operation."

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
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
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
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District 63 Board Of Education Discusses Evaluation Techniques

The board of education of East Maine School District No. 63 devoted most of its time at the regular Nov. 28 board meeting to discussion of educational topics.

Consideration centered on a report by Assistant Superintendent Frank A. Dagne describing techniques to be used during the year to evaluate Project Interweave, the teacher in-service training program underway in District 63 under federal sponsorship.

The primary instrument to be used to determine the degree to which teachers in the district have been influenced by Project Interweave, Mr. Dagne said, was developed by the Cooperative Educational Research Laboratory, Inc. (CERLI) in Northfield, a federally-funded project devoted

to researching evaluation procedures in education.

Three trained observers from the Cooperative Educational Research Laboratory, Inc. will observe 48 teachers in District 63 twice during the year using this instrument.

The observers, equipped with ready-made charts, will record a teacher's classroom behavior every six seconds during a 30-minute observation period. They will be able to determine from these records how adept a teacher is in the skills of inductive teaching — in, for instance, producing critical thought among her students.

The 48 teachers, about 22

per cent of the total teaching staff, have all been informed of the evaluation procedures and have agreed to be participants. They were chosen at random from all grade levels in all of the elementary schools in the district.

The data collected by the observers will be analyzed at the end of the school year at the University of Illinois.

The evaluation of innovative in-service programs is generally recognized as an area in which "little has been done," Mr. Dagne said, and consequently the data on evaluation procedures developed in District 63 will be pertinent to other in-service programs in

the state and around the country.

In another report, Superintendent Hugh E. McGuigan told members of the Board that reactions from parents, teachers and students are being considered in revising the district's new pupil progress report recently sent to parents.

The district, Superintendent McGuigan said, is making an effort to prepare a form which will, one, report to parents the progress that a child is making in school in relation to his potential and the effort he is putting forth and, two, provide an opportunity for teachers to make comments in regard to each of the academic areas.

The pupil progress report sent to parents Nov. 16 for the first marking period of the year in mimeographed form was designed, Superintendent McGuigan said, with the understanding that it might be revised.

Participates In Recovery Of Spacecraft

(Q0035) USS SABINE (AO-25) (FHTNC)-- Seaman Gerald M. James, USNR, son of Mrs. Marcella A. James of 8358 Shermer Road, Niles, Ill., participated in the recovery operation for the unmanned Apollo 4 spacecraft as a crewman aboard the other USS Sabine.

The officer waited on-station in the Atlantic as a back-up to the Pacific Recovery Force in the event of an emergency or malfunction resulting in the spacecraft's sp own in the Atlantic.

Launched by the Saturn V booster rocket, the spacecraft circled the earth twice at an altitude of about 100 miles. As it drifted back to earth and passed the 400,000-foot mark, the Apollo reached speeds up to 24,000 miles an hour.

The flight, designed to evaluate the Saturn V launch vehicle and test the Apollo's heat shield, subjected the shield to temperatures of 6,000 degrees as the craft re-entered the earth's atmosphere.

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
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St. Luke's To Celebrate Tenth Anniversary

From a humble beginning on April 28, 1957 when the first service was held at the Emma S. Meizer School to the bright future with the starting of a new sanctuary early this coming Spring, St. Luke's United Church of Christ in Morton Grove will pause and give thanks in remembrance of the past ten years at a banquet on December 10th at the Pyrenees Restaurant, celebrating the chartering of their church on December 8, 1957.

The Rev. Armin Munz, organizing Pastor, began canvassing the homes in Morton Grove in February of 1957 and at the first service had an attendance of 82 people, adults and children. Various committees were then formed to accumulate equipment and materials, start the Sunday

School, draw up a Constitution, etc.

The newly formed church suffered a set-back in 1958 when Rev. Munz resigned to accept a post in the West due to the health of his child. The Rev. Paul R. Stock was called from St. Louis to assume duties as Pastor of the fledgling church. Rev. and Mrs. Paul R. Stock arrived in November, 1958 to assume their duties. With the pioneer spirit again aroused, a multi-purpose building, the first unit of a master plan, was constructed at Shermer and Harlem Roads.

Feeling that he had completed the work at St. Luke's for which he had been called, and that new leadership would be necessary, Pastor Stock accepted a call to St. Charles, Missouri and left Morton Grove in January, 1963. Rev. Charles W. Ross accepted the call to come to St. Luke's in May and began his ministry in July, 1963.

The Rev. Armin Munz who has recently assumed a new post in Colorado, will not be able to attend the banquet. The Rev. Paul R. Stock has accepted his invitation and will attend the activities planned for the chartering celebration. The celebration will begin with worship services at 9:30 and 11 a.m. Rev. Paul R. Stock will deliver the message. The Rev. Dr. William L. Rest, Conference Minister, Illinois Conference of the United Church of Christ, will be the guest speaker for the evening. The Choir of St. Luke's Church, under the direction of Mr. Robert Nelson, will offer several musical selections.

On UNICEF

a statement showing that U.N. officials got \$12 million from the United Nations Special Fund and grabbed \$10 million from the United Nations Children's Fund, UNICEF."

The above is quoted from page 9932 of the Congressional Record of June 19, 1961."

5. Yes, I am aware that the World Health Organization and UNICEF work closely together, WHO technicians work for UNICEF, and the long-suffering American taxpayer has been tapped for over one hundred and eleven million dollars to support WHO over the years.

Food and Agricultural Organization technicians also work for UNICEF. The U.S. taxpayers tab for this one is over fifty five million dollars to date. In addition, the World Food Program (WFP) established a goal of \$275 million for the 1966-68 period. The U. S. pledge towards this goal includes:

(1) Up to \$92 million in agricultural commodities.

(2) Sufficient shipping services to transport same. (Estimated at \$32 million.)

(3) Up to \$6 million in cash for administrative and operational costs. (Report on the United Nations-1965)

That's an additional \$130 million U.S. taxpayer tap!

Certainly WHO disseminates birth control information. As Brock Chisholm, a Canadian, former head of WHO advocates - Canadian and American families should practice birth control and limit their families to two children. They should adopt

children from backward countries and the darker the skins the better, because he says the sooner we are all mixed into one race the better.

But, as to UNICEF and birth control:

"On the initiative of the U.S. delegation, UNICEF's role in programs for family planning was brought up for discussion ... Since family planning is an integral part of good maternal and child health services, expanded aid seems appropriate for this element of a health program to which UNICEF contributes such a large share of its resources... The U.S. also suggested, and the Board agreed, that several projects be brought to the Board from countries requesting assistance in family planning..." (Report on the United Nations-p 195.)

The U.S. Committee for UNICEF earlier told us clearly what Trick or Treat for UNICEF is all about. Their Nov. 5, 1949 Bulletin says:

"The truth in connection with this is that Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF is primarily an education program. More than 2,000,000 American children (now more than 3,000,000) participate in the project in some 10,000 communities."

We "share in the Nobel Peace Prize" and get educated (brain-washed) at the same time. What a value!

Trick or Treat for UNICEF? Mostly Trick and very little Treat, wouldn't you say?

State Scholarship Commission Grant Program

The legislators of Illinois have authorized the State Scholarship Commission to administer a Grant Program which offers monetary aid to college students on a non-competitive basis.

Applications for academic year 1968-69 are available at all high schools and approved colleges or universities in Ill., and must be submitted to the Commission office by the students before February 1, 1968. In addition to application materials, school counselors have received information packets to permit them to answer specific inquiries by their students.

The Grant Program offers monetary aid on an annual renewal basis to undergraduate students who are citizens and residents of Illinois, and can receive monetary aid for tuition and mandatory fees to a maximum of \$1100 for academic year 1968-69.

Students must be admitted in good standing and enrolled in full-time programs according to the requirements of the approved colleges of their choice.

Unlike the State Scholarship Program, an applicant in the Grant Program need not participate in a qualifying examination nor exhibit any specific high school record. High school graduation and attendance in good standing to an approved institution in Illinois are the only academic requirements.
