

District 63 Takes On Leadership Roles

It is up to the board of education to create "an atmosphere for change," Mr. Gur-olnick told members of the panel discussing individualized instruction. He suggested that a school board first set forth a formal statement of philosophy for an entire district.

Two important functions of a board of education involved in introducing individualized instruction, he said, are to make and stand by a commitment to change, and later to supply to the community information on changes as they take place in the educational system.

Members of a board of education, Mr. Gurolnick said can by their own enthusiasm develop an enthusiasm for change in a community and can cause teachers to be aware of their interest in progressive

4. Pay the 5-cent letter rate of postage on Christmas cards and letters; and use the new 50 Christmas Stamps. Be certain a return address with ZIP Code is printed in the upper left corner of both Christmas cards and parcels. This will present the parcels. parcels. This will prevent undeliverable mail from ending up in a dead letter office.

5. Do not enclose coins or hard objects of any kind in letters or cards. Cancelling machines cannot process such mail and often damage the envelope
