

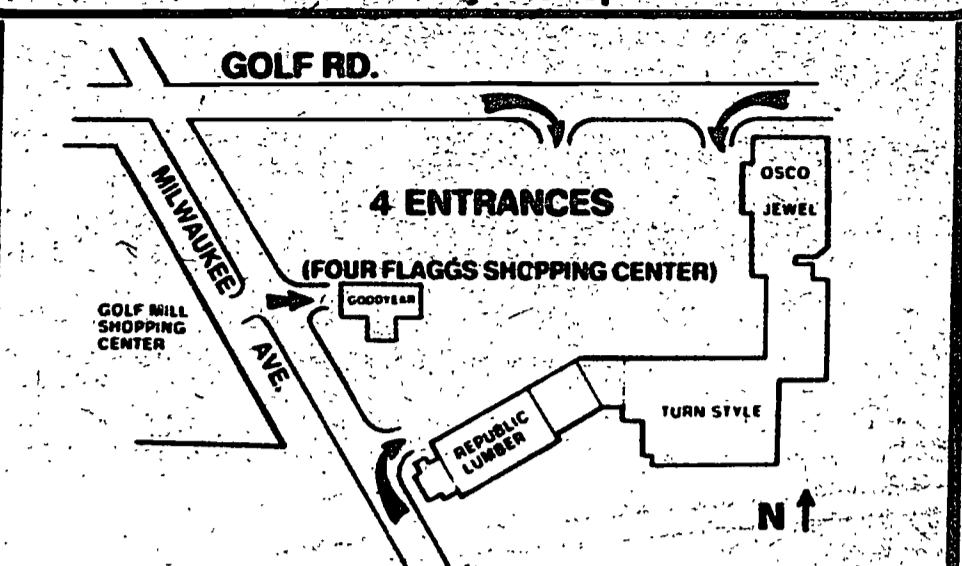

Ground breaking for permanent Oakton campus

State, county and local officials and educational and community leaders all attended the official ground breaking ceremonies for the permanent campus at Oakton Community College on Sunday, October 26.

Louis Silverman, chairman of the Illinois Capital Development Board which is responsible for the construction of the college Des Plaines campus, and Robert B. Glade, member of the Illinois Community College Board, discussed the significance of the event.

More than 300 people, most of whom had been involved in the college's development at one time or another, attended the program which culminated the six-year search for a permanent campus.

The 170-acre campus site is located on the Des Plaines River in Des Plaines between Golf and Central Roads. Site development construction is now underway and it is anticipated that building will begin in the spring. The college will be housed in one large, enclosed building which will contain classrooms, labs, offices and other facilities off of a central mall.

Mayors of municipalities in the Oakton district present at the event were Julie C. Bode, of Morton Grove, Edward K. Patten of Glenview and Nicholas B. Blase of Niles. Eleanor Rohrbach, a city clerk of Des Plaines, and Don R. Copeland, Skokie trustees, represented their respective cities.

Other officials at the ground breaking included George Dunne, president of the Cook County Board of Commissioners; State Senator John J. Nimrod from the 4th District; John "Bill" Carroll, State Representative from the 4th District; Allan J. Greiman and Peter P. Peters, State Representatives from the 15th District;

Then a very nice guy from a Des Plaines radio station suggested we throw in 10 or 12 niblets of corn around our fishing line and in 10 minutes we'd caught 3 fish. It proved once again city boys often lack the 'smarts' which they think they have an abundance of.

In the evening a sumptuous dinner was served in the lodge and the Centel people once more proved to be extremely cordial hosts.

Friday night we attended a publishers' dinner in Oakbrook. The guests for the evening were Cook County officials. Since we've tweaked, nudged and gone after local politicians thru the years, we have to report publishers are just guys after the almighty buck like most other people. During the introductions of public officials, Stanley Kusper was presented a plaque for his cooperation. During recent years Kusper has authorized legal notices be published in these men's newspapers. For this he received a plaque. It was incredible. If a politician was so brazen as the publishers, the politico would be raked over hot newsprint from one end of the County to the other. But there was this august body of opinion makers buttering up a County official because he made them a few more bucks for their newspapers.

There are code words publishers use which may camouflage their true intent. They contend the public has the 'right to know' in dispersing information about public bodies actions. And while they may be sincere, there are often dollar signs which motivate their intentions. If in letting the 'public know' they can also make a buck (from legal notices) then they have filled a dual mission.

Board investigates reduction of village speed limits

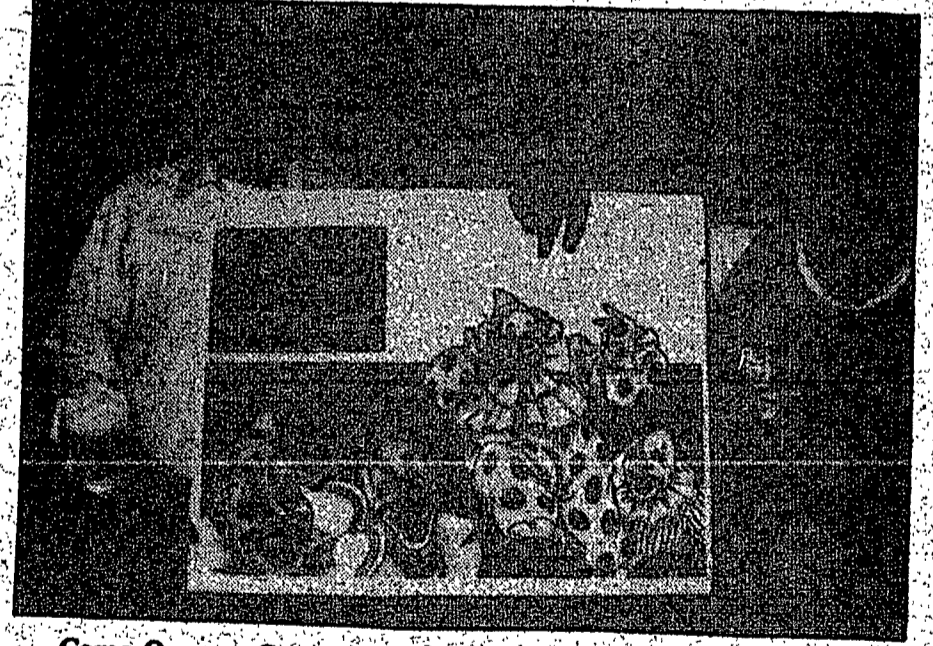
Village progress slows to 25 m.p.h.

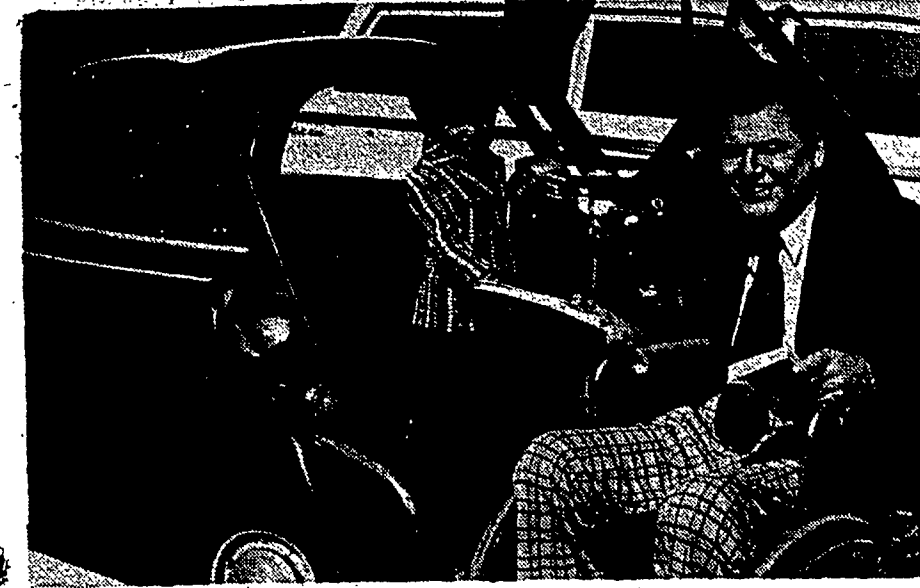

1976 Niles vehicle and animal applications



"To save gas, instead of driving, mail your 1976 Niles vehicle and animal license applications," states Frank Wagner, Jr., Village Clerk, and his four year old son Frankie as they prepare to take license application forms to the post office for delivery to every resident in the Village of Niles. This packet of forms, called a "data pack", contains applications for next year's vehicle sticker, animal tag and free bicycle license. As an added convenience a pre-addressed return envelope is also contained in the "data pack", along with some local ordinance laws that new as well as established residents will find helpful.

1976 Niles vehicle stickers, like state license plates, cannot be displayed until Dec. 1. Clerk Wagner is also reminding citizens over 62 years of age, that they may purchase one passenger vehicle sticker for only \$5 instead of the \$10 charge.

Mail early and be first to display your new Bicentennial 1976 Niles vehicle sticker!

Included this year are the new regulations concerning animals, that will be of benefit to all residents who are animal owners.

Clerk Wagner states that after the Village receives the completed applications, it will mail out the appropriate number of licenses to the applicant. He further states that is you haven't received your "data pack" by Dec. 1 to call 967-6100 and another will be sent to you. Additional vehicle sticker, animal tag and bicycle tag applications may be obtained at the Village Administration Building, 7601 Milwaukee ave., and will be mailed to any resident upon request.

Niles girl meets King Olav V of Norway

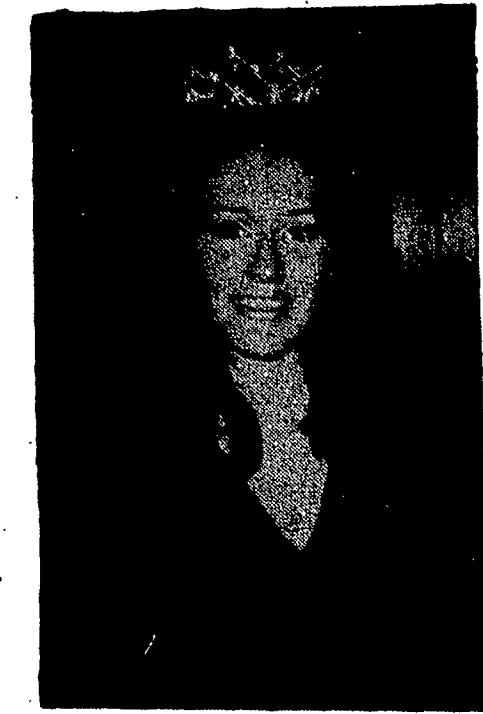
Princess Debra Susan Czeszewski of Niles was one of a chosen few who actually got to meet and shake hands with His Majesty King Olav V of Norway.

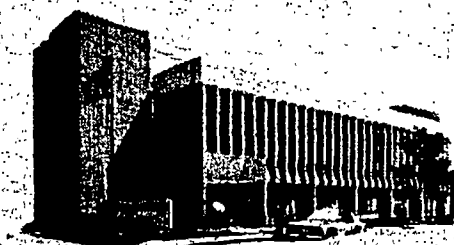

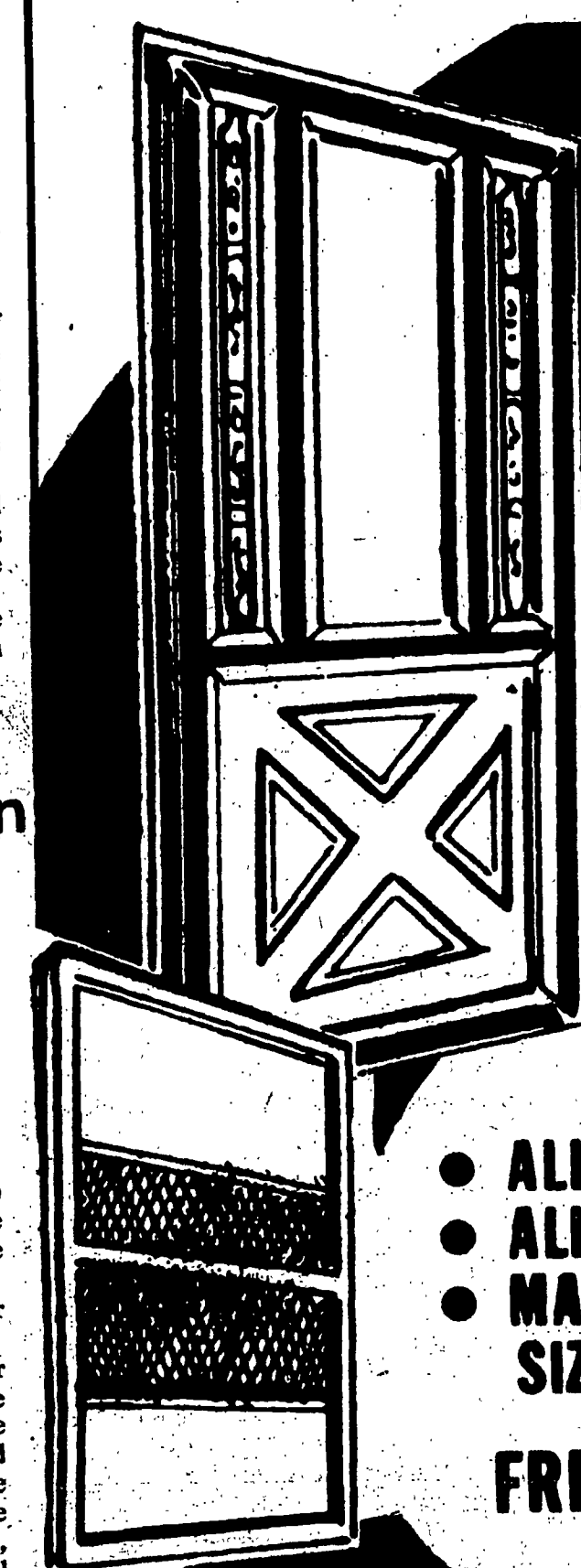

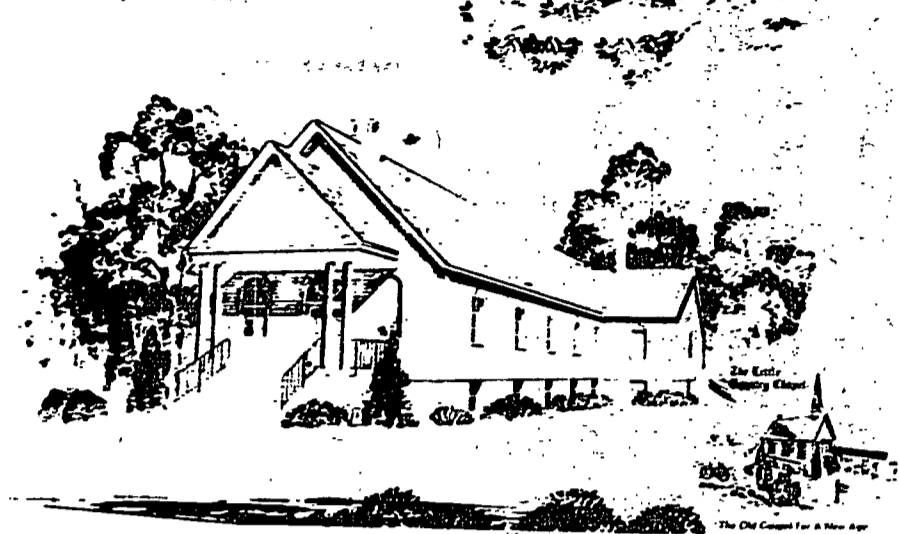

Ground breaking ceremonies for First Baptist Church

Ground-breaking ceremonies were held Sunday, Oct. 19, for the new addition of The Little Country Chapel (First Baptist Church), 7339 Waukegan rd. Members and friends looked on as Pastor Roger L. McManus; Deacons Roy Anderson and Roger Rowe; Niles Village Trustee Ang. Marcheschi, and former Niles Mayor John Calef took their turn with the shovel. The Faith & Victory Choral sang songs of praise and Mr. Calef recounted some history of the building as well as how he, as a little boy, helped his father dig out the basement.

The over 100-year-old structure is considered a "landmark" in

the village and was granted a zoning variation in order to use wood in the new construction. Remodeling and expansion of the church will begin immediately and the architectural design will retain the "old country" church appearance. Services and meetings will go on uninterrupted in the church while the work progresses.

Cost of construction is estimated at \$70,000. Over \$50,000 has been raised by selling Serial Sinking Fund Bonds, offering 7%, 7 1/2%, 8%, 8 1/2%, 9% and 9 1/2% interest, in denominations of \$100, \$250, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000, with maturities one year

"As usual," commented Park Commissioner Jack Leske, "everybody had a very exciting time."

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
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News Briefs

The Illinois Dept. of Transportation declined last week to reduce the 40 m.p.h. speed limit on Oakton st. from Caldwell to Greenwood on the basis of a speed study which indicated that a reduction "is not warranted at this time."

Niles Director of Public Services Keith Peck had requested the reduction in a Sept. letter directed to State District Engineer Sigmund Ziegowski asking that the Oakton speed rate be lessened to conform with Skokie Ridge limits on the east of 30 or 35 m.p.h. by reason of safety and reducing the accident rate.

Ziegowski's reply indicated that the survey showed a good percentage speed of 47 m.p.h. with a 68% violation rate "for that section of highway." Car speeds had been recorded by concealed radar of up to 55 m.p.h. he said. Therefore, he reasoned, any reduction of speed would increase the violation rate rather than slow traffic.

Speed limits are set nationally argued Peck with 60% violation rate. "Why not set a reduced rate on Oakton and enforce the decision?"

Mayor Nicholas Blase opined that reduction would be possible under Home Rule "if the village would undertake the necessary surveys of speed pattern, etc., and indicate to the State that enforcement of reduced speed rates would be followed in an orderly fashion."

As for the speed limit change, he said, "20 m.p.h. seems low and 30 m.p.h. too high," setting a median of 25 m.p.h. as "better."

Speed limits on certain streets, he indicated, such as Howard st. or Ballard west of Milwaukee ave. would not be reduced.

Blase also asked for police recommendations under Home Rule on a village ordinance requiring motorists to wear helmets. Under State law helmets are not required, he said.

In other business Trustee DeSole told the Board that the Scanning Ordinance would be presented at the Nov. 10 meeting. Response to an article published in The Eagle recently had been so great that calls were being transferred to the Administration Building. Callers are unanimously agreed to demand individual price stamping, he said. Two callers indicated possession of petitions for hand stamping of items.

Trustee Abe Selman announced that Youth Essay winners by invitation will appear on the State Lottery TV program Nov. 6 at 7 p.m.

Trustees approved a 3-way stop sign at the intersection of Clinton and Davis st. to reduce speeding south of Golf Mill Park.

Bids were opened for four 19 to 20 passenger Motor Coach buses from 5 companies: Mini Bus, Inc. and A. M. General Corp. of Wayne, Mich. offered no bid. Knoxville Trucks Sales, Tenn. \$67,815.40; Aero Coach and Equip. Co. \$95,434.49 and Truck Ranch Co. of Des Plaines \$74,354.96. Bids were referred to village administration for recommendation.

Trustees conditionally approved (re parking complications) a Special Use variation to Pleasantville Nursing Home, 6840 Touhy ave., for a 100-bed addition to the present facility.

Approved a Special Use zoning change at 8199 Golf rd. for construction of a Four Flags State Bank and a 6-lane drive up facility predicated on village-

approved bank security devices.

Continued to Nov. 10 the petition by Pizzo Hut for a Special Use zoning at 8999 Milwaukee ave. for study of newly submitted building plans and for clarification of Ballard and Milwaukee ave. exits.

Mayor Blase appointed a Building Code Committee of (chairman) Arg Marchesini, Carol Panek and Ralph Bass. Committee members will be appointed annually to investigate building code disputes.

Approved letting of bids for opening on Dec. 9 for a Fire Dept. Squad Pumper priced at \$71,000. Sale of out-dated squad apparatus will almost offset the cost of the new pumper, noted a fire dept. spokesman. With an 18 to 24 month delivery time, the fire pumper purchase is required mid-fiscal year due to a projected 3% increase on apparatus at the beginning of 1976.

Mayor Blase indicated denial of a proposed request for addition of 3 fire dept. personnel at this time.

Unanimously approved a village ordinance reducing cab fare pull rates from 60 cents to 45 cents and raising waiting time from \$6 per hour to \$8 per hour. In requesting the reduction the Niles Cab Co. representative said the rate would mainly affect riders taking cabs outside Niles toward Chicago. Niles residents will pay more to take a cab to and from O'Hare Airport if delayed in traffic.

Approved a Special Use variation for a Venetian Monument Sales Co. at 8445 Milwaukee ave. predicated on word fencing, Panek and Selman dissenting.

Sharp increases in meat and dairy products were primarily responsible for the increase over the April 26 prices.

Noting the striking increase in meat prices, Milva reported that the April 26 price of eight meat items was \$10.36. The price of the same eight meat items Sept. 27 was \$12.51 - more than a 20% increase.

In the dairy products category, all four items included in the market basket have gone up substantially according to the Milva statistics: sliced American cheese up to \$1.09 from 94 cents, eggs up to 77 cents from 61 cents, cottage cheese up to 72 cents from the April price of 63 cents, and the smallest increase - in a half gallon of low fat milk - up one cent to 72 cents from the April price of 71 cents.

Milva's periodic price checks began in June, 1974, and have been used to chart the fluctuations of food prices for residents. The same stores are used in each survey.

The survey includes grocery stores in Des Plaines, Evanston, Glenview, Lincolnwood, Morton Grove, Niles, Northbrook, Park

Station and the trustees referred them to Huber and Jim Dahm for their study and recommendations.

Ed Einze told the board that there is a water loss of some 22% which was causing some concern. Einze then moved to advertise for bids for the services of a leak finding company. The bids are to be opened on Nov. 7. The board voted in favor of the motion. Einze also said that he wanted permission to have some experts study the possibility of drawing up a modern Plumbing Code for Morton Grove. It was noted that specification for bids for the new addition to the Public Works Garage are available at Charles Conlon and Associates.

Herb Houndt said that Public Works Supt. Jim Dahm wanted to advertise for bids for a 12' salt spreader which should cost a little less than \$5,000. Houndt so moved and set the bid opening for Thursday, Nov. 6, at 11 a.m. Specs can be picked up at the Public Works garage.

John Hilkin said he felt Bart Connors, the Morton Grove gymnast who has competed in the Pan Am Games and is an Olympic candidate, should get some recognition from the village. The board agreed.

In regards to the proposed Housing for the Elderly Ordinance, John Hilkin said he had several questions concerning this. One was the 80' height limit in a B1 area. The other was the .5 for parking. Joe Sweeney said that all that was required was .33 for parking, but then said that from a survey of many Senior Citizens buildings that was quite adequate. Most of those occupying these apartments do not have cars according to Sweeney. Another question in Hilkin's mind was the one of eligibility. Mr. Sweeney responded by saying that so far he does not know of any instance where that clause has been questioned. Ron Henrici said he was not in favor of the one-room convertible type of apartment, although he did approve the other types. Mr. Sweeney answered since this type of apartment was approved by HUD and IDA, it was felt it should be included in our ordinance. John Hilkin said he wanted more time to explore the height factor and give it some further consideration. In the end the discussion was tabled indefinitely.

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

Sunday, we began a 4-week period in a new role as the father-of-the-bride-to-be. At a bridal shower for my oldest daughter, we were cast in the role of photographer. Since I'm new in this role I didn't fill it very well. While the chattering ladies ate their lunch, I found myself a couch in the motel's lobby and soon was dozing off. By the time I awoke, most of the festivities were over and my picture-taking missed most of the action. Those who searched for me concentrated on the bar, where a football game was being viewed, and also looked for me in a public auction, which was taking place in the motel. It was an afternoon where the father-of-the-bride-to-be pulled a real blooper.

Monday we attended a press conference with Congressman Mikva and guest Al Ullman. As chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, Ullman is preparing his tax reform bill which is aimed at closing loopholes in our present tax system. Ullman came across as a very sincere, conscientious public servant.

Following the press conference the Lerner Newspapers hosted a luncheon for the Congressman. We're sure they made a great effort in promoting the luncheon and many of those in attendance (who paid 8 bucks) were shortchanged by Ullman's speech. He spent 10 minutes saying what a great Congressman Mikva is, and for another 20 minutes, spoke in such round general terms interspersed with sophomoric generalities, unworthy of any of our local politicians. We had to leave when the question and answer period began and perhaps the tempo improved. But we felt sorry for 3 retired senior citizens sitting at our table, who came to be enlightened, and were fed such pabulum that they must have gone home mentally hungry, and for 8 bucks yet!

After the luncheon we went downtown and spent an hour and a half at the Fulle trial in the Federal building. The defense was presenting several character witnesses attesting to Fulle's integrity.

One witness, Joe Ferstl, head of the Illinois and Cook County Press & Publishers Associations, came downtown to present information which allegedly would show Fulle did not profit in his role as a County official and as a publisher. In this dual role Fulle might have received an abnormal amount of legal notices, but Ferstl had information which would attest to Fulle's integrity. But each time he tried to present the information, the prosecutors objected and Judge Decker sustained the objections. It happened 6 or 7 times. It indeed was a frustrating experience, preparing the information, and then not being able to present it.

Outside the courtroom we were speaking to Fulle when I suddenly wasn't feeling too well. We got into the fast elevator and descended 22 floors. When we were in the lobby, I was fast losing a grip on myself, a feeling I'd never had before. My fingers were tingling, my head was spinning and I rushed to a chair and put my head down for a moment to clear the air.

Ferstl, who was the witness whose efforts were frustrated by the Judge's upholding objections to his testimony, was my security blanket during this momentary problem. He stayed with me, then gathered me into his car, at a time when I felt quite helpless. But my head cleared quickly and I got thru the next hour with little difficulty.

Since Ferstl, who is executive vice president of the Lerner papers, was so kind to me, I wouldn't dare cast aspersions on the luncheon we had a few hours before, sponsored by his newspapers. But I'll think twice and even thrice in the future about eating a free lunch sponsored by a competitor of ours.

As my friend Pinky says, "There's no free lunch."
