Since I'm new in this role I didn't fill it very well. While the chattering ladies ate their lunch. I found myself a couch in the motel's lobby and soon was dozing off. By the time I awoke, most of the festivities were over and my picture-taking missed most of the action. Those who searched for me concentrated on the bar, where a football game was being viewed, and also looked for me in a public auction, which was taking place in the motel. It was an afternoon where the father-of-the-bride-to-be

Monday we attended a press conference with Congressman Mikva and guest Al Ullman. As chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, Ullman is preparing his tax reform bill which is aimed at closing loopholes in our present tax system. Ullman came across as a very sincere, conscientious public

Following the press conference the Lerner Newspapers hosted a luncheon for the Congressman. We're sure they made a great effort in promoting the luncheon and many of those in attendance (who paid 8 bucks) were shortchanged by Ullman's speech. He spent 10 minutes saying what a great Congressman Mikva is, and for another 20 minutes, spoke in such round general terms interspersed with sophomorie generalities, unworthy of any of our local politicians. We had to leave when the question and answer period began and perhaps the tempo improved. After the luncheon we went downtown and spent an hour and a half at the Fulle trial in the Federal building. The defense was presenting several character witnesses attesting to Fulle's integrity.

One witness, Joe Ferstl, head of the Illinois and Cook County Press & Publishers Associations, came downtown to present information which allegedly would show Fulle did not profit in his role as a County official and as a publisher. In this dual role Fulle might have received an abnormal amount of legal notices, but Ferstl had information which would attest to Fulle's integrity. But each time he tried to present the information, the prosecutors objected and Judge Decker sustained the objections. It happened 6 or 7 times. It indeed was a frustrating experience, preparing the information, and then not being able to present it.

Outside the courtroom we were speaking to Fulle when I suddenly wasn't feeling too well. We got into the fast elevator and descended 22 floors. When we were in the lobby, I was fast losing a grip on myself, a feeling I'd never had before. My fingers were tingling, my head was spinning and I rushed to a chair and put my head down for a moment to clear the air.

Ferstl, who was the witness whose efforts were frustrated by the Judge's upholding objections to his testimony, was my security blanket during this momentary problem. He stayed with me, then gathered me into his car, at a time when I felt quite helpless. But my head cleared quickly and I got thru the next hour with little difficulty.

Since Ferstl, who is executive vice president of the Lerner papers, was so kind to me, I wouldn't dare cast aspersions on the luncheon we had a few hours before, sponsored by his newspapers. But I'll think twice and even thrice in the future about eating a free lunch sponsored by a competitor of ours.

As my friend Pinky says, "There's no free lunch."





Mr. Bacon has won several such awards in area shows.

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


