SETTING THE.STAGE...the idea of a performing arts center i Niles is taking substance with the recent addition of two more members on the executive board, which will make decisions on the concept, programming and operations of a community theater.

The nine executive committee members are Bill Hughes, Niles Park District director; Elaine Heinen, park commissioner; Carol Panek, former village trustee, Veda Kauffman, former Gal Friday to Mayor Nicholas Blase; Gary Karshna, Niles finance director; Karol Verson, Diane Lewandowski, Guido Girolami and Anita Ashcroft.

Stepping into the picture is Dreamscape, a theater guild in the northwest suburbs. Guild representatives at the last committee meeting said they were interested in leasing space at the proposed performing arts center...which has been on the village's "wish list" for many years.

According to Joe Jensen representing Dreamscape, the potential for a cultural arts center in the village is unlimited, in which he envisions branching out into the video field ... taping performances and marketing them for theater buffs unable to attend live performances.

If the dream of a performing arts center is realized, it may be located at the Lawrencewood shopping center utilizing the vacant Lawrencwood Theater. The theater sits on a parcel of land earmarked for the village in a settlement made to end the shopping center's condemnation suit.

Some day...theater buffs in Niles may be singing "There's No Business Like Show Business" if the decision is made to go ahead with the project.

State gives motorcycle safety tips

Motorcycle safety depends on the motorcyclist being seen by other motorists. If you ride a motorcycle, two of the best ways to help drivers see you are to ride in the center of the traffic lane with your headlight on and to use your turn signals.

Each traffic lane gives a motorcyclist three "mini-lanes," Transportation, there were and perhaps more severe acci- or four-foot-wide paths of travel. Although grease strips caused by droppings from other vehicles can take up to two feet of the middle "mini-lane," you can ride to the left or right of the grease strip and still be within the center portion of the traffic lane.

> Turn signals not only tell others what you plan to do, but make you easier to see. Use your turn signals whenever you turn or change lanes, even if you think no one else is around. The car you do not see is the one that will give you the most trouble. Do not forget to turn your signal off. If you leave it on, an oncoming driver may think you plan to turn again and pull directly into your path.



The Walk registration is from 7-8:30. The Walk begins at 8:30 and officially ends at 5. The average time of completion is 5-6

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





Greetings from GOLF MILL. Last column we hope we heightened your appreciation of retail specialization. GOLF MILL'S development as a mall has not, and probably never will be, haphazard. Existing Businesses and those opening in the future have done their homework. In an evolutionary chain of influences-from marketing researchers at the home offices to mall management-a myriad of merchandising decisions and transactions have gone on behind the scenes.

A good example is THIS END UP, a furniture store whose outlets are all located in shopping malls. Last visit, their manager (who prefers to use her nickname), Muffie, not only lauded their product but also the benefits of working for a company where the emphasis is on informality. Don't let the outward informality fool you. Volumes could be written on the attention to quality, attractiveness, and other aspects involved in producing and marketing their furniture.

It's kind of like the children's story, This is the House That Jack Built. THIS END UP builds their pieces out of solid, kilndried northern yellow pine-the kind of wood used for flooring and house trim. It's heavy, hard, and shock resistant. Muffie told us, "Scratches only enhance the beauty of the wood, or if one prefers, they can sand them down. Each piece has a life-

Going backwards one step in reference to the wood the owners, Steve Robertson and Randall Ward, recognized another important detail. These two young men are products of a generation that saw the need for environmental conservation and base their business decisions on conservation considerations. 



Dudycz supports plan for mandatory auto insurance

State Senator Walter Dudycz \$1,000. (R-7th, Chicago) thinks 1988 Assembly will require drivers in and Sen. Robert Raica (R-Chicago). Illinois to carry liability insurance.

Dudycz is co-sponsoring Senate Bill 2180, which proposes a man datory auto insurance plan unveiled April 11 by Secretary of State Jim Edgar.

"Mandatory auto insurance is gaining more and more support in Illinois. Many people are tired of footing the bill for motorists who are not responsible enough to carry liability insurance," Dudycz said. "Driving is a privilege and every motorist must accept the responsibilities that go with the privilege."

Edgar's proposal would require motorists to carry insurance cards and show them to law enforcement officers when requested. The Secretary of State's office would also run random checks of vehicle owners to determine if they are insured.

"Statistics show that two million of the seven million registered cars and pickup trucks in Illinios are not covered by insurance. According to the state Department of Transportaion, 26 percent of passenger cars are uninsured and more than 60,000 uninsured drivers are involved in accidents annually," Dudycz

A motorist convicted of a first offense of driving uninsured would face a minimum \$500 fine and have his/her vehicle registration suspended for at least two months. A first offender would also have to pay a \$50 fee to have the registration reinstated. Multiple offenders would face a

minimum four-month suspension and a \$100 fee for reinstatement. If a motorist is caught driving a vehicle while its registration is suspended for non-insurance, he/she would be fined at least

Braidwood Unit 2 starts up

Commonwealth Edision's Braidwood Unit 2, the last generating unit in the company's recently completed construction program, achieved its first chain reaction today and has begun a series of low power tests. The 1120-megawatt unit is expected to reach 5 percent power by the end of March. Authorization for full power operation from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission [NRC] is anticipated later this month. Braidwood 2 is scheduled to be placed in commercial operation during 1988, becoming Edison's 12th operating nuclear

The completion of the twin-unit facility marked the end of the company's construction program which began in the early 1970's to help assure the residents of Edison's northern Illinois service territory of an adequate, reliable supply of electricity into the 21st Century.

Braidwood 2 will add to a nuclear generating capability that already is producing record fuel adjustment credits for Edison customers. The March fuel credit, the sixth in a row, is the largest in the company's history, resulting in a kilowatthour charge reduction in Edison's residential rate of 9.6 percent to 15.9 percent of the basic rates.

The monthly fuel adjustment is a credit or charge applied to each kwh used and is directly linked to Edison's fuel costs. Nuclear fuel costs are about one-fourth those of coal, which provides the bulk of the remainder of Edison's power needs.





These latter years of the 80's are a most serendipitous time for reading teachers and their students. Why? Because "literature" has returned to the elementary school classroom, often replacing the basic reading text. As a result, teachers report that reading class becomes more fulfilling in terms of reading growth and student satisfaction.

What do we mean when we use the term "literature"? In the elementary school, literature means all of those children's novels, stories, and poems (new and old) which are beautifully written and stir the imaginations of youthful readers. They are works which deal with the universal issues that concern young students or may provide a magical escape from daily life. Folk tales, tall tales, fantasies, mysteries, science fiction, nonsense rhymes. Sad stories, humorous stories, World War II stories, Revolutionary War stories.

The list is endless. Culver School teachers in Niles often find that when a class shares the reading and discussion of a fifth and sixth grade "hit"

like Fred Gipson's **Old Yeller**, the atmosphere of intense interest is almost tangible. Such literature is eminently teachable. How did this resurgence of children's literature as texts in the reading class come about? In part, teachers have learned that when students read dull, contrived selections in basal readers, many are unenthusiastic about reading class. Also the workbooks accompanying the text burden the student with exercises which provide practice of isolated skills unrelated to the subject of the stories. Such lessons may also have contributed to "aliteracy" - a condition all too prevalent which means that children can read, but

don't. Because dull stories turn children off, more and more teachers have chosen to teach reading by using enduring languagerich books - preceding and following the reading with activities requiring creative and critical thinking. Culver School reading teachers do continue to teach from a basal reader or anthology for part of the year. However, they also teach at least two novels during the year. Available to them on the shelves of the reading room are classroom sets of about 25 novels - all highly recommended as well as children pleasers. Favorites of the fifth grade are Old Yeller, The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe, and Bridge to

black family in the rural south. Seventh graders often read April Morning, The Cay, and Light in the Forest. In eighth grade Animal Farm, A Day No Pigs Would Die, and The Diary of Anne Frank are basic. All provide infinite opportunities for laughter, tears, thoughtful discussions, critical thinking, responsive writing, and even art projects. Nor are they soon forgotten by the students. Such quality reading helps comprehension, which, of course, is

the sole purpose of real-world reading. A characteristic of good readers is that they not only comprehend but truly "see pictures in their minds". When reading a fascinating book or story, students are most likely to "see" vivid mental pictures or setting, characters, and events of the plot.

In addition, the Culver School curriculum includes in-depth literature units of several weeks of duration based on America's tall tales for the fifth grade, folk tales for sixth grade, Greek and Roman mythology for the seventh grade, and poetry for the eighth grade. Characters and plots from these units are part and parcel of our "cultural literacy" and will serve as reference points for the students again and again throughout life. For instance, the term "Pandora's Box" derives from the Greek myth about the toocurious Pandora and appears without fail in newspaper headlines several times a year. And when last year's seventh grade visited the Museum of Science and Industry, they greeted the statues of the

Greek gods in the entryway like old friends. Reading aloud to students, even those in the upper grades, has become another satisfying and successful classroom activity in the middle school. Jim Trelease's popular book The Read-Aloud Handbook which provides "a detailed guide to more than 300 great readaloud books" is used as a reference by many teachers and parents and has definitely encouraged the revival of reading to children regularly.

The mischievous and adventurous Tom Sawyer, for instance, came to life again over the last two years for seventh and eighth graders at Culver when a teacher read the book aloud. It was a much more satisfying experience than watching the sentimentalized movies. However, teachers are not adverse to showing a movie version in class after reading or hearing a book. This practice provides wonderful opportunities for critical comparisons and contrasts with the author's words. Most often the book receives greater acclaim than the movie.

Finally, evidence of the return of excellent literature is everywhere. When the Suburban Council of the International Reading Association recently sponsored a conference titled "Reading, Writing, and Children's Literature: a Winter Celebration" on a frigid Saturday morning, about 200 area reading teachers attended. The May 1988 national reading conversation for reading teachers also lists many sessions on the subject. Of course, the Niles Public Library's own Battle of the Books programs which involves all of Niles' elementary schools expands and knowledge of fine children's literature for both coaches and children with its lists of 85 books. And a brand new magazine for teachers of children's literature, The New Advocate, just published its first issue.

Schools may be receiving heavy criticism these days but reading teachers and their students are rejuvenated and much more inspired now that children's literature is back in the classroom.



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Kustra calls for merit selection

State Senator Bob Kustra (R-28 Des Plaines) has proposed a Constitutional Amendment calling for merit selection of judges in Illinois.

"We have been working for merit selection for several years," Kustra said. "This time we have the backing of Governor Thompson along with the recommendations of the special Judicial Merit Selection Task Force and good bipartisan support in both houses of the General Assembly. We need to move on this now."

Kustra went on to explain that voters complain to him about having to deal with long lists of unfamiliar judicial candidates on election day.

"They don't know these people, have no idea if they are qualified, or - in veiw of Greylord - if they are honest, let alone if they meet experience qualifications. Prominent lawyers have told me that many of the judicial candidates' names are unfamiliar to them

He continued, "Often judges are selected solely on the basis of political party support. Our court system is far too important to allow the selection of our judges to be made on that basis alone." Three names would be submitted for each judicial seat. The Governor would then appoint each of the judges to the Supreme, Appellate and Circuit courts from those names.

Organ donor...

Gorell's proclamation says, "Many already have been given the gift of hearing or sight, or unshankled from dialysis machines or given the gift of life itself with new hearts or livers. Yet, so many more will wait in vain because there aren't enough donors.'

According to officials at the Regional Organ Bank of Illinois (ROBI), every family should hold discussions about organ and tissue donation. With the implementation of state and federal 'Required Request" laws, every one has the potential of becoming involved with the donation process. The laws state that family members of potential organ and tissue donors must be asked, at the time of death, if they would donate. The family has the right to grant or refuse donation. ROBI says the decision process would be easier if the family held prior discussions.

At the present time, the Illinois transplant waiting list includes 535 waiting for kidneys, 51 waiting for hearts, 27 waiting for livers, 11 waiting for pancreata, and 200 waiting for corneas. One 'half of the children waiting for livers will die for lack of a transplant. One third of the adults waiting for hearts will die for lack of a transplant.

Skokie residents can do something about this sad state of affairs by signing organ donor cards or the organ donor card on the back of the Illinois driver's license. By law, all organ donor cards are the same.

Those signing donor cards may chose to: (A) Give any needed organs or tissues; (B) Give specific organs and tissues; (C) science. It is not possible to the exception of the corneas, and then give the body for medical research.


