## Niles woman interprets for Russian/U.S. forum

"I didn't have any feelings one way or another as interpreter for the Russian delegation during their visit here. I was simply doing a job as they were supposed to do as representatives of their country," said Miriam Pushel, a former Russian citizen and a two-year resident of Niles.

Pushel, who left the Soviet Union as a political refugee seven years ago took on the role of interpreter for several hours during a Russian-United States international exchange forum on common problems focusing on alcohol and drug abuse.

Registered nurses and dietitians from Resurrection Hospital will instruct participants in the special American Red Cross certification program. Choosing the right invitation style for your wedding is among the most important tasks a couple must undertake before their wedding.

Order invitations three months before your wedding day to allow time for printing, addressing, and mailing. Visit your department store, local printer, jeweler or bridal salon to order them. Be sure to request a sample to check for mistakes before your order is printed.

Inviting your favorite people to celebrate your wedding is a big part of the day's fun. If you're having a larger wedding (100 or more guests) you'll want to send formal wedding invitations.

Word for formal invitations the traditional way. And do write out what you want before you order. Or ask your printer to show you personalized versions. If all your guests are being invited to both ceremony and reception, consider the "combination" invitation, below.

Mr. and Mrs. John Sampson request the honor of your presence at the Marriage of their Daughter Teresa Dawn

to Mr. Darrell Charles Tucker on Saturday, the Fourth of August at Four O'Clock St. James Church Mt. Prospect, Illinois and Afterwards at Old Orchard Country Club.

Request replies with an R.S.V.P., kindly Respond, or Please Respond in the lower left corner, and make it easy for guests to mail them. Printed reply cards do make it easy for guests. But traditionally, they're reserved for business functions only. If you use cards, why not "code" the envelope with different stamps for your guests and his. It'll make it easier to give an accurate head count to the caterer.

Spell everything on formal invitation: the wedding date, time and all numerals, and names. No

abbreviations, initials or nicknames are used - except Mr., Oe., Mrs., and Jr. Traditionally, only the bride's first and middle names are printed. But if you're a doctor or military officer, you can add your title and full name below the phrase, "their daughter." You may not want to add Mr. before your fiancé's name.

Begin your invitations with the name of the person(s) sponsoring the wedding. The name at the top of an invitation is not supposed to tell your guests who's paying the bills, so whether you live at home or not, your parents' names should head the invitations. You might also include the groom's parents name below his on the invitation... John North Flemingson of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fleming... If your parents are deceased, your guardian, a relative, or a friend can host the wedding. Or you two can be your own sponsors. If your parents are divorced, the parent who raised

you usually does the inviting. If that's your mother, and she's remarried, she uses your stepfather's name, inserts the phrase at the marriage of their daughter... then adds your full name. Divorced but friendly parents can issue a joint invitation.

Have your formal invitations printed in black script on the top page of a double sheet of paper in pale ivory or white. It can be paneled or plain. The most popular size 4 1/4" x 5 3/4" fits into an envelope without folding. A larger size 5 1/4" x 7 1/4" is folded once for mailing. It's for very formal weddings.

Add more "personality" to your invitations by choosing a translucent (parchment perhaps) or shiny paper in a pretty pastel or an earthy tone. Use color foil ink, or even a photograph of the two of you.

Bracelets were once an indispensable part of every well-dressed man's attire, worn by everyone from King Tutankhamun to Shakespeare. Now that men are rediscovering their jewelry heritage, bracelets are back in a big way. Wrist chains with bold, interesting links are among the most popular styles. # Bugle Bridal Guide



## Questions brides ask

- Q. Who gives the clergyman his fee?  
A. The groom pays, but best man hands it over in plain white envelope before or after the ceremony.
- Q. May a house wedding be just as formal as a church wedding?  
A. Yes, although there are never as many attendants.
- Q. How can wedding gifts be displayed if a home reception isn't being held?  
A. Close friends may be invited to a tea or cocktail party several days before the wedding.
- Q. Are checks displayed with wedding presents?  
A. No, but they may be noted on a card.
- Q. Is it correct to use "and family" on invitation envelopes?  
A. No. Send separate invitations to adult sons and daughters. For small children address the outside envelope to their parents, write their first names on the inner envelope under their parents' names.
- Q. How should invitation be inserted in envelope?  
A. Invitation is folded with the
- wording outside and put in the inner envelope (which has no gum on flap) with the folded edge down. The inner envelope is then placed in the outer one facing the flap.
- Q. Are reception cards enclosed with invitations?  
A. Yes, and so are the reply cards and reply envelopes. The home address would be printed on reply envelopes.
- Q. Are identifying cards put with the presents on display?  
A. Not these days.
- Q. Are gifts ever brought to the reception?  
A. No.
- Q. Do ushers and best man stand in receiving line?  
A. No.
- Q. May guests be invited to a reception and not the wedding itself?  
A. Yes, when the ceremony is attended only by relatives and close friends.
- Q. Must invitations be engraved?  
A. They can be. However, simulated engraving is less expensive and just as satisfactory.

## Groom's wedding check list

- Just as the bride has her check list for her wedding, so has the groom, reports the Jewelry Industry Council, which submits the following list to help the groom make the wedding plans go smoothly.
- After Engagement**  
Make up your guest list and give it to your fiancée. Visit the clergyman or justice of the peace together. Discuss wedding expenses with fiancée and both sets of parents. Select your best man and ushers and invite them to participate; you will need about one usher for every 50 guests.
- Six Months Before**  
Discuss honeymoon plans with fiancée; make transportation and accommodations arrangements. Update your passport if you plan to go abroad, and check on visas and inoculations needed.
- Three Months Before**  
Select wedding rings with fiancée. Order wedding attire, and talk with ushers about their wedding attire. Complete plans for honeymoon; buy tickets.
- One Month Before**  
Make arrangements for flowers for bridal bouquet, going away corsage, boutonnières for best man and ushers, and mothers' corsages. Pick up wedding rings, check engraving. Arrange lodging for out-of-town relatives and ushers.
- Two Weeks Before**  
Select bridal gift and gifts for attendants. Get legal, medical and religious documents for the wedding in order. Check that ushers have ordered their attire.
- Go with fiancée to get marriage license. Organize bachelor dinner with best man. Double check honeymoon reservations. Make sure to arrange transportation from the reception to wherever you are planning to leave on your honeymoon. Move belongings to new home.
- One Week Before**  
Make sure best man notifies ushers of rehearsal time and place. Explain any special seating to head usher. Pack for your honeymoon and get going-away clothes ready to change into after reception. Present gifts to attendants at bachelor party.

## How to plan the perfect honeymoon

When planning your trip, start with a good travel agent. She can be a big help by arranging ground transportation, sightseeing tours, theater tickets and providing information about currency, passports, good restaurants and points of interest.

## Planning your wedding

### ANNOUNCING YOUR ENGAGEMENT

- Announcements should be sent to the newspapers, both in your home town and your fiancée's, if he lives elsewhere. Type or print all information. Indicate the date when you would like the announcement to appear. Allow plenty of time. Be sure your name, address and telephone number are on the upper right hand corner.
- Many papers and some photographers have forms on which to fill in your name, your fiancée's name, names and residences of both sets of parents, background material on you both, and the expected date of your wedding. Society editors decide how much of this they can use. You may send along an 8" by 10" glossy photograph.

### AN ENGAGEMENT PARTY

- Often the bride's family wishes to celebrate the official announcement with a party for the couple. If the bride's family lives a great distance away, the groom's parents may do this, if they wish. It is absolutely essential that both the bride and her fiancée be in attendance. If this is not possible (military separation, school separation, etc.), the party must wait.
- The engagement party usually includes relatives and close friends and is given in the form of a cocktail party, dinner or even a summer barbecue. Informal printed invitations should read: first line: your parents name (or his, if they are hosts); second line: your name (or his); third line: "To meet Thomas Johnson (or Jane Jones)." Handwritten or telephone invitations are also correct.

- Determine your budget with your parents and decide whether your wedding will be formal or informal and where the ceremony will take place.
- Visit your clergyman with your fiancée and set the date.
- Plan the reception, reserve all the services you'll need.
- Decide which friends you wish to have for attendants.
- Draw up your invitation list and have your fiancée do this.
- Enroll with the Bridal Consultant of your favorite store and select your wedding dress, veil and accessories.
- Choose attendants' dresses and men's formal wear.
- Select the photographer.
- See your florist.
- Plan your music.
- Plan your home furnishings.

### THREE MONTHS BEFORE THE WEDDING

- Order your invitations, personal stationery and note paper.
- Make plans for your honeymoon destination.
- Begin to shop for your first-year trousseau.
- Have both mothers choose their gowns.
- Visit your doctor. Check on rubella immunization.

### TWO MONTHS BEFORE THE WEDDING

- Plan recording and display of wedding gifts.
- Finish addressing the wedding invitations.
- Decide upon gifts for your attendants.
- Select the wedding ring, if you have not already done so.
- Go with your fiancée to get the marriage license.

### ONE MONTH BEFORE THE WEDDING

- Have your hair styled as you would for the wedding.
- Attend parties in your hometown.
- Make transportation plans for the wedding party.
- Have the final fitting on your bridal gown.
- Arrange for the Bridesmaids'

- gowns to be fitted.
- Order your wedding cake and the package of groom's cake for guests to take home to "dream on."
- Arrange for your rehearsal dinner if you plan to have one.
- Plan accommodations for out-of-town guests.
- Mail your invitations.
- Plan bridesmaids' luncheon.
- Prepare the newspaper announcement of your wedding.
- Make a household check.

### TWO WEEKS BEFORE THE WEDDING

- Record each gift as received.
- Check on attire for everyone in the wedding party.
- Plan how to handle traffic and parking for guests.
- Arrange a seating plan for the reception. If you plan to have a bride's table at the reception, write out place cards.
- Go over personal trousseau.
- Send your typed announcement and glossy photograph to the newspaper.
- Arrange for name change, on social security, etc.
- Arrange to move belongings to your new home.

### ONE WEEK BEFORE

- Have final consultations with caterer, photographer, florist.
- Give bridesmaids' luncheon.
- Have hair done.
- Plan the rehearsal and inform attendants.

## Don't turn reception into 'Wedding War'

SHE GLIDED down the aisle, a vision in white silk and lace. Father smiled. Mother cried. The groom looked smashing in his tux.

No doubt about it, marriage is back in vogue. In the Chicago area alone, more than 20,000 couples tied the knot last year.

What's more, the traditional wedding is increasingly popular. Even if the bride and groom are young professionals, even if they've lived together for the past three years, they want a wedding that exudes innocence and love. Romance is back!

BUT A beautiful wedding just doesn't happen. It takes planning, work and compromise.

Alas, there's nothing romantic about planning a wedding. Few social events equal a wedding for generating stress.

The cost alone causes migraines. According to a Skokie-based wedding consultant, many weddings cost \$10,000. "And couples will pinch pennies to keep the wedding at \$10,000," he said.

Money isn't the problem. Each family has a separate guest list, and guests often range in age from children to great-grandparents. How do you seat them? What type

of food appeals to everyone? What kind of music is acceptable?

**BEFORE MAKING** the arrangements, the bride, groom and their families should sit down and discuss what kind of wedding they want. If the bride and groom want a small wedding and the parents want the big, splashy wedding they themselves never had, make the compromises before making the arrangements. Otherwise, every decision will be the latest battle in "Wedding Wars."

If talking doesn't resolve the differences, writing may. The couple and the family can make lists of "must have" and "negotiable" items. Looking at a written list usually helps to find where there's room for compromise.

Book the room, arrange for a clergyman, and get the dresses first. The size and color of the reception room help determine the size of the wedding and the color scheme of the gowns and flowers. Then arrange for musicians, a photographer, a florist, make the guest list, and order invitations.

IF JUST the thought of making all the arrangements leaves your family cold, think about hiring a consultant.

According to the director of catering at a Lincolnwood hotel, many consultants charge a percentage of the cost of the items. "The nice thing about the consultant is that they'll organize the lives of the people," he said. "They work with

the hotel and take care of all the details."

But if the thought of looking at multiple menu selections doesn't send shivers up your spine, try working on the arrangements yourself. Responsibilities can be divided between family members.

**MOST HOTELS** suggest booking the reception a year in advance. But it's possible to book dates three months in advance.

Hotels generally offer wedding "packages." One package includes two dressing rooms for the bride and groom, a junior suite for the night, a bottle of champagne for the bride and groom, a four-hour open bar, champagne for the toast, a meal including entree, two vegetables, dessert and wedding cake. Prices start at \$27 a person and go to \$38. The entree determines the cost.

Packages vary from hotel to hotel. Another hotel includes hot and cold hors d'oeuvres but has no wedding cake. Prices range from \$26.75 to \$31.75.

**ETHNIC** and religious restrictions don't pose problems for most hotels.

Both of the spokespersons from a Northbrook hotel and a Lincolnwood hotel, suggested allowing 60 to 66 percent of the wedding party budget for the reception and 33 to

40 percent for the florists, bands, photographers etc.

No package is set in stone. Most hotels, if requested, will replace the open bar with wine served at the table. Liquor usually accounts for 15 to 25 percent of the bill.

**BY THE** time the wedding date draws near, the catering consultant may seem like a member of the family. One consultant at a hotel in Itasca, referred to the brides as "all my children." She once cancelled a vacation to work with a

bride whose wedding date was moved up.

Many families want to trim costs. Director of catering at the hotel in Itasca will also suggest ways for cutting costs. For example, candles can be substituted for floral displays.

But for some families the sky's the limit. The Itasca director of catering recalls weddings with indoor fireworks and laser shows. Wedding decorations included ice sculptures of castles, swans and even people riding bicycles.

## Hints for Brides-to-be

Best wishes! Wedding days can bring happy memories that you may want to keep alive forever with photographs. How to choose the best photographer for your wedding? How should you prepare for a formal bridal portrait photo session? Here are some tips and suggestions from the experts that may help you look your very best in your wedding photographs, while saving you trouble and money.

• Proper planning is important, so get in touch with your prospective photographer, as soon as you have set your wedding date to discuss your wedding photographic coverage, both formal and informal. ## AIDS test

Couples seeking marriage licenses in Illinois now need to add an AIDS blood test to the blood tests traditionally needed before marriage, according to Rep. Penny Pullen (R-55th).

Depending on the lab and the number of analyses that have to be run on an individual blood sample, the testing process can take from a few days to a few weeks," Rep. Pullen said, "so couples ought to allow for the full 30 days the law allows before the license is secured."

Under a law which took effect Jan. 1, all couples must have their blood tested for evidence of infection with the virus that causes AIDS within 30 days of their application for a marriage license. A marriage license is valid after 60 days.

Rep. Pullen stressed that couples will not be required to provide the results of the test to the county clerk. In order to obtain a marriage license, couples need only to provide a certificate signed by a licensed physician that the test has been administered. All Illinois licensed physicians and county clerks have been provided sample certification forms by the Illinois Department of Health.

Prenatal blood testing is one of a package of laws recently enacted by the Illinois General Assembly aimed at stemming the spread of AIDS. The new testing law requires each party to the marriage to be informed of both test results. The physician is required to report confirmed infections to the local or state health department, but current rules preclude reporting the names of infected individuals.

Cost of the AIDS virus tests are borne by the applicants, as with the traditional syphilis test. Test costs can be expected to vary.

"Since the AIDS virus can be transmitted sexually," Rep. Pullen said, "a vast majority of legislators and the governor agreed that both parties to a proposed marriage ought to know—before the wedding and before conceiving a child—whether one of them is carrying the deadly virus." The AIDS virus is known to be transmissible from a mother to her baby before or during birth; about 50 percent of the babies born to infected mothers are themselves infected when born.

"The law does not prohibit the license from being issued—in fact, the county clerk's office will not know whether an infection is present. But we do think it's important for the couple to have the right to know and to make informed decisions," Rep. Pullen said.

"My office has brochures available explaining the premarital testing law and many of the facts about AIDS," she said. "I encourage all engaged couples to visit or call my office for a brochure. We're located at 22 Maine Street in Park Ridge; telephone number is 823-2023. Our hours are Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m."

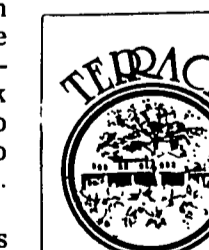

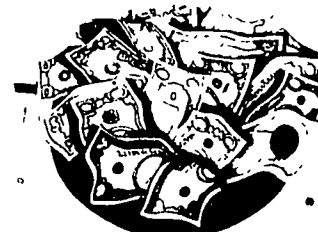
### Tax refund information available

Sitting around wondering "Where's my refund?" Now there's no need to, thanks to a free IRS service that will tell you the status of your tax refund check.

If you mailed in your 1987 Federal income tax return at least ten weeks ago and your refund check has not shown up yet, then dial toll-free 800-554-4477.

This automated service is easy to use, particularly if you have a copy of your income tax return at hand. A pre-recorded message will guide you step-by-step through the process, the IRS says.

Use the push buttons on your touch-tone or tone-signaling phone to enter such information as the amount of refund expected, your filing status, and your social security number. If you have a conventional rotary or pulse-dial phone, an IRS operator will enter this information for you. This computerized service will then tell you if your return is in process or when your refund check is scheduled to be sent. If there is a problem with your return, you will be requested to contact the IRS Taxpayer Assistance.

We dropped in at American Vision Center and spoke with optician Larry Gusk. Last visit we shared how Larry became interested in optics. He originally started as a submarine periscope technician in the military and went on to become an expert in optical services.

Larry gave us a tour behind the scenes to show us how glasses are made up. As a layperson we were not sure just how complicated and/or simple the process is.

Larry showed us the large round lenses in the most commonly used prescriptions they start with. These lenses must be prescription and size adjusted before they are inserted into the desired frame.

A machine called a lensometer determines the prescription power needed and "codes" the optical center of the lens. The "coded" lens is then measured against the size of the frame. After the geometric center is determined by a Projecto Marker, the lens is then cut on a machine with two cutting wheels. One wheel is for rough cuts; the other wheel for fine cutting and beveling the edges. Other processes include tinting, polishing beveled edges for rimless frames until they resemble crystal, and treatment of glass lenses.

Larry told us, "People used to go to school to learn these things but the demand for opticians is so great today they are trained on the job." It was fascinating to see the accuracy and swiftness technology provides in this field, but it also takes know how and concentration on the part of the optician.

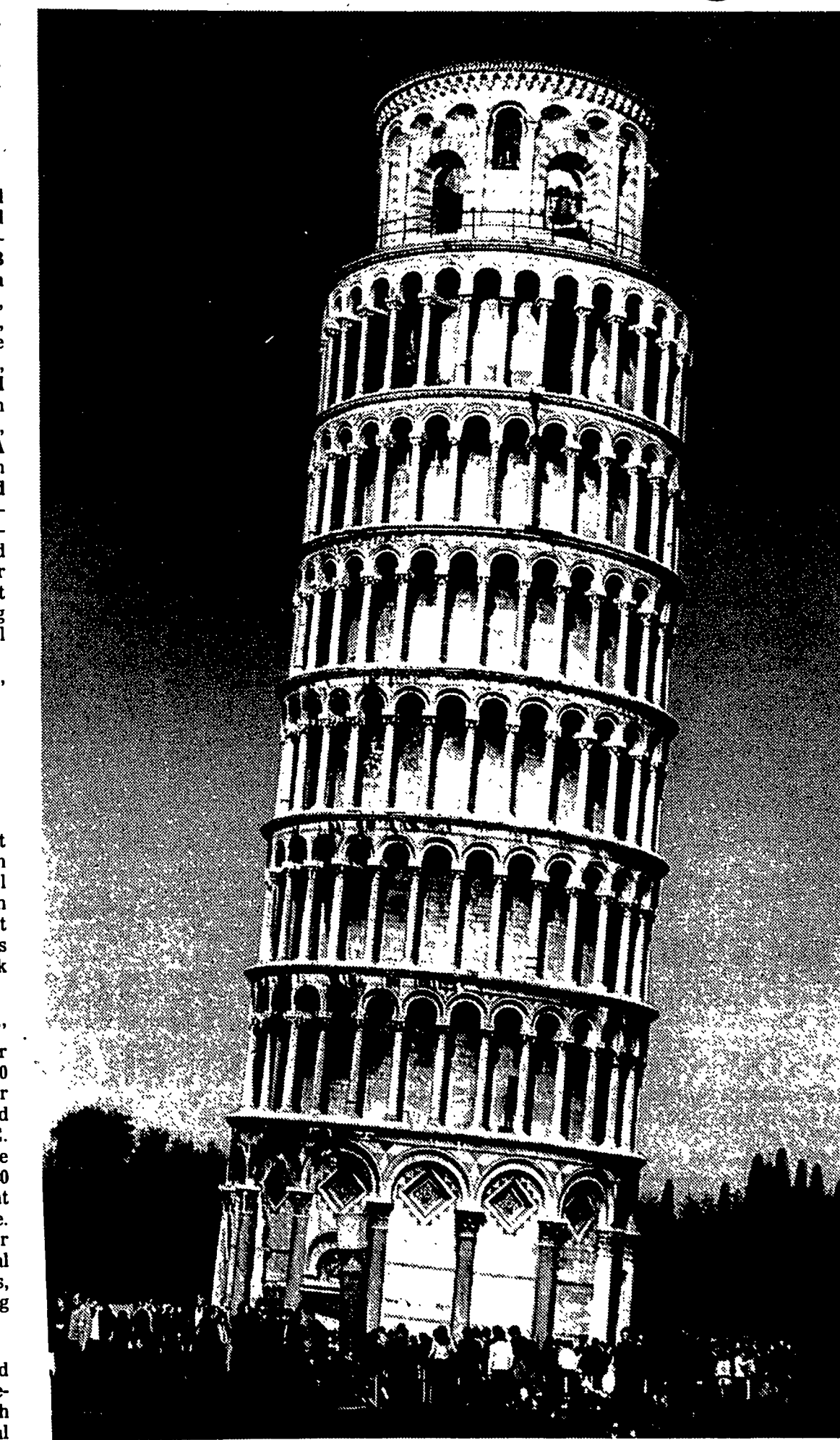

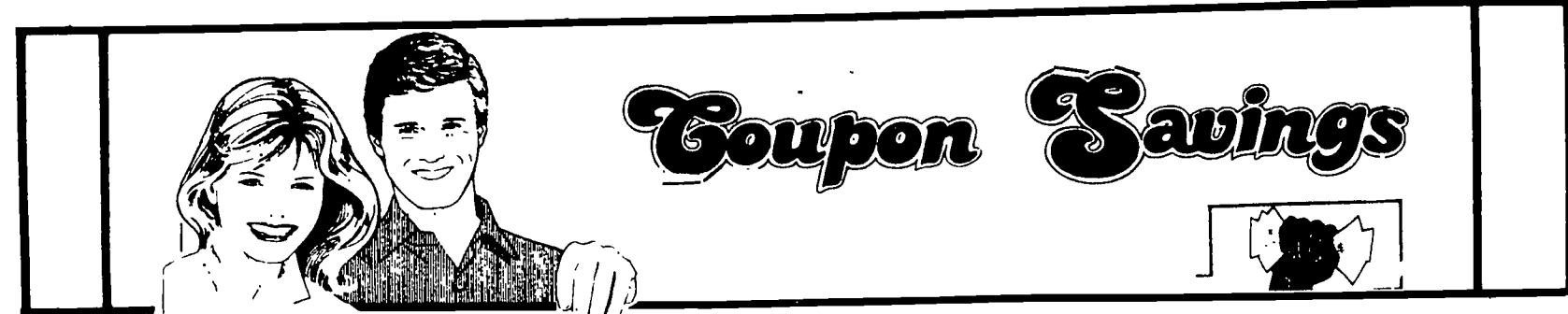

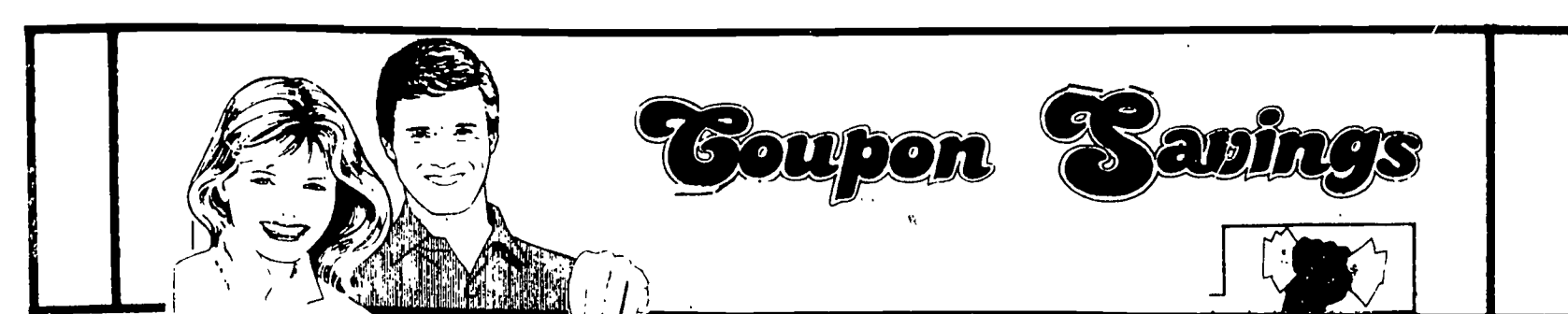

## Auto Skid Program at Notre Dame

Young drivers have the highest accident frequency rate of all drivers. According to the National Safety Council, drivers age 24 and under are more likely to be involved in a fatal accident than drivers age 25 to 74. On May 17 at 7:45 a.m. students at Notre Dame High School in Niles will take part in an auto skid program designed to demonstrate that, even under ideal driving situations, it is impossible to bring a moving car to an immediate stop.

The auto skid demonstration will be conducted by John Scott, District Coordinator of Community Education for the Country Companies, an insurance and investment group.

According to Scott, "Inexperience seems to be a key factor in why young drivers are involved in a greater percentage of accidents for their age group. Many simply do not know how a car will react in an emergency stopping situation."

The auto skid program puts students and teachers behind the wheel of a specially-equipped vehicle and asks them to make emergency stops at varying speeds between 20 and 40 miles per hour (mph). Actual braking distance is measured and students will be able to see that when an emergency stop is anticipated, it will take an average of 40 feet to stop a car moving at just 20 mph.

"Road, weather, and the car's and driver's physical condition also affect reaction and braking distances. We try to impress on students to be defensive drivers—alert to potential dangers that could require an emergency stop," Scott adds.

flexibility," Kobos said.

Kobos joined Niles Elementary School South as principal in 1970 and in 1977, assumed that position at Culver. Prior to joining District 71, he was a teacher in suburban area schools and then principal at an elementary school in Mt. Prospect.

"He noted 'top flight' education is provided to District 71 students and the district itself is people-oriented. They care about the educational programs here and are very supportive," Kobos said. "I'm going to miss everyone."

Kobos noted some negatives attached to the educational system today, such as state mandates affecting school districts. "At one time, the school was law. Now the law is school with the state dictating policy in certain areas," Kobos said, adding there are some benefits to state mandates

if carried out properly.

School Supt. Eugene Zaleswski said he would miss Kobos. "He is a highly professional educator. He is knowledgeable about education and newest developments in teaching children. The staff and children will miss him," he said.

Zaleswski said the district has received 60 applications for the position from principals and administrators in area school districts.

"The field of candidates will be narrowed down to about three or four, at which time the qualifications of the remaining applicants will be discussed along with personal interviews. 'I will make recommendations and the school board will vote on the matter,'" Zaleswski said.

"It was an exchange of ideas on how to control the use of alcohol among the young, which is a big problem in both countries, she said. "The Russian delegates were on the formal side, but were interested in what the American representatives had to say about the problem and took notes during the two-hour forum."

The Chicago visit on April 29 of members of the Soviet Temperance Society was coordinated by the Illinois Department of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (DASA) for a "Kids Know" exhibition. The two-day event of Illinois-based drug prevention groups was held at Northbrook Court shopping center on April 29-30.

In attendance at the forum were Russian members Dr. Valentina Cotell and Andrew Dmitreiv (Soviet Temperance Society). The American participants included representatives from DASA; Ann Meyer, president-elect of Parents Federation for Drug Free Use (affiliated with First Lady Nancy Regan); Martha Edgar, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union (Evanston); Bear's center Jay Hilgenberg and Jordan Kagan, a junior at Niles North High School who heads Operation Snowball at the school, an educational drug program.

Although the Russian visitors had brought their own interpreters to the Northbrook event, Pushel (by mutual agreement) remained the sole interpreter during the two-hour dialogue between the two groups.

Her credentials probably made her the perfect choice for the job because of her background as a teacher of both languages. Pushel taught English to Russian students before immigrating to the United States. After taking some required courses while living in Chicago, she was hired to teach the Russian language at the Jackson Language Academy and Whitney Young School (a magnet school), both in Chicago.

"We teach English in Russia, but for some reason the schools here do not include the Russian language in their curriculum," she said. "I think it's important to give students more understanding of what Russian people are really like culturally without involvement of politics."

Asked about the educational system in Russia, Pushel said the schools located in cities are excellent. The curriculum is well developed and children are motivated to learn. "Village schools are not as good," she said.


