can to reduce costs and live within our means," he said. "Just like we do at home."

Doherty, Chicago's 41st Ward alderman, said he already set an example of fiscal responsibility by slashing his ward's budget 37 percent and sending the money back to City Hall.

"And for the past two years I cut my salary by over 10 percent through furlough days, along with my staff," he added.

Doherty said he's giving up his aldermanic seat to go to Springfield because someone has to start putting the brakes on runaway spending by Democrats who now control every major state office, as well as the General Assembly. With a \$13-billion debt and a 39-percent increase in government spending during the past 10 years, Illinois has the worst fiscal reputation in the nation according to Forbes Magazine, and now owes \$8,300 for every man, woman and child in the state.

Medicaid makes up 30 percent of the state budget, and "the eligibility requirements are a joke. Not only to they not check to see if you're a citizen, but they only require you to show one pay stub, and don't even bother to check that. They don't even check for any hidden assets.

"Managed care alone would save the state billions."

While Doherty accused Mulroe of having been appointed state senator by the district's Democratic ward committeemen in a "backroom deal" after the resignation of longtime 10th District incumbent James DeLeo, Mulroe said state law requires such vacancies be filled within 30 days by someone of the same political party as the person giving up the seat.

"If I had refused the appointment I would have been criticized by people in my party, and when I took it, I was criticized by my opponent here," Mulroe said. "A choice had to be made."

Turning to Doherty's questions about whether Mulroe would have the guts to stand up to the "bosses" who appointed him if that ever became necessary, Mulroe said Doherty is hardly one to

talk about political independence when he "voted 91 percent of the time" to pass the city budgets and supported the controversial parking-meter deal, which Doherty and other aldermen had voiced misgivings about.

"I wouldn't want anything that important happening in two days," Mulroe said. "If it was that bad a deal and you feel it's being shoved down your throat, why vote for it? Why not stand up to the mayor? That's hardly what I'd call being a fiscal conservative."

When Mulroe again called Doherty a "career politician," Do-

herty said there's no disgrace in a public-service career, which is what being an elected official means. And besides, Doherty said, "it's a little disingenuous for my opponent to call himself a newcomer to politics when he holds three patronage jobs, has run for judge, is president of the 41st Ward Regular Democratic Organization, and defeated several other contenders for the 10th District Senate seat in the primary."

VILLAGE OF NILES New ethics code may be ready for vote in October

After an 18-month process a final draft of the Village of Niles Ethics Code is expected to be considered for approval at its October village board meeting. The Compliance Plan Committee composed of residents has created an ethics code for all village employees, as well as appointed and elected officials. The Ethics Board revised and re-

vamped the code, and department heads have reviewed it.

"It brings more accountability, transparency and openness to the process," said Joseph LoVerde, chair of the Niles Ethics Board. According to the Code of Ethics

final draft, village employees and officials "are prohibited from soliciting, accepting or retaining an economic or personal benefit or opportunity which may impair or present the appearance of im-

pairing their ability to fulfill their duties solely for the benefit of the residents of Niles."

The idea to create an ethics code for the village stemmed from federal corruption charges against former longtime Mayor Nicholas Blase.

"The village employees and elected officials decided we have to start doing everything we can to let the public know that whatever Blase did doesn't reflect on us and our job here," said Village

Attorney Joseph Annunzio. "It wasn't the village government acting."

The ethics code final draft also states that each official must file a statement with the village clerk disclosing direct or indirect ownership of any property located within the corporate limits of the village, including ownership by a spouse or other member of the household.

According to the final draft no official or employee shall give special treatment or a favor beyond what every other resident receives.

The Compliance Plan Committee has also been operating an ethics hotline for more than a vear.

Annunzio said complaints can be about village employees and officials, and they try to keep them anonymous.

"Every now and then we do get complaints and we follow through with them," Annunzio said.

Senior hosts cancer research benefit

Damiana Andonova knows much more about ovarian cancer than most Niles North High School seniors

That is because the disease has touched her family in ways she will never forget.

"Both of my grandmothers, who were in Bulgaria and raised me for five years, suffered from ovarian cancer. One of them died from it and I didn't even have a chance to say good-bye ... I don't want anyone else to go through what my family has gone through," she said.

So Andonova, 16, who lives in Skokie, organized the Ovarian Cancer Awareness and Research Benefit to be held 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Friday at Niles North, 9800 Lawler Ave., Skokie,

Its goal is to raise funds for NorthShore Hospitals' Auxiliary. a 509(a)(3) charity, and its 2011-13 ovarian cancer research initiative.

The evening will include a photography awareness campaign exhibition, live entertainment, refreshments, raffles, a memory wall commemorating past ovarian cancer victims and survivors, and a lecture by Dr. Gustavo Rodriguez, who practices gynecologic oncology, obstetrics and gynecology, about ovarian cancer research.

Pearls, Diamonds and Satin Events will donate their services to ensure a successful gathering. Black tie is optional, but everyone is encouraged to "dress up fancy," Andonova said.

"I got the idea for this project because one in 55 women in America gets this cancer and only 24 percent of all cases are diagnosed before the cancer has metastasized. So early detection

is really important," Andonova said

"I had a final photography project to do for school at the end of last year, which was kind of boring, so my art teacher let me choose another subject. And I chose to do a cancer awareness project," she added.

free periods, wrapped them in teal colored sheets and shot six women each period - and it was the 'funnest' thing I've ever done!" she said.

Andonova chose the color as a symbol of the Teal Ribbon Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation, Inc., which was organized to raise funds for ovarian cancer research; promote early diagnostic treatment programs and improve the lives of ovarian cancer survivors.

The foundation reports that ovarian cancer:

■ is difficult to diagnose.

■ has no reliable screening test for early detection.

■ is a serious and under-recognized threat to women's health

causes more deaths than any other female reproductive track cancer

■ is the fifth leading cause of cancer death among women in the U.S.

will cause the death of about 15.520 women this year alone, while more than 21,650 new cases will be diagnosed, according to American Cancer Society statistics

■ is very treatable when caught early, but only 20 percent is detected early.

■ is usually not diagnosed until too late.

has a 92 per cent survival rate of five years if caught before it has spread outside ovaries:

■ has a five-year survival rate of about only 45 percent if diagnosed after the disease has spread.

So Andonova, who wanted to do more than a photo exhibition, also came up with the idea of the benefit.

"When I made it a project for DECA, (an international association of marketing students) everything started going so well," Andonova said.

"I got teacher support, school support, and a lot of people wanting to give donations. Everything started falling into place," she added.

Now Andonova hopes her efforts to share knowledge about ovarian cancer in a supportive and festive setting will encourage communication between patients and physicians, and prompt women to seek information that might save their lives. For more information, contact



Man paralyzed in hockey game decades ago dies

In December 1975, Michael Schwass, one of the state's top high school hockey players, suffered a devastating blow to his neck, which left him a quadriplegic, according to a release from Notre Dame High School in Niles, where Schwass graduated in 1976.


Schwass went on to become an inspirational speaker and life coach, the release said. He co-authored the book "Don't Blame the Game," which chronicled how he fought back from his

Pressing school issues sure to test legislators

(1) Only 57 percent of high school juniors passed the state's reading test in 2009. In mathematics, the passing rate dropped to 52 percent; in science, 51 percent. (2) Only 23 percent of 2010 high school graduates who took the ACT met college-readiness benchmarks in all four test areas: English, math, reading and science.

(3) Illinois ranked 38th on a recently released study of low-income students' performance and gains on the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). The study was sponsored by the American Legislative Exchange Council.

If such omens aren't enough reason for state legislators to up-end the status quo, reform movements are forcing Illinois and other states to re-examine everything from charter schools and testing instruments to teacher seniority rules.

"We know that education hasn't been working as well as it needs to, and it hasn't been working too much for the kids in the schools," said Robin Steans, executive director of Advance Illinois, an education policy and advocacy group. "Even if you think your kid is one of the kids getting a good education, the state sinks or swims based on how the whole system is going."



We Ask: Illinois General Assembly Candidates

Do you support charter schools and vouchers for private schools?

Longtime civic leader and "political newcomer" John Mulroe Mulroe, 51, of Edison Park, is an accountant. lawyer, former assistant state's attorney, part-time instructor at Harper College and has been active in the Edison Park Community Council and Chamber of Commerce, and served as president of the St. Juliana School Board. His immediate goals are to find ways to "incentivize job development" through tax credits to encourage businesses to hire more people and not outsource, and wants to improve education funding.

Alderman Brian Doherty, 41st Ward, describes himself as a progressive Republican with 19 years of aldermanic experience under his belt. The 53-year-old Oriole Park resident defeated Roman Pucinski in a 1991 runoff and was a Golden Gloves and Chicago Park District boxing champion in his earlier days. Though he is the only known Republican currently in the City Council, he generally backs the policies of the nominally Democratic Mayor Richard M. Daley.

The benefits and drawbacks of charter schools and tuition vouchers have been well documented, which is why we have to look at them as part of a comprehensive solution and not as the silver bullet. In the end they are only going to help some students because we are not addressing the problems caused by underfunding head on, I am going to use my background as an accountant to remove waste and inefficiencies and divert these funds to education so



How should the state resolve the inequity between districts with high property values and those with low property values?

The gap in education funding is a serious problem. One of the ways to fix this is to reduce the burden of education funding on property taxes. and rely more on direct state fund ing for schools to ensure and enforce a more equitable education system

They'd have to revamp the entire educational funding formula. CPS gets a block grant, but the other districts have this convoluted formula. One of the problems is that while state funding has risen by 140 percent over the last 15 years, but we're not making any progress. The problem is how we're spending that money. (The unpopular solution would) require some swap between property tax and income tax. The more affluent aren't going to like it because they're paying more money.



No Child Left Behind, like many Republican ideas, sounds good on paper and has a catchy name but has failed to live up to its lofty goals. A ouick look at the September 9th (Chicago) Tribune article on the Chicago Public School system is proof of this. We have to recommit our resources to our schools, institute a system where teachers in different regions across the state are not being judged by the same standards, and strongly re-evaluate testing methods and standards going forward.

I don't think it has had any impact.

Does the state have an obligation to provide affordable higher education for in-state students?

If we are going to prepare the next generation of business leaders, scientists, and engineers we have to reevaluate higher education in Illinois. During the Blagojevich administration, the ratio of K-12 education funding to higher education funding grew to 30 dollars spent for every 1 dollar spent. That is an alarming figure that the current leadership has yet to address in earnest. I am going to make sure that higher education becomes more of a priority in state government. This also means that we have to create tax breaks for working families that will help make sending their children to college more affordable.

To an extent, yes. For basics, undergraduate college. But post-grad, no. We don't have a responsibility. And the question is, What's affordable? They do have a responsibility to help, but not to pay for it all.

Charter schools are an interesting innovation to the education system. However the results seem to be quite mixed. We need careful analy sis of the existing charter schools' performances and compliance issues before further expansion. I am opposed to a carte blanche voucher system and generally agree that vouchers undermine the public education system. However, I support a limited voucher program to provide opportunity for disadvantaged children while better solutions are developed

I support charter schools if they fit into a structure that sets forth goals outcomes and hires qualified teachers. I prefer tax credits to vouchers, probably because I haven't cared for most voucher bills. The bill sponsored by Sen. (James) Meeks wasn't what it was purported to be. It was not a pilot program, it was only designed for Chicago and it paid vouchers ahead of our obligation to public schools when we couldn't even make public school payments

I would support changing the way we fund a public school system. With such a heavy reliance on property taxes school funding leads to the perpetuation of a classed based edu cation system creating an ever-grow ing disparity between wealthy and poor areas. I believe that there must be reform in the tax system to reduce the reliance on local property taxes to fund local schools, which will have a positive impact on the education a child receives, regardless of their address.

The general state aid formula would have to be thrown out and there has been rejuctance to take that step. So actually the solution has been for high-property-value districts to take care of themselves and also be the exporter of tax dollars that infuse state money that goes into the formula for lower-property-value areas Also there is a presumption that all low-income areas underperform, which isn't always the case

The goal was ambitious and admirable. It attempted to mandate school districts into addressing and rectifying the disparity in school success between higher-income students and poor and minority students. Unfortunately, it has not met its goal; 41 percent of Illinois schools failed to meet their annual yearly progress for 2008-2009. Emphasis should be made on giving teachers the tools and training to address dis parities in the classroom and allow for creative and innovative teaching techniques tailored to the needs of underperforming students.

We have followed the federal law, enacted the testing program after a rocky start and provided extra resources to low-performing schools. There has been no formal evaluation of the program. The measure is if a district's test scores have come up and who still needs extra resources. The Obama administration will probably phase it out and replace it with something else; they have recently provided Illinois an additional \$146 million, and \$53 million is being allocated to under performing schools this year.

I believe that the state does have an obligation to provide affordable higher education for in-state students. Absent a quality, affordable education, our children will be unable to be competitive on a national or global economy.

I don't know if we have an obligation, but it is a laudable goal and certainly improves Illinois' educated work force when college is affordable. I believe Illinois has long provided a good education for the tuition dollar. Where we could improve is to raise the out-of-state tuition and put that money into lowering instate cost. We have the lowest outof-state tuition of the states in our area. We should also invest more in community colleges

No one is walking off stage in the middle of this Neil Simon comedy about two old and retired vaudeville actors, Al Lewis and Willie Clark, getting back together for one more show after years of being separated out of ill will toward each other.

"We are very fortunate to have a cohesive cast that truly enjoys working together," said co-director Dave Downing. "Sometimes they get along too well, which leads to laughing fits on stage. In a way, it's great to see people break each other up. It builds bonds and shows appreciation for the work of the other cast members."

Whew! Because that's not how it goes in the story of the vaudeville perform-

Al Lewis and Willie Clark formed a vaudeville team known as Lewis and Clark. Over the years, the two grew to hate each other; and the team came to an abrupt end after 40 years when Lewis walked off stage in the middle of a show. This infuriated an already cantankerous Clark, who refused to

forgive his old partner. He resented Lewis for leaving show business altogether and becoming a successful business man.

Several years later, a television network wants them to reunite for a show on the history of comedy, and Lewis and Clark are supposed to represent the vaudeville era at its finest. However, some hard feel-

ings still remain between the two men, now in their

Manny Schenk, of Glenview, plays Al Lewis and Scott Minches, of Chicago, plays Willie Clark. Both actors say their role isn't a stretch for them, which might lead some folks to worry how they'll make it through the play without killing each other.

"The role suits my per sonality," Schenk said. "Al Lewis is a mild-mannered, laid-back person."

His challenge is putting up with the surly Willie Clark character.

"The man is extremely sarcastic," he said. Minches said every actor

who isn't satisfied with where they are in their acting career can relate to Willie Clark.

"Willie is a funny man, but he's a sad man, because he hasn't been able to deal with the end of vaudeville, Minches said. "There's a bit of that in everybody, especially in the acting world."

But, Schenk and Minches do get along in real life.

"We have mutual respect for the ability of each person," Schenk said. "That's the key to doing this."



Since the shock factor in "The Last Exorcism" is nearly nil until the final reel bardcore fear freaks are likely to be severely disappointed. Haydn's classic "The Seven Last Words of Christ" will be presented by the players at noon



The action in the musical "She Loves Me" happened 70-plus years ago, in the 1930s, but it can easily be seen as the precursor to today's Internet dating.





WALL STREET: MONEY NEVER SLEEPS $\star \star 1/2$

Conversely, you might have a hard time staying awake during this morally and dramatically confused sequel to Oliver Stone's epochal '80s stock-market morality play. Dismayed at the way Michael Douglas' Oscar-winning portrayal of the ruthless corporate raider Gordon Gekko became a perverse role model for a new generation of Wall Street barracudas ("greed is good" was supposed to be understood with a certain amount of irony, guys), Stone seemingly is out this time to set the record straight.

After being released from his eight-year prison sentence for insider trading, Gekko is all about redemption: writing a book that warns the world about the dangers of credit default swaps and angling for forgiveness from his estranged daughter Winnie (Carey Mulligan). He's helped with the latter by Winnie's boyfriend Jake (Shia LaBeouf), a hustling young trader with a heart of gold and a dream of saving the world with green energy. Jake's also out for revenge on "pious piranha" Bretton James (Josh Brolin), the banking kingpin who destroyed his kindly mentor (Frank Langella) — and Gekko's glad to help. Fortunately, we're kept

guessing about the completeness of Gekko's reformation (the new, morally improved Gekko is remarkably uninteresting) when the recent economic

RDX has a revised 8-inch sereen; however, I'm disappointed that it's not a touch screen. Also, models with the technology package get a faster-reacting and more useful rearview camera in place of the nontechnology package models that feature a viewing screen integrated into the autodimming rearview mirror.

In my opinion, the RDX looks a lot better from the driver's seat than it does from my front porch. I just can't get used to its newly styled front fascia. It's strikingly unique, but not to my liking. Other than that, I find the 2010 Acura RDN to be attractive.

The cabin has been tweaked, too. It looks and feels more luxurious than its predecessor. I especially like the comfortable and supportive leather-trimmed seats. The front-seat side bolsters are significant and do well at keeping you in place when pushing the RDX hard through twisty roads and highway entrance ramps.

Acura chose to power all models of the RDX with a lightweight, turbocharged 2.3-liter four-eylinder engine rated at 240 horsepower. It's very responsive. There's just a slight bit of turbo lag, but not to the point of being objectionable. Torque comes in rapidly and peaks at 260 pound-feet.

All RDX models feature a smoothshifting five-speed automatic transmission. Also, there are steering-wheel-mounted shift paddles to shift the automatic manually when desired.

The transmission operates seamlessly when eruising around town, yet provides firmer shifts when pushing hard on the accelerator pedal. The transmission has a good top gear, too. I was impressed that at highway speed, my 2WD tester's engine was

pinning slightly below 2,000 rpm. Those who choose the RDX with SH-AWD (Super Handling All-Wheel Drive) will benefit from even better traction and handling on dry and wet pavement.

SH-AWD not only distributes optimum torque between front and rear axles, but it also splits the torque between the left and right rear wheels while being able to over-

drive the rear wheels to reduce understeer RDX is definitely fun to drive and provides all the versatility buyers in this segment are looking for. RDX has a luxurious and comfortable cabin. It comes nicely equipped, and it's priced well below many of its competitors. Plus, Acura has carned the reputation of producing well-built, reliable vehicles. The RDX is no exception.

autoNEWS For 2011, Saab adds 3 engines to 9-5 lineup

DETROIT - Just three nonths after its launch, the new Saab 9-5 sedan has added three new engines, doubling the size of the powertrain menu. For 2011 a 190-horsepower 2.0-liter turbo diesel makes the Saab XWD available for the first time with compression ignition. Using two-stage urbocharging, this new engine combines strong performance vith impressive frugality and oins the current 160-horseower single-turbo version.

The gasoline lineup is stended by the addition of highly efficient, 180-horsepower 1.6-liter turbo, reinforeing Saab's engine right-sizing strategy and establishing a lower price entry point for the range, A 220-horsepower 2.0-liter BioPower engine - able to run on gasoline and/or E85 fuel (85 percent bioethanol, 15 percent gasoline) in any blend is also introduced.

The Saab 9-5's high-tech options list is expanded by the ddition of adaptive cruise control and, for the U.S. market, the inclusion of a blind-spot indicator function and remote engine starting. The exterior color palette is also increased om seven to 11 colors.

The more powerful, twotage turbo diesel engine generites torque of 295 pound-feet rom just 1,750 rpm.

The sequential, two-stage charging system uses two turbochargers of different sizes with bypass valves that direct the exhaust gas stream between the two turbines. At low engine speeds, the small turbocharger supplies boost pressure independent of engine load, At intermediate engine speeds under higher loads, both the small and large turbochargers provide boost pressure; while at high engine speeds and load, only the large urbocharger is engaged.

This arrangement provides the driver with good, instant torque at low engine speeds via the low-inertia small turbo and strong, top-end power at higher engine speeds when the arge turbo is engaged. The small, highly efficient



180-horsepower engine epitomizes Saab's right-sizing engine strategy; it is among the most powerful series production engines in its displacement class. Such strong power is backed by plentiful torque of 170 pound-feet all the way from 2,200 rpm to 5,500 rpm (including an "overboost" function). The 9-5 sedan now also fea

tures Saab's BioPower flex-fuel engine technology. The new 2.0-liter turbo BioPower engine, like its gasoline-only stablemate. uses direct injection and variable valve timing, on both inlet and exhaust sides, to further improve fuel consumption, emissions and performance.

This engine offers the environmental benefits of being able to run on E85 fuel and/or gasoline in any blends. In both configurations, it delivers peak power of 220 horsepower and torgue of 258 pound-fect from just 2,500 rpm.

The adaptive cruise control for models with automatic transmission enables the driver to select a constant cruising speed and automatically alters the chosen speed to maintain a safe gap from the vehicle on the road ahead. ACC offers more relaxing and less stressful driving, particularly in slowing, congested traffic conmou ditions. The driver can select one of three distance options A radar sensor in the grille

emits a beam to measure the distance to the vehicle in front. If this gap reduces below the required setting, the throttle opening is adjusted or engine braking is applied. Once the appropriate distance is restored, the car will accelerate back up to the preset speed. Should heavy braking be required, a visual warning is flashed and a gong sounds to alert the driver to take action

Health in the garden Cooks look to herbs for flavor — and polyphenols

Home gardeners and cooks are rediscovering the taste and benefits of herbs, said Anna Krusinski, managing editor of Hatherleigh Press, which just published Healing Herbs: The Compete Reference for Kitchen and Garden as part of its Cooking Well series. The reference guide includes more than 50 recipes that incorporate herbs in soups, salads, main-course dishes and teas.

Growing your garden

"The concept of growing your own garden has had a resurgence in recent years, and herbs are very much a part of that landscape," Krusinski said.

She noted that throughout history people have turned to herbs, drawn by their unique flavors as well as their health-pro moting attributes. And cooks who grow their own parsley, mint, thyme and rosemary know their exact provenance and conditions under which they were raised.

Flavor boost

- Jacqueline King, a Glenviewbased registered dietitian, recommends the use of herbs because they give the flavor of food a boost.
- "Herbs are important because they elevate taste and possess no calories, which is helpful for those needing to cut calories, sugar, salt and fat," she said. "The

use of herbs fills in the gaps when these items are reduced and make foods taste better. When food is more flavorful, dieters tend to eat less because the improved taste makes people feel more satisfied."

Herbs also are powerful sources of antioxidants and anti-inflammatory agents known as polyphenols. Diabetes and other chronic diseases are the result of inflammation in the body that can be reduced with polyphenol use.


King said researchers have found that polyphenol levels are highest in oregano, marjoram and sage. The next highest levels of polyphenols are found in thyme, tarragon, mint and rosemary. In general, though, herbs derived from seeds, bark or roots have higher polyphenol levels than dried herbs from plant

Herb controversv

At present, herb use is controversial in wellness because evidence-based research has not been established, King added, cautioning that their use along with one's diet and health history should be discussed with a registered dietitian to insure their safety and health potential.

King points out that herbs act like drugs and could result in potential side effects and interactions with other disease states, drugs or dietary supplements.

Peggy Tsevis, another registered dietitian serving clients in


What to look for: Life certainly doesn't get any easier for the Dons, who will take the long trip to Chicago Heights. The Spartans are coming off a 49-33 win over previously undefeated St. Patrick. Benet answered right back on senior Pat Boyle's 25-yard touchdown run.

Benet star receiver Connor Nelligan then took over, diving for a 29-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Nick Mankowski. On the Redwings' next possession, Nelligan turned a short pass into a 56-yard TD in the first minute of the fourth quarter.

Facing a 25-14 hole, Notre Dame fought back.
