

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
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

Teens know where to go in Niles

NILES

Teens know they always have a place to go after school at the Niles Teen Center, whether it's to play video games, hang out with friends or get help with their homework.

The Niles Teen Center opened in September of 2007 and was formerly located at a Niles Park District building

Today, however, it runs at the Golf Mill Shopping Center.

The teen center has grown over the years and now has about 300 annual members and on an average day sees about 40 to 55 kids after

The center offers the teens a safe place to hang out with their friends after school and make new friends, play video games, watch new movies, play games, use the computer, play basketball and more. The center also provides help with homework.

"The kids can do what they want to do," said Mark Williams, the director of the Niles

Teen Center.

Williams said that the center is open to all teens looking for a positive place to visit after school.

"I come here every day after school," said Dennis Narsso, who attends Maine East High School and enjoys visiting the teen center to visit with friends, make new friends and play video games.

"They rent new movies every day," said Ashley Bezares, who also goes to Maine East. Bezares said she has made a lot of new friends at the teen center and it's a good place to go where you don't have to do chores.

"It doesn't matter where they live or where they go to school," Williams said. He said he has kids from Niles, Schaumburg, Chicago and other cities who visit the center.

The membership to join the center is \$20 a year for a teen who lives in Niles or attends school in Niles and \$35 a year for other teens.

The center also has some structured activities such as an arts and crafts project every other week and a new writer's club that will allow kids to get creative and enhance their writing skills.

Each month, Williams arranges someone from the community to make a presentation to the kids on various topics. The kids also attend two dances a year and take field trips to places such as Sky High Sports in Niles, ice skating and water parks.

Williams said kids come to the center for more than just checking out the latest video game.

"They come here to spend time with their friends or make new friends," said Williams.

He said some of the kids may struggle to make new friends at school and he said that the center provides a friendly atmosphere where kids, including those with special needs, can feel comfortable.

Two social workers from Niles Family Services also visit the teen center for a couple hours each week and organize activities for the teens.

'When these kids leave school if they have no alternative, like the teen

center, they go home and they are unsupervised," said Niles Police Chief Dean Strzelecki.

According to Strzelecki, recent statistics show parents of more than 28 million schoolchildren work outside the home and about 15 million children go home to an empty house after school.

"They can wander and commit crimes or be victim of crimes," said Strzelecki. He said kids have a lot of energy and that energy should be directed toward positive activities, like the ones provided at the Niles Teen Center.

The International Council of Shopping Center presented the Niles Teen Center with the 2011 U.S. Gold Maxi Award, the industry's highest marketing honor.

This fall the teen center will once again join 7,500 other communities in a national "Lights on Afterschool" event to emphasize the significance of after school programming. At last year's event, Strzelecki spoke at the event, as well as Mayor Robert Callero and Golf Mill Marketing Manager Monika Kalicki. The event featured a youth information fair and a rally and open house that many local teens and families attended.



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
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Tentative contract reached for District 64

PARK RIDGE

A tentative agreement on a new, four-year contract has been reached between Park Ridge-Niles School District 64 teachers and the Board of Education, district officials announced last week.


Members of the Park Ridge Education Association are scheduled to vote on the contract Sept. 18. The contract, if ratified by the union membership, would then go before the Board of Education for adoption Sept. 24.

According to the district, the contract includes a base salary increase of 2 percent for each year of the agreement. Teachers will also continue to receive "step" increases based on length of service, experience and education. These step increases vary, but average 1.6 percent, according to District 64.

Teachers will continue to share in the cost of health and dental insurance coverage, under the proposed agreement.

A copy of the actual contract was not immediately available for viewing by the Park Ridge Herald-Advocate.

"I think it's a good agreement," said Board President the contract will be adopted by the Board of Education. "I think it accomplishes our

goal of both protecting the community's resources and also recognizing our teachers as professionals and paying them appropriately."

Heyde acknowledged that negotiations were "lengthy," with about 12 meetings between the two sides taking John Heyde, who is optimistic place before the contract was schedule and structure," accomplete. Pay raises were the last issue to be resolved, he said.

"The economic issues were obviously challenging, given the state of the economy," Heyde said.

This is only the second four-year contract negotiated in District 64 in at least three decades, according to the district.

There are approximately 380 full-time teachers in District 64's five elementary schools, two middle schools and early childhood center.



'Our schools are not failing'

Though a majority of students at East Maine School District 63 last scored well on state exams last year, five of the district's seven schools failed AYP, for the fifth consecutive year. to meet federal benchmarks under the

No Child Left Behind Act.

As a result the district did not demonstrate adequate yearly progress, or

Administrators say imperfect

legislation, not lackluster education, is to blame, as evidenced by the number of schools locally and nationally that also struggle to satisfy federal requirements.

"The biggest question I get is, 'Is my child's school failing?" said Charlene Cobb, executive director of teaching and learning. "I have to say unequivocally, no, our schools are not failing."

The past year 696 school districts - or 80 percent of all Illinois districts - did not reach AYP, according to data provided by District 63. Only nine of 1,325 high schools in the state met performance standards.

"The fact is NCLB is a flawed law." District 63 Superintendent Scott Clav said. "You won't hear educators defending it, you won't hear politicians defending it."

He and Cobb gave a special presentation Sept. 5 on how Illinois Standards Achievement Test data relates to fed-

Enacted in 2001, NCLB requires states, districts and schools to demonstrate academic progress by having a certain percentage of students score satisfactorily on statewide assessments.

Subgroups of students must meet certain standards, too. Students are identified according to their ethnic and racial makeup, and are grouped together if they have limited English proficiency, special needs, or are from low-income families.

If one subgroup doesn't reach a benchmark in one subject, the district is labeled as not making AYP.

Clay said positive aspects of the act, such as keeping educators accountable for ensuring the success of all students, are overshadowed by the drawbacks.

Annually achieving "arbitrary standards" like 100 percent student proficiency on standardized tests by 2014 "just cannot be done," Clay said.

Reading benchmarks have consistently posed a problem for District 63.

The past year the district was 3 percentage points shy of having 85 percent of all students achieve passing scores in the subject, according to a report from the Illinois State Board of Education.

Hispanic students and students with disabilities did not meet exam standards.

The Hispanic subgroup missed both its math and reading targets by less than five percentage points.

On the other hand, 39.1 percent of students with disabilities met the 52.6 percent minimum target in

This group fared better in math with half the students passing, but needed a 67.2 percent success rate to achieve AYP.

And despite nearly 83 percent of economically-disadvantaged kids meeting or exceeding math proficiency standards, the required passing rate was 85 percent.

Overall, 87.7 percent of District 63 students performed satisfactorily in

On a school level, the size of the student population, as well as the number of students who fall into subgroup categories, affect whether it makes AYP. Schools are only held accountable for subgroups consisting of 45 students or more.

Melzer School in Morton Grove and Washington School in Glenview achieved annual yearly progress standards.

That's not to say instruction at the junior high and other elementary schools is sub-par, Clay said.

Elementary schools like Apollo and Washington, for example, have programs for children with special needs - and, therefore, a greater concentration of these students.

Melzer, on the other hand, doesn't have the same number of subgroups, which is advantageous when it comes to meeting test standards.

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
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A Closer Look

Municipal support of human services varies

The debate over governmental support of human needs services has been raging in Park Ridge for several years now.

Though the city's financial contributions to outside human services organizations were eliminated this year, surrounding municipalities like Des Plaines, Morton Grove and Niles, as well as Maine Township, continue to fund services that range from counseling to food pantries.

In neighboring Niles, the Niles Family Services Department, a division of the Human Services Department, provides counseling services, crisis intervention and food to citizens who request it. The department operates with a budget of approximately \$800,000 that comes from the village's' general fund, according to department director Seth Knobel.

"The mission is to be able to help with the full emotional needs of the residents of Niles." Knobel said.

Mental health services have been offered in the village since 1965, Knobel said. Today, counseling is offered to individuals and families and the department is staffed by four full-time social workers

and seven part-time social workers. Fees are determine based on income and sessions can also be paid through health insurance. "We usually have about 250 appointments every week," Knobel said.

Common reasons for residents to seek counseling

include job loss, family conflicts, relationship problems, loss of a loved one, stress and domestic violence.

The department also operates an emergency food pantry for families who qualify.

Other village departments commonly interact with Niles Family Services and may refer citizens to the department for help. A police officer who responds to a domestic problem within a family is one such example.

"One of the things that is extremely unique is that we are seen as an intricate part within the village," Knobel said. "Our department works with every other department in one capacity or another."

In neighboring Morton Grove, the Department of Family and Senior Services also offers counseling and financial assistance, but with a much lower budget of \$95,000.

"I would say it seems to be adequate," Jackie Walker O'Keefe said of the tax dollars provided. "The village has been very generous in terms of providing some financial assistance monies."

And emergency financial help is becoming a common request among citizens. According to O'Keefe it is "probably the No.1 thing" clients are seeking when they reach out to her department.

"With the economy and all that has come along with

that, I do see more people coming in for financial assistance," she said.

The maximum amount provided per year is \$300 per household.

Short-term counseling is the next most common service offered.

Because O'Keefe is the only licensed social worker on staff, she largely refers clients to other sources that can better help them with their needs, whether they be financial, legal or therapeutic. When O'Keefe met a client who was unable to travel for her cancer treatments, the social worker arranged transportation for the woman through the American Cancer Society.

"We're a referral source. We hook people up with the appropriate agencies for things," she explained.

Both Niles and Morton Grove also receive funding from The Salvation Army for emergency assistance. O'Keefe said this money can be used to help resident with a utility payment, rent, or a medical bill. Up to \$200 can be provided per household.

Morton Grove also has a village nurse who provides health screenings, home visits, medical case management and health education program. A similar service is offered by Des Plaines'

Grove Townships.

Health and Human Services Department which also provides emergency financial assistance made possible through outreach to various community agencies, the Des Plaines Ministerial Association and Maine and Elk

Maine Township's General Assistance Department provides a number of services to residents living throughout the township. These range from an emergency food pantry and counseling to a subsidized taxi program and financial assistance for rent, utilities and clothing. Residents of unincorporated Maine Township and portions of Park Ridge, Niles, Des Plaines, Morton Grove and Glenview that fall within the township boundaries can apply for such assistance.

Park Ridge, in lieu of a city-funded human services department, has a Human Needs Task Force which consists of representatives of several outside agencies, churches and schools who meet monthly to discuss the needs and activities of their respective groups. The task force does not receive funding.

"It's a networking organization," explained new Co-Chairman Dean Whitford. Members of the group learn about various needs in the community and try to direct people to the proper agency that can assist them, he added.

Such agencies include Maine-Center, which provides counseling services, and Center of Concern, a social service agency which offers counseling, financial assistance, and home-sharing opportunities.


Neither Whitford nor Co-Chairman Floyd Kortenhof said they felt Park Ridge would benefit from having its own human services department.

"When needs are brought to us, we're able to help these people," Kortenhof said.

Islamic organization to open in Maine Township

MAINE TOWNSHIP

An Islamic dietary organization has been granted permission by the Cook County Board to open a community center in unincorporated Maine Township.

County commissioners on Sept. 10 approved a special-use permit for the Sabeel Center, 8800 W. Ballard Road, which will be operated by the Park Ridge-based Islamic Food and Nutrition Council of America.

Plans call for the building to operate as a community center with an educational component related to IFANCA's work of certifying food as halal, or conforming with Islamic dietary laws. There will also be a gathering space, library and kitchen for cooking demonstrations to

teach the public about halal preparation.

Though the center will serve as a gathering place for area Muslims, there will also be a focus on outreach to the greater community, said Richard Reeder, spokesperson for IFANCA.

"We're viewing this as an asset," he said of the Sabeel Center. "It's basically a learning center for the entire community."

Area educators, of both public and private schools, have already expressed interest in the center and the concept of halal, Reeder added.

"It's really an exciting opportunity for everyone to learn from each other," he said.

IFANCA is planning approximately \$1.5 million in improvements to the facility which

borders Park Ridge and was last used as a synagogue. Reeder said now that the special-use has been secured the organization will begin moving forward on renovations with "full programming" possibly beginning next spring.

During meetings before the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals and the Maine Township Plan Commission earlier this year a small number of residents expressed concerns about the potential for crowds, congestion, noise and hours of operation.

The center, according to IF-ANCA President Muhammad Chaudry, will be open no longer than 9 p.m. and is not expected to generate large gatherings on a regular basis.







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


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


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How Illinois lawmakers voted in Congress for the week ending Sept. 14

Major roll call votes in the Senate

VETERAN JOB CORPS

Members voted, 84-8, to advance a bill (\$ 3457) to establish a Veterans Jobs Corps at a deficitneutral cost of \$1 billion over five years. The bill is designed to help veterans who served on active duty on or after Sept. 11, 2001. One major section promotes hiring priority for veterans in police, firefighting and other first-responder jobs on all levels of government.

Bill Nelson, D-Fla., said the bill is needed because "the unemployment rate among veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan was just under 11 percent in August." Jeff Sessions, R-Ala., said that because of budgeting gimmicks, the bill "violates the principles of common sense and good management" and shows why "this government is on an unsustainable financial path." Sen. Richard Durbln: Yes; Sen. Mark Kirk: Did not vote

1. GOVERNMENT SPY POWERS

Members voted, 301-118, to renew the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act through 2017. The law allows the National Security Agency to spy without specific warrants on phone calls, emails and other contacts between foreigners that pass through telecommunications switching points in the U.S.. A yes vote was to pass HR

2. SIX MONTHS' STOPGAP

Members passed, 329-91, a measure to fund the government through March 27 at an annual rate of \$1.047 trillion, slightly above fiscal 2012 spending levels. The bill extends a freeze on federal workers' pay into its third year while providing major increases for initiatives such as processing veterans' disability claims and fighting wildfires. A yes vote was to send a stopgap budget for the first half of fiscal 2013 to the

3. BUDGET CONTROL ACT

Members passed, 223-196, a GOP bill directing President Obama to propose specific spending cuts to replace \$110 billion in across-the-board defense and non-defense cuts that are due next year under the 2011 Budget Control Act unless Congress votes to repeal them. Chicago to buy land near Union Station for bus transit center

Chicago would acquire a surface parking lot near Union Station to build an "intermodal transportation center" needed to bring bus rapid transit to the Loop, under an ordinance to be introduced by Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel.

The mayor's plan would authorize the \$5.9 million acquisition of a surface parking lot south of Jackson between Canal and Clinton for construction of a \$7.3 million transportation center. Federal funding would cover 80 percent of the cost. The rest would come from funding generated by the local tax-increment-financing district.

Sheltered staging area for CTA buses would include a vertical connection to an existing Amtrak underground passageway. That would allow commuters to access the Union Station concourse crossing Canal and Jackson at street level, Last month, a 76-year-old woman was killed by a Megabus outside Union Station.

"The new off-street transportation center will improve conditions for CTA passengers boarding at Union Station and transfers to and from Metra and Amtrak trains at the busiest railroad terminal in Chicago," Emanuel said in a press release. "It will relieve street congestion surrounding Union Station and improve safety by reducing pedestrian exposure to traffic."

State, ACLU reach agreement on care of juvenile offenders

The state agency that houses youths who have committed crimes will enter into an agreement with the American Civil Liberties Union to evaluate and improve living conditions for about 1,000 juvenile offenders during the next six months.

The ACLU of Illinois will file a federal lawsuit against the director of the Department of Juvenile Justice, Arthur Bishop, and a settlement with the agency that will authorize three court-appointed experts to assess current conditions in the state's eight youth homes. The experts will also recommend improvements that will be enforced by the federal court.

The ACLU has targeted poor educational and mental health services, excessive use of solitary confinement, and unsafe living conditions in which staff doesn't adequately protect residents from

"We are optimistic the proposed consent decree we've agreed to with Director Bishop will solve the problems," said Adam Schwartz, senior staff lawyer for the ACLU of Illinois.

In a statement, Bishop said his agency chose not to fight the ACLU litigation because state resources could "be better spent on a mutually agreeable plan to move forward rather than litigating in court."



Report: Social Security lax on disability claims justification

Social Security is so overwhelmed by disability claims that some officials are awarding benefits without adequately reviewing applications, potentially adding to the program's financial problems as it edges closer to the brink of insolvency, congressional investigators say in a new report.

In more than a quarter of the 300 cases reviewed by congressional staff, decisions to award benefits "failed to properly address insufficient, contradictory or incomplete evidence." In many cases, officials approved disability benefits without citing adequate medical evidence or without explaining the medical basis for the decision, according to the report by the Republican staff of the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations.

In some cases, it appeared that administrative law judges struggling to reduce backlogs didn't take the time to review all the evidence, the report

Social Security has been working for years to reduce a huge backlog of disability claims.

"We share the subcommittee's concern that a small number of judges have failed our expectations with regard to a balanced application of the law, proper documentation, proper hearings and proper judicial conduct," Social Security spokesman Mark Hinkle said.

Stop 'straw buyers' of guns

For years Chicago and Cook County officials have been pushing a law that would help close the spigot of guns flowing illegally into the city.

So far, the National Rifle Association has blocked the law in Springfield, but officials here should keep pushing.

The so-called "lost or stolen" law would require gun owners to report a lost or stolen gun within 72 hours of noticing it is missing. It would help discourage "straw buyers" who purchase numerous guns legally in the suburbs and then sell them to felons in Chicago.

Straw buyers often say their weapons were lost or stolen when guns are traced back to them after a crime. A law requiring the reporting of lost or stolen guns would protect legitimate gunowners, but discourage straw purchases.

Get used to the idea of school strikes

I'm willing to guess that the teachers' strikes in Lake Forest and Chicago are just the tip of the iceberg of what is to come.

Why?

Because the looming cash crisis in Illinois — long-term debt combined with less revenue — is creating an intolerable situation for local government. Schools, which depend on local property tax revenue more than any other local government, will be the first to feel the crunch.

Just look at the current situation. The state is broke. It increased income taxes last year. It still is broke. Promises have been made to public employees, including teachers, in the form of pensions and other benefits that the state can't keep. Officials failed to sock away enough money in good times, and now that bad times are here, they can't afford to catch up. All new revenue

in education would have to go to pay for pensions, not pay increases. And even that might not be enough.

Property taxes are not going to be a stable form of revenue for local government. Here's why:

In the past five years, property values have plummeted up to 30 percent in some suburbs. That means the tax base, which lags years behind real value, is getting smaller. When the tax

base shrinks, it produces less tax revenue.

The only way to get the same amount or more money from a smaller tax base is to raise tax rates.

It's what Bill Clinton called arithmetic.

With 30 percent of home sales being foreclosures or short sales, who is

going to pay those higher tax rates on homes that are worth less? It doesn't take much to foresee how property taxes could make a home unaffordable to a prospective first-time buyer who can easily afford the mortgage, but thinks twice about paying that much for taxes.

School administrators are trying to cope with the reality of the situation. That's why in Chicago and Lake Forest, administrators are seeking to change the pay structure and accountability more than anything.

Teachers correctly see changes in salary structures for new teachers and performance review requirements as chinks in their armor of guaranteed raises and jobs for life — or at least until they retire at 55.

And you can pretty much bet that in coming years, retirement benefits for new teachers will be a tough negotiating point.

Sure, teachers deserve better pay. So do cops, firefighters, nurses and a lot of working people.

But reality is different. Someone will have to sacrifice to meet the others' demands. Do we really want to get into a debate over whose sacrifice is morally superior?

Less is not more; except in commercials

"Marketing" is not a four-letter word.

It has nine letters. I know that. It just sometimes seems as if "marketing" is a four-letter word.

We are engulfed in a sea of marketing. We are bombarded on all our electronic devices by marketing messages. Everyone wants to sell us something.

And it's never going to be any different. Marketing is the sixth most popular college major, according to the Georgetown University National Center for Education Statistics. Each year, colleges and universities hatch thousands of little marketeers who slither into the consumer forest we all inhabit.

Why am I so leery of marketing? Haven't # ever been put onto something good by marketing? Well, yes I

But I maintain my wariness. And here's one reason why.

I've seen commercials on TV for a new candy bar from Hershey's called "Air Delight." Says on the package that it is "aerated milk chocolate."

The TV commercial shows a young woman beside herself with rapture as she bites into an Air Delight. The voiceover says because of the air in the chocolate bar, the chocolate melts faster in the mouth.

I've never realized this is a problem; that chocolate takes too long to

melt in the mouth. It's not like you bite into a piece of chocolate and it melts three hours later. No one would eat chocolate if that were the case. How could they talk on their cell phones with a mouthful of unmelted chocolate?

A lifetime of experience melting chocolate in my

mouth has taught me that the **m**elting process takes much less than a minute. I can wait that long.

No, there must be some other reason for "aerating" a chocolate bar.

And I think I discovered that reason.

While I was at the grocery store, I bought an Air Delight. I also bought a regular Hershey bar, which is not an unfamiliar action for me. I've been buying Hershey bars ever since I was old enough to slide a handful of pennies across the counter at Zimmerman's candy store.

Today, the Hershey bar cost \$1.09. The Air Delight cost the same, \$1.09.

The Hershey bar weighed 1.55 ounces (43 grams). The Air Delight weighed 1.44 ounces (40 grams).

I paid the same price for both candy bars. But I received .11 fewer ounces of chocolate from the Air Delight.


Hershey marketing is trying to convince me this is a good thing. But I know that less is not more, or even equal

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
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Education in Focus

Principal: Incident reported at Nelson School a false alarm

A claim that a neighbor struck a student during recess at Nelson School in Niles on Monday, Sept. 10, turned out to be the minds of young kids getting carried away, according to Principal Jean LeBlanc.

The principal said that a lunch room supervisor reported that a couple of boys said a man approached them along the border of the school property during recess and tried to get them to come over to him.

LeBlanc said that one child said he saw the

man slap another child, but an investigation by the Niles Police school resource officer and school officials determined the neighbor just came over to return a ball that had gone off school property and did not touch any of the kids

"The line between fantasy and reality is a little thin at this time," said LeBlanc, referring to the second grade boys.

Two boys said the man told them to "shutup" when they told him that they didn't talk to strangers.

LeBlanc said the kids had convinced themselves that the man had struck one of the children. She said many of the parents warn them about talking to strangers and their minds got carried away in this case.

"It was scary to think a stranger might be bothering some children," said LeBlanc.

She said they wanted the police department to investigate the situation just to make sure nothing inappropriate happened. LeBlanc also felt it was important to make the parents aware of the situation.

LeBlanc talked with the kids and reminded them that they had to be very careful about being truthful and "super careful about the details."

"We handled it very conservatively," LeBlanc said.

LeBlanc said at Nelson School they always stress the importance of being safe, responsible and respectable and keeping kids safe is a top priority.

During recess when the boys were outside, LeBlanc said there were five adults outside supervising the kids and one of them reported that they saw the neighbor give back the ball to the boys.

Leys finds serving as delegate an 'unforgettable experience'

Eric Leys said serving as an alternate delegate at the 40th Republic National Convention was an unforgettable experience.

"It's been a very exciting week," said Leys, who said that Ann Romney's speech was a highlight of the recent convention in Tampa, Fla.

"Her words, 'He will not fail,' have echoed in my mind since she spoke," Leys said. "This is the main case I have been making to anyone who will listen for well over a year now. As a nation, we face some serious economic challenges and I believe in my core that Governor Romney possesses the right mix of skills suited to get us back on track and out of this unbearably slow recovery we have been forced to endure under President Obama."

Leys, an active local Republican and Maine Township High School District 207 board member, said he also enjoyed hearing speeches by U.S. Rep. Robert Dold, R-III., and Illinois Comptroller Judy Baar Topinka.

The top vote-getter among alternate delegate candidates, Leys won 25,839 votes in Cook and Lake counties, allowing him to be part of his second national convention.

Besides attending sessions and

delegation meetings, Leys also attended "Young Republican National Federation" that gave him a chance to network with leaders throughout the country. Various speakers,

including former Sen. Norm Coleman, former Gov. John Sununu and Speaker of the House John Boehner, visited with the delegation.

In 2004, he was part of the Illinois

Delegation Host Committee and participated at the Republican National Convention in New York City.

Leys said spending is out of control and Romney can fix things.

Fiscal responsibility has been a priority of Leys on the local level while serving on the school board.

"It's the biggest thing I've been fighting for," said Leys, who is the chair of District 207 finance committee. "We have not only a balanced budget, but a bit of a surplus."

Leys was elected in 2001, and reelected in 2005 and 2009. He served as board president from 2005-09.

Leys has served as precinct captain and board member in the Maine Township Regular Republican Organization and as a delegate to the Illinois State Republican Convention in June. He is the only Maine Township Republican that was part of the Illinois' delegation to the national convention.

Ley's said he is "strongly considering running again," when asked whether he will run for another term on the District 207 board in April.

"I have had some members of the community ask me recently to consider running for Alderman in Des Plaines and I am looking at that too, but it would be hard to leave District 207 when so much good is happening that I have been a part of for so long."

"Serving on the District 207 board for the past 11 years has been one of the great sources of pride in my adult life," Leys said.

Homeless subtitute teacher brings out the best in his former students

Henry Wolfson was living in a homeless shelter in Chicago when a quartet of his former students from Niles North High School learned of his situation.

And they decided to do something to make sure the life of their former substitute teacher improved.

The four created a page at www.giveforward.com on Labor Day. The site is designed to let people or groups raise money for a good cause with some help from a coach who can offer advice on the best way to encourage giving.

So far the group has raised more than \$33,000 that will be used to help Wolfson find a permanent place to live.

"We just want him to have a place he can call home," said Anita looked forward to seeing him and Zaia, one of the four former students who started the fundraiser.

After teaching for 26 years as an almost daily substitute at Niles North and McCracken Middle School, both in Skokie, Wolfson, 66, ended up in the homeless shelter as a result of medical costs, high insurance premiums and rent.

Zaia said as a sub he did not have the same benefits as regular full-time teachers. He also lacked support from family that might have helped him through the rough times, she said.

"He doesn't have that family support. He's part of our family now," she said.

In addition to Zaia, Wolfson's former students Adam and Tony Youhanna and Christina Audisho created Team Mr. Wolfson on the website.

Zaia said Wolfson was not the kind of substitute that got the class in a mood to play around when he walked in. Instead they

knew they would learn a valuable lesson. Attempts to reach Wolfson were not immediately successful.

Some of the comments on the www.giveforward.com site also reflect that.

Nikki Turbin made a donation, adding, "This is such a great cause. I hope this gets Mr. Wolfson the living conditions and support he deserves. Thank you, Mr. Wolfson."

Four people chipped in anther \$500 with the comment: "Stories like this, remind us that God some- in the past, with a fundraiser like times uses the toughest situations to demonstrate limitless beauty. We are so proud of the organizers of Team Wolfson, particularly our 'teacher' Tony."

Anita said the group originally set a goal of \$40,000, but plans on going past that if donations continue to come in.

In addition to a new apartment, she said Team Mr. Wolfson would like to help him with a cell phone he can use to call in for substitute

teaching jobs and a car he can use to get there.

Erica Trzeciak, director of user relations and the www.giveforward.com coach for the four students, said it ss unusual to raise so much money so quickly.

"They followed all of our recommendations perfectly," she said.

What helped, she said, is that the group started with some donations in hand. Also, students were able to reach out to other former students of Wolfson.

"He's helped so many people this it's going to go viral," Trzeciak

That's what Zaia said happened. "It shows how much of a great person Mr. Wolfson is," she said.

"He's always been there for us. We'll always be there for him. It's time for us to take care of him."





Niles dancewear company expands

NILES

The name says it all.

Seventeen years ago, Revolution Dancewear started something that no other dancewear manufacturer was doing — working exclusively with dance studios to sell dance shoes at a cost lower than retail.

Today, it is still committed to the concept of partnering solely with dance studios but the business has expanded to include dancewear, costumes and more.

The company was started in the basement of its founder, Scott Harris, and then was located in a couple different facilities in Glenview for 10 years before moving to its current location in Niles at 6100 Howard St. about five years ago.

"It's been a great move for us," said CEO Robb Lippitt, about its 72,000-square-foot building in Niles that houses its offices and warehouses.

Revolution Dancewear sells leotards, tights, jazz pants, shoes and more for all genres of dance including ballet, jazz, tap and hip-hop, as well as costumes for recitals.

Lippitt said the company has always believed that working with the dance studio owners as opposed to retail stores is the best way to address the needs of the studios as well as the students.

Another way that Revolution

Dancewear is unique is its commitment to speedy service.

In 2006, the company became the first in the industry to ship costumes the same day they are

ordered, as opposed to costumes taking 8 to 12 weeks to receive.

Lippitt said this way people don't have to worry and be nervous they won't receive their costumes in time for a recital.

Revolution Dancewear was also the first to ship the costumes on a hanger "ready to wear" in a free vinyl garment bag and include all the accessories with the costumes, free of charge.

The company serves more than half of the more than 18,000 dance studios in the United States and Canada, and its revenue has grown 275 percent since 2007. In 2010, Revolution Dancewear launched its active-wear product line.

The dancewear, activewear and recital costume collections include more than 390 designs, with 328 designs in its costume collection. In 2006, there were only 16 designs in the costume collection.

Lippitt said the company has a full inventory of all the costume styles.

The company believes in providing high quality, beautiful, but affordable dancewear, which is sometimes as much as 50 percent below retail costs.

Continuing to grow, on Sept. 12, the company announced that it has acquired Melsham, UK-based dance Direct, which is the largest online retailer of dance apparel in the United Kingdom and Europe.

"It's going to give us a great opportunity to bring our costumes to the European market," said Lippitt.

Lippitt said that Niles has been a great location for the company because of its central location and supportive community.

"We are able to attract and grow great talent here," said Lippitt. There are about 60 employees working at the headquarters in Niles.

I recently caught up with Goldfarb and asked her to share her top tips for frenzy-free family dinners.





Goldfarb believes a centralized grocery list is the cure to what ails most families - repeated and unnecessary trips to the grocery store. "Your goal is to buy everything you need in one trip," says Goldfarb. To save time

and energy, place your list in a centralized location in your home and teach your spouse and kids to add to it as needed. For tech savvy families, check out Ziplist (www.get.ziplist.com), which is an online app that maintains and stores your ongoing list and limits the "I misplaced my grocery list" blues.

When it comes to planning, be mindful of your family's needs. Goldfarb suggests reviewing your calendar once a week. Sour note not a bad thing for Oktoberfest

Pucker up! Sour beer is one new flavor that more and more people will experience as cultures around the world continue to embrace Germany's autumnal celebration of Oktoberfest.

And while Americans gain exposure to tastes of old-world Deutschland, local chefs also are introducing food recipes that reflect their non-German heritage. (German pizza, anyone?) In short: Our Oktoberfest has a new flavor wheel.

One of the fastest-growing flavors is sour, which is most obvious in the tart beers that are popping up on menus. One reason: They pair well with almost any food, sweet or savory. "They're so food-friendly," said Jared Rouben, brewmaster at Goose Island in Chicago.

"They are as palate-cleansing as sorbet and emulate qualities of sauvignon blanc, Gewurztraminer or other wines commonly paired with food."

But price may be holding sour brews back. Wooden barrels required for producing them properly can cost as much as \$110 each. Managing the necessary special yeast strain is also costly. Similar to the wild yeast first

used by medieval brewers to introduce sour beers, the yeast can easily contaminate other yeasts.

And not everyone appreciates the tart taste of the brews, which are challenging to balance. "A sour beer shouldn't be overly sweet, but should still have that 'pucker up' flavor," explained Anthony Carollo, brewmaster at The Lucky Monk in South Barrington.

Sour brews are an extension of lambics and other fashionable beers that filtrated onto the U.S. scene from Germany and Belgium many years ago. Like lambics, they have been enjoyed by mainstream Europe for centuries. "Sour beers are not a trend," Carollo said. "Americans are just being introduced to them. They are here to stay."

The segment of beers known as Oktoberfest beers followed a similar path. This year, Carollo crafted an amber-colored 2012 Oktoberfest Lager Beer. The beer, which was released on Sept. 18, is made with hops, malts and other ingredients that were imported

from Germany. Carollo blended them together to create a slightly bittersweet flavor with hints of caramel.

The new brew works well with a German Pizza made with cheese, ground beef, potatoes, onions and a white sauce that Chef Ricky Soto has developed for The Lucky Monk's Oktoberfest menu.

Soto thinks the pizza, which intertwines German influences with his personal inspirations, makes sense. "After all, what's more German than potatoes and beef?" he asked.

Soto's menu, which will be available through Oct. 31, also features more expected fare like schnitzel, bratwurst and potato pancakes.

Whether it holds beer brewed in wood or stainless steel, raise a stein to Oktoberfest, a tradition that began as a royal wedding celebration in Munich in 1810. Prosit!



Debut director has no 'Trouble'

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Growing up in Park Ridge and Norridge, Rob Lorenz, a 1985 William Fremd High School grad, loved movies and dreamed of becoming a director one day.

Now, after more than 20 years of working in Hollywood as an assistant director and producer (mostly with Clint Eastwood's Malpaso production company), that day is here.

Lorenz is making his directorial debut Friday with the baseball/family drama "Trouble with the Curve," in which Eastwood plays an old-school scout. On what could be his final recruiting trip, the cantankerous old cuss is reluctantly accompanied by his semi-estranged daughter (Amy Adams), because he is rapidly losing his eyesight.

We caught up with Lorenz, who learned his trade on films such as "Mystic River," "Million Dollar Baby" and "Letters from Iwo Jima," the up side of the grueling movie-production business, and why he chose "Trouble with the Curve" for his directorial debut.

Question: How long have you known you wanted to be a filmmaker?

Rob Lorenz: I loved movies when I was a kid. Though it didn't occur to me until high school to think of it as a career. Until then, I was into art and drawing and I thought I might end up as a graphic artist, which is what my mother did. Eventually I realized film was what I really loved and if I was going to have to do something for a living, that's what I wanted to do.

Q: How did you become involved with Clint Eastwood?

RL: Like so many things out here, through a connection. A friend who had worked with Clint as an assistant director had to pass on "Bridges of Madison County," so he recommended me. I became his first A.D. for several years, then he asked me to help produce "Blood Work" and "Mystic River" and "Million Dollar Baby,"

for which I was also assistant director. I stopped doing that for "Flags of Our Fathers" because it was such a big logistical deal and, since then, I've overseen everything in production.

Q: Was "Trouble with the Curve" written for Eastwood?

RL: The writer, Randy Brown, says no.
But when Randy came in for our first meeting, I told him I liked it a lot and I wanted Clint to really like it. So, instead of giving him the script right away, I asked Randy if we could work on it a little bit — to take out some of the stuff I knew wouldn't appeal to Clint and build up some of the stuff I knew he would like

Q: What appealed to you about the story?
RL: It's a very straightforward story
that could be told in a fairly simple way,
without depending on tricks or visual effects. I also was attracted to the rich char-

I've always had a nostalgic fondness for baseball and I thought this film could capture that pure spirit, the enjoyment we had from playing the game when we were kids. And contrast that pure spirit with the less appealing aspects of professional

acters and the relationships they develop.

baseball: the commercialization, the endorsements and all that.

Q: Was "Trouble with the Curve" developed pre- or post-"Moneyball"?

RL: We got the script just before "Moneyball" came out. The whole idea of the old scout vs. the new technological approach to scouting was a popular topic of conversation in the baseball world even before "Moneyball" came out, but I knew that people would draw comparisons between "Moneyball" and our film. In many ways, "Trouble" is sort of the flip side of "Moneyball." You can explore new ways of getting the job done, but you shouldn't lose sight of the wisdom that comes from experience.

Q: So, what's it been like, finally fulfilling your dream?

RL: It's been great, really great. If Clint hadn't kept me giving me more and more responsibility and kept giving me all those great projects over the years, I would have moved on to direct long ago. But all that great experience made me feel very prepared to make the move now. My only fear is that it will never be this much fun again.

HIGH-TECH V-6 POWERS 2012 CHEVY TRAVERSE

Chevy's Traverse is a popular choice for those who want—and need—lots of space to haul people and cargo. It's also affordable to own and operate.

With fuel economy and efficiency top on the minds of all auto buyers, the 2012 Traverse addresses those expectations with a high-tech 3.6-liter V-6 that uses direct injection and continuously variable valve timing to produce performance similar to many V-8 engines while using regular grade gasoline.

This state-of-the-art engine is rated at 288 horsepower and 270 pound-feet of torque. Ninety percent of the engine's peak torque is available from approximately 2,500 rpm to more than 6,000 rpm.

Mated to a six-speed automatic transmission, this power plant delivers 24 mpg on the highway. It's an advanced transmission with clutch-to-clutch shift operation, automatic grade braking, shift stabilization and precise shift control.

For 2012, Traverse is offered in LS, LT and LTZ models. Prices start at \$29,510, but the sticker price on our well-equipped LTZ tester was \$45,895. Product high-

lights include a four-wheel independent suspension, 17-, 18- and 20-inch wheels, easy access to the third-row seats, rear-seat entertainment system with second-row controls, XM satellite radio, Bluetooth hands-free phone connectivity and a towing capacity of 5,200 pounds.

On the road the 2012 Traverse's powertrain performs flawlessly. Acceleration is more than adequate for merging. Steering has a good on-center feel and requires just the right amount of effort for various driving situations. The brakes have good pedal feel and can stop this relatively large vehicle in a surprisingly short distance.

The sheer size of the 4,720-pound Traverse with a curb-to-curb turning circle of 40.4 feet makes it a bit difficult to maneuver in tight spaces, but its ride characteristics and interior comfort and convenience features make Traverse the kind of vehicle you would want for a long-haul vacation trip.

Traverse rides on a long 118.9-inch wheelbase, a 67.8-inch front track and 67.4-inch rear track. The front suspension uses a MacPherson strut design with a direct-acting stabilizer bar and aluminum knuckles. The multilink rear suspension uses an isolated mounting

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Not all odds are even

Know the game, the odds and how to play to win

Not all casino games are created equal.
Oh, they're all designed to make money for the casino by paying the winners at less-thantrue odds. And they're all designed so that players will win sometimes, enough to keep us entertained, and keep us coming back.

But some pay the winners at closer-than-true odds than do others. The way we measure and compare is in a statistic called the house edge. In double-zero roulette, the odds on most wagers will lead the house to keep an average of \$5.26 per \$100 wagered. That's a 5.26 percent house edge.

On the other hand, baccarat is designed so the odds of the game will lead the house to keep \$1.06 per \$100 wagered on banker, or \$1.24 per \$100 wagered on player. Those are house edges of 1.06 and 1.24 percent.

Games with lower house edges give players a better shot to win. Let's check a few with the lowest house edges.

Blackjack: The most, popular table game can be the best game in the house, and it can be a middling game. The key is in how well you play.

Skilled card counters with knowledge, disciplined and backed by a large enough bankroll, can get a mathematical edge on the game. Few players are that good, just learning basic strategy for playing decisions leaves a good game with about a 0.5 percent house edge, a few tenths more or less depending on variable house rules.

An average player who just tries to make common sense decisions faces a house edge closer to 2 percent. And some bad players can face a house edge of 4 percent or more.

So while blackjack is often touted as the best bet in the house, it's mainly a good one for those who will take the time to at least learn basic stratetry.

Craps: Here's another one that can be a great bet, and can be really bad. There are a number of good bets on the table: the pass line (house edge 1.41 percent); come (1.41); don't pass and don't come (1.40); place bets on 6 and 8 (1.52). You can reduce the edges on pass/come and don't/pass don't come

to 0.8 percent or less if you learn about free odds or laying the odds.

On the other hand, craps has some of the worst bets in the casino. Any 7 — a bet that the next roll will be a 7 — has a house edge of 16.67 percent. The house keeps \$16.67 per \$100 wagered. That's horrendous. Or you could bet any craps, a wager that the next roll will be 2, 3 or 12. House edge: 11.11 percent. Ugh.

Craps can be one of the best bets in the casino, but only if you learn the best bets and stick to them.

Baccarat: This is the best no-brainer bet in the house. The only decision you need to make is whether to bet on banker or player ... the only two hands that are dealt, no matter how many players are at the table. Decisions on whether to add a third card to each of the two-card hands are automatic, dependent on the totals of the first two cards. It's all posted at the table so you can follow along.

To enjoy the game, what you need to know is that the hand closer to a total of 9 wins. Aces count as 1,2 through 8 as face value, and 10s and face cards as zero. You'll pick up the rest as you play.

Banker hands win more often than player hands, but the house charges a,5 percent commission on winning banker bets. That leaves a house edge of 1.06 percent on banker and 1.24 percent on player. There's a third option: betting that the hands tie. Don't go that route. The house edge of 9.5 percent makes it one of the worst bets around.

Video poker: It's possible for skilled players to get an edge on certain video poker games. There are none of these high-paying games in the Chicago area that I know of, BUT there are a few here with 99-percent payback if you play at expert level. In this area, you'll occasionally see 9-6 Jacks or Better (99.5 percent with expert play), where full houses pay 9-for-1 and flushes 6-for-1. Some casinos have 9-7 Double Bonus Poker (99.1) and 9-6 Double Double Bonus Poker (98.98).

The key is not only doing a little online research or checking out a good video poker book to learn the best games, but also practicing with computer software to learn when to hold'em and when to fold'em.

Getting the most out of any of these games other than baccarat requires study and practice.

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
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Times to remember Back-to-back wins make big marks in gamers' memories

It was one of those all-too-rare days, a close encounter of the winning kind. Several wins, in fact, were encountered close together.

I was playing Super Aces on a quarter Five Play Poker machine, and just a few hands after I started I drew four Aces for 2,000 credits. I relaxed. I wouldn't be going back to my wallet atall on this day.

A couple of minutes later, quad Aces came up again. Three plays later, two of my five hands showed for Aces. Shortly thereafter came a royal flush to pad my bankroll by 4,000 more credits.

Finally, after about 15 minutes of play, I was dealt three Aces. I turned to a woman next to me who had hit the Aces a couple of times herself, and said, "Do you think I can get them again?"

She smiled and said, "I hope so."

Up they came. Twice.

When it comes to electronic gaming, all things are possible on every play. Some are more possible than others. There are a lot more blank-space combinations than lifestyle-changing jackpots hidden in those random numbers on a three-reel slot, more

BY JOHN GROCHOWSKI little wins of less than your wager than bonus events on a video slot, more low pairs than royal flushes in video poker.

> Still, the random-number generator that determines what we see on screens or reels is as random as humans can program computers to be. It leaves open the possibility of big wins encountered close together, and even back-to-back wins.

> For years, I've collected stories of other players' close-together wins, tales like these:

Robin: "On my birthday, I was playing the \$1 Wheel of Fortune. I was on a Red, White and Blue machine, and I hit the Red, White and Blue 7's for \$1,600! While I was waiting for the payout, I put \$20 in the machine and within two spins I hit the Red, White and Blue 7s again for another \$1,600!"

"I also had a day to remember one month later. I was playing a \$1 Double Double Bonus Poker machine. I hit four Aces with a kicker for \$2,000 followed two hands later by a Royal flush for \$4,000. I couldn't believe my luck."

Paula: "My big thrill came on Super Jackpot Party, the video game, on nickels. I hadn't been doing too well, and I had a losing spin, but suddenly I heard 'Surprise Party!' It took me to the bonus, and I just couldn't miss. I got this thing called Whack a Pooper where you hit

the pooper characters with a mallet, and got another bonus where this character dances and you get more credits, I got multipliers. When it was all over, I'd won more than 2,000 nickels."

"It went back to the regular game, and would you believe on the next spin I got a Jackpot Party? Back to the bonus! It didn't go quite as well this time, but I won another 500 nickels and a few more. It was fun!"

Anna: "I always save some time for Blazing 7s, I seem to hit a lot of jackpots on that. One day, my husband and I were playing next to each other, and I hit the Blazing 7s for an \$1,137 progressive. I was screaming, my husband was hugging me, and we didn't even notice that his

spin had landed on the 7s, too! He got \$1,000. He was just a few second after me."

Dave: "I was playing a quarter Bonus Poker progressive. The meter was up to \$1,480 when I was dealt a pair of Jacks but also three to a royal. For some reason, I went for it and got the royal. The sad part was, I was driving on a ticket and didn't have a photo ID, so all they would do is give me was a receipt until I got my license back."

"The following Sunday, I went back to collect my winnings and brought along \$200 to play with."

"Anyway, I hit another royal on a Double Bonus Machine. After they paid me, I turned around and played the Bonus Poker Deluxe machine right behind me and got another. I walked off with \$3,800."

Diane: "I was playing at a quarter Triple Play game. I was dealt three deuces, and I held them and threw away the other two cards. On one line, I drew the fourth deuce. After the attendant paid me the \$250, they asked me to play again to clear it off. I was dealt one deuce and threw away the other cards, and on one line, I caught the other three deuces. Back-to-back hands on the same machine, so it does happen."

Close together, back-to-back ... it does happen, as Diane said. Not often, but when that close encounter of the winning kind happens, it makes for a day to remember.

The basics pay off

A day at the track always more enjoyable if you know how it works

When it comes to enjoying a day at the races, there's a style for everyone, expert and newbie alike.

Take a look around, whether you're at a thoroughbred track with jockeys aboard the horses' backs or the harness races with a driver in a two-wheeled sulky behind. You'll find veteran horseplayers studying intently, as they weigh the past performances of horses, jockeys and trainers, the type of race and caliber of competition, the weather and more.

Others will be checking out the opinions of handicappers in print or online, trying to sort out the likely winners. Some just play hunches, betting names or lucky numbers.

But any novice can have fun at a price as low as \$2 a race without getting too deep into handicapping themselves.

One thing first-timers need to understand is that wagering on the horses is parimutuel. Each winning bet is paid according to the share of the betting pool wagered on that outcome. The odds are constantly changing, and are displayed on a big board at the center of the track as well as on video screens around the facility.

There are as many ways to bet a race as there are styles in picking the horses. You can bet individual horses to win, place or show ... that is, to finish first, second or third. You can bet on combinations of horses to finish 1-2 or 1-2-3 in the same race, or on horses to win consecutive races.

The combinations are harder to pick and usually have longer odds and higher payoffs than the one-race bets. For a racing newcomer, it starts with knowing what bets are available and how to make them. Here are some of the basics:

■ Win, place and show: These are the basics, the one-horse wagers. You pick your horse, go to the window or to the video betting terminal, and make your bet. When making your bet, always refer to the horse by the number listed in the track program. If you've picked the No. 1 horse in the first race and want to make a \$2 bet to win, you tell the clerk at the betting window, "First race, number 1, \$2 to win."

Easy enough, right?

If you bet the horse to place instead, you win if the horse finishes either first or second. And if you bet the horse to show, you win if he finishes first, second or third. Payoffs almost always are lower on show bets than on place

bets, and lower to place than to win. That's the tradeoff for winning more often when you bet to place or show.

■ Exacta, perfecta, quinella: Exacta and perfect are different terminology for the same bet. It just depends on what the track wants to call it. You're picking two horses, one to finish first and one to finish second, in the exact order. Tell the clerk, "\$2 exacta, 1-2," and you'll win if the 1 horse finishes first and the 2 horse finishes second.

A quinella also is a two-horse bet, but you win if your horses finish first and second in either order. Not every track offers a quinella, but you can get the same effect with an "exacta box." If you ask for, "\$1 exacta box, 1-2," you hand over \$2 get a \$1 exacta on the horses finishing 1-2, and another on the horses finishing 2-1. If your combo comes in, you get half the \$2 exacta payoff. If you want to go for the full pay, then you need to ask for a \$2 exacta box, and that'll cost you \$4.

Some bettors include more than two horses in the box. Just understand that increases the number of possible combinations, and so also increases the overall bet size.

Trifecta: One step beyond an exacta, the trifecta is a three-horse bet, and the three horses

you pick have to finish in exact order. Bet "\$2 trifecta, 1-2-3," and you win only if the 1 horse finishes first, the 2 second and the 3 third.

Like the exacta, the trifecta can be boxed. A \$1 trifecta box will cost you \$6 and give you half the trifecta payoff if your horses finish first, second and third in any order. Also like the exacta, including more horses in a box costs more money.

You'll occasionally also see a "superfecta" offered. That asks you to pick the first four horses, in order. Payoffs can be enormous. So is the degree of difficulty.

■ Daily double: A two-race bet, the daily double asks bettors to pick consecutive winners. If the track has a daily double on the first and second races, telling the clerk, "\$2 double, 1-2" gets you a \$2 bet if the 1 horse wins the first race, then the 2 horse wins the second race.

Some tracks offer multiple doubles over the course of a day. Check the track program to be sure.

The daily double has spawned other multirace bets, such as the pick 3, challenging you to pick winners of three-consecutive races, pick 4, pick 5 and on up the ladder.

Even for a first-timer, walking in to the track for a day at the races becomes a much more enjoyable experience knowing the basics.

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Tales of the table

Hints of blackjack strategy surface during a few unguarded moments

Blackjack players can be a bit uncomfortable talking strategy during breaks at the table. The more advanced players may not want to tip the casino off to how good they are, though it really doesn't take much observation to tell those who know their basic strategy from those who don't.

So the table talk at shuffling time often turns to asking the dealer about their hometown, or finding out if other players have tried the steakhouse, and the occasional gem about something unusual that's happened at casinos games.

But every once in a while, players let their guard down, and a little strategy is mixed in with the tales people tell at the table. The table talk that follows was collected on three different casino trips.

Bradley wanted to talk about the even-money form of insurance. When you have a blackjack and the dealer has an Ace face up, you can call for even money, and take a win equal to your bet. If you don't take even money, you could wind up with no win at all if the dealer has a 10-value card face down to complete a blackjack, or you could get a 3-2 payoff if the dealer doesn't have blackjack. The better percentage play is to turn down even money and play out the hand.

"You know how dealers are telling you to take insurance?" Bradley asked as dealer Tom exchanged one six-deck pack for another in the shuffling machine.

"What about you, Tom? Do you tell players to take insurance? No? Well, I hear a lot of dealers saying that.

"I was playing some \$15 a hand blackjack, and was on a hot streak. I got a blackjack, and the dealer had an Ace face up, and he asked if I wanted to take even money. I shook it off, the dealer didn't have blackjack and I won \$22.50. It happened a couple of more times within 15 minutes, and I won those, too."

"Then another guy got a blackiack, and the dealer had an Ace, and the guy asked the dealer what he thought. The dealer told him he was sure to win if he took even-money, that it was the only sure thing in the casino. So the other guy took the even money, and sure enough, the dealer had a blackjack. And the guy said, 'I guess that's why you make that play,' and the dealer smiled and nodded. I shook my head, but didn't say anything. I was happy with my wins."

Jonas knows basic strategy calls for the player to hit soft 18 whenever the dealer's face up card is a 9, 10-value card or Ace. A "soft" 17 has an Ace being counted as an 11, such ace Ace-7 or Ace-2-5. If you draw a 4 or higher, you don't go over 21 and bust the hand, the Ace just counts as 1 instead and you go from there.

"I had Ace-7, and the dealer had a King face up," he recalled. "I signaled to hit, and a lady called out, "Wait!" The dealer looked a little startled and looked at my card while the lady called out again, "You have 18!" I signaled to hit again,

and the dealer nodded and dealt me a 3. I had 21 and I needed it all, because the dealer had a 10 down."

"That other player said,
'You got lucky this time, but
you shouldn't be hitting 18.'
I just smiled and took my
chips. I wasn't going to go
through the whole strategy
explanation."

But for Gina, the strategy play where the reactions of other players get her every time is when she hits 12 when the dealer has a 2 face up. That's the correct basic strategy play, but she said a couple of other players had been downright peeved the night before when she took a hit.

"I was sitting at third base," she said, referring to the position all the way to the players' left, making her the last to play her hand before the dealer. "I had a 7 and a 5, and the dealer had a 9 face up. I hit, and this man and woman both groaned at once, 'What are, you doing?' I drew a 9 and made my 21. The dealer had a 2 down. If I hadn't hit, she'd have made 21. Instead, she drew a 4, then an Ace for 17. A couple of players won, a couple lost, but if I hadn't taken the hit the dealer would have beaten the whole table."

"Well, this pair didn't notice that. They told me that third base was a team spot and I had to stand on those hands and not risk taking the dealer's bust card."

"I said, 'Unless you're funding my bets, there is no team. I'm going to make the right plays for my hand.' They made a couple of snippy remarks and left, the other guys laughed, and I kept right on playing basic strategy."

Winning some fun

Win or lose, it's the extras that 'make' casino exploits

When readers share stories about their casino exploits, it's usually about big wins.

Let's face it, the wins are more memorable and more memorable to talk about than the more common losing sessions.

Still, every now and then a reader looking for a sympathetic ear will email me with a tale of a day when nothing went right.

Take Marcia. She loves the low-denomination video slots, especially ones with pick'em-style bonus rounds.

"I don't need to win big," she wrote.
"But when I go to the bonus, I like to
win SOMETHING. If I get five free spins
and they're all losers, that's not really a
bonus, is it?"

She started with a Jackpot Party machine, but lost \$20 on a penny machine without getting to the bonus event. On to Goldfish. Another \$20, no bonus.

"I thought I'd change my luck and play The Hangover. Every time I looked, one of my neighbors was playing a bonus. Not me."

With losses at \$60, she was reaching her tolerance point.

"Then I saw a slot called Kilauea. I figured it was fate. My husband and I got married in Kauai, cruised around the islands and saw Kilauea's lava flow twice. Once on land, once at night from onboard ship. This had to be it."

"This time I did get to go to the bonus. But it was free spins, and I didn't win anything. After that, I just walked around, until my husband was ready to go. He broke even on video poker and had a good time. I didn't break even, but that doesn't bother me so much. It was just a little downer that I didn't get to play the bonuses on the games I like.

"When the bonuses come, I have a good time."

So it goes on video slots. The entertainment comes from the extras, the animation, the sights and sounds, and the bonus events. Even a losing session is fun if you get to good run at a bonus or two.

Marcia limited her losses on penny

Nick emailed to say he learned an expensive lesson on a three-reel, \$5 game.

"I'd always heard that the \$5 slots paid more than the dollars or quarters," he wrote. "So I decided to take one big shot at the \$5 games. Instead of going every week and taking a couple hundred to play the dollar slots, I decided to make one trip at the end of the month, and bring a thousand.

"I have to admit I was a little nervous, but I put five \$100 bills in. It took that much to get the 100 credits that I like to start with. I bet two coins at a time. Betting \$10 on a slot machine sure seemed like a lot, but I figured that if I hit the 7s, or even the triple bars, even once, I could win a few hundred dollars. I mean, the jackpot would have been nice. But a middle-sized win or two was really all I was looking for.

"Well, the win never came. It can't have taken more than 15 minutes. I never got anything bigger than three mixed bars, and by the time I got that, I only had half my money left. When that first \$500 ran out, I put in another \$300, figuring again that one middle-sized hit would get my money back, and if I lost it, at least I had \$200 left to go play dollars or quarters. If anything, my money went down the drain even faster.

"I decided to get out of there with what I had left, and take it as a lesson that I'm not cut out to be a \$5 slot player."

Those \$5 slot machines do tend to have higher payback percentages than lower-denomination machines. But those percentages are compiled over hundreds of thousands of pulls, and short-term cold streaks are a normal part of play. If losing \$800 in a session makes you queasy — and it would do just that to most of us — you're better off sticking to lower denominations.

I wrote back to Nick and asked if that was the end of his \$5 slot career.

"Probably. Maybe if I was way ahead sometime. But I'm sticking to the three-reel slots. Those are the games I have fun at, as long as they're giving a little back."

And Marcia?

"Oh, of course I'll be back. I lost more this time than I like, but it was only \$80. It's the price of the day's entertainment. I just want to have some fun. That means actually getting to play the bonuses. Most of the time, it's fun."

"Our city has a great art fair legacy and I believe strongly that Chicago deserves to once again have a leading fair on the international art fair calendar," Karaman says.

Karman's experience, combined with a uniquely Chicago location, has attracted some of the biggest names in art, including: contemporary New York City-based artist Byron Kim; Jenny Holzer, creator of large-scale public displays; installation artist Dahn Vo; and local photographer Dawoud Bey. Such top-tier artwork deserves the perfect home, so Karman brought in renowned architect Jeanne Gang of Studio Gang Architects to design the interior of Festival Hall specifically for the fair.

Karman hopes that the four-day Expo event will spark a resurgence in the Chicago art scene.

"It is my great hope that everyone from institutions to galleries to artists benefits greatly from the international exposure generated by Expo Chicago," he says. "I hope that this week of activities has a lasting impact on Chicago's arts and cultural community."

With just a few days to go before the big event, Karman takes a break to chronicle his perfect Sunday routine.



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

US FAKER'

Interior designer Alison Pickart can create a glamorous space at any price

ong before decorating lush multimillion-dollar homes in London, Paris and Chicago, interior designer Alison Pickart was just trying to make her 10-person college house at the University of Dayton more livable.

"It got trashed constantly and I couldn't stand it," says Pickart. "So one weekend I taught myself how to reupholster. I took apart this sofa so I could understand how it all worked and how it fit together."

A part-time job at a local fabric store had her all set up with the perfect material to experiment with — a cotton graphic print from the, ahem, children's department.

"It had elephants on it, or something silly like that, but it actually ended up looking really cool on this sectional," she says, adding that her once-skeptical roommates were thrilled with the result.

Could that have been the begin-

ning of Pickart's playful alter ego, "The Fabulous Faker"?

Well, maybe. She's always believed that it's easy to swap budget-friendly options for their high end counterparts. And if you chat long enough with the woman whose talents are now in demand around the world, you realize that she was probably born with this talent.

"For me, design is like breathing. I've always wanted to live in a space that looked and felt very glamorous, even when I didn't have any money," she says. "I think the origin of The Fabulous Faker was me wanting to have the look that was in the magazines, but not being able to afford it."

It was an obsession, one that she wanted to share.

Soon after graduating from Uni-

versity of Dayton, Pickart opened Alison Pickart LLC and began studying at the Harrington College of Design in Chicago. Today, she divides her time between Chicago and San Francisco, designing interiors for homes around the world. Some are very glamorous and expensive, while some are more eclectic and creative, mixing a few select high-end treasures with affordable chic.

"My career has led me into projects that many designers aspire to," Pickart says. "At the same time, every client at every level wants the same thing. They want quality and they want value. It's very indicative of the economy we're in as well."

So what's Pickart's approach when clients come to her with a look that they want

for less? She does what she's always done — improvise.

"There's no excuse anymore not to have a totally fabulous environment to live in," she adds. "There are just so many sources, so many ways to figure something out. And [then] you can do it yourself."

JOANNA KRUPA LEARNED HOW TO BE 'REAL' IN CHICAGO — AND NOW EVERYBODY'S WATCHING

he was born in Poland, reared in west suburban Lombard and now divides her time between luxurious homes in Los Angeles and Miami. But whether she's making waves as an activist for People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals or as one of Bravo's "Real Housewives," supermodel Joanna Krupa's trademark is her Chicago point of view.

"I've noticed from my fans that they like me to be real," says Krupa. "They like me to be honest and truthful."

And being real means she is both joyously unfiltered and just fine with being disliked - if people don't get her, that's their problem. It's also one of the reasons her career has skyrocketed since she moved from Chicago to L.A. 13 years ago, starting out as a swimsuit model, then becoming a cover girl for magazines including GQ and Shape, and finally launching a reality television career with her 2009 appearance on "Dancing with the Stars."

This week, she debuted on the cast of the "Real Housewives of Miami," where she has lived part time ever since she met her fiancé five years ago, and her tell-it-like-it-is approach is already setting her apart. Previews show her stirring things up all season - from heated arguments with other cast members (face it: the catfights are the reason the "Housewives" are such delicious viewing) to confronting her fiancé, Mynt nightclub owner Romain Zago, about rumors of his infidelity.

Subjecting her personal life to the cameras was a calculated risk.

"Who wouldn't want to do the show?" she asks. "It's one of the top franchises out there. I also wanted to show the real side of me. I'm like everybody else - I don't wake up in the morning and look the way I do on a magazine cover. I want people to see that."

You could say that Krupa's selfassuredness was cultivated during her formative years in Chicago. Her parents moved here when she was 5, and at first they lived in a Polish neighborhood at Belmont and Milwaukee.

"I had to grow up fast, taking care of my little sister while my parents worked seven days a week, 12-15 hours a day," she says. "That's why I speak my mind and I'm fearless.

That fearlessness is evident from the opening credits ("I'm a model, but

[women] think they ruled Miami, and then they have new girls stepping in their territory."

And truly, nothing was off limits for the cameras.

"When I signed up for the show, I decided that I had no doubt in my mind I wanted the whole world to know

what I'm going through," she says. "So many things happened in the months we were shooting. Some moments were tough, but you know, that's life. And I'm glad people will be able to live that with me.'

Krupa says her closest friend on the show is another new character, Lisa Hochstein (the wife of a prominent Miami plastic surgeon known as the "boob god"), and admits she has enemies on the show — though she doesn't want to name names.

"Some girls I like more than oth-

ers," she says carefully, "some I had situations with that hopefully we can work out."

Despite the network's many promos that hint toward relationship trouble, Krupa and her fiancé, who wrapped up filming in May, are still together.

"We haven't set a wedding date yet," she says. "We've been together for five years and I feel like we're married. But we have the same issues as everybody else. We have our ups and downs, but [a wedding] is definitely in our future."

Also in her future: Krupa's third campaign for PETA, which debuts in October. Krupa has a soft spot for animals - she has four dogs and is fostering an abandoned 8-year-old Yorkie — and activism is what she considers her life's work. While she can't talk about the campaign yet, she promises it'll get tongues wagging.

"It has a huge comedic side to it," she says. "We'll see how people respond to it. Hopefully we'll get some positive feedback."

And even if it doesn't, she'll be just fine.



unday nights can be complicated: You're craving one last night on the town before a week of meetings, yet looking for an eatery that skews low key. Enter Jellyfish (1009 N. Rush). Combining sleek urban design with the mellow mood of a seaside retreat, it's miles away from the Gold Coast hustle and bustle — yet chic enough to start the week off on a stylish note.

At Jellyfish, managing partners Joseph De Vito and Josh Carl have brought together a youthful culinary team to create a restaurant unlike any other in the city.

"What's cool about the restaurant is that it takes you on a tour of Asia," says De Vito. 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



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Steve-O to reveal giant tattoo of himself

Expect outrageous stunts and filthy stories when "Jackass" veteran Steve-O makes his first visit to the Zanies comedy nightclub in Rosemont this weekend.

"It is clearly a comedy-variety show. I would be betraying my brand if I just stood there and talked the whole time," he said about his act.

Steve-O said the latter portion of each show will be devoted to stunts and tricks which could include setting his hair on fire.

"I wouldn't rule it out as a possibility," said Steve-0, a London native born to an American father and a Canadian mother in 1974.

Ever the consummate showman, Steve-O will also reveal the larger than life-size tattoo of himself on his own back.

"I generally have included a back tattoo reveal into the top of each show," he said.

That Steve-O portrait was conceived as a stunt for the first "Jackass" movie. It took 16½ hours to complete over the course of four sessions with an ink artist.

Steve-O, a former student at Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey Clown College, first considered

doing stand-up in 2006 when he was invited to perform a crazy stunt at an L.A. comedy club.

In 2008, following an intervention by Johnny Knoxville and his fellow "Jackass" performers, Steve-0 entered rehab and kicked some of his demons.

"I have been really, really fortunate every step of the way. I owe a major debt of gratitude to those guys for stepping in the way they did," he said. "Even though I have been free of drugs and alcohol for four and a half years, there are some incredibly intense issues that don't go away."

Doing stand-up, he said, is one way to cope.

"I can remember being 8 years old and consuming shakers of salt for the entertainment of my peers. Ironically, I stuck with that behavior and it turned into a career for me."

Next up for Steve-O is hosting "Killer Karaoke," which debuts Oct. 19 on the truTV cable channel.

"People sing karaoke while horrible things happen to them. Such as they get electrocuted consistently throughout their performance and they have to keep singing no matter what."

Young actors elevate dark 'Tusk Tusk'

The descent from *The*Boxcar Children to Lord
of the Flies comes steep
and fast in Polly Stenham's "Tusk Tusk."

For the three abandoned siblings left to fend for themselves after their mother goes missing, the degeneration of the eldest from caring, supportive brother to rage-filled abuser

is as rapid as it is alarming. Eliot, 16, may have the best intentions but it's only a short journey before he's locking his 14-year-old sister Maggie and 7-year-old brother Finn in a dark, dank basement.

Directed by Jennifer Green for Piven Theatre, "Tusk Tusk" is a flawed play elevated by a cast that captures the overwhelming desperation, fear, frustration and the intense, wrenching longing of the three youngsters as they try to keep their mother's disappearance a secret and avoid being split up and sent "into care" as wards of the state.

When their troubled mother vanishes, Eliot, Maggie and Finn enter into a dire secret agreement: They'll care for themselves, no matter how spectacularly ill-equipped — emotionally and financially — they are to do so.

Subsisting on potato chips and Chinese take-out, the three start out well enough. Finn bounds through the apartment joyfully pretending he is Max, hero of Where the Wild Things Are, seemingly oblivious to the fact that something is very, very

wrong. Maggie finds a stash of money in the unpacked boxes that fill the apartment, giving at least a temporary illusion of security to the children. And Eliot takes on the duties of provider, heading out at night to buy food for his brother and sister.

In the slow first act, Stenham provides a detailed portrait of the relationship between the three, especially Eliot and Maggie. The children are intensely close. He's the adored big brother, she's the trusting

co-conspirator.

The primary fault with "Tusk Tusk" lies in its overlong first act. Stenham takes her time setting up the complex dynamic between siblings; it's not until the second act that they em-

bark on their cataclysmic emotional journeys. The piece would be far more powerful pared to a taut 90 minutes

Still, with the latter half of "Tusk Tusk," Green's cast delivers some thrilling performances, work that belies their young ages. As Eliot, Bryce Lunsky, 16, captures all the emotionally and physically fraught contradictions of a young man forced early into shouldering responsibilities he just can't handle. In Maggie, Olivia Cygan, 18, portrays a girl caught in a trap of early adulthood, at once fervently trying to shoulder the burdens of adult responsibility, secrets and shame and passionately longing to confess all to an adult. Cherubic Gabriel Stern (Finn) is a wholly believable bundle of energy, laughter and tears as a 7-year-old at the mercy of a scary. grown-up world.



In May of 2003, the Music Institute of Chicago opened a new concert hall in the meticulously repurposed Christian Science Church at the corner of Chicago and Grove in Evanston.

To mark that milestone, the Nichols Concert Hall's 2012-13 concert season celebrates its 10th anniversary with a schedule packed with performances by world class artists, faculty members and alumni running through next July.

Among the stellar musicians performing this season are the Pacifica Quartet, Feb. 16, former Quartet-in-Residence at the MIC; alumnae violinist Rachel Barton Pine, May 18; cellist Wendy Warner, Nov. 17; and pianist Sergei Babayan, April 21. The Brotherhood Chorale of the Apostolic Church of God in Chicago, returns Jan. 20 for its annual Martin Luther King, Jr. birthday concert. And the Chicago Duo Piano Festival will celebrate its 25th anniversary season with concerts July 12-21.

"The first time I physically walked into the hall, it took my breath away," said Mark George, president and CEO of the Music Institute of Chicago since 2010. "I was being interviewed for the job, and I thought as a musician, you can't ask for anything better."

In addition to running the music school, which serves more than 10,000 students at all levels of ability, George collaborates on the concert schedule with Fiona

"She is very resourceful and has so many connections in the music world," he said.

"We've got an exceptional faculty here," Queen said, "and they have put together a program called 'Opus 10.' On March 24 more than 20 members of our violin and piano faculty will play 10 Hungarian Dances by Brahms and 10 Chopin Études, Op. 10."

George agreed, adding, "They could all play every piece on that upcoming program. In fact, the pianists are drawing straws to see which one they will play!"

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

Less a high-finance thriller than an elaborate morality play (in which few players take the moral high ground), "Arbitrage" basically wants to remind us of the terribly tangled web we start to weave when we deceive. Gere is impressive as a billionaire hedge-fund magnate who finds his fortune and public reputation are up for grabs when book-cooking and philandering leave him open to charges of fraud and manslaughter — unless he can brazen his way out with lies and outwit a zealous detective (Tim Roth). The strange thing is, though he's cold, ruthless, manipulative, arrogant and basically a world-class sleaze, you're likely to find yourself rooting for him.

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

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Strictly down the middle 'Curve'

"Trouble with the Curve"

Straight down the middle with nothing especially tricky on the ball, "Trouble with the Curve" gets the job done, more or less, as a feel-good, baseball-themed romantic family drama and as a late-innings vehicle for star Clint Eastwood.

Eastwood plays Gus Lobel, an aging old-school baseball scout who can tell a fastball from a curve by the sound it makes and "spot talent from an airplane" according to his old buddy and boss Pete (John Goodman). Remember the hopelessly old-fashioned scouts in "Moneyball" who opposed Brad Pitt's computer-generated recruitment program? Gus is one of those guys, back to get some respect.

This time around, the computer guy (Matthew Lillard) is one of the film's two villains, a treacherous yuppie who has no love for the game and no understanding of the human factor. And "Trouble with the Curve" is all about the human factor.

Such as: Gus is a cantankerous old cuss who's done a good job keeping people at a distance most of his life, including his semi-estranged daughter Mickey (Amy Adams), now a hot-shot lawyer who's in line for a partnership at her firm if she can win a big case. He's accustomed to being alone and he lives for his work, but now, with his eyesight failing from glaucoma, he

might need a little help for the first time in his life.

Enter Mickey (named for Mickey Mantle), who puts her big case on hold to accompany Gus on what may be his last scouting trip. Mickey has baseball in her blood just like Gus, of course, which makes it seem like fate may have taken a hand when Johnny "The Flame" Flanagan (Justin Timberlake), a nice-guy former pitching sensation discovered by Gus, shows up as a young scout.

At this point, "Trouble with the Curve" spends equal time developing the budding romance between Mickey and Johnny and the long-postponed rapprochement between Mickey and Gus. At the same time, Gus's evaluation of obnoxious minor-league slugger and movie villain No. 2 (Joe Massingill), is being tracked.

Will Gus's instinct and experience help him make the right call, even when he can't see? Will Mickey remember her love of baseball and give up her cold, corporate ambitions? Will Johnny find the way to her heart through her labyrinth of daddy issues?

That would be telling, of course, but this much seems fair to say: When life throws curves in movies like this, the good guys generally knock the ball out of the park.










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How to Eat Better at Work

Why is it so hard to eat right? "When you're hungry, you're not a philosopher," explains Dr. Daisy Merey, a physician and authority on eating habits.

Indeed, food – and especially the lack thereof – brings out our animal nature. And when we homo sapiens find ourselves in the artificial environment of the workplace, complete with its stresses, catered temptations, psychosocial dramas, smelly refrigerators, bureaucratic tedium and, yes, vending machines, we are animals who eat badly more often than not.

"You're sitting in a room with no windows for hours, and sometimes you just get bored and eat," says Natalie Davis-Runyan, a regional vice president for staffing firm Todays Office Professionals. And if you eat what's within reach, such as cafeteria food, high-calorie snacks and so on, you're alarmingly likely to develop health problems.

What can you do to improve what you eat at the office, which for many of us is the bulk of what we consume all day? Here are a few approaches to better nutrition in the land of heartburn and the pizza-sized chocolate chip cookle.

Bring Your Own Food

The consensus of health and nutrition professionals is that you'll eat much better if you plan ahead and pack a lunch. "You have to be prepared and bring food that's healthy," says Merey. "A brown bag is always better than a restaurant or vending machines."

Brown baggers are a small but significant contingent of the workforce. "There's about 25 percent of the people who bring their own lunches and walk away from the birthday cake." says Davis-Runvan.

Your planning should go beyond a lunch that includes fruits and vegetables and not too much sugar or fat. "Ideally, you want snacks with fiber, protein and carbs," says Elysse Lakatos, a registered dietitian.

Control Portions to Control Your Waistline

Whether it's a meat entree or gullty snack in a bag, you've got to control portions to eat healthfully at the office. The key is to portion out at home what you'll be eating in the break room.

If you must snack on fat-infused carbohydrates, try preportioned 100- or 150-calorie bags. "We have a tendency to finish the bag, whatever the size, even though people can satisfy cravings with small amounts," says Miriam Pappo, director of clinical nutrition at Montefiore Medical Center.

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Get Real About What's Healthy

Educate yourself to understand what's really nutritious. Those little cheesy fish-shaped crackers may be less nutritionally damaging than most potato chips, but they're still not health food. "There are a lot of foods that we think are healthy, but they're not," says Pappo. "One of the biggest is muffins; even a regular doughnut can have many fewer calories."

Advocate for Institutional Change

Employees should bring their nutritional needs to management, which often controls the cafeteria

as well as the vending machines. "The food service is a money maker for hospitals, so they want to balance what is healthy with what is profitable," says Pappo. Unfortunately, unhealthy foods often make the most money because they sell so well.

Then there are catered lunches, those stacks of meaty sandwiches and mountains of desserts mandated by executives looking to trigger each others' budget envy. The first solution to try is the simplest: "Ask the people who are ordering if they can change the food," says Tammy Lakatos, a registered dietitian and sister of Elysse Lakatos.

Take Special Care If You're a Woman


Finally, women should remind themselves that their cardiovascular health is of great concern, media emphasis on men's heart attacks notwithstanding. "More women than men die of heart disease each year," says Dr. Aliya Browne, clinical director for the Hainesport Women's Heart Center.

And women may have more difficulty staying away from unhealthy foods at the office, according to Browne: "We can become a bit more stressed than men, and that can make us more emotional eaters."





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
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Competitive personality pushes Gibson

As a cross country runner, Notre Dame senior Mike Gibson knows there is no one to blame but himself for a poor performance.

He uses that as motivation.

"I used to play soccer," Gibson said. "In soccer, you rely on your teammates for everything. After switching to cross country, it's all on you if you want to be the best. I try to put my best effort out there knowing it's all on me. How I do doesn't depend on how anyone else does and I really like that I can control what I do."

Gibson has emerged as a leader for the Dons.

After running a career-best time of 16 minutes, 34 seconds, and placing 10th at the East Suburban Catholic Conference Pre-Championship Meet on Sept. 12, Gibson placed 18th individually with

a time of 15:58.4 on a shorter, 2.9-mile course at the David Brady Invitational Saturday in Summit.

"Mike Gibson has been our best runner all year," Notre Dame coach John Barrett said. "He never wants to lose, whether it's against his teammates or other teams. He's a very good competitor. He practices hard and comes to race hard."

Gibson credits teammate Matt Siemanowski for his improvement.

"I compete with Matt and we really push each other," Gibson said. "The competitiveness makes us both better. I like to be up front and I like to be a leader. It's something that makes me feel good and I do the best I can to help the team."

Gibson trains at Dick Pond Athletics and has altered his game plan by running his first two miles at a quicker pace.

He's hoping that pays dividends by the end of the season.

"I'm learning how to take the pain and learning how to survive," Gibson said. "I hope to go to state. That is a major goal for me."

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
It's unusual for a consistent 1,000-yard running back to bounce around the NFL. In fact, only two players in league history have gained at least 1,000 yards in a season with three different teams. Any guesses? The first to do it was Ricky Watters, who topped the mark in 7 out of 10 seasons from 1992 through 2000 for San Francisco, Philadelphia and Seattle. The other is the still-active Willis McGahee, who has done it with Buffalo, Baltimore and Denver since being drafted in 2004.

Here's one from the remarkable coincidence department. Every year, the ACC gives out the Brian Piccolo Award to the conference's most courageous player, named of course for the late Brian Piccolo, who died of cancer while still a player for the Chicago Bears. In 2011, the award was given to North Carolina running back Giovani Bernard, who tore up this knee in 2010 but came back to rush for 1,222 yards last season. So get this Bernard graduated from Fort Lauderdale High School. So did Brian Piccolo.

If you're a Formula One race car fan, remember the name Lance Stoll. Just 13 in the summer of 2012, the Montreal native was signed by Ferrari, the sport's oldest team, at the tender age of 11 after dominating the Canadian go-kart circuit. Stoll will race go-karts in Europe until age 15, when he can get behind the wheel of a car. Until then, he'll make monthly visits to Ferrari's Driver Academy in Maranello, Italy, for reflex drills, breathing exercises and strategy sessions.



When Monreal-Berner, a senior, was asked who usually wins in practice, he smiled and looked over at Gargovic, saying, "You should ask him."

"I've beaten him twice," Gargovic said, though he wouldn't reveal how many times they've grappled with each other on the Wolves wrestling mats.

No matter, Gargovic displayed his strength Friday at Highland Park during the Wolves' 25-20 victory, clogging up the running lanes. Last year Giants (0-4) running back Andrew Sledd had six touchdowns and over 100 yards rushing, as Highland Park defeated Niles West 47-14. On Friday, he was held to one rushing touchdown and just 76 yards on 21 carries.

"Our coaches said to hit them and stay there to stop the run," Gargovic said about trying to limit

"He brings everything out there," Monreal-Berner said about his teammate. "He brings the attitude. He brings the intensity. The size of course. Just everything."

Much of those qualities can be traced to Wolves wrestling practices.

"The wrestling helps," Gargovic said. "When you're up against (offensive) linemen, it

helps you to get underneath them. In wrestling you need to get inside a lot."

When he wrestles, Gargovic has a couple of patented moves that he likes to use.

"Arm drags and slide-bys are his stuff (wrestling)," Monreal-Berner reported on Gargovic.

The way Gargovic is playing on the football field, not too many runners are going to slide by the line of scrimmage.

The Wolves will look to keep their undefeated season rolling, when they open up Central Suburban South play by hosting Waukegan (2-2) at 7:30 p.m. Friday. Waukegan, coming off a 14-7 win over Deerfield, has a defense that's allowed just over 14 points per game. On offense,
