

Kappy's reopens after renovation

The renamed and reinvented Kappy's American Grill is now open for business, and loyal customers are seeing a dining room, menu and uniforms like they haven't seen in 34 years.

With 23 fewer seats in the house, Kappy's is now a wide-open dining area with more intimate two-seat tables instead of booths, and no dividing walls anymore. A redesigned menu also offers 15 new dinner items — the main driving force behind the renovation.

"I told George that we have to take dinner more seriously," said co-owner Manolis Alpogianis. "BLT sandwiches, burgers and our Greek chicken are classic dinner items we kept, but we eliminated a ton of other things to make room for our new grilled and barbecue items."

The new dinner menu includes Blue Moon-infused skirt steak and brown sugar pork chops in the eight-item grilled section, as well as slow-smoked chicken, baby-back ribs and beef candy baskets in the seven-item smoked sections.

Hardwood flooring is atop the noticeable physical changes at Kappy's. The wood replaces green carpet and rugs.

All wood used for the floors, booths and new tabletops were from trees that fell naturally in the Midwest instead of from South American deforestation, Manolis Alpogianis said. Furthermore, he said the American workers in the Midwest also sowed the upholstery for the seat cushions.

"It cost us about 20 percent more, but my brother George was very adamant about being pro-America and environmentally friendly," Manolis Alpogianis said.

Kappy's traditional maroon uniforms have been handed in for collared black shirts with a yellow tie, creating the more elegant image the Alpogianis family wanted.

"We're quite good at the cooking, but there's also a presentation element to this business and we've stepped up our game so people

can truly enjoy their experience," said co-owner George Alpogianis, a member of the Niles Village Board.

An imitation brick wall and two flat-screen TVs replace George Alpogianis' wall of fame behind the eat-in counter - another fashion statement and transition in service.

The televisions will help turn the eat-in counter into a casual hangout later in the evening, when alcohol will be sold.

Though Kappy's does not have its liquor license just yet, George Alpogianis said the paperwork was filed and should be approved soon. Kappy's plans to sell five beers and six wines.

"We want people to feel comfortable having a beer with their meal while still being able to bring their kids with," Manolis Alpogianis

Kristina Otte brings her children to Kappy's once a week and said she takes no issue with the potential future alcohol sales.

"The whole project has made Kappy's much more contemporary," said Otte, who's also manager of the Morton Grove Farmers Market. "I'm glad Morton Grove has another elegant place for couples and families who like to go out."

Longtime Kappy's customer Edie Schulter said the wide-open dining room and surplus of natural light immediately caught her attention when she first visited the remodeled restaurant. The new menu also captured her attention.

"It's great to see all the breakfast items still here, because Kappy's has the best omelet in town and too much change can push your regulars away," Schulter said. "This is a good balance of traditional and brand new.'

Kappy's closed on Sept. 15 and reopened Oct. 15, a feat the family was told couldn't happen.

"A lot of places say they'll be closed a month and then don't reopen for three months," George Alpogianis said. "We were firm with our timeline because we wanted to hold the contractors accountable on everything else too. Changes

like this don't happen everyday." Kappy's is also hiring waiters and bus boys because several members of the old staff couldn't go four weeks without pay and took other jobs.

"We have just enough employees to run the restaurant, but we need to hire quickly before we burn anyone out," George Alpogianis said.

Niles man charged with shooting family member in home

60-year-old Niles man has been charged with shooting his 25-year-old son inside their home Sunday.

Chris Gianakopoulos, of 7233 W. Greenleaf Ave., was charged with one count of aggravated battery with a firearm in connection with the shooting, which officials said happened after an argument about the son's heroin use.

According to Assistant Cook County State's Attorney Christina Kye, Gianakopoulos' wife was arguing with their son, when the father tried to intervene

When Gianakopoulos was unsuccessful in breaking up the argument, Kye said, he went to get a 9mm Glock handgun that was loaded with one bullet.

Police said earlier that other family members inside the home heard the two men arguing before someone said, "I will shoot you," and a single gunshot was heard.

The victim was shot in the left arm and leg and was transported to Advocate Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge, police said. Assistant Public Defender Wendy Zun said the son was in detox for heroin use, and was initially unable to speak with investigators.

Gianakopoulos was taken into custody after he was allegedly seen running from the home. Police initially released his age as 52, but Monday said he is 60 years old.

Gianakopoulos is an engineer for Motorola who formerly served in the National Guard, Zun said.

His bond was set at \$100,000.

Morton Grove Hookah Lounge manager charged with theft after robbery report

A manager at Argila Hookah Lounge, 6322 Dempster Street, Morton Grove, is being charged with felony disorderly conduct and theft after police say he and an accomplice staged an armed robbery.

Moustafa Abdel-Salal, the 23-year old manager, called police in the early morning hours of Monday, Oct. 21 claiming a man wearing a hooded sweatshirt and mask was robbing the lounge at knifepoint.

Cmdr. Paul Yaras of the Morton Grove Police Department said officers created a perimeter around Argila while attempting to determine if the scene was

About \$260, several pieces of hookah equipment, a laptop and cellphone were reported stolen in the robbery, Yaras said. Abdel-Salal also suffered bruises in the alleged attack, Yaras said.

In the meantime, a patrol

officer noticed a man in a hooded sweatshirt parked in a car further down Dempster Street. Police approached 19-year-old Michael S. Marrougi and found the stolen items in his back seat.

Yaras said the two men gave statements that had some differing facts, and both ended up allegedly confessing to the staged robbery. Marrougi was reportedly waiting in a parking lot to meet Abdel-Salal, Yaras said.

Abdel-Salal was charged later that day with felony disorderly conduct and theft, while Marrougi was charged with theft.

Camera footage clearly shows a confrontation and struggle, Yaras said, but no property was damaged in the staged fight.



Village Board still not sure how to deal with term limit conflicts

Niles voters passed two different - and contradictory - term limit referenda in the spring.

One proposal has already gone into effect. The other hangs in limbo.

Officials are now considering whether it's the responsibility of the village to ensure the legal mess gets sorted out.

Trustee Rosemary Palicki brought the conflicting referenda issue back to the table last week, saying the matter should undergo a judicial review.

"That's the issue here — which one is valid?" she said. "We should follow this to the best of our ability legally, which means it's not our decision, it's the decision of a judge ... This is beyond our scope of authority."

Back in April, voters approved a citizens' petition to limit service on the Village Board to 16 years.

A second referendum, put forth by Niles and also passed by voters, revised an ordinance to allow trustees to serve a maximum of three full terms, equal to 12 years, and to limit the mayor to two full terms in office, or eight years.

After the results came in, Village Attorney Joe Annunzio consulted with outside legal counsel about the village's options for remedying the conflicting language.

According to documents obtained by the Pioneer Press, the village enlisted the assistance of attorneys from Holland & Knight three days after the referenda passed.

The firm found that, based on the ruling of a previous case heard in court, "a municipality has no obligation to implement (and a court will not enforce) a voter-approved referendum that is not clear and self-executing."

A second legal opinion — from Chicago-based Ancel Glink, which specializes in government law-also determined the matter hinged on whether the referenda met the requirements for being enforceable.

Both firms found the village's resolution question to be a valid and binding referendum. The petition question, however, was not self-executing and

contained "a number of ambiguities inherent in the wording," reads a memo from Ancel Glink attorney Paul Keller.

"I recommend the Village Board simply acknowledge that term limits have been adopted in Niles and take no other action," he stated.

Barbara Adams, of Holland & Knight, reached a similar conclusion in her report, noting Niles "has no obligation to, and is unable to, enforce the terms" of the petition question.

For their services rendered, the village paid Holland & Knight and Ancel Glink \$4,691.53 and \$450, respectively, according to village documents.

Trustee Chris Hanusiak pointed out on Sept. 24 that legal opinions are, after all, just opinions. He sided with Palicki and called on the village to let the courts decide.

"It would be better for us to resolve it for the people," he said.

Yet not all Village Board members were convinced anything more had to be done on the their end at taxpayers' expense.

A few officials agreed that Niles resident Joe Makula, who organized the citizens' petition, should be the one

settling the matter through the appropriate legal channels, if he so desired.

"We did everything correct, in my opinion, and we're back here talking about it again," Trustee Joe LoVerde said. "We have term limits."

"Why is it up to us to defend someone else's position?" added Mayor Andrew Przybylo, who initially expressed skepticism over the value in obtaining a judge's ruling.

The first-term mayor previously served as a village trustee for 24 years. He noted the possibility of losing his seat if the current term-limit rule is replaced by the measure limiting service to 16 years.

"I don't think it would be a fair thing to do (to voters)," Przybylo said.

Palicki said wanting to resolve the referenda conflict was not means for booting someone out of office. Rather, the residents of Niles "deserve a decision to be made, whatever is correct,"

Przybylo said he would see that trustees vote on sending the matter for judicial review. If the Village Board were split on its decision, Przybylo noted he would vote "yes" to letting the courts decide.

Niles testing local sewers by pumping in smoke

If you see the smoke coming out of the ground over the next few weeks, don't worry. The world isn't ending. It's just the Village of Niles Department of Public Services testing its sewers.

Smoke testing allows the village to find leaks, cracks and other sewer damage that would otherwise be hard to detect. The smoke isn't dangerous, but if it enters a home, it shows that something far more dangerous may already be leaking into the building. If that happens, residents are strongly urged to notify the work crews as soon as possible.

Smoke-testing has been used to find leaks in sewers since the late 19th century. According to Scott Jochim, director of the Department of Public Services, Niles has done smoke-testing before, approximately 20 years ago. This time, the village has contracted Chicago-based Hey and Associates Inc., a water resources consulting agency, to help handle the project.

Testing for leaks serves several purposes. It helps keep rain water and ground water from entering the sewers, which can put a strain on sewer pipes and sewage treatment facilities. And according to Jochim, finding and plugging the leaks could prevent sewer back-ups and help reduce flooding.

"We are looking for undetected cross connections between the sanitary and storm sewers," he said. "By eliminating these, we can hopefully reduce flooding in basements — assuming we find some."

The village will be smoke-testing the sewers section by section. The

crews will hang notices on the doors of all the buildings within the testing area before the actual testing starts. However, according to the statement on the Niles website, the testing may be postponed due to bad weather.

Ideally, the smoke would never enter the homes. But if it does, it would indicate that there is a leak inside the building and dangerous sewer gases may be seeping into the house. Public Services is urging residents to report the smoke as soon as they see it either to the crews working outside or by calling (262)

Jochim didn't think the test would impact too many property owners.

"We have no idea how many homes may have smoke entering their homes," he said. "Last time, we had one or two homes that reported smoke."

If plumbing issues are discovered, it will be up to the property owner to fix them. But Jochim told Niles Herald-Spectator that the issues may be easy to fix.

"[It] could be as simple as pouring water in the drain," he said.

Jochim emphasized that spoke wasn't dangerous. But according to the village statement, it may affect people with respiratory problems. If anyone who has mobility and respiratory problems lives in the building within the testing area, Public Services is encouraging them to contact the village before the testing begins.

Because of potential weather-related delays, the village hasn't set concrete dates, but Public Services expects the tests to run though October and wrap up by mid-November.

Morton Grove asks residents: 'What do you want in town?'

Morton Grove is building a road map for the future, and the village wants to know what residents are looking for.

A consultant was hired in August for \$43,800 to evaluate assets in Morton Grove, available resources, stakeholders' wants and projected trends before building a strategic plan that future government officials can follow.

The project is expected to run eight months. An Oct. 30 workshop at the American Legion Civic Center is the first scheduled opportunity for residents and business owners to chime in on what they want. The forum starts at 7 p.m. and will run as long as needed.

"Citizen input is vital in strategic planning. Who knows our needs and wants better than our own Morton Grove residents." Mayor Dan DiMaria said. "We have scheduled this community workshop meeting to allow residents to learn about the strategic planning process, but more importantly, to gather their ideas and suggestions for how to move Morton Grove forward."

Suggestions could include road upgrades, the addition or revision of village services, changes in how future home construction is regulated, or desires for new types of restaurants, among others.

The consultant, Houseal Lavigne Associates, also plans to create small focus groups later in the process to further gather information and run possible solutions past selected demographics.

Other town hall meeting-type workshops may be scheduled in the future

Morton Grove's Economic Development Commission is also working toward getting feedback from local businesses so the village can better retain current companies and attract new ones.

Morton Grove may get two more restaurants with video gaming

Two new restaurants may be coming to Morton Grove — and they both could have video gambling.

Blackhawk Restaurant Group has 39 pending applications with the Illinois Gaming Commission for new bistros throughout suburban Cook County, Will, McHenry and DuPage counties. Two of the applications list Morton Grove as places of business.

One of the proposed Betty's Bistro restaurants would be at 7152 Dempster St., near the intersection of Harlem Avenue, while the other would be at 7921

Golf Road, near Washington Avenue.

Four establishments in Morton Grove already have gaming licenses - Bringer Inn at 6230 Lincoln Ave., Tommy's at 9005 Waukegan Rd., the Moose Lodge 376 at 6419 Chestnut St., and Morton Grove American Legion Post 134 at 6140 Dempster

Earlier this year, Blackhawk told officials in Bartlett that Betty's will offer wine, beer and specialty beverages, and serve light breakfast and lunch, accroding to the Daily Herald. The Bartlett restaurant is slated to have five video gaming machines.

Morton Grove trustees approved the creation of five new liquor licenses in July to help make the town look more viable to businesses, instead of having only a few available licenses in each category.

Trustee John Thill voiced concerns over whether the new licenses would legitimately attract restaurants or serve a video gaming purpose. Mayor Dan DiMaria assured him that restaurants were the target and video gaming was inconsequential.

Neither DiMaria nor Thill were available for comment at the time of publication. A timeline for the opening of Betty's Bistro is still unknown as well.

Retired teachers band to protect their pensions

New group pickets in front of Biss's Skokie office

The retired teachers say they had a deal about their pensions and now state legislators like Sen. Daniel Biss, D-9, are trying to break it.

"It's like Obamacare and what the Tea Partiers tried to do," said retired Park Ridge teacher Fred Klonsky, who is leading a new group called S.O.R.E. - Skokie Organization of Retired Educators to try to protect their pensions. "It was settled. You can't come back and say let's do Obamacare over again."

But Biss sees little way out of a massive pension debt problem for the state unless everyone gives.

"Most far-reaching pieces of pension legislation that I have supported," Biss said, "are ones that would decrease the unfunded liabilities by virtue of benefit reforms by less than a third."

In other words, \$30 billion or so of the approximately \$100 billion of pension debt would come in changes to benefits to decrease the liability.

"When you say changes in the benefits, you mean decreasing the benefits," Klonsky shot back. "It means those who receive benefits now would receive less benefits if your plan would go into effect."

The feisty exchange occurred Friday outside the senator's Skokie office where 50 or so retired and a few current teachers picketed.

They held up signs as they faced busy Dempster Street - "Don't mess with our TRS," "If you can. read this, thank a teacher," "We paid you promised" and "Don't steal our pension" - among them.

Biss was patient and listened, and the teachers were respectful during the exchange. But they pulled no punches in letting the senator know that they were unhappy with the proposals he has supported.

While pensions were the main topic of the day, teachers also asserted that proposed changes in health care and Medicare are evidence that they are under attack.

"I feel it should be the principle of my party to speak for middle class and working people to maintain those benefits, and I really would like to have your cooperation on that," retired Wheeling-Buffalo Grove teacher and current Skokie resident Harriet Sheeley told Biss.

Agree on the problem

The two sides agree that the state was woefully negligent in not making mandated actuarial

payments into the pension system for decades. It created one of the worst pension crises in the country.

"What everyone agrees about is that we have a very, very massive pension debt," Biss said. "I think what is empirically true is that there is a gap between the assets available in the pension system today and the agreement that has been made to people who have already carried out service. And that is a very, very expensive problem."

The differences come in how to solve the crisis.

Biss believes reform proposals he supports take "a balanced approach" and spread out the burden among all parties. Less than onethird of the debt would come from workers, he repeated, the rest from the state through new revenue and other means.

"Instead of using the rhetoric about how proposed pension

reforms are placing the entire burden on the back of the workers, instead say it will place a little less than a third of the burden on the back of the workers," Biss said. "I think that would be a better characterization.

Not to the teachers who assert they already kept their end of the bargain and paid their share. Their pensions, they say, are protected under the state Constitution.

Teachers contribute 9.4 percent of their salary to their pension fund and receive no social security, according to S.O.R.E. It wasn't teachers who failed to pay into the system and create the crisis, the group maintains.

"This should not be the office we're marching in front of," Klonsky said. "The fact that we should be marching in front of the offices of Democrats to defend our pensions is crazy."

But the debt has become so

large, Biss insisted, that there is no viable solution other than sharing the pain.

S.O.R.E. supports a more graduated, progressive income tax to raise revenue in Illinois.

"Penny Pritzker who (owned) the Hyatt Hotel pays the same income tax rate as the people who clean the rooms in the hotel," Klonsky said. "We're not proposing higher taxes, but what we're proposing is those who have more should pay more and those who have less would be paying less."

What is uncertain is how much additional revenue would be generated under this change as well as closing corporate tax loopholes that S.O.R.E. also recommends.

What is more certain is that S.O.R.E. is not going away. The impassioned group was planning to head to Springfield this week to stand up for protecting pensions they say teachers were promised.

"I turned 20 years old in 1968," Klonsky said. "Those who turned 20 in 1968 are turning 65 this year. They're entering Medicare and social security. We bring with us a 60s sensibility. We fight for what is ours. We know how to fight and win."

Unpaid student fees piling up at District 64

Unpaid student fees are piling up at Park Ridge-Niles District 64, prompting officials to contemplate how to recover some of the roughly \$94,000 in lost revenue from the last two years.

Business Manager Rebecca Allard reported a growing trend in the number of outstanding balances at the district's seven schools and its special-needs preschool.

After one month of schools being back in session, the district had yet to receive payments for one out of every five students.

In the 2011-12 school year, \$40,952 in fees for 157 pupils - equal to 3.7 percent of student accounts - went unpaid. Last year the number of outstanding balances

rose to 198, or 4.6 percent of accounts, for a total loss of \$52,668.

Students with fee waivers, such as those who qualify for the federal free lunch and breakfast program, were not included in the figures.

Annual registration fees vary by grade level, and families have the option to pay for additional services like busing, sports, lunch and extended care.

Allard on Sept. 23 noted that 894 students had charges on their accounts for 2013-14, which she said is typical for this time of year, yet nonetheless troubling.

All student fees were due by Aug. 1. The average amount per child owed is \$260.

"The question becomes, do you write them off as the cost of doing business or do

we secure the services of a collection agency to collect those fees?" Allard said.

District 64, to date, has not used a third-party vendor to recoup money it is due. Current procedures have the business office mailing quarterly statements to families with outstanding accounts. The next bills are scheduled to go out Oct. 31.

Staff does not take further action to settle delinquent accounts after final notices are sent April 30. Late fees aren't assessed, and past-due accounts do not get reported to credit bureaus.

The district could only speculate why some families hadn't paid the out-of-pocket costs, though the bottom-line for most officials was that fairness and accountability need be considered.

"I'm very sad about this."

said board member Vicki Lee. "We all work hard, we all pay our property taxes, we all pay our fees."

Board President Anthony Borrelli acknowledged District 64's fees are higher than some of its neighboring districts, and suggested improvements could be made to the payment process to lessen the burden on families.

Installment plans are available by request, Allard said.

Board members proposed phone call follow-ups or having notices come from personnel at the schools since they interact with families more regularly.

Enlisting the services of a collection agency is another option the administration may explore.

We definitely want to keep a level of sensitivity," noted Superintendent Philip Bender.

Library unveils new website

When the Niles Public Library planned its renovation project, it was thinking beyond the physical structures.

The library website, which was last redesigned in April 2009, was due for a significant update.

That update arrived in the beginning October. The new website features a different color scheme, a better-organized layout, greater social media integration and more resources than ever before.

"The Library wanted an easy-to-navigate website with a clean layout," explained Vasilic. "We chose a new color scheme with brighter colors for the new website."

The library also wanted to make it easier for patrons to find and use its online resources. This included research databases, job search tools, and resources for English language learners.

While most of the site's content carried over from the previous design, the library did add a few new features. It launched a new Community section. which offers links to websites of local services, schools, hospitals and transportation providers. Patrons who want to know more about how local veterans participated in various wars can access the Veterans History Project, an online multimedia collection.

The library is also expanding its ebook offerings. In the past, the library only subscribed to MvMediaMall digital library service, which only offered ebooks from certain publishers. It

recently subscribed to 3M Cloud, another digital library. While it doesn't fill all the gaps, it significantly expanded the library's digital offerings.

The redesigned website was officially unveiled at the beginning of October.



E-reader refund is on the books

ear Help Squad, I returned a Nook to Barnes & Noble by mail after receiving a return merchandise authorization number. They have acknowledged they received it on March 21st. I still have not received a credit on my credit card for the return.

I have called them several times, and every time they acknowledge receipt of the Nook, that it was in good condition and I should be receiving a credit in 1 to 2 billing periods.

On August 28th, I was assured I would receive an email in 1 to 5 business days. I have not heard from Barnes & Noble at all. Can you please help?

Dear Bonnie,

This was a pretty simple fix for us, with a result that we think will make you happy. We called Barnes & Noble and spoke with a manager, who explained that the problem was, they don't give credit card refunds for store purchases, so whoever you were speaking with was mistaken. Instead, you will be receiving a check in the mail for the entire refund amount within seven days of the phone call we placed.

On another note, I remember you told me that you returned the Nook because you had a change of heart when it came to what kind of electronic book reader you preferred, choosing in the end to purchase

It got the Help Squad thinking about all the possibilities there are on the market for e-readers and tablets. So, we spoke with Edwon Lighthall, a Microsoft Advisor for Best Buy in Melrose Park, and asked him to share the features and costs of a few great options.



One specific demographic for the Nook seems to be college students, as the Nook offers download options for a lot of collegerequired reading. Starts at \$129.99.
- 3. Microsoft Surface RT: With a Windows operating screen and an HD touch screen, this tablet comes pre-installed with Word, Excel and PowerPoint. If you're willing to upgrade to the Microsoft Surface Pro 2, you get one year of free unlimited voice calling to landlines in more than 60 countries, free Skype in 2 million hot spots, and additional storage for two years. Both Microsoft Surface tablets have high-resolution screens. Starts at \$399.99 for RT and \$899.99 for Pro 2.
- 4. Kindle Fire HDX: "This gives you a beautiful screen and better resolution than a television," said Lighthall. Additionally, it's easy to navigate, very user-friendly, and it's very lightweight. It also lets you set up individual profiles and time limits for your children. Starts at \$229.99.
- 5. Apple iPad: According to Lighthall, because it's Apple, it's reliable, durable, and you get automatic updates. Lighthall said Apple is always rated one of the best. His favorites: iPad with Retina display, starts at \$499.99; and iPad Mini, starts at \$329.99.

Fifty years later and Kennedy assassination still stings



was walking home from school. My best friend asked if I had heard the president was shot. I hadn't. I thought it was some sort of

I said I didn't believe him, but he insisted, adding that our principal came into class and said so. At this Chicago Catholic school where most of the teachers were nuns, the principal's word was divine truth.

"She didn't come into our class," I countered.

By then I was home, and when I walked into the kitchen I saw my mother was crying. She didn't have to say anything. I knew it was true.

And that's where I was when I learned President Kennedy had been assassinated.

The 50th anniversary of his assassination is still a month away, but articles are already being published about the assassination and his presidency, new books are being released, new conspiracies are being put forward and old ones are being rehashed.

For those of you who don't remember Kennedy or the times, I'd recommend a couple of books. One is President Kennedy: Profile of Power, by Richard Reeves, where I learned that Eisenhower didn't like him and JFK didn't exactly realize the influence his own words had on the Civil Rights movement.

"Understanding my obsession with all things JFK, and obviously I am not alone in this obsession, might help the younger generation understand us Baby Boomers. We forever long for it to be noon on Nov. 22, 1963, because the downward spiral leading to exactly where we are today began at 12:30 p.m. with those three shots. For us, the Kennedy assassination will always be an open wound that will never heal."

Another good biography is An Unfinished Life, by Robert Dallek, where I learned that when asked if he was a liberal or conservative, JFK answered: "I'm a realist."

Like many of my generation who remember exactly where we where when we heard the awful news, I've spent the last 50 years asking why, wondering who did it, and imagining all the what-if scenarios.

I've read many of the conspiracy books. It was easy to see conspiracies everywhere after a decade of Vietnam, the assassinations of Martin Luther King and Bobby Kennedy, and then Nixon's fall.

After considering Kennedy was killed by a government plot, or by a power-hungry Lyndon Johnson, or by an out-of-control CIA, or by organized crime or, finally, by a Secret Service

agent in an incredibly tragic accident. I've come to the conclusion that Oswald did it and he acted alone. Everything else is bunk. Modern technology and ballistics prove it.

The realization that Oswald acting alone killed Kennedy leads one to the disorienting conclusion that Kennedy was killed for no reason. It was a senseless act with no overarching meaning. It changed the trajectory of the nation, but in a way that was just

one of thousands of random possibili-

Maybe we would have avoided Vietnam, maybe not. The breakdown in society we experienced in the years that followed was probably inevitable. But no Johnson and maybe no Nixon to follow? It is an interesting parlor game to consider.



Soon, it is feared, all stores will be open all day Thanksgiving. Store personnel and their families will be denied a Thanksgiving. Families will cut short their holiday celebration to go shopping, or maybe have no Thanksgiving dinner at all to save time and energy for hitting the stores.

And before we know it, Thanksgiving will have vanished.

That would be a pity. Thanksgiving is the least commercial, most family-oriented holiday we have. It's the holiday that most resembles the way Norman Rockwell painted Americans.

And, it seems a good bet that commerce will nibble away at Thanksgiving until the holiday — though it might not disappear will lose much of its meaning and special-

And whose fault will that be?

Business? Yes, I suppose. But blaming merchants would be like blaming a lion for killing and eating a zebra. It is the nature of a lion to kill prey and eat it. And it is in the nature of business to make money.







Park Ridge native in running for 'best job around the world'

t's one of those too-good-to-betrue job advertisements. For one thing, the tagline calls it "the best job around the world!" (And ves, the exclamation mark is included). The "chief world explorer" also promises a year of international travel, napping on beaches and a \$100,000 paycheck.

The company is Jauntaroo, and it helps match people with the perfect vacation destination — hence the need for a new chief world explorer to essentially promote the company.

Park Ridge native and 2005 Maine South graduate Mickey Mangan admits it's a long shot, but he's among 50 applicants up for the job, thanks to videos he created and submitted as part of the application process. His first short video highlighted Cologne, Germany, where he had been living and working for two years. The second, which can be viewed at www.bestjobaroundtheworld.com, is a two-and-a-half-minute piece highlighting the people and places of Bayonne, N.J., a city of 63,000 east of Newark. Mangan produced the film "over the course of two sleepless days," he says.

"I honestly do believe I have the best two videos of anyone who applied," he said. "I get the sense the applicants were putting an emphasis on themselves, but I decided to not include a single word about myself and just show the quality

material I am able to produce all on my own."

Mangan sees the job promotion as an ad campaign for Jauntaroo, as the company has received free nationwide publicity as a result of the unusual position. But he doesn't mind - he's having fun and hopes he'll be among the final five contestants chosen for an in-person interview later this month.

But Mangan's material isn't the only thing that will determine if he gets the job; he also needs to accumulate as many "likes" on the video as possible.

The winner is expected to be announced this November. If he doesn't win, Mangan is looking to focus on another endeavor, his "Lernen to Talk Show." It's a video project showing how ordinary people learn languages while living

Q: What made you want to apply for the chief world explorer job?

A: I first heard of it because a friend of mine emailed me a link to the job opening. I had never heard of the company Jauntaroo before. When I read the job description, I thought it spoke to me specifically

because it talked about needing somebody who loves to travel, connect with local cultures and produce video content to be published online

Q: What made you choose Bayonne, N.J. as the town you profiled?

A: I got an email from the company saying they liked my first video and I was one of the people chosen for the top 50 (finalists). I had only seven days to do the video. I was on tour with my brother's band, Jet W. Lee. I play bass when they tour sometimes, and we were in New Jersey. The task was to make a video of your town as if you were the chief world explorer. I would have done it for Park Ridge, but I wasn't going to be in Park Ridge until after the deadline. So I picked Bayonne because I wanted a smaller place, I wanted a place that would highlight my abilities as a travel host. I thought if I could make a small town exciting, then that says a lot about what I can do on camera.

The one thing that surprised me was that trying to tell a story about the place you're in can help you appreciate that place. I never went to Bayonne before, but I love it now. When you try to be creative about something, you end up caring about it more.

Q: If you did a travel video on Park Ridge, what would you highlight?

A: I would combine it with my own story. When I talk about Park Ridge with anyone, I always

emphasize the vertical street signs and how we're all better at reading vertically because of the signs. I'd also mention that Hillary Clinton lived here and how I loved the Pickwick. The Pickwick would definitely be in it. I like District 64 so I'd definitely show Lincoln Middle School and Roosevelt (where I went to school). I'd talk about the new development in Uptown, too, and about my favorite restaurant, Siam Thai. That's the first place I tried pad

Since I've been back to Park Ridge, I've been appreciating it in a different light. Like how the trees look when the sun shines. That's something I never noticed before, until I came back.

Q: If you're chosen as chief

world explorer, what exactly would your job be?

A: They've kept it kind of vague. They said in the job description that the chief world explorer would be something of a figurehead of the company and do media appearances.

It would be a lot of going to particular travel destinations and essentially advertising different places. Personally, I would love to have this job because it would be a way to practice my filmmaking. I'm pretty much self-taught when it comes to making videos and when I think about making 50 videos in one year, I couldn't imagine a better way to practice. That's what really appeals to me: supporting myself while cutting my teeth on filmmaking.





Employee Engagement and Creativeship: Lessons for Evolving Leaders

I've often defined leadership, which originally morphed from management, as the ability to lead people, build fellowship, and make money. But I've realized that this archaic definition is so yesterday!

While employee engagement remains the secret sauce that separates you from your competition, engaged employees alone will not guarantee business success.

Just look at iconic companies such as Digital Equipment Corporation, Polaroid, and Arthur D. Little. They were led by extraordinary leaders and had strong employee satisfaction and engagement, yet they went bankrupt.

Why? Because employee engagement, profit, growth, client satisfaction and even solid leadership by themselves are not sustainable.

Today, leadership is about Creativeship, defined as the creation of sustainable cultures and business

Creativeship will allow a business to compete and thrive in this world of unprecedented technological advances, globalization, shifting economic drivers, government intervention, changing workforce demographics, vastly different motivational drivers with Gen X, and the emergence of corporate social responsibility as a motivational driver.

Last year, I had the pleasure of leading a Monster webinar, Creativeship: The Evolution from Management to Leadership to Creativeship. The overwhelming response told me that both the Creativeship theme and the messenger were resonating with a wide range of people.

The themes of job creation AND organizational greed are not topics with people across the board -and these themes are woven throughout Creativeship.

The Six Pillars of Creativeship

Sustainability requires that firms shift their leadership model to Creativeship and invest their energies and resources in six prominent and interconnected business priorities: Purpose, Engagement, Performance, Innovation, Branding, and Growth.

Purpose. Generation Y is motivated by purpose as they become a substantial part of the workforce. Apparallel trend is the increasing role Baby Boomers are playing in leading corporate social responsibility activities. After years of focusing on wealth accumulation and career advancement, boomers are now shifting their priorities.

Engagement. I define employee engagement as the unlocking of employee potential to drive high performance. To help employees reach their potential, leaders must tap into the intrinsic motivational drivers of their employees and develop a job match that finds symbiosis between what an employee is great at, what they love to do, and what needs to get done.

Performance. Fair and equal are not always one in the same. Recently, a major Internet company announced plans to reward all of their employees (regardless of merit) with a 10 percent pay increase just because the company was doing well.

Over time, such a decision erodes employee performance and creates disengagement. There is no incentive for employees to be high performers when mediocrity is rewarded in kind.

Innovation. It seems axiomatic: companies fail when they cease evolving their product or service, or internal processes. And yet many organizations are slow to learn this lesson, leading their organizations for today rather than creating cultures of innovation and sustainability.

Creating this sort of company-culture requires investing today's cash to discover tomorrow's technologies, products, services, geographies, and approaches. The mantra "innovate or die" has never been more prescient.

Tri-branding. Creativeship is all about leveraging your employment brand to position oneself as an employer of choice.

Building sustainable cultures and business models with the valences that are now so much a part of everyday life requires tri-branding. This occurs when companies build tenacious customer brand loyalty and passion that customers and employees then feel compelled to communicate.

In his book, The Tipping Point, Malcolm Gladwell discusses connectors, defined as sociable. personalities who bring people together.

Given social media's role as a brand accelerator, connectors -- also a key point of Creativeship's tri-branding message -- have never been more relevant than today.

Global growth. Technology is creating a level playing field regardless of where a product is produced or a service is performed. And with younger employees increasingly motivated more by career development opportunities than financial rewards, an organization will seem hopelessly retrograde if it does not find its footing in the greater realm.

Having spoken to audiences worldwide since the Monster Webinar, Creativeship's theme of global growth continues to be a driver for markets and talent.

Today's Millennials WANT to work for global companies, given their experience in studying abroad and their "flat' worldview.

To be truly sustainable, companies that are local need to think regional; companies that are regional need to think national; companies that are national need to think global.

The interdependence of these individual pillars is what defines Creativeship.

To build a sustainable corporate culture, you've got to ask, "What's next?" You also need to wonder, "Why? and "Why not?"

And you can never take "because" as an answer.

Employee Engagement and Creativeship: **Lessons for Evolving Leaders**

I've often defined leadership, which originally morphed from management, as the ability to lead people, build fellowship, and make money. But I've realized that this archaic definition is so yesterday!

While employee engagement remains the secret sauce that separates you from your competition, engaged employees alone will not guarantee business success.

Just look at iconic companies such as Digital Equipment Corporation, Polaroid, and Arthur D. Little... They were led by extraordinary leaders and had strong employee satisfaction and engagement, yet they went bankrupt.

Why? Because employee engagement, profit, growth, client satisfaction and even solid leadership by themselves are not sustainable.

Today, leadership is about Creativeship, defined as the creation of sustainable cultures and business

Creativeship will allow a business to compete and thrive in this world of unprecedented technological advances, globalization, shifting economic drivers, government intervention, changing workforce demographics, vastly different motivational drivers with Gen X, and the emergence of corporate social responsibility as a motivational driver.

Last year, I had the pleasure of leading a Monster webinar, Creativeship: The Evolution from Management to Leadership to Creativeship. The overwhelming response told me that both the Creativeship theme and the messenger were resonating with a wide range of people.

The themes of job creation AND organizational greed are hot topics with people across the board -and these themes are woven throughout Creativeship.

The Six Pillars of Creativeship

Sustainability requires that firms shift their leadership model to Creativeship and invest their energies and resources in six prominent and interconnected business priorities. Purpose, Engagement, Performance, Innovation, Branding, and Growth.

Purpose. Generation Y is motivated by purpose as they become a substantial part of the workforce. A parallel trend is the increasing role Baby Boomers are playing in leading corporate social responsibility activities. After years of focusing on wealth accumulation and career advancement, boomers are now shifting their priorities.

Engagement. I define employee engagement as the unlocking of employee potential to drive high performance. To help employees reach their potential, leaders must tap into the intrinsic motivational drivers of their employees and develop a job match that finds symbiosis between what an employee is great at, what they love to do, and what needs to get done.

Performance. Fair and equal are not always one in the same. Recently, a major Internet company announced plans to reward all of their employees (regardless of merit) with a 10 percent pay increase just because the company was doing well,

Over time, such a decision erodes employee performance and creates disengagement. There is no incentive for employees to be high performers when mediocrity is rewarded in kind.

Innovation. It seems axiomatic: companies fail when they cease evolving their product or service, or internal processes. And yet many organizations are slow to learn this lesson, leading their organizations for today rather than creating cultures of innovation and sustainability.

Creating this sort of company culture requires investing today's cash to discover tomorrow's technologies, products, services, geographies, and approaches. The mantra "innovate or die" has never been more prescient.

Tri-branding. Creativeship is all about leveraging your employment brand to position oneself as an employer of choice.

Building sustainable cultures and business models with the valences that are now so much a part of everyday life requires tri-branding. This occurs when companies build tenacious customer brand loyalty and passion that customers and employees then feel compelled to communicate.

In his book, The Tipping Point, Malcolm Gladwell discusses connectors, defined as sociable personalities who bring people together.

Given social media's role as a brand accelerator, connectors -- also a key point of Creativeship's tri-branding message -- have never been more relevant than today.

Global growth. Technology is creating a level playing field regardless of where a product is produced or a service is performed. And with younger employees increasingly motivated more by career development opportunities than financial rewards, an organization will seem hopelessly retrograde if it does not find its footing in the greater realm.

Having spoken to audiences worldwide since the Monster Webinar, Creativeship's theme of global growth continues to be a driver for markets and talent.

Today's Millennials WANT to work for global companies, given their experience in studying abroad and their "flat' worldview.

To be truly sustainable, companies that are local need to think regional; companies that are regional need to think national; companies that are national need to think global.

The interdependence of these individual pillars is what defines Creativeship.

To build a sustainable corporate culture, you've got to ask, "What's next?" You also need to wonder, "Why? and "Why not?"





Gastón Acurio brings his world-renowned fare to

hen chef and restaurateur Gastón Acurio decides to open a restaurant i

decides to open a restaurant in Chicago, people pay attention. And for good reason: Acurio is behind more than 30 restaurants worldwide, and his Astrid v Gastón in Lima, Peru, was recognized as the 14th best restaurant in the world and the No. 1 restaurant in Latin America, according to the prestigious World's 50 Best Restaurants list. Tanta. his first foray into the Chicago dining scene, is carving out a reputation of its own; it's a hip, fun restaurant rife with traditional Peruvian fare. "Peruvian food is influenced by many cultures - Chinese, Japanese, African - all showcased in our dishes," says chef de cuisine Jesus Delgado.

The menu runs the gamut from smaller shared plates to street-food skewers to larger entrees. The vibrant ceviches are a highlight: There's the acidic clasico with fluke, red onion and cilantro (\$12), and the sweeter, Japanese-inspired nikei with ahi tuna, avocado, cucumber and tamarind (\$12).

The pescado frito (\$43), one of the larger entrees, tops a beautifully plated fried striped bass with baby bok choy, nikei sauce and chaufa rice. Here's what else you'll find at Tanta:

Chef stats: Delgado, a native of Peru, has worked for Acurio for a good part of his career, most recently at La Mar Cebicheria Peruana in San Francisco. Prior to that, he worked throughout Peru in various Chinese and Japanese restaurants.

National spirit: Pisco, an immensely popular spirit in Peru, is spotlighted on the cocktail menu. "It's fun, and the result is a very fresh, vibrant high-acidity drink," says beverage director Tomy Lokvicic. The Lima Llama (\$11), Tanta's version of the Moscow Mule, mixes Pisco with lime and ginger beer in a copper mug, while the Pisco Punch combines the spirit with pineapple gomme syrup and lemon (\$11).

Bundle up: As temperatures begin to drop, Delgado will introduce his winter menu. "I'm planning more soups, heartier dishes," he says. While we can safely expect Peruvian flavors and an abundance of local ingredients, Delgado himself has no idea what's in store weatherwise. "Honestly, I don't know what to expect from a Chicago winter," he laughs. "I have no idea what's coming."

eborah Lloyd is a woman in love. For her latest collection, the launch of which falls on the brand's 20th anniversary, Lloyd is channeling the vivaciousness that the Kate Spade New York girl embodies. "The whole idea of this collection was dancing on tables," she says. "I was inspired by Studio 54. I never got to go, and that's my biggest regret. I just love the idea of celebration."The influence of Studio 54's wild glamour is obvious in some of Lloyd's favorite pieces this season, especially the leopard-print jeans, which match the leopard-print banquettes that once lined the infamous hot spot.





roundhouse-kicked her way to pop icon status as the lovely-but-lethal Buffy the Vampire Slayer. But that was

more than 15 years ago. Since then, the actress has been busy: She's starred in films like "The Grudge," lent her voice to Seth Green's stopmotion show "Robot Chicken," married '90s (and current) heartthrob Freddie Prinze Jr., and given birth to two children, Charlotte Grace (4) and Rocky (1). While some celebs might take a minute to breathe — or even decide to call it quits and rest on their laurels — Gellar, 36, is back in the television saddle, starring alongside comedy legend Robin Williams in this fall's No. 1 new show, "The Crazy Ones," which drew more than 15 million viewers for its Sept. 26 pilot episode.

Set in Chicago, the show stars Williams and Gellar as Simon and Sydney Roberts, a father-daughter team running a major ad firm. For Gellar, stepping into her role as Sydney, the pragmatic counterpart to Williams' creative chaos, involved taking in a lot of television. "Watching commercials and thinking about the most memorable ones, that was my research," Gellar says. "[Wendy's] 'Where's the beef' is the commercial that really stuck with me."

"The Crazy Ones" is a horse of a different color for Gellar, which she readily admits. "The bond we formed [as a cast] is really different," she says. "We say 'hat we're like a mini theater troupe." While a sitcom is uncharted territory, Gellar is proving that comedy is right in her wheelhouse. "Part of what made 'Buffy' so great was its comedy. And I've always been lucky to keep my feet wet, whether it was with 'Saturday Night Live' or [other projects]."

Not that Gellar needs to prove her mettle or Hollywood worth. In her 33-year career (she started modeling at age 4), she's earned a Daytime Emmy for her long-running role on "All My Children," and "Buffy" was named one of Entertainment Weekly's 10 greatest TV shows of all time. Even on the big screen, Gellar is certified gold. Her horror flick "The Grudge" earned more than \$110 million at the U.S. box office, making it the No. 8 domestic grossing horror film ever. Though her career might have cooled while she grew her picture-perfect family with Prinze (whom she met on the set of the cult classic "I Know What You Did Last Summer"), it's never really lost momentum.

Now, she's moving faster than ever. In just the first three episodes of "The Crazy Ones," Gellar has belted out an off-key song in a crowded restaurant in front of Kelly Clarkson, flooded Daley Plaza, and crashed a car alongside Williams. Between takes, she's equally playful with the last. "When we were shooting the pilot, all the lights went down on the set; it was complete darkness," remembers John Montgomery, the show's executive producer and former executive creative director of Leo Burnett ad agency (see sidebar). "The lights came up and Sarah was lying on the floor like she'd been murdered, like she was a character in 'Clue.' She's always looking for opportunities to keep things fun and light."

Montgomery is just as quick to sing Gellar's praises onscreen. "Sarah is able to mine different human foibles, like insecurity. She finds the truth in the scene and makes it funny," he says. "I think we've tapped into something that she hasn't been able to put on display before, but must have been there all the time."

Though the show is filmed almost exclusively in LA, it's set in Chicago, a city that Gellar is a big fan of — despite having a rough experience on her last visit. "I was going to dinner three blocks from my hotel and [the doorman] was like, 'Do you want us to get you a cab?' It was three blocks! I was like, 'I'm from New York, I'm fine,' "she says. "It was the longest, coldest three blocks I've ever walked in my life. I had to stop halfway and take a break. I took a cab on the way home."

When Gellar isn't filming, she's juggling life as a wife and mother. She's been married to Prinze for 11 years, and the pair appears happy as ever, recently moving into a sprawling new house to accommodate their growing clan. Gellar makes it a point to carve out family time, taking Charlotte to school every day and to ballet class. Yet the actress stays mum on how she spends her days off, doing her best to retain a normal life. "I think any working parent will tell you it's about having help," she says. "I'm lucky to have great friends and family around, whether it's my husband or my mother. It's a challenge, but you set an example for your kids by showing them what hard work looks like." Charlotte and Rocky see their mom in action when Prinze brings them by the set. "Sarah is just a great, warmhearted person. [She creates] a nice family atmosphere [on set]," Montgomery says.

Even with the stress of being back in the public eye and starring in a top-rated show, Gellar is keeping her cool, knowing she doesn't need to prove herself. "It takes the pressure off," Gellar says of "Buffy's" success. "'Buffy' was so incredible and you can't recreate that. Now everything is gravy. I'm having the time of my life and I'm one of the few people who wake up every morning and go to a job they love. I'm just so happy and so lucky."

Though the ad firm on the show is called



Roberts & Roberts, it's based on Chicago agency Leo Burnett and


In episode two, Gellar plans a "spectacular," an advertising event designed to get press. with a giant coffee pot. What she doesn't plan for is Chicago's wind - and she proceeds to flood Daley Plaza (above). That actually happened to Montgomery. "We had a spectacular in New York that had a coffee-related disaster. We had forgotten to factor for wind when we floated a coffee pot above a billboard.

Is That On?

On an upcoming episode, the ad gang has a major 'oops' moment when they're on the phone with a client: They think the mute button is on and spill their real thoughts. The client hears it all. "We've all been on conference calls when we thought the mute button was on and it was, in fact, off," Montgomery admits.



IN WITH THE OLD

For the right owner, two historic houses are worth the extra work by MADELINE NUSSER

ld-house lovers crave the chance to purchase a vintage home and fix it up. Imagine: buying a rundown residence, giving it a little love and suddenly, it's worth twice the price you originally paid. Sounds good, right? Well, it's not quite that easy — but renovation can be very rewarding. As two history-laden fixer-uppers hit the market this month, we ask brokers what it takes to turn an old house — with many original details intact — into a hot property.

GOLD COAST DREAM HOUSE

Legendary Chicago englneer Dankmar Adler built at 55 W. Schiller in 1868, even before the term "Gold Coast" was coined. "There was nothing across the street," says @properties broker Kim Kerbis (call 773-305-0585) of the land just north of the property. Many years later, the three-bedroom row house remains nearly untouched, with its original façade, plaster ceiling medallions, walnut banister and brass hardware. Kerbis' mother — distinguished architect Gertrude Lempp Kerbis — purchased the home from a longtime owner in 2007,

planning to remodel it before she fell ill. "She loved high ceilings, big windows — a diamond in the rough," says the younger Kerbis, who saved the architect's plans to expand up a floor and back into the tree-lined yard. The asking price is \$985,000, and Kerbis estimates the renovation cost could be halved to around \$250,000 if the buyer doesn't seek zoning permits for expansion. The city designated the property "orange," a potential landmark. The upshot: Landmark status can provide tax incentives and other perks for a rehabilitation.

BROOKFIELD'S PRAIRIE GEM

With its horizontal bands and overhanging eaves, this charming 1911 three-bedroom in Brookfield epitomizes Prairie School design. Before listing 3601 Forest, Charles Rutenberg Realty broker Katrina Pekovic-Dobrovolny (call 847-502-4150) did some research, digging up blueprints drawn by architect William Drummond, who served as chief draftsman for Frank Lloyd Wright. She discovered the house boasts an original Roman brick fireplace and tessellated windows. A charming second-floor "proiection room" with built-in cabinetry (the home originally housed a private kindergarten) also remains intact. Architecture aficionados will want to remove the carpet covering terrazzo flooring and eliminate walls dividing up the airy space. The house, at \$399,000, is not protected by landmark status - which Pekovic-Dobrovolny describes as "bad news, good news." A new owner might tear it down or, on the bright side, have a little more leeway when renovating it. "It needs someone who's going to appreciate it, fix it up and stay in it," Pekovic-Dobrovolny says.



The Olympia Fields native stars in VH1's 'CrazySexyCool: The TLC Story'

hicago native Drew Sidora was thrilled to land the role of Tionne "T-Boz" Watkins in the VH1 biopic



"CrazySexyCool: The TLC Story" - but she admits that there was added pressure portraying a real person, especially one who paid visits to the set. "My first meeting with her was scary," Sidora says. Early years: "I was brought up in acting, dance and Method acting classes. I eventually went to LA, because my sister lived

there ... I managed to graduate early and get on the honor roll. I wanted to prove to my family that this is what I want to do and I will do what it takes to achieve it."

Looking forward: "I'm being careful and picky with the things I do. I want to continue to challenge [myself] as an actress. I have been focusing on working out and getting strong; I want to go into more action [films]."

Giving back: "I started my foundation, Dream Makers, for young women affected by the violence in Chicago. It helps them cope with the loss of their fathers, brothers, boyfriends or victims of violence."

Chicago connection: "I was born and raised in Olympia Fields [with] one brother and three sisters. My upbringing was very supportive — I was playing the piano, doing ballet, jazz and tap. I knew I wanted to go into entertainment; it was a matter of time. I like Municipal Bar [216 W. Ohio] — I'm having a viewing party there on Oct. 21 at 5 p.m.

Walk this way

The Museum of Contemporary Photography examines how we move through the world BY THOMAS CONNORS

alking, one could argue, hasn't been the same since the invention of the wheel - but it's also changed since the rise of the smartphone. With our heads perpetually cocked at a 45-degree angle, our eyes glued to the screen, our thoughts anywhere but where we are, the world often passes

To discover what you've been missing, visit "Of Walking," an exhibition at the Museum of Contemporary Photography featuring eight contemporary artists whose works involve putting one foot in front of the other. Though you may never have strolled the streets or landscapes referenced in these works - which stretch far beyond simple travelogues - the ways in which these artists ponder the world, and the way they walk through it, brings to mind naturalist John Muir's remark that "going out, I found, was really going in." For some of the artists, "corporeal movement is key to their process, even though, interestingly, it is not directly depicted," says curator Karen Irvine.

Simryn Gill catalogs her neighborhood outside Sydney, snapping gutters, trees, cars and people. British artist Hamish Fulton has been ambulating since 1973, when he completed a 1,022-mile trek. Sohei Nishino walks around a chosen city shooting as he goes, then arranges the myriad images in a composite view in which the various angles and perspectives result in a swirling, almost expressionist rendering of the place. Paulien Oltheten, who captures people re-enacting the

gestures of other people, and Iim Campbell, who reduces bodies in motion to pixels of light, are "interested in how the body moves through space when unobserved," Irvine says. Overall, she suggests, the works displayed in the show "link more to mapping, and trying to create a sense of duration/experience through still, individual images, mostly."

"Of Walking," which runs through Dec. 20, includes a

companion piece - a talk by Andrew Forsthoefel on Nov. 13. Three years ago, Forsthoefel, then 23, set out from his home in Pennsylvania and walked 4,000 miles to the Pacific Coast, wearing a sign on his back that read, "walking to listen." Along the way he recorded interviews with a range of people, conversations that form their own multifaceted snapshot of life, an audio map generated the oldfashioned way: step-by-step.

Exploring the historic lighthouses of Lake Michigan

From the Straits of Mackinac in the north to the Indian shore in the South, Lake Michigan is ringed with historic lighthouses that were built to help guide ships navigating the Great Lake's waters to safe harbors. Some of the more remarkable lighthouses in Wisconsin are located at Lake Michigan.

Seul Choix Point

This lighthouse is located on Michigan's Upper Peninsula, in the small town of Gulliver. Built on a hill that was the town's highest point, the lighthouse allowed watchmen to locate and assist ships in need. Construction of the lighthouse was completed in 1849, but the tower was then rebuilt in 1860. Now a historic site owned and operated by the town, you can visit the museum and climb the tower during the day in the high season.

Menominee North Pier

Though it is in disrepair, this lighthouse is still an impressive site. Located on the northern shore of Green Bay near the mouth of the Menominee River on the Wisconsin-Michigan border, the Menominee North Pier offers an impressive view of Green Bay.

Rawley Point


First lit in 1874, the Rawley Point lighthouse in Two Rivers, Wisconsin is still operational today. Over a century later, by 1979, the lighthouse became

fully automated and the lighthouse keepers' home was converted into a cottage rented out to the Coast Guard.

Port Washington Harbor

The city's first lighthouse was built on the north side of the harbor in 1849, and replaced in 1860. When the Federal Government provided funds to build two new breakwaters here in the 1930s, a new tower was built out on the pier. The old lighthouse dwelling is currently a museum run by the Port Washington Historical Society, featuring educational exhibits about local history.

Three Irish men, from different generations, are all at turning points in their lives. Although they sit next to each other, and their tales are interwoven, they speak directly to the audience in "Port Authority," Conor McPherson's lyrical play that is having its Midwest premiere at Writers' Theatre.

Rob Fenton plays Kevin, the youngest member of the trio in the show directed by William Brown.

"Kevin is a young 20-year-old who is trying to move out of his house for the first time and excited about the adventure of life but doesn't necessarily know where's he's going with his own," Fenton said. "I think he's searching for what makes him fit in and what makes him happy."

John Hoogenakker plays Dermot, a middle aged man.

"Dermot is a guy who has had a lot of letdowns in life," Hoogenakker said. "He seems to be a person who wants to take all of the problems that the world has dealt him and put them on someone else's shoulders."

Dermot is dealing with the fact that he has been hired for an amazing job with a prestigious money management firm. "He is completely unqualified for it," Hoogenakker related. His discomfort leads to shameful although somewhat amusing — behavior at a corporate party.

The oldest member of the trio, Joe, who lives in a group home, is played by Patrick Clear.

"Joe reminds me a lot of my father's generation," Clear said. "Someone who grew up Irish Catholic pre-Vatican II. He's essentially a conventional man who grew up in the '50s and '60s and worked in business. He sort of saw the world in very black and white terms."


"I was raised this way, too, as an Irish Catholic," the actor revealed. "You felt that God was watching you all the time and judging your actions."

Joe's tale is filled with regret. "To me, it's heartbreaking to think you've reached the very latter part of your life and realize that you didn't ask enough of life," Clear said.

Fenton noted that even though the three characters are basically delivering monologues and not interacting with each other, "We're aware of one another and kind of pick up the common humanity that threads the three of us together and makes our stories interconnected."

"It's a beautiful piece," Hoogenakker added, "and the more we rehearse, the more we learn about it. I'm sure once we add the audience component, it's going to bloom on a lot of other levels as well.'

Gaucho grilled meats star at Fogo de Chão

You can take the cowboy out of the country but he'll just bring the country right along with him. That's what the Coser brothers and business partners Jorge and Aleixo Ongaratto did when they opened their first Fogo de Chão in Porto Alegre, Brazil, in 1981.

The name literally means fire in the ground, or campfire. The 'churrasco' method of slowly roasting the freshest cuts of meat and eating them immediately, is the traditional heart of the gaucho (rancher/cowboy) diet. Fogo offers prix fixe menus that feature generous carvings of freshly-grilled meats and an extensive salad bar.

Diners dictate how their meat service will go by controlling it with tableside cards they flip from red to green. Fogo's expert servers are trained to spot the small discs and be tableside within seconds.

Offerings include tender filet mignon, Alcatra (top sirloin), Fraldinha (bottom sirloin), Beef Ancho (prime rib eye), and the tender Picanha (prime sirloin). In addition, there are velvety mini lamb chops, succulent pork ribs, chicken and Linguiça, a slow-roasted pork sausage.

The 16 cuts offered are the best parts of the animals, according to Ronaldo Chiesa, assistant general manager.

The staff recommends having small portions to experience the wide variety of meats but, for those who prefer to keep it even lighter, Fogo's salad bar has more than 40 freshly-made items including chilled salads, rustic artisan breads, aromatic cheeses and house-smoked salmon. Portions are the same for both lunch and dinner but prices do vary. Lunch is \$26.50; salad bar only, \$19.50. Dinner is \$46.50; salad bar only \$22.50

Gluten-free and other dietary restriction menus are also available. Let the reservationist know when you call so the staff can be alerted even before you're seated.

"It's a unique experience in that it is customizable by the guest," explained Adam Jurczak, general manager. "If you're looking for that in-and-out quick business lunch, you can do that. If you're looking for a full-on, two-and-a-half-hour culinary experience, you can have that, too."

Picanha, a prime sirloin, is a must-try. Served in choice of doneness, the sizzling and aromatic cut is a fiesta in your mouth.

The melt-inyour-mouth mini lamb chops are seasoned with mint leaves that reduce the gaminess; and the Fraldinha, flank or London Broil. is cut from the bottom of the sirloin, seasoned and cooked tender to desired doneness. Roasted bananas, fried

Hoosier Mama's Life of Pie

With her new cookbook out. Paula Hanev is set to open a second pie shop in Evanston


lew could turn down a piece of pie made by Paula Haney, aka Hoosier Mama. And in her new cookbook. The Hoosier Mama Book of Pie (Agate Midway, August 2013), Haney, the founder of celebrated Hoosier Mama Pie Company, with a shop in Chicago's Ukrainian Village, serves up plenty of tried-and-true secrets about making what she considers "the most unpretentious food in the world."

"I was afraid this classic American food was being forgotten," she said. "In fact, more and more people I talked to had only eaten pie from the freezer case at the grocery store. I was afraid we were forgetting what real pie was supposed to taste like."

In reviving the tradition, Hanev has injected a few modern techniques. One example is the red wine vinegar she likes to include as an ingredient in pie crust. "It helps with flavor, as well as texture," she said. "The vinegar in the pie crust inhibits gluten formation which would make the dough tough." She suggested apple cider vinegar or white distilled vinegar as other options.

The vinegar is a key ingredient in Haney's recipe for All Butter Pie Dough. She estimated that about 90 percent of Hoosier Mama pies are made with this recipe. "It's the most important recipe at the pie shop," she said.

But another of her favorite ingredients is as traditional as apple pie. This is persimmon season, and Haney is working the bright orangecolored fruits - which resemble small tomatoes — into plenty of pies.



AMERICAN PERSIMMON PIE (MAKES ONE 9-INCH

I single-crust, blind-baked All Butter Pie Dough shell (Use a favorite shell recipe or work with a storebought shell.)

I cup strained American persimmon pulp

Zest of 1/2 orange

3 large eggs

I cup heavy cream

I tablespoon unsalted butter, melted

I teaspoon vanilla paste

2/3 cup granulated sugar

2 tablespoons dark brown sugar

I teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon ground mace 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Using a spatula or the back of a

In her book, she describes their flavor as "like a cross between pumpkins and apricots, with some orange zest and allspice thrown in."

Persimmons are especially big in Indiana, Haney's home state.

a fine-mesh strainer.

Place persimmon pulp in medium bowl and sprinkle the orange zest

Whisk in eggs, cream, butter and vanilla paste, stirring well after each addition.

In separate bowl, combine granulated sugar, brown sugar, cinnamon, mace and salt. Whisk or mix with hands to break up brown sugar until thoroughly combined. Add dry ingredients to persimmon mixture and whisk until just combined. Pour filling into pie shell and bake for 45 minutes to one hour, or until edge of pie is slightly puffed and center is dry to the touch. The top of the pie will color slightly.

Cool to room temperature and then chill in the refrigerator for at least two hours, up to overnight, before slicing.

"In many Southern Indiana homes, including the one my husband grew up in, persimmon pudding - not pumpkin pie - is the holiday dessert de rigueur," Haney

"It's like a brownie without chocolate," said Helen Roney, co-owner of Tuttle Orchards in Greenfield. Ind. Roney and her daughter make Persimmon Pudding. They also sell frozen pulp from persimmons. grown by a local farmer.

Persimmons aren't commerciallygrown due to their astringent flavor while they are still hanging on a tree. But when the skin shrivels and the fruit falls off the tree, the flesh turns sweet and pudding-like. Farmers rig nets under their persimmon trees to catch the fruit before it hits the ground. They scoop out the pulp and sell it frozen to vendors like Tuttle Orchards.

Tuttle Orchards is one of many resources for pie ingredients included in a seven-page directory in the back of Haney's book.

With her book complete, Haney's next project is to open a second pie shop at 749 Chicago Ave. in Evanston around Nov. 1. The shop will be in conjunction with Dollop Coffee Co.

In the meantime, look for Haney at the Bookstall at Chestnut Court in Winnetka, www.thebookstall.com, at 3 p.m. Oct. 27. She and cookbook collaborator Allison Scott will chat about pie - and serve some slices, too — with enough forks to go around.



ALL IS LOST ***

Rated PG-13 for brief strong language

Stars: Robert Redford At least there's no Bengal tiger. That's about the only break the unnamed hero gets, however, in this deeply affecting survival-at-sea drama. The 77-year-old Redford gives one of his best performances as the yachtsman struggling to keep his ship afloat after a crippling accident in the Indian Ocean, with ever-diminishing hopes for rescue. With one actor, one location, almost zero dialogue and minimal, old-school special effects, writer/director J.C. Chandor ("Margin Call") turns the man's long ordeal into compelling drama as he keeps struggling through disaster after disaster. It's the struggle that counts, "All Is Lost" seems to be saying, and that's a very personal matter. One that

The worst thing about the extraordinarily awful "Argento's Dracula 3-D" is that it's not quite eccentric enough to be unintentionally funny. It's bad, make no mistake, jaw-droppingly bad. But it also seems to want to be taken seriously, even when that giant, cartoonish, paper-thin praying mantis comes creeping up the stairs. Directed by the '70s/'80s Italian horrormeister Dario Argento ("Suspiria"). "Dracula 3-D" is a surprisingly old-fashioned and flat-footed plodthrough of the Bram Stoker classic. Despite occasional outbursts of gore and nudity, including a queasymaking ogle of the director's daughter (frequently topless Euro-star Asia Argento) enjoying a sponge bath, tedium sets in quickly. And it doesn't help that the whole production seems afflicted with terminal cheapness from the ookie-spooky score to the almost unbelievably

An almost unimaginably harrowing depiction of slavery in the United States, "12 Years a Slave" is also an inspiring story of a man who refused to give in to despair despite extreme physical, emotional and spiritual suffering. In a profoundly affecting performance, a certain Best Actor contender, Chiwetel Ejiofor plays Solomon Northup, a free black man who was kidnapped from Saratoga, N.Y. in 1841 and sold into slavery. "12 Years" is a showcase for a parade of white actors behaving abominably (especially Fassbender as a religious maniac plantation owner), but it's the genuineness of Ejiofor's performance, with its innumerable shadings of acute anguish, that gives the film its devastating emotional impact. That and the terrible realism with which director Steve McQueen ("Shame") presents the story's nonstop cruelties.

Stallone plays a consultant who's hired to find flaws in prison security systems by busting out of them after being incarcerated. Not exactly nice work if you can get it, but it pays well. Things get out of hand, though, when he finds himself betrayed and locked away in a private superhoosegow, with only one similarly aged, similarly muy-macho ally (Schwarzenegger).

THE FIFTH ESTATE

Rated R for language and some violence

Stars: Benedict Cumberbatch, Daniel Bruhl, David Thewlis, Peter Capaldi

After exposing numerous corporate and government secrets in the interest of bringing the truth to light, the founders of Wikileaks (Cumberbatch, Bruhl) clash over how to handle a large number of particularly sensitive American intelligence documents.

ROMEO & JULIET

Rated PG-13 for some violence and thematic elements

Stars: Hailee Steinfeld, Stellan Skarsgard, Paul Giamatti, Douglas Booth

It's a pity, in the age of the casual hookup, that the "Romeo & Juliet" being served up to the present generation is, for the most part, such an overly pretty and artificial bore. From the first introduction of his two young leads (Steinfeld, Oscar-nominated for "True Grit," and Booth), who stare at each other stricken with slow-motion, sparkly-eyed, love at first sight, this clichéd, excessively lavish doublet-and-hoser is a miserable chore to sit through with the exception of a few strong supporting performances, especially Giamatti's excellent turn as Friar Laurence. Shakespeare's poetry also provides occasional compensation. This is an experience in exasperation that even seems to have affected Giamatti at one point, when he smacks the petulant Romeo on the side of the head — by far the film's most satisfying moment.

NICKY'S FAMILY ***

No MPAA rating Stars: Nicholas Winton, the Dalai Lama, Ben Abeles

In the 1930s, responding to a friend's request for help, British stockbroker Nicholas Winton took it upon himself to rescue 669 children from pre-World War II Czechoslovakia and find homes for them in England. And he then told no one about what he had done until his wife accidentally discovered his old records in 1988 and alerted the BBC. Very much alive at age 104 and honored with a much-deserved knighthood, Winton presents his own modest perspective on the story in Matej Minac's inspirational documentary - which also employs archival footage and dramatic reenactments to keep things lively. It's the now-aged children he rescued, though, who offer the most moving testament to Winton's good work, along with the remarkable fact that their descendants now number almost

THE INEVITABLE DEFEAT **OF MISTER & PETE**

Rated R for language, some drug use and sexual content

Stars: Skylan Brooks, Ethan Dizon, Jennifer Hudson, Anthony Mackie, Jeffrey Wright

Director George Tillman Jr. ("Soul Food," "Men of Honor") doesn't shy away from gritty details in this drama about kids from the Brooklyn projects trying to survive on their own after their junkie prostitute mothers are arrested. But he also imbues it with warmth and occasional humor. Outwardly tough 13-year-old Mister and younger, much more naive Pete (Brooks and Dizon, both excellent) are forced to fend for themselves one summer if they want to avoid a dangerous public group home, which means begging, hustling and ultimately stealing. Tillman keeps the mood remarkably light, though, largely because Mister has a plan. An aspiring actor, he's certain he's going to be flying to Beverly Hills after an upcoming TV series audition. Yet, as the title suggests, this isn't a fairy


Used cars make up 55 percent of sales

In the month of July, Niles residents chose Toyota more often than any other make when purchasing pre-owned vehicles and again opted for Toyota above all other makes when buying new.

All told, new car sales accounted for 45 percent of overall auto sales to residents of Niles, totaling 141 of the 315 overall auto sales in the month. 

Galloway goes the distance for Dons-

Senior from Lake Zurich brings his versatility and consistency

Monday through Friday, Matt Galloway rises before the sun.

Up by 5:30 a.m., 5:45 at the latest. Out the door by 6 a.m., 6:20 at the latest.

At that point, Galloway endures about a 60-minute car ride from his home in Lake Zurich to Notre Dame in Niles.

"On a good day, I can get it in 45 minutes. But normally about an hour," Galloway said. "The drive is really long, so that's hard to get used to."

If not for his Advanced Placement chemistry course, Galloway could enjoy another 25 minutes of sleep. But that class commences at 7:25. Most don't begin until 7:50.

Galloway said he does all that to receive a top-notch education and for football.

Galloway, a senior on Notre Dame's football team, opted to become a Don four years ago after attending Northridge in Niles from sixth through eighth grade and St. Theresa School in Palatine through fifth grade.

He could have remained at Northridge for high school with his brother Nick, who is three years older. But Northridge lacked a football team — a "game changer" for Matt Galloway.

With Matt Galloway unwilling to concede his football dreams, his parents afforded him the opportunity to tour various Catholic schools in the area.


Having watched Nick Galloway play soccer for the Knights at Notre Dame and been impressed by the football field, Matt Galloway said the Dons rose up his list quickly.

He toured Notre Dame first.

"I knew it was sort of the same environment so I thought I'd check it out," Matt Galloway said. "Once I saw it, I really liked it and I didn't need to check out any other schools."

Two other options for Matt Galloway were Carmel and St. Viator. Both are "probably half the distance" from his house when compared to Notre Dame.

But Matt Galloway said he chose

Notre Dame because of the football program and the school's academics.

Notre Dame coach Mike Hennessey declared Matt Galloway a "tremendous student." On the field, he is "probably one of the most consistent players we have," according to Hennessey.

Matt Galloway starts at outside linebacker and fullback, but various injuries and formations have garnered him time at defensive tackle, defensive end, inside linebacker, running back and wide receiver.

"You can put him anywhere and he's going to do a great job," Hennessey said. "He will do anything that is necessary to help his team win. And he has the talent to do anything."

To secure a 45-35 victory over Marist on Oct. 11, Hennessey said Matt Galloway gained "the most important first down of the game in the fourth quarter that kept our drive alive and made it so we could keep the football and win the game" on a halfback screen.

Showcasing his versatility, Matt Galloway logged extended time at running back and moved from outside to inside linebacker that day.

"He was the hero of the game," Hennessey said.

That job title has its perks.

"He's probably one of the most popular guys on the team," Hennessey said.
But it wasn't always that way.

"I didn't feel like I really belonged until junior year," said Matt Galloway, who knew no one and had no connection to Notre Dame prior to his first day of football practice.

NILES WEST

Undersized Reinemann representative of Wolves

NORTHFIELD - Niles West senior Isaac Reinemann may be small. but he's got big ability and big hair.

Generously listed at 5-foot-8 and 165 pounds (he said he's really 5-7 and 155 pounds), the linebacker with the flowing locks is in his second season as a starter for the Wolves, who bring a 6-2 overall record into Friday's regular-season finale at Glenbrook South.

This will be the second straight season Niles West makes the playoffs after missing out for eight straight years.

Though the talent-level in the program has grown in recent seasons, the Wolves are hardly bursting with Division I players. With a 41man squad, their numbers remain lower than many opponents in the CSL South.

Yet, with quality wins over Glenbrook North and Evanston and a fairly close 35-20 loss to powerhouse Maine South, the Wolves have shown an ability to punch slightly above their weight, which is just what Reinemann has been doing for years.

"(Reinemann) is one of those kids who comes in and you go, 'How the heck does he do this?" And he has for four years," Niles West coach Scott Baum said. "He's a spark plug, energy, call it what you will. That's him. He doesn't talk a lot. He just goes out and does it and does a nice job at it."

When he arrived at Niles West, Reinemann said he was about 5-3 and 110 pounds and he played on the Freshman B team. Coaches struggled to find the right position for him, using him in several spots: fullback, quarterback, cornerback and linebacker.

Sophomore season he was moved to linebacker full time and that's where he's remained, starting at strong side outside linebacker as a junior and now at weak side middle linebacker, or WILL.

"(Moving to linebacker) I really found the position I could flourish in," said Reinemann, whose twin brother Louis plays on the Niles West offensive and defensive lines. "I think I'm a good tackler and good at reading the linemen and the backs and where they're going to go, and getting off blocks."

Reinemann - a wrestler who went 31-9, won conference and reached the sectional at 132 pounds last season - said his experience on the mat helps him overcome a lack of size on the football field.

"I don't think about my size too much," said Reinemann, who also is a pole vaulter. "I use my hands a lot. As a wrestler, it's about getting people off of you, and I kind of use wrestling moves with the linemen who try to block me. That helps."

Niles West senior receiver and defensive back Andrew Mihulet has played football with Reinemann since the two were middle schoolers and he said he's always been impressed by his teammate's ability.

"(Reinemann is) a scrappy guy, and not afraid of contact," Mihulet said. "He knows how to play football. He's so athletic. He's a three-sport athlete, a pure athlete, and just an awesome guy to have on your side."

Reinemann also stands out on the gridiron because of his hair, which now goes beyond his shoulders and brings to mind Green Bay Packers linebacker Clay Matthews.

Reinemann said wearing his hair long is not a recent development.

"I started growing it out in second or third grade, though it's not always been this long," he said "I guess I've just grown to like it and it's unique on the field. People know who I am. (At first) I just wanted to see how it went, and then it became my thing."

Has anyone asked him to cut it

"Definitely," said Reinemann, who puts his hair up in a skull cap for wrestling. "Some girls, my dad, my brother, they've asked me to cut it. But I've never wanted to."

Reinemann added: "I'll get it cut one day. But I don't see it (happening) any time soon."

Niles West senior finishes tied for 16th in his fourth trip to Bloomington

BLOOMINGTON — Nate Lee stood in the tent next to the clubhouse staring at the scoreboard.

The Niles West senior didn't like what he saw on his Saturday card, but he said he was happy to be where he was one last time.

Lee played at the Class 3A state tournament all four years in high school and improved each season. In his final appearance at The Den at Fox Creek, Lee shot 72-80 to post an 8-over 152 that tied him for 16th. He finished tied for 25th as a junior, tied for 86th as a sophomore and tied for 93rd as a freshman.

"Even though I didn't play that well (in the second round), I am

glad I got to end it here," Lee said. "I couldn't imagine not playing here one last time."

Lee said it's not clear if competitive golf is in his future. He remains undecided on whether or not to play in college.

He's set on studying aerospace engineering somewhere, a field he's been interested in since he was a young boy.

"Nothing grabbed me like that did," he said. "Things like planes, missiles. I'd eventually like to get a Ph.D. in aerospace engineering."

Lee is considering attending Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Embry-Riddle, Illinois Wesleyan and Carthage.

"I do still want to play, but I am not sure right now," he said.

For the first time in his career, Lee had company in Bloomington. Wolves sophomore Skylar LeVine tied for 74th in his inaugural appearance at the state tournament. He shot rounds of 80-85 for a 21-over 165.

"My friend Mike Kane took it to the side, down the line," senior midfielder Pedro Acosta said. "I was sitting at the top of the box and I hit it one-time just under the crossbar."

"I was coming from the right," Kane said. "I just saw Pedro open, so I got him the ball."

It was the second senior-to-

senior goal of the game. For Kane and Acosta, it was a play that showed off just how long they've been teammates.

"Me and Mike have been playing together since sixth grade,' Acosta said. "We have a lot of chemistry together."

"We've been friends through high school and middle school," Kane said. "We're always stretching together and juggling together during practice."

Kane's assist to Acosta gave him 10 for the season - rare at a position in which the primary objective is to score goals. But for Northridge, that's just the way they have learned to play together.

"For most teams it's usually the midfielders distributing out," Kane said. "It happens quite often for us where the forwards take it to the sideline, and the midfielders step up to score."

Rodriguez transfers his energy to Niles North offense

A summer of hard work pays off for senior wide receiver

SKOKIE - Before the 2013 season, Eddie Rodriguez wasn't even sure he would play football for Niles North. Now the senior wide receiver is one of the Vikings' top offensive threats.

Rodriguez played for Evanston as a freshman and sophomore, but he sat out his junior year because he knew his family was moving. He transferred to Niles North near

the end of the 2012 football season. He wasn't sure how well he could compete for playing time with players who had been with the program

"I took the entire year off," he said. "I didn't play any other sports; I only did the occasional workout."

It was encouragement from an old friend that helped convince Rodriguez to play as a senior.

"We played Junior Vikings together, but lost touch when he moved to Evanston," said senior Michael Marek, a Niles North offensive lineman. "When he came to North we became friends again. We talked to coach (Mark) Egofske about Eddie playing."

"The times in the summer when I wasn't motivated to go to practice, Michael would call me up and have me sleep over." Rodriguez said. "He lives near the school, and we'd go to the morning practices together.'

It was during those summer workouts that teammates saw Rodriguez's potential.

"We both play wide receiver, so I was always doing drills with him," senior J.J. Myles said. "He was lost at first, but he's got great hands and he always runs hard."

Rodriguez saw he could learn a lot from Myles, the team's top returning receiver. During practice, Myles would help with his technique, showing him things like how to properly stand at the line before the snap. Eventually, they began to get extra workouts in after

practices.

"There were times in the summer where we'd have morning practices, then go to the field when nobody else was there," Myles said. "Me, Eddie, Mike, we'd get (senior quarterback) Charlie (Long), and just go work on routes, run 1-on-ls."

There were nights, Rodriguez said, when they would work on their routes until it was dark, and they'd ask a security guard to turn the lights on in the stadium.

That extra work helped Rodriguez earn a starting spot at wide receiver for the Vikings, and he's taken advantage of the opportunity.

In a 21-20 loss to Highland Park on Friday, Rodriguez caught five passes for a game-high 121 yards. His fifth reception was a 36-yard

touchdown on a corner route that put the Vikings up 18-14. On the ensuing two-point conversion, Long again found Rodriguez in the end

"I was actually the second option on the play," Rodriguez said. "When I hit my break I shoved off on (No.) 7, and I noticed I was open, so I started clapping for Charlie."

Although Highland Park would go on to win the game and drop Niles North to 3-5 overall and 2-2 in the CSL North, Rodriguez picked a great time to have his best performance of the season.

"The defensive coordinator and recruiter from Aurora (University) came to watch me and Mike," Rodriguez said. "We had no idea he'd be there."

After falling behind 2-0 in the second set, MacKinnon recovered from a pair of early double faults with consecutive aces to win the first of what would be six straight games for MacKinnon and Wolkoff.

MacKinnon played several matches at No. 1 doubles earlier this season, but she is happy with both her position and her partner, boasting a 7-2 record with Wolkoff.

"I like playing with Alex," MacKinnon said. "She's my favorite to play with. I'd rather play two with her than one with anyone else. We just click well."
