Ryan on 6th appeal

Execution set for March 6

Jerry Soucie, an attorney with the Nebraska Commission on Public Advocacy who represents Michael Ryan, filed a 116-page motion for post conviction relief in Richardson County District Court last Monday afternoon.

In the motion Ryan alleges the state of Nebraska misappropriated the drug Thiopental that would be used in his execution. Ryan is asking the Richardson County District Court to vacate his sentence of death and impose a term of life in prison without parole on his 1st degree murder conviction.

Soucie claims in the document that "none of the grounds for relief alleged in this motion could have been raised in any previous proceedings" because lethal injection did not exist as a means of exectution during any of Ryan's prior legal proceedings.



On Thursday in a Beatrice courtroom, Assistant Attorney General John Freudenberg asked Judge Daniel Bryan to throw out the claim and declared the motion as "frivolous."

Judge Bryan took the matter sement and could

under advisement and could either grant an evidentiary hearing or dismiss the motion.

The 63-year-old Ryan, who is on his sixth appeal, is scheduled to be put to death March 6 on his conviction for the first degree murder of James Thimm on a farm north of Rulo in March of 1985. Ryan was sentenced to death by Richardson County District Court Judge Robert Finn on Oct. 16, 1986.

Ryan is currently being held on death row at the Tecumseh State Correctional Institution north of Tecumseh.

The District 56 Board on Feb. 13 approved a motion to authorize the redemption of the Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Bonds that were issued in 2008, and a motion to authorize the issuance of Series 2012 Limited Tax Refunding Bonds.

The District was paying an interest rate of 4.65 percent and will now get into 2017 before the rate even hits 1 percent, Superintendent Tim Heckenlively

Also during its regular meeting the second Monday of the month, the District 56 Board approved a list of construction and maintenance projects as recommended by the project committee. Among the projects is a new strength and conditioning room in the present track and field storage area in the northwest corner of Jug Brown Stadium.

Construction on the facility was scheduled to begin this week and is expected to be finished by June 1. The 75-feet by 25-feet building will be insulated, wired for lighting and electricity and new heating and cooling elements will be installed. Plans are for much of the west wall to be fitted with 4-feet by 8-feet windows looking out to the football field.

"Once complete, the new strength and conditioning room project at Falls City High will address yet another major accomplishment for the FCPS Board of Education, as the third district goal, drafted a year ago at the Annual Planning Workshop, is checked off the list," Heckenlively said.

Petitioners need 851 signatures to hold recall election of Assessor

Petitions to recall Richardson County Assessor Regina Cummings were issued by the County Clerk's Office last Friday and are currently in circulation.

Circulators, led by Terry Lotter, of Falls City, and Fred Brewer, of rural FC, have 30 days to collect signatures from 851 registered County voters (35 percent of the 2,431 total votes cast in the 2010 election). If the sufficient number of signatures are gathered by March 7, the issue will appear on the ballot in the May 15 primary election. Thereafter, a special election would have to be held.

Both Lotter and Brewer submitted recall affidavits Feb. 6, each stating, "I feel that Regina Cummings is personally not performing her duties as County Assessor." Mrs. Cummings had 20 days to submit a defense statement, but did so late last week: "I do have health problems and for sometime have been taking intravenous treatments. However, when physically not present in the office, I am in constant contact and aware of what is being done in the office. For several months I have been preparing for the prospect of early retirement due to my medical problems."

Cummings, who was first elected County Assessor in 1994 and has since run unopposed in four different elections, was four years ago diagnosed with Guillain-Barre disease, a disorder of the nervous system that causes muscle weakness and can lead to paralysis. She undergoes IV treatments every three weeks each taking about seven hours - which she said make her sick. The treatments will continue indefinitely and Mrs. Cummings said she does not plan to run for reelection in 2014.

"I feel this is unnecessary because I'm going to retire anyway," she said.

Lotter and Brewer both said they'd rather not be the primary petitioners, but it's the voters' duty to manage the county of-

"I don't have anything against Regina," Lotter said. "I voted for her. But when you vote for someone, you expect them to perform their job. If they're not, they shouldn't be getting a salary. And if you're that sick, you should resign - what happens if your help gets sick? Do you just close the Assessor's Office?"

The County Commissioners set the Assessor's annual salary at \$43,745, plus benefits. And while the County Board doesn't have authority over the office, Nebraska State Statute 23-2012 does allow for the removal of disabled officers.

It reads, "Whenever the county board shall determine after hearing that any county officer or deputy is physically or mentally incapable of performing the duties of his office and cannot recover sufficiently to be able to perform such duties, the board shall declare such position vacant and appoint a successor. The county board shall appoint two physicians to examine the officer or deputy and shall receive the report of the physicians as evidence at the hearing. If the person so removed is an officer, the appointment shall be for the unexpired portion of the term."

Lotter said he was unaware of the State Statute prior to submitting the recall affidavit.

"I didn't know the commissioners could do that - it shouldn't be up to us, really. If our petitions do fail, I hope the County Commissioners will step up and take the proper procedures for this problem," he said.

Cummings, though, said she is performing the Assessor's duties, sometimes working from home.


"I'm in contact with my office every day and always have been. If I wasn't performing my duties, the State would take away my certification."

Brewer urged voters to look into the Assessor's Office themselves. "Voters have the right to check and see if their elected officials are performing their jobs. Just ask – if you have questions, call us. Honestly, I'd rather be doing something else. I'm not out to get anybody."

Lotter said the people would ultimately decide.

"If we don't get it done, then it tells me the people don't care if she works or not. Whether you're for or against (the recall), I'd like to hear what people have to say."

Dear Fellow Nebraskans:

This week I joined farmers, ranchers, agribusiness leaders, and policymakers to celebrate the accomplishments and future outlook for Nebraska agriculture. The Governor's Ag Conference is one of my favorite annual agriculture events because it serves as a venue for frank discussion and dialogue about how our state's number one industry has fared in the past year and what we can look forward to in the coming year.

The focus of this year's conference was "Nebraska Agriculture: Today's Challenges, Tomorrow's Opportunities." This annual event is an annual opportunity for agricultural producers and leaders to learn more about their industry.

This year's keynote speaker was John Doggett who is the Senior Lecturer of International Entrepreneurship, Management and Sustainability, and a Senior Research Fellow at the University of Texas at Austin. Mr. Doggett discussed Nebraska's agriculture role in the global economy of the future.

Bruce Knight, the Principal and Founder of Strategic Conservation Solutions, gave an update on the federal Farm Bill reauthorization. Mr. Knight is a former USDA Under Secretary and he also shared insight on the farm policy picture and its potential impact on Nebraska. He stressed the importance of Nebraska agriculture because of our productive advantage, irrigation advantage, grains and livestock, food processing capabilities, food handling and merchandising, renewable investments, and finally our advancements in transportation and infrastructure.

To feed an ever growing world population, farmers will likely need to double agriculture output by the year 2050. Two speakers addressed how Nebraska agriculture can respond to this challenge Dr. Archie Clutter and Mr. Bill Holbrook.

Dr. Clutter is with the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska and he explained how the University is positioning itself to be a part of meeting the challenge to provide food to a growing world population. Mr. Holbrook works for The ProExporter Network, an agribusiness economic research and analysis provider. He discussed opportunities and challenges farmers will face in meeting food production demand.

A panel of Nebraskans joined us to discuss their organizations and how they connect consumers with farmers and ranchers. These panelists included Willow Holoubek from A-FAN, Dawn Caldwell from Common Ground Nebraska, and Pete McClymont with We Support Agriculture.

Overall, the farm economy is doing well. Farmers and ranchers generally reinvest profits in their industry in order to improve their production capabilities for the future. They are making needed investments and improvements. They are putting additional conservation practices in place that improve the land and protect the environment. They are putting up new machine shops and bins, and they are paying down debt.

The 24th Governor's Ag Conference was informative and productive. I was pleased to have the opportunity to visit with our farmers and ranchers who play a critical role in supporting our Nebraska economy. Agriculture is the backbone of the Nebraska economy and by working together we can continue to grow our great state.



No action was taken in the ongoing negotiations between the county and road department union. The commissioners have proposed at 2.5% increase for the first year of the contract and 2.25% for the second year (Oct. 1, 2011 to Sept. 30, 2013). The county's offer includes health insurance coverage during the life of the contract. The union's proposal calls for an increase based on the Consumer Price Index as with elected officials through July 1, 2013.

Sheriff Randy Houser presented information regarding the purchase of a new patrol vehicle from Gene Steffy Dodge in Omaha, which has the State bid for the patrol units. The vehicle being considered is a '12 Dodge Ram Quad Cab 4X4 1500 for the State bid price of \$22,886 (with added features the price would

be \$23,931). No action taken. The sheriff presented a purchase order for the replacement of radio equipment. Two quotes were received, one from Midwest Mobile of St. Joseph, MO, for \$1,400 and the other from First Wireless of Lincoln for \$1,815. Sheriff Houser also discussed the Cooperation Agreement with the City of Falls City for dispatch services. The City Council approved the agreement on Feb. 6.

During their weekly meeting with Huppert, the board moved to advertise the public hearing for the County 1 & 6 Year Road Plan to be held at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 28. Huppert was authorized to advertise to accept sealed bids for the purchase of culvert and steel materials to be opened at 11 a.m. (steel) and 11:15 a.m. (culverts) on Tuesday, March 13.





will be paid by the District's Special Building Fund. Equipment, purchased from Power Lift, an Iowa-based company that outfits nearly 3,000 training facilities worldwide, including the University of Nebraska, will cost up to another \$70,000 or so, but that money is expected to come from donors and the Tiger Booster Club.

"In order to continue our momentum in enhancing and greatly improving our strength and conditioning program, we are encouraging Tiger boosters, alumni, and friends to consider partnering with the Falls City Public School in providing new and updated strength and conditioning equipment for the new facility, ultimately impacting the current and future student athletes," Heckenlively said.

"This facility will ultimately enhance lifelong wellness, strength, and conditioning for our students participating in all boys and girls extra-curricular programs as well as the strength and conditioning and fitness programs offered within the curriculum. The district will be accepting tax deductible monetary contributions to support the purchase of the strength and conditioning equipment through the Falls City Education Foundation."

Other priority projects for this year are a wood overlay of the Middle School gym floor, roofing maintenance, school security, and other general building maintenance projects.

The Richardson Foundation has made another community project come to life.

The Foundation has funded the fencing for the new Falls City Dog Park, located on the south side of Stanton Lake. The Foundation gave \$15,000 to the project which covered the entire cost of the fencing and the labor to install.

The generosity of people who donate funds to the Foundation makes such improvements to the community possible. The money for the signing in the park was donated by Rod Vandeberg, Bev Chesnut of Soft Touch Grooming and Stripes and Signs. The unique dog-bone picnic tables were made by Tom Whitehouse and frames were donated by the Whitehouses, Pam and Mike Moore and Farm & City Supply. The Whitehouses also donated the waste stations and other items.

The park will have a Memorial Fund for departed pets. Any money given to that fund will be used for upkeep and to purchase more props for the Dog Park. Funds also will be used to pay for training classes which will be provided to the public free of charge. Information on that fund will be on signing at the park entrance along with "Rules of the Park."

There are two areas at the park, one for small

dogs and one for large dogs. Once the dogs have gained "social skills" and are compatible, they

may join each other. The park is intended for the use by dogs prop-

erly licensed and tagged, accompanied by their owners, who need room to run and stretch. Many owners do not have fenced secure areas for their pets to run and will find the park a welcome place for their pets to exercise. Owners should remain in the fenced area when their dogs are loose to ensure their pets' safety. Owners are reminded to be good stewards of the park and to clean up after their pets. Waste stations and bags are furnished free at four locations in Stanton Lake Park areas. Owners also are reminded that dogs must be on a leash when outside the fenced area.

There will be advertised classes, as weather warms, at the park covering several basic things all dog owners should be aware of. Classes will be given on how to make one's dog more social with other dogs, on health care and feeding and teaching dogs to do tricks and heel. Even pet birthday parties are encouraged.

The Humane Society will host dog adoption days in the park, beginning in the spring.

Two Falls City students, Heather Feek and Jessica Fisher, earned President's Honor Roll status.



Rec pancake feed Sunday

FC Recreation will hold its 13th annual pancake feed on Sunday, Feb. 26, in the commons area of Falls City High School.

This will be a free will offering event, with pancakes and sausage along with drinks being served from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. This pancake feed replaces the door-to-door residential collection that FC Rec used to conduct. Profits from the pancake feed along with the business fund drive done in early summer are the main public fundraisers for Rec programs.

On an annual basis, it takes over \$30,000 to run the current programs. which consist of girl's softball leagues, boy's baseball leagues, a tee ball league for 4-6 year olds, swim team, Red Cross swim lessons, a soccer program in the spring, and a fall boy's flag football league. These various programs had over 1,300 participants last year.

Of the cost to run the programs, about half comes from participant registrations, with the City of Falls City providing about 15 percent. The balance comes from donations by the public and other civic, church and fraternal groups and the local business community along with other fund raising events that Rec undertakes. In addition to the annual program costs, Rec, in conjunction with the City, undertakes the improvements of the ball facilities. The soccer and flag football programs continue to grow and get larger and these games will again be held on the new Thomas Field. This is all made possible by the generosity of everyone that has made a donation of money or time to our program, all of which benefit the youth of the Falls City area.

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Guidelines for better heart health

For people who are either at high risk for a heart attack or stroke, or who have already had such an event, healthy habits and medication can help you live longer, improve your quality of life, and lower your chance of a repeat attack or the need for artery-opening procedures, according to new joint guidelines developed by the American College of Cardiology Foundation and the American Heart Association.

The guidelines will be published in Circulation: Journal of the American Heart Association and the Journal of the American College of Cardiology.

"Unless improvements are made in your behavior and medical therapy, the same blood vessel problem that caused your first heart attack or stroke can occur again - and may result in death - so long-term changes need to be initiated to get the vascular disease under control," said Sidney C. Smith, Jr., M.D., chair of the guideline writing group and professor of medicine at the University of North Carolina-Chapel

The guidelines are important because increasing numbers of older adults are living with cardiovascular disease, and in clinical practice many patients are not getting indicated therapies, Smith said.

For the first time, the guidelines recommend that all patients be referred to a comprehensive cardiac rehabilitation program after a heart attack, stroke, bypass surgery, or the diagnosis of heart-related chest pain or blockages in leg arteries. In addition, the guidelines note that it is useful to screen heart disease patients for depression, a common occurrence after heart attack or bypass surgery that can interfere with quality of life and the ability to initiate positive changes in health behaviors.

The guidelines recommend that patients with coronary heart disease and other vascular disease such as stroke and peripheral artery disease:

- Stop smoking and avoid exposure to tobacco smoke;
- Get at least 30 minutes of exercise 5-7 days a week;
- Reduce weight if you are overweight, obese, or have a large
 - Get an annual flu shot;

 Take low-dose aspirin daily unless your doctor prescribes a higher dose or recommends against it because of medical contraindications.

In response to evidence from recent clinical trials, the guidelines make several changes for health professionals in the recommended use of medications that reduce the tendency for blood clotting (antiplatelet agents/ anticoagulants).

New drugs that may be used instead of clopidogrel in combination with aspirin for patients receiving coronary stents, such as prasugrel or ticagrelor, are now included.

The importance of adequate dosages for statin therapy (to lower cholesterol) for all patients with known atherosclerotic vascular disease - the disease process that underlies most heart disease and strokes -- is emphasized. Low-dose aspirin therapy (75-162 mg) continues to be recommended for patients with known heart disease.

The writing group deferred modifying recommendations on high blood pressure and high blood cholesterol levels because new guidelines are anticipated to be released in 2012 from panels of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute that work specifically on these issues.

"Be sure to ask your physician about therapies that can help you live longer and stay healthier after you've survived a heart attack or stroke and make them part of your commitment to a healthy lifestyle," Smith said.





Seven-day Forecast for Falls City
















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

Dr. Ronald D. Bachman, 64, of Falls Church, VA, died at Canaan Valley, WV, on Friday, Feb. 10, 2012, in a traffic accident on a mountain road. He was on his way to his mountain retreat, "Arbor Lodge," when the accident took place.

Ron was born Nov. 4, 1947, in rural Rulo to the late Elias and Marguerite (Homewood) Bachman. He demonstrated academic excellence throughout his school years, graduating from FC High School in 1966 as class valedictorian. He majored in Russian at the University of Nebraska and earned his BA in 1970. He was both a student and Russian Language Instructor at Ohio St. University and was awarded his Ph.D. in Slavic Linguistics from that school in 1980.

In 1975, Ron began his career with the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. For 14 years, he served as a translator, research analyst, and editor of Slavic materials in the Federal Research Division. The FDR generated reports on economic and military topics of interest to Executive Branch agencies. During 1990 and 1991, he worked at the Pentagon as an East European Analyst, Air Force Intelligence Agency. He regularly briefed the Air Force senior leadership, including the Secretary and the Chief of Staff, on current economic, political, and military events within that region. He was required to be on call at all times and was happy when he was selected to work in the European Division of the LOC as the Area Specialist for Poland and Eastern Europe in late 1991.

Among the notable challenges he faced during his 15 years in that position was the supervision of 50 translators who prepared the materials for the exhibit "Revelations from the Russian Archives." He co-edited a book bearing the same title. He spoke several languages and traveled throughout Europe.

Ron retired from the LOC in 2007 and pursued other interests. He authored "A Fine Command-



ing Presence," the biography of a great-great-grandfather who descended from Dutch settlers of the Hudson Valley. He enjoyed genealogy, travel, reading, music, fine dining, mountain hiking, cross-country skiing, autumn visits to New England, and winter holidays at Lake Louise, Canada. He never forgot his Nebraska roots. Ron was a supporter of NU, an avid fan of Cornhusker sports, had RUNZA vehicle license plates, and called his West Virginia retreat "Arbor Lodge." He attended family events whenever possible.

Ron is survived by his lifelong friend David Osborne, who he met at NU, by dozens of nieces and nephews, and by eight sisters and three brothers. CHANGES IN WASHINGTON THAT MAY IMPACT YOUR TELECOM SERVICES

- Reduced payments from other (often larger) carriers who use rural networks.

Even where carriers and rural consumers can adapt to these changes, however, the FCC is considering further rule changes that threaten to reduce the ability of rural carriers to recover their costs. The additional changes now being considered include:

- Reducing the opportunity for returns on rural telecom investment and operations;
- Applying additional limitations on the ability to recover costs; and
- Reducing Universal Service Fund support if a competitor serves even just a small part of our serving area.

The Universal Service Fund cuts arising out of the new rules will put existing investment in rural broadband at risk, and they will discourage future investment in new broadband-capable networks by small companies such as ours. The FCC's cuts could also lead to increased rates for many customers for telephone, broadband and other services.

From the earliest days of telephone service, Congress has enforced policies that require affordable access to reasonably comparable communications services throughout the Nation. The Universal Service Fund is essential to fulfilling this policy. But rather than supporting true universal service, the new FCC rules now being considered promise better service to some Americans at the expense of lesser service, and higher cost, for others.

Help our company continue to provide you with the services you need at an affordable rate. Don't let the FCC keep our rural community on the slow side of a broadband digital divide. Don't let the FCC adopt policies that will require rural consumers to pay higher rates for telephone service and slower broadband.

Contact your congressional representatives and urge them to support regulatory action that ensures equal and affordable access to broadband for all Americans. 



If your children are overweight or obese, their risk of having high blood pressure is almost three times higher than children at normal weight, according to new research in Hypertension: Journal of the American Heart Association.

A study of 1,111 healthy Indiana school children over a period of 4.5 years revealed that when the children's body mass index (BMI) reached or passed the 85th percentile — the beginning of the overweight category — the adiposity effect on blood pressure was more than four times that of normal weight children. Adiposity is fat under the skin and surrounding major organs.

The absolute value of BMI is not used to classify weight status in children, because change in BMI is normal and expected as children grow and develop. Instead, BMI percentiles are used which adjust for age and gender.

Researchers found when children reached categories of overweight or obese, the influence of adiposity on blood pressure increased.

"Higher blood pressure in childhood sets the stage for high blood pressure in adulthood," said Wanzhu Tu, Ph.D., study lead author and Professor of Biostatistics at Indiana University School of Medicine in Indianapolis, Indiana. "Targeted interventions are needed for these children. Even small decreases in BMI could yield major health benefits."

Among study participants, 14 percent of the blood pressure measurements from overweight/ obese children were in prehypertensive or hypertensive levels, compared to 5 percent in normal weight children. Blood levels of leptin, a hormone in fat tissues, and heart rate had a similar pattern as blood pressure. So leptin may have played a mediating role in obesity-induced blood pressure elevation, researchers

The study reinforces the importance of separately considering overweight and obese children from those of normal weight; otherwise, the adiposity effect is overestimated in normal weight children and underestimated in overweight children.

"The adiposity effects on blood pressure in children are not as simple as we thought," Tu said

On average, children in the study underwent 8.2 assessments each, for a total of 9,102 semi-annual blood pressure and height/weight assessments to determine BMI. The average enrollment age was 10.2 years, with children stratified into 10 years and under, 11-14 and 15 and older. Children with BMI percentile values over 85 percent were considered overweight and those with BMI values over 95 percent were considered obese.


"Important questions that remain unanswered are what makes the blood pressure go up when you have an increase in the BMI percentile and what mechanisms are involved in the process," Tu said. "This study wasn't set up to answer those questions."

Further study may determine how the increase in adiposity affects blood pressure and whether other factors such as leptin, insulin or inflammatory cytokines may play a role.

Healthcare providers and parents should pay attention to children's weight, Tu said. "If they see a dramatic weight gain in a child who already is overweight, they need to intervene with behavioral measures, such as dietary changes and increased physical activity, to improve overall health and minimize cardiovascular risk."

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





termeier, a farmer and current natural resources district board member from Syracuse, announced his candidacy for Legislature from District 1.





FCC Issues Rural Call Completion Ruling

Carriers that deliberately fail to complete calls to rural areas could face cease and desist orders, forfeiture, license revocations and fines of up to \$1.5 million, the FCC said in a declaratory ruling adopted and released yesterday. The ruling is an important victory for rural telcos, who have seen a sharp increase in complaints from customers saying callers have not been able to

"These problems can have dire consequences," the FCC wrote in the ruling. "Small businesses can lose customers who get frustrated when their calls don't go through. Urgent long distance calls from friends of family can be missed. Schools may be unable to reach parents with critical alerts, including school closings due to extreme weather. And those in need of help may be unable to reach public safety officials.'

It is widely believed that certain carriers are deliberately failing to complete calls as a means of avoiding the payment of per-minute inter-carrier compensation to the terminating carrier. Those charges are highest in rural areas, where reports of call completion problems have been increasing dramatically.

The FCC's nine-page ruling references a variety of ways that failure to complete calls to another carrier violates existing statutes. The commission also said originating carriers could be liable for actions taken by least cost routers - other carriers who terminate calls for them.

'If carriers continue to hand off calls to agents, intermediate providers or others that a carrier knows are not completing a reasonable percentage of calls, or are otherwise restricting traffic, that is an unjust or unreasonable practice prohibited by section 201 of the [Telecommunications] Act," the FCC said.

The commission also noted that enforcement action would not be restricted only to carriers that fail to complete calls but also would include practices such as informing a caller that a number i not reachable or is out of service when the number is, in fact, reachable and in service. Such practices, the FCC said, are deceptive or misleading and therefore are unjust and unreasonable practices under Section 201(b) of the Act.

Eventually the motivation for carriers to fail to complete calls to rural areas may fade away as the FCC implements planned ICC reforms, but that process will take years—and rural telco groups, as well as state utility commissions have urged the FCC not to wait to take action to address the issue. Such stakeholders have been particularly concerned since the FCC took no action after holding a rural call completion workshop back in October.

Last month a group of senators wrote a letter to FCC Chairman Julius Genachowski asking the commission to provide an update about the rural call completion issue – and that may have prompted the FCC to issue the declaratory ruling at this time.
