College Announces Summer Plans

The 1943 fully accredited summer session of Morningside College will open its first term on Thursday, June 3, it was announced by Dean George E. Hill, director of the summer college.

The forty-second summer session is offering courses for Liberal Arts majors, commercial and business students, pre-professional students, future teachers, experienced teachers, and students desiring accelerated programs.

Pre-Induction Education

Any high school boy of 17 years who graduates this coming June, 1943, can enter the summer session and by next mid-year, 1944, complete one year of accredited college courses. Those high school boys who entered college at mid-year, 1943, will have completed one full year by August, 1943, if they continue through the summer session. If the high school June grads enter this coming summer session and continue until the end of the summer session of 1944, they will have completed two full years of college. Every evidence points to the value of securing at least one or two semesters of college training before being inducted into the services.

The Army-Navy board will again offer the test for the V-12 program next fall for those men of the required ages and accredited high school diplomas. Any college training acquired before that time would greatly increase the students chances of passing this examination which would enable them to continue college under the supervision of the Government.

Courses Offered

Courses listed for the summer session include: Art, Chemistry, Economics and Secretarial Science, Education, English, Geography, History and Political Science, Mathematics, Modern Languages, Music and School Music, Physics, Psychology and Sociology. Instructors for these courses include: Professors Mendal Miller, H. B. Hawthorn, Earl E. Special Training Opportunity

Through cooperation of the N.Y.A. Division of the War Manpower Commission, Morningside College summer school students enrolled in the basic aviation course can secure practical shop training, including aviation sheet metal work and welding. The fine shop facilities and instruction are available at the N.Y.A. Training Center in Sioux City. College credit

is allowed and the trainee receives pay for the time he puts in for this training. For further details consult the Director of the Summer School or Dr. M. E. Graber at Morningside College.

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FACULTY CHAPEL

Because of their display of remarkable talent, the clever entertainment presented by the faculty in the chapel on April 16 proved to be a highlight in the series of Friday chapels that are given throughout the year by various college groups. Judging by the enthusiasm with which the entertainment was received by the students, a precedent has been set which indicates that such a performance will be repeated by popular request year after year until it has become a tradition in the annals of Morningside history.

A typical faculty meeting was in progress as the program opened. Imagine, if you can, Prof. Van Horne, evidently truant officer for the day (self-appointed or otherwise) trying to forcibly usher Dean Graber from the back of the auditorium to the stage and both being admonished by Dean Hill (chairman pro-tem in Dr. Roadman's absence) with the words, "This is no place for a brawl, gentlemen!"; staid Dr. Stephens being dragged in from his laboratory to the meeting by the same Prof. Van Horne; Miss McNee, chewing an enormous wad of gum, giving a lengthy, scientific report on species of rabbits while the other faculty members yawned, whispered and fidgeted, with Marcia, nothing daunted, continuing undisturbed to the very end; Prof. MacCollin, interrupting every few minutes to demand that they adjourn for orchestra practice; various and sundry mirth provoking reports given by other faculty members; finally, the order of the day, the demand by Capt. Children need books that arouse a knowledge of all that the boys and girls might become and the ambition to work toward that ideal. The librarian is in a key position to guide them into reading avenues in biography, fiction, and such subjects as health, personality, family life, vocations, and recreation, which will help the boys and girls when peace comes."

Morningsiders In Print

Two years ago the publication of "Wildlife Conservation" by Ira N. Gabrielson, '12, was received. Now it is our pleasure to announce his fourth book, "Wildlife Refuges," just issued by the Macmillan Company in 1943.

As Director of the Fish and Wildlife Service of the U. S. Department of Interior, Dr. Gabrielson has been in a position to secure recent and authoritative information on this subject. In the Introduction, the author states that he has visited all of the major national refuges except one. As a

compendium of facts concerning our wildlife refuges, this work is the latest and most complete.

Dr. Gabrielson writes with a facile pen, well trained by much experience. Let us illustrate with this example: "The buffalo are but a memory—kept alive in a number of carefully guarded herds. The waterfowl, along with many others of the wild folk, traveled far down the path to extinction before the onward rush of the white men. Some, forced all the way, are the ghosts of a vanished heritage."

In the writing of his book, Dr. Gabrielson has noticeably departed from the older style of pessimism and dire prediction. The tone throughout is hopefully narrative. It is a record of achievement. One begins to feel that some of our native wildlife may,

Lieut. Col. Horace F. Wulf, '36, at present serving as an executive officer of the 133 Infantry Regiment in the 34 Division in the African war theater, is also a veteran of the First World War. He was to have graduated with the class of 1918 but left school in '17 to serve overseas with the Medical Corps of the 133rd Field Hospital Unit. Horace had been taking a pre-medic course in college with a view to entering the medical profession but was one of the many soldiers stricken in the epidemic of spinal meningitis in France before the close of the war, so was forced to give up his plans. However, he returned to Morningside and received his A. B. degree.

During his college years he worked as a reporter for the Sioux City Tribune, later becoming advertising manager and city editor. He left Sioux City to become editor of the Daily Calumet in Chicago in 1938,

F. contingent for Ireland. After being stationed in Ireland for a year, he was sent with troops to Africa where he has been in active service in Tunisia. Recently he was in command of a company which stormed and captured a town in the Tunisian area. Mrs. Wulf (Bernice Challman, '16) and son, Jerry, are here in Sioux City for the duration.

The following is an excerpt from a letter to Rev. George Dunn, '21, written March 31, 1943.

"At this writing it looks like the beginning of the end in Africa. My prayers go for a speedy conclusion of the whole sorry mess. Civilization has much to build as mankind licks his wounds for a couple of decades. We'll suffer many more inhibitions before and after it's over, but if this is the war to end international strife, no price is too dear. They may talk about courts of international justice, world police forces and formidable armies and navies for the democracies to sustain peace, but they'll never make it safe for the canary of peace to leave its cage until we start giving about a tenth as much to peace and the church as we toss to the mad dogs of war. Of course this is an African prospective, but civilization and political statesmen will have to take a different tack.

TRACK

Dual - meets and tri - meets led the cinder-path events this year. At a meeting of the North Central Conference coaches at Minneapolis, Minnesota, it was decided to disband the North Central Conference track meet for the duration. Don Snyder, representative for Morningside at the meeting, made a bid for the cinder-path event. Morningside has been hit by service calls although there are a few men returning. The outstanding tracker is the assistant coach, M. O. Hodges who hails from Baker University, Baldwin, Kansas. Hodges is a four sport letterman who is continuing his academic work here but will return to Baker in May to receive his degree. The assistant coach won a total of twelve letters while competing in football, baseball, basketball, and track. He is rated as all-Kansas Conference back for the last three seasons and in basketball he was an all-conference guard for two seasons. In his freshman year he won four major awards and is the only athlete to do this in the school's history.

The Morningside College Maroons held two intra-squad meets consisting of a septathlon and an octathlon. The septathlon, consisting of seven events, was held on April 21 and 22 and was won by Bill Briggs who collected 2,695 points. He won only one first in the meet which was the high jump. The octathlon, consisting of eight events was won by Bill Meacham.

The first dual-meet of the season was held April 16 with Wayne State Teachers at the City Stadium. Wayne defeated the Maroons 78-58. Hodges was the high scorer in the field events tying first with Bobber of Wayne in the pole-vault and the high jump. Hodges won first in the shot-put and the discus throw and placed third in the javalin throw. Events in which Morningside won firsts were: 120-yard hurdles, Kingsbury; 880-yard run, Wright; two-mile run, Ehorn; mile relay, Briggs, Hopp, Lohry, and Wright; and the broad jump, Asprey.

On May 6, a tri-meet was held at Omaha with Peru, Omaha and Morningside competing. Morningside emerged winner with 66½ points. A return meet with Wayne was held there May 14. The Maroons avenged their earlier defeat by collecting 88 points to 48 for Wayne. Hodges, performing in his usual brilliant style, won individual honors with a total of 30 points.

The tracksters who have been awarded their "M" this season are Gene Asprey, Bill Briggs, Bob Ehorn, Marvin Hodges, Bill Lohry, Warren Kingsbury, Bill Meacham and Dale Wright.

Two Morningside Maroons placed on the all-conference basketball team this season. Bob Held, '44, now in the armed services, and Bill Briggs, '46, were awarded berths on the North Central Conference roster.

Our Boys Write Us

In a letter to Dr. Stephens, Calmon Levich, ex '44, in commenting on an address by Harry Hopkins reprinted in a recent Reader's Digest, strenuously objects to Mr. Hopkins' statement that everyone over the age of 18 attending an institution of higher learning should be in the reserves, the armed forces, or studying an occupation vital to the war effort. Cal says, "Many of us left school to help fight the war, thinking that a democratic educational system would remain at home, not only waiting for us but operating in our absence. We were convinced that unless some of those who stayed behind were privileged to study the workings of civilization there would be nothing awaiting our return. After all, we

enlisted to protect the forms of life and education that would assure us that the destiny of our country would be in the hands of men of learning—men in whom the spirit of democracy and tolerance was being imbued by the institution we left. Opinions on education should be confined to educators who are qualified to have them. Mr. Hopkins would leave us a generation of automatons. We could well learn a lesson from the Chinese, who, in spite of years of ravage, have left the more promising of their youth in schools to assure the future of the country in peace time. It would, indeed, be an empty victory that saw those who were intelligent enough to seek learning regimented by Harry Hopkins.

Dear Editor:

Waymack, '11, and Edwin Haakinson, '26, plus the recently started and pleasant custom of sending the Collegian Reporter to former editors of the paper have reminded me that I long ago told Dr. Roadman that I would sometime write on former Morningsiders who have joined the ranks of "the funny little men in the battered hats and baggy pants in the pressbox."

Waymack's story was covered in the Bulletin and on Capt. Haakinson I can only add that he was city editor of the old Sioux City Tribune for several years before heading for Washington and the AP.

In school with Haakinson was Marion Leslie Woodward ('25, I think) who started her career on the Des Moines Register and for years was official sobsister on the

forementioned old, old Tribune. "Shorty", as far as I know, still is woman's editor of the Pittsburg (Pa.) Sun-Telegraph.

After Leslie and Haakinson, came a hiatus in the production of ink-stained wretches until the drought and depression 30's. Then in rapid order came B. C. But I insist that I'm not a "feather merchant" because I didn't ship in with a rate and still do not have one.
