In some ethnic communities, the proportion of immigrants is closer to 75% and the LEP rate is well over 50%. For these Asian Americans, language presents a significant - sometimes insurmountable - barrier to seeking justice through the legal system or courts. Poor or lack of interpretation has resulted in significant miscommunication between lawyers and clients, as well as between the courts and litigants, sometimes with disastrous results such as a parent losing custody of a child or a domestic violence victim being prosecuted for assault. Almost every major U.S. corporation is increasing its investments in the country to take advantage of its growing market. Asian companies have also become major investors in Brazil. China has replaced the U.S. as Brazil’s largest trading partner and investors from Japan, Korea and India are also engaged in significant investments in Brazil. As in much of the world, many of these cross border investments are done using U.S.-style legal documentation and thus U.S. lawyers have an opportunity to be involved in these transactions. More importantly, cloud computing is an example where corporate desire to reduce costs dovetails well with society’s goal of environmental sustainability. This session will revolve around cloud-computing case studies - like the partnership between Microsoft and Toyota surrounding Toyota’s adoption of Microsoft Windows Azure for its next-generation telematics services - and will help articulate what benefits the “cloud” can offer in terms of environmental impact, how cloud computing enables these benefits, why this matters to corporations today, and the important role that standards play in this space. One study found, for example, that using cloud-based solutions, as opposed to an on-premise one, reduced energy use and carbon emissions by over 30% in large deployments of IT solutions, and over 90% for small deployments. The Supreme Court said no.
