

### **Paving Of 5** Streets Proposed

A long-awaited street improvement program for the city of Plymouth may get going this fall if the proposed special assessments gain the approval of the property owners involved.

Six streets are being proposed for resurfacing, three of them for this fall and three others next June.


Included are Harvey St., from Ann Arbor Trail to Junction; Blunk, from Church to Farmer; Farmer, from Harvey to 300 feet cast of Karmada; Pacific, from William to Farmer; Wing, from Main to Deer; and Sheridan. from Sheldon to Mc-Kinley.

The projects are to cost over \$45,000.

The Harvey St. resurfacing is divided into two separate projects, one from Ann Arbor Trail to Church and the other from Church to Junction.

Two of the projects will be performed withoutassessment while the others are being assessed at \$1 per front foot and 50 cents a foot for side yards. This is much less than the cost of laying new pavement.

For that reason, we would like to be counted among the group which welcomed the chance to examine Premier Khrushchev of the Soviet Union at close quarters, right here in the United States.

We never have been able to understand how any progress - any forward movement - could be hoped for in the area of international relations unless the peoples of the world shared intimate knowledge of the facts.

One important part of the facts involves a knowledge of the ability, personality and disposition of the leaders of powerful nations.

Khrushchev's performance on his tour here, ably covered by press and radio, has permitted us a more personal knowledge of the Russian leadership than we otherwise could have obtained in a lifetime. For better or worse, Khrushchev is what he is, and we have seen him in action.

And, incidentally, he has seen the purpose for Americans.
