



Covering elections can be interesting. But more often they are dull. Always they are extra work.

It's standard operating procedure to plan on an all night stand. Covering an election, small weeklies that hit the newsstands on Wednesday afternoon face the same problem as your

There is no time. Elections are on Tuesdays. Often the final results don't come

favorite daily.

straggling in until 5 a.m. That means a mass of material must be tabulated and stories written before deadline.

Ordinarily that means 8 a.m. Wednesday morning. But deadlines are flexible for elections and the final story often isn't posted until

Most elections it appears as it will be virtually impossible to get the results in time. But nearly every year everything falls into place and the election is covered in detail and on time.

There are exceptions. One comes when the race is too close to call. That's breathholding time.

Given the hurly-burly of election night when county clerk's offices are full of candidates, officials and others just there out of idle curiosity for a free cup of coffee and a donut, no sane person would want to take as gospel any election decided by 50 votes or so.

That's just one of the hazards that can't be avoided. The ones that make you want to forget the whole thing are ones that go sour because of an easily avoided

I still grind my teeth when I think about one of those. It was a general election with plenty of propositions and a neavy vote.

It was also before the time of the spread of machine ballots in the county and counting was S-L-O-W.

It was along about 4 a.m. before all but one of the townships had reported and with smarting eyes and coffee hangovers we waited for the last return. And we waited. And we waited.

Finally at 6 a.m. the various media persons took over to post the results without the report from the township.

It's good that we did. The election committee evidently felt that they had worked long enough after they finished counting the results.

They simply locked up and went home. The results came in the next morning

There never has been a readership survey taken in the Thumb to tell how much of these stories are interesting enough to attract readers.

There's a suspicion that only readers with a personal concern read election news thoroughly . . . and even they may only read about the elections featuring candidates of personal concern.

You're asking, why do it?

Without pontificating, it's because this paper subscribes to freedom of the press and the public right to know. Most papers, large and small, feel this way, you

And it's good for all of us that they do.

No shots, no school for all students this fall

Getting shots may be an unpleasant experience, but the possible outbreak of measles, rubella (German measles), polio, diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) is even worse. To prevent such out-

breaks, state law requires school children to be vaccinated for protection against those diseases. Vaccination against mumps, though not required, is recommended.

The only exception allowed is if parents request in writing an exemption for their child for religious or other reasons.

Since most immunizations, once the series of shots is completed, are good for a lifetime, emphasis in making sure school children have the required shots is placed on those entering kindergarten.

. According to area elementary principals and the Cass City school nurse, most children have completed the required inoculations by the start of school.

As long as the children have at least started their series of shots, or will start them, they aren't kept out of school

. According to Carol Hrycko, director of nurses for the Tuscola County Health Department, children as young as two months can start receiving the required shots.

The sequence, she explained, is as follows: The first time, the child

receives a DPT shot (diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus) and oral polio vaccine. Two months later comes

another DPT shot and oral polio vaccine. Two months after that comes a third DPT shot.

Finally, one year later comes another DPT shot and oral polio vaccine.

Only one shot is needed for protection against measles and rubella and if a preschooler, protection against mumps is included in the same shot. This shot can be given any time after the child is 15 months old. Children who for some reason received a measles vaccination before they were one year old should be

After all the shots are taken, all that is required in the future is the DPT shot once every 10 years. Adults only need protection against tetanus and diphtheria every 10 years. If they received a measles shot prior to 1966, when a different type vaccine was used, they should be revaccinated.

HEALTH DEPARTMENTS

Youngsters -- or adults -can get required inoculations from their family doctor or county health depart-

The Tuscola department has an immunization clinic every Thursday from 9 a.m.noon and 1-3:30 p.m. The first Thursday of each month, the afternoon session runs until 7:30 p.m. Persons should call first for an appointment. The health department office is on M-81, west of Caro.

The Sanilac and Huron County Health Departments hold immunization clinics twice a month. Persons whose last name begins with A-M are asked to attend the first day; N-Z on the second

In Sanilac county, clinics this month will be Aug. 15 and 23 from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-4 p.m. The clinic is at the health department office at 115 N. Elk Street, Sandusky.

The Huron county clinic will be Aug. 16 and 22. Hours are 9-11 a.m. and 1-4 p.m. time. The health department office is in the county building

in downtown Bad Axe. The health departments do not charge for the immunizations.

SCHOOLS

All area school districts have a kindergarten roundup in the spring for youngsters starting school in the fall. At the round-ups, parents are reminded of the immunization require-

By the time school starts each fall, out of maybe 160 children starting kindergarten, according to Barbara Malone, nurse for the Cass City schools, there are usually about 40 youngsters who haven't completed their sequence of shots and maybe three or four who haven't

had any shots. Usually one or two parents ask for exemptions for their children religious on grounds.

As long as the children have started their shots, Mrs. Malone said, they are admitted to school. She checks later to make sure they are following through. "I think every year people

are aware of and are becoming more aware of it," she said of the immunization requirements, "I think our kids are fairly well immunized.'

At Gagetown Elementary, Principal Bill Britt said at the time of the round-up each spring, about 95 percent have had at least some of their shots.

If youngsters haven't had any shots, they aren't let into school in the fall. That hasn't happened in the three years he has been there, he said. There also haven't been any parents requesting exemptions during that

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Of maybe 60-70 youngsters starting kindergarten each fall, Kingston Elementary Principal Douglas Kramer said, maybe 10 percent aren't in compliance with immunization requirements. Most haven't had all their shots, but sometimes they have and their parents can't find their immunization records, and some

haven't had any shots.... Postnasal drip often is closely related to sinusitus, the American Medical Association points out.

At the root of the problem are abnormal secretions in the upper throat, the nasopharynx. One of the functions of the nasopharynx is to warm and moisten air drawn into the lungs through the nose and to catch dust and bacteria on its moist surfaces.

To maintain moisture, the nasal passageways normal-

Post-nasal drip is a com- ly produce rather copious quantities of two types of secretions - a watery, or serous, secretion, and a thicker mucus. A certain amount of these secretions lingers in the nasopharynx, but when an over supply accumulates there, particularly of mucus, the result is post-nasal drip.


Modern drugs can restore normal function in a high percentage of cases, and severe deformities of the airways can be corrected surgically.

Gargling is not effective against post-nasal drip or the offensive breath which frequently accompanies it. Gargling reaches only the front two-thirds of the oral cavity, and the secretions causing the trouble are in the rear one-third.

Sometimes coughing fails to expel the accumulation. Breathing can then be made easier by using certain medicines.

Finally, a sizeable number of the millions of cases of post-nasal drip among Americans would clear up if the sufferer would just stop



For this reason I am asking that you accept our congratulations on the accomplishment of your students, and that you extend these congratulations to members of your staff and citizens of your community.







Magistrate Maki rehired

The new Tuscola county magistrate is - the old Tuscola county magistrate. The county Board of Com-

missioners voted unanimously Tuesday to reappoint Joan Maki to the \$11,200 a year position.

She had resigned from the position effective July 1 to join her husband, Leo Maki, a former Caro attorney now serving as attorney for a banking firm in Hancock.

Filling the vacancy led to a row between District Judge Richard F. Kern, who selects the candidate, and the county board, which must approve his recommendation.

By a 5-2 vote July 18, the board rejected Kern's nominee for the position, feeling she was unqualified.

That meant Kern had to readvertise for applicants and among the applicants the second time was Joan

The judge recommended her to the board, which approved her appointment Tuesday morning. She was sworn into office immediately thereafter.

KINGSTON POLICE

Sheriff Hugh Marr and two members of the Kingston Village Council asked the board to approve the sheriff's department contracting with the village to provide a deputy there fulltime.

The village would pay the county \$14,784 annually for the officer's salary and fringe benefits and also provide a patrol car.
