

## Houses give way for bank

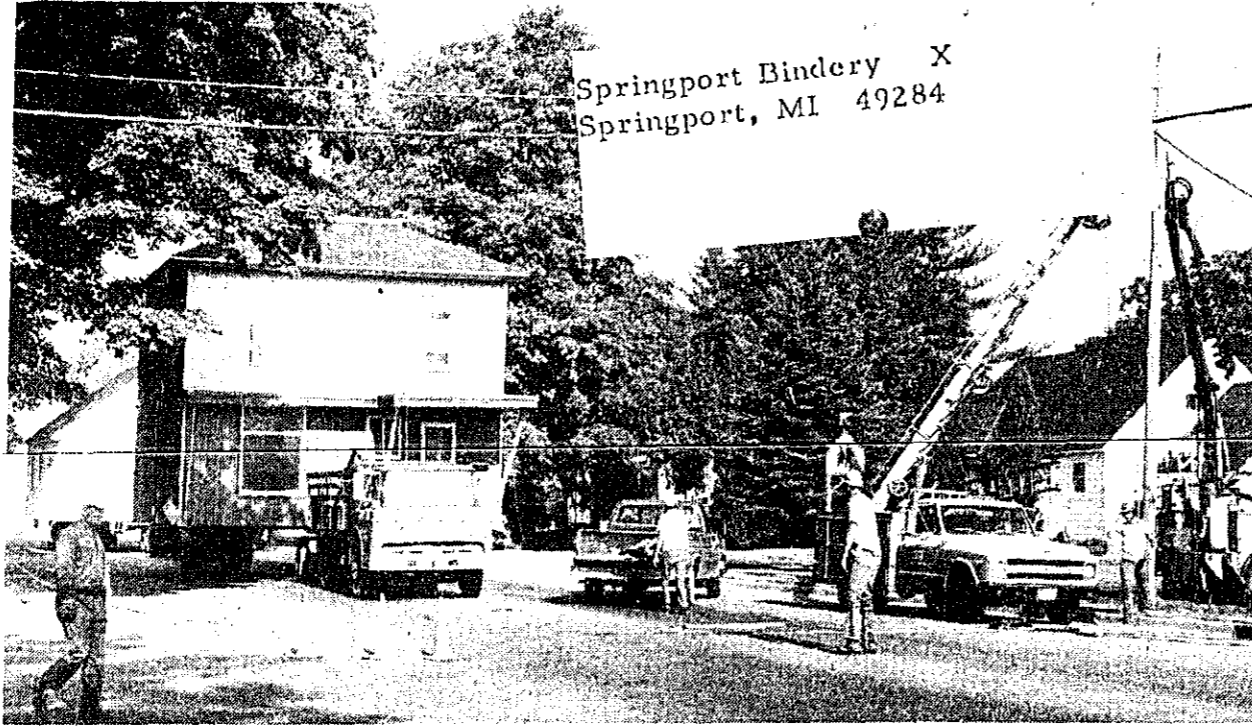
All that was left at the corner of Sherman and Main Streets Tuesday morning were two basements and a garage after Anthes Brothers Building Movers moved the two houses from the site.

The property is now owned by the Pinney State Bank, which plans to eventually build a drive-in facility there and maybe later a bank branch. Its application to build the facility is still pending with the state.

Thomas O'Connor retained ownership of the white house on the corner. It was moved to M-53, about 2½ miles south of M-81.

The house next to it (shown in front in the photo) was sold to Gerald Mathewson and was moved to Lamton Road, just south of Severance Road.

It will replace the former Mathewson family home, which burned to the ground last December.

## It's Spires vs. Joslyn for judge

It will be John P. Spires vs. Patrick R. Joslyn Nov. 7 in the race for the newly created judgeship on the 10th Judicial circuit, composed of Tuscola and Lapeer counties.

Spires, Lapeer county district judge, easily outdistanced the field Tuesday with 2,289 votes in Lapeer and 724 in Tuscola for a total of 3,013.

The race for second spot between Joslyn, Tuscola county prosecutor, and Wallace Kent Jr., Tuscola county probate judge, was much closer.

Joslyn won 1,517 votes in Tuscola county and 960 in Lapeer for a total of 2,477.

Kent won 1,019 votes in Lapeer county and 1,240 in Tuscola for a total of 2,259. In Elkland township, Joslyn won 198 votes; Kent, 102, and Spires, 65.

In Elmwood township, Joslyn had 67 votes; Spires, 10, and Kent, 33.

In Novesta township, it was 22 for Joslyn and 13 each for Kent and Spires.

Joslyn won 55 votes in Ellington township to 35 for Kent and 20 for Spires.

In Kingston township, it was 54 for Joslyn, 37 for Kent and 23 for Spires.

The other judicial race on the ballot was in the second district of the Michigan Court of Appeals, composed of 14 counties.

In the Thumb, Corunna attorney E. Thomas Fitzgerald was the big winner with 1,678 votes in Tuscola, 1,168 in Huron, and 3,282 in Sanilac. He was also the winner in the district.

The incumbent justice, Valter P. Cynar of Warren, had 571 votes in Tuscola, 599 in Huron, and 1,951 in Sanilac.

Luke Quinn, Genesee county juvenile court judge, received 782 votes in Tuscola, 679 in Huron, and 685 in Sanilac.

## Upsets few in townships, some millages defeated

Upsets were few in area townships Tuesday, with there being few primary races.

The biggest losers were some millage requests to finance road maintenance and improvements.

### TUSCOLA COUNTY

Elkland -- Pay McComb was renominated for trustee over challenger Jack McDaniel. McComb received 178 votes in precinct 1 and 94 in precinct 2, for a total of 272. McDaniel had 47 votes in No. 1 and 169 in No. 2 for a total of 216.

Only Republicans were on the ballot, with the other candidates, all incumbents, unopposed. Supervisor Jack Gallagher had 403 votes; Clerk Carolyn Ware, 440; Treasurer Art Randall, 438, and Constable Frederick Martin, 363.

Elmwood -- A request for one mill for five years for road construction and improvement was defeated, 72-61.

Only Republicans, all incumbents, were on the ballot. Supervisor Roy Messer had 136 votes; Clerk Joanne Sattelberg, 131; Treasurer Betty Russell, 150; Trustee Lewis McCreedy, 147, and Constable Harry King, 125.

Novesta -- There were no primary contests. The Republican incumbents are all seeking reelection. Vote totals Tuesday were Supervisor William O'Dell, 66; Clerk Henry Rock, 62; Treasurer Jean Clarke, 64; Trustee Arleon Retherford, 65, and Constable Donald Miller Jr., 63.

Democratic challengers in November will be Nurseie Kloc, for clerk, who received 22 votes, and Everett J.

Field, for treasurer, 24. Ellington -- No primary contests on the ballot.

Kingston -- In the only primary contest, for the Republican nomination for treasurer, incumbent Louis Wenzlaff received 59 votes to 17 for Velna Richter.

### SANILAC COUNTY

Argyle -- Supervisor Gerald King was upset in his bid for renomination. Hazel L. Foote, the present township treasurer, won the Republican nomination, 73-55.

For the vacated treasurer position, Kathleen O'Connor took the Republican nomination, 65-62, over Darwin J. Moriarty.

The two millage proposals were both defeated. Both were renewals. One mill for three years for road maintenance was defeated 101-57. A half-mill for fire protection was rejected, 99-58.

Austin -- Sylvester J. Bukoski won the Democratic nomination for trustee, 42-25, over Steven Mausolf. No Republicans were running.

Evergreen -- Audrey Leslie won the Republican nomination for supervisor with 75 votes to 37 for write-in candidate John Agar. Larry Puterbaugh didn't seek reelection.

Greenleaf -- Renewal of one mill for five years for fire protection was approved, 41-21. Lamotte -- Two mills for two years for road and bridge work was defeated, 89-74.

Moore -- Two of three incumbents on the Republican ballot won renomination. The loser was Clerk Stanley Kohn, defeated by David Jansen, 173-105. Treasurer Clayton Bitterling defeated Donna Freiberger, 145-136, and Trustee Colon Jury won 164-113 over challenger Gary Schell.

### HURON COUNTY

Bingham -- Three-quarters of a mill for 10 years to purchase and equip fire trucks was approved, 237-119. One mill for two years to buy and equip an ambulance was okayed, 307-67.

Brookfield -- Incumbent Treasurer John Draschil defeated challenger Robert McPhail for the Republican nomination, 136-105.

Creation of a park commission was approved, 108-58.

Grant -- Renewal of three mills for three years for road maintenance was rejected, 64-53.

Sheridan -- Two mills for four years for roads was approved, 65-54.

## Russell tops Ryan for commissioner, 2 incumbents lose

Former Elmwood Township Treasurer Royce Russell was the easy victor Tuesday over Clifford Ryan for a seat on the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners.

Two incumbent commissioners in the area, Edmund Good Sr. in Huron county and Joseph J. O'Connor in Sanilac county, lost their bids for reelection.

contest for the Tuscola county board was in district No. 1, where Ralph Rasch won the Democratic nomination over Deon G. Manke, 143-75. In November, he will face Republican incumbent Donna Rayl.

The district consists of Columbia and Wisner townships.

### HURON COUNTY

In district No. 1, Bay Port dairy farmer Bruce Kuhl, 42, upset Edmund Good Sr., 487-368.

Kuhl was the loser two years ago when he ran against Good for the Republican nomination. Good, 70, also a farmer, was serving his fourth two-year term on the board.

No Democrats are running, so Kuhl is assured of election in November.

The district consists of Brookfield, Sebawaing, and Fairhaven townships.

In district No. 2 -- Grant, Sheridan, Bingham, Paris and Sherman townships -- Robert Grifka didn't seek reelection.

No Democrats were running, so Republican primary winner William Nugent, a Bad Axe area dairy farmer, is the new commissioner. He

received 397 votes to 242 for Ugly businessman Bruce Brown. Nugent previously served two terms on the county board.

### SANILAC COUNTY

Dairy farmer Lloyd Severance easily won renomination for his fourth two-year term on the board.

He received 344 votes in the Republican primary to 241 for Methodist minister Allen Lewis and 63 for home builder Michael Lucas.

Severance, 62, of Evergreen township, now faces Democrat Eileen Riess of Snover Nov. 7.

District No. 1 consists of Greenleaf, Evergreen, Lamotte, Moore and Argyle townships.

In district No. 2, Joseph J. O'Connor of Minden City, in his sixth year on the county board and presently its chairman, was defeated.

Donald Decker, a farmer and Marion township trustee, received 361 votes in the Republican primary; O'Connor, 283, and William Lakatos, 141.

No Democrats ran. The district is composed of Austin, Minden, Delaware, Wheatland and Marion townships.

## Motorcyclist dies in Sunday crash

Tuscola county recorded its 16th traffic fatality of the year Sunday when William T. Scolly, 36, of Onaway was killed in an accident east of Vassar.

Sheriff's deputies reported that Shirley Ann Griffin, 53, of Caro, was northbound on Washburn Road, stopped for the stop sign at Saginaw Road, then was proceeding through the intersection when her car was struck by the eastbound motorcycle of Scolly.

Mrs. Griffin told officers she didn't see the motorcyclist approaching. A witness, driving behind Scolly, said the lights on the cycle were not on. The accident took place at 9:01 p.m.

Scolly was thrown from his machine and landed in the intersection. The cycle came to a halt off the north side of the road.

As of Tuesday, investigation of the accident hadn't been completed.

In 1977, only 14 persons were killed in county traffic accidents.

Caro state police reported she was eastbound on M-46 and was turning north onto Chambers Road when her car was struck by the westbound vehicle driven by James Lochner, 45, of Caro.

He was taken to Caro Community Hospital and released from there the next day.

Karl J. Wildner, 21, of Portland, Mich., sought his own treatment after an accident in Columbia township at 3:30 a.m. Sunday.

Deputies said he was northbound on French Road, turned the corner at Hoppe Road too fast, went off the road into a ditch and struck a driveway abutment.

Alexander E. Robles, 28, of 6394 River Road, Cass City, was ticketed by Caro

state police Aug. 1 on a charge of failure to stop in an assured clear distance following an accident at 3:40 p.m.

They reported Richard J. Green, 20, of Caro, was eastbound on M-81, waiting for traffic to clear to turn left on Colwood Road, when his car was struck in the rear by the Robles vehicle.

Eugene M. Bilicki, 22, of Caro, was ticketed by Caro state police after a 5 a.m. accident Friday. They reported he was eastbound on Stevens Road, west of Phillips Road, and lost control when his car went onto the south shoulder. It crossed the road, went into a ditch on the north side, and rolled over.

## Youth intoxicated when killed by car

Stephen J. Bard was legally drunk when he was run over by a car and killed July 9.

How much of a factor his intoxication was in his lying on the road when he was run over will never be known.

Bard, 19, of Bad Axe, was run over about 4:30 a.m. that day on Bay City-Forestville Road, about a half-mile east of Gageton.

The driver of the car involved, Gloria J. Stilson, 19, of 3124 Huron Line Road, Cass City, was later ticketed by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department for failure to report a personal injury accident.

No further charges were brought against her because authorities felt it would have

been impossible for her to avoid hitting the body as it lay in the road.

An autopsy was performed at St. Mary's Hospital in Saginaw and preliminary findings were that Bard was alive when he was struck by the car.

A sheriff's department investigation conducted immediately after his death concluded that he was not the victim of foul play prior to the incident, speculation having been that he had maybe been robbed, beaten, and then his body dumped on the road.

He had last been seen walking east on Bay City-Forestville, east from Gageton, about an hour before the incident. The remaining question to

be answered was whether he was intoxicated and that had to await the final autopsy report, which wasn't received until recently.

If he was drunk, he might have fallen down on the road in a stupor, not realizing where he was.

The autopsy report, according to Detective Ron Phillips, showed that Bard's alcohol blood content was above the legal limit for motorists of .10, although he didn't want it revealed what the actual reading was.

As to the condition Bard was in when he was run over by the car, Phillips said he could have been "sobering up" at the time, so it isn't possible to say whether he was alert when he was run over.

## McCann defeats Acheson

## DeGrow, Hoffman win

State Sen. Alvin DeGrow, Pigeon, and State Rep. Percy Hoffman, R-Appleton, held onto their seats in the legislature Tuesday, DeGrow by a large margin, Hoffman by a not quite-so-large margin.

In the Democratic primary to pick a candidate to oppose State Rep. Loren Armbruster, James McCann defeated Donald R. Acheson.

### SENATE

DeGrow had an easy time defeating challenger Edward Moore, a Bad Axe certified public accountant, 872-5,779. He will now face Democrat Kathleen Asher in the Nov. 7 election. She won 839 votes Tuesday.

The 28th district consists of Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties plus part of Lapeer and St. Clair counties.

County totals were: Tuscola -- DeGrow, 2,004; Moore, 451; Asher, 1,230. Sanilac -- DeGrow, 3,946; Moore, 1,686; Asher, 942. Huron -- DeGrow, 2,950; Moore, 2,302; Asher, 931. Lapeer -- DeGrow, 2,084; Moore, 702; Asher, 1,932. St. Clair -- DeGrow, 2,892; Moore, 1,009; Asher, 2,034.

### 84TH HOUSE DISTRICT

Incumbent Loren Armbruster of Caro was unopposed for the Republican nomination. He received 2,447 votes in Tuscola county, 362 in Genesee county, and 302 in Saginaw county

for a total of 3,111. The figure for Genesee is for 19 out of 20 precincts. The district consists of all of Tuscola county and part of the other two.

James T. McCann of Akron had no trouble winning the Democratic nomination with 2,482 votes to 1,281 for Donald R. Acheson of Chlo, who lost to McCann two years ago.

McCann had 1,234 votes in Tuscola county to 347 for Acheson; 1,206 to 904 in Genesee (19 of 20 precincts), and 42 votes to 30 for Acheson in Saginaw.

### 77TH HOUSE DISTRICT

Sanilac county provided the winning margin for incumbent Hoffman, although his challenger, Brown City

Mayor Keith Muxlow also lives in Sanilac.

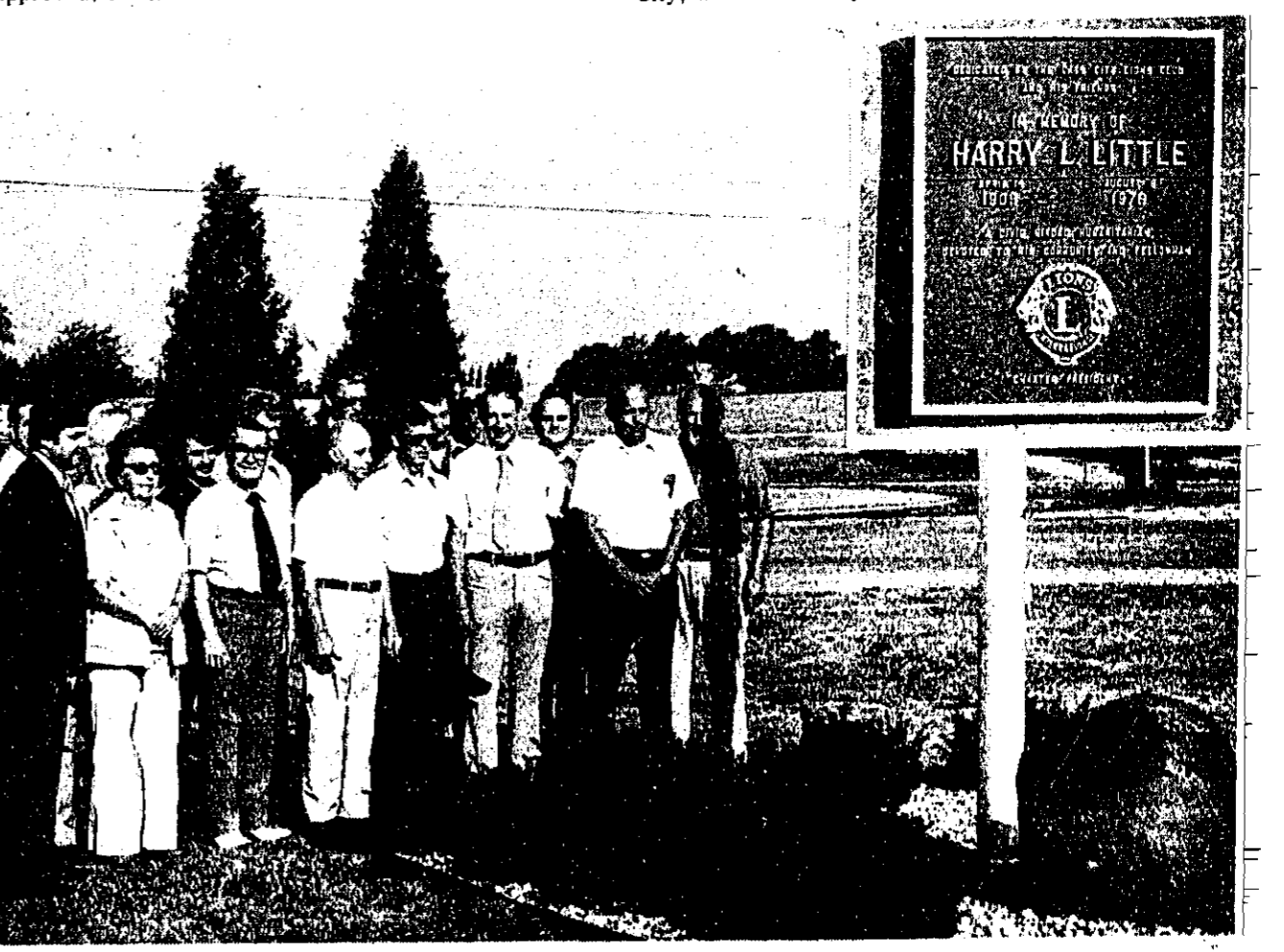
The total vote was 6,229 for Hoffman and 5,773 for Muxlow.

Hoffman will be opposed in November by Democrat Richard Davies of Melvin, who won 2,159 votes.

The district consists of all of Huron and Sanilac counties and part of Lapeer and St. Clair.

Results by county were: Huron -- Hoffman, 2,491; Muxlow, 2,700; Davies, 847. Sanilac -- Hoffman, 3,150; Muxlow, 2,438; Davies, 937. Lapeer -- Hoffman, 95; Muxlow, 190; Davies, 105. St. Clair -- Hoffman, 493; Muxlow, 445, and Davies, 284.

Hoffman won the election by 456 votes. His winning margin in Sanilac county was 712.

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

## 71 attend Crawford reunion

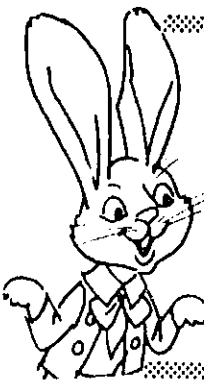
The Clayton Crawford annual reunion was held at the Cass City Park Sunday, Aug. 6, with 64 members and nine guests present.

Considering that only about 20 percent of the registered voters will bother to go to the polls, I sometimes wonder why we do it. Covering elections can be interesting. But more often they are dull. Always they are extra work.

It's standard operating procedure to plan on an all night stand. Covering an election, small weeklies that hit the newsstands on Wednesday afternoon face the same problem as your favorite daily.

There is no time. Elections are on Tuesdays. Often the final results don't come straggling in until 5 a.m. That means a mass of material must be tabulated and stories written before deadline.

Ordinarily that means 8 a.m. Wednesday morning. But deadlines are flexible for elections and the final story often isn't posted until 10:30 a.m.

Most elections it appears as it will be virtually impossible to get the results in time. But nearly every year everything falls into place and the election is covered in detail and on time.

There are exceptions. One comes when the race is too close to call. That's breath-holding time.

Given the hurly-burly of election night when county clerk's offices are full of candidates, officials and others just there out of idle curiosity for a free cup of coffee and a donut, no sane person would want to take as gospel any election decided by 50 votes or so.

That's just one of the hazards that can't be avoided. The ones that make you want to forget the whole thing are ones that go sour because of an easily avoided snafu.

I still grind my teeth when I think about one of those. It was a general election with plenty of propositions and a heavy vote.

It was also before the time of the spread of machine ballots in the county and counting was S-L-O-W.

It was along about 4 a.m. before all but one of the townships had reported and with smarting eyes and coffee hangovers we waited for the last return. And we waited. And we waited.

Finally at 6 a.m. the various media persons took over to post the results without the report from the township.

# No shots, no school for all students this fall

Getting shots may be an unpleasant experience, but the possible outbreak of measles, rubella (German measles), polio, diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) is even worse.

To prevent such outbreaks, state law requires school children to be vaccinated for protection against those diseases. Vaccination against mumps, though not required, is recommended. The only exception allowed is if parents request in writing an exemption for their child for religious or other reasons.

Since most immunizations, once the series of shots is completed, are good for a lifetime, emphasis in making sure school children have the required shots is placed on those entering kindergarten.

According to area elementary principals and the Cass City school nurse, most children have completed the required inoculations by the start of school.

As long as the children have at least started their series of shots, or will start them, they aren't kept out of school.

According to Carol Hrycko, director of nurses for the Tuscola County Health Department, children as young as two months can start receiving the required shots.

The sequence, she explained, is as follows: The first time, the child receives a DPT shot (diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus) and oral polio vaccine.

Two months later comes another DPT shot and oral polio vaccine. Two months after that comes a third DPT shot.

Finally, one year later comes another DPT shot and oral polio vaccine.

Only one shot is needed for protection against measles and rubella and if a preschooler, protection against mumps is included in the same shot. This shot can be given any time after the child is 15 months old. Children who for some reason received a measles vaccination before they were one year old should be revaccinated.

After all the shots are taken, all that is required in the future is the DPT shot once every 10 years. Adults only need protection against tetanus and diphtheria every 10 years. If they received a measles shot prior to 1966, when a different type vaccine was used, they should be revaccinated.

### HEALTH DEPARTMENTS

Youngsters -- or adults -- can get required inoculations from their family doctor or county health department.

The Tuscola department has an immunization clinic every Thursday from 9 a.m. to noon and 1-3:30 p.m. The first Thursday of each month, the afternoon session runs until 7:30 p.m. Persons should call first for an appointment. The health department office is on M-81, west of Caro.

The Sanilac and Huron County Health Departments hold immunization clinics twice a month. Persons whose last name begins with A-M are asked to attend the first day; N-Z on the second day.

In Sanilac county, clinics this month will be Aug. 15 and 23 from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-4 p.m. The clinic is at the health department office at 115 N. Elk Street, Sandusky.

The Huron county clinic will be Aug. 16 and 22. Hours

are 9-11 a.m. and 1-4 p.m. The health department office is in the county building in downtown Bad Axe.

The health departments do not charge for the immunizations.

### SCHOOLS

All area school districts have a kindergarten round-up in the spring for youngsters starting school in the fall. At the round-ups, parents are reminded of the immunization requirements.

By the time school starts each fall, out of maybe 160 children starting kindergarten, according to Barbara Malone, nurse for the Cass City schools, there are usually about 40 youngsters who haven't completed their sequence of shots and maybe three or four who haven't had any shots.

Usually one or two parents ask for exemptions for their children on religious grounds.

As long as the children have started their shots, Mrs. Malone said, they are admitted to school. She checks later to make sure they are following through.

"I think every year people are aware of and are becoming more aware of it," she said of the immunization requirements. "I think our kids are fairly well immunized."

At Gagetown Elementary, Principal Bill Britt said at the time of the round-up each spring, about 95 percent have had at least some of their shots.

If youngsters haven't had any shots, they aren't let into school in the fall. That hasn't happened in the three years he has been there, he said. There also haven't been any parents requesting exemptions during that

time.

Of maybe 60-70 youngsters starting kindergarten each fall, Kingston Elementary Principal Douglas Kramer said, maybe 10 percent aren't in compliance with immunization requirements. Most haven't had all their shots, but sometimes they have and their parents can't find their immunization records, and some haven't had any shots.

Children can begin school as long as they have started their immunizations, but Kramer said he usually finds about January, two or three children haven't started their shots. The parents are then sent a warning letter, which always has the desired effect.

He averages one requested exemption per year.

Kenneth Sweeney didn't become principal at Ubley Elementary School until last October, so couldn't say what the compliance rate is.

He did say parents were warned at the kindergarten round-up in the spring of the immunization requirements and reminder letters were being sent out this week.

## Only 19% voted in primary

The vast majority of Tuscola county's registered voters didn't think it worth their effort to go to the polls Tuesday.

Of the almost 28,000 registered voters in the county, 5,286 voted, a turnout of only a little over 19 percent.

Elkland township did considerably better than that, with 687 voters, 36.7 percent, of the 1,872 registered going to the polls.

The Elmwood township turnout was even better, with 37.1 percent of the 712 registered voters voting.

In Novesta township, 20.3 percent of those registered, 119 of 584, voted.

All vote totals given in this issue of the Chronicle are unofficial. Returns must be verified by county boards of canvassers before they are official.

# Nora Cole sentenced to 5-10 years for assault

Nora May Cole was sentenced Monday to 5-10 years in the Huron Valley Women's Facility near Ypsilanti for the June 18, 1977 shooting of her ex-son-in-law.

Sentence was pronounced by Circuit Judge Norman A. Baguley. She was credited with three days served. The judge granted a defense motion for setting of bond pending appeal. He set it at \$30,000.

Mrs. Cole, 46, was found guilty by a jury July 14 of a charge of assault with intent to commit great bodily harm less than murder in the shooting of Basim Ahmad Hmeidian. He was shot with

a .22 caliber rifle outside her home on Mertz Road (M-24), south of Caro. He was hospitalized but later recovered.

He had come to the house to see his son, who was living there with his ex-wife and Mrs. Cole.

In other action before Judge Baguley Monday: Phillip R. Waybrandt Jr., 19, of Birch Run, stood mute to a charge of unlawfully driving away an automobile.

A plea of innocent was entered and a pretrial hearing scheduled Aug. 21. Bond was continued.

Waybrandt is charged with taking the motorcycle of David Shurtz in Tuscola township June 3.

William R. Jacob, 27, of Elmer Road, Sandusky, stood mute to charges of driving under the influence of liquor (third offense) and driving with license suspended (2nd offense). Pleas of innocent were entered and a pretrial hearing scheduled Aug. 21. Bond was continued.

He was arrested on the charges June 12 in Juniata township.

John M. Springer, 25, of Otisville, pleaded guilty to violation of probation. His plea was accepted and sentencing scheduled Aug. 21. Personal recognizance bond was set at \$1,000.

Springer was placed on 60 months' probation Feb. 7, 1977 for attempted child abuse. He violated probation by failing to pay his court ordered obligations in May, June and July.

Charles D. Kibbe, 35, of 614 Welch Blvd., Vassar, was sentenced to 30 days in

the county jail for violation of probation. He will be allowed to go to work during the day under the work-release program.

He pleaded guilty Aug. 8, 1977 to the violation, after which sentencing was delayed one year. He was placed on five years' probation after a December, 1974 conviction for obtaining money under false pretenses with intent to defraud over \$100.

A motion by James Bedell for vacating of his conviction was determined to be premature. A request for a court transcript was granted.

Bedell was convicted of breaking and entering and then sentenced in December, 1962. He completed his probation in December, 1965.

He claimed in his motion for vacating of his sentence that he was convicted of a felony without the assistance of a lawyer, which the U.S. Supreme Court found in violation of the Constitution in 1963.

DISTRICT COURT

Jan Nickens, 20, of Phillips Road, Kingston, was sentenced Monday by District Judge Richard F. Kerl to attempted setting of false fire alarm.

He was fined \$97 and assessed \$103 court costs payable within 30 days; otherwise he must spend 1 days in jail. He pleaded guilty to the charge July 2.

Nickens was charged with pushing the fire alarm button in Kingston three times in the early morning hours of June 2.

Julius Wright of Cass City who pleaded guilty July 31 to possession of fireworks, was ticketed on the charge July 23 by Cass City police, not arrested, as reported in last week's Chronicle.

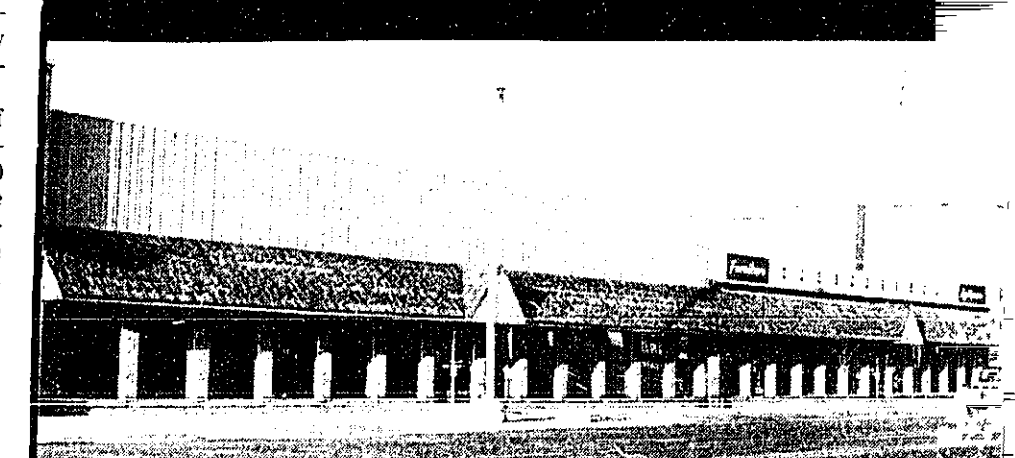

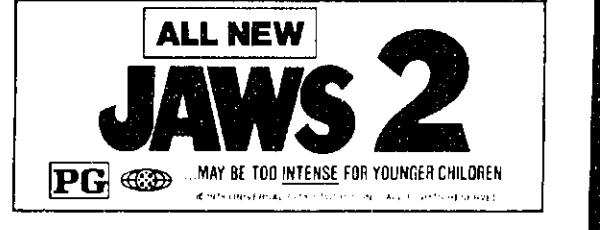

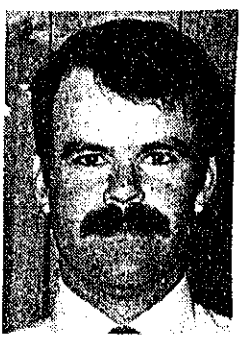

### HEALTH TIPS

## Post-nasal drip is preventable

By Frank Chappell, American Medical Association

Post-nasal drip is a common term for a common condition which annoys many persons.

Quite often its effects are encountered during the night or early in the morning. A sleeper moves and changes position, coughs, and spits up mucus.

Some of the causes of post-nasal drip are allergic reactions, irritants in the air, smoking, changes in barometric pressure, chemical or physical damage to the membranes, gross deformities of the airways, and individual responses to such conditions as climate, altitude and humidity. Post-nasal drip often is closely related to sinusitis, the American Medical Association points out.

At the root of the problem are abnormal secretions in the upper throat, the nasopharynx. One of the functions of the nasopharynx is to warm and moisten air drawn into the lungs through the nose and to catch dust and bacteria on its moist surfaces.

To maintain moisture, the nasal passageways normal-

## County follows state in balloting for state posts

As the state goes, so goes the Thumb -- or vice-versa. Candidates for statewide races who received the most votes in the Thumb were also the state winners.

Winner of the state Democratic primary for governor was Democratic State Sen. William B. Fitzgerald of Detroit.

The big winner, of course, in the Republican Thumb was incumbent Gov. William G. Milliken, who was unopposed for the Republican nomination. He received 2,823 votes in Tuscola county, 4,552 in Huron, and 5,121 in Sanilac.

In Tuscola county, Fitzgerald received 904 votes; Zolton Ferency, 381; Patrick McCollough, 333, and William R. Ralls, 304. Totals in Huron county were Fitzgerald, 641; McCollough, 410; Ferency, 271, and Ralls, 197.

Incumbent U.S. Senator Robert P. Griffin was the easy winner in the state and Thumb for renomination over Republican challenger L. Brooks Patterson, the Oakland county prosecutor. In Tuscola county, Griffin won 2,294 votes to 395 for Patterson; Huron county, 3,961-1,086, and Sanilac, 4,022-1,677.

Griffin will face former Detroit City Council President Carl Levin, the Democratic primary winner, Nov. 7.

Votes for Democratic senatorial candidates in Tuscola county were: Levin, 618; Phil Power (who also finished second in the state), 444; Richard F. Vander Veen, 292; John F. Otterbacher, 164; Paul A. Rosenbaum, 147, and Anthony Derezinski, 97.

In Huron county: Levin, 429; Power, 312; Vander Veen, 202; Derezinski, 159; Rosenbaum, 110, and Otterbacher, 80.

In Sanilac county: Levin, 520; Power, 223; Vander Veen, 216; Derezinski, 133; Rosenbaum, 93, and Otterbacher, 64.

U.S. Rep. Bob Traxler, D-Bay City, was unopposed for his party's nomination. He received 1,502 votes in Tuscola county, 1,231 in Huron, and 929 in Sanilac. His Republican opponent Nov. 7 will be Norman R. Hughes of Metamora, also unopposed. He received 1,405 votes in Tuscola, 2,550 in Huron, and 3,694 in Sanilac.

The district also includes all or part of four other counties.

In the party qualification section of the ballot, the U.S. Labor Party received two votes in Tuscola county and the Social Workers Party received one.

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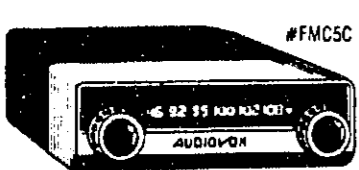

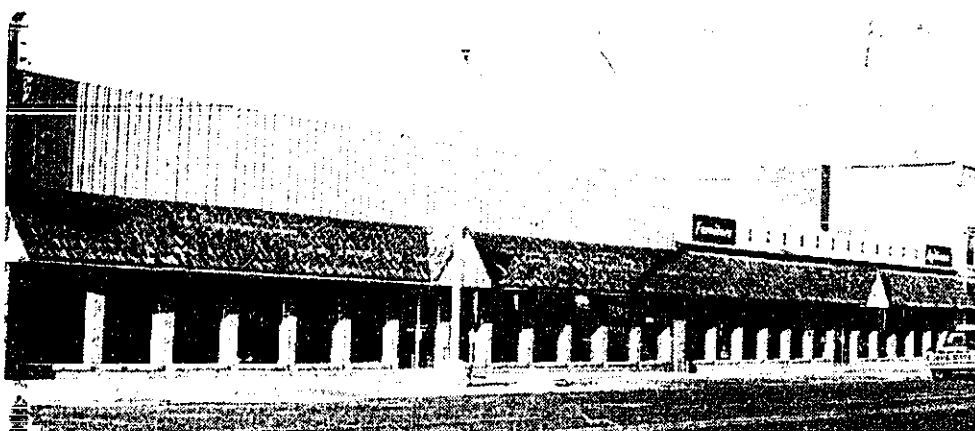
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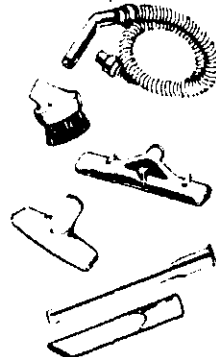
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# Koepfgen says Philippine 'don't rush' style is the way to enjoy life

After spending a year in the Philippines, Don Koepfgen would like to go back and is even entertaining the idea of living there.

In the meantime, he has adopted the Filipino life-style — "If we don't do it today, we can do it tomorrow. There's no problem." "It doesn't do any good to rush through your life and not enjoy anything," he explained.

That attitude doesn't mean the Filipino people are lazy, he points out. "They do work very, very hard. It's just an attitude of

'Why kill yourself over something you can do tomorrow?'"

Now that the participant in the Rotary Club exchange program is back, he isn't taking it easy. He's working this summer at Erla's and this fall will be attending Northwestern Michigan College in Traverse City for pilot training. After finishing the two-year program, he hopes to be either a bush pilot or flying instructor.

Don, 18, is the son of Mrs. Ken Maharg of 5206 Koepfgen Road. He spent what otherwise would have been his senior year at Cass City

High School in the Philippines, leaving for there last July and returning about a month ago.

He had met Dr. Efrén M. Dizon and his wife, Dr. Perla A. Espino, local physicians, who are from the Philippines, and was impressed with their friendliness.

Their influence was one reason for his wanting to go there. Another was the opportunity to learn about a different culture.

KOEPFGEN SPENT THE year in Bacolod City, a city of about 300,000 on the island of Negros Occidental. Except for 1 1/2 months, the

Cass Cityan lived with a plantation owner and his wife and family. The couple had three sons and two daughters, with one of the daughters spending the year in Pennsylvania as an exchange student.

The family lived in a modern house in the city; the 700-acre plantation was located outside of town. That is a good-sized farm by Filipino standards, Koepfgen explained, "because they do everything by hand." The main crops in the country are sugar cane and rice.

"After about the first week, I felt very much at home. After the first two weeks, I could joke with everybody." We all got along very, very well."

In about the middle of his stay, Don lived with a hotel owner and his family for about 1 1/2 months.

He started his education there by attending high school, but after about a month, decided he could learn more about the country by attending college. Transferring wasn't difficult — the Catholic institution he attended had all the way from kindergarten through college graduate school on the same campus.

He studied agriculture the first semester — (animal husbandry, agronomy and biology) and humanities (political science, social structures, marriage, and family planning) the second.

Even out in the rural areas, according to Koepfgen, most Filipinos graduate from high school.

He found the population very literate and very interested in current events.

For instance, he once met a man living on top of a mountain. "This guy asked me what I thought of President Carter and I didn't expect it."

THE NATIONAL LANGUAGE of the Philippines Tagalog, but dating back when the country was colony of the United States English is at least as common. Only in the mountains is it rare to find English being spoken.

Koepfgen learned one of the approximately 80 Tagalog dialects, which took him about 7-8 months. Even the because English is so wide spoken, he didn't become completely fluent. He found he could understand a conversation in the dialect better than he could speak it.

In addition to the language, Koepfgen also had learned to get used to the food and the weather.

Except during the rainy season, when temperatures were around 80 degrees, usually was 85-95 every day and very humid. Koepfgen said it was possible to become used to the climate function normally and not become lethargic.

Food consisted of steamed rice, lots of fish, and also some meat and vegetable. "I loved the fish," the Cass Cityan said. Fish there are cooked on coals without being cleaned beforehand. Clams are eaten as an appetizer, like Americans would eat potato chips.

Koepfgen had an opportunity while there for extensive traveling throughout the Philippines, by car, plane, boat, jeepney, and four-wheel-drive vehicle and described all the people he met as friendly.

His feelings about the country after living there are best expressed by the fact that he would like to go back there to stay, although that goal is by no means certain at this point. "I love to go back there and live because I love the Philippines very much," he said.

The Tuscola County Road Commission has agreed to request bids for work on two miles of Severance Road, the Novesta Township Board was informed Monday evening.

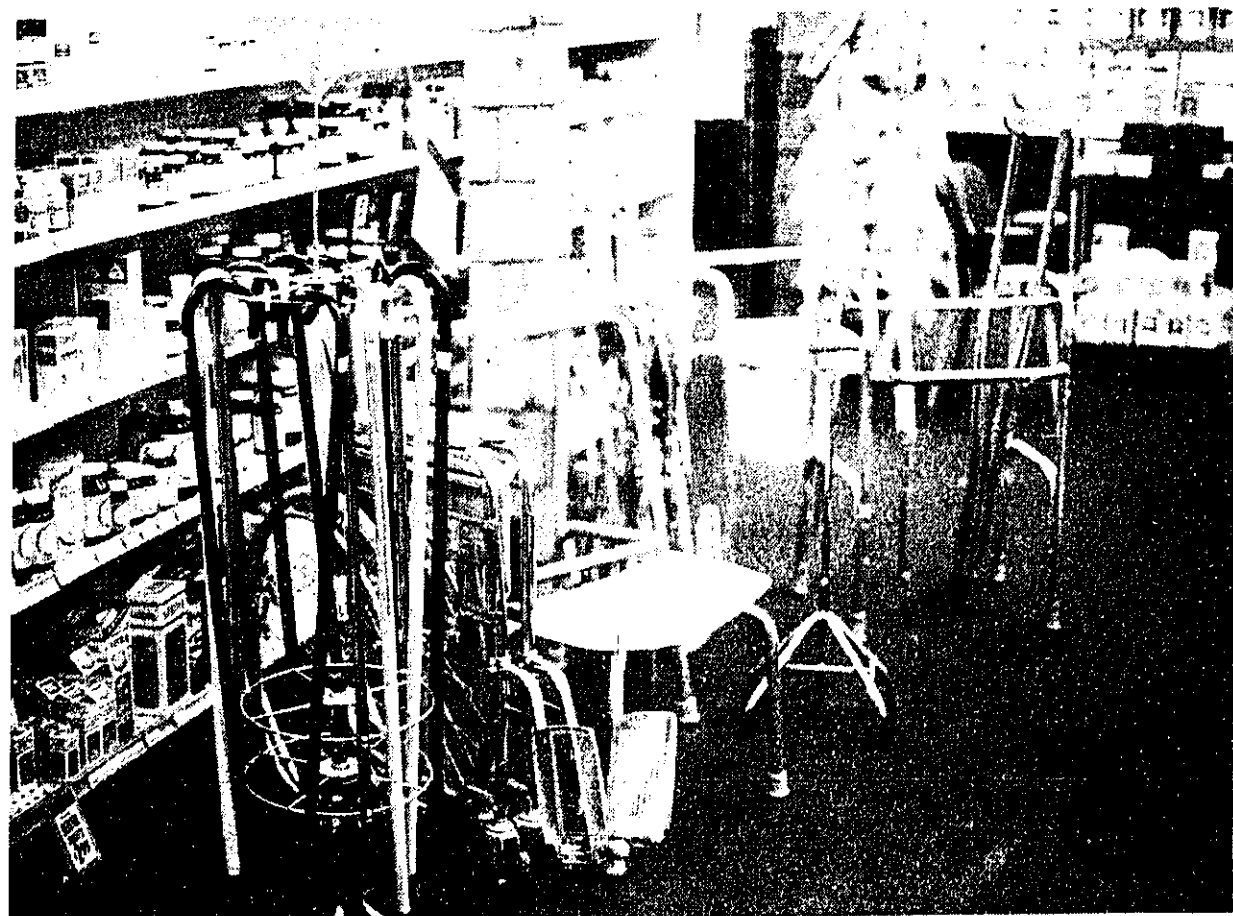

# Livestock brings top prices at annual Tuscola fair sale

Inflation may or may not have been a factor, but prices paid for most of the champion animals last Thursday at the 4-H and Future Farmers of America livestock auction sale at the Tuscola County Fair were up substantially over the 1977 sale.

In two instances this year, the reserve champions sold for more than the grand champions. That is somewhat unusual, presumably being examples of buyers wanting specific animals, possibly out of friendship with the owner or owner's parents.

The grand champion steer of Bob Leslie sold for \$1 a pound to the Production Credit Association and Federal Land Bank Association in Caro. The Charolais weighed 1,244 pounds. The 1977 grand champion sold for 90 cents a pound.

Bob, 15, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Leslie of Leslie Road, Decker, and is a Cass City FFA member. He was also the senior showmanship champion in beef.

The reserve champion 1,160-pound Simmental of Janelle Daily sold for \$1.25 per pound to the Mayville State Bank.

Janelle, 13, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Daily of M-46, Mayville. A member of the May-King 4-H Club, this was only the second year she has entered a steer at the fair.

Other top beef animals and the price they sold for were Gale Jackson, Hemliners 4-H Club of Caro, champion Holstein, 60 cents a pound to Joe Muz of Caro; Jason Hecht, Richville 4-H Livestock Club, junior showmanship winner, 82 cents a pound to Northeastern Paints of Saginaw, and John Gallagher, Cass City FFA, first place lightweight, 71 cents a pound to Enos Farm Supply of Cass City.

The market price for beef the day of the auction was 53 1/2 cents per pound.

**MARKET LAMBS**

In his final year of eligibility, Cass City FFA mem-

ber Dean Severance, 38, swept the top honors with both the grand champion individual and grand champion pen of market lambs.

The grand champion, 110 pounds, sold for \$3.60 per pound to Gettel Motors of Sebawaing. Dean had the grand champion last year, which sold for \$3 per pound, also to Gettel's.

Dean's grand champion pen, weighing 105 and 121 pounds, was purchased by Toy Chest Distributors of Mayville for \$1.25 a pound, below the \$1.70 paid last year.

Dean is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Severance of 6331 Severance Road, Decker. A June graduate of Cass City High School, he will be attending Eastern Michigan University this fall.

Kristi Garner of the Vassar Trail Blazers 4-H Club had the grand champion pen last year. This year she had the reserve champion individual, which sold for \$2.55 for each of its 137 pounds to Wickes Big Acres of Caro. The 1977 reserve champion sold for \$2 a pound.

Dean's brother, Randy, 15, had the reserve champion pen. The Pinney State Bank and Colony House, both of Cass City, each bought one of the animals for \$1.35 a pound. One weighed 121 pounds; the other, 95. Another Severance brother, Tim, had the reserve champion pen last year, which sold for \$1 a pound.

The market price for lambs last Thursday was 57 cents a pound.

**SWINE**

Mark Palmreuter of the Richville 4-H Livestock Club had the grand champion hog, 235 pounds, purchased by the Mayville State Bank for \$3.05 a pound. The 1977 grand champion sold for \$2.85.

The reserve champion hog of Scott Trump of the same club sold for \$3 a pound, also to the Mayville bank. The animal weighed 227 pounds. Scott was also the senior showmanship champion in market swine. Last year's reserve champion sold for \$1.70 a pound.

Aaron Graham of the Dayton Clover 4-H Club had the grand champion pen. The 235-pounder sold for \$2 a pound to Wayne Feed Supplies of Mayville; the 233-pounder to Mayville State Bank for \$1.90. The grand champion pen in 1977 sold for \$2.10 and \$2.40 a pound.

**Energy supply going rapidly**

**Shower of meteors early Saturday**

Close encounters of the meteoric kind can be seen by amateur skywatchers the night of Friday, Aug. 11.

Michigan State University astronomer Robert Victor says that is one of the best nights of the year to see meteors.

Victor says that up to 60 meteors per hour may be seen in a period two to four hours before sunrise (early Saturday morning, Aug. 12).

Although the meteors may be seen anywhere in the sky, the particles will originate from the direction of the constellation, Perseus, in the northeast sky, explains Victor.

Meteors are small pieces of matter which become visible when they enter the earth's atmosphere.

### Commissioners meet

## Magistrate Maki rehired

The new Tuscola county magistrate is - the old Tuscola county magistrate. The county Board of Commissioners voted unanimously Tuesday to reappoint Joan Maki to the \$11,200 a year position.

She had resigned from the position effective July 1 to join her husband, Leo Maki, a former Caro attorney now serving as attorney for a banking firm in Hancock.

Filling the vacancy led to a row between District Judge Richard F. Kern, who selects the candidate, and the county board, which must approve his recommendation.

By a 5-2 vote July 18, the board rejected Kern's nominee for the position, feeling she was unqualified.

That meant Kern had to readvertise for applicants and among the applicants the second time was Joan Maki.

The judge recommended her to the board, which approved her appointment Tuesday morning. She was sworn into office immediately thereafter.

tracting with the village to provide a deputy there full-time.

The village would pay the county \$14,784 annually for the officer's salary and fringe benefits and also provide a patrol car.

According to board Chairman Maynard McConkey, some doubts were expressed about the proposal, with some commissioners feeling the amount of money proposed wouldn't pay all expenses. It was also pointed out that the county's contract with the Fraternal Order of Police requires two officers in a patrol car at night, which is the main time police protection is needed in Kingston.

The request was referred to the departmental control committee for study and a recommendation to the full board.

#### MOORE DRAIN

The board having heard recently from the Moore Drain Coalition, opponents of the controversial Vassar area project, it was time Tuesday to hear from the proponents.

Vassar City Manager Dan Elliott, three city council members and a local businessman asked the board to reconsider its decision not to extend the county's full faith

and credit behind sale of bonds to finance the more than \$2.2 million project.

In July, the board voted 5-2 against backing the bonds.

No action was taken this time. McConkey said the board probably won't vote again on the proposal until after legal action by opponents in probate court and circuit court in an attempt to stop the project is resolved.

#### AKRON-FAIRGROVE

On the recommendation of the county Department of Public Works, the board approved putting the county's faith and credit behind sale of \$1,040,000 in bonds to finance the local share for construction of the Akron-Fairgrove sewage treatment system.

A federal grant will provide \$1,353,000 for the project and the state will pay about \$90,000.

Construction should start in the spring.

Extending the county's faith and credit means that if the local users of the sewage treatment system are ever unable to pay off the bonds, county taxpayers are liable. That allows the

bonds to be sold at a lower interest rate. It isn't expected that county taxpayers will ever have to help pay for the project.

#### TRANSIT STUDY

Commissioners declined to take action on a request from Ted Hull of Caro Area Services for the Handicapped and some others that the county participate in a public transportation study.

State and federal funds would pay the \$25,000 cost. The study of the possibility of providing public transportation would include Sanilac and Huron counties.

Lack of action by the board, McConkey explained, was equivalent to a "no" vote, although conceivably the state could conduct the study here without the county's permission.

He said commissioners feel if public transportation, probably dial-a-ride service, were provided here, it would require a costly subsidy by the county.

The state previously started such a study here, but apparently due to lack of funds, it was never completed.

The only traveling Mrs. Martin has done in the last several years is to Wisconsin, the Upper Peninsula, and the northern lower peninsula.







If she did have the time to travel, she would like to go
