INTRODUCTORY.

This, the Twelfth Biennial Report of the Historical Department of Iowa, presents the detailed business of the two years ended June 30, 1914.

The founder of the work, Charles Aldrich, laid down the policy of collecting and preserving the materials from which may adequately be studied all the essential features of the development of our commonwealth; of cooperating with all other Iowa persons and institutions in the promotion of intelligence concerning, and love for, Iowa history and biography; of conserving all the scenes and sites of historic and landscape worth and of recognizing and noting the attainment of Iowa men and women in all the lines of useful endeavor. These purposes have been all and singularly furthered to the extent of our capacity during the biennium.

THE ANNALS OF IOWA.

The Third Series is in its twenty-second year; it is an eighty-page quarterly devoted primarily to the publication of original materials upon Iowa and western history and biography. It is a medium of information concerning the Department and its activities, forms an exchange for publications and materials, and goes cost-free to all Iowa libraries that desire it for permanent preservation, and to those who contribute to its columns, or to other divisions of our work. Its contents, like most of the other valuable acquisitions of the Historical Department, are given to the public without compensation to the contributors. An index covering the era of the founder's work which ended March 8, 1908, and to the close of volume VIII, was issued, and a cumulative index hereafter is part of our plan. MAP COLLECTION.

Our valuable collection of maps has for the first time become fully available through a scheme devised by the Curator, whereby each map, mounted, is indexed by library method, and bound in loose-leaf form in its appropriate binder. By a series of frames of a size and mat approximating the sizes of the loose-leaf mounts, any map or series of maps may be exhibited on the wall for special or ordinary occasions.

LIBRARY.

The library of the Historical Department of Iowa is especially strong in books and pamphlets on western history, slavery, war of the rebellion, the American Indian, genealogy, county and other local history and early maps. While additions are being made on all of these lines, special attention is paid to the genealogical department. In this class our collections contain all or the best that is to be found in the greatest genealogical libraries in the United States.

We have 552 general works of genealogy, 889 separate family histories, 432 books of vital statistics, 28 books on names and 70 on heraldry and allied subjects.

Closely allied to genealogy are the town and county histories of the eastern, southern and middle states. Of local history we have 128 of Maine, 143 of New Hampshire, 71 of Vermont, 428 of Massachusetts, 334 of New York, 361 of Pennsylvania, 157 of Virginia and considerable numbers of the other eastern and southern states. Besides the books there are pamphlets and other material.

Every scrap of Revolutionary history is today almost worth its weight in gold. Realizing that what has come true with reference to the history of that war and period will inevitably be true concerning the Civil war, this department has set about collecting Civil war data and has paid especial attention to regimental histories. We have 47 such histories of Iowa, 15 of Indiana, 25 of Illinois, 48 of Massachusetts, 53 of Michigan and other states in proportion.

IOWA AUTHORS.

Attainment in literature and in other of the arts by Iowa people or by others under Iowa influence has been by us held equal in importance with military prowess or political achievement. On this account we began long since the acquisition of books by Iowa authors. During the past two years we have steadily increased the collections through some buying and much gifting, and with the acquisition of some 516 items from Hon. Henry Stivers of Osceola, Iowa, now have the most extensive group of materials on this subject of which we know. We propose a vigorous campaign in the immediate future not only for books by Iowa authors, but for autograph data by each writer upon his

own life and work. Thus we hope to present in time a general list of Iowa authors and their work, followed by a chronological list.

NEWSPAPER DIVISION.

Files of at least two papers from each county are to be found on our shelves dating from the establishment of the Department in 1892. Many valuable earlier files have been acquired from time to time, and it is hoped that many more will find their way here. These papers are substantially bound and carefully catalogued. A card index of the leading articles in the daily and weekly papers along the lines of Iowa history and biography, prominent events of state importance, and notable addresses by Iowa men, is kept. The indexing of these Iowa newspapers could be extended with great profit. A comprehensive index should be made of all early Iowa papers, and of at least one file from the beginning. No question of importance in any year or in any section of the State has escaped record and discussion here. These records and discussions are consulted daily by editorial writers and statisticians. Not infrequently lawyers and litigants search the official publication columns for published notices, ordinances and articles of incorporation.

Many papers from outside the State have been regularly subscribed for, received and bound, but it is our intention to limit this class to a very few in future, devoting the space and resources hitherto allotted to them to bringing up more completely the collections of Iowa publications. All out-of-Iowa papers not exchanging for our publications, unless one or two each from Washington, D. C., New York, Boston, Chicago, St. Louis, St. Paul, San Francisco and Los Angeles, will give place to trade papers, special publications and country weeklies that have multiplied in such numbers since the collections began twenty years ago, and to such technical journals as are indispensable to the specialists on our staff.

Leading in interest in the collection is the Dubuque *Iowa Visitor*, the first paper published in what is now Iowa, printed at the Dubuque Lead Mines, Wisconsin Territory, May 1, 1836-May, 1837. The next year it was issued under the name of the *Iowa News*. This was the fore-runner of the *Miners' Express*, of which we have a file beginning September, 1847, and continuing under various titles and various combinations of publication until it became the *Telegraph-*

Herald of today. From Burlington we have the *Iowa Territorial Gazette & Advertiser* a partial file, 1840-1843, and of the *Hawk-Eye* from 1842 to date; from Bloomington, now Muscatine, the *Bloomington and Iowa City Standard* in 1840-1841, the *Herald*, 1840-49, *Iowa Democratic Inquirer*, 1848-1860, and *Journal*, 1849 to date; from Davenport, the *Iowa Sun and Davenport & Rock Island News*, 1838-1841, *Iowa Democratic Banner*, 1852-1853; from Keokuk, the *Dispatch*, 1848-1849, 1854-1855, the *Des Moines Valley Whig* and *Gate City* from 1851 to date; from Des Moines, the *Iowa Star*, 1849-1854, *Campaign State Journal*, 1859, *Iowa State Journal*, 1860-1861, the *Iowa State Register*, 1860 to date.

Most of the newspapers are gifts to the Department, and many bear labels which perpetuate the names of donors or pioneer editors. The *McGregor North Iowa Times*, 1856-1882, was rescued from a junk dealer. Others came from attics and storage rooms. Files of which we hear often never reach us but are destroyed "to get them out of the way."

Chief among the earlier agricultural papers is a partial file of the *Country Gentleman* from 1853-1899, the *Iowa Farmer & Horticulturist*, 1853-1857, *Chicago Prairie Farmer*, partial file from 1843-1882, *Genesee Farmer & Gardener's Journal*, 1841, *Boston Scientific Farmer*, 1877-1878, *St. Louis Journal of Agriculture*, 1868-1870, and others from various sections of the country. Of the later agricultural papers we have the *Iowa Homestead*, beginning in 1862, the *Successful Farming*, *Wallaces' Farmer*, and *Kimball's Dairy Farmer*.

Our collection of miscellaneous volumes in the first years of the Nineteenth century embraces numbers of the *Philadelphia Franklin Gazette*, 1818-1819, *Boston Weekly Messenger*, 1820-1821, *Washington, D. C. National Intelligencer*, 1808-1811, 1822-1855, *Albany & New York Log Cabin*, 1840, edited by Horace Greeley, *Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper*, 1858-1865, 1874-1878, *Washington U. S. Telegraph*, 1832, *Baltimore Spirit of Democracy*, 1840, *Holyoke Freeman*, 1853, *Philadelphia Public Ledger*, 1839-1840, *North American*, 1853-1859, *Garrison's Liberator*, 1851-1865, *New York Herald* from 1848, *New York Tribune* from 1857 and *Chicago Tribune* from 1878 to date.

Our so-called "Single Newspaper Collection" contains rare single issues of non-Iowa papers of late Eighteenth or early Nineteenth centuries. Of papers issued by Northern soldiers on Southern presses in captured towns during the Civil war, we have *Our*

Whole Union, printed by First Iowa Regiment, June 15, 1861, at Macon, Mo., and *Union Democrat* printed by Third Iowa Cavalry, at Kirksville, Mo., August 23, 1861.

Among the specially interesting recent acquisitions may be noted the Albany, N. Y.—*Jeffersonian*, v. 1, 1838-1839, Horace Greeley, editor; Boston *Telegraph*, 1824; Des Moines—*New Broom*, 1869-1871; Des Moines—*Successful Farming*, 1902-1912; New York—*American Agriculturist*, 5 vol.; New York—*Atlas*, 1830-1833; New York *Log Cabin*, Jan. 23, 1841; Sigourney—*Life in the West*, 1856-1858; Washington, D. C.—*National Intelligencer*, 1808-January, 1810; January-September, 1811.

Every volume of the collection of over 8,000 is rendered immediately available by our card catalogue. Our chronological list shows the seeker at a glance what material may be obtained for any given period. Indexes for the *Dubuque Visitor* and *Iowa Sun* were prepared in the first days of the Department work. Many of the agricultural papers have printed indexes; the New York *Tribune* has an index from 1876-1906; the New York *Times* for 1865; while the New York Times Index, begun in 1913, is a key to national news of today. We currently index Iowa history and biography. The Library of Congress "Check List of American Eighteenth Century Newspapers," Rockingham's "Reminiscences," Hudson's "History of Journalism," Fulton's sketches of early Iowa papers, and catalogues and bibliographies of newspapers of other states, together with the current Newspaper Directory, give to the seeker a complete history of newspapers in the United States.

Our newspaper rooms are equipped with the best modern steel stack and shelving system and convenient reading tables.

The growth during the past biennium has been rather by exchange than by special donation. The accessions number 1018, making the total number of bound volumes 8030.

MUSEUM DIVISION.

While this term may technically include the art, autograph, manuscript and some other collections, we restrict it to the objects illustrating natural and political history, prehistoric and recent. Objects acquired bear authentic history and tend to demonstrate some fact or process in the development of life in Iowa and the West or some enterprise in which Iowa or its citizens have been directly interested. No abnormalities nor freaks are received.

Every object is placed where it may be easily seen and to it is attached a label exactly setting forth its identity and history. Thus an object, or a series, is a lesson silently, persistently impressing itself upon the mind of the visitor, regardless of his degree of intelligence. The educational influence on the thousands who annually visit the collections must be incalculable. Claim is laid to the best modern methods of administration.

Acquisitions continue to be made of the most valuable character. They come almost entirely by free gift of the people. With objects most desired often come some of less importance which we might dispose of by way of exchange had we authority so to do. The receipt of loan items is not encouraged except to fill gaps in series or where there is some equivalent consideration. Limited case room and the expense of labels weigh against acceptance of objects which are not to become the absolute property of the State.

The groups of buffalo, elk and moose referred to in our last report have been provided with exhibition cases of exceptional merit, and the room where they will be placed will be excelled in museum interest and scientific value by no natural history museum in the Mississippi Valley.

A suggestion made in our last report should be here repeated:

The vast problem of conservation of the game birds and animals of Iowa and the creation by gun licenses of a great fund in the hands of the state game warden occasioned the suggestion on the part of the Curator that the problem of his co-ordinate might be to some extent simplified by the institution of a system of museum and other education mutually prosecuted by the two departments. Thus with a comparatively small sum the warden might provide as a part of the collection of our Natural History Museum, such mounted specimens of fish and game and their enemies, together with representations of their habitats, as would materially enlighten the thousands of our visitors, while appropriate circulars, lectures and other literary channels might be pursued in common that are now disregarded.

DEATH MASKS.

In the effort to have at hand all possible aids to the study by artists as well as writers of eminent Iowa persons, we last year reported the acquisition of a death mask of Gen. James B. Weaver. During the past biennium we have received that of Hon. George G. Wright, who died January 11, 1896.

MONUMENTS AND MARKERS.

One of the most useful offices we have performed during the past two years has been the stimulation of the marking of historic sites.

One of the greatest of our needs is a fund whereby we can join local interests in the different parts of Iowa, in suitably providing monuments and markers. Our eleventh report in this regard should be repeated:

Every year the witnesses to events and owners of sites appeal to us to aid in permanently and officially noting them. Delay occasions loss of proofs and produces confusion in traditions. Sites are being seized upon for exploitation by commercial interests and are being indicated by inappropriate materials and inartistic designs. The rapid change of character and of origin of inhabitants by removals and death of Iowa pioneers, and immigration of and purchase by the thriftiest citizens of the eastern states and from Europe, interrupts the stream of tradition flowing from our early days. To check the loss, indeed to re-establish and stimulate sentiment, a system of "Marking of historic sites" is in course of development. From lack of public funds, the Curator resorts to gifts and private co-operation solely and through this means has plans for indicating by suitable markers all early Iowa trails, all treaty boundary lines, all prehistoric and Indian village sites, all treaty places and authorized trading posts, and every noted point of scenic or historic interest to Iowa citizens of the Civil war and earlier periods. Co-operation with local persons is proposed and all the advantages of our institution tendered. At present plans are perfected for marking the Mormon trail in conjunction with the Iowa Society Daughters of the American Revolution, to whom the Department suggested the scheme and furnished the historical reasons. The "Red Rock" of the "White Breast Treaty" line of 1842 has been re-located by the Curator and its indication at points crossed by railroads and main-traveled highways awaits only the interest of local influences. This line is about the meridian of Knoxville, Iowa, takes its name from the "Painted" or Red Rock on the Des Moines river near the town of Red Rock, and the materials formerly quarried there are tendered the Department cost-free for use.

ALLISON MEMORIAL.

As previously reported the Curator of the Historical Department of Iowa is made by statute a member of the Allison Memorial Commission. Forty thousand dollars is subscribed by over a thousand Iowa persons in the State and elsewhere for the provision of a work to symbolize the great life of Senator William B. Allison. To this is to be added a fund of ten thousand dollars from the State Treasury to be expended upon the erection of a pedestal "upon the capitol grounds or any extension thereof."

On organizing the commission, Gen. Grenville M. Dodge was made president and the Curator, secretary, whereupon the Board of Trustees authorized the Curator to participate fully, and tendered the advantages of the institution to the Commission as an exchange of courtesies to a co-ordinate State activity in com-

memorative work. A program was issued by the Commission in May, 1912, calling for models, and data was assembled upon the technical sculptural as well as landscape phases of the Commission's responsibility. The National Sculpture Society was asked for expert assistance and assigned Mr. Charles Grafly as sculptural, and Mr. E. L. Masqueray as architectural experts. The award was made in October, 1912, and contract for the erection of the memorial in 1916 made with Miss Evelyn B. Longman of New York City. A part of the official duty of the Commission and expert assistants, was the selection of an appropriate site which was chosen outside the capitol ground or any extension thereof, but chosen with regard for the enhancement of the landscape values of the capitol grounds as well as for the Allison monument itself. A Commission procured Mr. Masqueray to prepare a plan of the present grounds and environs, especially indicating the proposed placement of the Allison monument. This plan, and considerations for its adoption in the interest of the Allison memorial, was submitted by the Curator-secretary at the request of the Governor and chairman of the Commission and committees of the Senate and House of the Thirty-fifth General Assembly, and the same was adopted and incorporated in the statute for extending and completing the capitol grounds. A full report of this plan and considerations for its adoption was published in the ANNALS for July-October, 1913.

IN COMMEMORATION OF CHARLES ALDRICH.

It is proper here to renew the request that the unselfish, patriotic and invaluable services of Charles Aldrich to the State of Iowa should be conspicuously and indelibly commemorated by some suitable sculpture, or inscription on the Historical building.

CLEANLINESS AND SAFETY.

No part of our service has shown more improvement during the biennium than the housekeeping phase. The Thirty-fifth General Assembly made all employes in this service within the Historical building, directly responsible to the Curator. On request of the State Librarian two of the men, old employes of his, were assigned to the apartments of the General Reference Library and to the Library Commission, to take orders directly from the State Librarian. The remaining number were denominated guards and while assigned to specific tasks are so organized as to rotate in their duties in case of sickness, vacations and proper absence. As before

reported, Union soldiers in the Civil war are preferred, not only because of a statute providing therefor, but because a man of age who has remained a user of edged tools and a constant bread winner, free from injurious habits, is possessed of good eyesight and dexterity attained by few men not continuously working with delicate implements even if of much less age. But vacations and occurrence of ill health always entails added labor somewhere, and such added labor should be performed by other men as extras. As the youngest employe under the soldiers' preference law will be at least 72 when the Thirty-seventh General Assembly convenes, a class of housekeeping employe denominated porters should be established and three additional employes engaged for the apartments of the Historical Department, admitting of the present soldiers doing only guard and guide duties. Brave and faithful men should be retained in service, but they should not be responsible for night watching, floor scrubbing nor the manipulation of electrical elevators.

INCREASED COMPENSATION.

A general fault in us and in similar institutions is the meagerness of compensation of officials and employes. One in responsible management can exercise little judgment in directing or in changing incumbencies without the zeal on the part of subordinates to retain and on the part of other competent persons to secure employment. Salaries should be above rather than precisely at the point or below the actual worth of an incumbent, then the management should allow compensation not to exceed that actually earned. To this end a general and radical increase of compensation of Historical Department employes is recommended.

THE ARCHIVES DIVISION.

The Thirty-fifth General Assembly assigned to the Curator an assistant denominated an index clerk for the Archives Department. By law the accumulations in the various state offices may, after ten years, be sent to the Historical building and there as the Hall of Public Archives and under the authority of the Executive Council they are "arranged, classified, labeled, filed and calendared," and then become part of the collections of the Historical Department.

By the courtesy of Mr. C. C. Stiles, employed by the Executive Council as Superintendent of the Public Archives, I am enabled to present the results of the labors of the Executive Council.¹

By my direction there has been prepared by Miss Ethel B. Virtue a detailed report of her work as chief of the Division of Archives to which she was appointed by and with the consent of the Board of Trustees of our Department.

Briefly, Miss Virtue shows that no standard exists for indexing archives deposits in either our own or foreign general governments, or states. She assembled and digested all information extant upon the subject and evolved our system of Class Lists of all documents. The lists give dates, titles and other necessary information as to each document under the classes established by the Executive Council. Of these lists an index was devised and adopted after conference with all officials concerned, and a form-card produced for each volume or box of manuscripts. From the best points of the index cards of the various library systems and of national and state government depots of archives, she prepared our card, to-wit: a card 4x6 inches, simply ruled in spaces for dates, titles, notation and cross references. Upon this card was begun the index, or, to use the term common for this special form of index, the inventory. Our index or inventory is now complete for the boxes and volumes for our archives repositories thus far finished by Mr. Stiles and his staff, namely for the offices of Governor, Secretary of State and Auditor of State. A detailed index, that is of the contents of the boxes and volumes, which resembles a calendar in form, has been made of all Territorial Legislative assemblies filed in the office of Secretary of State—after they have been identified by reference to original journals. While this has been a laborious and slow process, it has for the first time in Iowa history offered the public the opportunity of ascertaining quickly and precisely the information heretofore locked up in the chaos of confusion.

In order to disclose the use and value of the administration of this division, the Curator recently directed that all applications by the public or officials for the use of documents be evidenced in writing, with the name, address and business of applicant, date and purpose of investigation, character or name of document sought and result of the search.

APPENDIX

REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF CLASSIFICATION AND ARRANGEMENT
OF PUBLIC ARCHIVES OF IOWA.

Halt of Public Archives....., 1914.

To George W. Clarke, Governor, W. S. Allen, Secretary of State, John L. Bleakly, Auditor of State, and W. C. Brown, Treasurer of State, Executive Council of Iowa.

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit to you this report of the progress and state of that part of the work of the public archives of Iowa, which pertains to the work of classification, cleansing, calendaring and filing.

No formal or printed report has been made since May 11, 1907. The report at that time was made by Prof. Benjamin F. Shambaugh, who had charge of the preliminary work under the board of trustees of the State Library and Historical Department. Chapter 157 of the Acts of the Thirty-second General Assembly, transferred the supervision of the work, placing it under the Executive Council, since which time the law governing it has not been changed.

Prof. Benjamin F. Shambaugh of the State University, who had direct charge of the preliminary work, made a thorough investigation of the subject of public archives and in his report of September 18, 1906, page 35, said: "Thus far nothing deserving the name of a comprehensive system of classifying and cataloging State archives has been devised anywhere in the United States. As leading up to a proper system of classification, attention is directed to the following general outlines."

The object to be attained in the general outlines as above mentioned, is the combination of a historical and administrative classification.

Since the transferring of the work to the Executive Council the work, first under A. H. Davison, with John H. Kelley in direct charge, and later by the writer, has been carried on with the intention of following as nearly as possible the recommendations of Professor Shambaugh.

All authorities on the subject of public archives agree that the problem of classification is the most difficult to overcome and that no library, subject, chronological or alphabetical system used separately can be made practical.

The system which we have applied to the work here and finally worked out in detail has been found by actual experience to be very satisfactory from both administrative and historical points of view. The system used is, or might be termed, a combination of the subject, chronological and alphabetical systems—in the order named, and briefly stated is as follows:

- 1st. The classification is made by departments.
- 2d. Each department is divided into main subjects or divisions.
- 3d. Main subjects or divisions are subdivided until the lowest subdivisions or subjects are reached.
- 4th. The documents under subdivisions or subjects are arranged in chronological order.
- 5th. The documents under the subdivisions are then, for each year, arranged in alphabetical order.

Several shorter systems are in use, which require far less labor, but which cannot be as efficient because they stop short of the detail work and the investigator is left to search for the individual document. The system used here has received favorable mention from persons who were investigating the subject of public archives and also in several reports made on the subject.

The problem of cleansing and filing the documents was solved by your present Secretary, A. H. Davison, and is as follows: The documents, after the classification has been made, are unfolded, cleaned with a damp sponge, pressed and dried between blotters, placed in tag board folders in cloth bound boxes. These are placed in specially constructed steel cases. The system is very satisfactory, has been adopted in other places and has been commented on favorably by persons making an investigation of the subject.

The progress of the work has been slow but the classification must be worked out in detail for each department and each individual document must be handled on an average of five or six times before being permanently filed. At the beginning of the work a great many mistakes were made which had to be corrected to conform to the classification. At times the appropriation has been inadequate. At one time for a period of a year and a half, only one person was left in charge. We have been greatly hindered by being unable to obtain all the documents from any one department at one time. The officials in charge of a department sometimes decide that certain portions of it should remain, but afterwards release it. Earlier documents belonging to different departments are often scattered and those belonging to one we often find among the documents of other departments. This has caused a constant opening of files, throwing back and shifting. To reduce this trouble we have searched the capitol from basement to garrets, removed to this department all scattered documents and records and thrown them into the departments to which they belong. In spite of all these hindrances and discouragements, the work has gone steadily forward. It has been a stupendous task, the earlier documents being a chaotic mass covered with the dust and dirt of years' storage in hot, unventilated vaults and garrets.

In regard to the work of the present biennial period, in which you are directly interested, I would say: The work has progressed during this period far more rapidly than at any other time, due to more assistance and better organization. Since the adjournment of the last legislature about seven hundred thousand documents have been cleaned and filed. The documents in the office of Governor, dating from 1898 to 1908, and

those in the office of Auditor of State, dating from 1898 to 1911 (and in some divisions to 1913), were transferred to this department, classified, cleansed, labeled and filed. We have removed to this department all the documents and records belonging to the office of Treasurer of State from its establishment to 1904. All these have been classified and are ready to be cleansed, labeled and filed. In addition to the above work we have attended to all the calls for information made to the department.

The finished documents and records now on file and ready to be turned over are now estimated, not by thousands but by hundred of thousands, and in weight by tons. Briefly stated they consist of the following:

Of the office of Secretary of State the work has been completed down to and including the year 1898 and in some divisions to the year 1908. From the land department nothing has been transferred to this department.

Touching the present and immediate future of the work we have a small amount of cleansing and filing to do in the several departments enumerated above, when we will be ready to commence cleansing and filing the documents in the department of Treasurer of State, the classification of which has been completed. I am at a loss to know how to handle the documents from this office. They fall to pieces when an attempt is made to unfold them. This was caused by storage in a small, unventilated vault in which a gas jet burned beneath them for years. We will soon commence the classification of documents and records from the department of Adjutant General, though the greater part of the documents in this department was not transferred by them. The documents retained consist chiefly of the muster rolls and pay rolls of the militia, during the civil war period and immediately following. Being tied in packages and filed in cases with glass doors, thus exposed to dust and light, it would be well to remove them to this department, classify and cleanse and then return them to the department of Adjutant General to be filed according to our system. Some of the earlier documents of this department are in very bad condition.

We have also removed to this department and placed in the storage cases a large amount of the earlier records of the offices of Railroad Commissioners, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Agricultural Department, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Capitol Commissioners (both

old and new), Iowa State Drainage, Conservation and Waterways Commission, Records of Custodian of Public Buildings, etc.

It is imperative to provide for the expansion of the Hall of Public Archives. The rooms assigned for that purpose are filled to their capacity. All filing cases are filled and we are now using storage cases for filing purposes.

A detail report, a manual or guide to the public archives of Iowa is greatly needed and should be published. Nothing of this character has been published since the work was transferred to the Executive Council and as Iowa is one of the pioneers in this kind of work, frequent requests are received for reports on the subject. These requests come from Libraries, National Archives Commission, and from Archives Departments in other States, the last request being from the National Archives Department of Cuba. These requests I have supplied in the past as best I could by sending typewritten synopses, explanatory letters, and copies of the *ANNALS OF IOWA*, which contain articles on the subject of "Public Archives of Iowa."

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Executive Council and your Secretary for the interest, encouragement and support you have given the work. In the beginning, as you are aware, the subject of public archives was not generally understood, hence, unappreciated, and at times the appropriations were totally inadequate. No persons trained for this particular line of work could be secured, because there were none, but through all these discouragements you have always done the best that could be done under the circumstances and have carried the work on until, at the present, you have the satisfaction of knowing that in the work of public archives in the United States, Iowa stands well in the front rank with other states and that the work is rapidly becoming more appreciated.

Each of the former faithful employees should be given full credit for their part in the building up of the department.

I have at all times fully appreciated the great responsibility placed upon me and have endeavored to give to the work all my time and the best thought of which I am capable.
