
Meeting Programs



Botanical Alert!

Researcher at Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México have described a new species of *Weberocereus*.

The new species *Weberocereus alliodorus* is similar to *W. glaber* (Eichlam), the only other *Weberocereus* found in Mexico. *W. alliodorus* is found at two locations in southeastern Oaxaca, Mexico. These locations are on the southern slopes of the Sierra Madre de Sur at altitudes of 3100 feet to 4000 feet.

Weberocereus alliodorus has more spines and slightly larger flowers than *W. glaber*; both species have white, fragrant, nocturnal flowers. What I find interesting is that the edible fruit of *W. alliodorus* has an onion-like smell when ripe.

Although *Weberocereus alliodorus* has a small geographical range, it can be propagated easily by cuttings. If this plant becomes available for hobbyists to grow, it would be an interesting addition to our gardens.

Get Your Facts First

How about some news about name changes? If you were at EpiCon this May,^{*1} you may have heard Dr. Rudi Dorsch mention something like there were *Epiphyllum* species that were actually *Disocactus* species according to some DNA testing. Or maybe you read about it in July's Epi Gram. So what happened, and what does it mean?^{*2}

In 2014, botanists at the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México^{*3} conducted a DNA study. They tested samples of ten of the eleven *Disocactus* species as well as samples from the *Epiphyllum*, *Hylocereus*, *Pseudorhipsalis*, *Selenicereus* and *Weberocereus* genera.^{*4} There were also samples from non-epiphytic, more distantly-related cacti genera.^{*5}

They found that *Epiphyllum crenatum* and *Epiphyllum crenatum* ssp *kimnachii* are closely related to *Disocactus macranthus*, and therefore should be renamed to *Disocactus crenatus* and *Disocactus crenatus* ssp *kimnachii*. They also found that *Epiphyllum anguliger* and *Epiphyllum lepidocarpum* are closely related to *Disocactus biformis* and therefore should be renamed to *Disocactus anguliger* and *Disocactus lepidocarpus*.

So right about now you might be saying, "Yes, and so what? These are a bunch of species that I don't grow, so this doesn't affect me. What does this have to do with Epi hybrids?" Well, if you don't grow these species it's true you won't have to worry about updating tags. But this news does affect you. You see, the *Epiphyllum* species used in hybridizing Epi hybrids have been *E. crenatum* and *E. anguliger*. But these new findings show these species to actually be *Disocactus* species. Doesn't this mean there is little to no actual 'epiphyllum' in our Epi hybrids? So should our clubs actually be called 'Epiphyllum Societies'? Could it be time to rename our clubs to 'Epicactus Societies'?

I will leave those ideas to percolate for awhile and mention some of the other findings. Both *Disocactus flagelliformis* and *Disocactus martianus* are more closely related to *Hylocereus*, *Selenicereus* and *Weberocereus*^{*6} than to other *Disocactus*, though these two species are most closely related to each other. The authors therefore recommend the genus *Aporocactus* be reestablished and these two species placed there. In

addition, *Disocactus speciosus* ssp *aurantiacus* should be recognized as a separate species, as it does not have a lot in common with *Disocactus speciosus* and its other subspecies.

The information from this study indicates there are now 14 species (and associated subspecies) plus a presumed hybrid (*Disocactus ×kimnachii*) listed under *Disocactus*. So if you do grow any of the affected species, should you change your plant labels? It's best to just add a label with the new name. When the word comes down^{*7} as to which name is the accepted one, then the incorrect labels can be tossed.

As far as changing the names of our clubs from 'Epiphyllum Societies'? This kind of change takes a lot of work and a lot of time. A change like this certainly needs to be discussed before any kind of action is taken. Given these new findings, perhaps now is the time to start talking.

*1 If you weren't at EpiCon, here is the news. Or possibly you were there and you still have no idea what I am talking about.

*2 And should you change your plant labels? :)

*3 A top tier research university located in México City, Mexico.

*4 These are all cactus species with an epiphytic growth habit.

*5 The more distantly-related species are there to provide a control. Sadly I do not have a clear enough understanding of DNA testing to confidently explain how the study was done. The original paper, listed below, discusses the methodology.

*6 There are some indications that *Hylocereus*, *Selenicereus* and *Weberocereus* are actually all one genus. But a lot more DNA testing needs to be done.

*7 The ICSG (International Cactaceae Systematics Group) of the IOS (International Organization for Succulent Plant Study) is the naming authority for cacti.

Now is the Time

- ✓ **Maintain good grooming** by eliminating unsightly and non-productive branches. This directs the plant's energy into the healthier branches which will produce stronger blooms next spring.
- ✓ **Protect plants from excessive direct sunlight.** Although the end of summer is in sight, in Southern California we can still anticipate some very hot days.
- ✓ **Prevent soil from drying out.** However, keep an eye on the humidity. Even though it may be very hot, too much watering during humid weather can contribute to root rot. Make sure there is air circulation around your pots.
- ✓ **Protect new growth from wind damage.** Hot, dry Santa Ana winds blow in September. Keep an eye on your plants during these days.
- ✓ **Protect apples (seed pods) from birds and rodents.**
- ✓ **Give plants final feeding of a balanced fertilizer for the fall growing season.**
- ✓ **Mist or hose down branches to clean off dirt and pollutants.**
- ✓ **Some die-back is natural** in epies and fall is a season you'll see this along with some new growth.
- ✓ **Many species plants bud and bloom now.** Remember to give them some fertilizer and don't move plants that are budding.
- ✓ **Watch for pests.** Late summer and early fall is an active time for snails. During dry weather, snails and slugs are drawn to moist, potted plants.
