

"Christmas Cactus" and "Easter Cactus"

At the October meeting, someone asked what the difference was between Christmas cacti and Easter cacti (except for the fact that one blooms close to Christmas and the other blooms in the Spring—often close to Easter). Both of these genera have gone through a lot of different names over the years.

Easter Cactus- when I first got interested in epiphytic

cacti, they were known as Rhipsalidopsis. There were two species: *Rhipsalidopsis* gaertneri and *Rhipsalidopsis rosea*. I still like these names. Prior to being called Rhipsalidopsis, gaertneri was called *Epiphyllum gaertneri* and *Epiphyllum* russellianum var. gaertneri. When the taxonomists decided that they wanted to decrease the number of genera names, gaertneri was lumped into Rhipsalis and was called *Rhipsalidopsis gaertneri*. The

last change has been to call it *Hatiora gaertneri*. *Rhipsaldopsis rosea* was lumped into *Rhipsalis rosea* before the last change to *Hatiora rosea*. All of the different hybrids of Rhipsalidopsis are the result of crosses of gaertneri and rosea and those crosses are now called *Hatiora xgraeseri (xRhipsalphyllopsis graeseri)*.

To determine what genus plants belong to, taxonomists look at the characteristics of the stem, the areoles, the flowers, the pericarpel, the hypanthium, the stamens and how they are inserted and the fruit. These two plants do not exactly match the characteristics of the Hatiora but come fairly close. They both have a regular funnel form flower – gaertneri's flower is scarlet while the flower of rosea is pink.

One of the most beautiful plants I ever had were two plants of *Hatiora rosea*. When I had them for about two years, they bothe came in full bloom one Spring and they were spectacular. The plants were covered with small pink flowers. But I soon found out that after these plants bloom, they have a habit of self destructing. I came out one day and there were segments all over the ground underneath where the plants wer hanging. I've always thought that this was one way they reproduce as the segments did root easily. I never had good plants after that. Schlumbergera also have gone through several name changes. Schlumbergera russelliana was first known as Epiphyllum russellianum. S. truncate was called Zygocactus truncates. S. Opuntioides was first called Epiphyllum opuntioides, then changed to Zygocactus opuntioides and after that, Epiphyllanthus opuntioides. There are six specie4s of Schlumbergera –S. kautskyi, S. microsphaerica, S. opuntioides, S. orssichiana; S. russelliana and S. microsphaerica have a nearly regular flower. If you cut a regular flower into 4 equal parts, each quartyer will be equal. If you cut a zygomorphic

flower into 4 quarters, only two of the quarters will be equal. Most of the hybrids that are on the market are the results of a cross of *S. russelliana* and *S. truncate*. There have been some good *S. orssichiana* crosses and a few3 *S. opuntioides icrosses*.

All of the Schlumbergera and Hatiora gaertneri and Hatiora rosea come from the mountains of southeastern Brazil. They are mostly growing as epiphytes (growing on trees or bushes) but some are saxicolous (growing on the ground or over

rocks). Depending on the species, the Schlumbergera, in the Northern Hemisphere, bloom from September to February. Many of the Schlumbergera make an excellent house plant because they can tolerate low light. They'll do better in a room that you don't heat in the Winter. If you keep them outdoors, put them in a shaded area and watch your watering. They don't like to be kept too wet but they also shouldn't dry out completely. The old fashioned Christmas Cactus can be a very tough plant and is often passed down from generation to generation in families.

As faer as I know, there have not been any proven crosses between *Hatiora gaertneri* or *Hatiora rosea* and any of Schlumbergera species although a lot of people have tried.

Since the Cobia nursery in Florida closed, there have not been any large commercial growers that are hybridizing Schlumbergera. Most of the new hybrids are coming from Denmark. They raise them in such large quantities that they can ship them to the U.S. and still sell them at a fair price. They are also hybridizing the Hatioras and now have a white hybrid that is quite good.

Why do we love our epies?

Epies are amazing plants. Epiphyllums are a true cactus from the jungle. Scott Haselton said, "Of the myriads of plants being grown for their flowers, the Epiphyllums are among the most deserving of first place because of exotic beauty". Whether you enjoy the hybrids, species, or both, the flowers are spectacular. Epies are incredibly adaptable. Here in Southern California we get to grow them outside all year long. In other colder climates, epies have to stay inside for the winter. They get to come out for the warmer months and for all this care they reward us with their exotic beauty . The range of flower size is from a couple of inches to 13 inches across. Who

is not impressed with that? The color combinations that have been coming out in the newer hybrids are more impressive each year. The variety of shapes is amazing, from the wheel form to multi-petaled; from narrow petals to full rounded petals. The choice of colors is wide ranging. There is a rainbow of colors and color combination to chose from, except blue (the elusive epi color). What's not to like about our beloved epies. There is an epi for everyone. Let's spread the joy and epies. Wishing you all an epifilled and joy-filled holiday season.

Now is the Time

Water if necessary

Prune plants. If some of your plants' branches appear dry and dehydrated don't panic. This is normal. Remove them by either snapping off the unwanted growth or cutting with snips. Remember to sterilize your cutting tools (burning dry with a torch), or spraying with the "Bar Rinse" sanitizing solution to prevent spreading unwanted viruses to other plants.

- Keep an eye on the weather. Make plans for protecting epis from bad weather (cold temperatures, high winds, hail) as we get further into winter.
- Continue to watch for pests.


Please accept my best wishes for an exciting and memorable 40th Anniversary celebration. I wish you continued success in your future endeavors.

The first place is Availability; there is a box asking -"At which location would you like to volunteer?" The second is: the very last box asking -


"Please indicate your area(s) of interest."
