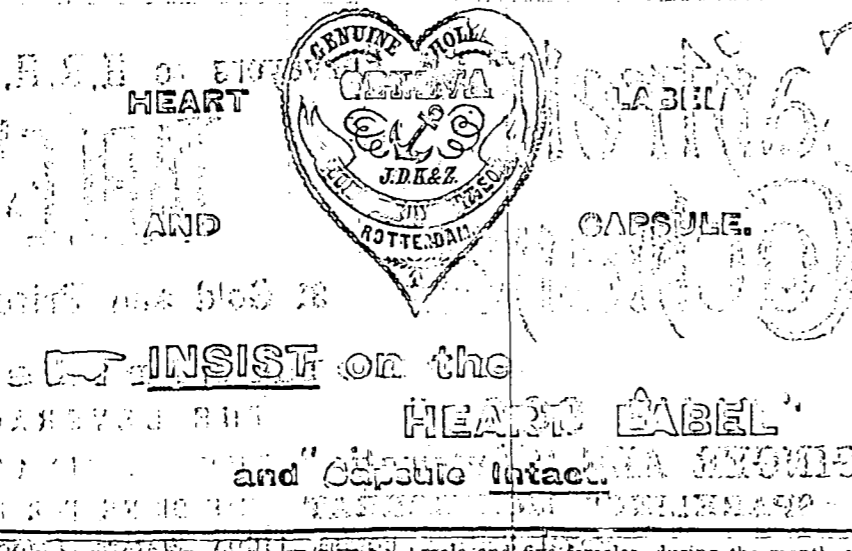

STRIKING RATES. SPECIAL MEETING FOR PRESENTATION PURPOSES. REMUNERATION OF COLLECTORS.

A QUESTION AS TO A PRINTING CONTRACT.

THE MAYOR AND MR. JAMES MCGRATH. A special meeting of the members of the Waterford Town Council was held on Tuesday evening last at the Town Hall.

The Mayor: I suppose there is nothing else for it but to take the first two resolutions. The Mayor: Would it not be well to explain for the information of the public, how this matter is to be dealt with, because a great many people are complaining that the rate is too high.

The Town Clerk: The explanation as to why the present rate is so high is very simple. The amount required for the year 1899 is 33,100. To make that up, we have to take 33,100 from the pound for 12 months, ending 31st March, 1899, on all rateable property in the said County Borough liable for the same.

To make and strike a new rate of 3s. 10d. in the pound on all rateable property within the same area liable thereto for the same period.

To give such directions for the levying and collection of the said rates as may be considered necessary; and

To do all such acts and take all such measures as to the making and collection of the said rates as may seem advisable.

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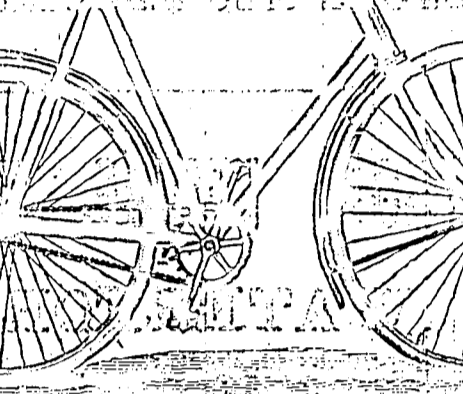

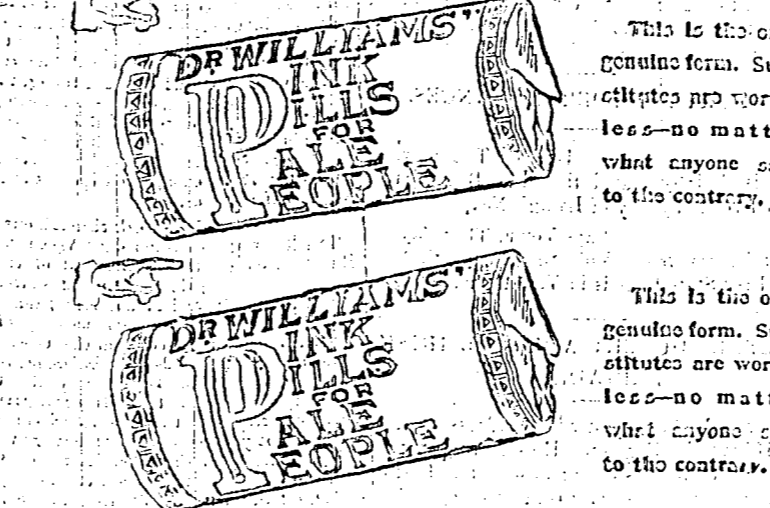
