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

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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

OF CONSCIENCE

There was a failed attempt at last Monday's monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan by Labour Party Cllr. B. Kyne to initiate a discussion on the forthcoming Referendum on the Constitutional Amendment to allow divorce. Cllr. Kyne called on the Council to discuss the matter and to make its views known on the issue which is to be decided on June 26.

Cllr. Kyne said that he would be voting "yes" and he proposed that the Council pass a resolution of support for the

Cllr. G. O'Halloran (F.G.) seconded the proposal but Fianna Fail Cllr. P. Kenneally said he totally opposed such a proposal holding that it was a matter for each person to dewas supported by Cllr. P. Coffey (F.G.), Cllr. S. Dunphy (F.F.), Cllr. C. Casey (F.G.) and the Chairman, Cllr. J. Carey (F.G.) all of whom held that the Divorce Referendum was a matter of conscience for each individual and that it was not a matter for the Council to become involved in as a

Cllr. C. O Riain on the other hand urged everyone to come out and vote against the Referendum and expressed extreme disappointment that the Catholic Church had not come out stronger against it. "They should have preached against it Sunday after Sunday," he said.

By a margin of 9 votes to 4 the Council agreed that it was not a matter for them to become involved in as a body.

POSTAL SYSTEM TOO COSTLY

Employees of An Post at their annual Conference in Portlaoise last week complained about their low wage structures and called on the Government to provide increased funding to

They claimed that the additional money required to do this for them should be provided in the same way as it had been found to meet the demands of the teachers. They felt that if necessary the extra should be realised money through further increases in postal charges.

But, according to the country's postal watchdog committee, the Irish postal system is too costly by international standards and An Post should use their projected profits over the next few years to reduce

The Chairman of the Postal Service Users Council, Mr. Padraig O Nuallain told a meeting of the Council in Galway also last week, that the recent decision to increase the cost of stamps was particularly disappointing. "These latest increases were opposed by our organisation, but representations from us to An Post proved fruitless," he said.

Mr. O Nuallain also claimed that the Government was wasting taxpayers money by including postal complaints under the terms of the Ombudsman. He said that it made no sense that the Ombudsman's office should be empowered to engage in matters which are already the function of another independent statutorily appointed body.

Of course this is but another costly example of duplication which is rife in the public service. It is no wonder that taxation is so exorbitantly high when we have to fund a number of systems, all doing (or pretending to do) the same thing. The wonder is that the country has managed to survive so long under such enormous

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

Assault Charge Dismissed Because Evidence Insufficient

On that occasion however the in jured party, Humphrey Murphy, gave evidence and said that when he left a licensed premises in Tallow that night the defendant walked over to him and declared "I am Hogan from Tallow." Without reason Hogan then struck him a blow of a fist in the face and two of his teeth were loosened.

Garda Michael Dineen told the court that when he met the injured party that night his face and clothes were covered in blood. His lip was also gashed with blood pouring profusely from it. Two of Murphy's teeth were also loose.



THE ARMY OF UNEMPLOYED

According to the current copy of "Eurofocus," unemployment in the 12-nation European Community fell by 273,000 between February and March. While this is good news, it is not the sharp turn around everyone is waiting for. Much of the fall is due to seasonal factors, as was the case in February, according to

the EC's statistical office.
Of the 16.4 million registered unemployed at the end of March, 9.5 million were men, 6.9 million women. In most Community countries men have benefitted more than women from the recent fall unemployment.

Seasonally adjusted figures point to a slight rise in unemployment in the U.K., Ireland and France. Ohly in the Netherlands has there been a slight fall, with the situation unchanged in Germany.
