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NO EXCESS SPENDING

According to the Finance Report of the Chief Executive Officer, Mr. P. G. McQuillan, submitted to the October meeting of the South Eastern Health Board, the clear message emanating from last month's meeting between the Chairmen and Chief Executive Officers of the eight Health Boards and the Minister for Health, Dr. O'Hanlon, was that there would be no more funds available this year for any Health Board which is at present spending in excess of its allocation. Any of the Boards finding itself in such a situation must take measures to correct the position in good time before the end of the year.

There can be, the CEO's report stresses, no question of carrying over into 1989 any excess spending in 1988 and the same clear message holds good for all Government funded authorities this year.

An interesting aspect of the report refers to health contributions and levies due to the Board by the farming community in the region. The total amount of the revised debt in respect of these contributions was given as £5,123,000 but in the years 1984-85-86, a sum of £3,289,000 of the debt was collected with further sums of £283,000 collected in 1987 and £342,000 in the current year which left a balance of £1,209,000 outstanding at September 30 last.

The shortfall in funds to local authorities in recent years has made budgeting almost impossible and with further cuts now forecast for next year, more and more of the burden of providing money to fund even the barest schedule of services is being thrown on to a handful of local ratepayers. The situation is becoming increasingly intolerable and some more equitable system of funding will have to be found.

ROAD SHOULD BE RAISED

Following the torrential rain-storm of last Monday/Tuesday week, the Blackwater overflowed its banks at several points and one of the areas again affected was the main road between Ballygalane and Ballyrafter in Lismore. Whenever the river becomes heavily flooded this is a stretch of roadway which invariably becomes affected and even on Wednesday evening of last

week the road here was still flooded to a depth of two feet and more.

Some vehicles got trapped while attempting to get through while the more cautious drivers made the detour along the other side of the river.

The County Council are continuing the widening of the road in the vicinity of the Kitchenhole back towards Cappoquin and are raising the level there by several feet. It is to be hoped that the levels of that part of the road which is now subject to such regular flooding will also be raised to a sufficient height to obviate this recurring problem with as little delay as possible.

SAFETY WARNING

Because the recent heavy rain may have caused some play areas for children to become filled with water and shallow streams to be much deeper the Water Safety Section of the National Safety Council urges parents and persons in charge of small children to ensure that they are constantly supervised while playing near water.

The back garden play pool or ornamental pond; the nearby river or stream; the uncovered rain barrel, well, water tank or slurry pit; holes or drains left after building operations, are all hazards for the very young and for elderly, feeble persons. Anglers and wildfowling are also urged to be extremely careful following heavy rain such as we have been experiencing in recent weeks.

MASTER McGRATH RESTORED

Thanks to the efforts of local courting enthusiasts the Master McGrath Monument at Ballymacmague outside Dungarvan which was irresponsibly vandalised some years ago by supporters of the anti-blood sports group has now been fully restored.

There will be a VIP gathering present for the unveiling of the restored monument to the three times winner of the Waterloo Cup, the Blue Riband of Coursing, which is due to take place at 3 p.m. on Saturday next, October 22.

Is Traffic Warden Help Or Hindrance?

Mixed views on the activity of the Traffic Warden and the enforcement of the disc parking regulations in the town were expressed at the October monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night. Members were divided in their opinions but the Town Clerk Mr. B. White, strongly defended the warden stating that he was performing a difficult job in an excellent manner.

The matter was raised by Cllr. R. Walsh, who stated that he had been inundated with complaints from shopkeepers and traders in the town who asked him if the Council were trying to put them out of

business by the manner in which customers were being hounded and threatened over the parking regulations. As a result, he said that shoppers who would otherwise be coming into Dungarvan to do their shopping were now going to neighbouring towns instead. "They are afraid that when they come into Dungarvan now that they will have a parking ticket slapped on their cars," he said.

Cllr. Walsh went on to say that Friday and Saturday were the two busiest shopping days in the town one time but now it was Thursday which was the busiest day. "The reason for that," he said, "is that the warden is not on duty on Thursdays."

Cllr. Walsh added that the Traffic Warden had been appointed in the first instance to help the business people of the town but in fact it was now the other way round. "I got stuck all over the Square last Friday and Saturday because of his activities and was told that as a result very little business was done and I think the Council will have to reconsider the situation and the implications it has for business," he said.

Cllr. J. Wright disagreed with Cllr. Walsh stating that he thought the disc parking scheme was a good way of getting money in for the Council.

Cllr. B. Kyne also said that he did not believe the traders were cribbing to the extent that had been suggested and he thought that instead of carping the traders should be considering the pedestrianisation of the shopping areas which would generally improve business. "It is cars that are the great obstacle to shopping anywhere," he said.

DIABOLICAL SITUATION

Cllr. P. Power, on the other hand, said that like Cllr. Walsh he had got complaints from the shopkeepers that the parking arrangements were causing a lot of hassle for customers. However, he said that the situation had become diabolical at the town on Thursdays because the warden was off duty then.

Mr. B. White Town Clerk, thought that the reason Thursday afternoons had become very busy was because of the late shopping in the town. Referring to the Traffic Warden he said that he thought the man was doing a difficult job in an excellent manner. "I deal with him directly," said Mr. White, "and I have always found him very fair and above board."

The Town Clerk then reminded the council that it was they who had approved of the parking regulations and the disc system. "I must say on behalf of the Traffic Warden," he then said, "that he has a job to do in accordance with the rules and he can't be expected to half do it."

Cllr. Walsh remarked that his complaints were not directed against the man but against the system.

The discussion ended with Cllr. Wright stating that he thought it ludicrous to suggest that people were going elsewhere, to shop rather than pay 10p for a parking disc. He believed the system was so successful in the town centre that it should be extended to other areas.

MINISTER ASKED TO CLARIFY POSITION ON NEW SCHOOL

On the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne, members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee decided at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday to ask the Minister for Education, Mrs. Mary O'Rourke T.D., to receive a deputation to discuss and to clarify the exact position in regard to the proposed new Vocational School for Dungarvan.

A site for the school had been provided by the Urban Council at Quann's and, said Cllr. Kyne, everything seemed to be in order until they were informed that the proposal had been knocked because of government cutbacks.

Cllr. D. Goode said that he was always opposed to the proposed site for the school because, being so near the sea-front, it was subject to flooding. It was pointed out by Cllr. P. Coffey, Chairman, that the point at issue was not the site but whether they were now to get the new school or not.

When Mr. Donal Kellither, C.E.O. informed the members that the local gardai had foiled another attempted raid at the Dungarvan School last week-end, members joined in praising the gardai for their prompt response to the alarm signal on the occasion.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White agreed that all Council outdoor workers should be provided with suitable identity cards and said they were in the process of looking into this.

PRISON SENTENCES FOR MALICIOUS DAMAGE AND ASSAULT ON GARDA

Patrick Cummins with an address at Childers Estate, Dungarvan was sentenced to concurrent terms of 3 months and 1 month in prison when he was convicted by District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week on charges of causing malicious damage amounting to £121.25 to a mattress at Dungarvan Garda Station and for assaulting Garda M. Clifford on September 23. But the District Justice said that he would postpone signing the warrants and adjourn the charges until November 23.

In reply to Mr. King, witness agreed that the defendant was very drunk on the occasion. Garda M. Murphy in evidence said that he was Station Orderly that night and the defendant had been placed in cell No. 2 when he was brought in. The defendant kept kicking and banging the cell door and when witness looked in at him he saw him tearing up a fire-proof mattress which, as a result, had to be replaced. Witness added that the defendant had been very aggressive and wanted to get out while in the cell.

TOOK ON ENTIRE GARDA FORCE

Asked about the defendant's previous record, Inspector Hayes told the court that on January 28 last, Cummins took on the entire Garda force in Dungarvan. He went into the Garda Station that night, said the Inspector, "brandishing an axe and invited any Garda to take it from him. That's what he thinks of the Garda."

Mr. King said that the defendant was now under medical care and was responding well to treatment he was receiving. Stating that compensation would have to be paid by the defendant, District Justice O'Connell then sentenced him to 3 months on the malicious damage charge and a concurrent 1 month for the assault on the Garda. "But," the District Justice then said, "I will postpone the signing of the warrant and adjourn the charges until November 23. I will limit the amount of compensation to the defendant's circumstances but he must have that paid by November 23." In addition a fine of £10 was imposed on the charge of being drunk and a danger to traffic on the occasion.

Replying to questions by Inspector Hayes, Garda Clifford said that at 9.35 p.m. on September 23, he was in the Garda patrol car with Garda Foley. They were parked outside the Garda Station. He saw a man staggering along the footpath outside the Station and he then fell face down on the path. "I thought he was injured," said Garda Clifford, "and I went to pick him up and as I did so he started punching me into the stomach." Witness then said that a woman came along and said that she would take the man home but Garda Foley and witness took him into the Garda Station.

THE MORESBY STORY

What Really Happened In Dungarvan Bay

By TOM TOBIN

A few weeks ago, RTE television attempted to present a synopsis of the tragic story of the Moresby — the great ship that foundered in Dungarvan Bay on the 23/24 December 1895 with the loss of twenty lives.

The RTE programme was a feeble effort but even worse, it was one that showed up some glaring examples of inaccuracies which cannot be excused. Lack of research on the part of some of those involved in that programme displayed a blatant disregard for the facts of such a major tragedy.

Putting it bluntly — they did not know what they were talking about and apart from the inaccuracies, there was the disturbing innuendo that bitterness still exists in Dungarvan following the failure to save those who were swept to their deaths that morning of Christmas Eve 1895.

Had any of those taking part in the RTE programme read my book "Echoes from the Deceis" published in 1953, they would not have had to rely on fallacy.

THE TRUTH

More than 40 years ago, I spoke to people who remembered the long hours of the tragedy that shocked the nation. I recorded their stories and particularly those of Thomas O'Mahony who had a carpenter's shop opposite the Munster and Leitner Bank in Bridge Street now Allied Irish Banks.

In fact, I spent three years researching the Moresby story which appeared first of all in the DUNGARVAN LEADER in the mid or late 'forties. I intend to use this story in full in a book on Dungarvan which I am working on but I feel very strongly that it is my duty to do what I can to clear the air on a number of points made on that RTE programme which presented Dungarvan and the Captain of the Moresby in a very dark scenario.

What I found hard to take as I watched that television programme was the statement that 32-year-old Capt. George Coomer jumped into the sea with his dog tied to his back. The truth is he jumped with his baby daughter Ivy, strapped to his back. At the same time his wife Ita Isabella was roped to the back of her brother Martin J. Louis who was man of the quartermaster and jumped into the sea also in the hope of reaching the shore.

ROUGH SEAS

One of them was an Englishman named Henry Bant who told the inquest: "The mate took the wife and the captain took the child and they jumped overboard before I did. The ship's boats were carried away a long time before that. I was from a quartermaster and they were in the water before we were picked up. I had a lifeboat on."

Questioned by District Inspector Egan: "If the lifeboat had been launched would it have saved the whole crew?" The survivor told the inquest: "I believe it could if it had come an hour earlier. We could have jumped overboard and she could have picked us up. It would not have been necessary for the lifeboat to come alongside to save us as we were jumping into the sea and were picked up. The sea was worse the previous evening when the lifeboat went out than it was on the following morning between seven and ten o'clock. There was a lull in the storm."

began to draw her anchors. More cable was slipped out but it was here that late played a damning role. The port cable ran out of the hawse-hole leaving the Moresby with just one anchor. It was at this stage that the Captain realised his ship was doomed. Distress signals were shown and were seen in Ballinacourty and in Dungarvan. But they were ignored on Ballinacourty Head. This was the real tragedy and one that cannot be understood even to this day. A number of volunteers in Ballinacourty wanted to go out to rescue all on board the Moresby but they were refused the use of the lifeboat.

THE UNNAMED HERO

Word was sent to Dungarvan for more volunteers and to Helwick on the other side of the bay. In Dungarvan the message was delayed by one man's failing and the records of the events allege that because of this man's delay twenty young lives were lost. The call was received in Dungarvan early in the night but did not bring the needed response until early the following morning. By this time the scene on board the Moresby was one of heartbreak. She was all but wrecked and the crew scattered by the cold waves of the cruel Atlantic.

Dungarvan's bell-ringer on getting the belated message promptly collected a volunteer crew who headed for Ballinacourty with all speed. Other volunteers rushed in from Helwick using a horse and cart as transport. When the Dungarvan men reached Ballinacourty they had to overcome stiff resistance in taking over the lifeboat. Under the command of Capt. Veale who acted as coxswain, the following volunteer crew put to sea: J. Slattery, Capt. T. Grady, Wm. Slattery, M. Dwyer, J. Donovan, William Duggan, Mike Duggan, Jim Duggan (brothers), Pad Flynn (known locally as 'The Russian'), J. Gleeson, P. Byrne, Tom Donovan, J. Leahy and his son, Pat.

When they reached the stricken vessel, she had heeled over. They picked up seven men and two boys, leaving only two of them died, leaving only five survivors. It is important to record here that in the height of the terrifying storm on the night of December 23rd two old-timers, Tommy Flynn and James Donovan and a young boy put to sea in a small boat and battled through the waves to reach the stricken Moresby. Because of the poor visibility they did not see the lifeboat moving towards the vessel. Nevertheless, they risked their lives only to find that their offer of assistance was not accepted. The Moresby's captain believed they could ride out the storm. Strange as it may seem, I could never confirm the name of the young boy who took part in that gallant rescue attempt and, perhaps, someone in Dungarvan today might be in a position to add his name to the list of brave men.

THE LAST LIVING MAN

One by one, the bodies of the victims were found along the seashore. In Bohernabreena, the remains of Capt. Coomer were picked up. The blanket that had been wrapped over his baby's body now sagged in its emptiness upon his shoulders but there was no sign of the babe. Not long afterwards, little Ivy was found on the Ring side of the harbour and a short distance away lay the body of her mother. Far away across the bay near Barnawee, the body of her brother, Martin Louis was located and attached to it were the ropes that had held his sister when she jumped into the sea. Eventually, all bodies were recovered at various points inside the harbour. One body, that of a coloured man named Hunter was found near Ardmore.

The names of the five survivors were: L. McKenna, H. McKenna, E. W. Bloomquist, H. McKenna and H. Blount. It was Hugh McKenna who told the inquest: "After the lifeboat's first visit (i.e. the Ballinacourty crew) the wind freshened and at half-past five in the morning the starboard cable parted and she drifted into where she is now. She lay in that position for about two hours with her head to the sea. It was then daybreak. We showed signals of distress long before this. The captain sent up signals from eleven o'clock the previous night and was burning lights all night."

Mr. Egan: "By sending up the signals did the captain mean to leave the ship?" McKenna: "Oh, certainly. The ship was in danger and he wanted assistance. If the lifeboat came out between seven to ten—that is about two hours earlier she could have saved all hands. Had the captain and his wife remained, and the others, it is possible they would all have been saved. Those who first left were too long in the water before the lifeboat came up. The captain's wife had a lifeboat on. I was the last living man picked up."

COXSAIN SPEAKS OUT

Mr. M. Commins, told the inquest that he was coxswain of the lifeboat in Ballinacourty and was also a coxswain. He went out to the vessel on the first evening, we were about 3 hours in the boat going to and coming from the vessel. He recalled the signals made from the Moresby about eleven o'clock that night, he said that he tried to get a crew.

I first saw the schooner going into Clonea Bay. We hoisted a signal and I fired rockets for the lifeboat crew. There was a tremendous sea and Patrick Norris, an old lifeboat man said he never saw anything like the spirit of the Dungarvan people towards me when one man said a ship's boat would not live in the sea.

Capt. Moloney: "And I say so too." The coxswain continued his evidence: "It's all very well to criticise. I got the boat on the carriage at eleven o'clock. I was down with the vessel was firing signals of distress. I went to assemble a crew. It was blowing again at the time, I could not get a crew. After that I got a telegram from the secretary asking did the coxswain and lifeboat crew refuse to go to the vessel. I telegraphed to Dungarvan that the lifeboat crew refused to go. They were too tired after being out before. I shut up the boat house and William Shaw, a coastguard and myself, thought it advisable to go down to the other vessel (the schooner MARY SINCLAIR) and we went the best part of the way. When we did not see the rocket apparatus we returned to come home and we arrived here at four o'clock in the morning. I went down with my clothes on until just about six o'clock when the watchman came and called me and said that the vessel had struck the bank. I went and fired two more explosives to get a crew but I could not get a crew. Only three or four men were left in the boat house and everything ready for the boat to go out. Mr. Sampson who had charge of the rockets asked me not to see if we could do anything with the apparatus. No crew turned up."

"I had my lifeboat on all the time. I asked for volunteers to go in the lifeboat from the crowd standing opposite the vessel but only one man named O'Brien answered."

"I am a coward. I would take that boat where others would be drowned. I am called a coward by men thirty years at sea and spending twenty of that in a public-house in Dungarvan. The rocket party and a lot of people were in the field when I asked for volunteers and only one would come."

Capt. Veale: "Why did you not go in the boat when you got the volunteers?" Mr. Commins: "I won't answer that, you have shown me a vindictive spirit before this. I think you ought to clear out when I am giving my evidence. I met Capt. Veale on the cliffs when he asked me why the lifeboat did not go out. I told him I could not get a crew. He said he would make one. Capt. Veale asked me why I did not telegraph into Dungarvan for a crew. I told him the hon. secretary had done so, who was at the station at the time. Capt. Veale said he could not live alongside of her (the Moresby) the sea was so bad. Capt. Veale said then let us launch her and we can do the best we can and that he would go as coxswain. I said I was glad as I was fatigued and had not changed my clothes all night and all day."

These are, but a few extracts from the inquest which was held at the coastguard station in Ballinacourty (now the Golf Club) a few days following the tragedy. Coomer to abandon ship and time after time they battled against the sea keeping the lifeboat as close as possible to the Moresby. Eventually they were forced to return to port cold, wet and fatigued.

It was later that night and early on the morning of Christmas Eve when the anchors slipped and the cables ran out with the result the Moresby was swept on to the Whitehouse Bank, where she foundered. Some of the crew clung to the rigging, the remainder, including the captain, his wife and child and the mate, jumped into the sea in the hope of reaching the shore alive. All of them died beneath the waves when they jumped into the sea with the exception of seven who were on the rigging and who had all but given up hope when they jumped into the sea to be rescued by the Dungarvan volunteer crew. Two of the seven died of exposure on reaching Ballinacourty. In all, twenty lives were lost.

The tragedy was one that should not have happened. It would be easy to place the full blame on the Ballinacourty lifeboat crew: on the stubborn stand taken by Capt. Coomer or on the disgraceful lack of urgency in the system of communications. However, my own personal examination of the

facts as I placed them together down through the years shows all too sadly that the tragedy of the Moresby was the result of a combination of misjudgments. At the same time it brought forth some of the finest acts of bravery recorded in the annals of Dungarvan but here again the human fallings of life are seen in the simple fact that it has taken 93 years to honour the memory of all who sailed on the Moresby and died in Dungarvan Bay: the bravery of those who tried to save them and those whose intentions were noble but whose strength and spirit failed them.

The Wigham Buoy that marked the scene of the wreck of the Moresby is now a memorial to all. It is also a landmark Dungarvan can respect and those responsible for its preservation have earned our admiration. In remembering the place where the bones of the Moresby seafarers lie above the bay in the Old Churchyard, let us not forget to pay our respects with honour. Dungarvan has many such graves of seafarers forgotten and neglected.

There is no place for bitterness in our hearts for all those who tried and failed. It could be the epitaph of many of us.


SATURDAY, OCTOBER 15

Drunk Driving Charges At Dungarvan Court

Twice in the space of fifteen days a Kilrossary farmer was apprehended driving under the influence of drink. District Justice W. F. O'Connell was told at Dungarvan Court last week.

The court heard that on the second occasion as the gardai pursued him, Michael Walsh Briskley Upper Leamybrien, abandoned his car in the middle of the road and took flight. Walsh pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol at Kilrush, Dungarvan, on May 30 and again at Grattan Square on June 13.

Garda Inspector P. J. Hayes said that on June 13 as the gardai pursued him, Walsh stopped his car in the middle of the road, jumped out of it and ran off.

"He abandoned ship" said defence solicitor Mr. J. P. Gordon, who added that the defendant panicked when he saw the gardai. He was fined €25 and €50 respectively on the first and second drunk driving charges. Both convictions were endorsed and he was disqualified

from driving for concurrent one and three year terms. Walsh was also fined €10 for careless driving on May 30, and a total of €40 on two counts of careless driving on June 13. All three convictions were endorsed.

FAILED TO STOP AT CHECK POINT

A factory worker, Tom Veale, Leamybrien, was fined €50, endorsed, and banned for driving for one year when he pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol on May 15 last.

Inspector P. J. Hayes told the court that gardai were operating a late night checkpoint at New Line, Abbeyside, when they signalled Veale to stop. He failed to do so and gardai pursued him, eventually stopping him. Veale claimed he thought he had been signalled to pass by the gardai.

DRUNK IN CHARGE

A motorist with a number of previous convictions under the

Road Traffic Act was convicted of being drunk in charge of a car at Lower Main Street, Dungarvan, on May 29, when William O'Connell, 2 New Houses, Kilmacathomas, pleaded guilty to the offence.

"This particular defendant is no stranger to the District Court," said Inspector P. J. Hayes. "His past convictions date back to 1976."

District Justice O'Connell fined O'Connell €100 and endorsed the conviction on his driving licence.

DRUNK CYCLIST

Eugene Duggan, 36 Kyne Park, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, was convicted on a charge of drunk driving — of a pedal cycle.

Garda Timothy Murphy said he observed the defendant cycling at the Causeway at 1.40 a.m. on May 15th last, and he was "alover the road". When he stopped Duggan he admitted having had a share of drink, while there were no front or rear lights on the bicycle.

For driving the pedal cycle while drunk Duggan was fined €25 and he was fined an additional €10 for not having lights on it.

Inspector P. J. Hayes prosecuted while the defendant did not appear in court.

WAS COMING FROM A WEDDING

Donal McCarthy, 4 Springfield, Estac, Dungarvan, was charged with driving with excess alcohol at the New Line, Abbeyside on April 10.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q.—I have an elderly relative who has been in hospital for the past few months but is due out shortly. Because of her age and condition she will need constant care and attention. Can I get any payment from the State to look after her?

A.—If your relative is in one of the categories listed below she may qualify for a Prescribed Relative Allowance: —be getting a blind pension or an invalidity pension or; —be aged 66 or over and getting a social welfare payment and;

—be so incapacitated that she needs full-time care and attention and be getting this care and attention from a prescribed relative; —be living alone except for the prescribed relative, child under 18 or people who are mentally or physically handicapped; —not be getting constant attendance allowance under the

occupational injuries scheme. The Allowance is €27.20 per week. The payment is made to the social welfare pensioner and not directly to the relative looking after him/her. For the purposes of this payment the prescribed relative is one of the following: —brother half-brother, son, step-son, grandson, nephew, brother-in-law, son-in-law; —sister, half-sister, daughter, step-daughter, grand-daughter, niece, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law.

Sean O'Donnell, Mellary Hill, Cappoquin, was fined €10 by District Justice W. F. O'Connell when he pleaded guilty to allowing a horse to wander unattended on the public road on Sept. 27 last.

O'Donnell, whom Garda Oliver Croke said refused to move the horse off the roadway, was told by the District Justice that he would face a very substantial monetary penalty if he is convicted on a similar offence again.

"O'Donnell's refusal to move the horse is the most disturbing feature of this case," said Garda Croke, who added that following receipt of a 999 telephone call he had found the horse on a dangerous bend.

Garda Croke said it was a wet night and the horse posed a serious hazard for motorists. O'Donnell, he added, had a previous conviction for a similar offence this year.

O'Donnell told the court that the horse broke his rope. "It was raining heavily and there was no way I was going out that night," he said.

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

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
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STRADBALLY WIN DISAPPOINTING "DERBY" FINAL

€20 FINE FOR PUB BREACH

PROGRAMME FOR SLOGADH '89

€50 FINES FOR "GROSSLY CARELESS DRIVERS"

An accident at 3.20 a.m. on the main Dungarvan / Cappoquin road on June 5 involving a car and a Hiace van was recalled at Dungarvan Court last week when both drivers were charged with dangerous driving.

Patrick Tobin Knock, Clonea and Patrick Fraher, Shanbally, Cappoquin, both pleaded not guilty.

The evidence of the defendants however was sharply contrasting. Tobin, the car driver, insisted that he was on his correct side of the road when the van driven by Fraher approached on its incorrect side. Fraher however told the story in reverse and said it was the car that was on its incorrect side.

Garda Michael Murphy said when he arrived at the scene he found both vehicles embedded in each other more or less on the crown of the road. "I think both drivers were at fault," said District Justice W. F. O'Connell. "In fact they were grossly careless," he added.

The Justice convicted both on a reduced charge of careless driving and fined them €50 each with an endorsement.

Tobin was also fined an additional €10 for having two bald tyres on his car.

Garda Inspector P. J. Hayes prosecuted while Mr. J. P. Gordon Soir. and Mr. Niall King Soir. appeared for Tobin and Fraher respectively.

SUSPENDED SENTENCE FOR "SHABBY OFFENCE"

Forty-year-old Denis Daly, 48 Cahill Brugha Place, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at Dungarvan court last week to what Garda Inspector P. J. Hayes who prosecuted described as "a particularly shabby offence."

Daly pleaded guilty to entering the dwellinghouse of Patrick Foley, Boherard, Dungarvan, between May 5 and 31 with intent to steal.

Inspector Hayes said the house was unoccupied at the time and nothing was taken by Daly. It was however a particularly shabby offence. The defendant had a number of previous convictions.

District Justice W. F. O'Connell sentenced Daly to two months imprisonment but suspended the sentence on the defendant entering a bond to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for 12 months.

SHEEP

To control sheep scab satisfactorily each sheep must be immersed in the dip tank for a minimum of one minute. Make sure to maintain the dip at the correct concentration at all times.

TILLAGE

Soil Analysis — Low yields in crops are very often due to lime deficiency and low levels of P&K in the soil. Now is a good time to get a soil test in preparation for next year's cropping programme. Contact your local Teagasc office.

MILK QUOTA

Many suppliers are now seriously over quota. Farmers in this situation should consider the following options:

(a) Drying off first calvers, thin cows and cows for culling immediately;

(b) Feeding milk to calves in Spring.

(c) Milking cows once per day from now on;

(d) Drying off total herd before feeding silage.

Adopting one or more of the above actions will help to reduce a farmer's liability for payment of Super Levy.



quin in the days of Morrissey's Hotel, of the hansom cabs and sidecars and when steamers travelled up the Blackwater from Youghal with passengers and cargo to the town.

We must thank the many readers who have responded with the information which has formed the basis for those articles and in particular Mr. Tom Conway who now resides in Chippenham, Wiltshire and who has supplied us with photo copies of some old newspaper reports to which we referred last week. He informs us that these were given to him by a close friend, Michael J. Kenny, grandson of the original M. J. Kenny one time owner of Morrissey's Hotel (referred to last week) and who is now Clerk of the Court in Chippenham.

Before leaving the subject, we think that a few extracts from some of these old newspaper reports would prove of interest and informative as to life in Cappoquin in the early years of 1900. One records the fact that M. J. Kenny was elected to the Cappoquin Division of the Waterford County Council in 1908 on the death of a Mr. J. Flynn. In 1911 he was defeated by Sir John Keane, Bart., but was co-opted to Lismore Rural District Council and represented that body then on the County Council.

A copy of the election address issued by Mr. Kenny "To the Electors of Cappoquin and District" for the 1911 election clearly shows that there was no love lost between him and Sir John and while Sir John's name appears nowhere in the address the references in it are clear such as, "At the last Election it was fought for personal spite, and

now his half bailiff friends are urging on my Opponent to fight again."

Pointing out that in the years since 1908 while a member of the Co. Council he never spared time, trouble or money in getting the project "of having the River Blackwater deepened for the benefit of the town of Cappoquin" accomplished, and for which "it has now been reported by the Royal Commission that a sum of £6,000 is now almost ready to be expended for the improvement of the river," Mr. Kenny in his address asks in scathing fashion, "I would like to ask my Opponent did he ever spend one penny stamp over the whole project, perhaps at the time that I was interested in the dredging of the river, he was out in South Africa trying to have a Cock-shot at some poor Boer farmer."

The electoral address (incidentally printed by J. Browne, Lismore) goes on to deal with other matters in similar vein and concludes: "Remember I am going under the Old National Banner, a Flag which I will never desert, that is Home Rule, the rights and liberties which every Irishman should possess."

However what would seem to be Mr. Kenny's turbulent political career ended when he died at the early age of 44 years. His passing is recorded in a report in the "Waterford Star" dated July 3, 1915 which states: "By the death of Mr. Michael J. Kenny, Cappoquin has lost one of its most highly esteemed and most prominent public men. He passed away to his eternal reward on Saturday morning last after an illness of some weeks duration and at the age of 44 years. He sprang from a good old Cappoquin family and conducted a lucrative business, the bakery, grocery and wine and spirit trade in Main St., Cappoquin and some years back also was proprietor of that old established hotel known as "Morrissey's." He was president of the local A.O.H. Division and Vice-President of the West Waterford Executive of the United Irish League. . . . Throughout his career he was an ardent nationalist and a staunch follower of the Irish Party."

For the record the report states that the interment took place in the family burial vault in the New Cemetery, Lismore and that "not for many years has a funeral been attended in such remarkable numbers with people coming "in hundreds from all sides of the country between Dungarvan and Ballyduff to pay a last worthy tribute to a dear departed friend."

That was Cappoquin away back in the very early 1900's.

DANNY BOY

"Danny Boy" is a very old and much loved ballad which still enjoys very wide appeal. But the accepted version runs to a couple of verses only. Browsing through a new collection of "Songs and Ballads of Ireland" during the past week we found it included and with a third verse which we had never heard before. For this reason we make it our choice for the ballad corner this week.

Oh Danny boy the pipes the pipes are calling From glen to glen and down the mountain side The summer's gone and all the flowers are dying 'Tis you 'tis you must go and I must bid adieu And come again some sunny day When the summer's in the meadow Or when the valley's hushed and white with snow 'Tis I'll be there in sunshine or in shadow Oh Danny boy, oh Danny boy, I love you so.

And if you come when all the flowers are dying And I am dead as dead I will may be You'll come and find the place where I am lying And kneel and say an 'Ave' there for me And I shall hear, tho' soft you tread above me And all my grave will warmer, sweeter be For you will kneel and tell me that you love me And I shall sleep in peace until you come to me.

But should I live and should you die for Ireland, Let not your dying thoughts be all of me But break a prayer to God for our dear Ireland That He will hear, and He will see her rear, and He will take your place, and pike my dearest, And strike a blow, though weak that blow may be To help the cause, to which your heart was nearest, And you will rest, in peace until I come to thee.

Geraldines Hang On To Take Title

Geraldines hung on (by 0-12 to 2-5) in a nail biting finish to wrest the junior hurling 'B' championship title from favourites Rathgormack at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last.

There was only a point in it at the end and many a Geraldines hear, fluttered before John Michael Kelly's long whistle, ended the agony of certainty and heralded the Aglish-Villierstown side as the new county champions.

There was hardly a neutral in the huge crowd (gate receipts £2,748) as the sides battled it out for the honours. Geraldines led 0-12 to 2-3 with ten minutes to go but a brace of points left Rathgormack trailing by just one minor with two minutes left to play. The atmosphere was electric as the winners resisted stubbornly against mounting pressure. The final whistle brought relief and unbridled joy for the huge gathering of Geraldines supporters as they converged on the pitch to pay homage to their heroes.

On the day the winners just about deserved to shade the verdict. They took the lead after just 30 seconds with a superb Michael Kiely point from an 80 yards free. They were subsequently never headed and although there was never more than a puck of the ball between the sides for much of the game, Geraldines always managed to keep their heads in front right to the exciting finish.

The first quarter was dominated by Geraldines, at the end of which they enjoyed an 0-5 to nil advantage. Indeed the winners looked to be on the way to an easy win until Mickey Whelan broke through for a Rathgormack goal in the 18th minute.

Still Geraldines came back for points from Brian Connery and Eddie O'Grady, but then three minutes from the break they suffered a setback when keeper Johnny Grady could only parry a lobbing ball and John Flynn met the rebound to sneak home Rathgormack's second goal. Tony Halley pointed just, on the half hour to give Geraldines a two point lead (0-3 to 2-0) a lead which hardly flattered them following a good first half performance.

WHIRLWIND START

Geraldines had a whirlwind start to the second half when Eddie O'Grady and Brian Connery shot over points to leave them four points clear.

Rathgormack made a determined bid after this and points from Tom Burns, John Murray and Martin Power cut the lead to just a point going into the final quarter. It was nip and tuck as Geraldines edged ahead with a Michael Kiely point from a 65' and a Paddy Corkery point, to leave the three points clear with ten minutes to go.

FOR TRIAL AT SPECIAL CRIMINAL COURT

Stating that he was satisfied that a prima facie case had been established by the State in the Book of Evidence submitted, District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week returned Terence Moroney, 90 Childers Estate, Dungarvan for trial to the next sitting of the Special Criminal Court in Dublin.

Moroney, an unemployed labourer, appeared on bail from a previous sitting of the District Court on two charges under the offences Against the State Act with membership of an illegal organisation, the Irish National Liberation Army (INLA) and with having incriminating documents in his possession at his home on February 15.

Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solicitor who appeared for the Director of Public Prosecutions made application to have the defendant returned to trial to the Special Criminal Court.

Mr. Niall King, Solicitor (J. F. Williams and Co.) on behalf of the defendant made an application which was granted under the Free Legal Aid Scheme, the District Justice agreeing to assign one Counsel for the defence.

Moroney was then remanded on continuing bail in his own bond of £100.

Ger Whelan (25th minute) and Nicky Whelan (free, 28th) for Rathgormack cut the deficit to a point but Geraldines hung on in a frenzy of excitement to take the title by the narrowest of margins.

It wasn't a game to whet the appetite of the purist but from a Geraldines point of view the standard of hurling meant nothing. Victory was all that mattered, the manner of its achieving was secondary. They did however have the better hurlers on the day and fully deserved their win. Each and every player from keeper Johnny Grady to corner forward Eddie O'Grady played his part and while some might have outshone others it was essentially a win fashioned through

team work and hard but honest endeavour over the hour.

Rathgormack too contributed in no small way to making the game close and exciting but in the end they had to give best to a better balanced outfit, on the day.
