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# Storms Continue Unabated

# As Repair Bills Mount

Gale force winds accompanied at times by torrential rain continue to lash the country with unabated strength. With the exception of an odd few days the storms have just blown from one into the other in the course of the last fortnight. As a result, much of the extensive coastal damage and erosion caused by the major storm of December 16/17 has been aggravated and widened.

Around the coast, the high winds have also been creating travel havoc as cross-channel ferries have been delayed and flights cancelled leaving hundreds of passengers stranded, especially at the week-end.

The heavy rainfall has also caused extensive flooding and both the rivers Blackwater and Bride have overflowed their banks causing widespread flooding on the adjoining lands in the Lismore-Ballyduff areas and also in the vicinity of Tal-

Fishing trawlers have also remained stormbound because of the incessant gales and it is a rather unusual sight in these times to see up to a dozen sheltering trawlers moored at the Quayside in Dungarvan as they are unable to put to sea because of the terribly bad weather conditions. So prolonged have these conditions been that one fisherman stated that they had been able to fish for only four days since the beginning of the new year. Because they have been unable to fish, the trawlermen and the crews are suffering financial losses.

#### **ESB REPAIRS UNDER PRESSURE**

ESB services throughout the western end of the county had returned to normal by Tuesday of this week but Area Supervisor Michael Norris warned in Dungarvan that the ESB crews had been able to effect only repairs of a temporary nature and they are keeping their fingers crossed that further gales (as forecast by the Met. Office) would not cause further breaks. As far as the repair gangs have been

## Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

GOD IS ASKING YOU TO HELP

Isaiah in the first of last Sunday's readings reminds us that being a follower or a servant of God does not stop at knowledge and faith, but must extend and be linked with love and concern for our neighbour. He goes on to say and explain that if we hope to be a light and example, we must be prepared to shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, feed the hungry, etc. In short, he is saying that to be a true follower of Christ, one must be open to the needs of others. His message, rooted as it is in the basic principle of God's law of love, namely, love God and love your neighbour, should not be ignored.

Last week I reminded you of Paul's disappointment when he returned to Corinth only to find his converts quarrelling and divided; and how quick he was to make them see the foolishness of their squabbling. He reminded them that the duty of the preacher was to preach Christ crucified, and the message of good news which He bequeathed to all His brothers and sisters. Paul is saying, if you hope to help people to find Christ, you must provide them with genuine information to enable them to meet Him. He begged his listeners to abandon their foolish wrangling and remember that faith is based not on the wisdom or the eloquence of man, but on the power and the word of God. Hence, the true preacher and shepherd is the one who hands on the Gospel news as delivered by Jesus, and thereby enable the flock to follow in the steps of the Master.

The Gospel reading dovetails into the other readings by portraying the same theme on the Christian duty of being a light and an example to others. It also reminds everyone that the Church's mission of salvation imposes obligations not only on bishops and priests, but on all blessed with the light of faith. The Lord said, you are the salt of the earth, and it is therefore your duty to give unbelievers a taste for Christ. Isaiah has provided us with the know-how. He said, it was not by our words, but through our good works that men will see our Father in Heaven. It goes without saying, if our own lives do not measure up to our words and works, we'll fail to dispel the darkness. A good Christian is one who fulfils his duties both to God and to man.

God, having blessed us with the light in Baptism, has laid the consequent duty of sharing that blessing with others, and, above all, not to hide it under a tub. That means we communicate and share not our own light, but rather the light of Christ. St. Paul was

most insistent on this. The Lord has invited every single person to live by His light, and he is asking you to deliver His message to the blind and the deaf. God is asking you to help in the salvation of souls.

You may have commitments, and so may not be able like St. Paul to leave everything and go and spread the word among those who are "hungry. Anyhow, let us look at our own community, and ask ourselves, what did we ever do for anyone? Have you ever felt concern for the needy, and tried to extend a helping hand? There are lay organisations in every parish, who try to do something about it. I know people are most generous to SVP etc., but have you ever considered lending a hand. Mostly, we are inclined to be the hurler on the ditch! Those who do this work for Christ will tell you, it is a joy and a blessing. Nowadays, we hear a lot of the new species of vultures who prey on the aged and the vulnerable. They watch and wait for the chance to steal the little they have, and not content with that, they beat them up to ensure they have got the last penny. Perhaps, we should be asking ourselves, if we could make a contribution to Community Alert.

## FAMILY RESPONSIBILITIES

Some of us reserve our patience and our consideration for outside airing, and seem to forget all about our family responsibilities. I am afraid a lot of us will have to do some rethinking about behaviour in the home. The family after all is the arena and platform where most of us will find the opportunity to bear influence on the lives of others. Innumerable numbers have found God through the good example of their partners. And, when you consider the power and influence of parents on their children, one is bound to ask: what has gone wrong? God will one day ask many, why they failed to discharge their parental duties? It is good to see a family at prayer, and watch them gather around the altar of God. Somehow, fewer of our young people seem to give thought to a more committed service in the Church. It is sad, because the harvest is ready! I feel many parents no longer pray or favour their children entering the Church. I often met this attitude in England. And, now that we have joined the "jet set" young minds are bound to be gripped with the attractive prospects. We could all ask ourselves: what do we want from life? I have no doubt that if we responded to the readings over the last few Sundays, the flowers would once more bloom in our gardens again.

## DAIL REPORT

# Clash On Storm Damage Sees Deasy Ordered Out

Fine Gael T.D. for Waterford, Austin Deasy, was ordered out of the Dail during Question Time last Thursday following a clash with the Ceann Comhairle, Sean Treacy, when he failed to get an assurance from the Minister for Tourism and Transport, Mr. Seamus Brennan, that the extensive storm damage to three tourist resorts in Waterford would be repaired in time for this year's tourist season.

Deputy Deasy's question tioned. asked the Minister for Tourism and Transport if he had been fully appraised of the damage to tourist resorts and facilities on the south and south eastern coastal areas caused by the storm of December 16/17 last; whether he had any consultations in the matter with the Minister for the Marine and Minister for the Environment; and the measures he intended to take to assist the areas and individuals affected to see that their tourist potential for 1990 and subsequent years would not be damaged.

Minister Brennan's reply to the question simply stated: "I have no statutory function in relation to this matter which I understand comes within the brief of my colleagues the Ministers for the Environment and the Marine."

Mr. Deasy — I am sure the Minister is concerned about the destruction of tourist resorts. Is the Minister aware that the three leading tourist resorts on Waterford, Ardmore, Bonmahon and Tramore were savaged by recent storms and that their potential is greatly in danger? Is he prepared to do something about it?

Mr. Brennan — I am concerned about the destruction of any resort since my brief covers the tourism area. I will certainly convey the Deputy's concern to my colleagues at the Department of the Environment and the Department of the Marine and draw their attention to the areas men-

Mr. Deasy — The question was put down two weeks ago and I would have thought the Minister would in the meantime have consulted his colleagues. I can only deduce from what happened yesterday when £1 million was granted to Wexford and Wicklow that we are seeing political patronage of the worst kind. Waterford has been worse affected than any other part of the country by the storm in question and should have received a sizeable amount of money, irrespective of whether money was given to any other area. The County Engineer in Waterford estimates that it will cost £11.5 million to rectify the damage done.

An Ceann Comhairle — I am anxious to assist the Deputy in eliciting information but he may not embark on a speech.

Mr. Deasy — The question has been down for two weeks.

An Ceann Comhairle -That may be so.

Mr. Brennan — To the wrong Minister.

Mr. Deasy - I am absolutely disgusted that the Minister has not concerned himself because of the damage to the tourism industry.

Mr. Brennan — I am concerned, but the Deputy has enough experience to know that this question is down to the wrong Minister.

Mr. J. Bruton - Why did the Minister accept it for answer?

An Ceann Comhairle —

Ouestion No. 7 please. Mr. Deasy — This is political favouritism of the worst kind.

An Ceann Comhairle -This question should not give rise to disorder.

Mr. Deasy — I am insisting that the Minister should give some commitment to the House that funds will be made available, whether from the national Exchequer or from the structural funds in Europe.

An Ceann Comhairle — I have given Deputy Deasy quite a lot of latitude but he must know obey the chair in the final analysis. I am calling Deputy Kavanagh.

Mr. J. Bruton - On a point of order-

An Ceann Comhairle -Sorry, Deputy. I am on my feet deliberating in this House.

Mr. J. Bruton — I wish to draw your attention-An Ceann Comhairle —

To what? Mr. J. Bruton — To a point of order.

An Ceann Comhairle - I am dealing with a point of disorder.

Mr. J. Bruton — Perhaps a point of order might help allay the disorder.

An Ceann Comhairle — Deputy Deasy will have to resume his seat.

Mr. Deasy — I put the question down and I have got no answer.

An Ceann Comhairle - I hesitate to ask the Deputy to leave the House but he will leave me no discretion in the matter if he persists in defying the Chair.

Mr. Deasy — I want some commitment.

An Ceann Comhairle — Deputy Deasy, you have persistently refused to obey the Chair. I must now ask you to leave the House.

Mr. Deasy — One million pounds was given to Wicklow and Wexford. I can only call it political patronage of the worst kind.

An Ceann Comhairle -Either resume your seat forthwith or leave the House.

Deputy Deasy then left the house.

# The Dungarvan

In March 1859, a local landowner and amateur naturalist in Dungarvan, Edward Brennan came across a quarry worker in the town square showing an immensely large bone to the admiring locals. It had been discovered under the solid rock which at the time was being quarried at Shandon. Asking the quarry man to pass any such finds to him, he eventually came into possession of what was found to be the remains of a mammoth elephant, together with the fossilised bones of bears and reindeer.

The discovery caused great excitement among the scientific establishment and in the local community. Mr. Brennan prepared a paper which was read to the Royal Dublin Society in June 1859 and published in their scientific journal. Among the locals the area always had a very bad reputation being considered a haunted place and the dwelling of some evil spirit.

The quarrying had exposed a cave at the far side of the first quarry, now the site of the cattle mart. It was 100 feet in from the original quarry face and 30' underground. Many Dungarvan folk will remember this heavily wooded area, it's an ideal playground for cowboys and indians and other games of childhood later it was used as a training ground for the FCA in preparing for their annual camps.

The mammoth elephant was the prime discovery and from the remains, Professor Ownes and Dr. Carte of Dublin were able to deduce most of the salient facts about this extinct mammal. It was 15' high, about 24' long, had small ears and relatively short hind legs. It carried magnificent tusks and a double covering of thick wool and very long hair. Unfortunately half the bones had been pulverised and removed before Mr. Brennan came on the scene, but from the remaining parts it was esti-

mated that the bones were about 14,000 years old.

Being of a religious disposition, Edward attempted to relate his finds to various Biblical events. He thought that the animals in the cave had fled there for refuge from the flood and had died there like all living things outside the ark. "It must be have been many ages," he muses poetically, "since the elephant stood on the picturesque heights of Shandon, surveying the winding course of the Colligan beneath.

The Shandon discovery was the first example of a bone cave in Ireland. Similar fossil remains had been found in Siberia and the lower Arctic.

Thus, fourteen thousand years ago, the country must have been much colder and the mountains and valleys must have been well covered with forests. In the last two centuries a feature of the Dungarvan market was the massive loads of bog timber on sale for fuel and lighting. Brennan himself observed the remains of over thirty oak trees being removed from a bog called Loch-Na-Gceann at Mapstown.

#### EXTENSIVE STUDY

Edward Brennan made an extensive study of the caves and caverns in the neighbourhood of Dungarvan as the strata of carboniferous limestone in the region gave rise to many interesting geological features. At Mapstown, at Ceilliscul, and

Knockalara, streams carrying considerable volumes of water disappear into fissures in the rock. The last stream, the Magaha, turned a mill at Nicholastown, enters a gully in the limestone and reappears at Bewley after a subterraneous passage of two miles.

Caves were also found at Cuilnadamh, Pollnageat and Magnageolur (cave of the pigeons), this last cave containing magnificent stalactites and stalagmites. He also discovered in another Shandon cave, the store house of an ancient Irish Chieftain, together with valuable domestic items such as vases, scissors and fish hooks.

The salvaged bones of the Shandon Mammoth are stored in the Palaeontological Section of the Natural Science Museum, and there are plans to put them on permanent exhibition when the present renovations there are completed. But, as almost half the bones were removed with the rocks that were employed for road repairs, remember as you stroll down the street in Dungarvan you may be walking on the bones of one of our most famous residents!

# Tallow And Lismore To Have Better Public Lighting

The arrival of electricity in the early part of the nineteenth century must have revolutionised people's lifestyle. The electricity was connected to homes in West Waterford in 1926.

Public lighting has in recent years come in for severe criticism from the general public as towns have suffered from a deteriorating dull and dismal lighting system. Public representatives have highlighted the problem of inadequate lighting over the years. At times low voltage and dirty light shades were thought to contribute to the problem.

A positive breakthrough came last year when Tallow Councillor Willie Mc-Donnell made a successful bid to the ESB to erect more powerful and extra lights in the towns of Tallow, Lismore and Cappoquin.

The ESB started work in Cappoquin last October. The completed work resulted in a major improvement in the town's lighting sys-

At a recent area meeting of the County Council, Cllr. McDonnell again raised the issue of town lighting and asked that both Tallow and Lismore be supplied with the same good lighting system as Cappoquin. He also requested that extra lights be erected on the outskirts of each town.

Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer, told him that extra lights had been granted and work will start in Tallow and Lismore in April. Tallow will get 28 extra lights and Lismore 43 lights. The new lights will be erected on most of the existing poles. New poles

and lights will be placed in the new housing areas and extended to the outlying areas of the towns.

The ESB are experimenting with the new lights in Tallow which are yellow in colour. These lights are initially very expensive but are expected to use less electricity over a 12 months period than other

Councillor McDonnell thanked Mr. O'Flynn and the Co. Council for their persistent efforts to improve the lighting system in the three towns. He added that the people in West Waterford are now leading the field as far as public lighting is concerned.

# WHAT THE BUDGET FAILED TO DO

The official announcement last week-end that the country's jobless figures had risen by 3,339 in January more than took much of the gloss off the Budget which had been greeted by such a fanfare in the previous week.

The Central Statistics Office disclosed last Friday that the January total of those signing on the "live register" was 234,467, an increase of 3,339 on the previous month. An effort was then made to benumb the impact by referring to "seasonally adjusted" figures, but the fact of the matter is that the figures confirm a further significant wintertime jump in the number of people now unemployed in Ireland.

The substantial rise in the unemployment figures sharply highlights the fact that no priority was accorded to job creation in the Budget and floors the government claims that the measures taken in Finance Minister Reynold's package would improve the conditions and incentives to accelerate the growth in employment. It goes further and firmly indicates that the government has no coherent jobs strategy, a fact reinforced by the budget which again increased the employers' PRSI contributions.

The present Minister for Industry, Mr. Des O'Malley, before he and his PD colleagues threw in their lot with Fianna Fail to form a government, very correctly declared that providing jobs was one of the most heavily taxed procedures in the country. Apart from the actual wage content involved, there were such added hidden costs as PRSI, insurance, superannuation and such like and where the small employer was concerned these proved the greatest disincentives to job creation at this level. The government has done nothing to lighten such burdens in order to encourage small concerns to create some extra jobs.

Significantly absent from Mr. Reynolds' Budget also was any provision to fund repairs of the extensive storm damage suffered by the maritime counties of the south and south-east including Co. Waterford in the big storm of December 16-17 and which have been greatly aggravated by the continuing storms which have lashed the coastline for the past fortnight.

It would appear, in the circumstances, that the only hope which these storm lashed counties now

have of finding the kind of financial help which they have been crying out for in recent weeks is in Europe where moves are being made to obtain help from the EC Regional Fund. Certainly the government has so far given no indication as to whether the Department of the Environment and/or of the Marine have any intention of providing such assistance.

# TO FORM WATERFORD BRANCH OF ALZHEIMER SOCIETY

Alzheimer's Disease made the front pages of the world press when it was discovered that Rita Hayworth, the beautiful film star of the 50's, was one of its victims. It can strike anyone.

It is a disease which causes intellectual disturbance by damaging some cells of the brain. It is particularly sad when if affects younger people, but is is also known to be commoner amongst the elderly and is the most frequent cause of mental deterioration in later life.

The rapid increase in the number of older people in our country is beginning to focus attention upon this condition, but still surprisingly few are aware of the existence of the disease or its significance to both younger and older patients and their relatives and helpers, although there are probably 20,000 Alzheimer sufferers in Ireland

Tragic as Alzheimer's is for its victims, the brunt of the problem must be borne by the families and friends who care for them. Their task is an extremely difficult and demanding one. There are no easy answers to the problems they must face, no simple rules to follow that will work every time.

To help those faced with such a family problem, a Waterford Branch of the Alzheimer Society of Ireland is now to be formed and anyone who is interested in the formation or in attending branch meetings can obtain further particulars by contacting Tony Barden at 051/77214.

## A HUGE SEND UP

The manner in which our local contemporary featured the story about a major archaeological discovery in the village of Ballyduff with a front page four column spread last week indicates that they failed to recognise it as a huge send up to highlight the forthcoming Drama Festival in the Blackwater village.

It is difficult to understand why the novel press release was not at once seen for what it really was with references to plastics being in use in the ninth century and that at that time the river Lee ran through Ballyduff. It was, of course, extremely comical and should never have been treated as a factual report as was done by having it printed as the main story of the week on the front

We must admit that the press release was indeed a novel one and displayed the excellent classical knowledge of the PRO responsible for compiling it. So good, in fact, was it that many people in Ballyduff at first believed it and thought what a wonderful thing it was that such valuable ancient treasures had been located in their area. That some University students had, in fact, been active in the locality during the past summer season added further credence to the story but when we were in Ballyduff on Monday morning last we were informed that these students had not been involved in anything like an archaeological "dig" but were there pursuing some form of entomical studies.

Anyway when the people of Ballyduff came to the realisation that far from being factual the whole thing was a joke and had never been intended to be taken in any other but in a jocose manner, their reaction changed. Several felt they had been fooled and at least one expressed the view that because of the manner in which the situation had developed because of the way in which it was handled, the idea which was aimed at winning good publicity for the Ballyduff Drama Festival might well

boomerang on the event. We sincerely hope that this will not be the end result.

The manner in which this Ballyduff "archaeological find" has now garnered so much negative publicity reminds us of the story of the two editors of rival provincial papers which flourished away back in the 1940's (both have since ceased publication). One was strong with a large circulation, the other small with a limited readership.

The editor of the smaller paper was an extremely, intelligent well-read man while the other was a thick-headed, boastful character. To make a long story short, the small editor got a friend to send a report to the editor of the larger journal that an upright stone of archaeological importance had been discovered in a field in a nearby townland with the following Latin inscription: FORAS SESTO RUBON. The big editor duly published the report and asked readers for their views as to the inscription.

It was then the small editor scored. In a letter to the big man he declared — "we are afraid that your classical education must have been sadly neglected. The "Latin" inscription which you published last week simply requires to be properly spaced when it then correctly states: FOR ASSES TO RUB ON!"

It would appear that like those on our local contemporary the big editor swallowed the story of the archaeological "find" hook, line and sinker and published it as fact having failed to recognise it as fiction.

While everyone agrees that apartheid should be dismantled, such questions as how can this be brought about in the light of the latest developments in South Africa; Can it be achieved by maintaining or even by stepping up international sanctions or what, if any, are the alternatives? continue to arise and create divisions. These questions will be addressed by the participants in the Concern debate on Thursday, February 15 commencing at 8 p.m., so it should prove an informative and entertaining evening for all who attend.

## **Court Gives Youghal** Man One Final Chance - Or Else

The former P.R.O. of Youghal A.F.C., who fraudulently converted club funds totalling more than £300 to his own personal use in 1988, must make restitution in full by May 1 or serve six months imprisonment.

That was the decision of District Justice W. F. O'-Connell at Youghal Court last Friday in an adjourned case against 38 year old Daniel O'Keeffe, 36 Sarsfield's Terrace, Youghal.





# Proposed New Playing Rules

At the closing date for motions and nominations for Annual Congress on Saturday last, only a small number of counties submitted motions dealing with the proposed new playing rules and if this is taken as an indication of the interest in the changes, the sponsors could find it difficult to get them accepted. Many of the national papers are cynical about the changes and have been crusading for their rejection, but wisely delegates at Congress ignore these pests and do their own thing.

What our 'own thing' will be in the case of the playing rules, has yet to be decided. Coisde Gnotha have decided that time for a discussion on the proposed playing rule changes, will be allowed at the March meeting.

On next Sunday at Leamybrien, players from Wicklow and Waterford, as well as all patrons attending the game, will be invited to tick-off their preferences on a small hand-out which will be issued going in to the game. Free Kicks: Not including penalties) — 3 (a) — A player who is fouled shall have the option of taking the kick from his hands, or the ground, at the point where the foul occurred, or alternatively leaving it for another player, to take from the ground on receipt of an appropriate signal (whistle) from the referee.

(a) - A team which is awarded a free as a result of a Category D Offence, shall have the option of taking the kick from his hands, or from the ground, at the point where the foul occurred, on receipt of an appropriate signal (whistle) from the referee.

(c) Teeing up the ball, i.e., kicking a divot or creating any form of elevated platform for the purpose of taking a free kick from the ground shall be prohibited.

Infringement: (Penalty for advancing beyond point where the free is to be taken or teeing up the ball) Throw-in where the offence occurred.

Sideline Kick: 4. To be taken from the hands where the ball crossed the line on receipt of an appropriate signal (whistle) from the referee.

Infringement: (Penalty for advancing beyond the point where the kick is to be taken). Throw-in where the ball crossed the line.

Hand Pass: 5. — There must be a definite striking

Two-handed: The striking hand (open/closed) must not be in contact with the ball immediately before delivering the strike.

One-handed: The ball must be tossed and struck with the same hand (open/closed).

A throw-in is defined as follows: (a) When the ball is held in both hands and played away by releasing it from both hands simultaneously; (b) when the ball is pose a problem.

Kick-out — 2 (a) — All propriate signal (whistle) held in one hand and played away directly, without being struck, by that hand.

Infringement: (Category D Offence) - Free kick from where the offence occurred.

#### HURLING

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
## OPENING IN TALLOW
