## Drama Festival Begins On Saturday

The Waterford Open Drama Festival will be officially opened by Maurice O'Doherty, R.T.E. President of Irish Actors Equity, at the Friary Hall, Dungarvan, on Saturday next, 7th February at 8.15 p.m. There are thirteen full length plays from seven Counties in competition for All-Ireland nomination and the festival will continue until Thursday, 19th February.

The adjudicator is Gerda Redlich of Vienna, the actress who defied Hitler.

The festival committee have spent £1,300 to improve stage lighting at the Friary Hall. Advance booking at Jack Murphy's Shop, Main Street, Dungarvan. Phone (058) 41527.

The first play will be "The Vigil" a play based on the Resurrection presented by Holycross, Co. Tipperary, who last year won the Dr. Russell trophy for the best play in the rural section.

The Hon. Patron of the festival Most Rev. Dr. Russell, D.D., Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, will be in attendance on opening night along with other distinguished guests. The adjudicator this year is Miss Gerda Redlich, an international actress and filmmaker, who now lives in Manchester. Miss Redlich is well known all over Ireland and has adjudicated at twenty drama festivals in this country including a recent one in Thurles. She is just back from Berlin after working there on a TV play. Miss Redlich was involved in a political revue in Vienna in 1940 when Hitler invaded Austria. Condemned to the gas chambers and with U.S. agents closing in on her, she escaped on skis over the Alps and joined a travelling circus in Italy. In 1945 she continued her acting career and has played in every European country including Russia. A really entertaining person, she will enjoy her constructive and witty criticism.

Other plays in the festival include "Mick and Mick" a good modern comedy by Hugh Leonard, presented by Gorey Little Theatre Group; "The Man from Clare" and "The Black Stranger" by Blackwater; "Kilmeen" and "Dear Antoine" by Jean Anouilh. Included in the Rathvilly cast are a young Co. Waterford couple Mr. and Mrs. Tom Conery. Mrs. Conery is the former Deirdre Murphy N.T. a native of Kilmestomas, who now live in Carrigrohane.

The festival will conclude with a dinner dance in the Devonshire Arms Hotel on Friday, 20th February. Tickets for this social are now available from the hon. secretary Mrs. Ann Power, Killosera, Dungarvan.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mr. Editor,  
Please allow me through the medium of your popular newspaper to answer, and more importantly to "nail" the campaign of vilification which has been directed towards me from certain quarters during the past week.

Following last Monday week's meeting of the Urban Council, someone, with apparently the sole purpose in mind of wronging me and the Flanna Fall party generally, put out the scurrilous and untrue allegation that my party had used its overall majority on the Council to deprive the Dungarvan Soccer Club of a playing pitch at Quans. "On a 5-4 vote Flanna Fall have deprived the club of their pitch," the rumour mongers declared.

But, alas that untruth flourished. There were only six of the nine members present at the Council meeting, three F.F. and three Coalition members.

Let me state quite unequivocally that there never was a vote of any kind taken at the meeting as to whether or not the Soccer Club should be given a pitch. Enough for that particular distortion! But worse was to follow from my point of view. It was stated, had gone out of my way to oppose the pitch for the club. That sufficed to spark off just about the greatest character assassination of all time. People literally jumped on the bandwagon and utilised the opportunity to vilify me. But worse still the Dungarvan G.A.A. club of which I am very proud to be a member of, also suffered at the tongues of the rumour mongers. Why the G.A.A. Club should be dragged into it I'll never know. I certainly don't represent the club on Dungarvan Urban Council.

Let me put the facts truthfully. Since becoming a member of the Council in June '74, I have consistently supported allocating a playing pitch to Dungarvan A.F.C. That support was again forthcoming last week and indeed I spoke in support of Senator

Austin Deasy when he expressed the view that the soccer club should have jurisdiction over the proposed soccer field at Quans.

On more than one occasion I used the Press columns at my disposal in another weekly newspaper to highlight the club's great plight of not having a "home" of their own. Soccer club officials even thanked me personally for my stand on their behalf. Do they seriously suggest then that I would now turn around and inflict a stab in the back on them? Truly is eaten bread soon forgotten.

Of course the soccer club official who addressed a function in a local hotel on Wednesday night of last week and expressed his regret and sadness that politics should enter into sport in Dungarvan was right. Only instead of inferring that it was the Flanna Fall party who had done so he should have looked over his shoulder in another direction.

And then to cap it all I understand, a Sunday news paper reporter was summoned to Dungarvan, to tell all his readers of what Johnny Murphy and his fellow Flanna Fall councillors had done. Well his visit was a futile one - unless of course he went to the trouble of ascertaining where the slanderous untruths emanated from in the first instance.

I think it is safe to say at this stage that even those who have revelled in spreading the untruths now know the real truth. But if there are some who still feel like carrying them on I would dearly wish they would repeat them to me in the presence of an independent witness.

Finally Mr. Editor, may I say that despite the vilification directed at me and the Dungarvan G.A.A. Club, I will continue to do as I have been doing for the best nineteen months - fighting for a playing pitch for Dungarvan A.F.C. at Quans. It is no more than the club deserves.

## WATERFORD COMMUNITY GAMES

### FACTS ABOUT COMMUNITY GAMES

Community Games had its birthplace in Dublin in 1968, when 24 communities competed in athletic finals in Santry Stadium. Successive years increased its interest and in no time it caught the imagination of most counties in Ireland. For example here is a recording of the development of Community Games areas in Waterford, 1973-10; 1974 - 15; 1975-23.

Community games went nationally in 1970 but this was only in athletics which were held in Santry Stadium up to 1972. In 1973 Community Games achieved its ultimate aim to involve all its sporting activities in a mini Olympic style village where children of the various age groups 8-16 years could be entertained socially and sportingly in friendly competitions. That year from April to September over 800,000 children were activated in the various competitions and eventually through Provincial elimination, the successful 2,500 made their way by train, bus and car to Bultin's Holiday Camp, Mosney, for the greatest final event ever witnessed in Ireland.

This, indeed, put Community Games on the brink of real achievement and a great effort was put into the 1974 games. The whole country was alert with enthusiasm and county areas not involved before were showing an interest and were producing young people who had not shown sporting ability before. They were discovering new interests and becoming involved. In 1975, Community Games expanded all the time and the number of children involved is increasing at local, county and national level at a fantastic rate.

**PARTICIPATION AND INVOLVEMENT**  
This is the true concept of Community Games. Its purpose is to interest children in healthy sporting exercises and to develop them in the spirit of their choice. Community games should not be regarded as a big sporting event but rather a means by which children can obtain an interest and use it to the fullest in their leisure periods.

National sporting organisations will have to appreciate the role community games are endeavouring to play which will assist them greatly in building up the membership of their clubs. Community Games will activate community areas, thereby interesting children in sport and encouraging them to get involved in sporting clubs.

**WINNING ISN'T EVERYTHING**  
This is the message the Games people are endeavouring to get across to the children, something they can't possibly hope to succeed in without the full assistance of parents. In these times where victory at all costs can be the object of the game, sport has tended to become very competitive. Anything less than reaching the pinnacle is regarded as failure. Community Games hope to overcome this by placing the emphasis on participation and involvement. Their progress over the past seven years is an indication of the need that existed for such an organisation.

**NOTICE BY THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS**  
**VALUE-ADDED TAX**  
**CHANGES EFFECTIVE**  
**FROM 1st MARCH 1976**

On and from 1 March, 1976, the following changes will be introduced:

- goods and services at present chargeable to V.A.T. at 6.75% will become chargeable at 10%, and goods and services at present chargeable at 19.5% will become chargeable at 20%;
- passenger motor vehicles (including motor cycles) at present chargeable to V.A.T. at 6.75% on sale by persons who are not assemblers of these goods will become chargeable at 10%; the 36.75% rate applicable at present to sales by assemblers, and to imports by non-assemblers, will become 35%;
- radios, television sets, record players and records at present chargeable to VAT at 6.75% on sales by persons who are not manufacturers of those goods will become chargeable at 10%; the 36.75% rate applicable at present to sales by manufacturers, and to imports by non-manufacturers, will become 40%;
- articles of clothing made wholly or partly of natural fur skin at present free of VAT, will become chargeable at the rate of 20%. Clothing of woolled sheep or lamb skin, clothing trimmed with natural fur skin to an extent not exceeding one-fifth of the area of the outside material, and all footwear will remain free of VAT;
- short-term hirings of passenger motor vehicles at present exempt from VAT will become chargeable at 10% bringing these hirings into line with other hirings;
- building and certain associated services at present chargeable to VAT at an effective rate of 3.0375% (6.75% on 45% of the price) will become chargeable at an effective rate of 3% (10% on 60% of the price);
- dances at present chargeable to VAT at 11.11% will become chargeable at 10% bringing the rate into line with the rate on other forms of entertainment;
- the arrangement under which a registered person is entitled to a tax credit equal to one per cent of the price paid in respect of the purchase from unregistered producers of agricultural produce or fish will be discontinued; and
- sales of cattle, sheep and pigs by registered persons, at present liable at an effective rate of 1% (6.75% of 14.81% of value), will be maintained at that rate by charging them at the new 10% rate on 10% of the value. There will be no change in the VAT treatment of clothing, generally (other than certain fur skin clothing) or of food, electricity, gas and certain other fuels. These will continue to be free of tax.

A leaflet setting out full details of the changes will be distributed shortly to all persons who are registered for VAT.

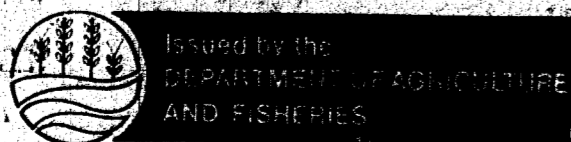

The Budget provided no stimulant for expansion in agriculture, said L.F.A. President, Mr. T. J. Maher. This contrasted with what the Minister for Finance told an I.F.A. delegation that he met earlier this week, when he declared he was very conscious of the contribution which the agricultural industry made to our balance of payments in 1975.

CAP For Potatoes

Proposals emanating from the European Commission in Brussels on a common Agricultural Policy for potatoes could have very serious implications for the future of the industry here if implemented without considerable changes.

While welcoming the suggestion that grading and quality standards would be introduced, Mr. Wilkinson pointed out that the suggestion that marketing and development grants would only apply through produced groups and so the less well organised areas of the community would suffer.

A meeting of the main interests involved in production will be held in the Department of Agriculture this week to discuss the proposals with the objective of approaching Brussels with a united voice.

In regard to the present market situation, Mr. Wilkinson, on behalf of the committee, is advising growers to continue marketing of potato stocks in a responsible manner. In this way available stocks should prove adequate to meet all demands.

Mr. Wilkinson further advises growers to make provision to ensure that they retain sufficient seed for planting this season and growers not having adequate to do so should take immediate steps to procure their requirements.
