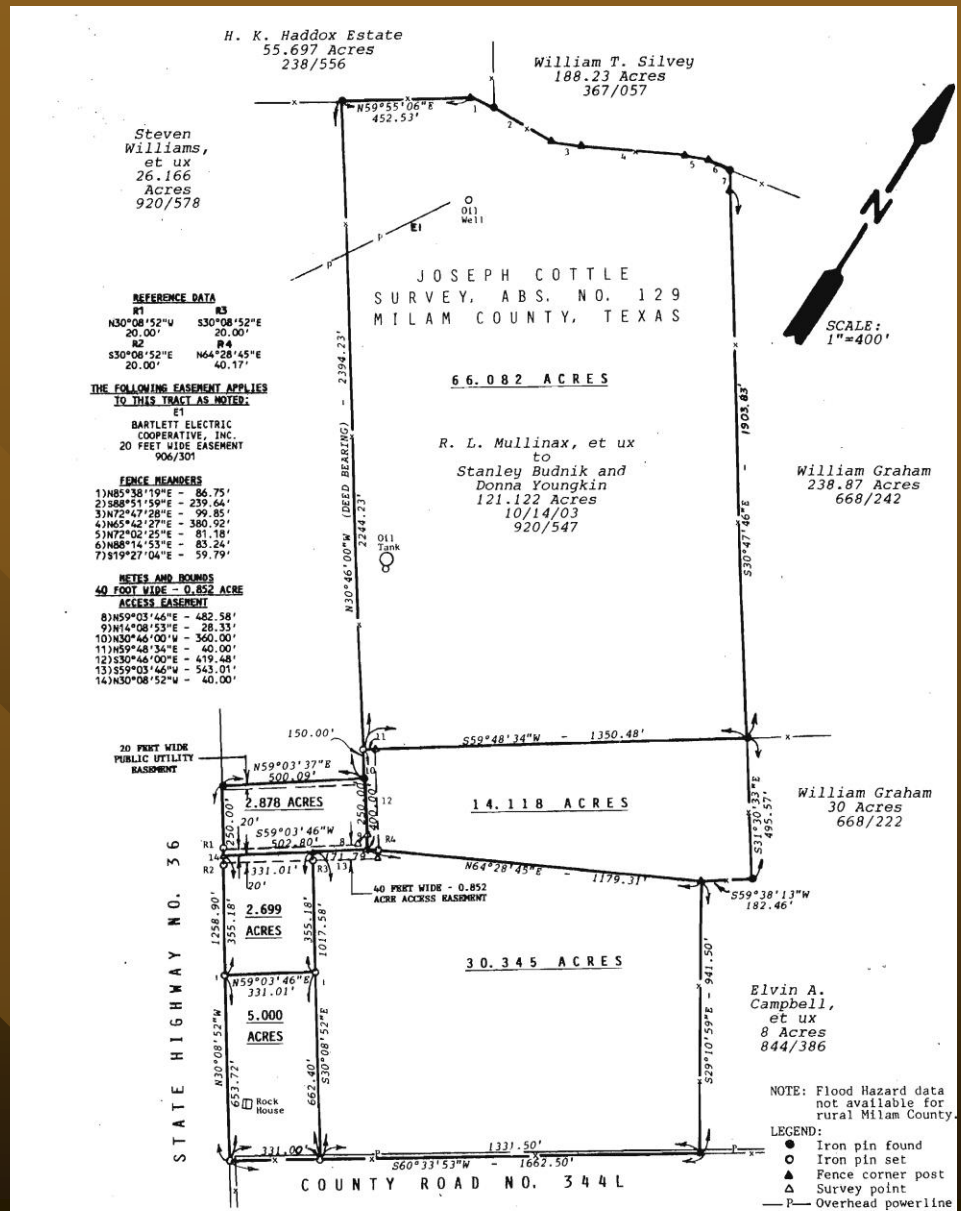

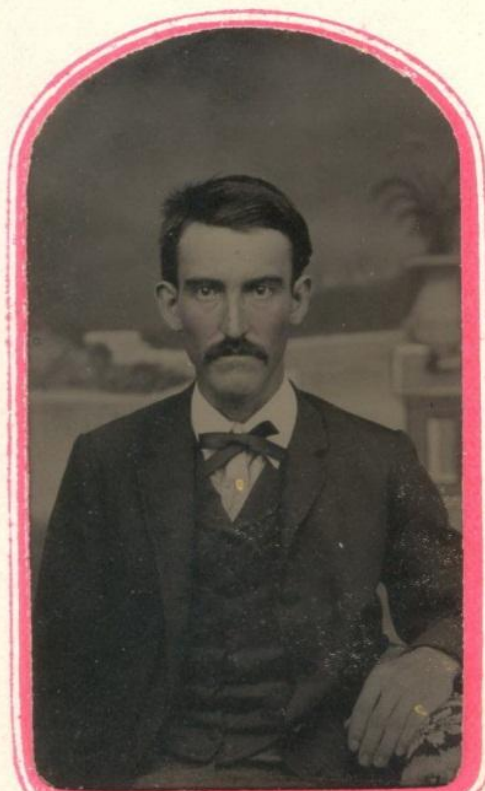

George W. Beard Is Buried at Milano

Brother of Former Representative
Had Lived in Milam County
For 64 Years

George W. Beard died at his home, the old rock house, near Milano Sunday and was buried at Sand Point Cemetery Monday. Mr. Beard had resided in that community since 1864, with the exception of a year spent in Ohio. His parents, Coleman C. and Louisa Stratton Beard, were pioneer settlers and reared a family of prominent citizens. Coleman C. Beard was four years in the Confederate service, and died shortly thereafter and left a widow and children to fight the battle of life without a husband and father. Educational opportunities were poor, but by home study and extensive reading, George became a well informed man.

In 1906 he and Miss Amanda Harrel of Calvert were united in marriage. One son, George H. and the wife together with two brothers, the Hon. C. M. Beard of Milano and Andrew Beard of the valley country, survive him.

Deceased had been a consistent Christian and a member of the Christian church fifty years. Rev. Dan Bounds of Rockdale conducted the funeral and a large concourse of relatives and friends attended the services. The floral offerings were profuse and beautiful.

Misses Leila Woolley and Lillian Atkinson and Mrs. Kathryn K. Robbins, Judge John Watson, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Beard and Mrs. V. P. Woolley attended the funeral of Mr. George W. Beard of Milano Monday.



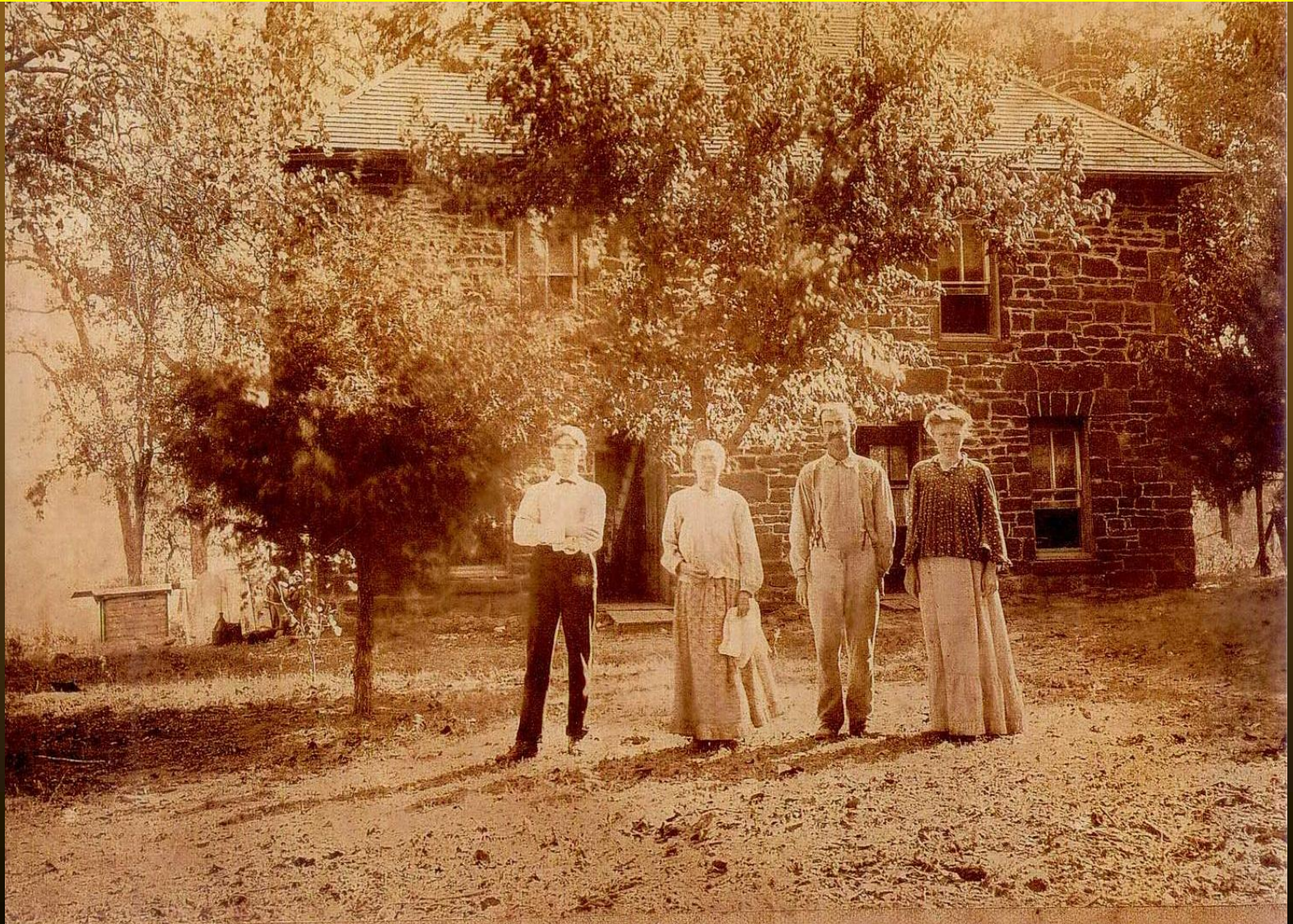

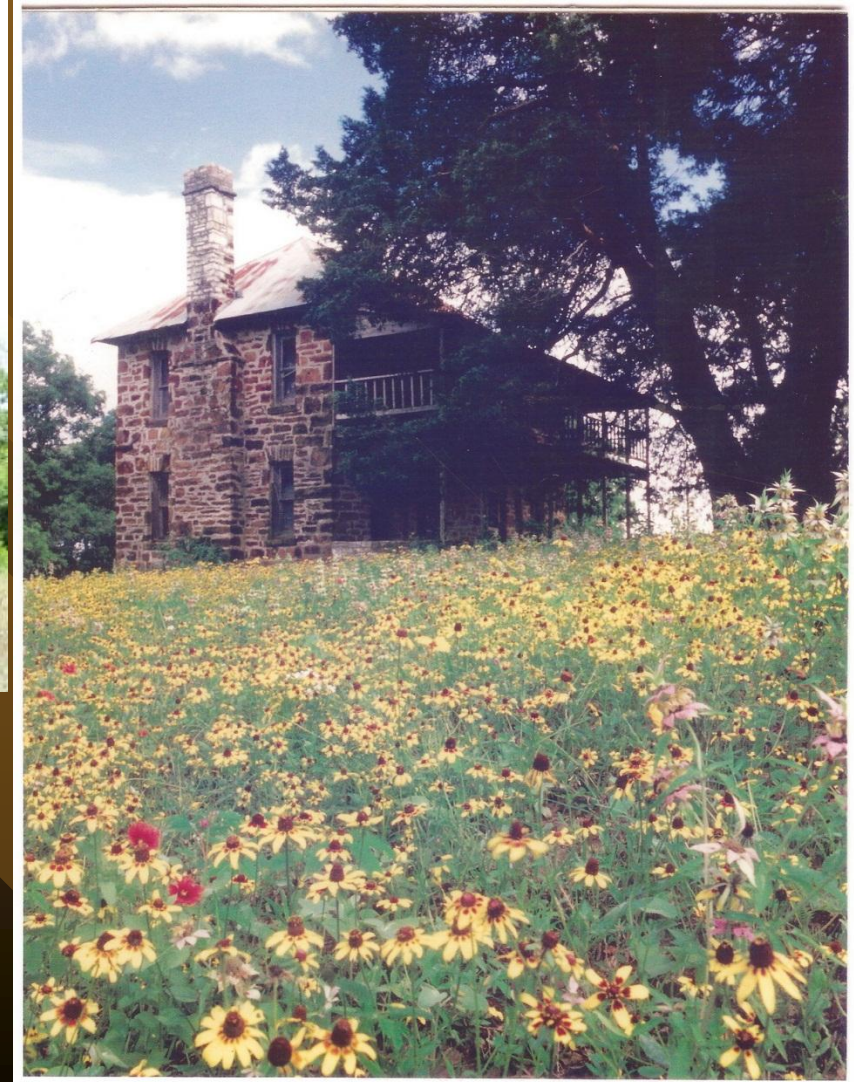

Rock house of ages

Anthropology prof renovating South Milam landmark

MILANO—In rural areas, sometimes landmarks become icons and so is the case with the "old rock house" off Texas 36 about two miles south of Milano. Dr. Donny Hamilton, head of the Anthropology department at Texas A&M University, has taken on a "labor of love" to restore the 120-year-old home site, starting with the locally famous two-story house.

Hamilton has visitors stop and tell him of folklore stories of haunting ghosts, floors invested with rattlesnakes and bodies in the well, none of which are true. It was also thought that the home was once used as a stagecoach relay station, also not true according to the Feres, Texas native, who has done extensive research on the homestead and Beard family.

He said it is sure that a work weekend goes by that he does not have someone stop by to talk about the Milam County relic. Oh, and the tales of a body in the well, the ghost of a 13-year-old girl in the house and picture showing the silhouette of man in top hat are all false as well, Hamilton said.

"It is interesting owning an icon," he joked. "My family thinks I'm crazy."

Big decision
Like a lot of people, Hamilton was driving by and thought how awful that no one is doing anything to the old house.

"I hated for it to just be worn down," he said.

Once he decided to buy the house and the surrounding five-acre tract, it took Hamilton about two weeks to track down the owners and ask to purchase the local relic. He purchased it 28 months later and the restoration of the home began in July 2010. For "Mama"

The home was originally built in 1901 by George W. Beard for his widowed mother, Louisa America Stratton Beard. His wife Amanda, also lived in the home. At the time of its completion, the home

had four rooms, two fire places and a kitchen separated from the main house by a large back porch or gallery. One of the two chimneys still stands. The other was struck by lightning at some point in the last 30 years.

The Beard family originally moved to the Cedar Creek area just south of Milano in 1864. Louisa and her four sons built and ran the family farm while her husband was off fighting the war as a member of the Confederate Army.

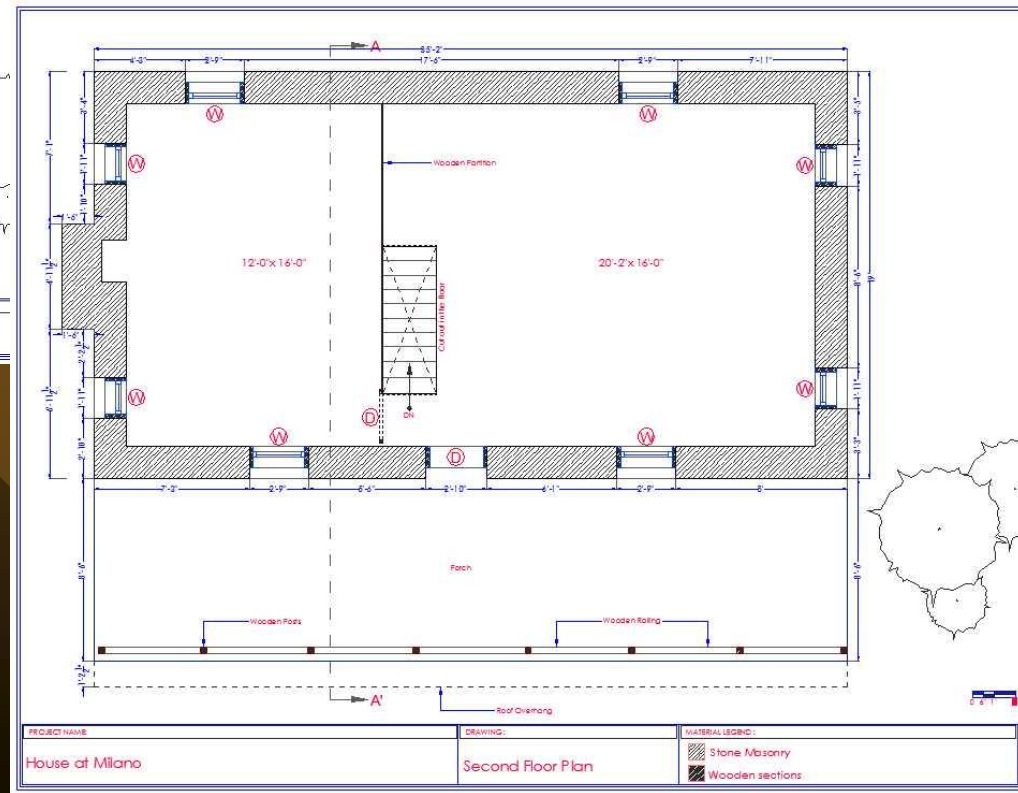
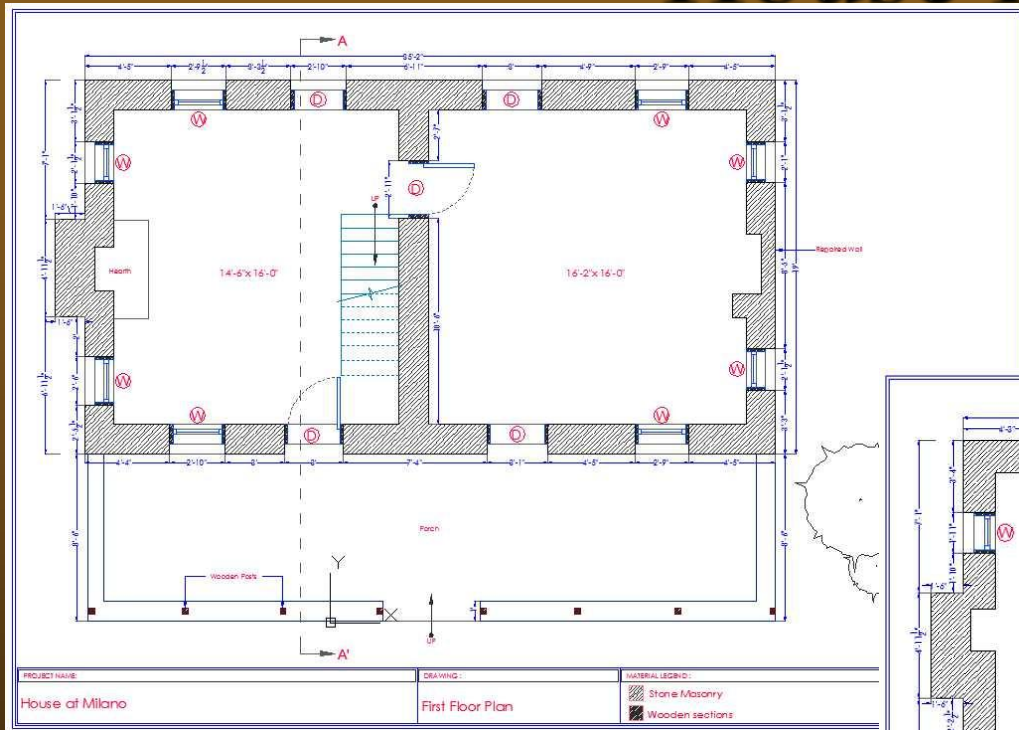

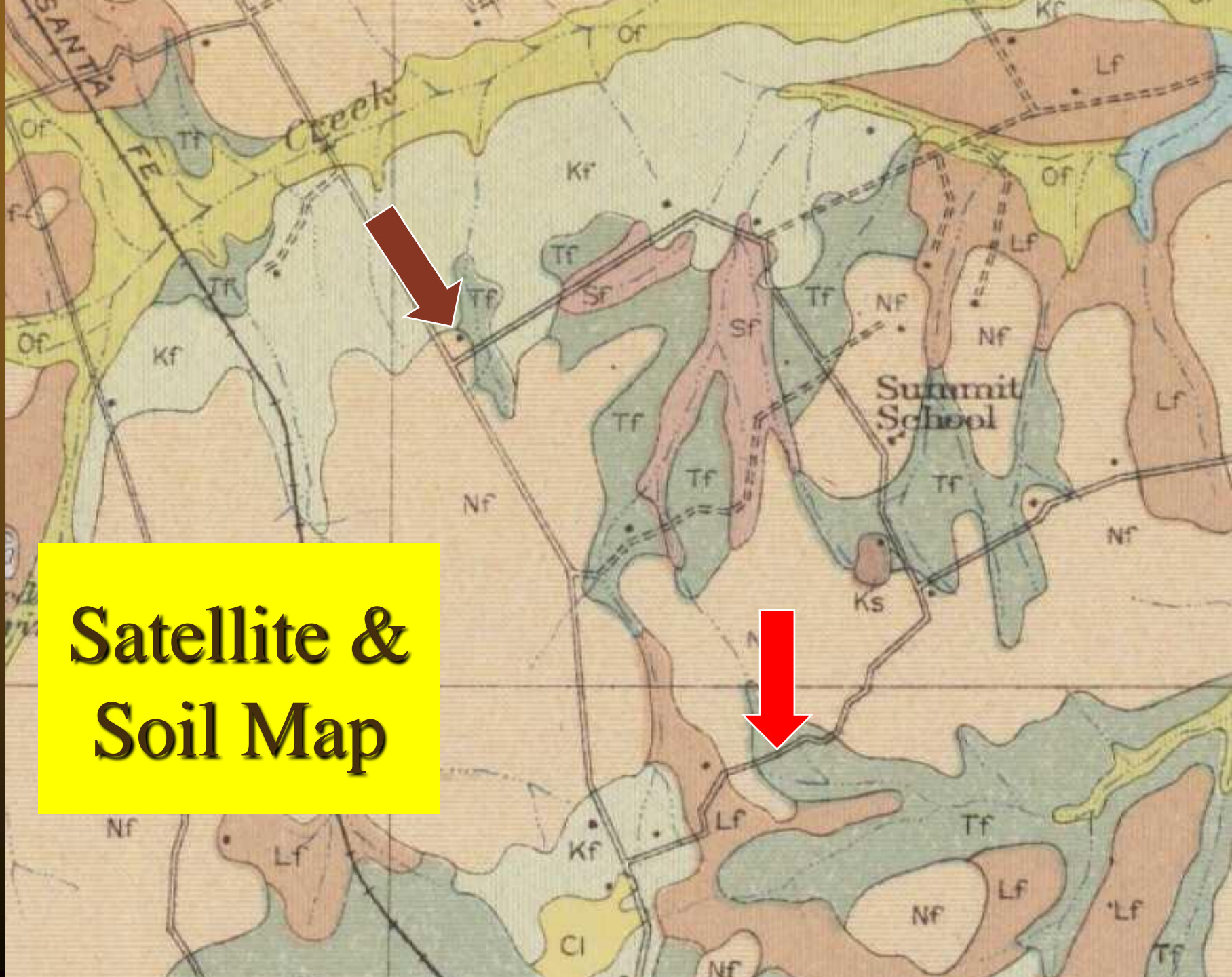


House Plan

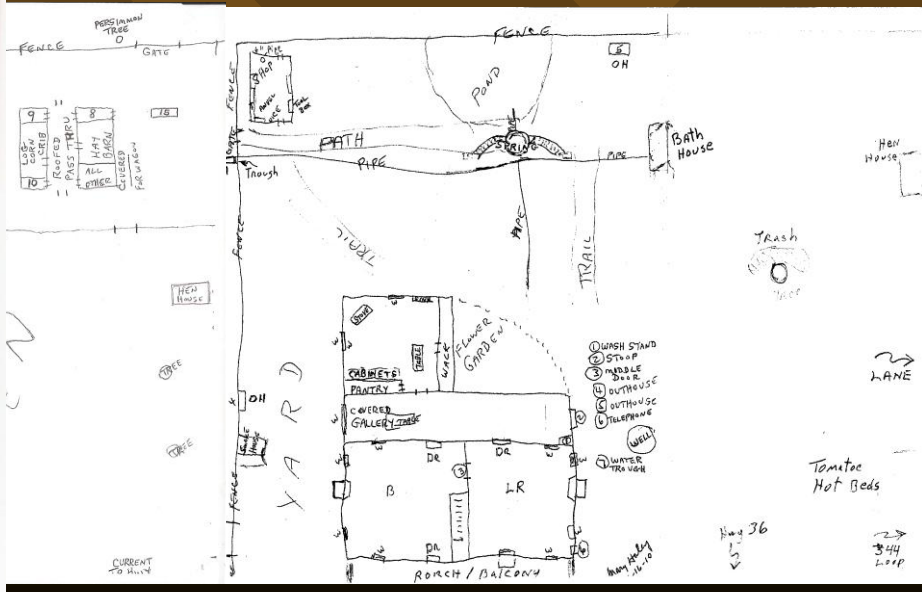

- For best red sweet potatoes, 1st prize.
- For best onions, 1st prize.
- For best pop corn, 2nd prize.

Mrs. Beard was also the winner of first prize in another contest and second prize in two other events. The fact that she was the 184th exhibitor at the Fair renders her achievement all the more gratifying.

The success of Mrs. Beard's exhibits on this occasion serves to demonstrate the fact that the products of the soil of the Milano country can compete successfully with those of any other section of Texas.

G.W. appears several times in the Milano Gazette from 1919-1925:

Milano Gazette, July 5, 1919: Local News Items Round About Town

Mr. G.W. Beard left a couple of whopper onions of the Australian Brown variety at the Gazette office one day this week that beat anything we have seen in the onion line. One of the onions he brought weighed two pounds. Mr. Beard says he planted the seed in February of 1918 and then planted the sets that fall, so the onions have been almost a year and a half in attaining the huge and wonderful growth.

Australian Brown Onions

Milano Gazette, November 29, 1919: Mr. G.W. Beard says: This great scarcity of farm labor is going to mean a serious matter if present conditions keep up. People are just simply refusing to work on the farms even at good pay for their work. They prefer to work in towns and cities. There must be a back to the farm movement sometimes, and if it doesn't materialize in due course of time, then the people who go to the stores to buy their flour and clothing will some day find there isn't any to be bought. The young men of today who are making big salaries had better save the greater part of it and buy a farm as soon as they can.

Milano Gazette, June 4, 1921: Mr. G.W. Beard of the Cedar Creek Country brought in two crates of tomatoes Monday of this week, May 30, which were, as far as we know, the first tomatoes of the season. They were good ripe tomatoes, of [illegible transcription] pack and were sold to the J.D. Peeples store at \$2 a crate. This is about a week late for the first crate of Milano tomatoes, which usually arrive in the local market in May 24th to May 26th.

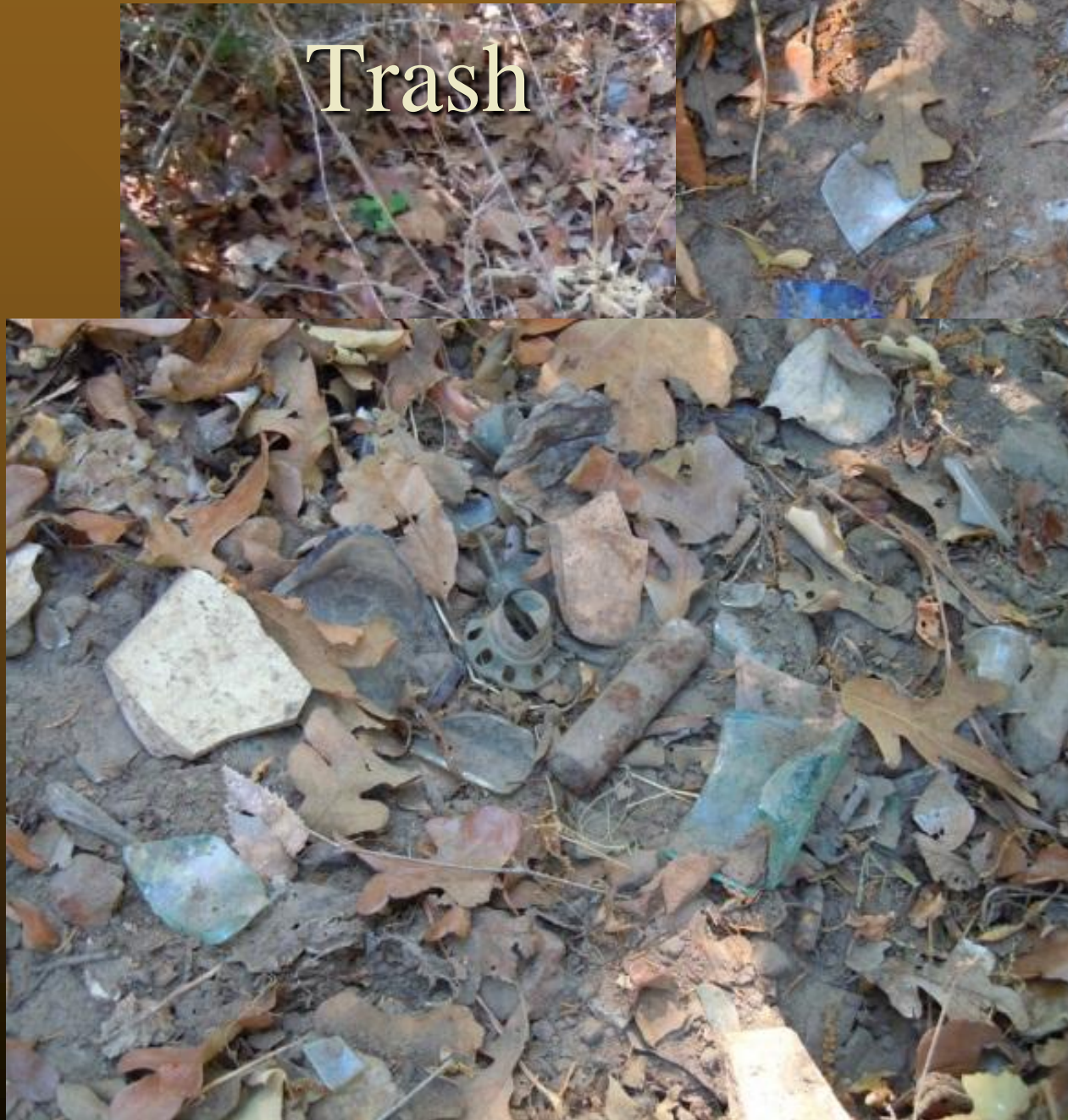
