Good use for bad peppers

razilian peppers are hateful. Their hearts are filled with malice.

As interesting as they may appear when trimmed, they are twisted always.

Évil. Their existential mission is to envelop the world. Or certainly my world.

After a decade battling this flora of the damned at home, this I fully believe: The devil created Brazilian peppers.

That said, it was a revelation to come across Bill Hobson

recently at the Englewood Farmers Market. Hobson is a woodworker, a former carpenter and construction superintendent who retired here from Rochester, N.Y., three years ago.

He is 64, with a full beard straight out of the old Yankee workshop. The day we spoke he was wearing a bright, tie-dyed Haight-Ashbury T-shirt. It fit.

To keep busy in retirement, Hobson makes wooden birdhouses in his portion of the garage. (Wife Stacy gets the other half for things like a car). He also — and here is the key to my admiration — transforms branches of Brazilian pepper trees into chairs, tables and stools that are works of art. In this, he tames the wicked and creates beauty. And in a way that's functional too.

Hobson began making birdhouses in his spare time years ago. He brought a few to work, he said, "And the guys on the job site thought, 'aha, Christmas, perfect gifts.' Then Father's Day, and dad's birthday and mom's birthday. That's how I got going."

He also branched out into furniture.

"I started doing chairs years ago because it's free and I don't have to buy the wood," Hobson said.

He started with driftwood, but that was hard to find and hard to haul back from the beach.

So he came to the Brazilian pepper. "I was trimming my yard and there were all these woods and all these trees," he said. "I looked at them and I said, you know what, let me take off all this bark, dry it out and see if the wood cracks once it dried."

It did not.

"I said, let me see what it would look like in a chair, and it was perfect."

Yes. And it was good.

To make a Hobson chair, the creator takes eight or nine sticks and clamps them into a seat. "I sit in it and lean back and see what's comfortable," he

Hobson attaches front legs that curve naturally into arm rests, and Brazilian pepper spindles that point heavenward in a frame for the back. All pieces are notched and doweled for strength. He finishes off with three coats of urethane.

The result is the antithesis of IKEA. It is a curved universe of chairdom. Each is unique, naturally.

"I try to get them as crooked as I can, as funky as I can," Hobson said.

When his wife remarked that one of his table tops was too crooked, he told her, "I know. That's what I want. I don't want things straight. I'm tired of things being straight."

And as for the omnipresent nuisance

Caught in Obamacare limbo

Couple claims website is a 'Catch 22'

Ken Bubnick shook his head and said, "I'm in Obamacare limbo. I'm completely frustrated and disillusioned."

While the national political debate swirls about glitches in HealthCare.gov, the government website to enroll in the Affordable Care Act, or Obamacare, Bubnick, 62, and his wife, Christine, 60, of Punta Gorda, are squarely in the middle of the vortex.

They've been trying since Oct. 1 to

sign up — and they almost made it a couple of times. But now one part of the government system tells them they don't exist and another part says they can't start over from scratch because they're already in the system.

This is their story, according to Ken

On Oct. 1, the day the site was supposed to go live, he tried to log in without success. Trying every day, finally on Oct. 7 he got through, registered for an account, and was assigned a user name and password. But as he tried to progress through the system, it wouldn't recognize his new user name and password.


"I did receive a set of confirmation emails," he said, "so even though I couldn't complete the process, I felt like I was at least progressing through their site."

Then on Oct. 8 he got through to a "live" person on the ACA telephone number, 1-800-318-2596.

"I spoke with a cogent, intelligent young lady with a master's degree in social work," he said. "She said they

There is an old Scottish prayer that goes, "From goulies and ghosties and long-leggedy beasties, And things that go bump in the

night, Good Lord, deliver us!" Tales of unusual happenings come from every corner of the globe — including Charlotte County — where many strange occurrences

and eerie hauntings have been documented. On Friday, in observance of Halloween, the Charlotte County Historical Center hosted The Chilling Tales of Charlotte County, where "Countess" Jackie Brown, wearing Victorianera black mourning attire, greeted guests and told them to "enter if you dare."

Dressed in period garb, Jeannie Blahnik portrayed Mary Sandlin, the wife of James L. Sandlin, one of Punta Gorda's early prominent citizens. She explained the tragic history behind their ornate house, built in 1890, located on West Retta Esplanade.

"The home brought so much misfortune and sadness," 'Mary Sandlin' said. "My son died of tuberculosis three days after his birth, and my other son, Felix, died from the same disease at age 12."

Because of her husband's declining health, the family sold the building and relocated near Alligator Creek. But the tragedy did not stop there. The house's new owner, Captain Albert Dewey, narrowly escaped death when a would-be assassin's rifle shot ricocheted and struck him in the leg. The wound was so severe, the leg had to be amputated.

After James Sandlin's death, Mary moved back into the house. Unfortunately, the structure "unleashed its wrath," according to his "wife." One afternoon in 1909, her

Man pleads not guilty to dog abuse

Mosaic buys phosphate company

The Mosaic Co. announced plans Monday to acquire CF Industries' phosphate operations, which company officials say would make Mosaic the only phosphate company operating in central and south Florida.

The sale, which Mosaic expects to be officially approved by the Department of Justice in the summer of 2014, will allow Mosaic to cancel

the construction of a Hardee County beneficiation facility, where phosphate would be mechanically separated from soil, and delay the opening of a mine in DeSoto County, which was slated to open by 2021.

Mosaic paid \$1.4 billion, including \$200 million reserved for the long-term care of CF Industries' phosphogypsum a radioactive byproduct of phosphate mining — stacks in Plant City and Bartow.

Bo Davis, senior vice president

of operations for Mosaic, said in a telephone press conference that the deal "would push (the DeSoto mine) out past the 2021 period that we looked at but ... we have not looked at that totally and definitively. We still have work to do on it."

DeSoto officials were not concerned the sale would adversely affect employment opportunities in the county.

Warming up for the election

The sound of ballots scanning and tape printing echoed off the concrete walls of Charlotte County's elections warehouse, a small, windowless building tucked behind a law enforcement training center and a gun range off Airport Road in Punta Gorda.

Seven staffers from the Supervisor of Elections Office and Punta Gorda City Clerk Karen Smith, who chairs the canvassing board, gathered there Monday morning to test all 12 DL 200 voting machines and six ADA iVotronic machines that will be used during the Nov. 5 District 5 City Council election.

Though the public was formally invited to attend the testing, it's not surprising that during a small, off-year election race like this, no one showed up, officials said.

"It's really kind of


boring," said Lori Harney, IT director for the county elections office. "Usually you'll see the candidates show up for like 10 minutes and then leave."

The candidates for this particular race are former Burnt Store Isles Homeowners Association president Charlie Counsil and former Team Punta Gorda Executive Director Nancy Prafke, both of whom are vying for the District 5 seat being vacated by current Mayor Bill Albers.

Under state statute, machines are required to be tested to ensure "logic and accuracy," the process by which voting equipment is configured, tested and certified for accuracy prior to an election. Each component is tested to verify that it is fully functional and free from mechanical problems, and that each voting unit contains the appropriate ballot styles for its designated polling place.

"Every race, every

candidate, in every precinct," said Assistant Supervisor of Elections Lou Spacco. "On this ballot, there is only one race so it won't be as complex a test as we would normally run on elections, but we're doing exactly the same thing.

"In this case, because it's a small election we're testing all of the pieces

of equipment that will be used."

During a general election when all machines are in use, tests are conducted on a sampling of the machines.

The machines are tested to verify they initially print out a "zero" tape before test ballots are entered.

"We print the results and they will check them

that's seven or eight years out," Mandy Hines, DeSoto County coordinator, said, referring to the proposed mine, and pointed out that with "the development of a mining operation on this scale, any number of factors could delay it."

Rather than worry about whether the mine is delayed, Hines said a "large part of the working population (at Mosaic in DeSoto) is nearing retirement," and they will create openings as they leave.

As for the Hardee County plant, Hines said the county is "focusing more ... on what they're trying to construct in DeSoto" when considering the local job market.

Hines also said DeSoto County is trying to look beyond mining to increase job opportunities,

and is using redevelopment funds to invest in economic growth initiatives.

"Mining might bring great job prospects, but it's ... not a forever fix," she said. Davis said the assets

that Mosaic purchased included a 22,000-acre South Pasture mine and beneficiation plant in Hardee County, a phosphate manufacturing facility in Plant City, and an ammonia

terminal and warehouses in Tampa.

Davis said that as a result of the agreement "CF Industries will be basically out of the phosphate business" but still operating as a nitrate business. The nearest competing phosphate company, Potashcorp, has operations in White Springs, Fla.

It was not immediately clear whether the purchase would lead to layoffs. Davis said the new

employees Mosaic will acquire "are very much a part of the assets that we need to run the business and the operations once this is approved." When asked whether any job loss was anticipated, Davis said, "We still have to go through the integration process to see if there are any overlaps or overlays, but I wouldn't expect there to be much overlap there."

comment. Assistant State Attorney Martina Hedvicek — who has been assigned to prosecute the case — also could not be reached.

If convicted of the animal torturing charge, Hoeckel could face prison time. His next court date wasn't known as of Monday afternoon.

14-year-old daughter, Mary Leah Sandlin, was tragically burned in an accident.

"The gasoline in the iron she was using on the front porch ignited the dress she was wearing," 'Mary Sandlin' said. "She ran down the street screaming. Neighbors put it out but she died in agony three hours later."

The porch was badly scorched, and it has been said that it cannot be removed. To this day, there have been reports of footsteps climbing to Mary Leah Sandlin's upstairs bedroom, laundry tossed across the room, and irons being turned on. For years, no one would enter the house, believing it was haunted.

Another unfortunate accident was the untimely death of assistant postmistress Katie Sloan, who was mauled to death by a dog as she walked the streets of Punta Gorda. Pregnant at







Report: Cocaine traffickers caught in Charlotte

CHARLOTTE COUNTY – A routine traffic stop Sunday led to the arrest of two Bradenton residents for cocaine trafficking, after 2 kilograms of the drug were found hidden in the trunk, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

Warren Davis, 35, and Shawnbria Williams, 25, were stopped around 5:30 p.m. on I-75 northbound near mile-marker 151. Davis, the driver, was allegedly traveling on the inside lane at 55 mph — the speed limit is 70 — and traffic was backed up behind the vehicle. They were pulled over and questioned.

Davis informed the trooper that he and Williams were coming from Miami, and the report shows he was acting nervously. Williams initially provided a false name and said she was scared.

A search of the car — a rented 2013 Nissan Altima — led to the discovery of cocaine in the spare tire compartment. Two gallon Ziplock bags of the drug were found in a tool bag.

Davis and Williams were each charged with possession of cocaine with intent to sell and trafficking cocaine. Williams was also charged with resisting an officer.

In Florida, a conviction for trafficking more than 400 grams of cocaine (but less than 150 kilograms) is punishable by a mandatory minimum of 15 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Davis and Williams were being held Monday in the Charlotte County Iail without bond.

Scott's spending spree on mansion makes no sense

ometimes Florida Gov. Rick Scott makes it too easy for opponents to pick on him.

His recent \$800,000 upgrade of the Tallahassee mansion where he and his wife live is just another example.

With the economy expected to once again be a key issue in the 2014 governor's race, Scott ignored the potential for criticism and spent the money to spruce up the mansion where he plans to spend four more years after the election.

We have no problem with repairs for the governor's mansion. Heck, everyone has to keep up their house. But, the expenditures seemingly had little to do with "fixing" things

Let's take a look at some of the renovations that were needed.

There is a \$2,000 mirror for the first lady's bathroom and \$38,000 in rugs.

The kitchen was upgraded. There were new screens purchased for the swimming pool. New wallpaper, pillows, drapes and furniture were also on the list of improvements.

Scott could defend the spending by saying taxpayers did not foot the entire bill. And, he's right. Lobbyists and donors to his campaign chipped in a good portion of the money including the cost of the bathroom mirror and rugs. We're sure they did that out of respect for the governor's quality of life and won't expect any favors for it.

Some of those donations came from U.S. Sugar, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida and Florida Crystals — each of them forking over \$100,000 for the renovations.

Also, lobbyist Brian Ballard, Scott's political adviser Fabrizio and George Zoley, CEO of the private prison company The GEO Group, which runs two Florida penitentiaries, were inclined to donate \$20,000 each.

Are we making a big deal out of nothing?

You could make that argument but, the economy in the state and nation continues to be the major issue in every debate and almost every decision being made in Congress and the Florida Legislature.

When Scott came into office he pledged to slash government spending and he has tried to do that at the expense of education, early in his tenure, and big cuts to other popular programs like Florida Forever.

If you look at past governors' spending on the mansion, the \$800,000 ranks somewhere in the middle. Jeb Bush spent \$3 million but much of that was for security upgrades after 9/11. Charlie Crist spent much less than the \$800,000.

Democrats, as you would expect, are lining up to take pot shots at the governor for the mansion upgrades.

House Democratic Leader Perry Thurston, D-Fort Lauderdale, said the spending came at a time when the state is pushing cutbacks in other areas, according to The Associated Press.

"Maybe the first place in government cutbacks is where you are staying at," said Thurston.

The Democrat lawmaker added that he doubted few people in the public sector were aware of the corporations and private individuals who ponied up money to help pay for the renovations.

"There is a concern there. What are they expecting to receive from their contributions?" he said.

Scott's spending, whether needed or not, is ill timed and surely fodder for his critics something he doesn't need.

More problems in Deep Creek

Property owners of Section 23 in Deen Creek recently received their packet of information for this year's election of board members, and the annual meeting, scheduled for Oct. 30. This ballot is in direct violation of the Florida Statutes and the Bylaws of the Property Owners Association, which requires that board members be elected by secret ballot.

In addition, property owners are being billed for a \$50 special assessment that is not yet approved. This special assessment will raise \$167,000 which should not be required.

Our current president, Ron Woods, has in his possession a legitimate proposal from a qualified management company which would save the property owners approximately \$86,000 annually compared to last year's cost. This savings, with the amount budgeted for 2013/2014, should make the special assessment unnecessary.

There are four board members who clearly are not doing their fiduciary duty ("to act in the best interest of the property owners of Section 23

hile the nation's attention has been riveted on the Keystone Congress, the executive branch was busy developing its own comedy routine. Picture the cast (you know the characters) shrugging their shoulders in unison: "Who, me?"

This would be the response to the glitchrich health care rollout, for which no one seems responsible. "Beats me. I thought it was working!" This also would be the response to the eavesdropping scandal, which soon could become an international showdown. "Who knew?" Hint: He used to work at the NSA and now lives in Russia.

Not least, the shrug also would be the response to a White House rumor that a certain Republican House leader said to President Obama during a government shutdown meeting, "I cannot even stand to look at you."

Except no one said it. *Shrug*.

The rumor kicked off uncharacteristically glitch-free when Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., heard it from what he apparently considered a reliable source and posted it on his Facebook page. Early rumor embellishments suggested that House Speaker John Boehner was the demon source, which later was clarified to impugn Pete Sessions, R-Texas, who denied it.

In fact, no one said it, according to a White House official, who attributed the untruth to a "miscommunication" during a report by White House Deputy Chief of Staff Rob Nabors to Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid. Of course,

Reid told the entire Senate Democratic caucus, identifying Sessions as the evil-doer. Durbin did not name Sessions in his post.

Voila! A rumor is born. Roll cameras. The White House regrets the "misunderstanding." Cut.

Meanwhile, the "rollout," a term forever tarnished by the ineptitude displayed since Oct. 1 when Americans were finally going to be able to sign up for "affordable" (translation: I buy, you pay) health insurance, has been an embarrassment. Even if one is inclined to grant benefit of the doubt (because technology can be a beast), evidence suggests that the "glitches" were the result of poor judgment and bad decisions.

But whose?

Four contractors hired to set up the computer system testified during congressional hearings that system testing began just two weeks before the launch date

— and the test failed.
Part of the problem was a decision not to allow customers to browse anonymously, as most people doubtless would prefer. Privacy and all that (chortle, chortle). Instead, people had to fill out forms before they could take a peek at the merchandise — an unmanageable burden to a system inadequate to the immense demand.

Who made that decision? The contractors testified they didn't know who made the decisions or who was responsible for correcting problems. One can blame the computer guys, of course. Or demand the head of Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius, under whose supervision the Affordable Care Act falls. But ultimately, the responsibility for the popularly known "Obamacare" rests with the person who insisted in the midst of a historic recession, a global financial meltdown and

record unemployment that we needed to overhaul the entire health care industry.

Not to drone on, but yet another "meanwhile" demands attention: A photo of German Chancellor Angela Merkel on the front page of Friday's Wall Street Journal saves writers a thousand words. She may be giving the evil eye to a photographer as she arrives at a European Union summit in Brussels, but it perfectly captures sentiments she has expressed upon learning of a report that the National Security Agency had been listening to her cellphone conversations.

Not only Merkel but as many as 35 world leaders may have been targets of our eavesdropping, according to Britain's Guardian newspaper. They are not amused.

Consequences, which include potential damage to a trans-Atlantic free trade agreement, are yet to be fully imagined.

What we cannot avoid registering is that we look like not the glimmering city on the hill but a ship of untrustworthy fools.

We reportedly eavesdrop on our allies and force citizens to buy insurance through a system we can't manage. We concoct character-smearing rumors and attach them to our political adversaries. And that's just the executive branch. Most important, we have damaged our bonds of trust with nations we need to keep as friends.

Any one of the above would make for a very bad week in governance. Combined they suggest an uncomfortable conclusion to the world we purport to lead: The lights are flickering in the city on the hill and our ship of state is foundering.

Wars turn messy because of politics

he examination of war from an exclusively military perspective, isolated from its social and political context, leads to false conclusions and poor strategy."

That is the conclusion of Emile Simpson, a former infantry officer in the Royal Gurkha Rifles, who served three tours of duty in Afghanistan, in his book, "War From the Ground Up."

The book has won extraordinary praise from the veteran British military historian Michael Howard, who wrote in the Times Literary Supplement, calling it "a work of such importance that it should be compulsory reading at every level in the military."

Howard compares
Simpson's book to the
classic "On War," by the
Prussian military strategist Carl von Clausewitz.
Both experienced a war
that was utterly different
from what they had
been trained for and
tried to explain it "from
the top down as well as

from the ground up."
Clausewitz experienced the total war wrought by Napoleon's massive citizen armies and the large armies raised by Prussia, Austria and Russia in response. "War," he famously concluded, "is merely the continuation of policy by other means."

In such large wars, the outcome is rarely ambiguous. Each side pursues the "absolute victory" promised by Franklin Roosevelt in his Pearl Harbor speech. Virtually everyone recognizes that result when it happens.

When the result is ambiguous, the result can be disastrous, as when Germany surrendered in November 1918 rather than be overrun by the Western powers. In the ensuing years, Hitler and others argued that Germany had been stabbed in the back by enemies within and sought revenge.

Emile Simpson argues that in most of the conflicts that liberal democracies have engaged in since 1945, things are not so clear. These are little wars, against

enemies difficult to define, in which "tactical actions often need to be considered primarily in terms of their local political effect."

Inevitably, "a decision to attack one group or support another ... will attract some realignment in the local political situation." And "strategy has to operate within a complex political environment that nobody can ever fully understand."

fully understand."

This was particularly true in Afghanistan, where kinship ties and local loyalties meant that the same individuals might, at one time, support the Taliban and, at another, the central government.

In such conflicts, Simpson argues — as Samuel Huntington does in his 1957 book, "The Soldier and the State" — that there is no clear separation between the political setting of goals by the civilian commander-in-chief and the decisions carried out by military tacticians.

In conflicts in places like Afghanistan and Iraq, political considerations must be taken into account, not just by civilian leaders and theater commanders, but also by lieutenants and sergeants.

If they fail to "change policy in response to military reality," the result is "like driving a car through the rearview mirror rather than looking at the road ahead: It swerves all over the place and may crash"

crash."

This is hard for liberal democracies to do, he admits. But something like it has been done by U.S. and coalition troops, under General H. R. McMaster in Tal Afar, Iraq, in 2004-06 and General David Petraeus' in Anbar and elsewhere in 2007-08.

It is critical, Simpson argues, for the troops

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to live with the locals, getting to know them personally and gaining their trust. It is critical also to have a convincing "strategic narrative" that is flexible enough to appeal to different publics — to soldiers, to locals, to neighboring countries and to elites

and voters back home.
His major historical
example, the 1962-66
British-Indonesian
conflict in Borneo, is
not entirely reassuring.
There in response to
Indonesian guerrilla
and regular army
attacks across the
colonial border, British
Commonwealth troops
seasoned in jungle
warfare in Malaya and

Burma retaliated with cross-border attacks.

But this occurred largely out of view of the press and the public. Neither government, for reasons of its own, declared war nor acknowledged that a conflict was going on.

The recent raids in Libya and Somalia and drone strikes in Yemen and elsewhere suggest that the U.S., even after leaving Iraq and preparing to leave Afghanistan, is engaged in more conflicts than headlines indicate.

Some will take Simpson's book as an argument to avoid such conflicts altogether.

Others, who believe



Spying outrage widens

Europe considers sanctions against US for NSA actions

BERLIN — The United States could lose access to an important law enforcement tool used to track terrorist money flows, German officials said Monday, as Europe weighed a response to allegations that the Americans spied on their closest European allies.

In Washington, Senate Intelligence Committee Chairwoman Dianne Feinstein called for a "total review" of all U.S. intelligence programs in response to the allegations — activity the California Democrat said she wasn't told

about.

Feinstein said that while her committee was informed of the National Security Agency's collection of phone records under a secret court order, it "was not satisfactorily informed" that "certain surveillance activities have been in effect for more than a decade" - including eavesdropping on German Chancellor Angela Merkel's own cellphone.

She said President Barack Obama was also not told that Merkel's communications were being collected since 2002.

"With respect to NSA collection of intelligence on leaders of U.S. allies — including

Service members: Fat test forces desperate measures

SAN DIEGO — Soldiers often call plastic surgeon Adam Tattelbaum in a panic. They need liposuction — fast.

Some military personnel are turning to the surgical procedure to remove excess fat from their waists in a desperate attempt to pass the Pentagon's body fat test, which relies on measurements of the neck and waist and can determine their future prospects in the military.

"They come in panicked about being kicked out or getting a demerit that will hurt their chances at a promotion," the Rockville, Md., surgeon said.

Service members complain that the Defense Department's method of estimating body fat weeds out not just flabby physiques but bulkier, muscular builds.

Lexus, Toyota top auto reliability survey

DETROIT — Japan's lock on Consumer Reports' vehicle reliability rankings is starting to

Three Japanese brands - Lexus, Toyota and Acura — took the top spots in this year's survey, and seven of the top 10 brands are Japanese.

But three non-Japanese brands — Audi, Volvo and GMC — cracked the top 10. And the magazine announced Monday it's not recommending that consumers buy 2014 models of the Honda Accord V6 and Nissan Altima sedans, two of Japan's top sellers, because of poor reliability scores. Two other Japanese mainstays, the Toyota Camry and Toyota RAV4, won't be recommended because they flunked a frontal crash test from the Insurance Institute for

Docs to parents: Limit kids' electronics

CHICAGO — Doctors 2 parents: Limit kids' tweeting, texting & keep smartphones, laptops out of bedrooms. #goodluckwiththat.

The recommendations are bound to prompt eye-rolling and LOLs from many teens but an influential pediatricians group says parents need to know that unrestricted media use can have serious consequences.

It's been linked with violence, cyberbullying, school woes, obesity, lack of sleep and a host of other problems. It's not a major cause of these troubles, but "many parents are clueless" about the profound impact media exposure can have on their children, said Dr. Victor Strasburger, lead author of the new American Academy of Pediatrics policy.

"This is the 21st century and they need to get with it," said Strasburger, a University of New Mexico adolescent medicine specialist.

The policy is aimed at all kids, including those who use smartphones, computers and other Internet-connected devices. It expands the academy's longstanding

Ellis Island museum reopens after Sandy's floods

NEW YORK (AP) — The island that ushered millions of immigrants into the United States and became a monument to its mosaic of ancestries reopened to visitors Monday for the first time since Superstorm Sandy, adding a chapter to the narrative of hard-won recovery on the eve of the storm's anniversary.

The Ellis Island Immigration Museum hasn't fully recovered from the floods that filled its basement; many of its more than 1 million photographs and other artifacts are still in storage, and officials haven't yet repaired computers the public can use to research forebears. But visitors were able to return to much of the graceful main building, including some exhibits, and to absorb the island's singular views of the nearby Statue of Liberty and lower Manhattan.

"Awe" was Cathy Scheer's reaction as she stepped off the first visitor ferry Monday morning. The Riverside, Calif., resident and a colleague at a school bus driver-training company had arrived a day early for a business trip in hopes of seeing the statue and Ellis Island.

Some of Scheer's German and Scottish forebears immigrated via Ellis Island, so she was excited at "the chance to walk in my ancestors' shoes," she said.

Sandy's surge swamped Ellis Island, the entry point for about 12 million newcomers from 1892 to 1954 and a public historic site since 1976. David Luchsinger, the National Park Service superintendent for the island and the Statue of Liberty, arrived the day after Sandy to find first and higher floors,

doors and windows blown out, pilings strewn on the grounds and the basement full of water, which destroyed the electric, heating, air-conditioning and phone systems.

Liberty Island was also inundated during Sandy and reopened on July Fourth, only to close again for a time during the recent partial federal government shutdown.

The floodwaters didn't touch the Ellis Island exhibits, which are on the but they were later moved to storage because they could have deteriorated without climate control.

Rebuilding and storm proofing the electrical and other networks without marring the 1900, Beaux-Arts-style building was a challenge to plan and is still a \$21 million, 18-month work in progress. Heat is currently running through the building's original radiators, instead of the modern climate-control system.

Food stamps, milk prices eyed in farm talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The fight over renewing the nation's farm bill has centered on cuts to the \$80 billion-a-year food stamp program. But there could be unintended consequences if no agreement is reached: higher milk prices.

Members of the House and Senate are scheduled to begin long-awaited negotiations on the fiveyear, roughly \$500 billion bill this week. If they don't finish it, dairy supports could expire at the end of the year and send the price of a gallon of milk skyward.

There could be political ramifications, too. The House and Senate are far apart on the sensitive issue of how much money to cut from food stamps, and lawmakers are hoping to resolve that debate before election-year politics set in.

Minnesota Sen. Amy Klobuchar, a Democrat who is one of the negotiators on the bill, says the

legislation could also be a rare opportunity for the two chambers to show they can get along.

"In the middle of the chaos of the last month comes opportunity," Klobuchar says of the farm legislation. "This will really be a test of the House of whether they are willing to work with us."

The farm bill, which sets policy for farm subsidies, the food stamps and

other rural development projects, has moved slowly through Congress in the last two years as lawmakers have focused on higher-profile priorities, like budget negotiations, health care and immigration legislation.

But farm-state lawmakers are appealing to their colleagues to harken back to more bipartisan times and do something Congress hasn't done

very much lately - pass a major piece of legislation. **Even President Barack**

Obama, who has been largely silent on the farm bill as it has wound through Congress, said as the government reopened earlier this month that the farm bill "would make a huge difference in our economy right now."

"What are we waiting for?" Obama said. "Let's get this done."

The main challenge in getting the bill done will be the differences on food stamps, officially called the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP. The House has passed legislation to cut around \$4 billion annually, or around 5 percent, including changes in eligibility and work requirements. The Senate has proposed a cut of around a tenth of that amount, and Senate Democrats and President Obama have strongly opposed any major changes to the program.

Hacker charged with theft from US Army

NEWARK, N.J. (Bloomberg) — A British hacker stole "massive amounts" of confidential data from the U.S. Army and the U.S. Missile Defense Agency, including service members' personal information, the U.S. government said Monday.

Lauri Love, 28, and others also breached computer systems at the Environmental Protection Agency and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, according to Paul Fishman, the U.S. attorney in New Jersey. Love was arrested Oct. 25 at home in Stradishall, England, said Fishman Monday.

"They stole military data and personal identifying information belonging to servicemen and women," Fishman said in a statement. "Such conduct endangers the security of our country and is an affront to those who serve."

Love stole identifying information of workers at NASA, the Missile Defense Agency and the Army Network Enterprise Technology Command, according to an indictment unsealed today in federal court in Newark, N.J. Criminal complaints also were unsealed in Newark and Alexandria,

The hackers also stole data on the demolition and disposal of military facilities, natural-resource management, defense program budgeting data and nonpublic competitive acquisition bid data, according to Fishman.

Love also hacked into computers at the Department of Health and Human Services, Energy Department, **Sentencing Commission** and Regional Computer Forensics Laboratory, according to a complaint unsealed in Alexandria. He stole personal information about employees of the computer forensics laboratory and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, according to an arrest complaint filed by the FBI.

Love's arrest came in connection with an investigation by Britain's National Crime Agency, according to Fishman. He faces as long as five years in prison on the New Jersey charges.

The hacking "substantially impaired the functioning of dozens of computer servers" and caused millions of dollars in damage to government agencies, according to the indictment.

Love conspired with two people in Australia and a resident of Sweden from October 2012 to this

month, prosecutors said. "Computer intrusions present significant risks to national security and our military operations," Daniel Andrews, director

of the U.S. Army Criminal

Investigation Command's

computer crime investigative unit, said in a

statement. In some attacks, the hackers found weaknesses in Structured Query Language, a type of programming language, the U.S. said. In others, they attacked a Web application platform known as Coldfusion. They placed malicious code that let them maintain access through a so-called back door or shell, according to the indictment.

They communicated using secure Internet chat rooms, where they frequently changed online monikers, prosecutors

On Dec. 25, Love began a monthlong hack of computers at the Sentencing Commission, according to an FBI complaint. The commission sets sentencing policies for federal courts, including guidelines for various federal crimes.

Jackson doctor released, wants return to medicine

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Michael Jackson's doctor was quietly freed from jail on Monday, two years after he was convicted of killing the pop superstar with an overdose of a powerful anesthetic and he would like to practice medicine again.

Conrad Murray was released at 12:01 a.m. from a jail in downtown Los Angeles after serving about half of his maximum sentence for involuntary manslaughter. A change in California law allowed his incarceration time to be significantly reduced.

Murray was taken from the jail a back way, eluding a cluster of TV crews and a few Jackson fans. Sheriff's officials arranged the quiet exit and drove him away for safety reasons, spokesman Steve Whitmore said.

Immigration bill's fate murky on eve of lobbying

WASHINGTON (AP) - Prospects for comprehensive immigration legislation this year grew murkier on the eve of an all-out push by a coalition of business, religious and law enforcement to convince the House to overhaul the decades-old system.

Proponents seized on two developments as a Senate-passed measure remains stalled in the House — President Barack Obama's meeting at the White House on Tuesday with a House Republican working on legislation and a California GOP lawmaker's willingness to back a House Democratic plan.

But in a blow to their effort, Sen. Marco Rubio signaled support for the piecemeal approach in the House despite his months of work and vote for the comprehensive Senate bill that would provide a path to citizenship for the 11 million immigrants living here illegally and tighten border security.

Obamacare data hub service restored

WASHINGTON (Bloomberg) — The Obamacare data hub that routes applicant information to websites run by the federal government and 14 states resumed service after failing Sunday.

The data hub center, operated by Verizon Communications Inc.'s Terremark unit, lost connectivity after workers tried to replace a broken networking component. As of 7 a.m. Monday, the hub was "fully operational," according to an emailed statement from Joanne Peters, a spokeswoman for the Department of Health and Human Services.

The Obama administration has been under fire since Oct. 1 for persistent problems with computer systems assembled to help people compare and enroll in insurance plans under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

Fed judge: Texas abortion limits unconstitutional

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) A federal judge has determined that new Texas abortion restrictions violate the U.S. Constitution, a ruling that keeps open — at least for now - dozens of abortion clinics that were set to halt operations Tuesday had key parts of the law taken effect.

In a decision released Monday that the state is certain to appeal, District Judge Lee Yeakel wrote that the regulations requiring doctors to have admitting privileges at a nearby hospital creates an undue obstacle to women seeking an abortion.

Study: Poverty, neglect affect brain size

SAN FRANCISCO (Bloomberg) — Poverty and lack of nurturing in early life may have a direct effect on a child's brain development, according to a study that found smaller brain volumes in poor, neglected children.

The study of brain

scans, published Monday in JAMA Pediatrics, found children living in poverty without adequate nurturing had smaller hippocampus, a brain region linked to learning and memory, than those who weren't poor or neglected. Poor children, even if not neglected by parents, were found to have less gray matter, which is linked to intelligence; less white matter, which helps transmit signals; and smaller amygdala, an area key to emotional health.

The study adds to previous research suggesting the stress of living in poverty in childhood can have lifelong effects on learning and emotional health, said Charles Nelson, who wrote an accompanying editorial in the journal. Monday's findings brings researchers closer to better understanding how experience shapes biology, he said.

Transplant without immune blockers may be possible

SAN FRANCISCO (Bloomberg) — A 63-yearold man with Type 1 diabetes received a transplant of insulin-producing cells with the aid of a device that eliminated use of immune-blocking drugs, a potential breakthrough that may lead to safer and more effective procedures to revive weakened organs.

The cells, which survived for 10 months, showed signs of insulin production, according to a study released today by the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. The new approach may lead to diabetes therapies, as well as open the possibility of other types of tissue transplants where side effects of immune suppression may outweigh the benefits.

Trial begins for suspended Panhandle sheriff

BRISTOL (AP) — A suspended Panhandle sheriff is headed to trial this week on misconduct charges in a case that has divided a small rural county and sparked yet another debate over Florida gun laws.

Nick Finch, the Liberty County sheriff, was arrested in June on felony charges of official misconduct and falsifying public records. Finch, who was removed from office by Gov. Rick Scott, is accused of personally intervening after one of his deputies arrested a resident accused of

carrying a pistol without a concealed weapons permit.

Finch, who has pleaded not guilty, has repeatedly said that he let the man go because he is a believer in gun rights. He has drawn support from conservative media outlets and gun rights activists.

A jury was selected Monday in the trial that is expected to be wrapped up by Thursday.

During jury questioning, prosecutors made clear their position that the sheriff can't ignore laws he disagrees with.

They plan to argue that Finch tried to destroy records that showed he intervened in the case.

Finch for his part kept quiet on the first day, refusing to answer questions from reporters but added that he would have "plenty to say" once his trial was over.

The case's impact on tiny Liberty County which has slightly more than 8,000 residents was evident during the jury selection process.

Nearly everyone told Judge William Gary that they had read or heard about the case, with

some prospective jurors telling Gary point blank they thought Finch was either guilty or innocent. One prospective juror acknowledged that his aunt had been fired from the Sheriff's Department when Finch took over.

At one point Assistant State Attorney Jack Campbell asked if any juror was "kin" to the witnesses or "has a dog in the hunt."

Potential jurors acknowledged that the case had been talked about everywhere from the local Piggy Wiggly grocery store to a seafood restaurant that sits near the banks of the Apalachicola River. Bristol is located about 40 miles west of Tallahassee.

Finch, an Army veteran and onetime police officer, won his election as sheriff by less than 200 votes in November 2012. Previously, he ran as a Republican in 2008 and lost even though GOP presidential nominee John McCain carried the county.

The county's election supervisor said that Finch became a Democrat but ran in 2012 with no party

affiliation. That allowed him to bypass a heated primary that included two other Democrats and incumbent Donnie Conyers.

State authorities investigating the case say that in March, one of his deputies arrested Floyd Eugene Parrish following a traffic stop during which Parrish was carrying a semi-automatic pistol in his pocket without a concealed weapons permit.

State authorities say Finch let Parrish leave the county jail in Bristol and that Finch took steps to conceal the initial arrest.

Immigration detainee has meningitis

MIAMI (AP) — U.S. immigration authorities say one of their detainees in Miami has been hospitalized with bacterial meningitis.

Immigration and **Customs Enforcement** spokesman Nestor Yglesias says the detainee at the Krome Detention Center was diagnosed after being taken to the hospital Oct. 21.

The detainee remained hospitalized Monday. Yglesias says officials have "no reason for significant concern of disease transmission outside or within the facility."

Yglesias says that "out of an abundance of caution," detainees in several housing units have been separated from each other temporarily. The Miami-Dade County Health Department also was notified.

The detainee's identity was not released.

Symptoms of the usually severe infection include sudden onset of fever, headache or stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, increased sensitivity to light and confusion.

Remain found inside burned-out car in Hialeah



The FHP is investigating since Lockard died on the interstate.





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


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White House OKs limited waiver on health penalty

WASHINGTON (AP) — With website woes ongoing, the Obama administration Monday granted a six-week extension until March 31 for Americans to sign up for coverage next year and avoid new tax penalties under the president's health care overhaul law.

The move had been expected since White House spokesman Jay Carney promised quick action last week to resolve a "disconnect" in the implementation of the law.

It comes as technical problems continue to trouble the website designed as the main enrollment portal for people who don't get health care at work.

As a consequence, Republican lawmakers, and some Democrats as well, are calling for a one-year delay in the penalties most Americans will face starting next year if they remain uninsured. Monday's action by the administration stops well short of that, and amounts only to a limited adjustment.

Under the latest policy change, people who sign up by the end of open enrollment season on March 31 will not face a penalty. That means procrastinators get a grace period.

Previously you had to sign up by the middle of February, guaranteeing that your coverage would take effect March 1, in order to avoid fines for being uninsured.

The extension — granted for 2014 only — addresses confusion that was created when the administration set the first open enrollment period under the law from Oct. 1-March 31.

The problem was that health insurance coverage typically starts on the first day of a given month, and it takes up to 15 days to process applications. So somebody signing up March 16 — well within the open enrollment period — wouldn't get coverage until April 1, thereby risking a penalty for being uninsured part of the year.

"has determined that it would be unfair to require individuals in this situation to make a (penalty) payment," the Health and Human Services department said in guidance issued Monday evening. As a result, the department is creating a special onetime hardship exemption for people who get covered by March 31. And they won't have to file additional paperwork to apply for the exemption.

The administration

The mandate to carry health insurance is the most unpopular requirement of the health care law. It's meant to nudge as many people as possible into the insurance pool. That would help

keep premiums in check, since the law also forbids insurers from turning away people with health problems.

Mindful of the need to sign up lots of healthy uninsured people, the administration released an analysis Monday that concludes nearly half of uninsured single young adults could buy a "bronze" level plan for \$50 or less a month, after tax credits to offset the cost of premiums.

The inconsistency between the law's coverage requirements and the administration's schedule for the initial open enrollment season was first pointed out by the Jackson Hewitt tax preparation company.

As possible leverage, German authorities cited last week's non-binding resolution by the European Parliament to suspend a post-9/11 agreement allowing the Americans access to bank transfer data to track the flow of terrorist money.

German Justice Minister Sabine Leutheusser-Schnarrenberger said Monday she believed the Americans were using the information to gather economic intelligence apart from terrorism and that the deal, popularly known as the SWIFT agreement, should be suspended. That would represent a sharp rebuke to the

United States from some of its closest partners.

"It really isn't enough to be outraged," she told rbb-Inforadio. "This would be a signal that something can happen and make clear to the Americans that the (EU's) policy is changing."

Suspending the agreement, officially known as the Terrorist Finance Tracking Program, would require approval by an overwhelming majority of the 28 European Union countries. The agreement allows access to funds transferred through the private, Belgium-based Society for Worldwide Interbank Financial Telecommunication, which handles the

movement of money between banks worldwide.

Asked Monday if the NSA intelligence gathering had been used not only to protect national security but American economic interests as well, White House spokesman Jay Carney said: "We do not use our intelligence capabilities for that purpose. We use it for security purposes."

Still, he acknowledged the tensions with allies over the eavesdropping disclosures and said the White House was "working to allay those concerns," though he refused to discuss any specific reports or provide details of internal White House discussions.

Ford and its luxury Lincoln brand were near the bottom of the rankings because of customer complaints about their glitch-prone touchscreen dashboard systems and lowerthan-expected fuel economy numbers.

The key to reliability is a conservative approach to vehicle redesigns. The brands that do best, like Toyota and Honda, often use time-tested engines, transmissions and other parts from prior models in their newer cars, Fisher said. Automakers with new engines or other untested features in their new cars — like Ford or Cadillac — tend to do worse.

"When you redesign cars from the ground up, you're going to expect those issues," Fisher told The Associated Press.

Brands with many older models, like GMC and Volvo, also tend to do better.

recommendations on banning televisions from children's and teens' bedrooms and limiting entertainment screen time to no more than two hours daily.

Under the new policy, those two hours include using the Internet for entertainment, including Facebook, Twitter, TV and movies; online homework is an exception.

The policy statement cites a 2010 report that found U.S. children aged

8 to 18 spend an average of more than seven hours daily using some kind of entertainment media. Many kids now watch TV online and many send text messages from their bedrooms after "lights out," including sexually explicit images by cellphone or Internet, yet few parents set rules about media use, the policy says.

"I guarantee you that if you have a 14-year-old boy and he has an Internet connection in his bedroom, he is looking at pornography," Strasburger said.

The policy notes

that three-quarters of kids aged 12 to 17 own cellphones; nearly all teens send text messages, and many younger kids have phones giving them online access.

"Young people now spend more time with media than they do in school — it is the leading activity for children and teenagers other than sleeping" the policy says.

Mark Risinger, 16, of Glenview, Ill., is allowed to use his smartphone and laptop in his room, and says he spends about four hours daily on the Internet doing homework, using Facebook and YouTube and watching movies.

He said a two-hour Internet time limit "would be catastrophic" and that kids won't follow the advice, "they'll just find a way to get around it."

Strasburger said he realizes many kids will scoff at advice from pediatricians — or any adults.

"After all, they're the experts! We're media-Ne-anderthals to them," he said. But he said he hopes it will lead to more limits from parents and schools, and more government research on the effects of media.

The policy was published online Monday in the journal Pediatrics. It comes two weeks after police arrested two Florida girls accused of bullying a classmate who committed suicide. Police say one of the girls recently boasted online about the bullying and the local sheriff questioned why the suspects' parents hadn't restricted their Internet use.

Mark's mom, Amy Risinger, said she agrees with restricting kids' time on social media but that deciding on other media limits should be up to parents.

Chemical weapons inspectors in Syria miss deadline

BEIRUT (AP) — International inspectors overseeing the destruction of Syria's chemical weapons stockpile have missed an early deadline in a brutally tight schedule after security concerns prevented them from visiting two sites linked to Damascus'

chemical program. Experts from the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons were to have checked all 23 of Syria's declared chemical sites by Sunday, but the organization said Monday that inspectors have visited only 21 because of security issues. While there are no consequences for missing the deadline, the group's failure to meet it underscores the ambitious timeline as well as the risks its inspectors face in carrying out their mission in the middle of Syria's civil war.

Israeli leader faces uproar over prisoner release

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's prime minister faced a political uproar from across the political spectrum on Monday over the planned release of 26 Palestinian prisoners, all according to authorities convicted on murder charges connected to deadly attacks on

Tuesday's release is part of a U.S.-brokered agreement that restarted peace talks with the Palestinians over the summer. It is the second of four planned releases of the longest-serving Palestinian prisoners held by Israel in the coming

The overnight announcement of the prisoner names triggered a storm of criticism. Among those going free are people jailed in connection to the killings of Israelis including a reservist and a Nazi death camp survivor, according to the list provided by Israel's prison service.

Driver plows into crowd at Beijing's **Tiananmen Square**

BEIJING (LA Times) — A jeep plowed through a crowded sidewalk at Beijing's Tiananmen Square at lunchtime Monday in an incident that left three dead and many injured, according to the state news service.

Hurricane-force gusts batter UK, Europe

LONDON — A savage coastal storm powered by hurricane-force gusts slashed its way through Britain and western Europe on Monday, felling trees, flooding lowlands and snarling traffic in the air, at sea and on land. At least 13 people were reported killed.

It was one of the worst storms to hit the region in years. The deadly tempest had no formal name and wasn't officially classified as a hurricane due to a meteorological standard — but it was dubbed the St. Jude storm (after the patron saint of lost causes) and stormageddon on social networks.

Gusts of 99 miles per hour were reported on the Isle of Wight in southern England, while

gusts up to 80 mph hit the British mainland. Later in the day, the Danish capital of Copenhagen saw record gusts up of to 120 mph and an autobahn in central Germany was shut down by gusts up to 62 mph.

All across the region, people were warned to stay indoors. Hundreds of trees were uprooted or split, blocking roads and crushing cars. The Dutch were told to leave their beloved bicycles at home for safety's sake.

At least 13 storm-related deaths were reported, most victims crushed by falling trees. Germany had six deaths, Britain had five and the Netherlands and Denmark had one each. One woman was also missing after being swept into the surf in France.

Two people were killed in London by a gas

explosion and a British teen who played in the storm-driven surf was swept out to sea. A man in Denmark was killed when a brick flew off a structure and hit him in the head.

Despite the strength of its gusts, the storm was

not considered a hurricane because it didn't form over warm expanses of open ocean like the hurricanes that batter the Caribbean and the United States. Britain's national weather service, the Met Office, said Britain

does not get hurricanes

because those are "warm latitude" storms that draw their energy from seas far warmer than the North Atlantic. Monday's storm also did not have an "eye" at its center like most hurricanes.

London's Heathrow Airport, Europe's busiest, canceled at least 130 flights and giant waves prompted the major English port of Dover to close, cutting off ferry services to France.

Nearly 1,100 passengers had to ride out the storm on a heaving ferry from Newcastle in Britain to the Dutch port of Ijmuiden after strong winds and heavy seas blocked it from docking in the morning. The ship returned to the North Sea to wait for the wind to die down rather than risk being smashed against the harbor's walls.

Beleaguered Syrian Christians fear future

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) - Sami Amir is used to the deep echoing rumble of the Syrian army artillery pounding rebel positions on the outskirts of Damascus. It's the thump of mortars launched from an Islamist-controlled neighborhood that scares him to death.

The mortars have repeatedly hit in his mainly Christian district of Damascus, al-Qassaa, reportedly killing at least 32 people and injuring dozens of others the past two weeks.

"You don't know when

and you don't know where they hit," says Amir, a 55-year-old Christian merchant. "Life here is often too difficult.'

Rebel shelling into the capital has increasingly hit several majority-Christian districts, particularly al-Qassaa, with its wide avenues, middle class apartment blocks, leafy parks, popular restaurants and shopping streets busy with pedestrians.

The shelling and recent rebel assaults on predominantly Christian towns have fueled fears among Syria's religious minorities about the growing role of Islamic extremists and foreign fighters among the rebels fighting against President Bashar Assad's rule. Christians believe they are being targeted — in part because of the anti-Christian sentiment among extremists and in part as punishment for what is seen as their support for Assad.

Though some Christians oppose Assad's brutal crackdown on the opposition and the community has tried to stay on the sidelines in the civil war, the rebellion's

increasingly outspoken Islamist rhetoric and the prominent role of Islamic extremist fighters have pushed them toward support of the government. Christians make up about 10 percent of Syria's 23 million people.

"When you bring a Christian and make him choose between Assad and the Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant, the answer is clear," said Hilal Khashan, a political scientist professor at the American University of Beirut, referring to the al-Qaida branch fighting

alongside the rebels. "It doesn't need much thinking.'

The rebels have targeted other Syrian minorities, particularly Alawites, the Shiite offshoot sect to which Assad belongs and which is his main support base. Altogether, ethnic and religious minorities - also including Kurds and Druze — make up a quarter of Syria's population. The majority, and most rebels, are Sunni Muslim.

But Christian areas have recently been the focus of fighting.



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S&P 500 logs another record

NEW YORK (AP) — The Standard & Poor's 500 index notched another record close on Monday by a tiny margin as good news from J.C. Penney helped offset disappointing earnings from several U.S. companies.

J.C. Penney was the biggest gainer in the S&P 500 after the retailer's CEO said sales were improving. Merck fell after the drugmaker sharply lowered its earnings forecast for the year and reported a plunge in third-quarter earnings. Roper Industries, a medical and industrial equipment

manufacturer, dropped after lowering its full-year earnings estimate.

The S&P 500 has closed at an all-time high six times in October. The index was boosted earlier in the month by a deal in Washington that ended a partial government shutdown and prevented a potential default on the U.S. government's debt. Stocks have also climbed because companies have been able to keep increasing their earnings even as the economy failed to escape stall speed.

Earnings are expected to rise by about

4.5 percent at S&P 500 companies, according to data from S&P Capital IO. While that is the slowest rate of growth in a year, companies are still beating the estimates of Wall Street analysts. About twothirds of the companies that have published third-quarter earnings so far have exceeded

"Earnings are beating a low bar," said Russ Koesterich, chief investment strategist at BlackRock. "You have an economy that's not producing a lot of top-line growth, but it's allowing

analysts' expectations.

Burger King sees early promise in Satisfries

NEW YORK (AP) — Burger King says it's attracting more customers with its new lower-calorie fries but is being careful not to call them a home run yet.

The Miami-based company said Monday that it saw sales trends in North America turn positive after last month's launch of "Satisfries," which have 20 percent fewer calories than its regular fries because of a batter that absorbs less oil.

"It brought in incremental consumers who would otherwise not have come into Burger King," said Alex Macedo, the chain's president of North American operations. He noted that other promotions also played a role in improving sales and stressed that the economic climate nevertheless remained challenging.

Pending sales of existing homes slump

WASHINGTON (Bloomberg) — Fewer Americans than forecast signed contracts to buy previously owned homes in September, the fourth straight month of declines, as rising mortgage rates slowed momentum in the housing market.

The index of pending home sales slumped 5.6 percent, exceeding all estimates in a Bloomberg survey of economists and the biggest drop in more than three years, after a 1.6 percent decrease in August, the National Association of Realtors reported Monday in Washington. The index fell to the lowest level this year. Mortgage rates last

Scientists dig for fossils in LA a century later

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Surrounded by a gooey graveyard of prehistoric beasts, a small crew diligently wades through a backlog of fossil finds from a century of excavation at the La Brea Tar Pits in the heart of Los Angeles.

Digs over the years have unearthed bones of mammoths, mastodons, saber-toothed cats, dire wolves and other unsuspecting Ice Age creatures that became trapped in ponds of sticky asphalt. But it's the smaller discoveries — plants, insects and rodents — in recent years that are shaping scientists' views of life in the region 11,000 to

50,000 years ago. "Earlier excavations really missed a great part of the story," said John Harris, chief curator at the George C. Page Museum, which oversees the fossil collection. People "were only taking out bones they could see, but it's the hidden bones that provide clues to the environment."

to do that it could easily take another century to complete. On a recent Wednesday, a volunteer in a white lab coat skull in the museum's fishbowl laboratory where visitors can witness paleontology in action. Nearby, two workers hunched over microscopes, sorting bone fragments belonging to extinct creatures.

beasts ruled the land. Back then, sagebrush scrub covered the basin, home to herds of mammoths, bison, camels and ground sloths. Mastodons hung out in the woodlands. Lurking were meat-eating predators including

saber-toothed cats, dire wolves and giant jaguars.

Every so often, creatures would get bogged down in pools of water and asphalt that seeped from underground crude oil deposits, and die of dehydration or starvation. Stranded animals

that appeared to be easy prey then became a trap for predators that also got stuck in the ooze.

In 1913, the predecessor to the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County launched a twoyear project to uncover only the best-preserved

mammal bones, largely ignoring everything else. Though the early digs gave scientists a glimpse into the types of animals that roamed, there was still much to be learned.

After the early missteps, scientists in 1969 decided to focus on pulling everything out and revisited a tar pit dubbed Pit 91 to do a more detailed excavation. For nearly 40 years, work at Pit 91 dominated the Page Museum's efforts as visitors gawked from a viewing platform.

Museum officials temporarily halted digging at Pit 91 several years ago to concentrate on an unexpected trove of Ice Age fossils that was found during the construction of an underground garage next to the tar pits, located some 7 miles west of downtown Los Angeles.

"I can't think of any other site that is as rich," said Sarah George, executive director of the Natural History Museum of Utah.

Sex among demented spurs elderly care group to call for policies

(Bloomberg) — An association of professionals who work at hundreds of elderly-care facilities in the United States is calling on the homes to reconsider their policies — or, in most cases, lack of policies — on geriatric

AMDA, formerly known as the American Medical Directors Association, said it took the action after articles published

by Bloomberg News exposed the under-examined issues and consequences of sex between the demented at U.S. facilities.

Some nursing home companies are already reviewing their policies in light of the stories. Hebrew Health Care, a nonprofit operator of a variety of elderlycare services in West Hartford, Conn., started developing a policy and

training in September,

said Pamela Atwood, its director of dementia-care services.

'What our organization would love to see is assuming that intimacy and sexuality is normal, because it is," Atwood said. "We're looking at taking care of the baby boomers. These folks burned their bras and developed the pill. Do we really think they're not going to be sexual?"

Nursing homes and other long-term care

facilities are widely unprepared to deal with sex among expanding populations of residents with dementia, partly because administrators, staff and families are reluctant to discuss or even acknowledge elderly sexuality, AMDA concluded after a survey of physicians and other medical professionals who work with elderly care facilities across the

As the baby boom generation ages, "there is a growing need for change in policies and institutional practices focused on intimacy and sexual behavior," Columbia, Md.-based AMDA said. "While the mandate is clearly recognized, silence and invisibility regarding this issue seem the prevailing paradigm."

The recent AMDA survey and interviews with caregivers suggest the issue is a low priority for most facilities. Only

13 percent of survey respondents said they work with facilities that provide staff training on sexual behavior, which the AMDA said means employees are "significantly undertrained." Fewer than one in four respondents said their facilities have policies addressing the problem, according to the survey. Almost half of the respondents didn't know whether their facilities have policies.



Putting Richmond in the rearview

Late-race spin scandal fades for Bowyer

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Clint Bowyer fielded fan questions for nearly 30 minutes Monday at the NASCAR Hall of Fame, where the topics covered everything from his recent appearance on an episode of "Duck Dynasty" to his displeasure with people

Not a single person asked him about Richmond.

who text while driving.

Finally, nearly two months after Bowyer spun late in the race that set the field for the Sprint Cup-deciding Chase, the scandal is finally fading into his rearview mirror.

His actions in the Sept. 7 race triggered a massive chain reaction that knocked the wind out of NASCAR as it headed into its championship portion of the season. Michael Waltrip Racing was crippled with the loss of a longtime sponsor, and Martin Truex Jr. and 15 percent of the MWR workforce were given pink

Bowyer, one of the most popular drivers inside the garage, suddenly found he was considered Public Enemy No. 1 among a fan base that only in the last few years had begun to appreciate his talent and humor.

"I was in middle of a storm, certain kind of storm. A four-lettered storm is what I'd call that," Bowyer said Monday.

It took a toll on the freewheeling country boy from Kansas. He was second in the points heading into the Richmond race and thought he'd challenge for a championship this year. Then came the fallout from Richmond, where NASCAR said MWR deliberately manipulated the finish of the race in an attempt to get Truex into the 12-driver Chase field.

He said he quickly figured out the final laps at Richmond had created a firestorm that wasn't going away anytime soon.

"I didn't that night. But then (figured out) 'this is not good,' "Bowyer said. "I was immediately crushed because of the sport and what I care and believe about this sport. It was tough."

The Chase was effectively over for Bowyer before it began. He opened with a ninth-place finish at Chicago, where points leader Matt Kenseth won, and was 17th the next week at New Hampshire, where Kenseth won again. Just like that, Bowyer was 10th in the standings and out of the title hunt.

He acknowledged Monday the Richmond drama "definitely" contributed to the No. 15 team stumbling out of the gate.

Bowyer said he read things about himself over the last seven weeks, heard things on the radio, and learned to bite his

tongue.

"Out of respect and understanding the magnitude of the situation, I never would have dreamed in a million years that would have escalated into what it did, it was a bad deal," Bowyer said. "Hardest thing I've ever been through in this sport, but certainly not the hardest thing I've been through in my life. It was tough to listen to those things for a while. It's not like me to just keep my mouth shut. I wanted to bite back, but certainly, again, respected the situation. I understood the magnitude of it and knew I was part of it and didn't want to be.'

It's the third time since 2010 that Bowyer's title chances were vanked out from underneath him in the blink of an eye.

He opened the 2010 Chase with a win at New Hampshire that vaulted him from 12th to second in the standings. Then NASCAR ruled his car was illegal, docked him 150 points, and the lengthy appeal process wore down his race team.

Richard Childress Racing never got the points back, but it didn't matter, anyway. Bowyer finished 25th and 15th in the two races after New Hampshire and spent the entire Chase trying not to finish last in the field. Last year, Bowyer used

a win at Charlotte at the midpoint of the Chase to move to fourth, then close to third in the standings with the leaders in sight with two races remaining. But an angry Jeff Gordon chose the penultimate race to settle a vendetta and deliberately wrecked Bowyer late in the race at

Phoenix. It ended his title chances with one race remaining, and this year he hardly got out of the gate. Lister Street in Port Charlotte. Yacht

Reeling Miami back to work

DAVIE — The Miami Dolphins had little time Monday to dwell on their most dreadful day yet this season.

After blowing a two-touchdown lead at New England to lose their fourth game in a row, the Dolphins must regroup quickly to face first-place Cincinnati on Thursday. The quick turnaround might be for the best, because the latest defeat was one to forget.

"Obviously we aren't at an all-time high right now," quarterback Ryan Tannehill said. "But we've got to get back on track. That's the only option we have with a short week."

Regrouping won't be easy after the collapse at Foxborough. Miami (3-4) was outscored 24-0 over the final 24 minutes to lose 27-17, accelerating a tailspin that began after the Dolphins won their first three games.

Now they've gone more than five weeks without a victory, and they'll be hard-pressed to end the drought against Cincinnati (6-2). The AFC North leaders extended their winning streak to four games Sunday by drubbing the Jets 49-9.

Sacks and turnovers were again the most glaring problems in the Dolphins' latest loss, but there's also a new, troubling trend. They had a shot at winning in the fourth quarter in each of the past three games but were outplayed each time.

Tannehill's play has regressed in recent weeks, and the second-year quarterback has been especially erratic late in games, with a passer rating of 60.9 in the fourth quarter this season.

Poor protection remains part of the problem, despite the acquisition of left tackle Bryant McKinnie, who started Sunday after three days of practice. The Patriots blitzed relentlessly in the second half, and Tannehill was sacked six times to tie his season high. His 32 sacks lead the NFL.

Compounding Miami's offensive problems, receiver Brandon Gibson was sidelined by a knee injury that may be seasonending. He has three of the nine touchdowns Tannehill has thrown to wideouts in his 23 starts.

The defense hasn't been good enough to win lately, either. Miami ranks in the middle of the NFL pack in run defense, pass defense and takeaways, and has allowed 20 points or more in six consecutive games.

But while the Dolphins' woes are numerous, wide receiver Mike Wallace said the solution is simple.

"We go to work. That's all you can do," he said. "Sitting here and saying that isn't going to get it done."

Injury throws Bucs for another loss

TAMPA — Tampa Bay's struggling offense suffered another setback Monday: Receiver Mike Williams needs surgery to repair a hamstring injury and will miss the remainder of the season.

Williams was placed on injured reserve when the Bucs returned to practice after the weekend off. The fourth-year pro who signed a six-year, \$40.25 million contract in July, had 22 receptions for 216 yards and two touchdowns in six games.

"Mike had a hamstring injury that he tried to play through, but just wasn't effective doing it," coach Greg Schiano said. "He'll get surgery now, and it'll be repaired. He'll be fine, but it'll be a little bit of a recovery."

Losing Williams is yet another blow to the winless Bucs (0-7), who've struggled offensively in the wake of a messy split with quarterback Josh Freeman and injuries to running back Doug Martin and guard Carl Nicks, who are both out indefinitely.

Williams injured his right hamstring against Arizona on Sept. 29. He was inactive against Philadelphia on Oct. 13, but played the past two weeks and had a

combined seven catches for 52 yards and no TDs.

A year ago, Williams teamed with Vincent Jackson to give Tampa Bay one of the top receiving tandems in the league. Jackson is off to another strong start with 41 receptions for 623 yards and four TDs. However, the sore hamstring hindered Williams' ability to do what he's done best since entering the league as a fourth-round draft pick in 2010 — make leaping catches over defenders downfield.

While Jackson was putting together his fourth 1,000-yard season in 2012, Williams averaged a career-best 15.8 yards per reception on the way to finishing with 63 catches for 996 yards and nine TDs.

"After getting all the information from the doctors, he was allowed to try (to play)," Schiano said. "He did for two weeks, but wasn't really

himself. He couldn't do the things he needs to do to be effective, so it's time to get surgery."

Before sitting out this month's game against the Eagles, Williams had not missed a game in his career. He's started 52 of 54 games he's appeared in and has 215 receptions for 2,947 yards and 25 touchdowns.

Rookie quarterback Mike Glennon has one established receiver, Jackson, who's had 100yard games in two of the third-round draft picks four starts.

Tiquan Underwood, , a fifth-year pro with 43 career catches, likely will move into the starting lineup, and Williams' absence figures to create more playing time for Chris Owusu, Eric Page and Skye Dawson, a trio of young, unproven receivers.

Schiano said he does plan some changes to try to help Glennon, who's thrown 181 passes more than any player in league history through the first four games of a

"I think we've put Mike is a bad spot," Schiano said. "He's thrown too many passes. ... We shouldn't put him in that spot as coaches. We're going to try to play a little more balanced."

UM bracing for hurricane Jameis

CORAL GABLES -Jameis Winston's numbers are just ridiculous. A 70 percent completion rate. An average of 311 passing yards per game. Multiple touchdown throws in every outing so far this season.

That's how a redshirt freshman becomes a Heisman Trophy frontrunner. That's also why the Florida State quarterback has Miami's full attention.

Seven teams have tried, all have failed, and now it's Miami's turn to figure out a way to solve the riddle of "Famous Jameis," who will lead No. 3 Florida State (7-0, 4-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) against the seventh-ranked Hurricanes (7-0, 3-0) in Tallahassee on Saturday. And the Hurricanes are making no secret of the fact that at least slowing Winston down is an absolute priority for them this weekend.

"He's beyond his years," said Miami coach Al Golden, whose eyes widened a bit Monday when asked what impresses him about Winston's game. "He's mature with the football. Strong arm, can move his feet, can create from a bad situation and I just think he's excellent."

Then again, this is Miami-Florida State. Numbers against other teams aren't always the best indicator of what

And that's just part of Miami's history of thwarting Florida State quarterbacks. The Seminoles have passed for only 11 touchdowns in their last 13 games against the Hurricanes. Miami's defense this year has given up only six passing touchdowns, tied for third-fewest in the nation.

But Winston, so far, has seemed unfazed.

"How he's gotten there is the thing I think he's got to remember, and I think he's doing a great job of that," Florida State coach Jimbo Fisher said. "Who was I before everyone knew me? I'm the same guy. And I think he does that. And I think our team respects that from him.'

on and Derrick Rose came back, though Kobe Bryant won't quite yet. Nine firsttime coaches are coming in and David Stern will soon head out.

With different looks all around the NBA in 2013-14, one familiar sight remains: LeBron James and the Miami Heat are entering another season as the team to beat.

The two-time defending champions will collect their rings Tuesday night, then open against the Chicago Bulls, who with a healthy Rose might be the team that can unseat the Heat.

Or maybe it's San Antonio or Indiana, both a game away last year — actually, the Spurs were just seconds away — from finishing off Miami. Perhaps it's the Nets or Clippers, after both picked up pieces of the old Celtics that had the Heat's respect but not their number.

If someone does dethrone King James, it won't be because he was satisfied with two titles and lost his edge.


"When the hunger is gone, I'm going to give it up," James said. "I've got a talent and I'm going to take full advantage of it. So I'm hungry.

"I love the game. There's nothing I would do more than play this game of basketball. So the championships are all great, but I'm playing for more than that. I've got a bigger calling than that."

If he means becoming the best ever, he might be on his way. With four MVP trophies and no noticeable weaknesses, the gap with his peers is getting larger and the one with the greats before him is shrinking.

"He's the best on the planet right now. I don't know what you can do, but just hope that he misses," said Nets coach Jason Kidd, one of the nine coaches getting his first opportunity. In total, 13 teams changed coaches.

James did miss in the closing seconds of Game 6 of the NBA Finals, but the Heat got the rebound to set up Ray Allen's tying 3-pointer, pulled it out in overtime and won Game 7 to deny the Spurs a fifth

title.

San Antonio may get another chance to finish the job, or may not even be the best team in Texas after Howard joined James Harden in Houston.

Howard bolted after one unfulfilling season in Los Angeles, where he and Bryant never found a working partnership. The center already seems happier and healthier in Houston, where he and Harden can build a potent inside-outside tandem.

As for Bryant, he'll watch the Lakers' opener, and who knows how much more, while he continues to rehab from a torn Achilles' tendon. Questions over how well he can play at 35 after such a serious injury, along with Howard's departure, created unusually low expectations for the

Instead, the buzz in Los Angeles is about the Clippers, who hired Doc Rivers to coach while Paul Pierce and Kevin Garnett went to Brooklyn after Boston's breakup. That

also could make both longtime losers not only the current kings of their cities, but also contenders to reach the NBA Finals which are returning to the 2-2-1-1-1 format after 29 years of 2-3-2.

Here are five other things to watch around the NBA this season:

SITTING SPEEDSTERS While Rose returns after sitting out last season with a torn ACL, Russell Westbrook and Rajon Rondo remain out recovering from knee surgeries. A healthy Westbrook makes Oklahoma City a title contender while Rondo could help the Celtics exceed expectations — or perhaps become the next player they trade.

UP AND COMERS They're not ready to contend for a title, but keep an eye on New Orleans, Washington and Cleveland, all with dynamite young players who may be good enough to carry their franchises back to the postseason.

CHANGING COMMISSIONERS Adam Silver replaces the retiring Stern as commissioner on Feb. 1, exactly 30 years after Stern took office. Silver has done much of the heavy lifting for years, but he'll be replacing

one of the greatest executives sports has seen. "I'm excited for the league and for the future, and for the fact that having been at the league now for 36 years, we've reached this point and there's a really extraordinary executive in Adam ready to take it to the next level," Stern said.

SUMMER STORIES Business will really pick up after the next NBA champion is crowned. Kansas freshman Andrew Wiggins, should he decide to enter the draft, could become the most sought-after prospect in years. Free agency will then open on July 1 with James and Carmelo Anthony perhaps set to top the class.

WHO WINS? The Heat are the choice of everyone from odds makers to the executives who voted in the NBA.com GM survey. But they were enormous favorites last season after a 27-game winning streak during a 66-win regular season and almost fell. This time, there's even more teams capable of finally knocking them off. "They are the favorites, but I don't think they're the heavy favorites," Hall of Famer and TNT analyst Charles Barkley said. "Everybody's picking the Heat right now, but there's some teams, they're going to have some stiff competition."

Emotions always play a part of Ring Night, and this will be no exception.

Seven years ago, when Heat veterans Dwyane Wade and Udonis Haslem got their first title rings, Miami played the Bulls for the opener. Final score: Bulls 108, Heat 66.

Claims cost Penn State \$59.7 million


HARRISBURG, Pa. -Penn State said Monday it is paying \$59.7 million to 26 young men over claims of child sexual abuse at the hands of former assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky.

The school said 23 deals are fully signed and three are agreements in principle, but did not disclose the names of the recipients. The school faces six other claims, and the university says it believes some of those do not have merit while others may produce settlements.

University president Rodney Erickson issued a statement calling the announcement a step forward for victims and the school.

'We cannot undo what has been done, but we can and must do everything possible to learn from this and ensure it never happens again at Penn State," said Erickson, who announced the day Sandusky was convicted in June 2012 of 45 criminal counts that Penn State was determined to compensate his victims.

The settlements have been unfolding since mid-August, when attorneys for the accusers began to disclose them. Penn State followed a

policy in which it has not been confirming them, waiting instead to announce deals at once.

Harrisburg lawyer Ben Andreozzi, who helped negotiate several of the settlements, said his

clients were satisfied. "They felt that the

university treated them fairly with the economic and noneconomic terms of the settlement," said Andreozzi, who also represents some others who have come forward recently. Those new claims have not been presented to the university, he said.

Penn State has spent more than \$50 million on other costs, including lawyers' fees, public relations expenses, and adoption of new policies and procedures related to children and sexual abuse complaints.

It said Monday that liability insurance is

expected to cover the payments and legal defense, and expenses not covered should be paid from interest paid on loans by Penn State to its self-supporting units.

Sandusky, 69, has been pursuing appeals while he serves a 30- to 60-year state prison sentence.

Three former Penn State administrators await trial in Harrisburg on charges they engaged in a criminal cover-up of the Sandusky scandal. Former president Graham Spanier, retired vice president Gary Schultz and retired athletic director Tim Curley deny the allegations. A trial date has not been set.

MOORE WINS CIMB CLASSIC IN PLAYOFF

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Ryan Moore birdied the first hole of a playoff with Gary Woodland on Monday to win the CIMB Classic after an overnight wait caused by thunderstorms.

Moore had to fight just to get in the playoff, hitting an awkward 60-yard wedge shot on the 18th hole Sunday that dropped within several feet of the hole and allowed him to salvage par.

He and Woodland finished at 14-under 274, with the playoff postponed until Monday because of fading light.

In the playoff, Moore hit a similarly well-placed approach with an 8-iron to the same green that stopped about 5 feet from the hole, setting up his winning putt.

It was Moore's third PGA Tour title and came nearly a year after he won his second at the 2012 Shriners Hospitals for Children Open in Las Vegas.

Tiger Woods put the heat on Golf Channel over analyst Brandel Chamblee's insinuation of cheating, saying "the ball really is in the court of the Golf Channel and what they are prepared to do." Golf Channel has not commented on the flap. ...

Rory McIlroy won for the first time this year — even if it was an 18-hole exhibition against Woods. McIlroy made four birdies and an eagle over the final seven holes for a 6-under 67 at Mission Hills, giving him a one-shot win over Woods for the second straight year in China. ...

The LPGA Tour is waiving its 18-year-old age requirement to let 16-year-old Lydia Ko become a member. Ko was 15 when she became the youngest winner of an LPGA event last year at the Canadian Women's Open. She defended her title in Canada this year. She will join the tour for the start of the 2014 season.

Purdue suspends Hammons: Purdue coach Matt Painter suspended starting center A.J. Hammons for three games for violating team rules. Painter did not elaborate on what rules were violated. A year ago, Hammons was one of the Big Ten's top freshmen. The 7-foot, 251-pound center averaged 10.6 points and 6.0 rebounds.

MLB seeks dismissal of A-Rod's lawsuit: Lawyers for Major League Baseball are seeking a speedy dismissal of an Alex Rodriguez lawsuit accusing the league and Commissioner Bud Selig of trying to drive him out of baseball, according to a letter sent to U.S. District Judge Lorna G. Schofield in Manhattan. She agreed lawyers on both sides could make their formal requests by Nov. 8. ...

Major League Baseball's all-time home run leader asked a federal appeals court to reconsider its refusal to overturn his felony obstruction conviction. Barry Bonds made his longshot request of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco. A three-judge panel of the 9th Circuit upheld Bonds' conviction in September.

Bulldogs enjoy host privileges

ARCADIA — After winning its 16th district championship and third in a row Thursday night, DeSoto County High School took it easy this weekend.

The Bulldogs were the lone area team to win a district championship, and earned the right to host tonight's Region 5A-3 opener. They had a light practice Friday afternoon, then spent the next two days resting for battle against Cypress Lake.

DeSoto County (14-11) doesn't know much about the Panthers (16-10, District 5A-12 runner-up), who lost to Lemon Bay on Oct. 5 and lost to Port Charlotte during a weekend tournament, but Bulldogs coach Laura White said an in-depth scouting report would not change the plan of attack.

"We'll probably watch a few videos of (the Panthers) just to see them play, but at this time of the year, the main thing is to just keep our team healthy and ready to go," she said. "We're just going to continue to do what we've been doing, and practice what we've been practicing. (In the district championship) we stayed with normal routine and it worked just fine."

The Bulldogs split with Port Charlotte this season. and took two of three matches from Lemon Bay. The latter included a win for Thursday's district title, and should the Manta Rays and Bulldogs win their respective regional openers tonight, next week will feature a fourth meeting between the teams this season.

White was optimistic about the Bulldogs' chances against the Panthers (16-10), helped along by DeSoto County's distinct home-court advantage.

"It does help to stay at home, be able to eat there, take it easy and get ready for the game," she added."Our last district game we had a pretty good crowd going, it's a nice thing to see everyone come out and support us."

Lemon Bay (11-9) saw its 2012 season end at the hands of Lely, and the Manta Rays received the same regional quarterfinal matchup this season. The Manta Rays have not beaten the Trojans in the past five seasons, and took a three-day weekend after losing in the district championship to prepare.

success doesn't come as a big surprise — he contributed last season as a freshman and has been one of the team's top golfers all season. But the postseason success of freshman Chace Neer has been a pleasant surprise for Lemon Bay.

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

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



Early treatment is critical for sepsis

Would you be able to write something about sepsis? I recently spent almost a week in the hospital being treated aggressively with IV antibiotics for this. Did it used to be called blood poisoning? How does one get it? Is it contagious? What are the chances of it recurring? I am told I was very lucky to be diagnosed early, as it has a fairly high mortality rate. Oddly enough, it was extreme pain in my neck and upper back that made me go to the emergency room. Could the sepsis have stirred up my arthritis?

ANSWER: Sepsis is a severe reaction to a generalized infection. In a serious infection from any cause — such as skin infection, urine infection or pneumonia — certainly there is danger from the bacteria (or other germ, such as virus, fungus or parasite), but also from the body's excessive response. Treatment of sepsis must include treating the infection while simultaneously treating the effects of excessive inflammation. For example, many of the substances released by both the bacteria and the body during sepsis cause the veins to relax, which, if severe, can lower the blood pressure dangerously. Thus, IV fluids are an important treatment of sepsis. Severe sepsis has a very high mortality rate, so treating early is critical.

"Blood poisoning" is an imprecise term, but might include sepsis, especially from a skin source. Whether sepsis recurs depends on the site and type of the initial infection. That's why it's so important to find and treat any underlying

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have degenerative disk disease, spina bifida, spinal stenosis, curvature of the spine and disk herniation. A friend told me that a friend died after having back surgery — from rusting of the rods that were put in. Is it possible for rods to rust after implantation? Any help would be appreciated

on back surgery. — G.C. **ANSWER:** There are many reasons to be hesitant about back surgery, but rusting of the rods is not one of them. The

materials used don't rust inside the body.

You have so many back issues (spina bifida is when the bones of the spine don't completely grow around the spinal cord, although there are many different types) that you need an expert to discuss your possible treatments. Infection is the most feared complication whenever artificial materials are placed in the body.

In general, have a healthy skepticism when hearing about medical issues from a friend of a friend.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I recently had an initial appointment with a physician who has an on-site lab. I'm a healthy 61-yearold female coming for a wellness exam. At the end of the visit, he told me the phlebotomist would be coming in to draw my blood. This was a 1 p.m. appointment, and I had eaten both breakfast and lunch. I informed him that I had eaten and told him I would prefer to be fasting. He said that was fine and I could come back at a later date. The blood work included cholesterol testing as well as blood glucose.

ANSWER: Fasting cholesterol and glucose levels have different interpretations from those after eating, but both provide useiui iniormation. Fasting results are better standardized, but normal results after eating are reassuring. Since some people never come back for their blood tests, we often prefer to get what readings we can, and repeat only if the levels are abnormal.







Should shoppers zip up?

Dear Readers: How many times have you gone shopping and, as you pay for the purchases, been asked for your ZIP code? Did you ever wonder why the retailers are asking you for this information? Do you have to give it to them? Not really, unless using a credit card where the issuer requests a ZIP code for security purposes.

It's all about marketing and getting more information about you. Asking the ZIP code gives a retailer easy access to your address, which helps it mail you advertisements, coupons and other junk mail from that store and maybe others if the retailer 'shares" or sells its data.

However, at a gas station, you may be asked for our ZIP code to prevent fraud. A thief probably would not know your ZIP code (unless he or she stole your purse or wallet with other identifying information in there).



Retailers share their advice in dealing with unruly kids

DEAR ABBY: I managed a retail store for 10 years, and I can relate to the shop owner who signed herself "Had It With Overindulged Kids" (June 28). She could turn things around by creating a designated play area and market to the children by taking any opened items and placing them there for a children's testing ground.

I had a "play table" with toys to keep them busy while their moms shopped. I put a gated area around it and a dads' bench in front of it so they could watch the children.

They are your customers. So cater to them and be thankful the parents shop in your store. Learn the children's names and suggest new age-appropriate products. If you don't have the time, hire someone who loves children and has the patience to play with them in a controlled environment. — JOYCE FROM MICHIGAN

DEAR JOYCE: Thank you for the helpful advice. Customers and retailers alike shared their experiences. Many of them questioned whether the children always misbehaved this badly in public and blamed their behavior on today's parenting skills—or lack thereof. Here's a sampling:

DEAR ABBY: I shopped at a local store for years, but gave up when the place seemed overrun by unruly children and distracted parents. Out of desperation, I took a job there and vowed to find a way to make the parents rein in their youngsters.

One: I posted a sign that read, "if you break it, you bought it." If they refused, I didn't push the issue, but I did gesture upward. They would always look up, and when they did, I'd thank them for smiling at our cameras.

Two: Any child found unaccompanied would be escorted to our customer service area and the parents paged repeatedly

Since I instituted these policies, the condition of the store has improved, the morale of the employees has improved, sales have risen, and old customers who left due to the old circumstances are returning. — SURVIVOR OF RETAIL HELL
