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Punta Gorda restricts demonstrations, events at **Vietnam Wall**

PUNTA GORDA — A Punta Gorda resident and Vietnam veteran said Wednesday a proposed ordinance to limit demonstrations and special events at a veterans memorial violates free speech.

The ordinance would create a limited designated public forum around the perimeter at Vietnam Wall of Southwest Florida at Laishley Park — a half-sized replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

The City Council moved unanimously to approve a restricted boundary surrounding the veterans wall, but reduced the setback for sound and staging equipment from 100 feet to 50 feet.

'You'll merely be proving that the delineation of the prohibited zone here in Punta Gorda is just arbitrary and not purpose-driven," said Michael Hirsh, a U.S. Army combat correspondent in Vietnam and former journalist. "... I'm sure that someone will say that you can grant an exemption to the Military Heritage Museum. But if you give them an exemption, you have to give an exemption to everyone who asks. Otherwise, you are picking and choosing what speech is acceptable."

An original draft of the ordinance called for demonstrations and special events

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Officials: Man killed girlfriend prior to car fire

OSPREY — A Hillsborough County man is accused of killing his girlfriend and then torching his vehicle with her body inside on Interstate 75 last month.

The Sarasota County Sheriff's Office has charged Michael Clark with murder in the death of Kristen Kelley.

Clark, 34, was found

standing next to his burning 2012 Chrysler Town & Country minivan Oct. 15 along southbound Interstate 75 near Mile Marker 202 near Osprey.

After the fire was extinguished, authorities found the body of Kelley, 34, of Riverview, in the small area between the third row and the lift gate, reports show.

Invading iguanas could be 'biggest disaster of all'

Like the esteemed Pilgrims hundreds of years ago, many of these more recent immigrants came to our country

specifically Southwest Florida — on ships. Not interested in religious freedom (as far as we know), and most of the time, not even looking to travel, most were accidental stowaways who were minding their own business, munching contentedly on a vegetarian meal when they were inadvertently plucked, host plant and all, and placed on ships bound for Florida.

In their new homeland, they adapted as best they could, tasting the strange, new plants that proliferated naturally here and finding them tasty indeed.

Instead of building their own residences, to save time they simply supplanted natives' homes and claimed them as their own. Call it the invasion of the iguanas.

Pets and pet peeves

To be sure, some were bound for pet stores, placed purposely on the ships to be offered as novelty pets to those who wanted something unusual.

Unfortunately, many owners weren't prepared for their enormous size — growing 4 to 5 feet — and simply released them into the wild to fend for themselves, frightening and frustrating locals as they reproduced rapidly and ate every pretty petal off their carefully tended flowering plants.

Even more troubling, the interlopers often took over gopher tortoise burrows and sea turtle nests, rendering the native species homeless and in

Say 'no' to unsolicited air-conditioning service offers

Although having no issues with her air-conditioning system, the 72-year-old Port Charlotte resident told me she accepted an unsolicited phone offer from FAST AC for a \$34.95 "tune-up." When the techs arrived, she says they told her she had an "urgent situation."

"My compressor, air handler, and all ductwork and vents were

full of mold," Jackie wrote me. "They said I needed major work done immediately, or my system will burn out." Saying she was "under much duress," Jackie agreed to a "discounted" price of \$1,995 and paid with her debit However, without a requested

itemized bill, Jackie had second thoughts about the need for the job and cost. So, she asked FAST AC to "hold off" completing the balance of the work and didn't

want them to return. Jackie then requested an adjustment of her bill. While the tech later offered \$395 subject to the owner's approval, Jackie's heard nothing since.

So, I wrote the owner and license holder, Matt Foster. Instead, a reply came from Foster's office manager, Mike Hussion.

"When I discussed this with my technicians, they claimed that indeed they did see a problem that was very noticeable and should have been fixed immediately," wrote Hussion. "It is of course not in our policies or guidelines into forcing or pressuring on any sales." Hussion confirmed the company would honor the \$395 refund, but nothing more.

I quickly discovered this wasn't an isolated case. Another reader wrote me with almost the exact same scenario, after accepting a FAST AC

Two drop out of Punta Gorda police chief search

PUNTA GORDA — Eight candidates remain as two bowed out from consideration as Punta Gorda searches for its new police chief.

Jeff Hadley, public safety chief at Kalamazoo (Michigan) Police Department, didn't cite a reason for withdrawing his name, and David Sklarek, former chief deputy at Osceola County Sheriff's Office, said the "timing wasn't right," City Manager Howard Kunik said Thursday.

Interviews for the top eight wrapped up today with a final decision

"forthcoming in a short time frame," Kunik said. City Council members met with candidates, as did community liaisons, the city manager said.

Hadley — who received an associate degree in Fort Myers and was a patrol officer at the Cape Coral Police Department — was embroiled in a scandal in 2011 after he struck an SUV in his cityowned car and failed to immediately report it.

Sklarek made headlines as well.

After launching an unsuccessful bid for sheriff a year ago, it was revealed that Sklarek planned to collect a lump sum he accumulated

through the state deferred retirement option program (DROP), as well as his monthly retirement and sheriff's salary, according to Orlando's WFTV. The practice is legal, but some argued Sklarek would have been double-dipping.

After receiving over 130 applications, Punta Gorda quickly whittled down the list. None of the contenders live closer than 23 miles from Punta Gorda, with in-state candidates hailing from Fort Myers, Sebring, Tampa, Brooksville and Miami.

The salary will range from \$71,427 to \$110,718, depending on experience.

The vacancy was

created when former chief Tom Lewis was fired for his role in the death of 73-year-old retired librarian Mary Knowlton, who was fatally shot by former K-9 Officer Lee Coel during a community demonstration. Lewis was later acquitted of culpable negligence this summer; however, Kunik said Lewis could not continue as chief, citing safety concerns that happened under his watch.

Commission goes back to community for hospital help

NORTH PORT — After the creation of a task force, two interested hospital entities and many years of trying to get a hospital to the city, the North Port City Commission are going back to their original tactics.

Over the years, the city has tried and failed to obtain a certificate of need, either through a companies' filing or their own filing. The certificate of need is legally required to obtain in Florida to build a hospital in any city. The city has failed to be approved for a certificate of need.

The task force was created to help address those problems. But the issue became moot when after the task force's first meeting, two different hospital entities stated they wanted to come to the

"Our hand stirring the pot was not what we wanted to do," task force chair Nicholas Worden said. "(The hospital entities) already did the groundwork before the certificate of need was even filed."

The task force spent a few months looking at the entities and discussed what could be useful in a hospital specific to North Port. But after the city commission told the task force to choose their next direction, both parties felt disbanding would be best.

"You walked in and the rug was pulled out from under you guys," Commissioner Jill Luke said. "You did the best you could to coordinate the meetings so thank you to the entire task force. There was some light moments in the hard work you were trying to accomplish, as you were trying to accomplish climbing Mount Everest."

The commission unanimously approved to disband the task force at its Thursday afternoon special

meeting.

"Thank you for choosing us for this board, I know we all were grateful to be chosen," Worden said. "We're excited the city of North Port is getting a hospital. It may not be today or tomorrow but I know we're getting one."

But with the disbanding of the task force, the question still remained as to how the commission and community could help the hospital process — mainly showing support for the certificate of need already filed by Universal Health Services.

While some commissioners initially discussed creating an advisory board, after

talking amongst the group it was decided simply recruiting help from city staffers and volunteers would be the best route.

"Let's utilize whatever resources we have," Commissioner Chris Hanks said. "We haven't used any of our resources. We had trick-or-treating (at City Hall) with 3200 people. That would have been the perfect time to get 1,500 letters."

It is a tactic that was similarly employed by Vice Mayor Vanessa Carusone and a handful of others several years ago. They had gathered thousands of individual letters of support to bring by a bus to lawmakers in Tallahassee.

"They put in the certificate of need and the city supported them by putting the community support," she said. 'It was in collaboration with the commission. It was a true community effort and you have to have that.'

And it is the hope thousands of letters will be collected yet again under the new direction.

"We can elicit their help with the chamber of commerce and say 'I'm trying to get support for a hospital, '" Commissioner Debbie McDowell said. "Between social media, the media, the newspapers I really think we could step up our game."

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How to deal with iguanas as their numbers rise

Florida's booming iguana population is far from endangered — but the reptiles could be in the crosshairs soon.

State officials are looking at ways to control the critters.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission has begun an effort to push the do's and don'ts for removing iguanas and also ways to live in harmony with them.

Under Florida law, you can remove iguanas from your property "as long as it's done safely and humanely," said Sarah Funck, non-native species program coordinator for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

The herbivores, which can be spotted along canals and in backyards on any sunny day, munch their way through gardens and then leave behind the digested remains on patios and in pools.

Prolonged cold spells years ago took a big bite out of the iguana population, plunging the reptiles into a state of hibernation from which many of them could not recover. Iguanas, like some

Floridians, can't tolerate temperatures that drop into the 30s. The reptiles fall like icicles from trees.

Mild winters in recent years have propelled the population, said Funck, the coordinator for the FWC's nonnative species program.

"They are making messes on patios, they dig holes, undermine sea walls,' said Joe Miller, who runs JP Miller & Sons Pest Control.

Among the tips from Funck:

• Use wire-mesh screening to create a barrier around plants.

 Make sure chicken wire is installed at least one foot beneath the soil around your fences or seawalls to prevent iguanas from digging underneath them.

• Bang pots and pans together, play loud music, or shout at them to scare them off.

• Install electric fencing. Iguanas can get spooked when water is flung at them, so installing a water

scarecrow, basically a motion-activated sprinkler, is also an option, she said.

She also mentioned a few of the state laws regarding iguanas' removal. It's legal to gather iguana eggs and dispose of them, she said. It's also legal to hire a trapper or trap them yourself.

But inhumane tactics are unlawful, such as shooting iguanas with a BB gun or any other method that would harm them.

Boynton Beach residents living near Lake Ida Park say their yards are overrun with iguanas that devour their gardens and leave droppings on their patios and in their pools.

Iguanas' population has grown abundant because of their ability to lay nearly 100 eggs two or three times per year, Funck said. Tens of thousands, if not more, call Florida their new home.

Gary Fishman, president of the Diane Drive neighborhood association in Boynton Beach, said he sees at least 10 iguanas in his yard per day.

"They're beastly," said Fishman, a 30-year Boynton resident. "They have huge appetites, they eat all your vegetation and your flowers, and then they swim in your pool and go to the bathroom on your deck. They're very unsightly."

Hailing from Mexico to Panama, where they are favored for medicinal properties and as a food source, local lore says an original three were brought to Southwest Florida in 1978 or 1979. At first, the newcomers were considered harmless because their herbivore diet meant they weren't interested in other animal species as prey.

But the iguanas found the subtropical weather to be the perfect environment for them to flourish, and they've tended to prefer aggravating the rich and famous when it comes to

As they've multiplied, a favorite spot over the past 30 years or so: Gasparilla Island. In response to residents' complaints, Charlotte County began a trapping program that netted 9,467 of the invasive creatures from 2008 to 2011. In 2015, Charlotte signed a new, \$75,000 deal with the U.S. Department of Agriculture to continue trapping iguanas on the island.

In addition, Lee County was part of a program including hiring trapper George Cera, whose Save Florida Eat an Iguana cookbook can be found on amazon.com. Cera, after trapping or shooting them with a pellet gun,

also was disposing of iguana carcasses by giving them to crabbers as bait for their traps. Cera told the Boca Beacon that he captures about 2,000 a year.

Beyond Boca Grande, Charlotte records show numerous sightings all over the county, clustered in places from the Duncan Road area in Punta Gorda, up and down Edgewater Drive in Port Charlotte to various parts of Englewood and Rotonda. The beasts, well-established in Charlotte, Lee and Dade counties are expanding their reach statewide, according to the FWC.

New College of Florida has reported iguana colonies making their way north into Sarasota County. Cera has told the *Sun* that he previously harvested 500 iguanas from Blind Pass Park on Manasota Key. County records have shown sightings tended to be closer to the coast than the interior in places like North Port, but danger

Falling temperatures,

Iguanas do not do well in the cold. That's why they aren't found in central or northern Florida. A few years back, when winter temperatures dipped into freezing on many nights, residents really began to notice just how many iguanas proliferated their

Port Charlotte resident Deb Guinto had a warning out for frozen iguanas that might fall on your heads," she cautioned her nephew and his friend who were walk. They came back rather quickly, deciding to walk in the warmer

Guinto was only partially joking. The freezing temperatures caused iguanas to go into a frozen, hibernation state and subsequently fall from the tree branches. Some weren't dead, however. When the temperatures rose again in the daylight hours, the iguanas would again come to life. Seeing the frozen wildlife on the ground or, worse yet, encountering one during its fall, made residents aware of the vast numbers of iguanas that lived among them.

To serve homeowners throughout the region including Port Charlotte, Punta Gorda, Englewood and North Port — several local companies added iguanas to the animals they trap and relocate. Nuisance Wildlife Rangers added trained iguana trappers to their skilled technicians. IguanaControl.com traps and controls iguanas

Iguana Control recommends gradually reducing the landscape to love, such as hibiscus advise replacing them with alternatives such

Mexican Petunia, Silver Buttonwood, Chenille and others that iguanas do not favor.

"They (iguanas) are extremely resourceful and have adapted to changes in their environment very well. They can, and have, altered their diet to adjust for the availability of certain food," Iguana Control cautions on their website.

The University of Florida Extension Office adds greens such as kale, broccoli and lettuces to the food iguanas like; and citrus, milkweed and tough, thick-leaved plants to those that iguanas dislike.

Trapping iguanas on legal, if you can find a way to corral these elusive lizards. Since they are not native to Florida, they are considered exotic, unprotected wildlife. However, homeowners are bound by anti-cruelty laws. Only live trapping methods are permitted, such as nets, nooses, snares or catching by hand. (Good luck with that.) Be aware, too, that such traps will also catch other animals and even small pets.

Once caught, iguanas cannot be released back into the wild such as on someone else's property. Try giving them to someone who would enjoy them as a pet or selling them to a pet store.

Pests or pets?

While those who have been frustrated by having large numbers of wild iguanas on their property may not understand the lure of having one as a pet, many others do. A recent unofficial survey of local pet stores revealed that most do not sell iguanas. However, Petco is one store that

"People like them for the large size they can get, as big as four to 6 feet long," said Petco's Eileen Brumbaugh. "Green or blue ones are most popular."

It's more expensive to care for iguanas, though, than other lizards, Brumbaugh said. While other lizards eat insects, iguanas require lots of vegetables like kale, bell peppers, squash and carrots. Fruit should be given once a week, along with a calcium supplement. They also require more expensive, UVA and UVB light.

In fact, nearly one million green iguanas are imported as pets annually, according to Reptiles Magazine.

If only a fraction are released into the wild, or escape, iguanas as nuisance animals won't be eradicated any time soon.

spreads inland, it's game over. For everything.' University of

Florida Biologist Joe Wasilewski was critical of the Pinecrest Police Department last year when it bragged about rescuing a trapped iguana from a fence and released the reptile instead of having it euthanized by animal control.

"They're a threat that people don't realize. They're like a plague of locusts," Wasilewski told the Miami Herald. "They're out of control."

Catching them isn't easy. The spiny-tailed iguana, moving at more than 21 mph, is the speediest lizard on the globe, according to Guinness World Records, although still short of the fastest human on Earth, Olympic runner Usain Bolt's 27.8 mph in the 100-meter sprint.

Unclear the future potential impact of global warming, but if there is a positive for now, the physical size of the iguanas are stunted here to usually no more than four feet as compared to their native lands in southern Mexico and Central America closer to the equator, where the days are longer and hotter, a federal study shows. A six-footer there is not unusual, according

to Reptiles Magazine. Still, the large lizards are a menace to local landscapes and sea turtle nests. Some of the plants favored by iguanas, for example, attract species of butterflies to the area. When the plants are picked clean, the butterflies go elsewhere in search of accommodations.

The iguana issue goes much deeper than posing problems for local plants and the species that depend on them. The burrowing lizards have caused sea walls to collapse and sidewalks to break up, damaged roads and runways, gnawed at electrical wiring and proved to be a costly hazard to homeowners and a threat to local ecology.

Birds, snakes and larger animals will eat iguana eggs and hatchlings. Larger iguanas, however, have no natural predators; yet they can carry deadly

Green iguanas have become almost as common a sight as palm trees in South Florida, and many residents have come to see them more like reptilian squirrels rather than exotic invaders.

The reptiles are native to Central and South America and escaped or were dumped as pets in the Miami suburbs and the Keys, where they've been breeding for at least a

They've been considered mostly harmless because they eat plants instead of native animals. But their burrows undermine seawalls, sidewalks and levees, and they eat their way through valuable landscaping as well as native plants. Their droppings can be a significant cleanup problem, as well as a potential source of salmonella bacteria, which causes food poisoning.

Compared with elusive pythons in the Everglades, iguanas are easy to spot. They can grow to more than 5 feet long, and they like what draws people to Florida: nice landscaping, waterfront views, swimming pools and sunbathing.

One iguana even stopped a first-round tennis match at this year's Miami Open by crawling over a scoreboard onto the court. German player Tommy Haas snapped a selfie with it, but his Czech opponent Jiri Vesely complained to the umpire that he couldn't concentrate. An ATP Tour video shows the umpire telling Vesely, "It's not a dangerous animal.'

Trapper Brian Wood easily caught three iguanas one afternoon this year, each roughly 3 feet long, basking on a condominium's seawall in the resort community of Sunny Isles Beach. Using a long fishing pole, he looped wire around their necks, reeled them in, and placed them in a narrow metal cage.

Janet Sarno, board chairwoman at King's Point Imperial Condo, hired Wood because the number of iguanas — big adults and bright green babies — hanging around the building's pool has been growing despite residents' attempts to chase them away or block their entry.

"Maybe 10 years ago, you might see one or two on the seawall. Now there's 20 at a time coming out. There's just too much," she said.

The iguanas burrow under the seawall and first-floor patios, climb trees to reach secondfloor balconies and eat the bright blooms off recently planted bougainvillea, Sarno said.

"They just come and they eat, they dig ... they're in the pool," Sarno said. "Lately, there's crap all over. It's terrible.'

Wood primarily hunts alligators and tans their skins for luxury leather goods, but he's received so many calls from homeowners seeking help with iguanas in the last several years that he created a pest control business called Iguana

Catchers.

He wants to breed the iguanas he catches to sell hatchlings as pets in northern states with cold winters. In the meantime, he euthanizes them and sells their meat as a delicacy. He's also trying to generate interest in iguana skins as a sustainable leather source, alongside alligator and python skins available in his Hollywood store.

'They're like rats, they're always going to be here," Wood said. "I think it's going to be a growing business.'

Not much threatens adult iguanas except cars and cold weather, which has kept them from spreading farther north. News stations have showed frigid iguanas stiffly falling from trees.

Scientists say development has only increased their preferred habitat.

The damage, cleanup and health concerns associated with iguanas, as well as their dramatic population growth, has prompted state officials to start thinking about management strategies.

"Calls from residents about iguanas have increased, which pushed us to address them this year," said Sarah Funck, non-native species program coordinator for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

In the Florida Keys, iguanas ate up the host plant for the endangered Miami blue butterfly in Bahia Honda State Park. Nearly 600 iguanas have been removed from the park in 2015 and 2016, according to Florida's Department of Environmental Protection, but the quarter-sized butterflies hadn't returned by earlier this year.

State officials worry their digging may exacerbate long-term ecological damage if their burrows destabilize water restoration projects or flood-control structures near the Everglades. The South Florida Water Management District has reinforced some canal banks in Palm Beach County to prevent damage from burrowing iguanas, said Rory Feeney, the district's land resources bureau chief.

"Burrowing in these levees, particularly around structures, can cause hydraulic eddies and can increase erosion to our system," Feeney said.

Florida wants to protect its smaller native lizards and keep green iguanas from becoming as big a pest as they have become in the Caribbean. In the Cayman Islands, researchers have confirmed with DNA evidence that green iguanas have hybridized with native iguanas.

On Grand Cayman, the adult green iguana population grew from 127,660 in 2014 to more than 400,000 last year, according to Jane Haakonsson, a researcher with the terrestrial resources unit of the Cayman Islands' environment department. An experimental hunt in July on the 22-mile-long island netted nearly 14,500 iguanas — 16 tons of carcasses — hardly enough to control them.

"Everyone is complaining about it. Everyone has issues with their pools and their gardens, and on the roads they're being run over all the time," Haakonsson said. "A lot of the hatchings being born are surviving. What we're doing is not stopping them."



how the victim died or how he got to Sarasota County.

Crime scene investigators also found Clark had cuts and swelling on his knuckles and a large amount of blood on his pants.

The blood was later found to be Kelley's.

According to the Sheriff's Office, an investigation found Clark had driven Kelley to work on Oct. 14 at the Comfort Craft Cafe in Valrico, and later picked her up after work.

At 11:57 p.m. on the same day, Clark and Kelley had been seen

at Brandon Billiards near the cafe. Then at 2:19 a.m. on Oct. 15, Clark and Kelley were seen arguing. Later that evening, Clark confronted Kelley, and she pushed him away, according to witness

At 2:46 a.m., witnesses saw Clark put Kelley in a headlock.

statements.

Reports show that at 3:20 a.m., Clark's minivan left the Brandon Billiards parking lot, and the victim's vehicle never left the parking lot. Clark's minivan was later spotted near his mother's house and then passing a car wash at 4:40 a.m. in Brandon traveling west toward I-75.

The first 911 call about the fire was received

by the Sarasota County Sheriff's Office at 6:04 a.m.

During the course of the investigation, Sarasota County detectives found Clark had been arrested on Sept. 30 by the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office for aggravated assault. During the Sept. 30 incident, Clark placed a knife on Kelley's neck and threatened to kill her and then himself, reports show.

On Thursday, Clark was charged with murder, tampering with evidence, arson and possession of cocaine.

Clark is currently being held at the Hillsborough County Jail without bond.

to be prohibited in the restricted area, mirroring language used by the National Parks Service at the national wall. Punta Gorda's ordinance was later revised to reflect a limited designated public forum, a legal tool that governments can use to restrict messages in public places.

In that amended ordinance, it also states: "Stages and sound equipment permitted in other areas of Veterans Park may not be closer than 100 feet from the boundaries of the designated memorial area." Sound systems are to be pointed away from the wall, according to the ordinance.

At its closest point, the restricted boundary is 63 feet from the gazebo a spot where many events and demonstrations are held — according to Charlotte County Geographic Information System.

"It was not the intent to prohibit otherwise customary activities at the gazebo," said city attorney David Levin. He said exact measurements were not taken when preparing the ordinance.

District 5 Councilwoman Nancy Prafke suggested 50 feet after GPS data indicated the gazebo was within 100 feet, meaning popular veterans events would be outlawed or restricted in nature. Vice Mayor Gary Wein repeatedly pushed for "definitive measurements.'

Carr, president of Vietnam Veterans of Southwest Florida and a U.S. Air Force veteran, said, "The wall is the same one in D.C. and deserves the same protection and same respect."

Staff Sgt. Michael Raymond, commander at American Legion Post 110 in Port Charlotte and a Vietnam veteran in the U.S. Air Force, agreed, adding that the wall is a "place to go to heal wounds." Raymond was on the committee that helped build the wall.

"Our number one goal was to construct a place where vets can go to heal wounds. Sometimes that takes months to persuade a vet to even go," he said. "Now imagine how the

veteran would feel if he arrived and saw people protesting? Would it be a continuation of the disrespect they had arriving back home after serving country in Vietnam?

"Not once in construction of the wall did protest come up. That's because we never thought we'd need to address it," Raymond said.

However, a group of veterans gathered at the wall a year ago, turning their backs in a peaceful protest during a visit by Republican Sen. Marco Rubio.

phone solicitation offering what he called a "cheap cleaning" of his 3-year-old

system.
"When they opened my unit, he told me (it) was full of mold, blocking air through the coil and would burn out my compressor," wrote Richard Christensen. Told he "needed to address this immediately," the 84-year-old Port Charlotte resident agreed to a discounted repair cost of \$1,750, charged on his credit card.

But Richard said he changed his mind as soon as the tech left, calling FAST AC's Hussion, requesting the removal of a UV light, and his money refunded. He never heard back.

So, Richard did three smart things. First, he sent a registered cancellation letter to FAST AC before midnight of the third business day after purchase. That ensured his rights under federal and state laws to cancel a home solicitation sale. And because he used a credit card as opposed to a debit card, he's

disputing the charge. Finally, he registered

a complaint with the Florida Attorney General's office, which told me there are two additional complaints on file against FAST AC, although it "does not have a consumer protection investigation against this company at this time." Complaints can be filed at 866-9NO-SCAM (966-7226) or online at

MyFloridaLegal.com. In December 2015, the AG's office obtained an injunction and asset freeze against 11 companies and individuals who "used false claims, intimidation and scare tactics to coerce hundreds of consumers, many of them seniors, into purchasing expensive air-conditioning parts and services that were not needed or rendered. The scheme cost consumers millions of dollars."

If you receive an unsolicited call offering a cheap air-conditioning service, say "no." If you're on the Florida Do Not Call List, file a complaint at www.fldnc.com.

Construction funding for Legacy Trail Extension in works

SARASOTA — Ownership hasn't officially transferred yet, but already funding to construct the first phase of the Legacy Trail Extension is in the works.

A draft work plan for District 1 of the Florida Department of Transportation includes \$7.5 million for construction of the popular bike trail from Culver House Park northward to Proctor Road.

According to the draft work plan, which runs in five-year increments, the funding would be available in the fifth year of the plan, 2022-23.

The draft plan also includes funding for projects in North Port and Englewood as well.

In North Port, \$970,600 for landscaping along North Sumter Boulevard over the next two years, and \$1.2 million in 2019-20 to add bike lanes and sidewalks along Biscayne Drive from Elyton Drive to Glenallen Boulevard.

In Englewood, \$228,000 is allocated over the next year to update the traffic signal at the intersection of Dearborn Street and State Road 776.

But, it was news of the allocation for the Legacy Trail Extension that drew the most excitement.

"This is great news for our community, which has been so invested in the Legacy Trail and seeing it grow," said Patrick Lui, the county's bicycle, pedestrian and trails coordinator. "It is rewarding to see the collaborative efforts of so

many interested parties and the leadership of our county commission coming to fruition."

Colleen McGue, principal planner for the Sarasota/Manatee Metropolitan Planning Organization, said, "Once funding is included in FDOT's work program, we frequently see those projects advance. This was the MPO board's number one trail priority for the past two years, so we're very excited to see its inclusion, and we feel confident it will become a reality.'

The MPO submitted the projects to FDOT for consideration to be included in the work plan.

According to Sarasota County spokesperson Jason Bartolone, the work plan still must go through the state budgeting process, but neither the Legislature nor the governor have the authority to do line-item vetoes.

The closing for the purchase of the first phase of the abandoned railway is set for late December at

a price of \$7.9 million.

A second contract to purchase the remaining segment from Ashton Road to Payne Park in downtown Sarasota is more problematic, as it will likely depend upon citizen approval of a referendum in November 2018. That contract calls for the county to spend \$30.1 million for this segment with a closing date in May 2019 if citizens approve the referendum.

A referendum is necessary since the purchase price exceeds the \$22.6 million limitation in the county's charter on the county's borrowing power without voter approval.

The Trust for Public Lands negotiated the contracts to purchase the abandoned railway from the CSX Corporation on behalf of the county. The trust chose to divide the entire purchase into two segments due to the lack of funding on the part of the county.





Poll indicates high response, lessened fears

OUR POSITION: Many
Floridians took Irma's threat seriously. Will they do so the next time?
recent public opinion poll

about Hurricane Irma had some positive news for Gov. Rick Scott's political fortunes but troubling signs for emergency management officials looking to the future.

According to the Jacksonvillebased Mason-Dixon Polling & Strategy, Scott got high marks for leadership. The governor took a highly visible role before, during and after Irma, a frightening Category 4 hurricane that struck Southwest Florida on Sept. 10.

Some 35 percent of poll respondents rated the governor's performance "excellent." Another 31 percent gave him a "good" mark, and 25 percent "fair."

Only 4 percent said he had been "poor." A few more — 5 percent — had no opinion.

Naturally, Scott's star shone the brightest with members of his own party. Nearly 90 percent of Republicans rated the Republican governor "excellent" or "good." Democrats were far less impressed: Only 49 percent approved. What's new?

Overriding political considerations, though, was data reflecting behavior during Irma and how individual experiences might sway behavior the next time a massive storm approaches.

A large number of those interviewed — 32 percent — said they left their homes during Irma: going to a shelter or another person's home, or evacuating the area. Nearly six in 10 of all respondents (625 registered voters) said they would evacuate in the future, if ordered.

But the poll found only
43 percent of those specifically
under mandatory evacuation
orders actually followed those
orders. Of those — 19 percent
of all respondents — 71 percent
said they would leave again. An
overwhelming number of those
who stayed, despite an order, said
they also would do the same again
— not a good sign. Only two in 10
said they'd go next time around.

The good news, in sum, was how many people took this storm seriously. The bad is that complacency, reinforced by one experience, may be harder to overcome in the future.

Only 10 percent of those interviewed said their home had suffered "very serious damage." Thirteen percent said damage was "somewhat serious." Fifty percent said they had little or none.

The big scare and the relatively small damage may have a psychological impact. Not necessarily a good one.

In a note analyzing the poll results, Mason-Dixon's Brad Coker wrote, "Next time 'round could be a different story, as many Floridians indicate that they will rethink their actions."

And not respond in a like manner?


That could pose a challenge for public safety officials. Many Floridians took this one seriously. They reacted appropriately to real threat assessments. Having experienced those hardships, and then seeing relatively light impacts, they may be less likely to heed future warnings.

It's a natural human response. But it minimizes what may well be a real and present danger.

As emergency management always warn, you never know. Each storm is different. Each threat is

Charlotte and Sarasota counties are assessing their Irma responses, with Sarasota going as far as bringing in former FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate to conduct a formal review. (Note to Charlotte: An excellent exercise, made possible with funding from local foundations.)

Likely, Irma will be the baseline. But will people respond the same way?

Bronze has the highest out-of-pocket costs and the lowest monthly premiums. Silver is the only plan that qualifies for financial help to lower out-of-pocket costs. Gold plans have higher premiums and no deductibles. Platinum plans have the least out-of-pocket costs and the highest monthly premiums

visits, trips to the emergency room, mental health and substance use disorder services, prescription drugs, lab tests, preventive services and treatment in the hospital. No one can be denied coverage because of a pre-existing condition.

consumers looking for coverage face an especially bewildering experience this year, as they will have less time and less help to reach a decision because of the Trump administration's funding cuts and rule changes. The president's decision to end federal payments that insurers use to offset discounted health plans for lower-income Americans has deliberately

made the experience more confusing.

Facing little help and information, some people might go without health insurance. Others may be discouraged by the attention to rising premiums. But people eligible for federal assistance in paying their premiums — those who make up to about \$97,000 for a family of four — may not realize that their costs are likely to be about the same or even less than in 2017 and they could be eligible for bigger premium tax credits. In 2016, eight in 10 people qualified for financial help and more than 1.5 million Floridians were enrolled in an Affordable Care Act plan.

While the objective of the president is to make it as difficult, confusing, and inconvenient as possible for people to receive health insurance, there are many local certified assisters and navigators that can be contacted through the Health Planning Council of South West Florida on 866-547-2793.

Other sources of help include the Marketplace call center, 800-318-2596, and the Enroll America Connector, connector. getcoveredamerica.org

An enrollment event sponsored by the Health Planning Council of Southwest Florida will be held at 1100 Loveland Blvd., Port Charlotte, on Wednesday, Nov. 15, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Consumers can meet with a navigator and obtain information about the ACA Marketplace and also make an appointment to receive one-onone assistance.

Coverage could be cheaper than many people think. Please do what you can to get the word out about this year's Open Enrollment period and if you need insurance, remember that the deadline for enrollment is Dec.15. But don't wait, sign up early and avoid the rush.

FBI to Trump, White House: Happy Halloween!

eware the low-level volunteer. Virtually unheard of before Monday, when the FBI indicted two of President Trump's campaign staffers, George Papadopoulos is either the key to Russian collusion with the Trump campaign during the 2016 presidential election — or a lying "low level volunteer," as the president tweeted early

Tuesday morning. But contrary to Trump's dismissive, never-heard-of-him shrug, Papadopoulos was also known within the campaign as Trump's foreign affairs adviser. It was within the latter capacity that Papadopoulos tried, unsuccessfully, to arrange meetings between the Trump campaign and Russians close to the Kremlin, ostensibly to learn dirt on Hillary Clinton.

He may be the key to special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation

that led to Monday's indictments of the president's former campaign manager Paul Manafort and his longtime business associate Rick Gates on charges of money laundering, tax evasion and crimes against the United States. Papadopoulos himself was offered a pre-indictment plea bargain on charges that he had lied to the FBI during an earlier point in the investigation.

In response to the indictments, Trump has done everything but burn an effigy of Hillary Clinton — as distraction or, well, what? In the swamp, one is never sure whether movements beneath the surface are gators or mere shadows. Trump's history has taught us, however, that when he's under attack, Clinton will feel it. Like the Ghost of Election Past, she haunts Trump's dreamscape.

"But why aren't Crooked Hillary & the Dems the focus?" he tweeted Monday soon after the news broke.

Indeed, on Capitol Hill, some Republicans, who've been scurrying away from the indictment news as fast as their little mice feet can carry them, have moved to open an investigation into the Obama-era sale of Canada-based Uranium One, which had licenses to mine U.S. uranium, to a subsidiary of a Russian state-owned energy corporation. A committee composed of representatives from several U.S. government agencies, including the State Department — at

the time led by Clinton — had to approve the sale, which transpired after the Clinton Foundation received \$145 million in donations from Uranium One investors.

This would probably be a good time to grab a sheet of graph paper and a pencil. You're going to need them to chart the many possible overlaps in this Venn diagram of Russian propaganda/possible collusion/corruption/ sleaze/lies/more lies and wires. As of yet, we have seen no videotape, though it's possible that Papadopoulos has been wearing a wire in recent months.

Also, keep your eraser handy. People have people, you know, and others get fired. Or pardoned. But speculation that Trump would pardon Manafort and Gates is probably irrelevant. Manafort and Gates's alleged federal

crimes almost certainly could not have happened without committing state crimes. State attorneys general could build cases off of Mueller's investigation and effectively neuter Trump's power. A president can only pardon federal crimes.

The question now is: Who's next? And what bigger fish could Manafort or Gates offer up in a plea that would spare them potentially up to 80 years and 70 years, respectively, in prison? Former national security adviser Michael Flynn's name keeps coming up.

None of this affirms or even bolsters a case that Trump's campaign colluded with Russia to influence the election, especially given that many of Manafort's relevant business dealings preceded his association with the campaign. All we know for certain is that Russia did influence the election, thanks to

astounding testimony by social media leaders Tuesday.

Twitter identified 36,746 accounts associated with Russia that generated electionrelated content; Google found about 43 hours of election content in about 1,100 videos suspected to be of Russian origin; Facebook estimates that about 126 million people were exposed to Russianproduced stories leading up to the election.

If Trump benefited from these virtual incursions, there's no proof that he knew about it. Then again, we've likely only seen the tip of the iceberg, which must loom large to swamp-dwellers. Plus remember, Chicago crime boss Al Capone was brought down not on murder or racketeering, but on tax evasion.

It's unclear who came up with the spy camera idea, but apparently it's perfectly legal — not to mention its great potential for political blackmail.

The camera belongs to investigator Derek Uman, whose company, Clear Capture Investigations, offers services that include "infidelity surveillance."

Latvala, a tough ol' cuss who would spit into the mouth of an active volcano, shot back that any suggestion he was acting inappropriately is "an outright lie."

In a statement he also noted, "Are we working against the Democrats? No, we are doing it

against each other! Why? Because of personal ambition, a greed for power that overwhelms any consideration for fellow human beings."


First Amendment Foundation President Barbara Petersen noted as much when she wrote to the committee, saying she was "most alarmed by the dramatic impact this proposal would have on the constitutional right of access to public records.

Stemberger said he was "somewhat bewildered" by Petersen's concerns.

I'm bewildered why any politician would want to chip away at the public's right to know. We all should be, and this is exactly the kind of stuff that gets lost while we focus on things like spy cameras.

Water district questions rate changes

ENGLEWOOD — If the rate structure ain't broke, why fix it?

Englewood Water District elected supervisors continued their ongoing discussion Thursday whether to restructure existing water and sewer rates. They appear to prefer the present rate structure to what consultants recently recommended.

"We want to make sure we do what's right for the (water district) and what's good for customers," Chairman Taylor Meals said. Supervisors reached no decision Thursday. Since 2008, the

district has made small incremental hikes — no more than 4 percent to the water and sewer base facility charges customers pay every month. Customers now pay a base charge of \$16.24 for water and \$23.63 for sewer service.

Instead, consultants recommended rate increases be based more on water consumption.

Customers using 6,000 gallons or less now pay \$1.93 per 1,000 gallons and are recommended to pay \$2.30 per 1,000 gallons. Those who use between 6,001 and 8,000 pay \$2.57 per

1,000 gallons and are recommended to pay \$4.05 per 1,000 gallons.

Customers using 12,001 to 18,000 gallons now pay \$8.56 per 1,000 gallons, but would pay \$5.80 per 1,000.

Water users of 18,001 gallons or more now pay \$13.38 per 1,000 gallons. They could see that rate drop to \$7.55 per 1,000 gallons, according to the recommendation.

The water district was among the first utilities that established water conservation rates for heavy users of water. Officials saw a drop in water use by most of their customers soon

after the conservation rates went into effect.

Also, rates based on water consumption wouldn't work for the water district, Meals suggested. The customer base fluctuates greatly, depending on the season of year.

Supervisors also didn't like hiking the rates for those who use the least water and dropping the consumption rates for those who use the most.

Supervisors Phyllis Wright, Sydney Crampton and Meals did like the consultants' recommendation to collect an upfront "accrued guaranteed

revenue fee" (AGRF) for new customers hooking up for water or sewer service.

New water customers would pay a \$329 AGRF charge per equivalent residential connection, while new sewer customers would pay \$580 per ERU upfront for sewer service. AGRF fees would be subtracted from the entire hookup fee whenever the new customers were ready for utility services.

New customers now pay a water hookup fee of \$3,273.96 and \$8,666.94 for sewer. The study does recommend hiking those fees to

\$3,280 for water and \$9,151 for sewers.

District attorney Robert Berntsson noted the upfront fee was "an industry standard," but Supervisor Steve Samuels wasn't in support of it.

"If the economy changes, you may want to change that (fee) and you've tied up capacity," Samuels said.

Supervisor Rob Stern did not attend the meeting Thursday.

The discussion will continue with supervisors intending to meet with the consultants to further discuss changes to the rate structure.

Walk to raise awareness for drowning prevention

This year, Paul DeMello has been busy installing pool cages for families who lost or nearly lost a child in a drowning.

One way he gets the money to install the safety equipment is by having a Twin Tot Walk for the past six years.

He's planning it again from 4 p.m. to sunset on Nov. 19 at Laishley Park in Punta Gorda. Registration is \$22.

"We changed the location where we set up over to Laishley Park for the last couple of years, and it seems to be working," said DeMello, founder of the Just Against Children Drowning Foundation. He founded the

nonprofit organization after losing his twins, Joshua and Christian, in a 2010 drowning. The boys broke through the baby gate at their grandparents' Port Charlotte home. They were found by their mother, floating facedown in the pool.

At the annual walk, which is held in honor of DeMello's boys, hundreds are expected to walk, run or bike the U.S. 41 bridge. Participants are asked to get sponsored donations before the walk.

The event is used to support JACD and its fight to end childhood drowning through community education and offering financial assistance for pool fences, CPR classes, swimming lessons and other water safety devices.

Now DeMello needs help with the event. He's looking for a few volunteers to help with everything from setup to cleanup. He's also looking for new participants to register. He's offering business sponsorships to be on the event T-shirt. Traditionally, he sees families he helped with swimming lessons or pool fence installs. Some wear T-shirts with pictures of the children they lost.

Some people are expected to attend the event by boat.

There will be prizes for the most money raised and the largest group.

"It's a therapeutic time for some families," DeMello said. "There

are people at the walk who truly share the same experiences that others have in a near drowning or a loss of a child. My passion is to take this tragedy to make it meaningful, to save lives. There's so much more that can be done. Sadly, a 15-month-old in Palm Beach drowned at her home earlier this year. Her death was ruled an accidental drowning. It's heartbreaking."

This year, DeMello installed fencing at two Englewood homes where children nearly drowned.

Through DeMello's work in Englewood, the Josh the Otter mascot has joined in his

Besides installing baby barriers, or

"family-friendly fencing" as he calls them, the foundation has several other avenues to raise awareness of the issue, DeMello said. They include "Face Up 2 the Facts" events for community groups involving advice on pool supervision, water safety procedures and CPR. DeMello partnered with

the city of North Port Police Department's first pool safety event earlier this year. DeMello also

sponsored swimming lessons for a North Port child in need this year.

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
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Fla. premature birth rate remains C grade range at 10.1 percent

Florida is not making progress to reduce the rate of babies born prematurely, according to a new report from the March of Dimes.

The state received a C grade for 2017 — the same as last year — in an annual assessment of premature birth, which is a primary factor for infant death before age

The state's premature birth rate is 10.1 percent and has hovered just above 10 percent since

A premature birth occurs before 37 weeks of pregnancy, according to the March of Dimes, the nation's leading nonprofit organization that strives to improve pregnancy and baby

Many babies born early face serious and chronic health conditions, from breathing ailments to cerebral palsy and intellectual delays.

Besides the emotional toll on families, the medical costs to families and society are high. The financial impact is roughly \$26 billion annually in avoidable medical costs, according to the National Academy of Medicine.

The nation also received a C this year with a national premature birth rate of 9.8 percent, up slightly from 9.6 percent the year before, according to the March of Dimes.

The uptick last year meant an additional 8,000 babies were born early. More than 380,000 babies are born prematurely in the United States each year.

Race and ethnicity disparities continue to play a role. Black women in the U.S. are 49 percent more likely than white women to give birth early, according to the March of Dimes.

The Zika virus has not had an effect on prematurity rates locally, Timuta said. She heard there were one or two pregnant women who were infected with Zika in the region last year, but she does not know the outcomes of those pregnancies.

The Zika virus, transmitted by infected mosquitoes or by sexual contact with an infected person, can cause severe birth defects and lifelong impairment.

In early 2016, when Zika infections quickly began rising in Miami, Gov. Rick Scott offered free Zika testing and monitoring among pregnant women statewide.

In 2016 the state Department of Health reported there were 299 pregnant women with Zika, and four babies were born with congenital Zika syndrome, or birth defects linked to the virus.

rate, 8.9 percent, in the region, while Lee County has the highest at 11 percent, according to the **Healthy Start Coalition** of Southwest Florida. There were 297 babies born prematurely in Collier last year and 745 premature babies born in Lee, according to the coalition.

Collier's premature birth rate has been below 9 percent since 2013, said Cathy Timuta, executive director of the coalition.

The Lee Prematurity Task Force has found a lack of "baby spacing," of waiting at least 18 months between pregnancies, is the leading contributor to prematurity, she said. An educational campaign has been developed and will be started soon, Timuta said.

"Your body needs time to recover," she said.

The state needs to take steps to reduce overall prematurity, Timuta said.

"Agencies in our community are great at partnering together to tackle important issues like prematurity," she said.

"There are simple education messages we can all communicate with our clients that can have a great

impact on premature births, such as the importance of spacing pregnancies at least 18 months apart and not smoking during pregnancy. "Sometimes the large number of premature births is discouraging, but we need to focus on making an impact on one family and one baby at a time.

The national March of Dimes data show 43 states, as well as Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia, had increases in premature birth rates, said Stacey Stewart, president of the March of Dimes.

"This is an unacceptable trend that requires immediate attention," she said in a news release.

Stewart did not address the effects of the Zika virus on premature birth rates.

The first case of local transmission in a pregnant woman was reported in Puerto Rico on Dec. 31, 2015, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The number escalated to more than 4,500 pregnant women with lab evidence of Zika in the U.S. and its territories from 2015 through mid-October this year, according to the CDC. The federal agency said 3,375 infants were born without birth defects and that 137 infants were born with birth defects, along with eight pregnancy losses during the same period.

The overall March

of Dimes report shows four states received an A grade for the lowest premature birth rate of 8.1 percent or lower, which is the organization's goal for all states by 2020. The four states are Washington, Oregon, Vermont and New Hampshire.

The report shows 13 states received B grades with premature rates of 8.2 percent to 9.2 percent. They are Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Montana, New York, North Dakota and South Dakota.

There were 18 states that received C's with premature birth rates of 9.3 percent to 10.3 percent. In addition to Florida, they are Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The District of Columbia and 11 states received D grades for premature birth rates of 10.4 percent to 11.4 percent. The 11 states are Arkansas, Georgia, Hawaii, Kentucky, Nevada, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas.

Lastly, Puerto Rico and four states got grades of F for premature birth rates of 11.5 percent or higher. The four states are Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and West Virginia.



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North Port group to discuss drones, birds

NORTH PORT — North Port Friends of Wildlife will be hosting a talk about a recent drone study done of the canals in North Port.

The survey is the first to be done in the area since the 1990s when fixed wing aircrafts were used.

The purpose of the study is to restore and enhance high-functioning aquatic resources

within the landscape. Water Resource Associates Engineering surveyed the canal to identify active nesting wading birds during the 2017 nesting season using drones.

An FAA licensed pilot was responsible for tracking the drone's flight path and another observer monitored the camera to identify nesting wading birds. The study found wading bird species types and abundance of vegetation was observable during the flight, which had the drone flying 200 feet above the canals.

According to a release issued by North Port Friends of Wildlife, the city of North Port contains 80-plus miles of canals that include

vertical seawall or shrubby vegetation.

NPFOWL chairwoman Edie Driest said she had noticed birds nesting in a canal near Cocoplum, and wondered how the shopping plaza's proposed retention pond would affect it. Driest feels it got the ball rolling to get the study done, and FOWL had Cocoplum's developers to agree to a 20-foot buffer between the pond and canal.

ne pond and canal. Matthew Miller of WRA Engineering led the study. He is a professional wetland scientist. Danielle Clooney, an environmental scientist at WRA and FAA-licensed drone pilot, led the GIS study.

GIS is a geographical information system that used to capture, store, manipulate, analyze, manage and present spatial data. GIS is being used currently to track Gopher Tortise dens in the area. Driest hopes that

the same use of GIS can be used for wading birds in the area.

answer questions.

Irma-damaged boats pull out of state waters

Nearly 1,500 vessels impacted by Hurricane Irma have been removed from state waters over the past month and a half, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Almost

three-fourths were in the Florida Keys, where 1,101 vessels have been taken out of the water. The updated numbers came as additional removal barges are arriving this week to support the work in the Keys. Many of the vessels have been removed by the boat owners themselves, while state

and federal agencies also have been involved in removals.

"Responders are actively removing displaced vessels that pose a potential environmental threat," U.S. Coast Guard Cmdr. JoAnne Hanson said in a prepared statement Tuesday.

"Vessels that are

actively leaking are our top priority, and we are working with the vessel and property owners, using Florida state laws, to determine the best method to mitigate the impacts of Irma on a vessel-by-vessel basis."

The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said owners of sunken vessels can release ownership through a waiver from the commission if the owners don't have the resources for repairs or the boats have been deemed beyond repair. Along Florida's Southwest coast, from St. Petersburg to Collier County, 265 boats have been

removed, including a 34-foot sailboat that was partially blocking a residential canal in Cape Coral. Along the Southeast coast, 69 boats have been removed.

Hurricane Irma made landfall Sept. 10 in the Keys and Collier County before moving up the state.

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

At the Tennyson, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigated and found that a secret device was mounted in the hallway of the common area by private investigator Derek Uman from Gainesville. His company, Clear Capture Investigations, specializes in insurance fraud and "infidelity surveillance," as well as "political and corporate surveillance."

The building's video cameras showed Uman moving the device to a new position each day — until it caught the eye of Sen. Oscar Braynon, the outgoing Senate Democratic Leader from Miami Gardens who lives on the floor.

As Braynon was walking to the elevator, he spotted something that had fallen

Braynon had reason to suspect he was being watched. Two weeks earlier, Sen. Frank Artiles, R-Miami, had resigned after apologizing for a tirade of racially charged remarks to fellow senators. Braynon's Senate colleagues had told him that the scorned Artiles wanted revenge.

"They told me, that he was putting private investigators on legislative people he thought were at fault for his demise," said Braynon, whose party lost a bitterly fought race to Artiles in the District 40 Senate seat held by Democrat Dwight Bullard

found the covert camera, he turned it over to the concierge in the Tennyson lobby. The building managers were alarmed enough to alert the FDLE, which conducted an investigation. The building is home to dozens of legislators and lobbyists and other public

Braynon didn't have any proof the camera was the work of Artiles, but he had the threat. He alerted the other lawmakers and some lobbyists who live on the floor, including Reps. Jeannette Nunez and Heather Fitzenhagen, and Sens. Dana Young and Anitere Flores. He said he told them that the state police were asking questions.

said the private investigator had rented a unit on the 14th floor for the week and therefore had a right to mount the camera.

"Derek Uman was acting within the full scope of the law as a licensed private investigator within the state of Florida," the investigators concluded in the report. They said "no criminal activity took place" and closed the investigation.

Uman's attorney, Jon Uman of Gainesville, did not immediately return calls for comment. The FDLE agents said Uman could be working for "a scorned husband, a divorcee, a business partner we don't know," Braynon said. "There is no direct link to Frank. I don't know if he did it. All I know is that he told other people in Tallahassee, and they

But Braynon does know the sheer threat of political operatives and legislators hiring investigators to spy on each other will have a "terrible, toxic effect" on trust among lawmakers, who are already holding committee meetings in preparation for the next legislative session scheduled to start Jan. 9.

An attempt by the Times/Herald to reach Artiles on Monday was unsuccessful.

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

Point system causes head scratches, aches

Does your head hurt yet from playoff scenarios?

It sure does for Charlotte coach Binky Waldrop and Port Charlotte coach Jordan Ingman.

In the latest playoff standings released by the FHSAA on Tuesday, Port Charlotte remained in eighth place in Region 6A-3 for the final playoff spot with 35.13 points while Charlotte stayed ninth with 34.63. But the Tarpons crept up on the Pirates with the win over their rivals last week, increasing their point average by 1.30.

Charlotte (277) only trails Port Charlotte (281) by four total points, making tonight's games extremely important for playoff position. Charlotte stands to gain 45 points with a win over Palmetto (6-3) while Port Charlotte would only pick up 35 against winless Westland Hialeah.

But that still doesn't even guarantee that Charlotte would jump Port Charlotte because the points system is so fluid. The points a team

received for a win month ago may not be worth the same amount after tonight's final games depending on who wins or loses because points are based off winning percentage.

For instance, take Port Charlotte's win over North Port in the seasonopener. The Pirates are currently receiving 35 points for that victory, but if North Port (3-6) defeats Lemon Bay tonight, that total would jump to 40 because North Port's win percentage jumps from 33 percent to 40 percent.

"I'd just rather both of us be in. I think we're both good football teams," Ingman said. "It's one of those deals where there's some teams down south that scheduled very smartly but hurt Charlotte and hurt us. Our district with Ida Baker and Island Coast really hurt Charlotte and us. We're both dealing with the same kind of struggles."

Waldrop has been frustrated with the system because you always receive more points for a win than a loss regardless of record and he feels like he's at a disadvantage tonight after already losing to three playoff-bound teams this season in Dunbar, Fort Myers and North Fort Myers.

Palmetto also is fighting for playoff position. It's currently seeded fifth in Region 7A-3 and needs to win to maintain position and avoid falling too far back.

"This playoff system punishes people that play a difficult schedule," Waldrop said. "It rewards the teams that play a weaker schedule and win football games."

Ingman crunched the numbers for various scenarios when the new standings were released on Tuesday and he believes regardless of Charlotte's outcome with Palmetto today, Port Charlotte would still get in with a win and a North Port win over Lemon Bay. Neither Lemon Bay nor North Port has a chance at postseason.

That could be a tough request, considering North Port quarterback Devon Allen is hurt and possibly won't play. Playing a winless Westland Hialeah squad also doesn't help the Pirates in the grand

scheme of things either.

The Tarpons may have the tougher opponent, but they stand to gain more from a win tonight. "Points-wise, yeah I'd

be lying to you if I said I didn't wish we had a tougher game this week based off of how everything shook out this year," Ingman said. "But we had hopes for winning the district and not having to worry about other teams losing and points and all this, so I wouldn't change it based off what we had before the season. But hindsight is 20/20."

As for Waldrop, he's done crunching numbers. He's just planning for a win and hopes the chips fall his way on Sunday at 11 a.m. when the playoff field is announced.

"I worry about winning. I don't worry about all that crap. There's other people that do that but at this point, we have to win this Friday to have a chance to make the playoffs," Waldrop said. "In my opinion, we should already be in, but it doesn't work that way, this year anyway."

Mantas' Denson takes big plunge into diving

ENGLEWOOD — Gage Denson has done the near impossible in the pool this season at Lemon Bay High School.

Not only did he qualify for Saturday's Class 2A state meet individually in the 100-yard freestyle, but he's also headed to Stuart to compete off the diving board. That's typically unheard of in the sport but especially at Lemon Bay — no Manta Ray has ever done that. Until now.

"Some swimmers do it, but to do it well, is almost impossible," Lemon Bay coach Dawn Hall said. "You'll have kids that do diving and do a relay but to do both and actually individually qualify is impressive. I looked at the last three years at least and nobody's done it (in the state)."

Now a junior, Denson finished seventh in the 100 freestyle and third in the 1-meter dive at regionals last weekend to move on to the state after winning district titles in both events on Oct. 19.

Oh, and he also swims the last leg on Lemon Bay's 200 freestyle relay team, which also qualified for the championship with a fifthplace region finish. That team — you guessed it — also won a district championship.

But diving has been the biggest surprise for Denson, who didn't even try it until high school. He originally took up swimming in middle school just to lose weight and stay in shape.

Now he's head over heels in the water.

"I came to high school and I found diving and they were like, 'Who wants to try it out?' I said, 'You know what? I like doing flips off boards and doing crazy stuff. Let me try it out,'" said Denson, who also swims year round for CSC in Port Charlotte. "I did that and from there (diving coach Jeff Fazler) said I was a natural and I stuck with it. Now I'm here."

Last year Denson qualified for state in diving and was seeded 15th with a score of 314.10, but he plummeted to 17th with a 189.85. This year he's seeded ninth and believes he can catapult into the top six for a medal thanks to that rough experience in 2016.

"Last year I was very nervous and I didn't do too well," Denson said. "But this year I feel like I have my mind straight, I know what it's like and I'm going to go in there and just kill it.

"This year I'm way better. I have a lot more height. I've learned from my mistakes because last year I hit the board and now I'm able to fix my mistakes. I feel way better this year than I did last year."

Denson also feels

pretty good about his 100 freestyle, where he's seeded 17th. He's dropped his time by about three seconds from last season and recently swam a 49.25 at regionals. That's close to the school record of 48.60 set back in 2011 and it's a mark Denson is aiming for before he graduates.

Maybe even this weekend.

"He's gotten bigger, stronger and he's working hard," Hall said. "Mentally, I think it's coming together and he's matured. That's really all it takes. He had everything else."

Well, not everything. Not quite yet.

Denson knows his best chance at a state medal is off the diving board, and unlike last year, he now knows he's talented enough to compete with the best.

"Last year when I went to state I realized that I was good at it. I made it just barely but I was like, 'You know what? I'm honestly really good,' so I've stuck with it and I like it.

"That was awesome," Port Charlotte coach Kevin Krause said. "I knew it was going to be tough. (Charlotte) fought so hard. It made for a great match."

The Pirates defeated the Tarpons for the fourth time this season, with Wednesday's victory giving them a date against Barron Collier at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Region 7A-3 championship. Barron Collier ended Charlotte's season last year in the region

Charlotte appeared headed for another date against the Cougars by holding momentum late in Wednesday's match.

After winning the fourth set 25-15 — the most decisive win of any of the sets for either team — the Tarpons quickly jumped out to a 7-3 lead in the final frame. It was then 8-5 when McKenzie Stewart and the Pirates took control.

"We needed to communicate more than we had been (at the end of the match). Sometimes we get a little low, but we just need to keep picking it up," Kiersten Tisdale said. "I don't know how to feel (right now). It's overwhelming."

Stewart served nine straight points for the Pirates, including three aces, to help clinch the victory.



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

Popular breaks would also be trimmed

WASHINGTON — With fanfare and a White House kickoff, House Republicans unfurled a broad tax-overhaul plan Thursday that would touch virtually all Americans and the economy's every corner, mingling sharply lower rates for corporations and reduced personal taxes for many with fewer deductions for home-buyers and families with steep medical bills.

The measure, which would be the most extensive rewrite of the nation's tax code in three decades, is the product of a party that faces increasing pressure to produce a marquee legislative victory of some sort before next year's elections. GOP leaders touted the plan as a sparkplug for the economy and a boon to the middle class and christened it the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act.

"We are working to give the American people a giant tax cut for Christmas," President Donald Trump said in the Oval Office. The measure, he said, "will also be tax reform, and it will create jobs."

It would also increase the national debt, a problem for some Republicans. And Democrats attacked the proposal as the GOP's latest bonanza for the rich, with a phase-out of the inheritance tax and repeal of the

alternative minimum tax on the highest earners — certain to help Trump and members of his family and Cabinet, among others.

And there was enough discontent among Republicans and business groups to leave the legislation's fate uncertain in a journey through Congress that leaders hope will deposit a landmark bill on Trump's desk by year's end.

Underscoring problems ahead, some Republicans from high-tax Northeastern states expressed opposition to the measure's elimination of the deduction for state and local income taxes. Senate

Scientists say they have found a hidden chamber

CAIRO — Scientists say they have found a hidden chamber in Egypt's Great Pyramid of Giza, in what would be the first such discovery in the structure since the 19th century and one likely to spark a new surge of interest in the pharaohs.

In an article published in the journal Nature on Thursday, an international team said the 30-meter (yard) void deep within the pyramid is situated above the structure's Grand Gallery, and has a similar cross-section.

The purpose of the space is unclear, and it's not yet known whether it was built with a function in mind or if it's merely a gap in the pyramid's architecture. Some experts say such empty spaces have been known for years.

"This is a premier," said Mehdi Tayoubi,

a co-founder of the ScanPyramids project and president of the Heritage Innovation Preservation Institute. "It could be composed of one or several structures... maybe it could be another Grand Gallery. It could be a chamber, it could be a lot of things."

The scientists made the discovery using cosmic-ray imaging, recording the behavior of subatomic particles called muons that penetrate the rock

similar to X-rays, only much deeper. Their paper was peer-reviewed before appearing in Nature, an international, interdisciplinary journal of science, and its results confirmed by other teams of scientists.

Chances of the space containing treasure or burial chambers are almost nil, said Aidan Dodson, an Egyptologist at the University of Bristol, but the

NEW YORK — In the three weeks since the string of allegations against Harvey Weinstein first began, an ongoing domino effect has tumbled through not just Hollywood but at least a dozen other industries. It's open season on open secrets.

Nearly every day has brought new allegations of sexual harassment, assault or misconduct, and subsequent firings, dismissals or the distancing of men in various stations of power, from highly regarded media pundits to celebrity chefs.

"There is no turning back," Asia Argento said Wednesday on Twitter. "All predators will go down."

Trump nominates Jerome Powell to be next Fed chairman

WASHINGTON —
President Donald Trump on
Thursday announced his
choice of Federal Reserve
board member Jerome
Powell to be the next chairman of the nation's central
bank, succeeding Janet
Yellen, the first woman to
hold the position.

Trump made the announcement in a Rose Garden ceremony with Powell standing next to him. Trump said Powell had earned the "respect and admiration of his colleagues" during his five years on the Fed's seven-member board.

Trump also praised Yellen, whom he decided not to nominate for a second term, as a "wonderful woman who has done a terrific job."

In his remarks, Powell said it had been a privilege to serve under both Yellen and former Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke, saying he shared their sense of mission and dedication and said he would do "everything within my power" to achieve the Fed's congressionally mandated goals of "stable prices and maximum employment."

Yellen, in a statement,

congratulated Powell on his nomination and said, "I am confident in his deep commitment to carrying out the vital public mission of the Federal Reserve." Yellen, who did not attend the announcement, said she would work with him to ensure a smooth transition.

After a search that was more public than any before in the Fed's more than a century of history, Trump's choice of the 64-year-old Powell was seen as a safe choice that represents continuity at the Fed.

"Mr. Powell could be considered a clone of Janet

Yellen in a positive sense. He will continue the same cautious, gradualist policy in setting interest rates that she did," said Sung Won Sohn, economics professor at California State

If confirmed by the Senate, Powell would become chairman when Yellen's term ends on Feb. 3.

University-Channel Islands.

Trump had considered re-nominating Yellen for a second four-term term. But in the end, he opted for Powell, a Republican, over Yellen, a Democrat, explaining last week that doing so would allow him to put his own mark on the Fed.

Powell would be the first

Fed leader in nearly four decades to lack an advanced degree in economics. He has served on the Fed board since 2012 after a career as an investment manager through which he amassed personal wealth in the tens of millions.

Trump had indicated that his final decision had come down to Powell, Yellen and John Taylor, a Stanford University economist. Earlier, the president had also considered Kevin Warsh, a former member of the Fed board, and Gary Cohn, his chief economic adviser.

Powell will likely be welcomed on Wall Street as someone who has supported the cautious stance toward interest rate hikes that Yellen has pursued in her nearly four years as chair and may be inclined to extend that approach if the economy performs as expected.

In Powell, Trump chose a middle ground between sticking with Yellen, who had been chosen for the Fed job by President Barack Obama, and Taylor, who was critical of the Fed's response to the 2008 financial crisis and would likely have pushed for raising rates more aggressively than Yellen's Fed has.

Manafort attacks special counsel's case as 'embellished'

Attorneys for Paul Manafort defended him in a court filing Thursday as a "successful, international political consultant" who, by nature of his work on behalf of foreign political parties, was necessarily involved in international financial transactions. They argued that Manafort, who led Trump's campaign for several months last year, had done nothing wrong and did not pose a risk of fleeing the country.

The filing was the first volley from Manafort's defense team seeking to undermine a 12-count indictment charging him and longtime business associate Rick Gates in connection with their political consulting work for Ukraine's former ruling party. The charges were the first announced by Mueller, the former FBI director appointed as special counsel in May to run the Justice Department's investigation into potential coordination between Russia and the Trump campaign.

They were placed on house arrest earlier this week, released on multimillion-dollar bonds meant to guarantee their appearances for future court dates. Both men appeared Thursday in federal court in Washington, where a judge determined that they would remain on home confinement and electronic monitoring at least through the weekend.

Attorneys for Manafort, 68, and Gates, 45, are asking U.S. District Judge Amy Berman Jackson to lift the conditions of their home confinement and say the bonds are enough to ensure they show up for court. The judge said she would take up the matter again at a hearing on Monday, but in the meantime, directed attorneys on both sides to not comment publicly on the case. Manafort's attorney, Kevin Downing, had issued a statement to reporters outside the courthouse on Monday.

"I expect counsel to do their talking in the courtroom and in their pleadings, and not on the courthouse steps," Jackson said.

Prosecutors disclosed additional details about the wealth and international connections of Manafort and Gates in a court filing earlier this week that sought to keep them confined to their houses. The prosecutors note that Manafort has provided widely differing accounts of his assets in the past few years.

Trump's tweets seen as unlikely to slow New York terror case

NEW YORK — President Donald Trump's tweets calling for the death penalty for the man charged in the New York truck rampage could be seized on by defense attorneys as evidence of bias, but they are unlikely to amount to even a speed bump in the case, legal experts said Thursday.

In a highly unusual instance of a president weighing in on the fate of a defendant awaiting trial, Trump said on Twitter that 29-year-old Sayfully Saipov "SHOULD GET DEATH PENALTY!" in the attack that left eight people dead. In another

tweet, Trump said prosecutors "Should move fast. DEATH PENALTY!"

Some legal experts said judges in Manhattan's federal courts will not let the president's remarks slow the case or throw it off track, especially in a courthouse with a quarter-century record of swift terrorism prosecutions with mostly airtight outcomes.

"Nothing slows down the train," said James Cohen, a professor at Fordham Law School. He said the yet-to-be-assigned judge will question prospective jurors to ensure they can be fair despite anything they might have heard or read.

Karen Greenberg, director of the Center on National Security at Fordham Law School and a frequent observer at terrorism trials, said: "Because this is in federal court, this will happen

court, this will happen both speedily and without it interfering with the normal process of the trial." In bringing terrorism

charges against Saipov that could bring the death penalty, federal prosecutors Wednesday said the Uzbek immigrant used a rental truck to mow down people along a bike path after being inspired by Islamic State propaganda videos.

Investigators continued poring over Saipov's phone records and online contacts and combing surveillance footage to reconstruct his movements in the weeks before the rampage. They also interviewed friends and family, including his wife.

At one point, the FBI put out a bulletin seeking any information on a fellow Uzbek immigrant, Mukhammadzoir Kadirov, but quickly canceled it after locating him.

A law enforcement official who was not authorized to discuss the investigation and spoke on condition of anonymity said Kadirov was a friend of Saipov's and may not have a role in the case at all, but authorities got suspicious because he "went off the radar" when they went to speak with him. He was questioned and released.

Ex-Trump campaign official withdraws nomination for ag post

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former Trump campaign official linked to the Russia investigation by special counsel Robert Mueller has withdrawn his nomination as the Agriculture Department's chief scientist.

Sam Clovis, a former Trump campaign national co-chairman and chief policy adviser, wrote in a letter Thursday to President Donald Trump that he does "not want to be a distraction or a negative influence."

Questions had been raised about Clovis' qualifications for the administration post. He is a self-described skeptic of climate change.

Republicans were preparing to hold a hearing on his nomination next week. But it was revealed this week that Clovis had communications with George Papadopoulos, a former Trump campaign foreign policy adviser who has admitted to lying to the FBI about his contacts with Russian intermediaries last year.

"There were some questions that our distinguished ranking member had for him that I think under the circumstances — and given the votes — his decision was a good one," said Sen. Pat Roberts, R-Kansas, chairman of the Agriculture Committee.

Bowe Bergdahl judge begins deliberating sergeant's sentence

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — A military judge on Thursday began deliberating the punishment for Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl after defense attorneys asked for no prison time while prosecutors sought more than a decade behind bars.

Army Col. Jeffery Nance said he planned to spend the afternoon considering evidence and would open court again Friday morning to continue deliberating then. It wasn't clear when he would deliver the sentence.

Bergdahl faces up to life in prison after pleading guilty to desertion and misbehavior before the enemy for walking off his remote post in Afghanistan in 2009. In closing arguments, prosecutors asked for a sentence of 14 years in prison, citing serious wounds to service members who looked for Bergdahl.

Report: Many 2016 voting sites lacked full disability access

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Fewer than one in five polling places were fully accessible to voters with disabilities during the 2016 general election, a government report shows — a finding that has prompted federal officials to recommend the Justice Department adopt stricter compliance rules.

The report released Thursday by the non-partisan Government Accountability Office comes less than a week before mayoral elections in Atlanta and New York, elections for governor in New Jersey and Virginia and a special U.S. House election in Utah, and gives a window of only a year to address problems before the 2018 congressional elections.

The bottom line in the report, provided to The Associated Press in advance of its publication, is that accessibility for voters with disabilities has not kept pace with the increase in early voting that has occurred in many states since the 1990 Americans with Disabilities Act and the 2002 Help America Vote Act. Both early voting and the disabilities access improvements are top goals in making it easier to vote.

US rate for gun deaths increases for second straight year

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. rate for gun deaths has increased for the second straight year, following 15 years of no real change, a government report shows.

Roughly two-thirds of gun deaths are suicides and those have been increasing for about 10 years. Until recently, that has been offset by a decline in people shot dead by others. But there's been a recent upswing in those gun-related homicides, too, some experts said.

Overall, the firearm death rate rose to 12 deaths per 100,000 people last year, up from 11 in 2015, according to the report released Friday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Before that, the rate had hovered just above 10 — a level it had fallen to in the late 1990s.

In the early 90s, it was as high as 15 per 100,000 people.

NC officials still looking for deadly prison's assault tally

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Three weeks after the deadliest attempted prison breakout in

North Carolina history, prison and law enforcement officials still can't quantify the scope of the violence that correctional officers at the understaffed prison had been confronting daily.

State prison officials say they don't yet know how many employees or inmates at Pasquotank Correctional Institution have been injured by violence in the past year.

Nor are they able to say how many prison workers have been assaulted at other prisons across the state since the failed escape on Oct. 12. At least one correctional officer was injured when she was attacked last week by an inmate at North Carolina's primary women's prison in Raleigh.

Records of on-the-job injuries suffered by prison workers aren't tracked by wardens of individual lockups and are instead kept in a central database, state prisons spokesperson Jerry Higgins said Thursday.

"The request has been made to our data people here for these numbers, for this information. It's kept in a central location, not at the prisons," Higgins said. "We are still waiting to receive the information from our data people. No one's dragging their feet."

Russia takes on Mideast diplomacy as US retreats

BEIRUT — After watching for years as the United States called the shots in the region, Russian President Vladimir Putin is seizing the reins of diplomacy in the Middle East, establishing footholds and striking alliances with unlikely partners.

From the battlefields of Syria to its burgeoning relationships with Iran and Turkey to its deepening ties with Saudi Arabia, Russia is stepping in to fill a void left by the United States first under the Obama administration and now in the vastly inconsistent and largely hands-off policies of Donald

Embroiled in controversy at home and loathe to engaging in the strife-riddled region beyond fighting the Islamic State group, Trump has largely stayed on the sidelines of attempts to help find a political settlement for Syria's long-running civil war. Those efforts are now led by Russia, in partnership with Iran and Turkey, organizing local cease-fires and creating "de-escalation zones" that have significantly reduced the violence in the country. Russia's role in Syria has raised its international profile and allowed it to claim fighting terrorist groups such as the Islamic State group while it shored up President Bashar Assad's government.

Moscow has stood by Tehran while Trump has refused to re-certify the nuclear deal between Iran and world powers — a stance reiterated by Putin himself Thursday on a visit to Tehran. It has also reached out to Iran's Mideast rival Saudi Arabia in recent weeks, promising weapons deals and other investments to the Sunni power house.

Bilal Saab, a senior fellow and director of the Defense and Security Program at the Middle East Institute, said that while Russia has clearly become a more influential interlocutor on Syria, there are clear limits to its overall foray into the region.

"What Russia offers is transactional, as opposed to strategic. Arms sales are no substitute for deep political rapport, which is what Washington provides,

despite lingering tensions with key partners," he said.

Still, Putin appears to be positioning himself as Mideast broker, seeking to expand his influence in a region where the U.S. remains the most dominant military actor.

Syria power broker

Moscow's military involvement in the Syrian war since 2015 has propped up Assad's forces and turned the conflict in his favor, while Russian mediation earlier this year launched cease-fire talks in Astana, Kazakhstan. The talks, sponsored jointly with Iran and Turkey, have brokered local deals that have significantly reduced violence in the war-torn country.

This week, Russia announced plans to host Syrian groups and government representatives for political talks on Nov. 18 — just 10 days before a new round of U.N.-sponsored talks are to start in Geneva. The invitation has roiled Syrian opposition groups who described it as an attempt to "bypass" U.N. efforts to resolve the country's conflict and dictate the terms of any settlement.

Russia invited over a dozen groups, a mix oi government representatives and political opposition parties, including for the first time the main U.S.backed Kurdish party now in control of northern Syria. The Syrian Kurdish PYD has previously been barred from participation in political negotiations at the Geneva Talks, at Turkey's insistence.

The invitation by Russia has led to speculation that Russia may use the conference to broker a wider reconciliation between Assad and the Syrian Kurds under conditions that preclude long-term U.S. influence in Syria.

"Russia is accelerating its effort to subvert the Syrian political process by establishing a new diplomatic framework that sets conditions to expel the U.S. from Northern Syria," said an analysis by the Institute for the Study of War this week.

Badran Ciya Kurd, an adviser for the Kurdish-led self-administration who met with Russian officials ahead of the invite to Sochi, said Russia supports the Kurdish federal project while the U.S. strategy has been vague.

"It is not yet clear what their (Americans) strategy is after Raqqa, and we would like to understand," he said, referring to the northern city liberated from Raqqa last

Gulf contracts

Across the Gulf Arab states, the U.S. has been the guarantor of security since the 1991 Gulf War. In recent years, however, Gulf countries have increasingly looked toward making defense deals with Russia, especially after growing wary of the U.S. detente with Iran under President Barack Obama. In the last weeks alone, Russia has gone big into Saudi Arabia, which supported the Afghan mujahedeen against Soviet troops in the 1980s.

King Salman of Saudi Arabia visited Moscow last month and signed multibillion-dollar energy deals with Russia, which also agreed to sell the Iranian rival its advanced S-400 missile system, which Tehran does not possess. Other deals would include Saudi Arabia locally producing Russian anti-tank missiles, rocket launchers and automatic grenade launchers, as well as the latest version of the Kalashnikov assault rifle.

King Salman's visit marked the first by any Saudi monarch to Moscow and heralded a new era of cooperation and a thawing in a bilateral relation that has been severely strained since Russia's military intervention in Syria on behalf of Assad.

Close cooperation with Israel

Israel and Russia maintain a close, if sometimes uneasy, relationship on regional issues — particularly when it comes to the war in neighboring Syria. In recent years, the Israeli and Russian air forces have been active in Syrian skies and have maintained, throughout the fighting, a hotline to prevent clashes between their air forces. Israel's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, has also held a number of meetings and phone conversations with Russian President Vladimir Putin, to discuss the situation in

Still, Israeli officials are concerned about Russia's cooperation with Iran. But they also believe that Russian and Iranian interests could diverge as both countries compete for lucrative reconstruction contracts and political influence in postwar Syria. Israeli officials believe that Russia considers Iran a potentially destabilizing force in postwar Syria, and are cautiously optimistic that Russia understands Israel's

"Russian and Israeli interests in Syria may not be the same but that doesn't necessarily mean that Russia cannot play a constructive role in Syria in Israel's view or that certain understandings can't be reached between Russia and Israel with regard to Syria," said Chagai Tzuriel, the director general of Israel's Intelligence Ministry.

Spain judge jails Catalan ministers, mulls leader's arrest

MADRID — A Spanish judge jailed nine former members of Catalonia's separatist government Thursday and was deliberating a possible international arrest warrant for the region's ousted president, who remained in Belgium while the others appeared in a Madrid court for questioning about their efforts to break away from Spain.

Former President Carles Puigdemont and his 13-member Cabinet are being investigated for rebellion, sedition and embezzlement stemming from their pursuit of Catalan independence. The Spanish government removed them from office on Oct. 27 and they were summoned to appear in Spain's National Court on Thursday.

After the nine Catalan Cabinet members who showed up were questioned, a judge sent eight of them to jail without bail. One was ordered held in lieu of 50,000 euros (\$58,300) in bail. The seven men and two women were taken from the court in police vans hours later and assigned to prisons in the Madrid area.

Thousands of protesters took to the streets of Catalan towns to condemn the pre-charge detentions, which fellow separatist politicians and elected officials criticized as an attack on ideas.

UK's defense chief replaced as harassment scandal widens

LONDON — The resignation of Britain's defense secretary amid a growing sexual harassment scandal is a sign that the U.K.'s corridors of power are not always a comfortable place for women.

As allegations of impropriety and abuse spread to more politicians and officials, many women are expressing hope this will be a tipping point in transforming Britain's macho political culture. Some men, though, worry they are being unfairly tainted by allegations of sexism.

Michael Fallon, a dependable lieutenant to Prime Minister Theresa May, quit as defense secretary late Wednesday, saying his past behavior "may have fallen below the high standards" expected. Fallon had apologized after a newspaper reported that he had repeatedly touched a journalist's knee at a function in 2002, and reports suggested more allegations about him might emerge.

Fallon's resignation is an unwelcome challenge for May, who is struggling to keep ner iractious government united as Britain heads for the European Union exit. She replaced Fallon on Thursday with Gavin Williamson, the former Conservative chief whip.

It's also a challenge to the British political system.

Multiple sexual-harassment claims against British politicians have emerged since the scandal around movie mogul Harvey Weinstein emboldened people in many industries to speak up about improper behavior by powerful individuals who control their future job prospects.

Refugee chief criticizes **UN** for failing to solve conflicts

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees is sharply criticizing the Security Council and world leaders for their failure to prevent and resolve conflicts which have displaced nearly 66 million people around the world.

Filippo Grandi tells the U.N.'s most powerful body Thursday that the number of displaced persons has risen sharply from 42 million in 2009, saying that the uptick "reflects weaknesses in international cooperation, and declining capacity to prevent, contain and resolve conflicts."

Grandi stressed that "sustainable peace is critical to securing solutions to displacement."

But he said competing interests are being pursued through "proxy wars" instead of being resolved through diplomacy and dialogue.

Grandi pointed to conflicts in Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan and other countries and asked, "Have we become unable to broker peace?"

Macedonia: 33 convicted over deadly militant attack

SKOPJE, Macedonia (AP) — A court in Macedonia has convicted 33 people of being members of an

ethnic Albanian militant group and planning terrorist attacks.

The suspects were arrested following a deadly police raid in 2015. The raid and an ensuing gun battle near in the northern border town of Kumanovo left eight officers and 10 militants dead.

Seven of the defendants were handed life sentences on Thursday, and another 13 were sentenced to 40 years in prison. Others got prison sentences from 12 to 20 years. Four men were cleared.

The trial, which lasted 20 months, was held under heavy security and the defendants were brought to the court Thursday by helicopter. State prosecutors had sought life sentences for all 37 on

France tightens rules to award the Legion of Honor

PARIS (AP) — The French government says it is tightening rules for awarding the Legion of Honor, France's highest distinction.

Government spokesman Christophe Castaner said Thursday the number of awardees next year will decrease by 50 percent for civilians, 10 percent for soldiers and 25 percent for foreigners.

Currently some 3,200 civilians and 1,300 military staff receive the award every year.

Castaner suggested the Legion of Honor is currently granted too easily to people who have the right networks to put their names on the

Speaking at a news conference following the weekly Cabinet meeting, he said the selection criteria should be stricter, adding: "You don't get it by doing friends favors."

The Legion of Honor, created by Napoleon in 1802, aims at honoring famous as well as unknown people, French and foreigners, who have served France and defended its values.

UK seeks extradition of Manchester concert bomber's brother

LONDON (AP) — British police are seeking the extradition from Libya of the brother of the Manchester Arena suicide bomber on murder charges stemming from the attack.

Hashem Abedi, the brother of the bomber, is in custody in Libya. Sky News said Thursday that the armed group holding him indicated it would cooperate with the request if the Libyan attorney general approved it.

Police said Wednesday night that an extradition request was given to Libyan authorities earlier Wednesday.

Stocks end mixed on tax proposals and shaky forecasts

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks finished mixed on Thursday as investors pored over House Republican's tax proposals and President Donald Trump picked Fed Governor Jerome "Jay" Powell to lead the Federal Reserve. Weak results from consumer and health care companies pulled those parts of the market lower.

The House tax plan would cut the top

corporate tax rate to 20 percent from 35 percent. That helped smaller, more U.S.-focused companies, because they generally pay higher tax rates than larger firms that do a lot of business in other countries. Home improvement retailers and homebuilders slumped because the bill would reduce the amount of interest Americans can deduct on new mortgages. That could hurt home sales, particularly in highcost areas.

The GOP tax plan was

mostly what investors expected, said Mona Mahajan, U.S. investment strategist for Allianz Global Investors. She noted that the bill would immediately lower the corporate tax rate instead of reducing it over time, an idea some Republicans had proposed earlier.

"That alone is a win for corporations becoming more competitive with global peers, especially the small cap and domestic companies," she said.

The choice of Powell

also didn't surprise Wall Street, as he had been seen as the most likely pick for a week or so. If he's approved by the Senate, Powell would replace current Chair Janet Yellen when her term ends in February. He has been a Fed policymaker since 2012 and is generally seen as favoring lower interest rates than other top candidates. Investors expect him to keep raising rates at the gradual pace the Fed has maintained over the last few years

while continuing to let its bond portfolio shrink.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 0.49 points to 2,579.85. The Dow Jones industrial average added 81.25 points, or 0.3 percent, to a record 23,516.26. The Nasdaq composite sank 1.59 points to 6,714.94. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks picked up 3.77 points, or 0.3 percent, to 1,496.55. Slightly more stocks on the New York Stock Exchange fell than rose.

The standard deduction — used by people who don't itemize, around two-thirds of taxpayers — would nearly double to \$12,000 for individuals and \$24,000 for couples. That's expected to encourage even more people to use the standard deduction with a simplified tax form Republicans say will be postcard-sized.

Many middle-income families would pay less, thanks to the bigger standard deduction and an increased child tax credit. Republicans said their plan would save \$1,182 in taxes for a family of four earning \$59,000, but features like phase-outs of some benefits suggest their taxes could grow in the future.

"The plan clearly chooses corporate CEOs and hedge fund managers over teachers and police officers," said Rep. Bill Pascrell, D-New Jersey.

One trade-off for the plan's reductions was its elimination of breaks that millions have long treasured. Gone would be deductions for people's medical expenses especially important for families facing nursing home bills or lacking insurance — and their ability to write off state and local income taxes. The mortgage interest deduction would be limited to the first \$500,000 of the loan, down from the current \$1 million ceiling.

GOP TAX PLAN MAY OFFER

LITTLE AID FOR MANY IN

MIDDLE CLASS

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans have stressed that the tax plan they unveiled Thursday is tailored to benefit America's middle class. Just how much it would remains uncertain based on the details that have been provided so far.

What is clear is that many of the benefits for the middle class could dwindle over time, even while companies and wealthy individuals could enjoy lasting tax advantages.

The plan promises tax savings next year of \$1,182 for a typical household of four with gross income of \$59,000, leaving their tax bill at \$400. 'We are focused on increasing paychecks

in a major way," said Rep. Kevin Brady, the Republican chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. But the proposal's conflicting provisions and

phase-outs of certain benefits suggest that taxes could rise for some middle class earners over time. And for many, the income gains being touted by President Donald Trump are unlikely to materialize.

Some of these complications arise because under the budget instructions, the planned tax cuts can't increase the national debt by more than \$1.5 trillion over the next decade. Anything above \$1.5 trillion

would force Republicans to amend their plan to generate more revenue — a change that would likely prove difficult.

Trump has frequently said that this would be the biggest tax cut in U.S. history. But outside analyses show that that's not the case.

The tax plan's primary beneficiaries would be wealthier Americans, who would enjoy lower tax rates despite the elimination of some breaks, a repeal of the so-called alternative minimum tax and the termination of the estate tax.

"With the details they've presented to us so far, it looks like the tax cut benefits the wealthy and major corporations," said Martin Sullivan, chief economist at Tax Analysts and a former staff economist at the Treasury Department. "In fact, if you have a large family, given the facts that we have now, that you would pay more in taxes."

All told, nearly 70 percent of the tax cuts would go to businesses over 10 years, according to an analysis by the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget. The rest of the tax cuts appear to favor the wealthy.

Gary Cohn, the president's top economic adviser, said Thursday at the Economic Club of Washington that the objective was to help the middle class. But he declined to say whether the wealthy would

movement of its own. Now that some of the silences and stigmas around sexual harassment have been shattered, the flood gates

"This is the patriarchy starting to crumble," said Toni Van Pelt, president of the National Organization of Women. "I think that women are finally taking their power. They know they're strong.' In the three weeks since

the first allegations were leveled against Weinstein, there have been at least 20 prominent men who have been forced to defend or apologize for past actions. Amazon Studios chief Roy Price resigned after a television producer on one of Amazon's shows said he had sexually harassed her. Following allegations of sexual advances on an underage actor, Netflix halted production on Kevin Spacey's "House of Cards." A Roman Polanski retrospective prompted protests in Paris.

Sari Kamin was one of 38 women who came forward to the Los Angeles Times to say that the director James

Toback sexually harassed her by luring her with the possibility of a film role. Toback has denied the claims but within days the number of alleged victims climbed past 300.

"Listening to women come out from the Harvey Weinstein fallout, that certainly empowered me," said Kamin. "It brought back a lot of painful memories and kind of unlocked something. It made me think: Well, if they can come forward maybe so can I."

An air of "who's next" has settled over not just Hollywood, but elsewhere, too. NBC News terminated Mark Halperin's contract allegations that he sexually harassed a dozen women while at ABC News. John Besh, the New Orleans celebrity chef, stepped down from the company he founded after more than two dozen allegations of sexual harassment. Fashion photographer Terry Richardson, who has previously been accused of sexual harassment, was banned by Conde Nast. Accusations of harassment have been leveled against actors Dustin Hoffman and Jeremy Piven.

Vox fired its editorial director, Lockhart Steele after a former employee raised allegations. Andy Signore, senior vice president of Defy Media, was fired after several women made sexual harassment allegations. The Atlantic magazine removed contributing editor Leon Wieseltier from its masthead after allegations emerged that Wieseltier harassed numerous women during his lengthy tenure with The New Republic.

Two executives at Fidelity Investments were forced out for sexual harassment. Nickelodeon fired "The Loud House" show runner Chris Savino for sexual harassment. NPR news chief Michael Oreskes was ousted after sexual harassment allegations dating back to the 1990s surfaced. Oreskes was a vice president and senior managing editor at The Associated Press from 2008 until he joined NPR in 2015.

It has been a head-spinning few weeks

that some believe is adding up to a landmark moment for a pervasive and under-reported problem. Up to 85 percent of women say that they have been sexually harassed at work, according to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, but only a fraction of those cases are reported, partially due to the professional and legal risks for women who come forward. In the wake of the Weinstein saga, millions of women have posted "me too" on social media, sharing their individual stories of sexual assault and harassment.

"I'm sensing a cultural shift," says Fatima Goss Graves, president of the National Women's Law Center. "In an issue that has usually been met with widespread disbelief and shaming, people have been able to really tell their stories of harassment and violence without shaming, without discounting and disbelief. And that's really empowering. I don't think you can just put that back into a box.'

Authorities say Calloway escaped custody on Wednesday while he was at a doctor's office for a medical appointment for what Duncan called "some sort of procedure." Officers had removed his shackles and restraints at the doctor's office. Investigators say

Calloway grabbed an officer's head and tried to hit her head on the ground before fleeing. The sheriff says

as many as 100 law enforcement officers were involved in the search.

5 gubernatorial candidates address media

TALLAHASSEE — Five major candidates for Florida governor addressed a meeting of reporters and editors Thursday hosted by The Associated Press at the state Capitol. The following, in order of their appearance, are highlights of what they had to say:

Republican Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam

"We are not adequately investing in our workforce development, and it has to start earlier than just the community colleges and the state colleges. We want young people to know what they can earn in a range of professions — from nursing, to financial services, to the construction trades, to manufacturing, to logistics, to heavy equipment — before they feel pressured into \$70,000 in student loan debt for a degree they don't want and may not be able to use.

"When I graduated from (the University of) Florida, a lot of my classmates left Florida. They went to Atlanta, they went to Charlotte, Austin, Boston. We need to reverse that talent flow, so that not only are we keeping our students and our young people here in Florida, but we become the magnet for talent from around the world."

Democratic Orlando-area businessman Chris King

On the Florida economy since Republicans took power in 1999:

We have barely moved an inch in 15 years. When you simply adjust our per capita (gross domestic product) for inflation, we are literally at the same place in 2015 than we were in 2000. ... Blue states and red states all around this country grew, and Florida did not."

On higher education:

"Higher education for many has become inaccessible and unaffordable. I'm the first candidate to release a program ... for free community college and trade school in the Sunshine State.

"If you graduate with an AA degree versus a high school diploma, you make about \$10,000 more ... we think this is an incredible opportunity to lift up so many families.

On guns:

"(Republicans), in their own words, have been a sellout to the NRA. I am for common sense gun safety, like a ban on assault weapons.'

Republican state Sen. Jack Latvala

On the opioid crisis:

"We have an opioid crisis that is going on right now that 14 people a day or more are dying because of overdoses. ... This is related to the mental health system, and a mental health system where we're number 50 in America in spending per capita on mental health."

"It's sad to see that in the last 10 years since the recession started, we've actually got 36 counties in Florida — more than half the counties in the state — that have lost jobs. And where are they? They're in our rural areas.

... Where's the attention for that? Where is the emphasis on how we can help the rural areas improve their economies?"

On ethics:

"The real problem up here is ... On education and employment: taking \$250,000 checks for your PAC from groups who have an interest in front of the Legislature, and then pushing those interests. It's being in a law firm or having a family member who is a lobbyist pushing very, very expensive, wellsought-after pieces of legislation."

Former Democratic U.S. Rep. **Gwen Graham**

On education:

"Shame on the state of Florida for putting that grading of schools in place. When I'm governor, I'm going to end the grading of schools because it's not grading; it's degrading. It's degrading to our kids; it's degrading to our schools.' On raising the minimum wage:

"No one should have to go to work and then think about, 'Well, when I end this job, I'm going to be rushing over to my next job, and then when I end that job, I'm going to be rushing over to my next job,' just so they can put food on the table, just so they can pay their insurance bills.'

On sexual harassment:

'The 'me too' movement I think is very powerful. ... I hope it's a real watershed moment for our country, about how we interact with each other in a professional manner. And I'm not saying lose the humanity in it; I'm not saying we all have to walk around stilted and worried, but be respectful of one another."

Democratic Tallahassee Mayor **Andrew Gillum**

On renewable energy:

"We just broke ground on the first 120-acre solar farm that is going to multiply the solar energy that we produce here. ... I believe there's a blueprint there for the rest of the state of Florida. Not only is it good for our environment, it's also good for people's jobs.

On Florida Democrats' poor record in statewide elections:


"There's a pathway to victory, and part of that pathway to victory requires that we have a Democratic nominee who has the ability to motivate, inspire and turn out about 100,000 more Democratic voters that we're going to need in order to win. If we fail to turn out those voters, we can just hand this race over to Republicans. If we think we're going to run for governor in this state by ignoring the issues and the values and the ideas that our base is clamoring for ... we're going forfeit an opportunity."

Authorities scrutinize noose incident at Miami fire station

MIAMI — Miami authorities are scrutinizing a fire station where a noose was found hanging over a black firefighter's family photo ruined by lewd drawings. City officials fired six firefighters and five others could be suspended or demoted.

Termination letters sent to The Associated Press on Thursday said the fired firefighters drew or helped draw pictures of penises on personal photos of a colleague. Two of them were supervisors. One of them failed to report the incident and lied to investigators and the other one.

The letters don't say who created the noose, but city manager Daniel Alfonso says the investigation continues.

'City of Miami Fire Rescue is an ethnically and racially diverse department and one of the best in the country," said Alfonso in a statement. "We cannot and will not tolerate behavior that is disrespectful, hurtful and compromises the integrity of the department and the City of Miami."

The city manager said he and the fire department's chief found out on Sept. 9 about an incident "involving sexually explicit and racially offensive conduct" and transferred employees to other stations. After the police department began an internal investigation, 11 firefighters were suspended without pay. Of the six firefighters who were fired, two were supervisors who lied to investigators, according to the dismissal letters. One of them is accused of encouraging and helping subordinates draw lewd pictures on the photos.

The firefighters have up to 10 days to dispute their termination before Miami's Fire-Rescue Chief Joseph Zahralban.

It is the second incident involving a noose and firefighters in South Florida this year. In June, a noose was found hanging over the chair of a black firefighter recruit in a training session in Pompano Beach, leading to one firing and three resignations.

Experts have pointed out an increase in the use of hate symbols such as nooses and swastikas around the country. Nooses have appeared in the last few months in numerous public places from museums in Washington to universities in Maryland and Kansas, a high school in Oklahoma and a church in Alabama.

Craigslist iPhone sale ends in death at busy drugstore

DAVIE (AP) — An iPhone sale on Craiglist has ended in a fatal shooting at a busy Florida drugstore.

Davie Police say Matthew Barry met Andre Smith at a pharmacy on Wednesday afternoon to buy a phone for \$280. Barry and Smith told each other they were armed.

Davie Police Major Dale Engle said he thinks Barry feared Smith was trying to get his phone back. Barry went inside and asked the clerks to call 911 several times as Smith pursued him throughout the store. Video surveillance captured the pursuit.

Engle told the Sun Sentinel that Barry pushed Smith and pulled out a handgun. Barry responded firing several times. Smith died at the hospital.

Barry was not arrested. The investigation is ongoing. Authorities urged consumers to make similar transactions at law enforcement lobbies or parking lots.

Man arrested at **Orlando airport** threatened to kill wife

ORLANDO (AP) — Authorities say they've arrested a Florida man at Orlando International Airport who they believe may have planned to shoot his wife.

WFTV reports police officers in Atlanta tipped Orlando police that 49-year-old William Schultz was possibly planning to shoot his wife. The officer recognized Schultz Tuesday evening from a picture he had seen earlier that day.

An arrest report says Schultz asked the officer about a parking garage and then walked away. The officer ordered him to stop.

Schultz's wife was traveling out of state and told law enforcement he'd texted her threatening messages, adding that he would be at the airport when she landed. Police said she canceled her flight out of fear. Her daughter called authorities.

He's charged with aggravated stalking with a firearm. Jail records don't list a lawyer.

Unattended 3-year-old causes apartment fire

PANAMA CITY (AP) — The mother of a 3-year-old child who started a fire in a Florida apartment is facing a child neglect charge.

The News Herald reports that management at the Macedonia Garden Apartments in Panama City saw a trail of smoke coming from an apartment on Tuesday. Inside the apartment they found two children ages 1 and 3 — who were unattended.

A police report says the 3-year-old attempted to use the microwave and overcooked some food caused the small fire, which filled the apartment with smoke. The report says the children had been left unattended without adequate food.

Neither child was injured. Police found their mother some 3 miles away. She said her car had broken down and she couldn't get back to her children.

She was booked into jail.

Gov. Scott wants more child protective investigators

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida Gov. Rick Scott wants to spend millions to hire more child protective investigators and boost money spent on services for children adopted

from foster care. Scott announced the budget recommendations Thursday during the annual pre-session planning day hosted by The Associated Press. The spending recommendations will be considered by the Florida Legislature during the 2018 session that starts in January.

The Republican governor wants to spend \$10 million to hire 130 additional child protective investigators and Florida Abuse Hotline counselors. Scott in previous years has advocated hiring additional investigators.

Scott also wants a \$2 million increase in the money spent on services provided to adopted children. That will bring the total to nearly \$200 million.

Former prom queen, jail inmate dies

BARTOW (AP) — Authorities say a 29-year-old former prom queen and inmate at a Florida jail has died.

The Polk County Sheriff's officials say Shamirah Johnson was transferred from the Central County Jail infirmary to a Lakeland hospital after complaining of vomiting and diarrhea. She died Tuesday. Autopsy results showed no evidence of trauma. Toxicology results are pending.

Johnson was arrested in October for probation violation. She had been sentenced in March to one year of probation for possession of prescription medication without a prescription, possession of marijuana and possession of paraphernalia.

The Ledger reports she had been active in the community, volunteering more than 1,000 community service hours and won an essay contest for Black Heritage Weekend in 2006 in Jacksonville.



Astros could be back for more titles

HOUSTON - It's notjust one World Series title that has Houston excited. With Jose Altuve, Carlos Correa, George Springer and more locked in for years to come, the Astros are ready to be a force for some time.

Houston's plan to endure a difficult rebuild has put the team in a great position moving forward. No player in Houston's

starting lineup for Game 7 of the World Series will be free agent earlier than

Alex Bregman and Yuli Gurriel are under team control until 2023, and All-Star shortstop Correa can't hit free agency until 2022. Springer, the World Series MVP, is under control through 2021, and promising young starter Lance McCullers Jr. is under team control until 2022. Altuve has teamfriendly club options for

the next two seasons that will keep him in town through 2019 at least.

While everyone else is chasing high-priced free agents, Houston should be set, especially after acquiring ace Justin Verlander on Aug. 31 from the Detroit Tigers. Verlander is owed \$56 million over the next two seasons combined before possibly becoming a free agent.

All of that was made possible by patience from owner Jim Crane and general manager Jeff Luhnow. The Astros were the laughingstock of baseball after trading away their veterans to shed payroll, losing 100 games every year from 2011-13, including a franchise-worst 51-111 mark in 2013.

With the losing came a bevy of high draft picks, and Houston hit big on a few of them. In Luhnow's first draft in 2012,

NFL: Bucs Winston says injured shoulder improving

TAMPA – Jameis Winston says his injured throwing shoulder is getting better.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers quarterback practiced again Thursday, throwing for the second straight day in preparation to face the New Orleans Saints.

This is the first time Winston has thrown early in the week since spraining the AC joint in his right shoulder on Oct. 15.

The past two weeks, he's refrained from participating in passing drills on Wednesday and Thursday before taking all of the snaps with the first-team offense on Friday.

"I'm just following the plan," Winston said. "It feels good to be back out there with the guys in a practice atmosphere, and hopefully it translates to the game."

The Bucs (2-5) have lost four in a row, with Winston playing through the injury during losses to Buffalo and Carolina the past two games.

The Hurricanes (7-0, 5-0 ACC) lead the Coastal Division race and are in search of their first division title since both Miami and Virginia Tech joined the conference in 2004. Virginia Tech (7-1, 3-1) would gain the upper hand in a tiebreaker with a victory, a scenario that dates back to the teams' days in the Big East.

"Obviously it doesn't get any bigger than this," Hokies venerable defensive coordinator Bud Foster said earlier this week.

And Foster should know, having been on the Virginia Tech sideline for many Hokies-Hurricanes showdowns.

Virginia Tech's 13-7 victory in 1995 was their first in the series, and Foster said it "turned our season around." The Hokies were 0-2

going into the game, and coming off a 16-0 home loss to Cincinnati, but won out and beat Texas 28-10 in the Sugar Bowl.

"I think, obviously, that was one of the signature wins in this series without a doubt," Foster said.

In 2003, Miami was ranked No. 2 and the Hokies beat them 31-7 at Lane Stadium. The victory remains the lone victory for Virginia Tech against a top 5 team in its history; they have come up short in 31 other attempts. A year later, Tech won 16-10 at Miami on its way to winning its first of four ACC championships.

"They've got a tremendous history, some dynamic athletes have played through there and we've played against about all of them," Foster said. "It's helped our program grow, playing those folks."

Second-year Miami coach Mark Richt has

his team playing its best football in years with 12 wins in a row dating to last season, but he doesn't need a history lesson to appreciate an obstacle. The Hokies beat visiting Miami 37-16 last season.

"I think they've been underrated from the preseason," said Richt, who has fashioned a 16-4 record at Miami. "I think they are one of the better teams in America and it's going to be a great challenge for us."

Virginia Tech's second-year coach, Justin Fuente, has drummed it into his players' minds that each week is its own entity. The players continually talk about going 1-0 each week, but there's added incentive in this one.

Tight end Chris Cunningham, a native of Jacksonville, Florida, has some personal motivation.


During a Miami recruiting visit to his high school,

Sources: Texans QB Watson out for season with ACL tear

HOUSTON - Texans quarterback Deshaun Watson sustained a season-ending knee injury in practice on Thursday, two people familiar with the situation told The Associated Press.

The rookie suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in one of his knees and will go on injured reserve. The people spoke on the condition of anonymity because the team hadn't announced the injury.

His injury is the latest blow to a team that lost three-time NFL Defensive Player of the Year J.J. Watt and linebacker Whitney Mercilus to season-ending injuries on Oct. 8.

The former Clemson standout had been a bright spot in a challenging season for the Texans (3-4). The 12th overall pick in this year's draft was the AFC offensive player of the month after throwing for 1,171 yards with 16 touchdowns and running for 145 yards and another score.

Clemson coach Dabo Swinney, talked about

Watson's time as a backup was short-lived as Savage struggled in the opener and was benched at halftime, making the former Clemson standout the ninth quarterback the Texans have played in the past five years.

Colts shut down Luck for season

INDIANAPOLIS Indianapolis Colts quarterback Andrew Luck will be placed on injured reserve, likely ending his season.

Colts general manager Chris Ballard made the announcement on Thursday.

"We're going to shut his throwing down and we're going to continue rehab, hard rehab," Ballard said.

It's hardly a surprise. Since undergoing surgery in January for a partially torn labrum in his throwing shoulder, the star quarterback missed all of Indy's offseason workouts, all of training camp, the entire preseason and will miss his ninth straight regularseason game Sunday at Houston.

Luck didn't even start throwing to teammates until early October and was shut down two weeks later after complaining of soreness in his right shoulder.

So with the Colts (2-6) struggling, their playoff hopes fading fast and Luck apparently not close to 100 percent, Indianapolis made the smart move.

"He was frustrated. He's a competitive guy, he knows the impact he has on a Sunday," Ballard said. "He's a differencemaker. He's one of the best quarterbacks in the league, so he's frustrated."

Ballard said Luck will do his rehab at a couple of different places and is expected to be in and out of the team complex and that they will take a different approach with rehab for his strength.

As for putting his career in jeopardy, Ballard said: "I'm not getting career-ending from anybody. What we're getting is 'be patient.' Careerending is putting him on the field before he's ready to play."

If Luck is ready to go for the 2018 season opener, he would go more than 20 months between taking regularseason snaps.

NO CHANCE: Lawyers for the NFL say Dallas Cowboys running back Ezekiel Elliott has no chance of success with his latest attempt to delay a six-game suspension.

The lawyers made the argument Thursday in papers submitted to the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

UConn women No. 1 in AP preseason poll

UConn is in a familiar spot to start the season — No. 1 in the poll.

The Huskies were a unanimous choice in the top spot of The Associated Press women's basketball preseason poll on Thursday. It's the 12th time in school history that UConn has been No. 1 in the preseason poll, matching Tennessee for the most all-time.

"Being ranked number one in the AP preseason poll is something we certainly do not take for granted but I think those are the expectations, internally and externally, as it relates to this program," UConn coach Geno Auriemma said. "This is an honor and a testament to the hard work of our players, but we all know that what really matters is where you finish the season and not necessarily where you are when the season starts."

UConn also was the preseason No. 1 in 1995, '99, 2000, '01, '03, '08, '09, '10, '13, '14 and '16. The Huskies open their season on Nov. 12 against No. 10 Stanford in Columbus, Ohio — site of this season's Final Four. UConn has gone on to win the national championship in seven of those years.

Auriemma thinks Pitino should get another chance

Geno Auriemma thinks Rick Pitino should get another chance to coach and that he's already suffered enough by losing his job at Louisville.

"There are people running for office and winning that have been accused of a lot worse who are given another chance," Auriemma said on Thursday at ESPN during women's basketball national media day. "As far as I'm concerned he's already served his punishment. He lost one of the best jobs in the history of college basketball."

Auriemma originally said on Barstool Sports podcast "Pardon My Take" Wednesday that he'd hire Pitino if he had a job opening. UConn's Hall of Fame coach clarified that remark Thursday saying he would hire him for a pro job.

Making a change

What goes into deciding whether to change football coaches?

College football coaches have been losing jobs for the past month, including Jim McElwain at Florida, and as the season hits the stretch run numerous athletic directors have to be considering whether it is time for them to make a change, too.

Most will wait it out until the end of the regular season. Some could move sooner. And some ADs have likely begun laying the ground work for hiring a replacement, just in case.

Often the decision to make a coaching change comes down to wins (not enough) and losses (too many). But costly buyouts and long contract extensions add a financial wrinkle. Then there is the matter of timing. Would waiting be a disservice to the players? Can an early firing shift the focus away from the current lost season and on to the promise of a better tomorrow?

And this season, for the first time, there is also an early signing period for football recruits to consider.

All of these factors are likely in play in places like Tennessee, Arkansas, UCLA, Texas A&M and elsewhere.

The first schools to make a coaching change this season were UTEP, where Sean Kugler resigned after an 0-5 start on Oct. 1, and Georgia Southern, which parted with Tyson Summer on Oct. 22 with the team 0-6. At Tennessee, the Butch Jones watch has been in full effect since the Volunteers were shut out at home by Georgia on Sept. 30. The Vols have lost three more games since, but AD John Currie has stood pat.

Gerry DiNardo, a former coach at Vanderbilt, LSU and Indiana who does consulting work for schools searching for a new coach, said just because a coach has not been fired does not mean an athletic director is not busy working behind the scenes.

"I would suggest to you if I'm an AD I can do a better search with my coach under attack then I can by firing a coach," said DiNardo,

who is an analyst for the Big Ten Network. "As soon as I fire the coach, then everyone switches to the search. So I'm distracting my opponents. Meanwhile, I've already decided I'm firing him and not only that, I've got three agents waiting to negotiate with me."

Contact between coaches' agents and search firms ramp up this time of year, trying to gauge which active coaches might be interested in soon-to-be vacant job.

That's a long-term play. An AD must also consider what's best in the short-term for the current team.

"There may be team dynamics that (the public is) not aware of," said Todd Turner, the former Vanderbilt AD and president of the search firm

Collegiate Sports Associates. If an AD believes that even during a losing season the coach is maintaining order in his program, making a change might not be urgent. But it can't be solely about pleasing players, who often are loyal to their coach.

"There's no price that you could pay that's more important than having the trust in your coach," Turner said.
"That he represents your university. That he's a fit.
That they are great caretakers for the university's name and image as well as the studentathletes' well-being."

Turner was not speaking directly to the Florida situation but he probably could have been. McElwain and the school went separate ways last Sunday after an odd week in Gainesville. Florida athletic director Scott Stricklin acknowledged that McElwain's 22-12 record in two and half seasons with the Gators was not the sole factor in the breakup.

McElwain had a \$12.5 million buyout, though a settlement was being negotiated, Stricklin said. The finances of firing a coach have changed over the last 15 years as big buyouts and quick contract extensions for coaches have become the norm. McElwain received an extension after last season. Florida still owes South Carolina coach Will Muschamp, who McElwain replaced, \$1.575 million.

Jed Hughes of executive search firm Korn-Ferry has worked with Texas and Southern California on recent coaching searches. He said the market is skewed to favor coaches because the pool of proven candidates is not deep, and a little success can get stakeholders excited.

"There's a lot of pressure on that athletic director," Hughes said. "Most of the time it might not be that athletic director making the final decision. Could be somebody above him, maybe the president or maybe somebody on the board that's intimately involved."

Then when things go sideways with a coach, an athletic director must weigh the cost of paying to get rid of him against what it might cost in fan and booster support to keep him.

DiNardo and Turner agreed that most Power Five programs can find the money to pay the buyout. In some places, wealthy boosters might be willing to pitch in.

"I don't know that the money is ever the real reason," DiNardo said. "I think the perception of the money at times may be the real reason."

This year another factor has come into play for AD's looking at making a change: For the first time, high school prospects will be able to sign with schools from Dec. 20-22.

"In a perfect world, you would have someone in place in time to positively affect the ability to sign players for the early signing period," Stricklin said.

In the G League, female refs can make a name

MIAMI — The G League season opens Friday night, and there will be someone on the court in places like Grand Rapids or Greensboro or Des Moines whose next job will be in the NBA.

That isn't limited to players.

Or to men.

Nearly one-third of the referees in the G League this season are women, and some – like dozens of players, coaches, front-office staff and refs - are moving closer to realizing NBA hopes. Every referee hired by the NBA in the last 15 years has some experience in what's now called the G League, which means it's a proving ground for both those who are making plays and making calls.

"It was my experience that as my skill set deepened, so did my resolve to work at the highest level," said Lauren Holtkamp, the NBA's third full-time female referee and someone who spent six seasons in what was called the NBA Development League before it was rebranded earlier this year. "The training fueled the desire."

That's the same sort of sentiment players in the G League have.

Every NBA team opened this season with a G League alum on its roster, some with many of them. The NBA says 38 percent of its players right now have at least some G League experience, and that number has been rising rapidly in recent years. In 2004-05, there were 15 G League graduates starting the season in the NBA; this season, there were 167.

Detroit, Atlanta, Toronto, Chicago and Miami combined to have 48 G League alums on their rosters — more than the entire NBA had a decade ago.

"I absolutely think all are really realizing the high level of talent, the high level of competition that we have in the league," G League President Malcolm Turner said. "We are a league of opportunity and a league of aspiration. We can be a launch pad to help NBA dreams come true whether you're a player, coach, referee, on down the line and that's reflected in the style of play that you see. Our guys get after it, night in and night out."

The league is now up to a record 26 teams; a 27th is coming next season and Turner hasn't ruled out the chance that the league's goal — 30 teams, all single-affiliated with an NBA club — could become reality within a year or two at the most.

Chiropractic is a valid form of therapy for low-back pain

I've been going to chiropractors for 30 years. They help me when I have a pinched nerve, but they always want me to keep coming back. How do I know whether that exacerbates the problem? It seems to me that it may loosen things up so I have to keep coming back. - S.B.

ANSWER: Chiropractic spinal manipulation is considered a generally safe treatment for lower-back pain, and it is associated with some benefits in pain and function.

There remains controversy about rapid manipulation of the cervical spine in the neck, with rare reports of stroke following this procedure. It is not clear whether the apparent risk of stroke is due to the manipulation, or whether people with symptoms of a dissection happen to see a chiropractor, making an apparent connection when there is none. I am conservative and recommend against rapid neck manipulation, which is a plausible cause of damage to the arteries in the neck.

I do not believe that the manipulation of the lower spine for treatment of back pain causes problems that would require further treatment. I believe that chiropractors, like traditional medical doctors, truly want to help their patients, and offer follow-up appointments when they think they can be helpful. However, like any therapy, I would recommend against it if it isn't clearly helping.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Please tell me why I bruise at the slightest pressure? I've been on gamma globulin for CVID for seven years. Is there any correlation? - M.M.S.

ANSWER: CVID, common variable immunodeficiency, is an inherited disease of the immune system that I discussed in a column earlier this week. People with CVID are more likely to get certain infections, such as sinus infections, pneumonia and bacterial gastrointestinal infections. People with CVID have lower amounts of antibodies, also called immune globulins, so a common treatment for CVID is to boost immune

globulins by injection, especially intravenous immunoglobulins. These are obtained from blood and plasma donors, and provide some protection against infection. CVID should be considered in people with recurrent infections. People with CVID have low blood levels of immunoglobulins, especially IgG, also called gamma globulin. People with Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes seem to have a high risk of CVID.

Bruising is not a common side effect with intravenous immunoglobulin, IVIG. The package insert says that it happens less than 4 percent of the time; however, I found many people in online forums noting this effect. Easy bruising can be a sign of platelet conditions, so it may be worthwhile to get that checked by your doctor.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have high blood pressure, for which I currently take 10 mg of lisinopril. I had a transthoracic echocardiogram done, and "mild concentric left ventricular hypertrophy" was listed on the results. What does that mean? — D.K.

ANSWER: The left ventricle is the chamber of the heart that squeezes blood to the body (rather than to the lungs, which the right ventricle does). "Hypertrophy" means that the muscle of the ventricle is thicker than normal. "Concentric hypertrophy" means the thickening is symmetric, and that is most commonly seen in people with high blood pressure, especially if it wasn't caught early or was not treated well for some period of time.

Lisinopril is generally a good treatment for most people with concentric LVH, but some people need additional treatment. Many physicians, including myself, try to get the blood pressure down into the 120/80 range in people with LVH, as long as they can tolerate the medication.

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BMW 5 Series: A perfect union of performance, technology

As one of BMW's bread-and-butter vehicles — nearly 8 million have been sold — one might think the 5 Series' identity and legacy would be etched in granite by

But one has to wonder: Is it still the "ultimate driving machine," even with all the ground Mercedes-Benz, Audi and Jaguar have gained? Or has the 2017 540i, known as the G30 among the Bimmer elite, changed course and become the "ultimate technology machine"?

Perhaps the nitwit-yet-cerebral Forrest Gump came up with the best answer while pondering human destiny vs. chance: "Maybe it's both."

The seventh-generation G30 has been redesigned and redefined. It still ranks among the leaders in driving dynamics, offers deft handling, improved steering — especially when equipped with rear-wheel steer - and twin-turbo get-up that dashes to 60 mph in 4.7 seconds.

But the drive is well-assisted by high-tech gizmos like adaptive cruise control with stop-and-go function, active lane change, which checks for cars and makes the change happen, and remote control parking. Inside, the latest iDrive 6.0 system is one of the finest in the luxury segment, period. It even includes the futuristic gesture control — you can impress passengers by sweeping away an unwanted call with the wave of a finger.

But back to the

ultimate-driving-machine part. The aggressive 540i wider headlamps and a broader twin-kidney grille is without the big V-8, but you won't miss it. The 3.0-liter twin-turbo inline 6 gets 335 horsepower and 332 pound-feet of torque and has a top speed of 155 mph. Speed is regulated by a smart and smooth-shifting 8-speed automatic transmission.

(Note to speed freaks: The now-available BMW 550i, sporting a 462-hp twin-turbo V-8, is being billed by the carmaker as the fastest 5 Series ever. Just sayin'.)

The 540i feels every bit the sport sedan, aided by adjustable shocks and self-adaptive anti-roll bars, which stiffen on tight corners but will lighten up when it's comfort you seek. That's all part of the Dynamic Handling Package (\$2,600). The rear-steer version sharpens response and improves the car's agility on winding

The M Sport package adds stiffer springs, performance brakes with larger rotors and painted calipers, and is slightly lowered. It also adds luxuries like soft-close doors and power trunk lid.

On the straightaway, there's just enough growl to know the 540i means business. The turbo system has twin scrollers, one on each side, that eliminate any sign of turbo lag. And the grille has active shutters to improve air flow and efficiency at highway speeds. The EPA says fuel economy of 30 mpg is achievable. You'll get 20 mpg around

For the parking-impaired, a \$750 option can do the parallel work for you, too. Just stand outside the car and work the key fob's little computer. But it takes some time and patience - from you and perhaps others waiting in cars behind you.

Inside, the 540i looks good with upgraded materials (ceramic controls!) and ambient lighting, feels good with rich Nappa leather, and even smells

good as interior perfumes waft throughout the cabin. Driver comfort is virtually guaranteed with 16-way controls plus fourway lumbar adjustments.

But the star is the iDrive system, which can be operated by the wheel, the high-resolution 10.5-inch touchscreen, or the aforementioned hand gestures. The rear and surround cameras offer a complete picture of what's outside the car. And a big head-up display provides

adaptable driver information at a glance.

Oddly, it offers a Wi-Fi hotspot but only a single USB port for charging. But luxury options abound, including moonroof, power tailgate and — if you have the ear and the money — a \$4,200 Bowers & Wilkins sound system that sounds like Carnegie.

Three driver-safety packages are available with the 540i, which will add \$5,000 or so to the total. The Driver Assistance

II alone (\$1,700), for example, buys the lane change and lane-keep assist with side-collision avoidance.

In fact, be warned that it's real easy to jack your \$56,450 MSRP into the stratosphere with BMW's broad range of options. When the "ultimate driving machine" sets its sights on becoming the ultimate high-tech machine, it's no surprise that the financially timid should step aside.


Is mechanic's throttle body recommendation legit?

ear Car Talk: What the heck is a throttle body? We have a 2007 Toyota 4Runner with 85,000 miles and a 2011 Toyota Venza with 45,000 miles. Our local Toyota dealer is pushing us to service the "throttle body." I agreed to do it on the 4Runner, but I want to check with you before agreeing to have the throttle body serviced on the Venza. Is this service mandated by

Toyota? — Gary No. It's not mandated by Congress, either, Gary, despite what you may have read in school about the Fartkowsky-Schnurrer Throttle Body Cleaning Act of 1915.

The throttle body is the device that regulates the amount of air that the engine is sucking in. When you step on the gas pedal, it sends a signal to the computer, which then sends a signal to a little electric motor in the throttle body. That electric motor





moves the throttle plate and allows more or less air into the engine — depending on the position of the gas pedal.

Over time, the inside of the throttle body can get crudded up with carbon, and that can make the throttle plate get sticky and close unevenly. But if your throttle body had enough carbon in it to make your throttle plate sticky, you'd notice it: You'd notice a rough idle, surging or hesitation and stumbling when stepping on the gas. But you didn't mention any of those things.

Plenty of cars go their entire lives without needing to have the throttle body cleaned. So I'm a

little skeptical that your dealer wants to do it to both of your cars. I think you might be getting YOUR throttle body cleaned, Gary.

If you're interested, ask the dealer why you need your throttle body cleaned. If he tells you he just recommends it as preventive maintenance, tell him thanks, but you'd rather buy a year of HBO. If he tells you he inspected it and saw carbon buildup, that's at least a little more legitimate. But I'd still put it off until and unless you experience performance issues. It'll cost you no more to clean the throttle body then, if that time ever comes, than it will cost you now.

Instructions for doing your own shock absorber 'bounce test'

Dear Car Talk: My 2004 Jeep Grand Cherokee has 187,000 miles on it. I

bought it new. What is a reasonable lifetime for shocks? I've been told to keep them if they aren't leaking. Mine don't have signs of leakage, but the car does not ride as it first did. I've replaced the tires with ones with softer sidewalls, and have replaced the springs. Both have helped the ride, but should I be replacing the shocks as well? Many thanks! — Jon

Jon, you should have written to me five years

Actually, there's no time limit on the life of a shock absorber; its lifespan depends on how much and what type of use it gets. If you do mostly highway driving, it's conceivable that your shocks are still OK. It would be unusual, but conceivable.

Since the shocks aren't leaking, then you have to give them the classic "bounce test": You start at one corner of the car, and push down as hard as you can on the

bumper. When you've pushed it down as far as you can, let the bumper come back up and immediately push it hard again — trying to amplify the movement. It's like pushing a kid on a swing. The idea is to really get that corner of the car oscillating up and down as violently as you can.

Then, when it's really moving — or when you begin to feel the first signs of angina, whichever comes first — push it all the way down and let it go. If the shock is good, that corner of the car will come back up once and stop immediately, and not oscillate. If it continues to go up and down at all, the shock is worn out.

I have to say that we replace shocks far less frequently than we used to. We used to routinely replace shocks at 30,000 or 40,000 miles. And now it's not at all unusual to have cars with well-over 100,000 miles that still don't need replacement shocks.

Still, I think you're at the far end of the bell curve, Jon. And even if you replace the shocks, you can't reasonably expect the car to ever ride as it first did. Remember, it's 13 years old — old enough to have pimples and a first girlfriend. So pretty much everything is somewhat worn out.

So if you want a newcar ride, look at the 2018 Grand Cherokee. But in the meantime, give your shocks the bounce test. Good luck.



Last year's inaugural Palate Pleasures Restaurant Week drew unprecedented traffic, even during summer slow time, to take advantage of discounted meals all over town.

In collaboration with main sponsors Sysco and Cheney Brothers, the Punta Gorda Chamber of Commerce is rolling out Restaurant Week again, this time on the cusp of season. Again, Palate Pleasures spans more than just a week's worth of specially discounted meals: 12 days, two weekends, from Wednesday, Nov. 1, through Sunday,

If diners can't find a good deal, they mustn't be looking very hard.

Lorah Steiner, director of tourism for the Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach Visitor & Convention Bureau, said, "This is a great way to kick off season. November is a shoulder month (not low, not high season), so restaurants still need to fill seats and hotels still need to sell rooms. I love restaurant weeks, as they provide incentives to discover new places and cuisine."

Punta Gorda Chamber chair Sue Randall, who has two restaurants in the promotion — Village Fish Market and, now, La Fiorentina — said, "We were busy during Restaurant Week last year, and I think this year is going to be highly successful."



(Excerpts from the Daily Herald-News from Nov. 3-Nov. 9, 1977:)

Our New Airline

The addition of Naples Airlines to Charlotte County's transportation system is a major boost to the area that deserves the support of the residents. The daily flights from Charlotte County Airport to Tampa and Miami are complimented by daily service of Trailways and Greyhound buses. It gives the county transportation opportunities very few areas of our size have. Good transportation in and out of an area is more than a convenience for travelers-it can serve as a major selling point for prospective businesses. Making fast connections is vital to progressive business, and for other travelers. With the addition of Interstate 75 coming through here, shipping goods will be about as easy as shipping people. Punta Gorda and Port Charlotte need no longer be designated as "halfway between Sarasota and Fort Myers." As well as being blessed by having scheduled airline flights, Charlotte is fortunate to be served by an organization of foresight and vitality. Naples Airlines President John Van Arsdale sums it up: "Traveling from Charlotte by air will first become attractive, then popular. His planes are solid, a first-class commuter air service. The airline deserves to be supported.



Do You Wish To Buy A Pier?

Are you in the market for a slightly used bridge? Then contact with Punta Gorda City manager Robert Hollander. He has a one-owner, 1921 vintage bridge, or more accurately, part of it. Most of the old Peace River Bridge was torn down earlier by Beach Reefs Inc. But three columns of concrete pilings remain, stretching several hundred feet into the river. About 400 feet of the bridge are still covered by the original roadway and serves as a fishing pier for local anglers. What is to become of the remnants of the crumbling eyesore? Nobody seems to know yet. Money ran out before the entire bridge could be torn down. It is much to the relief of fishermen who know fish like to congregate around the rumpling pilings. They have been allowed for the time being to practice their favorite sport.

Raising The Retirement Age

With elevation of the mandatory retirement age to 70, instead of 65, an interesting facet of the issue has emerged. Young people think mandatory retirement is not a good idea. During discussions over the legislation, opponents contended that raising the retirement age would tend to block promotions and employment of the nation's youth. According to a poll conducted by the Conference Board, a business research group, the following emerged: The survey of 5,000 households indicated that 75 per cent of those 25 years old and younger favored no mandatory retirement age; 10 per cent of those 25 to 34 agreed. In contrast, about 56 percent of people between 55 and 64 opposed a fixed retirement age. One would think the youngsters would want the oldsters out of the way," but it was not the way this particular poll came out. As matters now stand, Congress will raise the retirement age.




