Daylight Saving Time change unlikely, some say

As he rented chairs and umbrellas on Englewood Beach last week, Mark "The Beach Guy" Timchula said he was happy Florida lawmakers recently agreed with him and many of his sun-loving customers in deciding that Daylight Saving Time should be year-round.

But even though lawmakers

and Florida Gov. Rick Scott recently supported Daylight Saving Time (DST) being permanent, not everyone agrees it will actually happen — or that it's a good idea.

Congress must amend federal law to make it happen. Bills filed a couple of weeks ago in the Senate through Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Florida), and in the House by Rep. Vern Buchanan (R-Florida), have not moved much.

One of the bills from Rubio would make DST permanent across the country, and the other would give Florida approval to establish permanent DST in its boundaries.

Upon announcing his filing of the bills, Rubio said in a press release on March 14 that he was introducing the bills because they would "approve Florida's will and, if made nationally, would also ensure Florida is not out of sync with

the rest of the nation.'

Despite strong legislative support in Florida as well as some support from locals involved in tourism, not everyone is on board and some are still trying to gauge support for permanent DST.

Florida Parent Teacher Association, for example, is against it.

The nonprofit organization

NORTH PORT — Former North Port Police Chief Kevin Vespia had some surprises given to him at his retirement ceremony, but Mayor Vanessa Carusone gave him the biggest one of the afternoon: an annual award for single-parent families.

The idea came to Carusone and Vespia when they worked on the North Port Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention, but as the years went by, the idea had not come to fruition.

"I wanted to make sure it

started before he left," she said.

Carusone announced the creation of the award during her speech for Vespia. She added it will be called the Priscilla Vespia fund, in honor of his mother who died from cancer when he was 27.

As Vespia wiped tears from his eyes, Carusone went further in-depth with the details.

The award will be given to one single-parent family each year at the beginning of the school year. It will include funds raised from donors. The criteria for the family will be created by

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Sarasota County Schools to discuss new grant funding

SARASOTA — The Sarasota County School Board will discuss two items of new business Tuesday.

The board will look at a grant to benefit student education, as well as a potential change to contracted services involving Brentwood Elementary.

The grant, known as the Florida Diagnostic and Learning Resource Grant, is provided through the Florida Department of Education. According to the district, an approved grant for \$1,065,383 would fund diagnostic and instructional support services.

It also provides opportunities for developmental screenings for children ages 3 to 5, Pre-K

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transition, professional development, technology, parent services and IDEA implementation, according to the district.

The grant also funds a Florida Inclusion Network facilitator, which works collaboratively to support student placement and achievement in the least restrictive environment.

The board will vote on the grant approval on Tuesday.

The second item under new business is a ratification of a building contract for Brentwood Elementary.

According to the agenda, this new ratification will increase the existing contract by \$12,043,847. The work on **Brentwood Elementary** includes redoing the entire cafeteria, media center, renovation of the

HVAC system and overall beautification of the campus.

The money proposed in the ratification is in addition to the already existing \$12,500,000 for the project that was agreed upon in October, according to documents.

The board will vote to add the additional funding.

The board will look at a student art showcase for the All State, Art in the Capitol student artists.

There will also be a presentation on Teen Court, which recently began meeting in North Port along with a school showcase on Career and **Technical Education** at Suncoast Technical College.

The Sarasota County School Board meets at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in The Board Chambers, 1980 Landings Blvd., Sarasota.

Meetings are broadcast live on The Education Channel, Comcast channel 20 and Frontier channel 33. Meetings are also streamed live on the district's website www. sarasotacountyschools.

has between 20 and 30 members. "We reach out into the community and show them that bikers are just regular people who love the lord and want to make a difference," said Kress.

Sunday's event included CMA members from Sarasota and Fort Myers.

"This is my first time here," said Joe Naples, road captain of the Sarasota chapter called the Faith Riders. "It's just like being in church. It convenes ... everybody ... (as) a fellowship. It helps to keep the group together. We get to pray with people in prayer. It helps get the word out."

Of the Fort Myers Kingsway Riders, Jack Barney said services like the "Sonrise" service are important because it helps to unite the group and its faith.

"Camaraderie with the other chapters (makes it important)," said Barney. "Resurrection Sunday (is important) because we all share the same mission ... to be lifted up together. It unites our faith. It builds us back up again for the purpose of the calling that we all share together, to spread the good news

that Jesus is alive." Many of the CMA members discussed the importance of helping bikers who were "lost" and the importance of the organization's efforts to support those riders. According to Charlotte CMA member Ed Godwin, those who are lost are living a life separated from Him.

There's a lot of lost souls out there," said Godwin, "and I enjoy riding my motorcycle. So this is an avenue for me to meet bikers and not just bikers ... other people too. It's an opening that I could get a shot at them and bring them to the

Yvonne Pawlicki and her husband are both members of the Charlotte CMA chapter. She described the "lost" as people who are continually making mistakes.

"They're doing the wrong thing," said Pawlicki. "Whether it be drinking too much ... dating too much. All of those things that we consider sins. They're only doing that because they don't know the Lord because if they knew the Lord, they wouldn't be doing that. But, you can't walk up to them. Our motto is 'don't preach it to anybody just let them know we're here you ...

had even asked Scott to veto the bill and has reached out to Rubio's office with concerns over the bills he has filed.

"We are concerned about the safety of our children waiting for school buses, walking or riding their bikes to school in the dark," said Florida PTA Legislation Chair Angie Gallo.

If the bill passes through Congress "we will not see a sunrise in parts of Florida during the winter months until 8:15 a.m. or 8:20 a.m.," Gallo said.

And that "will put our youngest children in jeopardy and have our high school students attending school for over an

hour in the dark," according to

Prior to its passage in the Florida Legislature, Charlotte County Public Schools had also supported the way it is right now — where clocks spring an hour forward March 11 through Nov. 4 during DST and then back again.

Florida PTA points to some news reports where in 1974 a short-lived, emergency DST act signed into law by former President Richard Nixon involved deadly consequences. "In the first month, eight children were killed and six of the deaths were attributed directly to children going to school in the darkness," said Gallo.

We do expect this bill to receive resistance federally," Gallo said, adding some media groups also have concerns

about the impact it could have on programming.

Rubio's release, however, claimed permanent DST "reduces car crashes and car wrecks involving pedestrians."

He also pointed to benefits to the economy and agriculture it could spur, along with increasing physical fitness, reducing childhood obesity, positively impacting wildlife conservation, and reducing robberies by 27 percent.

Meanwhile, the Florida Chamber of Commerce which has not taken a position on the issue — is still actively soliciting opinions from its members "to see where Florida's business community stands," according to Florida Chamber of Commerce Director of Infrastructure and Governance Policy Christopher Emmanuel.

"I believe that a change is very unlikely in the near future," Emmanuel said.

Emmanuel shared a memo with the *Sun* that he provided to the chamber's Board of Directors recently, which said the legislation signed by Scott has an "uncertain path forward."

This merely expresses the intent of the Florida Legislature and has no practical effect nor does it bind future Legislatures or governors," Emmanuel's memo stated.

Emmanuel believes that given the tenor in Washington, D.C., Congress will probably not

act on this. And not all members of Congress from Florida are actively pushing for it.

"This isn't something that the congressman is considering

right now," said U.S. House Rep. Tom Rooney's spokesperson Allison Nielsen.

Timchula, "The Beach Guy," said he was "bummed out" about Congressional inaction so far on this — as well as other items growing stagnant in Washington, D.C.

This year in Tallahassee, Sen. Greg Steube (R-Sarasota) had introduced a year-round DST bill in the Senate, which was substituted by a prevailing House version (HB 1013) signed by Scott.

Rep Mike Grant (R-Port Charlotte) voted in favor of it, while Rep. Julio Gonzalez (R-Venice) voted against it.

Overall in both houses, 136 state lawmakers voted for year-round DST. Just 13 cast nay votes.

The criticism that comes with any similar public position is something she has learned to deal with.


"Sometimes I just smile and agree to disagree," she said.

She answered a list of questions about the city's current issues:









fourth term on the City Council and have served four of the eight years as mayor.

Q: Are you a native of **Charlotte County, if not** where did you move here from and when?

A: My family moved to Port Charlotte from Geneseo, New York, when I was 4. They moved here in search of better weather for health reasons. Over 40 years later, my parents still live in the same house in Port Charlotte. I attended Charlotte County schools K-12: Neil Armstrong, Punta Gorda Middle and Charlotte High, so even though I am not a native, this is the only home I've known.

Q: What was your job/ profession before elected to council? Do you still

A: Prior to being elected

to City Council, I was a teacher in Lee and Charlotte counties and then became a stay-athome mom and volunteer in the schools. I received my master's degree in **Educational Technology** from Florida Gulf Coast University around the time I was first elected, but have not returned to full-time work. I volunteer on many committees and also serve on committees as assigned through the city.

Q: Punta Gorda has been a relatively quiet town with few controversies until recently, with the buzz over a developer wanting to put a restaurant in Gilchrist Park, the complaints about not parking in the grass, the height restrictions, and the Trabue Woods naming. Is all this a matter of the town just growing up or is there some reason for all the discussion and controversy all at once?

A: These examples are not so much controversial as they are just issues being addressed as our town changes and "modernizes."

For example, Gilchrist Park had many ADA issues at the gazebo, pavilion areas and the playground was basically defunct. All of these areas have been rebuilt, or will be in the near future, so that all abilities can enjoy them. The park plan was also based around a wider path for pedestrians and bicyclists, enhanced landscapes, and more green space for all to enjoy. We are not finished with the park, so I encourage

patience while we comnlete all of the phases for

a finished project.

There was never a plan to put a restaurant in Gilchrist Park and any rumors to that effect are baseless. Since 2008, when the park renovation plans were revealed and discussed, City Council has always included the no parking on the grass as part of the final design. Parking along Retta and at Harvey when you enter, along with off-street parking areas by the tennis courts, pickleball court, and playground have been incorporated into the design as well. Upon entering the park on Harvey, there is a roundabout at which one can stop, unload items from one's car, transport them along the sidewalk or Harborwalk to their location in the park, and then find suitable parking in the Retta area or

behind City Hall. In regards to height restrictions, the building height proposal draft ordinance language is still being drafted. Any discussions around this now are purely conceptual.

Q: What do you see for the future of City Marketplace?

A: City Marketplace represents a unique opportunity for the right development. I would definitely like to see elements of community space incorporated into a mixed-use project. We have heard ideas, but most have been conceptual. It's definitely a prime piece of real estate so the

project will need to be a

feature for the city and contribute to the overal downtown feeling.

Q: Do you think most residents approve of the potential new rules on building height and do you think it will spur

development downtown? A: Again, the conversation on changing City Center zoning has been conceptual and a draft ordinance is in the works. Not only will the City Council conduct multiple public hearings, the Planning Commission will hear the draft as well. The intent of granting additional building height is to facilitate development in the City Center District while preserving and enhancing the downtown appeal. I am in favor of these considerations on large parcels, but not on every lot. I do think changes will help in creating a more business friendly environment, which will help us create a more stable year-round economy.

Q: The grass parking has created much more discussion than some might imagine. When was the idea of not parking on the grass first brought up and where? Was it in a public meeting?

A: Let me reiterate, in July 2008, as part of the TEAM Punta Gorda Waterfront Development Master Plan, the park renovations were revealed and discussed. The city then secured an engineer to undertake design of the Harborwalk/Gilchrist Park. During 2010, and almost on an annual

basis thereafter, several presentations were made regarding design, all of which included parking on Retta and closing off the grass areas, all of this took place in public meetings.

Q: Some people have charged the city is trying to run the musicians out of the park. You yourself said at the last council meeting that you had reservations about it being a year-round event? Can you address that?

A: The city has reserved both Tuesday and Thursday nights for music and has refrained from renting any areas of the park (pavilions, grass area, etc.) — from the hotel to the gazebo — for private functions. We want to retain the area for music enjoyment and keep the historical musical tradition in place. However, I have reservations about removing the bollards two nights a week, year-round. We have not made it through an event season or a rainy season and we still have more landscaping to do in that area. I love the Guitar Army but they do need some leadership or organization so that we can work with them like we do every other group.

Q: The lack of a commercial tax base has been a big issue. Do you see the city annexing more property or do you believe the decisions being made now — such as the new height restrictions — will spur enough

growth to overcome that

shortcoming? A: The lack of a com-

mercial tax base means that our tax burden is shouldered by property owners. Since 2006, the city's strategic plan has had this as a focus area and general action item. We have yet to make real progress in this area because as we add a few commercial elements, we have annexed some residential.

Q: Many people have expressed a desire to keep Punta Gorda just as it is. Is that realistic, especially with the plans for the Sunseeker resort across the river?

A: Growth is coming our way from the north, south and east. We will need to adapt and stay engaged with other government entities, as well as look to the future. For instance, we are currently undertaking a transportation study so this information can help us prioritize and plan for what will be needed. Also, we will be taking a look at impact fees to plan for future roads and other infrastructure needs.

Q: What would you like to see Punta Gorda look like in 20 years?

A: In 20 years, I would like to see Punta Gorda diversify its population so that all generations feel like this is their home town. It's a great place to raise kids and to live year round, so I hope we can continue to build a city that attracts people that can enjoy this city as much as I do.



Weather forecast shows an overall sunny week

While northern parts of the country enter spring with cold temperatures and wintry precipitation, Southwest Florida pushes on with hot afternoons, partly cloudy skies and foggy mornings. According to the National Weather Service, the week's highs are forecast to be

in the mid to high 80s, dropping back into the 70s by the end of the week.

Today is expected to be mostly sunny with a high near 86 degrees. An east-southeast wind is forecast for around 6 mph, turning south-southwest in the afternoon. Tonight looks to be partly cloudy with a low around 65 degrees. A west-northwest wind

is expected to move through the area at 6 mph, becoming light and variable throughout the night.

Another sunny day is forecast for Tuesday with a high temperature around 83 degrees and an east southeast wind at 5 to 9 mph. Tuesday night's forecast shows signs of patchy fog after 2 a.m. Otherwise the night should be partly

cloudy with a low around 66 degrees. A southwest wind is expected at 5 to 7 mph, becoming calm in the evening.

Tuesday night's patchy fog is forecast for Wednesday morning before 8 a.m. After that, the day is expected to be mostly sunny with a high near 83 degrees. A light and variable wind is forecast to come through the Southwest Florida

area, turning southwest at 5 to 10 mph in the morning. Wednesday night is expected to be partly cloudy with a low around 65 degrees with a northwest wind of 6 to 9 mph.

NWS reports Thursday to be a mostly sunny day with a high near 79 degrees and a north wind around 9 mph. Thursday night should be partly cloudy with a low around

Friday is forecast to be mostly sunny with a high near 80 degrees. Friday night is expected to be partly cloudy with a low around 64.

Going into the weekend, there is a 20 percent chance of rain for Saturday. Otherwise, the day should be mostly sunny with a high near 82 degrees.

Emblazoned below her shapely form was "The Outlaw," the name of her movie from 1943.

Staff Sgt. Robert Wollitz was a side-gunner on the bomber during the war. He flew 33 combat missions on "The Outlaw" during the Korean conflict.

He is now a resident of River's Edge Mobile Home Park, south of Fort Ogden near Arcadia.

At the time, he was a member of the 28th Bomb Squadron, 19th Bomb Group, 20th Air Force. Wollitz's outfit flew ground support missions for U.S. Marines and Army troops battling the North Koreans and Chinese. In addition, they carpet-bombed many of the North Korean's major cities with incendiary bombs that disintegrated

"Our plane was the first bomber to fly 15 combat missions in Korea," Wollitz recalled nearly 70 years later. "The Outlaw's crew received special recognition for this feat.'

They flew over the Chosin Reservoir as part of an attempt by the 20th Air Force to provide air support to Gen. H.M. "Howling Mad" Smith and his 20,000-plus members of the 1st Marine Division surround by hundreds of thousands of enemy North Korean and Chinese

troops. "We were supporting our Marines when we were flying against targets above the Chosin Reservoir," Wollitz recalled. "By then, they were already encircled by the enemy."

With the help of Wollitz and other B-29 crews above, the Leathernecks fought their way back down to the coast 75 miles away. They traveled on a narrow rutted road along steep mountain terrain to waiting transport ships that took them out of harm's way. But not before hundreds of Marines froze to death in the sub-zero cold in one of the most daring battles in the history of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Wollitz remembered how cold it was even inside their pressurized bomber during those flights over the reservoir.

"When we flew those Chosin Reservoir missions the outside

air temperature was 70 degrees below zero. In our bomber, you could have frozen water even though our cabin was pressurized," he said. "When it got that cold outside, we had to divert all the heat to the engines to keep them running."

It was during this period that Wollitz's B-29 crew was ordered to make a flight over Manchuria looking for more Chinese troops.

"We knew nothing about the orders until we were airborne. We flew into Manchuria all by ourselves looking for the enemy."

Wollitz doesn't remember what they found in Manchuria, but he does recall it was a quick flight in and out of enemy territory.

It was at this point that Gen. Douglas Mac Arthur, the supreme Allied commander in Korea, was thinking about running the Chinese forces out of the country and back to Manchuria. The general was even considering using atomic bombs against the enemy. That's when President Harry Truman removed him from his command for insubordination.

"We got hit by a lot of anti-aircraft fire. When we came back from a mission we'd find all kinds of shrapnel holes in our plane. \bar{I} had one piece of shrapnel pass about a foot over my head and put a hole in the side of the airplane. We were lucky because we never had any anti-aircraft fire that put us out of commission.

Wollitz was a 20-yearold side gunner on his B-29 bomber. It was his job to man one of the 10.50 caliber machine-guns aboard the plane.

Shortly after arriving at Anderson Air Force Base on Guam in June 1950 they were told to prepare a small kit of personal things and bring an extra set of fatigues. Their 28th Squadron was going to take part in some action in Korea they knew little about.

"At the time I couldn't have told you where Korea was," he said. "Our 19th Bomb Group got about a dozen of its 45 B-29s in the air by midnight. When we got to Kadina, we didn't have a clue what was going on. Things got serious in a hurry. The next day, June 2, 1950, we flew our first combat mission against the railroad station at Seoul, South Korea. We bombed

the hell out of it. 'We never got bothered much by MIG fighters. They usually left our bomber formations alone. We could see the enemy fighters coming off the

field in Manchuria on the other side of the river. If we stayed in formation we never had a big problem with the MiGS. If you got caught out on your own you could be in deep trouble.

"They called this area 'MiG Alley.'

"Losing an engine on a bombing run was a bit unnerving. On occasion, we came back to Kadina a time or two on three engines," he said. "These missions strained a B-29 pretty hard. We could run 10 hours or more and we might have to stop in Japan on the way back to base to fuel up. We had no aerial refueling.'

Transportation targets were their main objectives — railroad lines and bridges. Other times they would carpet bomb enemy cities with incendi-

ary bombs. Pyongyang, the capital of North Korea, was a favorite target of Wollitz's bomb group. It repeatedly dropped incendiary bombs on the city.

Wollitz's most vivid recollection of a single mission was when "The Outlaw" got a 2,000-pound bomb stuck

in the bomb bay that wouldn't eject.

'We depressurized and I went back in the bomb bay and tried to get it out. First, I made sure the wires that triggered the bomb's fuses were still in place which they were," he said. "There was a little catwalk in the bomb bay and I was skinny enough I could get on it and push the bomb.

It wouldn't budge. "There was nothing below the tip of my toes. Nothing but 15,000 feet down to the Sea of Japan.

"When we landed the damn bomb was still in our bomb bay. We taxied off the runway and were headed for our hard stand where the bomber was parked when we hit a bump. Out the unexploded bomb went, but it didn't explode.

'Later a crew loaded the bomb into a truck. They took it and dumped it into the ocean at Okinawa," he said.

"Our pilot was trying to get me a Distinguished Flying Cross for my efforts to get the bomb out of our bomb bay," Wollitz said. "I never got my DFC, but I'm just happy I made it back from that war."

From June 1950 until January of the following year, Wollitz flew with the 20th Air Force on B-29 bombing raids over Korea. The rest of his hitch was served with the 301st Bomb Group, a Boeing B-47 bomber squadron based at Barksdale Air Force Base in Shreveport, Louisiana. The B-47 was atomic bomb compatible.

When Wollitz got out of the Air Force he went to work for General Motors. For 30 years he worked as a tool and die maker with G.M.

In 1991, he retired and Wollitz and his wife, Norma, moved to Florida in 1999. The couple has three adult children: John, Kathy and Jeanne.

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Florida children cuddle up and read with therapy dogs

PENSACOLA, Fla. — The young girl sat across from the little doggie

Buster and read to him. Every few seconds, you would hear a "Woof

Woof.' Not from laid-back Buster — an 11-year-old Bichon Frise. But from 10-year-old Chancey Cogley.

'Woof Woof," she said, reading from the children's book "Biscuit Takes a Walk." "It's Grandpa." Then, she continued with the short story of the fictional dog Biscuit taking a walk with fictional grandpa.

Just a few minutes earlier, Chancey was reading another story to a 2-year-old basset hound named Poppy on Saturday at the Tryon Branch Library, part of the West Florida Public Libraries system. Chancey has read to the dogs many times before, as she's practically grown up participating in the Pet Partners "Read With Me" literary program, which allows children to read to therapy dogs.

"This program has been part of her life since she was six months old," said her father, Casey Cogley. "She grew up with this program."

Pet Partners is an international organization that strives to improve the health and well-being of people by allowing them to bond with animals. The group uses animals — mostly dogs — to help people in nursing homes, schools, veterans groups and others to form that dog-human bond.

The group has been visiting area libraries since 2008 and brings therapy dogs — usually

two at a time — to the Tryon Branch Library on the third Saturday of each month, and at the Southwest Branch Library on the fourth Saturday of each month. Times are 10 a.m. to noon. All dogs are with their owners/handlers and are on a leash. Pet Partners animals and their human volunteers undergo specific training before being sent out into the field.

Library employee Michelle Cogley is Chancey's mother and is program organizer — one reason her daughter has been reading to dogs for most of her life. Cogley said anywhere from a half-dozen to 20 or so children — with parents and guardians, of course — show up for each Pet Partners session.

"I've seen kids come in afraid of dogs," she said, recounting the story of one boy who made monthly visits with his

cousin. "When he first came, he wouldn't even come in the door."

It took the boy six months to get comfortable enough where he would sit next to his cousin during the reading sessions. Soon, the boy was reading to the dog. A month later, "he even touched the dog," Cogley said.

Little Gracie Kennedy, 6, sat down on the soft mat next to Buster to read him the children's story "One is Enough" – about being an only child. (Gracie is not.)

The dog was flopped on his side, belly exposed, being rubbed by his human companion Brenda Rudolph, a Pet Partner volunteer.

After she read the story, Gracie rubbed the mellow dog's belly too.

Gracie is only in first grade, but read like a seasoned veteran. How long has she been reading?

"Since I was little."





Olympic and Stanford swim star Katie Ledecky turning pro

Katie Ledecky is turning

The five-time Olympic swimming gold medalist gave up her final two years of eligibility at Stanford, allowing her to concentrate on training for the 2020 Olympics while cashing in on sponsorship and endorsement deals that wouldn't have been available to her as a college

athlete. Other than the financial windfall, Ledecky isn't planning any big changes. She will continue training on the West Coast under coach Greg Meehan while working toward her degree at Stanford, where she's been focused on psychology and political science.

"It's something I could've done in two years once I completed my eligibility, but this gives me some time before 2020 to really focus in on getting all the pieces in place so I can really train hard and focus on my training leading up to 2020," Ledecky said at the Washington Press Club, where she made the announcement Monday while home on spring break.

Meehan said the two discussed Ledecky's pro aspirations "casually during the recruiting process, but got more specific back in September. "At that time, they decided she should make the transition after the NCAA championships, which were held two weekends ago at Ohio State.

The 21-year-old Ledecky captured five NCAA individual titles while helping the Stanford women win two straight

back titles since taking five straight from 1992-96. At this year championships, she won her second straight title in the 1,650yard free by lapping the field and finishing nearly 30 seconds ahead of the runner-up.

Ledecky is following a similar path to the one taken by Missy Franklin, who starred at the 2012 Olympic but put off her professional career to swim collegiately at California-Berkeley for two years.

After turning pro in 2015, Franklin moved back to Colorado to train but struggled to regain the form she showed in London. She qualified in only two individual events at the Rio Games and failed to make the final in either one. Franklin later expressed regret about leaving the college environment, saying she felt lonely and isolated at home since many of her high school friends had moved away.

"There was nothing to do but just train and swim," Franklin told the AP last summer while reflecting on what went wrong in Rio. "That became my whole life. I had to get to a place where I could find balance again."



Buddy Hughes: North Porter, one of a kind

OUR POSITION: This 90-yearold has made her presence felt in North Port.

t would be hard to find a North Port resident more dedicated to the city of North Port than Althea "Buddy" Hughes.

The first time we dropped by her home the diminutive woman was in her yard pulling weeds. We were less confident we would find her on our second visit some weeks later, but the bird feeders in the bushes near her front window were full.

Buddy arrived here with her late partner, Olympia Guenn, 35 years ago, when North Port was largely a scattering of homes near U.S. 41. Buddy and Olympia had been offered a free trip from Brooklyn, N.Y., to North Port. It paid off. They bought a General Development Corp. home along the Cocoplum Canal.

She soon became a fixture in community affairs.

The white-haired, 90-year-old — a former city commissioner who is battling cancer — still attends City Commission meetings and usually speaks during every available public comment session, sometimes three or four times during a meeting. Each time at the lectern, she gives her name and address, although everyone knows who she is.

Badly treated by commissioners years ago, she now sits in the second row of the audience at meetings. Her comments often add levity to sessions.

Her advice is wide-ranging. Poorly kept yards get her attention; pot holes make her list. Once, after someone stole her computer a few years ago, she used a number of public comment opportunities to alert the community and ask for it back.

She also identifies issues that require attention. For instance, in 2009 Buddy urged city commissioners to contact Sarasota County school officials and ask them to build a technical school in North Port. Nine years later, that dream is coming true.

On her 90th birthday in May 2017, the city honored her with a cake, a key to the city and a proclamation.

Now, as her health has failed, Buddy has given away closets full of clothing. She has a hard time keeping up her yard.

But she remains energetic and more upbeat than one would expect, acknowledging she hopes to spend her final days at home. She still has a sparkle her eyes and talks non-stop about politics. (A Republican, she has no time for Donald Trump, who is too crude and too much of a braggart for her taste.)

She lost her license, so friends must give her rides. North Port's retiring police chief has driven her home after commission meetings. When her large dog died, ex-Fire Chief Bill Taaffe drove to her home to bury it. (Now, a tiny pup shares her

At least two commissioners, Jill Luke and Debbie McDowell, often drop by. Each morning, a police department volunteer calls to be sure she has made it through the night. (That free service is available to all city residents.)

Many are praying she will continue attending commission meetings for months to come. Her dream is to reach the age of 91, but she doubts she will make it. Without Buddy the meetings just won't be the same.

Our hope is the city will dedicate a public space in her honor: a street, perhaps, or Pine Park. The Buddy Hughes ball field would be appropriate. Baseball is how she got her nickname: As a youngster she was so skilled at hitting a baseball the guys always

chose their "buddy" first.
Whatever the choice, we urge the commission to do it now, while she is still around.

We should expect all of our newspapers to follow the same path. This is a way for a diverse group of citizens to get their opinions out into the public arena.

Over the past 17 years, I have seen letters that

reflect all points of view on any and every issue. Of course, some letters are not only inarticulate, but some also present falsehoods as facts.

The proper response is for another letter writer to present accurate information to counteract such false statements. The Sun staff and their reporters do

not have the time to fact check every letter, but our citizens do have that ability, and should do so if they have the facts. The folks who oppose any development, such as the proposed Sunseeker Resort, or changes in building height in Punta Gorda need to have others who are in favor of these changes articulate their points of view, as well. We all have access to the letters page. Let us exercise this freedom while we can.

Recently, a number of local letter writers have argued for the banning of so-called "assault weapons." The problem here is the definition of

an "assault" weapon. Is it your grandfather's M1 carbine that was used in World War II and Korea, which was manufactured in the 1940s, because it uses a 15-round magazine? Is it the World War II M1 Garand? Is it the M1A, the semiautomatic version of the M14, which was used in Vietnam, because it uses a 20-round magazine? Is it your brother's 22 rim-fire rifle that can hold a magazine of over 15 rounds? Is it almost every modern semi automatic pistol which may hold 17 rounds of ammunition in a magazine?

The military defines

assault weapons as those that have the capacity of fully automatic firing action via a selector switch. The AR-15 is a semi-automatic weapon, i.e. one shot for each pull of the trigger. Fully automatic weapons have been legally controlled since 1934.

Do we really think that criminals, terrorists, or gang members will obey any laws we pass? We need to be very careful in proposing laws that would eliminate some of our constitutional freedoms. Today, it may be the Second Amendment, tomorrow it might be the First Amendment.

Certainly, we all wish to make our local schools safe for our children and our grandchildren. I know that our School Board, our school administrators, and our law enforcement community are all on the same page. We just need to make sure that all of the actions we take, are not violating the rights that so many Americans died to preserve.

Should we pretend justice will happen this time?

avbe we should just skip to the end.

Is that sacrilege? Is it too cynical by half? After all, this is the part where we're supposed to be waiting for answers and pretending to believe justice might be done.

But if you've seen a movie a hundred times, it is difficult not to mouth the dialogue ahead of time. Similarly, it is pretty hard not to have a strong sense of where this latest police shooting of an unarmed black man is, barring the unexpected, likely heading.

The district attorney will decline to seek an indictment. Or the grand jury will refuse to hand one down. Or the case will go to trial and a jury will purport to sift through the evidence, and then return an

acquittal.

And the family of Stephon Clark, killed in a volley of 20 gunshots by two Sacramento police officers while standing in his own backyard armed with nothing more menacing than a smartphone, will be asked to stand before a microphone, put aside their grief and betrayal and save the city's collective backside. They will face a restive crowd, every person in it thinking how easily Stephon could have been Tony, could have been Ted, could have been Tanya, could have been me, and they will plead for calm.

Maybe they'll get it and the California capital will sleep in peace. Or maybe they won't, and the city will burn.

If that's pessimistic, it is a pessimism well earned. In the movies, James Bond has a license to kill. In America, police have what amounts to the same thing.

Yes, that's a hard judgment likely to jolt and offend many observers, legions of good and conscientious cops among them. But can it really be argued? After Philando, after Tamir, after John, after Sean, after Eric, after Michael, after Darrius, after Sam, after Freddie, after Alton, after Terence,

after Amadou, how can anyone really dispute the point?

It is understandable that jurors and police officials are loath to second-guess an officer who, in less than the time it takes to blink. makes a bad decision in good faith. But once that willingness to accord the benefit of the doubt when sometimes warranted hardens into a reflexive refusal to hold accountable any officer in any circumstance ever, it becomes very hard to trust justice.

Consider that jurors in North Carolina saw video of Charleston police officer Michael Slager pumping bullets into the back of Walter Scott, who was running away, yet still could not bring themselves to convict him. Slager ended up

accepting a plea deal to avoid retrial.

If you're African-American, what is that supposed to make you think? You come to regard justice as a fairy tale for the very naive. You conclude that black lives actually don't matter. Not to, or in, America.

But then, Caroline Small's life didn't matter much, either, and she was white. The unarmed mother of two was executed by two officers in 2010 in a small town in Georgia. An investigation found that police tampered with the crime scene and manufactured misleading evidence, yet her killers never stood trial.

It calls to mind a truth Martin Luther King once spoke: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." So

a nation that routinely excuses police killings of unarmed black people is a nation where all of us are ultimately at risk. Unfortunately, America has never quite comprehended that truth, nor really wanted

So the ritual of yet another black man's useless death plays itself out in speeches, promises, recriminations. And many of us just watch and wait and pretend to believe. But it gets harder every time.

We've seen this movie too often. And we know every line by heart.

Our political cheating scandals: Census, gerrymandering

heating isn't winning. We try to teach this to our children, but politics provides the opposite

Political cheating allows those who engage in it to amass far more power than they have a right to in a constitutional democracy. Its most sophisticated form isn't ballot-box stuffing but the use of indirect means by those in authority to perpetuate themselves in office.

Within 48 hours, Americans were offered two fast courses in the politics of cheating.

Late Monday, the Trump administration — acting against the advice of six previous Census Bureau directors, Republicans and Democrats alike moved to add to the 2020 census a query about a respondent's citizenship status.

And on Wednesday, the Supreme Court heard a case that turns on whether Maryland's gerrymandered district boundaries deprive Republicans of fair representation in Congress.

In both cases, the courts should act to defend our republican democracy. On the census controversy, Congress could also provide a remedy. But



most Republicans are likely to be quite happy with the distortions that the citizenship question could introduce into our

decennial head count. There's a reason why the formal census has not asked about citizenship since 1950, and why it is an especially bad idea to reintroduce it now

Response rates to the census in lower-income neighborhoods have long been a challenge, and immigrants in the country illegally have worried that answering the questionnaire could endanger their status, despite legal guarantees of confidentiality. Even legal immigrants have shared these worries.

Such concerns have increased exponentially with President Trump targeting undocumented immigrants with a proud and public ferocity.

The undercounting of immigrants would create a twofold injustice. It would tilt representation at all levels of government away

from places with large populations of Latinos and other immigrants (often Metropolitan and Democratic-leaning) and overrepresent white, rural regions and states. And it would shortchange undercounted areas when it comes to federal funds, since many programs operate on formulas based on the

census. In the Trump era, there is an irony here since one legitimate concern in locales with high levels of recent immigration is that their public services are often strained. Cutting money from such jurisdictions only increases the burdens on local taxpayers, native born and

immigrant. The maneuver is all the more problematic because Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross chose to include the request for information on citizenship in the face of objections from career Census Bureau officials. The lateness of his decision means the citizenship question will not be subjected to the Bureau's usual extensive testing for the effect of new inquiries on the accuracy of the overall count.

This is one key contention of the lawsuit from California Attorney General Xavier Becerra. who said Ross' decision was "arbitrary and capricious." He's right. California is one of at least 12 states trying to block the move.

And political cheating at its purest and most obvious is gerrymandering, drawing district lines to maximize your party's representation in legislative bodies and minimize the number of seats your opponents can win.

Because so many of the state legislatures that drew district lines after the 2010 Census were controlled by Republicans, an end to gerrymandering now would be especially challenging to the GOP. So opposing gerrymandering has come to be seen as a partisan, Democratic issue.

But it's not. The addition of the Maryland case to a docket that already includes a challenge to an outlandish GOP gerrymander in Wisconsin is a reminder that both parties can suffer from this practice.

In Maryland, a formerly Republican district based in the rural and western parts of the state was chopped up, its pieces redistributed in a way that reduced the GOP to only one seat in the state's eight-member House delegation.

Linking Maryland and Wisconsin could allow the Supreme Court to rule against gerrymandering nationwide in a thoroughly non-partisan washpost.com. way. And the Wisconsin litigants provided an objective formula for judging when district lines are plainly unfair.

Justice Stephen Breyer's suggestion Wednesday that the court kick the matter into a later term is worth pursuing only if it could lead to a comprehensive ruling against gerrymandering. Attacks on judicial

activism are a staple on the right. The increasingly aggressive activism of conservative judges has made this a live concern on the left as well. But when elected officials use their power to make it ever harder for their opponents to win elections exactly what's happening with the census and gerrymandering — the





A bug is afoot — a leaf-footed bug

ne spring/summer plant pest that really bugs me is the leaf-footed bug. Just as its name implies, the back legs of this insect have leaf-like projections easily seen by the naked eye. The leaf-footed bug attacks many types of plants and is a general nuisance in the garden.

There are nine species of leaf-footed bugs in Florida. This insect is a type of stink bug which will be very evident if you get your hands on one. This is a defense action that keeps predators (and people) at bay. As a member of the Hemiptera, they have straw-like piecing/ sucking mouthparts which are inserted into a plant to suck juices. The adult leaf-footed bug is about three-quarters of an inch in length, has an elongated body with a triangular thorax, and is brownish in color. Some have a light-colored marking across the mid-section. The young (nymphs) look just like the adults, but are smaller, have no wings, and are orange to light brown in color. You may even be able to detect the tiny eggs which are golden brown and are conspicuously placed end-to-end

in a single row on leaves. Interestingly enough, the main host plant of this critter is the thistle. Unfortunately, they have found other plant types, including citrus, pecans, beans, peppers, lychee, okra, tomatoes, crape myrtles, roses, ixora, and hibiscus, equally inviting. Not only does the piecing/ sucking mouthpart cause damage to the plant, but it can also trigger fruit drop and rots to develop. While you may see just one or two leaf-footed bugs, they often have the groups. I have had the most problems with this insect on cherry tomatoes and southern peas. Adult leaf-footed bugs can fly

and leave the premises pretty fast when encountered. I have had success in actually hand-picking them to reduce numbers and suppress this pest. I hand-pick as soon as I first detect them, thus preventing a build-up of the population. Again, they are very nimble, and of course will release their "stink" when handled, but at least you know they are gone! Monitor regularly and remove any new arrivals as needed — you

will get used to it! The leaf-footed bug has a unique appearance and can be a nuisance in the garden. Recognition is important as there are many types of stinkbugs including beneficial types that actually feed on pest insects — you don't want to kill those!

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

Trump says 'NO MORE' on deal for 'Dreamer' immigrants

PALM BEACH, Fla. — President Donald Trump declared Sunday that a deal to help "Dreamer" immigrants was "NO MORE" and threatened to pull out of a free trade agreement with Mexico unless it does more to stop people from crossing into the U.S. He claimed they're coming to take advantage of protections granted certain immigrants.

"NO MORE DACA DEAL!" Trump tweeted one hour after he started the day by wishing his followers a "HAPPY FASTER!"

He also said Mexico must "stop the big drug and people flows, or I will stop their cash cow, NAFTA. NEED WALL!" The U.S., Canada and Mexico are currently renegotiating the North American Free Trade Agreement at Trump's insistence. Trump says NAFTA is bad for the U.S.

"Mexico has got to help us at the border," Trump told reporters before he attended Easter services at an Episcopal church near his Palm Beach, Florida, home, as he held his wife, Melania's, hand. "If they're not going to help us at the border, it's a very sad thing between our two countries."

"A lot of people are coming in because they want to take advantage of DACA," he added.

Former President Barack Obama created the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program to protect from

Defunct Chinese space lab set to re-enter Earth's atmosphere

BERLIN — China's defunct Tiangong 1 space station hurtled toward Earth on Sunday and was expected to re-enter the atmosphere within hours.

Most of the craft should burn up on re-entry, so scientists said it poses only a slight risk to people on the ground.

The European Space Agency forecast that the station, whose name translates as "Heavenly Palace," will re-enter sometime between Sunday night and early Monday GMT. The Chinese space agency said it should happen during the course of Monday Beijing time.

The Aerospace Corp. predicted Tiangong 1's re-entry would take place within 2 ½ hours of either side of 0010 GMT Monday (8:10 p.m. Sunday EDT.)

Based on the space station's orbit, it will come back to Earth somewhere 43 degrees north and 43 degrees south, a range covering most of the United States, China, Africa, southern Europe, Australia and South America. Out of range are Russia, Canada and northern Europe.

Only about 10 percent of the bus-sized, 8.5-ton spacecraft will likely survive being burned up on re-entry, mainly its heavier components such as its engines. The chances of any one person being hit by debris are considered less than one in

'Hope and dignity:' Pope calls for peace in Easter message

VATICAN CITY — On Christianity's most joyful day, Pope Francis called for peace in a world marked by war and conflict, "beginning with the beloved and long-suffering land of Syria" and extending to Israel, where 15 Palestinians were killed on the Israeli-Gaza border two days before Easter Sunday.

Francis reflected on the power of Christianity's core belief — that Jesus rose from the dead following crucifixion — in his formal "Urbi et Orbi" Easter message delivered from the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica to a packed square of some 80,000 faithful below.

The pontiff said the message of the resurrection offers hope in a world "marked by so many acts of injustice and violence," including parts of Africa affected by "hunger, endemic conflicts

and terrorism."

"It bears fruits of hope and dignity where there are deprivation and exclusion, hunger and unemployment; where there are migrants and refugees, so often rejected by today's culture of waste, and victims of the drug trade, human trafficking and contemporary forms of slavery," the pope said.

Francis called for a "swift end" to

the seven years of carnage in Syria, demanding that aid be delivered to the war-torn country's needy and calling for "fitting conditions for the returned and the displaced."

The pope also urged reconciliation in Israel, a place "experiencing in these days the wounds of ongoing conflict

that do not spare the defenseless." His remarks followed the Friday deaths of Palestinian protesters who charged toward Gaza's border with Israel, the area's deadliest violence in four years. Turning to Asia, Francis expressed

Family of man killed by police joins rally for reform

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — The family of Stephon Clark joined hundreds of people at a rally urging California's capital city not to let his memory or calls for police reform fade nearly two weeks after the 22-year-old unarmed black man was killed by Sacramento officers

Clark's fiancee, Salena Manni, stood on stage with his two young sons, grandmother and uncle for the gathering Saturday organized by Sacramento native and former NBA player Matt Barnes, who pledged to create a scholarship fund for the children of black men killed by police.

"All he wanted to do was go see his sons again, and unfortunately he can't," Curtis Gordon, Clark's uncle, said as he recalled seeing his nephew hours before the shooting. "So remember that — while we mourn, while we shout, while we cry — because it ain't just our pain, it's their pain."

Barnes amplified calls for charges against the two officers who are on administrative leave.

"It's more than color — it comes down to right and wrong," he said. "You're trying to tell me I can kill someone and get a paid vacation?"

The peaceful demonstration that drew between 200 and 300 people to a downtown park came a day after a

private autopsy released by the family showed Clark was shot from behind.

Clark was killed March 18 by two police officers responding to a call of someone breaking into car windows. They yelled that he had a gun before shooting, but it was only a cellphone. The police department says it has not received an official autopsy report

from the county coroner's office.

A female demonstrator was hit by a Sacramento County Sheriff's Department vehicle as a crowd began marching in the streets after another vigil Saturday night. In a statement early Sunday, the department said "the

Access to checking account?

ear Dave, Will paying my taxes online give the government electronic access to my checking account?

— Ashley

Dear Ashley,

If you use your checking account, of course they will have the ability to withdraw that money from your account. I believe I know where you're going with this question, and I think you may be a little confused about my stance on this sort of thing.

There's nothing wrong with certain entities having access to your checking account. I use electronic bill pay for utilities, mutual fund contributions, and things like that all the time. The only time I warn people against giving electronic access to their bank accounts is when they're dealing with collectors over a bad debt. The government — even the IRS — isn't known for coming in and randomly taking money out of people's accounts. Collectors, on the other hand, do it all the time.

You're in a fight when you're dealing with a debt collector. It's an adversarial relationship. As a rule, no one in that industry should ever be given electronic access to any of your accounts. There may be a few decent debt collection companies out there, but many of them will lie, cheat, and steal to get your money.

I hope that clears things up, Ashley.

Large Midwest energy project turns to ex-Missouri governor

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — Stymied by state regulators, a renewable energy company seeking to build one of the nation's longest power lines across a large swath of the Midwest has turned to a prominent politician in an attempt to revive its \$2.3 billion project.

Former Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon, now working as a private attorney after recently finishing 30 years in public office, is to argue Tuesday to the Missouri Supreme Court that utility regulators he appointed wrongly rejected the power line while relying on an incorrect court ruling written by a judge whom Nixon also appointed.

Should Nixon prevail in court, it could help clear a path for Houston-based Clean Line Energy Partners LLC to build a 780-mile, high-voltage transmission line from the wind farms of western Kansas across Missouri and Illinois to Indiana, where it would feed into a power grid serving eastern states. Missouri had been the lone state blocking the project, until an Illinois appeals court in March also overturned that state's approval.

"I think it's a great opportunity for our state and an important one policy-wise" for the nation, Nixon said in an interview with The Associated Press.

The power line, known as the Grain Belt Express, has come to symbolize one of the largest challenges for renewable energy developers in the U.S. Although converting wind into electricity is increasingly affordable, it can be hard to get the regulatory and legal approval needed to transmit the power from remote areas where it's produced to the places where it's most needed.

Clean Line has been working on

its proposed directcurrent power line since 2010 but still hasn't been able to begin construction.

The Missouri Public Service Commission rejected the project in July 2015 while determining it had little benefit for Missouri consumers and citing the burden on landowners in its path. Clean Line then agreed to sell power to coalition of Missouri municipal utilities. It won Nixon's endorsement in June 2016 after the Democratic governor

said the company agreed to his request to add more landowner protections.

Clean Line reapplied but got denied again by Missouri regulatory commissioners last August. This time they said that while Clean Line's project was worthy, it first needed approval from all counties where it planned to string power lines across roads. The commission cited a western district state appeals court ruling in an unrelated case.

That's when Clean Line turned to Nixon, a former state attorney general whose term as governor ended in January 2017.

Nixon was hired because he had "a strong working knowledge of the project" and the Dowd Bennett law firm where he now works has "extensive appellate experience," Mark Lawlor, Clean Line's vice president of development, said in an email.

Nixon won the first round in court, when an eastern district state appeals court ruled in February that commissioners were wrong about local

pre-approval being necessary.

The judicial panel transferred the case to the state's highest court for a final determination. When Nixon steps into the

Missouri Supreme Court, he said it will mark his first arguments there in more than 15 years. He's been preparing by holding mock court sessions in front of attorneys who have grilled him with questions. He also enlisted the aid of longtime colleague James Layton, the state's former solicitor general who argued 92 cases before the state Supreme Court over a two-decade career.

Two of Missouri's seven Supreme Court judges were appointed by Nixon, including one who previously worked for him in both the governor's and attorney general's offices. But Nixon said he expects no favoritism and sees no potential conflict of interest.

"I don't think anything says that after you've been governor, if you happen to be there for a while, that you should be limited in your ability to aggressively represent the clients that you so desire," Nixon said.



Ousted Shulkin rejects claim he resigned VA job

WASHINGTON — Former Veterans Affairs Secretary David Shulkin is making it clear he was fired from his job amid conflicting claims from the White House.

White House spokeswoman Lindsay Walters on Sunday told The Associated Press that Shulkin had "resigned" from his job when President Donald Trump abruptly announced via Twitter last Wednesday that he was nominating White House doctor Ronny Jackson to replace him.

But in television interviews, Shulkin said he had not submitted a resignation letter, or planned to, and was only told of Trump's decision shortly before the Twitter announcement. He said he had spoken to Trump by phone earlier that day about VA improvements, with no mention of his job status, and was scheduled to meet with the president the next morning.

"I came to run the Department of Veterans Affairs because I'm committed to veterans," Shulkin said. "And I would not resign, because I'm committed to making sure this job was seen through to the very end."

The semantics could be relevant to Trump's ability to name an acting VA secretary to temporarily fill Shulkin's place. Last week, Trump named Defense Department official Robert Wilkie to the acting position, bypassing Shulkin's deputy secretary, Tom Bowman. Bowman has come under criticism for being too moderate to push Trump's agenda. Under federal law,

a president has wide authority to temporarily fill a federal agency job if someone "dies, resigns, or is otherwise unable to perform the functions and duties of the office." There is no mention of a president having that authority if the person is fired. Still, it's unclear if courts would seek to draw a legal distinction between a firing and a forced resignation, if that is indeed what happened to Shulkin.

The day after announcing that he was replacing Shulkin, Trump told a rally in Richfield, Ohio, that he had been dissatisfied with efforts to improve VA. Shulkin had enjoyed Trump's support for much of his first year in the administration, but that eroded in February after a bruising ethics scandal and political infighting at VA.

A VA spokesman did not have immediate comment Sunday. Wilkie, now listed on the VA website as acting secretary, took over Shulkin's duties last week.

The back and forth over the circumstances behind Shulkin's departure — and what it could mean for Wilkie's status — comes as the nomination of Jackson is drawing concern among lawmakers and veterans groups. They worry the Navy rear admiral and lifelong physician lacks the experience to manage an enormous agency paralyzed over Trump's

push to expand private care.

Trump's new Cabinet nominees also are beginning to pile up in the Senate, likely leading to weeks of confirmation battles and other delays in the run-up to congressional midterm elections in November. That could mean an extended reign for an acting VA secretary.

On Sunday, Shulkin, who had previously recommended Jackson to be VA undersecretary of health, repeatedly demurred when asked to fully endorse Jackson for the job of VA secretary. He noted the complexity of running the government's second largest department.

"This is a yeary tough

"This is a very tough job," Shulkin said. "I'm not sure that anybody realizes how complex this is ... I think he is going to need to have a good team around him, like everybody will, to be successful."

Shulkin's dismissal comes amid a broader shakeup of top Trump administration officials and charges of excessive spending by Cabinet officials.

Also currently under fire are Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Scott Pruitt, Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke and Housing and Urban Development Secretary Ben Carson.

The AP reported last week that Pruitt paid just \$50 a night for about six months last year to stay in a Capitol Hill condominium linked to a prominent Washington lobbyist whose firm represents fossil fuel companies.

On Sunday, former New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, a Republican, and Sen. Doug Jones, D-Ala., questioned whether Pruitt would be able to last in his job.

"I don't know how you survive this one, and if he has to go, it's because he never should've been there in the first place," Christie said.

"He's in real trouble ...
I think it seems that he may be on his way out,"
Jones said.

Shulkin spoke on CNN's "State of the Union" and NBC's "Meet the Press," and Jones and Christie appeared on ABC's "This Week."

New advance directive would let dementia patients refuse food

Treading into ethically

and legally uncertain territory, a New York end-of-life agency has approved a new document that lets people stipulate in advance that they don't want food or water if they develop severe dementia.

The directive, finalized in March by the board for End of Life Choices New York, aims to provide patients a way to hasten death in late-stage dementia, if they choose.

Dementia is a terminal illness, but even in the seven U.S. jurisdictions that allow medical aid-in-dying, it's not a condition covered by the laws. Increasingly, patients are seeking other options, said Dr. Timothy Quill, a palliative care expert at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and longtime advocate of the practice.

"Developing incapacitating dementia is certainly my and a lot of people's worst nightmare," he said. "This is an aggressive document. It's a way of addressing a real problem, which is the prospect of advanced dementia."

The document offers two options: one that requests "comfort feeding" — providing oral food and water if a patient appears to enjoy or allows it during the final stages of the disease — and one that would halt all assisted eating and drinking, even if a patient seems willing to accept it.

Supporters say it's the strongest effort to date to allow people who want to avoid the ravages of advanced dementia to make their final wishes known — while they still have the ability to do so.

"They do not want their dying prolonged," said Judith Schwarz, who drafted the document as clinical director for the advocacy group.
"This is an informed and thoughtful choice that needs a great deal of reflection and discussion."
But critics say it's a

disturbing effort to allow withdrawal of basic sustenance from the most vulnerable in society.

"I think oral feeding is basic care," said Richard Doerflinger, an associate scholar with the Charlotte Lozier Institute, which opposes abortion and euthanasia. "It's what they want here and now that matters. If they start taking food, you give them food."

Advance directives are legally recognized documents that specify care if a person is incapacitated. They can confirm that a patient doesn't want to be resuscitated or kept on life support, such as a ventilator or feeding tube, if they have a terminal condition from which they're not likely to recover.

However, the documents typically say nothing about withdrawing hand-feeding of food or fluids.

The New York directive, in contrast, offers option A, which allows refusal of all oral assisted feeding. Option B permits comfort-focused feeding.

Both options would be invoked only when a patient is diagnosed with moderate or severe dementia, defined as Stages 6 or 7 of a widely used test known as the Functional Assessment Staging Tool (FAST). At those stages, patients would be unable to feed themselves or make health care decisions.

The new form goes further than a similar dementia directive introduced last year by another group that supports aid-in-dying, End of Life Washington. That document says that a person with dementia who accepts food or drink should receive oral nourishment until he or she is unwilling or unable to do so.

The New York document says, "My instructions are that I do NOT want to be fed by hand even if I appear to cooperate in being fed by opening my mouth."

Whether the new directive will be honored in New York — or

anywhere else — is unclear. Legal scholars and ethicists say directives withdrawing oral assisted feeding are prohibited in several states. Many care facilities are unlikely to cooperate, said Thaddeus Pope, director of the Health Law Institute at Hamline University in St. Paul, Minn., and an expert on end-of-life law. Doctors have a duty to honor patient wishes, but they can refuse if they have medical or moral qualms.

"Even solidly legal advance directives do not and cannot ENSURE that wishes are respected," Pope said in an email. "They can only 'help assure' that."

Directors at End of Life Choices New York consider the document "legally sturdy," Schwarz said, adding: "Of course it's going to end up in court."

Whether assisted feeding can be withdrawn was at the center of recent high-profile cases in which patients with dementia were spoon-fed against their documented wishes because they continued to open their mouths. In a case in Canada, a court ruled that such feeding is basic care that can't be withdrawn.

People who fill out the directives may be more likely to have them honored if they remain at home, Schwarz said. She stressed that patients should make their wishes known far in advance and choose health care agents who will be strong advocates. Legal experts say the documents should be updated regularly.

Doerflinger, however, said creating the directive and making it available misses a crucial point: People who don't have dementia now can't know how they'll feel later, yet they're deciding in advance to forgo nourishment.

"The question is: Do we, the able-bodied, have a right to discriminate against the disabled people we will later become?" Doerflinger said.

Frank Stallone sorry for profane tweet on school shooting

Mostly known for being the brother of Sylvester Stallone, the actor and musician backed away from a Saturday tweet attacking teenager David Hogg. Hogg has become a powerful voice for gun control after the attack at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High in Parkland, Florida.

Larry Nassar victim to speak at Harvard about forgiveness

Denhollander told police in 2016 that Nassar molested her when she was a 15-year-old gymnast. Dozens of other women later testified in court that Nassar had abused them too.

He pleaded guilty in November to molesting patients and possessing child pornography and was sentenced to spend the rest of his life in prison.

The event will be moderated by Harvard professor and developmental psychologist Nancy Hill.

vigil and protest Saturday night outside a sheriff's department office. It was the latest disruptive but mostly peaceful demonstration since Clark was killed.

Protesters have twice blocked fans from entering games involving the NBA's Sacramento Kings at a downtown

arena, but there were no signs of trouble amid a big police presence at a game Saturday night against the Golden State Warriors.

The Friday release of the private autopsy commissioned by Clark's family has prompted fresh outrage. Pathologist Dr. Bennet Omalu,

known for his study of a degenerative brain condition in football players, announced that Clark was hit by eight bullets — six in the back, one in the neck and one in the thigh — and took three to 10 minutes to die. Police waited about five minutes before rendering medical aid.

Omalu said the proposition that Clark was assailing the officers, meaning he was facing them, is "inconsistent with the prevailing forensic evidence." He said it was unclear if Clark would have survived had he gotten immediate medical attention.

Woman, nearing 98, is outliving her insurance

MILWAUKEE Lorraine Guenther and Thrivent Financial insurance company had a deal, or so she thought.

She would pay them a premium of \$500 a year for the rest of her life. And they would someday provide a death benefit of \$25,000 to cover her funeral and burial.

The universal life policy took effect in 1988 when Guenther was 67, and it came with a maturity date of February 2021 when she is 100.

But now, three years earlier than that, the company is telling this grandmother the cash value of her policy will dwindle away to nothing later this year, and the death benefit will be gone, too.

At age 97, she apparently has outlived her life insurance.

"In my words, they're penalizing me for living," she said.

Part of the issue is that the cost of insuring someone so old is chewing up all the cash value of the policy at a rate exceeding \$300 a month, double what it was three years ago. About 10 years ago, the policy had a value that hovered around \$10,000, but it's down to \$2,800 now and dropping fast.

Guenther contacted Thrivent recently and was put in touch with an agent who suggested that lowering the death benefit to \$10,000 would buy her some time with the policy, but not beyond next year. Guenther turns 98 in April.

"He said, 'The Lord has been good to you and has allowed you to live all these years."

"I'm very grateful. Thank you, mister," she replied. "But I still expected to get my money when I passed away so I could be buried."

Thrivent Financial used to be known as Aid Association for Lutherans. Guenther bought the policy through her church.

"The men would come to church and talk to us and we knew them as friends. The man who prepared it for us was a friend of my husband's," she said.

She lost touch with that agent. Guenther's husband, Harold, with whom she raised three sons in Wauwatosa, Wis., died in 2002.

Guenther's sons got involved, and soon letters were going between the family and Thrivent. Son Jim said he doesn't think anything illegal is going on, but rather a "built-in stick it to you."

The family filed a complaint with the Wisconsin commissioner of insurance, asking for a refund approaching \$20,000. They're awaiting a reply.

Spielberg's 'Ready Player One' tops holiday box office

LOS ANGELES — Steven Spielberg has found his way back to the top of the box office with the action-adventure "Ready Player One," while Tyler Perry has scored again with "Acrimony."

Studio estimates on Sunday say Spielberg's virtual reality-focused film earned a solid \$53.2 million in its first four days in theaters from 4,234 locations since opening Wednesday night, with \$41.2 million of that coming from the three-day weekend.

Not adjusted for inflation, it's Spielberg's best opening in a decade following "Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull," which launched with \$100.1 million in 2008. Aside from "The BFG," Spielberg has lately favored smaller historical dramas instead of the big-scale blockbusters of his

heyday. **Based on Ernest** Cline's popular novel and chalk full of references to 1980s pop culture, including some nods to Spielberg's own films, "Ready Player One" is a return to the popcorn filmmaking that he became known for. With that includes a reportedly hefty \$175 million price tag, which does not account for marketing costs.

Audiences gave the film an A- CinemaScore, and reviews have been warm, too (it's sitting at a 76 percent on Rotten Tomatoes). Those who turned out this weekend were mostly male (59 percent) and over the age of 25 (56 percent).

"It's great to be in the Steven Spielberg business," said Jeff Goldstein, Warner Bros.' president of domestic distribution. "We always believed that this movie itself would carry the day and that's really what happened. We've seen all around the globe that the word of mouth is really propelling it."

Goldstein said while advance ticket sales were solid, the walk-up business was particularly robust on Friday and Saturday.

Internationally, the film exceeded the studio's expectations with \$128 million from 62 territories, including \$61.7 million from China (the biggest-ever opening in the country for Warner Bros.). Globally it grossed \$181.2 million

Vitamin E is no miracle cure for women and hot flashes

DEAR DR. ROACH: There is a very easy cure for hot flashes and it works! Take 400 units of vitamin E twice a day. The flashes will disappear in three days. This has worked for countless women for years. Why don't doctors know about this? — S.P.B.

ANSWER: Researchers have evaluated vitamin E for the treatment of hot flashes. One study found that vitamin E reduced hot flashes by about 25 percent, but an identical pill with no vitamin E reduced hot flashes by 22 percent.

Another study showed that women had five hot flashes a day on placebo, and 3.2 a day on vitamin F

On the basis of this, I can't recommend vitamin E as a very effective treatment. However, it is safe and is at least partially effective for some women.

DEAR DR. ROACH: A recent column discussed female pattern hair loss. I experienced hair loss similar to what this woman described. I am 65, and the receding hairline and loss of crown

hair started when I was 60. I asked every doctor I went to (including a dermatologist, an internist and a gynecologist) why my hair was thinning so significantly.

All of them said that at my age, it could be expected. All of my bloodwork was good — no low thyroid.

In September 2017, a new dermatologist asked if my hormone levels had been checked (they had not), because it looked like male pattern hair loss. My testosterone levels were off-the-charts high. She sent me back to my gynecolo-

gist, who did a pelvic ultrasound, which led to an MRI, which showed that I had a small cyst on my right ovary (one that he had not been able to feel). He said it may be a very rare cyst that was secreting testosterone.

In January, my ovaries were removed, and testing of the cyst showed that it was a Sertoli-Leydig cancer that was contained in the

I thought it might be helpful to remind women with significant hair loss to have their hormones checked as a possible cause. If this had not been done for me, this cyst would not have been detected until it was much larger and the cancer more advanced.

As you can imagine, I am very grateful to my new dermatologist for taking the initiative in helping me get properly diagnosed. I am hopeful that my hair will grow back, but if not, that's fine. I am happy to be cancer-free! — Anon.

ANSWER: I am glad that you were diagnosed and treated in time. It is unfortunate to hear that

your diagnosis was delayed. Female pattern hair loss is an overall thinning of hair along the midline of the scalp, whereas male pattern is a receding hairline and thinning along the crown.

However, some people have a pattern that is difficult to type, and it is important to check for other signs of high testosterone. Growth of body hair, acne and a deeper voice all are indicative of excess testosterone in women.

If it's unclear which type, a simple blood test is potentially lifesaving.

Anger surges after Siberian mall fire kills 64

KEMEROVO, Russia — Trapped inside a movie theater at a burning shopping center, 11-year-old Vika Pochankina's made a panicked phone call to her aunt and delivered her last words: "I'm suffocating. Tell Mama that I loved her.'

Yevgenia Pochankina told her niece to cover her nose with her clothes to fend off the smoke.

"After a moment, she disconnected," the aunt told The Associated Press.

The deaths of 64 people — including 41 children — in a Siberian shopping center fire on March 25 have tormented their loved ones not only with the memories of those they have lost but with deep dismay about the state of life in Russia.

The relatives — and many others in Russia – ask why the shopping center's emergency exits were locked, why the mall's fire alarms didn't sound, whether the center ever met building standards or if inspectors were bribed to turn a blind eye to deficiencies.

Living in Kemerovo, a Siberian city 1,900 miles east of Moscow, they are hurt and angry over what they see as official callousness after the fire. The regional governor didn't visit the scene, President Vladimir Putin didn't

declare a national day of mourning until two days after the fire, and officials have dismissed their protests over the blaze as political opportunism.

"This tragedy reflects all of Russia's problems — the corruption of officials who closed their eyes to problems with fire safety, uncoordinated work of the special services, the imperviousness of authorities," said Rasim Yaraliyev, head of a citizen's group pressing for answers about

Vika was one of six schoolchildren from the village of Treshchevsky who had traveled 30 miles that day to Kemerovo, a trip rewarding them for being good students. As they sat in the theater watching an animated film, a fire broke out in the four-story Winter Cherry mall.

Vika and her classmates were among the dead. Teacher Oksana Yevseyeva, the trip's chaperone, had left the children to watch the movie themselves in the theater while she did some shopping. She was on the first floor when the fire broke out above.

"I begged the guards to give me a mask and let me in to the children when the fire started, but they said there is smoke everywhere, you will just die," she said.

Igor Vostrikov, whose wife, three daughters and a sister died in the fire, told the AP that investigators had let him see him CCTV footage from outside the movie theater, showing that the entrance doors to the room where they died were locked by a man who possibly was trying to keep the smoke out until a rescue team

On Saturday, he posted a video apparently showing a woman opening the door to that room as smoke began filling the multiplex's hallway but she apparently says nothing. The video showed people fleeing other rooms.

Six people have been arrested in the case, including the head of the regional construction inspection agency when the shopping center was developed in a former candy factory, and the general director of the company that owns the

"They're not telling us the truth. Judging by everything, nobody saved the children, they closed them off and abandoned them," said Olga Begeza, whose daughter Diana wanted to go on the trip but couldn't because her mother didn't have the 400 rubles (\$7) to pay for it.

"It seems that our lives don't count for anything. That's the only thing my

Complaints about official corruption and incompetence are widespread in Russia, and in Kemerovo they are aggravated by what's seen as an insensitive response from officials.

Although Putin visited Kemerovo on Tuesday, he did not speak to a large gathering of demonstrators demanding answers, protesting corruption and calling for regional officials' ouster.

Deputy regional governor Sergei Tsivilyov did show up but incurred the crowd's anger when he dismissed as "a PR stunt" concerns that the death toll was far higher

In a meeting with Putin, regional governor Aman Tuleyev added to the anger by blaming ""the opposition" and "local busybodies" for fomenting the 10-hour protest.

Tuleyev's resignation, after more than 20 years in the post, was announced Sunday by the Kremlin. Tsivilyov is now the acting governor.

In the days after the fire, tens of thousands of people in Moscow, St. Petersburg and other cities have streamed to makeshift memorials to the fire victims, bringing flowers and stuffed toys. Officials appear concerned that

dismay over the fire could encourage protests that could undermine Putin's mandate just weeks after he won election to a fourth

Andrei Klimov, head of the committee for defense of state sovereignty in the upper house of parliament, warned that such protests could be exploited by Western countries that want to weaken Russia, echoing the frequent contention that the West is inherently "Russophobic."

'With every protest, they try to transfer it into the political plane — an example of this is the situation in Kemerovo," he said Friday.

Israel rejects calls for inquiry into Gaza violence

ASSOCIATED PRESS JERUSALEM — Israel's

defense minister on Sunday rejected international calls for an investigation into deadly violence along Gaza's border with Israel, saying troops acted appropriately and fired only at Palestinian protesters who posed a threat.

Fifteen Palestinians were killed and over 700 wounded in Friday's violence near the Israeli border, according to Palestinian health officials. It was the area's deadliest violence since a war four years ago.

Human rights groups have accused the army of using excessive force, and both the U.N. secretary-general and the European Union's foreign policy chief have urged an investigation.

In an interview, Defense Minister Avigdor Lieberman said Israel would not cooperate with a U.N. inquiry if there were one.

"From the standpoint of the Israeli soldiers, they did what had to be done,' Lieberman told Israeli Army Radio. "I think that all of our troops deserve a commendation, and there won't be any inquiry."

Friday's mass marches were largely led by Gaza's ruling Hamas group and touted as the launch of a six-week-long protest campaign against a stifling decade-old blockade of the territory. Israel and Egypt have maintained the blockade since Hamas, an Islamic militant group sworn to Israel's destruction, seized control of Gaza in

In Friday's confrontations, large crowds gathered near the fence, with smaller groups of protesters rushing forward, throwing stones and burning tires.

Israeli troops responded with live fire and rubber-coated steel pellets, while drones dropped tear gas from above. Soldiers with rifles were perched on high earthen embankments overlooking the scene.

Protests have continued since Friday but at a far smaller scale. On Sunday, one person was seriously wounded by gunfire, Palestinian medical officials said.

The military has said it responded only to violent attacks aimed at troops and the border fence. But video from the scene showed at least a handful of incidents in which people appear to have been shot either far from the border or while they were not actively rioting.

The Israeli military accused Hamas of releasing videos that were either incomplete, edited or "completely fabricated." It said troops had followed strict rules of engagement, and that protesters were putting themselves in "harm's way" by operating in a dangerous area.

In the interview, Lieberman said those who protested peacefully were not harmed, saying claims that peaceful protesters were harmed were "lies and inventions."

"Whoever didn't get close to the fence was not shot," he said.

Tamar Zandberg, leader of the dovish opposition party Meretz, posted a video over the weekend calling for an independent inquiry into Friday's violence.

"I'm worried about the fate of all of us, and the fate of the residents of

the Gaza periphery communities, who could be sitting in bomb shelters today, tomorrow or next week," she told Army Radio, "so I'm calling to stop this now."

Zandberg came under heavy criticism for her comments. "As if this were a case of innocent civilians who had been shot while doing their holiday shopping, rather than people who had been pushed to the border by Hamas in order to be killed in service to the Palestinian narrative." wrote defense analyst Alon Ben-David.

The Israeli military has said those killed by troops were men who were involved in violence and who belonged to Hamas and other militant factions. The army later released the names and ages of 10 of the dead, including what it said were eight members of Hamas and two from other militant groups.

Israel has also accused Gaza health officials of exaggerating the number of wounded.

Four of the 15 dead were members of the Hamas military wing, Hamas said Saturday. The group said a fifth member who was not on the Health Ministry list was killed near the border, and that Israel has the body. It said another man is also missing in the border

The protests are to culminate in a large border march on May 15, the 70th anniversary of Israel's founding. The date is mourned by Palestinians as their "nakba," or catastrophe, when hundreds of thousands were uprooted in the 1948 Mideast war over Israel's creation.

Two-day strike by French workers to disrupt train service

PARIS (AP) — France's national train company is warning that a workers' strike will disrupt train service within France and elsewhere in Europe on Tuesday and Wednesday.

SNCF said in a statement on Sunday that only 15 percent of high-speed trains and 25 percent of regional trains would be running on April 3-4 due to the strike.

The company says one in three trains between France and Germany and 75 percent of Eurostar trains between Paris and London will be operating.

Four labor unions have called on rail workers to strike for two days every week until the end of June.

They are protesting a government plan to prepare SNCF before the service is opened to competition and to end some worker benefits.

Thalys trains between France, Belgium and the Netherlands should be running normally.

Mexican frontrunner, ruling party candidate start campaigns

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Front-running candidate Andres Manuel Lopez Obrado has opened his campaign for the July 1 presidential election in Ciudad Juarez, the border city that launched some of Mexico's key resistance struggles.

Lopez Obrador depicts his third run at the presidency as a historic battle against corruption and entrenched elites, on a par with the resistance to the French invasion of 1862-1867 and the 1910-1917 revolution. Ciudad Juarez served as a base in both.

Ruling party candidate Jose Antonio Meade launched his campaign Sunday in the colonial city of Merida, the capital of a state his Institutional Revolutionary Party hopes to retain, with nine governorships at stake.

Meade is third in the polls. He alluded to Lopez Obrador, saying, "Don't let them take away the future of our children with false promises."

7 police die trying to quell prison riot in Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Authorities in eastern Mexico say seven police officers have died while trying to quell a prison riot.

The Veracruz state government says the officers entered the La Toma prison in the mountain town of Amatlan de los Reyes to restore order and move some dangerous inmates on Sunday.

It says inmates apparently set fire to some mattresses, and the smoke may have killed the officers. Investigators are trying to confirm the cause of death.

Lawyer: **Ex-Guatemala** dictator Efrain **Rios Montt dies** at 91

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) — A lawyer for former Guatemalan dictator Efrain Rios Montt says the ex-leader has died at age 91.

Lawyer Jaime Hernandez says the cause of death was a

heart attack on Sunday. Rios Montt seized power in a 1982 coup and presided over one of the bloodiest periods of Guatemala's civil war as soldiers waged a scorched-earth campaign to root out Marxist guerrillas.

Rios Montt was

convicted in 2013 of genocide and crimes against humanity for the massacre of 1,771 indigenous Ixil Mayans by security forces under his command.

But the ruling was swiftly set aside and a new trial ordered, dismaying human rights activists and victims who long sought to see him punished for atrocities during his 17-month regime.

He is survived by his daughter Zury Rios.

Egypt media body fines newspaper over election coverage

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt's media regulatory body has fined an Egyptian newspaper 150,000 Egyptian pounds (\$8,527.5) and called for an investigation over a front-page report it published saying the state rallied voters to participate in the presidential election.

Sunday's decision by the Supreme Council for Media Regulation says it has called for an investigation into Al Masry Al Youm by the Press Syndicate, naming its chief and news editors specifically, and demanded that the daily issue an apology to the National Election Authority.

Pro-government media and the state's regulatory bodies have largely criticized foreign media's coverage of the election.

Since 2017, Egyptian authorities have blocked some 500 websites including those of independent media and rights groups. Several local reporters have also been jailed, and a British iournalist was expelled in February.

Palat pulled the Lightning within a goal at 7:32 as he was open in the slot to take a pass from Stralman and fired a shot from between the circles for his 10th.



Isner earns biggest win, beating Zverev in Miami Open final

KEY BISCAYNE -John Isner punctuated his unexpected run to the Miami Open title with a surprising display of agility, dancing across the court while basking in a breakthrough.

The 6-foot-10 Isner looked twice as tall skipping about with a grin brighter than the Florida sunshine. He had just won the biggest title of his 14-year career,

holding every service game and rallying past Alexander Zverev 6-7 (4), 6-4, 6-4 on Sunday.

Isner, who turns 33 this month, previously had been 0-3 in ATP Masters 1000 finals.

"You can't replicate moments like this," Isner said during the trophy ceremony. "I'm toward the latter part of my career; this is the best moment of my career."

Isner's win came in the last singles match on Key Biscayne before the

Miami Open moves next year to the NFL Dolphins' stadium.

Seeded 14th, Isner became the first American man to win the tournament since Andy Roddick in 2010. Isner joined Sloane Stephens , who won the women's title Saturday, for the first U.S. sweep in the event since 2004, when the champions were Roddick and Serena Williams.

The start of the last game was delayed by the crowd's chants of "U-S-A!" Isner then held at love, and on the final three points he smacked aces, giving him 18 for the match and 79 for the tournament.

"I was just ready for this moment," he said. "I've been here three other times, and I've lost three times on this stage. I was just ready for it."

Isner is best known as tennis' marathon man thanks to his 70-68



Markkanen, hot-shooting Bulls top playoff-bound Wizards

CHICAGO - Rookie Lauri Markkanen scored 23 points and connected on 5 of 83-pointers to lead the Chicago Bulls to a 113-94 win over the Washington Wizards on Sunday.

Bobby Portis had 18 points and hit 4 of 5 from long range, and Sean Kilpatrick added 14 points. Chicago shot 52.4 percent overall from the floor and was 18-for-34 on 3s matching its season high - as Bulls head coach Fred Hoiberg missed the game with an upperrespiratory infection.

Hoiberg returned home before tipoff, leaving associate head coach Jim Boylen to direct Chicago to its second straight win following a seven-game

Otto Porter Jr. led the Wizards with 17 points as five-time All-Star John Wall rested. Bradley Beal scored 15 points and reserve Mike Scott added

Wall remained on the bench against Chicago after playing 33 minutes in his first game in over two months on Saturday. The slick point guard had 15 points and 14 assists in the Wizards' playoffclinching 107-93 win over Charlotte.

Before Saturday, Wall had last played on Jan. 25, six days before he underwent left knee surgery. The Wizards went 15-12 during his absence.

The Bulls opened a 15-point lead late in the first quarter before Washington finished the frame with a 6-0 run to cut it to 36-27. Chicago shot 60.9 percent in the quarter and connected on 8 of 11 3-point attempts, with Markkanen and Portis each sinking three from long range.

Chicago led 68-59 at the half.

Getting a lift from Scott and others off their bench. the Wizards trimmed the Bulls' lead to four points three times in the second quarter.

But Chicago kept connecting. The Bulls upped their field-goal percentage to 64.3 and went 11-for-17 on 3s in the first half. Markkanen led with 15 points and four 3-pointers at the break.

The Bulls cooled down in the second half. But Chicago effectively

The Rockets were without injured Chris Paul and the Spurs were without Kawhi Leonard, who has played in only nine games this season.

PACERS 111, CLIPPERS 104: Victor Oladipo scored 30

points, Myles Turner added 24 and the Indiana Pacers rallied to beat the Los Angeles Clippers for their fifth straight victory. Oladipo shot 11 of 17 from the field and had 12 assists for the playoff-bound Pacers, who have won four in a row over the Clippers. Neither team led by more than seven points in the fourth quarter, when the Pacers scored on nearly every possession over the last five minutes. They've won 12 of their last 16. Tobias Harris led the Clippers with 21 points, Lou Williams added 20 and Montrezl Harrell had 19 off the bench. Austin Rivers scored 18 and DeAndre Jordan grabbed 12 rebounds.

76ERS 119, HORNETS 102: Ben Simmons had 20 points and 15 assists as Philadelphia kept up its passing prowess, beating the Charlotte

Hornets. The Sixers set a team record with its ninth straight game of 30 or more assists - they had 36 on their 48 baskets. Former Hornet Marco Belinelli scored 22 points off the bench and J.J. 

Poulter delivers to win Houston Open

HUMBLE, Texas -Ian Poulter delivered another big moment Sunday, this one for himself.

Down to his last putt, Poulter made a 20-foot birdie on the 18th hole to force a playoff with Beau Hossler, and then he won the Houston Open with a par on the first extra hole to earn the last spot in the Masters.

One week after Poulter was mistakenly told he had locked up a spot at Augusta National through the world ranking, he left no doubt by winning with a clutch moment reminiscent of his Ryder Cup heroics from Medinah in 2012.

"I had to dig deep today," said Poulter, who closed with a 5-under 67.

Hossler, who also shot 67, overcame a three-shot deficit with four straight birdies on the back nine. He had a chance to win on the 18th in regulation with a 30-foot birdie putt that trickled over the right edge of the cup.

That set the stage for Poulter, and the

42-year-old from England lived up to his nickname as "The Postman" by delivering his biggest putt in years. Poulter pounded his chest five times when the putt dropped, and all Hossler could do was smile.

"I did think I'd made it," Hossler said, "but it hung out there. Ian basically had the same putt and there's no way he was going to miss it after watching my ball. I gave Ian the perfect read (for him) to make his putt. I knew he was going

to make it."

In the sudden-death playoff on the 18th, one of the more daunting finishing holes off the tee with water down the left side and a bunker to the right, Hossler found the bunker for the second time. He hit into a greenside bunker, and his third shot caught way too much ball and went over the green and into the water.

Poulter was safely on the green as Hossler took his penalty drop, chipped onto the green and took

two putts for a triple bogey.

They finished at 19-under 269.

Poulter won for the third time on the PGA Tour, and his first in America since the Match Play in 2010 at Arizona. This was his first stroke-play victory in America, and the timing could not have been better.

When he reached the quarterfinals of the Dell Technologies Match Play last weekend in Austin, he was told that it was enough to get him into the top 50 in the world ranking by the end of the weekend, the cutoff for qualifying for the Masters.

It turned out he needed to win his quarterfinal match, and Poulter was informed of the mistake before he teed off. Kevin Kisner beat him, 8 and 6.

Poulter was so disappointed that he contemplated not even going to Houston, and when he opened with a 73 in a first round of low scoring, he packed his bags and prepared to go home to Florida the next day. Instead, he bounced back with a 64, and shot 65-67

on the weekend.

"Last week was painful," he said. "To come here this week, I was tired. I was frustrated on Thursday.... I was patient. I waited my time. And this is amazing."

It was his first victory since the HSBC Champions, a World Golf Championship event at Mission Hills in China in 2012. That was a month after Poulter led Europe to a stunning turnaround in the Ryder Cup by making five straight birdies to win a fourballs match and give Europe momentum to overcome a four-point deficit.

Along with going to the Masters, Poulter cracks the top 30 in the world and now is in good shape to be eligible for the rest of the majors. He also has a two-year exemption, critical because he nearly lost his card a year ago until he was spared by a clerical error by the tour.

"The journey continues. I've had 19 good years on tour and I guess I've got another couple coming," Poulter said. "I think I've got some good golf left in me. I think I proved it this week. So there's life in the old dog yet."

Hossler did everything right until the playoff. His four straight birdies included a 30-footer on the par-3 14th to tie for the lead, and a wedge that settled 4 feet below the hole that gave him the lead with three to play.

"I said yesterday I wanted to beat these guys at their best and I think I saw Ian's best today," Hossler said. "It's a bummer, but I'm very proud of the way I played."

Jordan Spieth closed with a 66 and tied for third with Emiliano Grillo (68), giving Spieth momentum for the Masters. It was Spieth's best finish against a full field since he tied for second in the Dell Technologies Championship outside Boston in September.

"Goal accomplished for the week," Spieth said. "I've made some big strides from my last couple tournaments. I'm very excited for what next week holds."

Garcia makes Sunday arrival at Augusta a day for family

AUGUSTA, Ga. -Sergio Garcia peeled back the blanket and leaned over for another peek at his 3-week-old daughter, sound asleep against her mother's chest. As his wife chatted with friends, he walked back over to take a purse that dangled from her arm, and then a shopping bag at her feet.

He was much a doting father and husband as he was the Masters champion, and that was only itting Sunday

The mood is light the day before Masters week officially begins. It feels more like a day of family and celebration, enhanced by the 60 children moving out from the driving range to the chipping area to the 18th green for the Drive, Chip and Putt competition that has become a tradition since

it began five years ago. Garcia was a big part of that, too.

He became the first defending champion to attend the reception Saturday night. One girl was asked for her best Garcia impersonation from his victory last year, and she crouched, clenched her fists and pumped both arms. According to those in attendance, Garcia came on stage and showed the real thing.

Garcia later went out for a practice round with his father, Victor, but not before a big Spanish celebration.

fifth-set victory over Nicolas Mahut at Wimbledon in 2010. He possesses perhaps the game's biggest serve but has never reached a Grand Slam semifinal, largely because a lack of mobility makes it difficult for him to stay in

bel level still higher.

Isner's serve allowed him to overcome inconsistent returning, a succession of botched volleys and shaky play at crunch time. He converted only two of 12 break-point chances and lost his final three service points in the tiebreaker.

But he gave Zverev only three break-point

chances, and Isner's serve was at its best down the stretch. He made 83 percent of his first serves in the final

Meanwhile, baseline errors by Zverev mounted.

"I think I missed more shots today than I did in the whole tournament," the young German said. "I played bad from the baseline, but it's not easy against John. You always feel the pressure that if you get broken, you might lose the set."

Mindful of that small margin for error when he lost serve to fall behind 5-4 in the final set, Zverev let his frustration boil over. He slammed his racket to the concrete, picked it up and slammed it again, and then tossed it gently to the stands as a mangled souvenir.

When Isner sealed the victory four points later, he also tossed his racket - but in celebration. Then it was time to dance.
