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Punta Gorda woman evacuated from cruise

Despite harrowing experience, she would 'definitely' go again

When Barbara Wyatt took a cable car up a mountain in Norway, she thought it would be the most eventful part of her trip on the Viking Sky cruise trip. "I thought it was going to be the most exciting thing I would ever do," she said. "I had my eyes closed most of the time."

Wyatt, 80, of Punta Gorda, had booked the trip with her friend Helen Harrison, who lost her husband about a year ago. The two have been friends since 1962.

"She was visiting me, and she's at odds with what to do at home," Harrison said. "I said, 'Well, I'd like to go on a cruise.' And she said, 'Well, I'll go, too.'"

Most of the trip went as expected. They saw snow-topped mountains that looked like they were "covered with frosting," Wyatt said. They saw a green streak of the northern lights.

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Ride-sharing carries risks

'If it doesn't feel right, don't get into the car'

Local Uber driver Trish Poston's best advice for passengers' safety is short and to the point.

"If it doesn't feel right, don't get into the car," said Poston, a Rotonda West resident who has been an Uber driver for three years.

Ride-sharing services and passenger safety have jumped to the forefront this week with the death of Samantha Josephson, a 21-year-old University of South Carolina student who

reportedly hopped into the wrong vehicle, believing it was her Uber ride.

South Carolina authorities arrested and charged Nathaniel David Rowland, 24, with kidnapping and Josephson's murder.

Both riders and drivers need to use caution before a ride is initiated, say drivers and law enforcement. And first instincts can be the first line of defense.

"If someone looks out of place, I wouldn't get into the car," Poston said. She recommends passengers

contact Uber for another driver.

If you're already on the road, then ask the driver to pull over. If the driver doesn't pull over, dial 911.

Ridesharing services like Uber and Lyft have some built-in safeguards. They both screen drivers and check their driving records before allowing them to drive for the service. They encourage riders to give instant feedback about any problems they've encountered.

Mating season means more aggressive alligators

Gator attacks have been on the rise in our state, with the last two fatal attacks occurring during mating season

Along with the comfortable weather and April Fools' jokes, the first of April also marked the start of a more Florida-specific tradition: Alligator mating season.

From April 1 until June, Florida's estimated 1.3 million alligators will be more active, more visible and more aggressive as they mate, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

While the chances of being bitten in Florida are only 1 in 3.2 million, attacks have been on the rise in recent years.

Inside Science, a science news publication, wrote in August that gator bites in Florida have increased "from an average of just one every three years between 1988 and 1999 to about seven per year between 2000 and 2016." Statistics on the FWC's website suggest similar numbers, saying there has been an average of six unprovoked alligator bites per year over the last 10.

The reptiles mainly

choose their meals based on what they can find at a given time, which means they'll eat frogs, birds, turtles, fish, snakes, small mammals and even wild hogs.

Dogs and cats look like natural prey, so gators sometimes attack people's pets.

"Anything that's about the right size and the right opportunity is potential prey," said Marty Main, an expert in alligator behavior and program leader for natural resources at the University of Florida's

Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. "They can even go for adults if you find yourself in a compromising position."

Since 1988, there have been 18 fatal attacks on humans involving an alligator in Florida and two since 2016, according to the FWC.

The two most recent incidents occurred during mating season. Last June, a 47-year-old South Florida woman

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

was attacked and killed by a gator while she walked her dogs near a lake in Davie. Two mating season's prior, a 2-year-old boy was dragged into the water by an alligator near Disney's upscale Grand Floridian Resort & Spa and killed, grabbing national headlines.

"Alligators have inhabited Florida's marshes, swamps, rivers and lakes for many centuries, and are found in all 67 counties," the agency says on its website. "In recent years, Florida has experienced tremendous human population growth. Many residents

seek waterfront homes and increasingly participate in water-related activities. This can result in more frequent alligator-human interactions and a greater potential for conflict."

Scientists say the reason alligators become more visible and aggressive in mating season is due to the warmer weather, which increases the reptile's metabolism and desire to seek out prey. It also means you'll potentially see them basking in the sun more often as they regulate their body temperature.

In order to keep pets and residents safe, the agency released the following tips:

- Never feed an

alligator. It's illegal and causes alligators to overcome their natural wariness and learn to associate people with food.

- Keep your distance if you see one. Alligators may look lethargic but can move quickly.
- Swim only in designated swimming areas during daylight hours. Alligators are most active between dusk and dawn.
- Keep pets away from the water (at least 10 feet from the water's edge).

The FWC says it encourages anyone who believes a specific alligator poses a threat to people, pets or property to call the Nuisance Alligator Hotline at 866-392-4286. The organization said

that it receives an average of 15,000 nuisance alligator complaints annually. "FWC's response to

alligator bite incidents is to remove the alligator involved," agency spokesperson Karen Parker said

in August. "Every effort is made to ensure the responsible alligator has been removed."

They also provide riders with the make, model and color of the car, the license plate number, as well as the driver's name and photo — all factors that a rider can easily and quickly check before getting into a vehicle.

Two years ago, Randy Shockley drove for Uber and said passengers should pay close, very close attention to the detailed information relayed to them on their smart phones about their drivers and the vehicles they are driving. Also, the drivers should display their Uber or Lyft trademarked signs in the front windshield.

An Uber driver, Shockley said, will also know the name of the passenger to be picked up.

Uber frequently and randomly requires its drivers for updated photographs, Poston said, and have even called upon her to pull off the road and take a selfie.

Even driving locally, some situations can become awkward both for the passenger and driver,

UBER SAFETY TIPS FOR PASSENGERS

- Plan ahead. Before you request a ride, think about where you're headed and review the safety features in the app so you know how to use them.

- Request your ride inside. Avoid spending unnecessary time outside alone with your phone in your hand. Instead, wait indoors until the app shows your driver has arrived.

- Get in the right car. Before you get in the car, check that license plate, driver photo, and driver name all match what's listed in the app. Uber rides can only be requested through the app, so never get in a car with a driver who claims to be with Uber and offers a ride.

- Be a backseat rider. If you're riding alone, sit in the backseat. This ensures you can safely exit on either side of the vehicle to avoid moving traffic, and it gives you and your driver some personal space.

- Buckle up. The Centers for Disease Control reports that seatbelt use is the most effective way to save lives and reduce injuries related to car accidents.

- Share your trip details with a friend. While en route, tap "Share status" in the app to share your driver's name, photo, license plate, and location with a friend or family member. They can track your trip and see your ETA without downloading the Uber app.

- Protect your personal information. There's no need to share your phone number or other contact information with your driver. If a rider and driver need to contact each other, the Uber app automatically anonymizes both phone numbers to protect everyone's privacy.

- Follow your intuition. Trust your instincts and use your best judgement when riding with Uber. And if you ever feel you're in an emergency situation, call 911 immediately.

- Be kind and respectful. As outlined in our community guidelines, please respect your driver and his or her car.
- Give feedback on your trip. Your feedback helps us improve the Uber experience for everyone. Our 24/7 global support team reviews feedback and will follow up with appropriate action on any reports of conduct that violate our community guidelines.

suggested Melissa Irlandi, who has been an Uber driver for more than a year.

Her best advice is for those leaving a bar or club and who have been drinking: Leave with someone you know, or ask the establishment's staff for help.

Law enforcement advice

"Ride-sharing is growing more popular, but you

can never let your guard down," said Heather Turco with Lee County Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention division. "It is also concerning, because often people use them, because they have been drinking and they don't want to drive themselves. Often time we let our guard down, when we are tired, intoxicated or distracted (like using our phones)."

According to reports, a Lee County woman,

after patronizing a Fort Myers club, accused an Uber driver of assault two years ago. That same year, authorities arrested a 33-year-old Fort Myers man for sexually assaulting a female Florida Gulf Coast University student.

Lee and Charlotte sheriff's offices and other law enforcement's tips for passengers include:

- Never take a ride-share if you are alone and under the influence of alcohol.

"There's a fellow there that is interested in buying my boat and he asked us to bring it down to see if we fit in (the harbor)," he told the Sun. "It hasn't been sold yet but I do have a deposit on it."

Depending on the weather and the tides, Capt. Steve Siegel said they should ship out on Wednesday.

Until then, the massive yacht blocks almost the entire north end view of the

harbor from both Harpoon Harry's and Captain's Table, owned by Smuggler's Enterprises, creating a stir on social media.

"Move this tank to the (west) side (dock) where it belongs," wrote Judith Harris in a March 30 Facebook post. "Quit trying to hurt Smugglers."

"It is unfortunate that this huge yacht has been docked here and the view has been obstructed," wrote Anita Robbins Collins in a March 31 Facebook post.

"We don't like it," John Ruple, a patron at

Harpoon Harry's, told the Sun. "It blocks the view. It's a distraction ... especially at sunset. It's a deterrent for coming here (to Harry's)."

Peggy Ruple said she understand's Fishville's attempt to bring in new business, but they could have gone about it differently.

"We can appreciate them (Fishville) wanting to do new business but it could be somewhere else," Peggy said. "It's just too much here at Harry's."

The only place to dock the ship was the north

end of the Fishville pier, according to Burnam.

"It is docked on the north courtesy dock, as that is the only location available to accommodate the size and electrical needs of the vessel," Burnam said.

Smuggler's representatives refused to give any official statement on the yacht's docking.

This occurs amid a lawsuit between ATA Fishville, Fishville's parent company, and Smuggler's Enterprises over lease rates and other issues.

But on the final leg of the journey, they became two of 479 passengers evacuated by helicopter after the ship had engine trouble in the midst of a storm. The Associated Press reported five helicopters evacuated passengers amid wind gusts up to 38 knots, or 43 mph, and waves 26 feet high. Some other passengers and crew stayed on board as the weather grew calm.

On Saturday, March 23, a muster alarm, which is seven whistles, alerted the passengers to the danger. Wyatt went one way, while Harrison, who was reluctant to get up, went to a different muster station.

"She went to the theater where things were handed down," Wyatt said. "I went to the dining room where everything was flying around."

Everywhere, dishes were breaking, and one extra large wave broke the glass out of the door at the far end of the room, Wyatt said.

"Those people got washed down on the floor with tables and chairs on top of them," she said.

"They woke up in two or three feet of water and thought they were going back out to sea when the ship went the other way."

Wyatt experienced the rocking to a lesser degree where she was seated with around 15 other people.

"The ship went to the left and we all went to the left," she said. "I ran into a man who was seated on a wall on that side. He held out his hand and grabbed my hand (and said), 'We've got to stop meeting like this.' That's kind of the way it was. People were taking care of each other and not real panicked. There were some people in tears, they were so scared, but mostly people were just numb, waiting to be told what to do."

The water soon reached her side of the dining room, getting the passengers' feet wet, before they were evacuated to a dryer area in the atrium. Wyatt and Harrison were reunited when she spotted Harrison in a line of

people holding hands as they walked to get ready for the helicopter. They waited in the same group for the rescue.

People in wheelchairs were evacuated first, but as they were waiting, another wave hit, and they went sliding, wheelchairs all in a jumble on

the floor.

At Wyatt's turn, she said a rubber tube was placed around her, connected to a rope going up to the helicopter.

"We didn't see the helicopter and the rope hanging down and the heavy seas still going until we got out to go on, and

then they just moved us so fast, you didn't have a chance to turn around and back off," she said. "They said hold onto the rope, hold on tight, and about two seconds later jerked us into the air. I didn't see anything after that 'cause I had my eyes closed."

It was about a 10-minute ride to land, where Wyatt said her chest was hurting. Before the cruise, she had fallen and bruised the area, but officials, fearing a heart attack, quickly took action.

"They whisked me off to another room, and I got a shot of morphine," she said. "I don't remember anything after that until they were putting IVs in my arm at the hospital. That hurt enough that I woke up for a while. I had every test you can imagine, all in Norwegian, so I don't know what they were."

She was determined to be in good health, and she and Harrison were put up in a five star hotel before heading out to Oslo the next day and home soon after.

In Tampa, Wyatt's

daughter met her at the airport with a sign that said, "Welcome Viking Sky Survivor Barbara."

"They blew up balloons, and she met me in baggage there," Wyatt said. "It was fun."

Though it could have ended much worse, Wyatt said the whole thing was well-handled by Viking staff. Their belongings were all taken from the ship to the hotel, even a tiny necklace she'd left on board handed out cookies, sandwiches, and water throughout the period of waiting. For the people who stayed on board, they performed the final Beatles show on the last night.

Viking has already reimbursed her trip and offered another cruise, as well as invitation to join on the maiden voyage of the cruise line's newest ship, the Viking Venus, in 2021.

Wyatt, unfazed by the storm, said she'd happily go again. "I would definitely go again," she said. "I would go for sure, because it all turned out well."

Babcock in line for water/sewage plant loan

They are the only borrower tax-exempt bonds from Industrial Development Authority

Babcock Ranch is tapping into tax-exempt bonds for a future water and sewage plant.

The Charlotte County Industrial Development Authority last week unanimously approved a \$42 million bond to Town and Country Utilities. Charlotte County Commissioners will vote on the bond as well in April.

The authority had approved \$30 million in 2017 for this phase two project, and Babcock has three years to use the loan. Babcock is requesting an additional \$12 million, plus a re-vote as the three-year window is closing. Kitson and Partners representatives told the authority.

Back in 2011, the authority approved

\$26 million for a phase one plant to serve the first residents of Babcock, who ended up moving in early 2018. That first loan was renewed in 2014 as the giant project finally got under way.

A national economic recession stalled the beginning of Babcock around 10 years ago. Babcock is a planned development authorized to build up to 19,000 homes on about 18,000 acres in the county's undeveloped eastern region. Since phase one was completed, those neighborhoods have rapidly filled. Now it's time to prepare for the next phase, John Broderick of Kitson and Partners told the authority members.

"There's a lot of exciting things going on out there," he said, including the next subdivision with 1,000 lots and a golf

course.

A total of 2,000 lots have been sold or are under contract, he said. "We're already out of capacity based on lots." Babcock is scaled to become a community of 50,000 some day.

Erica Woods of Kitson told the authority that it will take 18 months to two years to build the facility, so they need to get the financing arranged now.

Ultimately, there could be up to six phases of utilities for Babcock, said Broderick.

Using tax-exempt bonds allows Babcock to get low-interest loans regulated by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service. Rates are low because investors don't pay federal income tax on the revenue they receive, according to municipal authority websites in Los

Angeles and the Midwest.

These bonds are typically available for industrial development in regions that need economic growth. For the Charlotte authority, Babcock is the only borrower, said authority member Rob Humpel.

"I'd like to say congratulations. Job well done. This is one of the reasons this board was developed," he said.

A privately owned manufacturing facility can only borrow \$20 million, however a nonprofit performing municipal function can borrow more. Town and Country Utilities is a nonprofit.

Babcock Village is located far from county utilities. Zoning created for Babcock requires the development to provide its own water and sewage processing. Babcock also generates much of its own electricity by partnering with Florida Power and Light to install two solar facilities.

Do better for all Florida foster children

The settlement agreement to end a federal lawsuit over inadequate foster care in South Florida should provide some essential protections for vulnerable children in two Florida counties.

But what about the other 65 counties, and especially those in the Tampa Bay area, where rising case loads and funding shortfalls are overwhelming the safety net? Florida needs to address the deficiencies in foster care statewide and provide local agencies the resources they need to adequately manage the child welfare system.

The Florida Department of Children and Families agreed to several conditions as part of a settlement to a federal class action lawsuit filed by the advocacy group Children's Rights, which accused the state of failing to provide adequate housing and care to foster children in Miami-Dade and Monroe counties.

As the Tampa Bay Times' Christopher O'Donnell reported, the department has agreed to no longer place children overnight in hotels or unlicensed offices, to stop squeezing more children into over-crowded foster homes and to keep children ages 6 and younger out of group homes staffed by shift workers. These are basic, common-sense protections, and it shouldn't have taken a lawsuit to wrangle them.


But the agreement applies only in these two counties. State officials said the agreement doesn't create different levels of care in Florida because the concessions align with federal and state targets that apply statewide. But the agreement will mean a difference in how foster care is monitored and what potential penalties DCF could face, at least in South Florida. The settlement also designates a child welfare expert to act as an independent monitor to oversee DCF's performance. If the department falls behind, advocates in Miami-Dade and Monroe can now call on a federal judge to demand corrective action.

Having the state acknowledge core problems within the system and a responsibility to correct them is — as advocates say — a significant step in the right direction. But DCF needs a statewide focus on addressing the shortage of foster beds and the numbers of children being bounced from home to home.

"The problems with inadequate placement are pervasive across the state," said Robin Rosenberg with the advocacy group Florida's Children First. A Tampa Bay Times analysis of foster records between 2000 and 2017 bears out that the revolving door in placements has been an age-old problem, hindering the ability of children to develop trust and form healthy relationships.

Florida is already working through statewide improvements in foster care that were required by the federal government in 2017. But the need is also acute in the Tampa Bay area, where resources for foster services have not kept pace with needs. Hillsborough County, for example, leads the state in the number of children in care, despite its No. 4 ranking in population. In the past three years, the bay area has seen double-digit increases in youths requiring out of home placement, yet the budget shortfall for serving these children has grown to \$11.5 million in the region this year.

It's encouraging that more attention and resources are being directed to South Florida. But problems exist in foster care across the state, and children in every corner of Florida deserve a similar response.

In an unexpected twist in the 2020 election season, even some white male Democrats are facing a newly evolved Court of Prior Offenses, which, apparently, can include being born white. If you were born of white privilege, you're in for a bake sale's worth of humble pie.

Plainly, we've crossed a Rubicon of sorts. In

this time and place, the emerging battle lines aren't just demographically defined but constitute a historical reckoning. It isn't enough that women and minorities ascend. No one reading this needs a lecture about colonialism, slavery, genocide or Jim Crow, to mention a few index items.

And, if so, are you sorry?

So, these two white guys walk into a bar, where Brenda Lee is on

the jukebox singing, "I'm Sorry." Not really, but Beto O'Rourke and Joe Biden have both begun apology tours that could become their undoing.

In a recent interview, O'Rourke acknowledged "the truth of the criticism" that he was born of privilege and, as a white male, had more opportunities than others. He already had apologized for writing prose as a teenager about running over children. He also apologized for making an offhand remark about sometimes helping his wife with their three children. Note to Beto: This will never end. Once you start apologizing, especially for things over which you had no control, you are more likely to be perceived as weak — and not real smart.

Biden is remorseful for everything — for supporting a 1994 crime bill, for having called Vice President Pence a "decent

guy" — and especially for his role in the Clarence Thomas Supreme Court hearings long ago. Then chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Biden regrets the way Anita Hill was treated — with tough questioning and, as I recall, a hostile environment. All those white men and this lone, black woman. As they say, it wasn't optically optimum.

Additionally, Biden is very upset about what he terms "white man's culture," referring to the environment in which women have been afraid to speak up in cases of sexual harassment. Well, OK, but if we're going to blame White Man's Culture for all of that, then we ought to add a footnote about the genius of the founders, the U.S. Constitution, the Declaration of Independence and, if we're still allowed to use the term, Western civilization.

Trump's success, unfortunately, is based in part upon his attention to white voters who feel marginalized by a culture they increasingly don't recognize, including the blue-collar white guys who used to vote Democratic.

This is not calculus, but it was a calculation that Trump got right. With the end of the Mueller investigation and the wackiness emanating from the far left, he may be poised to win again. If Democrats want to woo renegade Republicans and independents — and evict Trump from the White House — they'd best focus on uniting their constituents under a banner of shared values rather than encouraging good men to apologize for being born.

Besides, as most men know, saying you're sorry is never enough.

How do we pay for Buckley's Pass cut-through?

I have been working with other local residents to devise a fair funding formula for the proposed Buckley's Pass cut-through.

We suggest to continue the current canal assessment fee. Extend the Hurricane Irma Canal Assessment Fee (\$100), which expires in 2021, into the Buckley's Pass fee (\$100) until 2025. The homeowner continues

with the \$100 increase in canal maintenance, except it lasts until 2025 instead of 2021.

After 2025, it reverts back to \$550.

Benefits:

- Improved navigational access to the harbor by decreasing travel time to

reach open water. Second access point for Punta Gorda Isles canal front properties.

- Reduce congestion at Ponce Inlet and approaches from the canal system and the harbor improved tidal exchange that will lead to better tidal flushing of the interior canals.
- Improved property values in the area. Higher revenue for the city.

• Buckley's Pass will prove to be a closer Safe Harbor inlet to PGI in storm conditions.

- Improve access to Sunset Lake Raft-Up area used by boaters throughout Punta Gorda.
- Punta Gorda boaters regularly bring friends around the canal areas as an interesting sightseeing destination.

• Cruising south, it is much more direct

to Burnt Store Marina, Bokeelia, Matlacha and the Intracoastal Waterway.

- Fishermen fishing locally will be able to fish the exit of Alligator Creek, the shoreline and up to Ponce De Leon inlet.
- Sailboats at full hull speed of 5-6 knots will be able to use the rim canal at safe speed and save 2 to 3 miles.

We are one city and one boating community. Trump's the one who's overly obsessed with Russia

Overreach and overkill are two of the most common errors in politics. A week after the release of Attorney General William Barr's gloss on Robert Mueller's report, it's clear that President Trump's characteristic response — to lash out at enemies and entangle his party in his obsessions — has prevented Republicans from using the end of the special counsel's investigation as a pivot point.

It's also obvious that Democratic presidential hopefuls, like the party's House candidates in 2018, are largely ignoring the noise around the Russia scandal. Instead they're piling up rafts of proposals on subjects close-to-home: education, child care, infrastructure and economics. They are talking to the voters who will decide the 2020 election in a way Trump isn't.

By now, no one ever expects Trump to be gracious. But his inability just to declare victory and move on after Barr's favorable summary of Mueller's findings has frozen public opinion where it was before the latest news. This is not good for the GOP.

After the attorney general issued his letter, Trump escalated his long-running war against Adam Schiff, the chairman of the House intelligence committee. On Thursday, all its

Republican members decided to join his campaign, signing a letter asking Schiff to step down. It was a big mistake. They afforded the California Democrat the opportunity to broadcast his epic rebuttal, recounting the connections between the president, his campaign and Russia.

Schiff invoked the Republican committee members' unanimity to tie them all into an across-the-board apology for Trump. Over and over, Schiff deployed the formulation "You might think it's OK" to suggest that the GOP was indifferent to a long list of Trump's Russia-linked transgressions. He concluded: "But I don't think it's OK. I think it's immoral. I think it's unethical. I think it's unpatriotic. And yes, I think it's corrupt."

Schiff's profile, along with the reach of his devastating denunciation, was further enhanced that evening when Trump unleashed a vicious, profane attack on his adversary at a campaign-style rally in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Trump belittled Schiff's appearance

— appearances being everything to Trump — and claimed "complete vindication" on the "collusion delusion."

Of course, even Barr's pro-Trump account of Mueller's report conceded that the special counsel went out of his way to say that his inquiry "does not exonerate" Trump on obstruction of justice. But the larger problem is that Trump's inability to let go of the Russia controversy kicks away the opportunity he and his party might have exploited to reset the public conversation.

At least some Republicans know how foolish this is. Karl Rove, George W. Bush's political maestro, offered an almost plaintive Wall Street Journal column under the headline "Move on from Robert Mueller, Mr. President." Trump recklessly went exactly the other way in Michigan. Rove urged Trump "to pivot to issues, like the economy and the opioid crisis, that matter to swing voters" and cited a Fox News poll underscoring that the energy in politics is still on the side of Trump's opponents: Only 27 percent of voters strongly approve of Trump, while 42 percent strongly disapprove.

Rove's instincts about the need for a new narrative were confirmed Friday morning with the release of a March 25-27 NPR/PBS News

Hour/Marist poll finding 54 percent of Americans saying they definitely plan to vote against Trump in 2020, while only 35 percent saying they would definitely vote for him. The survey also found that 75 percent back the core Democratic demand that the full Mueller report be made public, a warning to Barr that excessive redactions could incite public discontent. Only 36 percent said the report cleared Trump of any wrongdoing. This is not a man who should still be playing to his base by stoking the Russia story.

If anyone is listening to Rove's counsel, it's Democratic presidential candidates. Last week, while Washington was consumed by Mueller news, Sen. Amy Klobuchar, D-Minn., rolled out a detailed plan on infrastructure — the quintessential middle-of-the-road concern.

Sen. Elizabeth Warren, D-Mass., added to her impressive compendium of policy innovations with an approach to agriculture stressing the interests of small farmers over those of agribusiness. For her part, Sen. Kamala Harris, D-Calif., offered a Washington Post opinion piece highlighting her proposal to raise teacher pay across the country.

In other words, the Democrats who would be president are paying far more attention to questions that resonate in Iowa, New Hampshire, and the industrial Midwest than to what transpired in Moscow or St. Petersburg. Trump's biggest problem may be his difficulty in doing the same.



Fake puppy sellers steal your heart (and money)

‘How much is that doggie in the window?’ sang Patti Page in her 1953 hit record release. (You know, the one with the waggly tail.) “I do hope that doggie’s for sale.”

Back then, Page’s song typified how we began searching for that special family pet.

However, today, that search often begins online. And, unfortunately, it can come with horrible outcomes. The Better Business Bureau warns at least 80 percent of the sponsored advertising links in an internet search for pets may be fraudulent.

Just ask Chrissy Masse. Chrissy and her husband Craig were looking to bring another purebred Labrador Retriever into their family. The Port Charlotte couple’s previous Lab was purchased through a local breeder, but he’d gone out of business.

Chrissy was excited when she found “Jacko,” a 10-week old male for \$600 while doing an online search.

“Looking for a Labrador Retriever Puppy? Then you are at the right place,” touts “Pat” at patlabradorpuppies.com. “We are unique in offering the finest Labrador Retriever Puppies. This is our passion and we want to share with the world!”

Pat’s online website promised Jacko’s health was guaranteed. He was current on all shots, came with registration papers and shipping was free.

What Chrissy didn’t know at the time was Jacko was just a stolen picture and part of an elaborate scam which was just beginning to unfold.

Beginning her saga, Chrissy and Craig said they followed requested instructions to send Pat the \$600 using Zelle. Zelle instantly enables payments from one enrollee’s bank account to another’s using only an email address or mobile phone number. Chrissy’s bank is in the Zelle network. (More on Zelle fraud in next week’s column.)

Not satisfied with just \$600, the scam continued.

Three days later, Chrissy got a phone call from “Coastal Logistics Shipping.” A refundable deposit for an air-conditioned puppy crate needed to be wired via Western Union so Jacko safely could fly to Punta Gorda airport.

Chrissy agreed. However, before her wire transfer went through, it was stopped by an alert Western Union fraud unit which flagged the shipping company as fake. It was fraudulently impersonating a legitimate company, “Coastal Logistics Group.”

If Chrissy’s wire had gone through, the scam likely would have continued, as additional unexpected problems arose. Like an emergency vet visit. Or a required vaccination. Or needed pet insurance.

Think of this scam as slowly reeling in a prized catch. The bait? The most popular — and hard to find — puppies.

According to the American Kennel Club, the top 2018 dog breeds were Labrador Retrievers, German Shepherds, Golden Retrievers, Bulldogs, Beagles, Poodles and Rottweilers.

That means if you’re looking for any of these, you’re a targeted victim.

“Potential victims can easily become so emotionally invested in preparing for their new pet that they are devastated on finally learning the animal does not exist,” emphasizes the BBB.

So, don’t let pet scammers steal your heart and your money.

Whether looking at websites or classified advertising, the BBB recommends avoiding buying a pet without seeing it in person. To expose an imposter, Scambusters.com suggests offering to travel to collect the pet. “A scammer will quickly disappear or make dubious excuses why this can’t be done.”

Most important takeaway? Never send funds to people or companies you don’t know and trust.

The major project elements include:

- Rehabilitate Runway 15-33 pavement. The runway would be extended by 593 feet and upgrade runway to temporarily accommodate commercial air service while Runway 4-22 is closed.
- Reconstruct and rehabilitate Runway 4-22 pavement
- Acquire property and avigation easements
- Re-configure taxiway/runway entrance to Runway 15
- Develop general aviation apron, buildings, and parking facilities on the north side of the airfield
- Construct new flight school building and parking lot
- Relocate Building 111 and demolish existing structure
- Construct additional long-term public parking and cell phone waiting lots
- Remove wetland habitats identified as wildlife hazard attractants.

Dear Kendall, Marriage counselors say you have a good chance of having a successful marriage if you're in agreement on four things — religion, money, children, and in-laws. So, first things first. I'd strongly suggest you and your fiancé go through pre-marital counseling to make sure you're on the same page when it comes to handling this and other issues. If you and her mom really want to show her you love her, you'll make sure she starts learning some character and discipline. And it's very important that both of you are on the same page and in agreement every step of the way. You might also want to read a book together by Dr. Henry Cloud called "Boundaries." This is a great book, and it will give you both several ideas for creating a reasonable timeline aimed at teaching her more responsibility. I would advise letting her mom present any changes to her initially. Neither of you wants to create a scenario where you're viewed as the bad guy. Let her mom start the process by explaining that she made a few mistakes in terms of teaching her more about personal responsibility and self-reliance when she was younger. Then, she can begin to lay out the first few rules and expectations.

In my mind, there's nothing wrong with requiring her to get a job within 30 days if she doesn't already have one. If she needs to go job hunting, make sure she's out of bed and on the road no later than 8:00 a.m. every morning. During this first phase, looking for work every day should be her job. It wouldn't be a bad idea to start teaching her about budgeting, saving, and everything else that goes into handling money responsibly during this time, too.

Next, phase two might consist of requiring her to help around the house doing chores on her days off, or whenever mom needs a hand. Then, after a month or two of this, phase three might consist of her paying a small amount in rent. Do you see what I'm doing? By stepping up the expectations gradually you're building a foundation so she'll have the tools and knowledge to where, in the sixth or seventh month, she's moving out and taking care of her own responsibilities. 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

Disaster aid stalls in fight over Puerto Rico

Senate Democrats block GOP disaster aid bill, saying it doesn't do enough to help Puerto Rico

WASHINGTON — Senate Democrats on Monday blocked a Republican disaster aid bill, saying it doesn't do enough to help hurricane-torn Puerto Rico.

The move tossed long-sought relief for victims of hurricanes, floods and western wildfires into limbo.

The vote escalated a fight between Democrats and President Donald Trump, who opposes further rebuilding aid for the

U.S. island territory, which was slammed by back-to-back hurricanes in 2017.

The 44-49 vote fell short of a majority, much less the 60 votes required to overcome a Democratic filibuster. It sent GOP leaders back to the

drawing board but seemed unlikely to kill disaster aid efforts outright, since there is much political support to send aid to Southern farmers, wildfire-ravaged California towns and Midwestern flood victims.

Trump allies such as Sens. David Perdue, R-Ga., and Rick Scott, R-Fla., are among the strongest backers of the legislation, which has already faced significant delays.

"We will get this done eventually," Perdue said, promising relief to struggling farmers in his state. The path forward is not clear, but a leading option is for the Senate to pass a much more narrowly drawn bill simply to get the issue into a House-Senate conference committee. House Democrats insist the talks must produce a

Economic consequences in the US could be an upheaval of daily life

EL PASO, Texas — President Donald Trump's threat to shut down the southern border raised fears Monday of dire economic consequences in the U.S. and an upheaval of daily life in a stretch of the country that relies on the international flow of not just goods and services but also students, families

and workers. Politicians, business leaders and economists warned that such a move would block incoming shipments of fruits and vegetables, TVs, medical devices and other products and cut off people who commute to their jobs or school or come across to go shopping.

"Let's hope the threat is nothing but a bad April Fools' joke," said economist Dan Griswold at the Mercatus

Center at George Mason University in Virginia. He said Trump's threat would be the "height of folly," noting that an average of 15,000 trucks and \$1.6 billion in goods cross the border every day.

"If trade were interrupted, U.S. producers would suffer crippling disruptions of their supply chains, American families would see prices spike for food and cars, and U.S. exporters would be cut

off from their third-largest market," he said.

Trump brought up the possibility of closing ports of entry along the southern border Friday and revisited it in tweets over the weekend because of a surge of Central Americans migrants who are seeking asylum. Trump administration officials have said the influx is straining the

Officials: Trump team overruled 25 clearance denials

WASHINGTON — A career official in the White House security office says dozens of people in President Donald Trump's administration were granted security clearances despite "disqualifying issues" in their backgrounds, including concerns about foreign influence, drug use and criminal conduct.

Tricia Newbold, an 18-year government employee who oversaw the issuance of clearances for some senior White House aides, says she compiled a list of at least 25 officials who were initially denied security clearances last year but then had those denials overruled by senior administration officials.

The allegations were detailed in a letter and memo released Monday by Rep. Elijah Cummings of Maryland, chairman of the House Oversight and Reform Committee. The documents, which are based on Newbold's March 23 private committee interview, don't identify the officials on the list but say they include "two current senior White House officials, as well as contractors and individuals" in different parts of the Executive Office of the President.

"According to Ms. Newbold, these individuals had a wide range of serious disqualifying issues involving foreign influence, conflicts of interest, concerning personal conduct, financial problems, drug use and criminal conduct," the memo says.

The release of the documents sets the stage for another fight between the White House and the Democratic-controlled House, and immediately drew criticism

Scientists hunt for cause of recent earthquakes in the South

Government researchers are trying to determine whether the quakes are related to oil and gas operations in the area,



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14 die when boat carrying Haitian migrants capsizes

At least 14 Haitians are dead after a twin-engine outboard boat smuggling migrants to the Turks and Caicos capsized in shark-infested waters, the islands' police force confirm.

Takara Bain, a spokeswoman with the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police, said 14 individuals were rescued before the search-and-rescue operation was suspended late Sunday until daybreak Monday.

"Today we have utilized all of our marine components, with the support of other rescue services. The search and rescue operation is ongoing. We cannot tell when it will end as it will be determined by the number of recoveries we make over the next day or so," acting Police Commissioner Trevor Botting said after four bodies and one survivor were found shortly before 6 p.m.

The islands' police marine branch was alerted after 8 a.m. Sunday that a boat transporting undocumented migrants from Haiti had capsized off West Caicos, an uninhabited island in the British overseas territory.

"At this stage, it is unclear as to the total souls on board the vessel," Botting said. "This is a tragic loss of life. We offer our condolences and sympathies to the families of those affected by this terrible incident. No journey is worth risking lives on the dangerous seas in these small vessels."

Botting said the incident is now under investigation to establish the circumstances of the vessel's voyage and what happened to the craft.

In February, Bahamian authorities recovered the bodies of 28 Haitians after a boat smuggling them sank off the northern Bahamas. Some 17 individuals were rescued and taken into police custody. In response to that tragedy at sea, the U.S. Embassy in Port-au-Prince launched a public service announcement warning Haitians not to risk their lives at sea.

Haiti has been mired in a worsening economic situation, which has stirred political tensions in recent weeks. The country's prime minister was recently fired by the lower chamber of deputies, and inflation is at the highest it has been in 11 years.

Brexit alternatives rejected ... again

Divorce deal could have softened or even halted Britain's departure

LONDON — Britain's Parliament has spoken — and it has said no, again.

Lawmakers seeking a way out of the country's Brexit morass on Monday rejected four alternatives to the government's unpopular European Union divorce deal that would have softened or even halted Britain's departure.

With just 12 days until the U.K. must come up with a new plan or crash out of the bloc in chaos, the House of Commons threw out four options designed to replace Prime Minister Theresa May's thrice-rejected Brexit deal — though in some cases by a whisker.

The result leaves May's Conservative government facing difficult and risky choices. It can gamble on a fourth attempt to push May's unloved deal through Parliament, let Britain tumble out of the bloc without a deal, or roll the dice by seeking a snap election to shake up Parliament.

Brexit Secretary Stephen Barclay said the government would continue to seek support for a "credible" plan for leaving the EU.

"This House has continuously rejected leaving without a deal just as it has rejected not leaving at all," he told lawmakers in the House of Commons after the votes. "Therefore the only option is to find a way through which allows the U.K. to leave with a deal."

May has summoned her Cabinet for a marathon meeting Tuesday to thrash out the options. The prime minister, who is renowned for her dogged determination, could try to bring her Brexit agreement back for a fourth time later this week.

Monday's votes revealed a preference among lawmakers for a softer form of Brexit — but not a majority to make it happen.

The narrowest defeat — 276 votes to 273 — was for a plan to keep Britain in a customs union with the EU, guaranteeing smooth and tariff-free trade in goods. A motion that went further, calling for Britain to stay in the EU's borderless single market for both goods and services, was defeated 282-261.

A third proposal calling for any Brexit deal Britain strikes with the EU to be put to a public referendum was defeated 292-280.

The fourth, which would let Britain cancel Brexit if it came

within two days of crashing out of the bloc without a deal, fell by a wider margin, 292-191.

May had already ruled out all the ideas under consideration. But the divorce deal she negotiated with the EU has been rejected by Parliament three times, leaving Britain facing a no-deal Brexit that could cause turmoil for people and businesses on both sides of the Channel.

The April 12 deadline, imposed by the EU, gives Britain's politicians less than two weeks to bridge the hostile divide that separates those in her government

who want to sever links with the EU and those who want to keep the ties that have bound Britain to the bloc for almost 50 years.

Lawmakers have carved out more time on Wednesday for further votes on Brexit options.

The impasse is raising expectations that lawmakers or the government could try to trigger a snap election in the hope a new configuration in Parliament would break the Brexit logjam.

The lack of consensus reflects a Parliament and a government deeply divided over how — and whether — to leave the EU.

Murder charge dropped in Kim Jong Un's brother's killing

A Malaysian court dropped the charge after she pleaded guilty to a lesser offense

SHAH ALAM, Malaysia — Two years after North Korean leader Kim Jong Un's half brother was killed, a Malaysian court on Monday dropped the murder charge against the only suspect still in custody, and she pleaded guilty to a lesser offense and is expected to be released soon.

The move to reduce the charge against the Vietnamese woman, Doan Thi Huong, came three weeks after an even more stunning development in the case, when prosecutors unexpectedly dropped the murder charge against Huong's Indonesian co-defendant and immediately freed her.

The two women had been the only suspects in custody after four North Korean suspects fled Malaysia following the killing of Kim Jong Nam in a Kuala Lumpur airport terminal on the morning of Feb. 13, 2017.

Oh Ei Sun, a senior fellow with the Singapore Institute of International Affairs, said

the decision not to charge the two women with murder likely marked the end of the case.

"This is pretty much the end as the real culprits are apparently hiding behind the veil of diplomatic immunity and state-sponsored sanctuary," Oh said.

Huong and the Indonesian woman, Siti Aisyah, have said they thought they were participating in a prank for a TV show and did not know they actually were taking part in a high-profile murder. The two were arrested and accused of smearing VX nerve agent on Kim's face.

Kim was the eldest son in the current generation of North Korea's ruling family. He had been living abroad for years but could have been seen as a threat to Kim Jong Un's rule.

Lawyers for the women have previously said they were pawns in a political assassination with clear links to the North Korean Embassy in Kuala Lumpur, and that the prosecution failed to show the women had any intention to kill. Intent to kill is crucial to a murder charge under Malaysian law.

Malaysian officials have never officially accused North Korea and have made it clear they don't want the trial politicized.

The murder charge the women had faced carried the death penalty if they were convicted. Huong nodded Monday as a translator read the new charge to her: voluntarily causing injury with a dangerous weapon, VX

nerve agent.

Oh said he believed it was a "friendly gesture to Vietnam while paying due respect to the judicial process." While Huong may not have had any premeditated intent to kill Kim, she did apply the VX on his face and has to account for it, he said.

High Court Judge Azmi Ariffin sentenced Huong to three years and four months in prison from the day she was arrested on Feb. 15, 2017. Huong's lawyer Hisyam Teh Poh Teik said his client is expected to be freed by the first week of May, after a one-third reduction in her sentence for good behavior.

"I am happy," Huong, 30, told reporters as she left the courtroom, adding that she thought it was a fair outcome.

While handing out a jail term short of the maximum 10 years the new charge carried, the judge told Huong she was "very, very lucky" and wished her "all the best." Vietnamese officials in the courtroom cheered when the decision was announced.

The original charge had alleged that the two women colluded with four North Koreans to murder Kim with VX nerve agent as he passed through the airport.

A High Court judge last August found there was enough evidence to infer that Aisyah, Huong and the four North Koreans engaged in a "well-planned conspiracy" to kill Kim and called on the two women to present their defense.

Huong's lawyer told the court Monday that her guilty plea to the lesser charge showed she "has taken responsibility" for her actions. In asking for a lenient sentence, he also told the court that her move saved judicial time.

Hisyam had urged the judge to take into account Huong's honesty, her acceptance of responsibility and the acquittal of her co-defendant. "She is neither a criminal nor has the propensity to commit a crime," the lawyer said.

Huong has a degree in accounting, but she is also "naive and gullible," he said.

Hisyam said the four North Korean suspects still at large were the "real assassins."

The judge said he took into account the gravity of the offense and also the fact that Huong was remorseful and a first offender.

Before the sentencing, Vietnam's ambassador to Malaysia, Le Quy Quynh, said he expected Huong to be freed immediately.

Wildfire now threatens area pounded by Hurricane Michael

PANAMA CITY (AP) — A wildfire that officials say quickly spread through dead trees that still hadn't been cleared after Hurricane Michael forced the evacuation of nearly two dozen homes in Florida's Panhandle.

Fire officials say the fire broke out Saturday near Panama City, which was hit hard by Michael in October. By Sunday afternoon it had grown to some 500 acres.

Amy Carter tells the News Herald "our house was destroyed in Hurricane Michael, and now this." She and her husband had their car packed with some sentimental items Sunday in case they had to flee.

Helicopters continuously dumped water from a nearby pond on the forest.

Florida Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried's office says 23 firefighters, multiple bulldozers, fixed-wing aircraft, and helicopters were working to contain the blaze.

Meteor likely cause of bright flash in night sky

ERIDU (AP) — The National Weather Service says a bright flash across the Florida night sky over the weekend was likely a falling meteor.

News outlets report people in southern Georgia and the Big Bend area of northern Florida reported seeing a flash shortly before midnight Saturday. The National Weather Service in Charleston confirmed a mapping tool "detected the released light from the suspected fireball" over a spot about 35 miles east of Tallahassee just before midnight.

The Tallahassee office released a loop in which the meteor briefly blinks as a purple dot. It's unclear where the meteor landed.

Saturday's flash followed meteor sightings across the southeast early Friday. The American Meteor Society says more than 150 reports were recorded in Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

14-yr-old boy killed, 2 teens charged with murder

LEHIGH ACRES (AP) — Deputies say an arrangement between three Florida teens to buy a tactical vest ended with a 14-year-old boy dead and two charged with murder.

Lee County Sheriff's officials say the three teens met Saturday and that J'Martin Hixon had planned to buy the vest he'd seen on an online sale site. During their meet-up, one of the teen sellers shot Hixon. The News-Press reports Hixon also fired back and struck one of the boys.

Lamartine Malbranche, 15, and Jerry Murassaint, 16, were charged with conspiracy to commit robbery, robbery with firearm and murder while engaged in certain felony offense. One of the teens was taken to the hospital with a non-life threatening gunshot wound.

A third male with the two was also in the area, but the sheriff's office didn't release any details

about his possible role.

Lawyer who stole from clients gets 15 years in prison

TAMPA (AP) — A Florida lawyer was sentenced to 15 years in prison for stealing more than \$2 million from his clients.

On Monday morning, Hillsborough Circuit Judge Christopher Nash also ordered 51-year-old David Land Whigham to pay restitution for the money he took from clients. The Tampa Bay Times reports several of his clients were physically or mentally disabled.

Nash said he considered a number of factors, including Whigham's self-reported bouts with depression and substance abuse. His sentence was above the 11-year minimum sentence suggested by state guidelines. It was less than the 20 years prosecutors sought.

The thefts were discovered in 2016 and Whigham was suspended, then disbarred by

the Florida Bar.

He pleaded guilty last year to nine counts of grand theft.

Whigham specialized in estates, wills and trusts.

String rip currents keep lifeguards busy along coast

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — Lifeguards rescued more than 100 people from rough surf along a stretch of beaches on Florida's Atlantic coast.

Volusia County ocean rescue Capt. Mike Beard tells The Daytona Beach News-Journal that lifeguards rescued 48 people on Saturday and at least 55 on Sunday. Those rescued included a 7-year-old girl washed out into the water by strong rip currents.

He says the child and another child in nearby New Smyrna Beach were taken to hospitals as a precaution.

Beard says the rip currents were "pretty bad" over the weekend as spring break crowds flocked to the beaches.

Avenatti is heading back to court in California

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — A week after Michael Avenatti's shocking arrest in New York, the attorney famous for representing porn star Stormy Daniels in legal battles against President Donald Trump will be back in federal court Monday to face fraud charges in California.

The brash lawyer faces a hearing in the Orange County city of Santa Ana on charges he fraudulently obtained \$4 million in bank loans and pocketed \$1.6 million that belonged to a client. Avenatti has long faced allegations from a former client and a former partner that he was hiding money to avoid paying what he owed.

Now, federal authorities are adding their voices to that chorus, with the specter of a long prison sentence that could be the downfall of a man who once considered challenging Trump in his re-election bid.

Avenatti, 48, is charged with wire and bank fraud. He was arrested last week in New York and released on \$300,000 bail on unrelated extortion charges. He has said he expects to be exonerated.

Federal prosecutors in New York allege that Avenatti tried to shake down Nike for millions of dollars so he wouldn't reveal allegations the apparel company paid off high school basketball players. He has denied the charge to reporters.

In California, federal prosecutors said Avenatti filed bogus tax returns to fraudulently secure \$4 million in loans from a Mississippi bank and embezzled a client's settlement funds.

Magician David Blaine accused of sexual assault

NEW YORK (New York Daily News) — At least two women have claimed they were sexually assaulted by magician David Blaine and the NYPD has launched an investigation, according to a report.

Detectives from the department's Special Victims Unit took statements from two women, although one of the claims may fall outside the statute of limitations, according to The Daily Beast.

One of the women told investigators that Blaine, 45, sexually assaulted her inside his Manhattan apartment in 1998.

Chief of Detectives Dermot Shea said there is an active investigation.

Blaine has not been charged. He told The Daily Beast he has not been approached by police.

Blaine has faced similar charges in the past. In 2004, former model Natasha Prince accused Blaine of raping her at a private home in London, an allegation Blaine denied.

Popular rapper killed in LA

Nipsey Hussle is being mourned for much more than his music

LOS ANGELES — Nipsey Hussle thought Marathon Clothing could be a seed to revive the impoverished Los Angeles community where he grew up.

The 33-year-old rapper and his business partner purchased a plaza in the Crenshaw neighborhood, intending to knock it down and erect a six-story residential building atop a commercial plaza, with Marathon as its anchor.

But as Hussle stood in that same plaza Sunday night, he was shot and killed by an unknown assailant. On Monday, the neighborhood he sought to improve was mourning him for much more than his music.

Hussle's philanthropic work went well beyond the usual celebrity "giving back" ethos, and political and community leaders were as quick and effusive in their praise as his fellow hip-hop artists.

"Nipsey's activism, leadership and dedication to community was an inspiration for Californians and beyond," tweeted California senator and presidential candidate Kamala Harris. "His senseless death leaves us worse off."

LA Mayor Eric Garcetti tweeted about the "awful tragedy" Sunday night even before investigators had confirmed his death.

By Monday, hundreds of people formed a circle in front of the closed store to pay their respects. A memorial of candles, flowers and paintings of Hussle took shape in front of the store and in the parking lot.

Police cleared out after an all-night investigation that involved canvassing for witnesses and seeking surveillance video from nearby businesses, Lt. Chris Ramirez said. Investigators did not reveal a motive or publicly identify any suspects.

The coroner planned to perform an autopsy Monday. Two other men standing near Hussle were shot and wounded.

Los Angeles Police Commissioner Steve Soboroff tweeted that he and Police Chief Michel Moore had agreed to meet

with Hussle on Monday to "talk about ways he could help stop gang violence and help us help kids."

Hussle, whose real name was Ermias Asghedom, was an Eritrean-American father of two who was engaged to actress Lauren London.

His hip-hop friends and other stars, including Rihanna and Snoop Dogg, mourned on social media, with many pointing out his particular role in uplifting African Americans.

Hussle espoused clean living and eating healthy and planned to create a documentary focused on the life of Alfredo Bowman, better known as Dr. Sebi, a Honduran herbalist and self-proclaimed healer.

Hussle was born on Aug. 15, 1985, in the same Crenshaw neighborhood where he died. He said his first passion was music but he got involved in street life as he tried to support himself, and he joined a gang as a teenager.

"I grew up in gang culture," Hussle told the Los

Angeles Times in 2018. "We dealt with death, with murder. It was like living in a war zone, where people die on these blocks and everybody is a little bit immune to it."

For a decade, he released much sought-after mixtapes that he sold out of the trunk of his car, helping him create a buzz and gain respect from rap purists and his peers.

Last year he hit new heights with "Victory Lap," his critically acclaimed major-label debut album on Atlantic Records that made several critics' best-of lists. The album debuted at No. 4 on Billboard's 200 albums charts and featured collaborations with Kendrick Lamar and CeeLo Green.

It got him a Grammy nomination, though he lost out to Cardi B's "Invasion of Privacy."

Hussle was also a wildly popular figure among professional athletes, especially those based in LA, where he was a regular on the sidelines. Players admired him for his community building.

A vital and healthy diet includes omega-3 and omega-6

DEAR DR. ROACH: It seems that eating a healthy diet with an emphasis on nuts and seeds, fruits, vegetables and grains is the best choice for anyone. It's been well-documented that omega-6 is inflammatory, whereas foods containing omega-3 are not. It seems to me that we should be consuming foods that have more omega-3 in them. The only problem is that, from my research, all nuts and seeds with the exception of chia and flaxseeds have a much higher ratio of the omega-6 to the omega-3. This appears to be the case with most foods, no matter which food group they are in. How can any of the healthy foods be beneficial when so much more of the "bad fats" are being ingested? — Anon.

ANSWER: Dietary fats are categorized into four groups: monounsaturated, polyunsaturated, saturated and trans-saturated. It is accepted that monounsaturated fats have a healthy effect, reducing heart disease risk, while trans-saturated fats are harmful.

The effect of saturated fats on health is mixed, but those that come from processed meat increase heart disease and diabetes risk. Saturated fat overall has little effect on heart disease risk, but swapping saturated fat with unsaturated fats appears to reduce heart disease risk.

Polyunsaturated fats are categorized into the omega-3 family and the omega-6 family. I also have read in many places that omega-6 fats are "bad fats," causing inflammation. The best evidence, a 2014 review of all controlled trials

published, showed that omega-6 fats are NOT inflammatory and that they DECREASE risk of heart disease compared with meat-based saturated fats.

We should be consuming both omega-3 and omega-6 polyunsaturated fats, mostly from plant sources. The data support that nuts and seeds are foods we should be eating more of, but we also should be eating good sources of omega-3, including fatty fish, the chia and flaxseeds you mentioned, as well as walnuts and canola oil. Most people have to work harder to get omega-3 oils but get plenty of omega-6.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Hi. I'm a very healthy, 68-year-old male. My only issue is almost non-existent testosterone. What type of doctor should I see? It seems to be a problem for many senior men. — A.

ANSWER: Low testosterone is a concern for many men as they get older. In some cases, the concern is justified. Some men may have a problem making testos-

terone due to a condition in the brain or in the testes, where testosterone is actually made. In these cases, testosterone replacement therapy is clearly indicated.

What is still controversial is whether to treat healthy older men who have a low testosterone level and no symptoms. It's not clear that treatment of low testosterone will prevent problems. It's possible that's the case, but I am cautious about prescribing a drug with potential harms for someone without symptoms, when it has not been proven to be of benefit.

However, men with symptoms of low testosterone, such as low sex drive, depressed mood and loss of body hair, and who have clearly low testosterone levels may benefit from treatment, and a trial of testosterone treatment is appropriate. Men should learn about potential risk and have regular laboratory evaluation.

Low energy by itself is not clearly a symptom of low testosterone and may not improve with testosterone treatment.

DeSantis announces Florida task force on opioid crisis

SANFORD, Fla. — Florida's Office of Drug Control will be re-established in the governor's office and a state task force on drug abuse will be set up to provide a unified vision for battling the state's opioid epidemic, Gov. Ron DeSantis said Monday. The governor appointed Attorney General Ashley Moody to chair the state-wide task force, which will develop a strategy and make recommendations. The Office of Drug Control will support the task force's efforts.

Moody said Florida loses 17 people a day to the drug crisis, including one on Monday in Seminole County, where the announcement took place.

These efforts will help the people "who are fighting in the trenches on a daily basis have the tools and resources they need not only to prevent people from becoming addicted but to go after the drug organizations that seeks to poison our children and citizens," Moody said.

The drug control office will coordinate with state and federal officials in leveraging resources to reduce opioid abuse. Various state agencies already have substance-abuse programs but the Office of Drug Control will centralize those efforts so Florida can act with a unified vision, the governor said.

"The opioid epidemic has devastated families and communities throughout our state," DeSantis said

during a news conference at the Sanford Fire Department. "These are issues that require serious, comprehensive action."

Former Gov. Jeb Bush established the Office of Drug Control in the late 1990s as one of his first acts as governor. Bush's daughter, Noelle Bush, battled addiction and had a stint in Florida's drug court program.

Former Gov. Rick Scott dismantled the office as one of his first acts as governor more than a decade later. Despite calls to re-establish the office as the opioid epidemic grew worse this decade, Scott never did, and it became a priority for Moody as she campaigned for office last year.

"This office was discontinued several years ago but the importance of restoring its functions couldn't be more obvious given the circumstances before us," DeSantis said.

Bush on Monday tweeted a thanks to DeSantis. "I know his efforts will go a long way in helping Florida fight this growing and heartbreaking crisis," Bush said.

DeSantis also said Florida has secured an additional \$26 million in federal funding for the state's opioid response project. At the news conference, the governor also announced Dr. Scott Rivkees as the next Florida Surgeon General. At a separate announcement later in the day in Palm Beach County, the governor said he was naming Thomas Frazer as Florida's first chief science officer.

immigration system to the breaking point.

Elected leaders from border communities stretching from San Diego to cities across Texas warned that havoc would ensue on both sides of the international boundary if the ports were closed. They were joined by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which said such a step would inflict "severe economic harm."

In California's Imperial Valley, across from Mexicali, Mexico, farmers rely on workers who come across every day from Mexico to harvest fields of lettuce, carrots, onions and other winter vegetables. Shopping mall parking lots in the region are filled with cars with Mexican plates.

More than 60 percent of all Mexican winter produce consumed in the U.S. crosses into the country at Nogales, Arizona. The winter produce season is especially heavy right now, with the import of Mexican-grown watermelons, grapes and squash, said Lance Jungmeyer, president of the Fresh Produce Association of the Americas.

He said 11,000 to 12,000 commercial trucks cross the border at Nogales daily, laden with about 50 million pounds of produce such as eggplants, tomatoes, bell peppers, lettuce, cucumbers and berries.

He said a closing of the border would lead to immediate layoffs and result in shortages and price increases at grocery stores and restaurants.

"If this happens — and I certainly

hope it doesn't — I'd hate to go into a grocery store four or five days later and see what it looks like," Jungmeyer said.

Laredo Mayor Pete Saenz, chairman of the Texas Border Coalition, said a closure would be catastrophic.

"Closing the border would cause an immediate depression in border state communities and, depending on the duration, a recession in the rest of the country," he said.

Marta Salas, an employee at an El Paso shop near the said her whole family, including relatives who attend the University of Texas at El Paso, would be affected if the border were closed.

"There are Americans who live there. I have nephews who come to UTEP, to grade school, to high school every day," Salas said.

Meanwhile, the Trump administration said Monday as many as 2,000 U.S. inspectors who screen cargo and vehicles at ports of entry along the Mexican border may be reassigned to help handle the surge of migrants. Currently, about 750 inspectors are being reassigned.

That, too, could slow the movement of trucks and people across the border.

The effects were evident Monday: Sergio Amaya, a 24-year-old American citizen who lives in Juarez, Mexico, and attends UTEP, said it normally takes him two minutes to cross the bridge. It took an hour this time.

"The Border Patrol agent said it's going to get worse," Amaya said.

Instead of ensuring the flow of goods across the border, the inspectors are being put to work processing migrants, taking their applications for asylum and transporting them to holding centers.

final measure with help for Puerto Rico.

The amount of money in dispute is relatively small, but Trump feels antipathy toward Puerto Rico's government and Senate Republicans backed him up — for now — in denying Democratic demands for more aid to rebuild its badly damaged water systems and to ease the requirement that Puerto Rico financially match a portion of the federal government's aid

contribution.

Democrats say Trump has been slow to release already-appropriated funding for Puerto Rico and has exhibited little urgency in helping the island. Trump poor-mouthed the island's government at a meeting with Senate Republicans last week and suggested Puerto Rico has gotten too much disaster help compared with states such as Texas, using inflated numbers to make his case.

"Just as we leave no soldier behind on the battlefield, we help our fellow Americans when

there's a disaster, wherever the disaster strikes. We do not abandon them. Period," said Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y.

Trump weighed in on Twitter Monday to preemptively attack Democrats for blocking the measure.

"Democrats should stop fighting Sen. David Perdue's disaster relief bill. They are blocking funding and relief for our great farmers and rural America!" Trump tweeted.

The \$13.5 billion Senate measure mostly mirrors a \$14.2 billion measure

passed by the House in January, combining aid to Southern farmers, California communities devastated by last summer's wildfire, and hurricane-hit states such as Florida, Georgia and North Carolina. Hurricane-damaged military bases in Florida and North Carolina would receive rebuilding funds.

Democrats want to add almost \$700 million more to unlock further disaster aid for Puerto Rico and several states, including help to rebuild badly damaged water systems. Democrats are also trying

to force the administration to release billions of dollars in rebuilding funds that have already been approved.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said the measure is the fastest way to get aid to the hurricane-slammed South and the badly flooded Midwest, along with nutrition aid to Puerto Rico, where food stamp benefits have already been cut.

Trump has yet to veto a spending bill despite some tough talk, and he has signed off on \$600 million to ease food stamp cuts in Puerto Rico.

from House Republicans who called the allegations overblown and "cherry-picked."

Cummings' panel has been investigating security clearances issued to senior officials including Trump son-in-law Jared Kushner, former national security adviser Michael Flynn and former White House aide Rob Porter. That probe has picked up steam after The New York Times reported that Trump ordered officials to grant Kushner a clearance over the objections of national security officials, and after Newbold spoke out to NBC News and other news outlets about her concerns.

On Monday, Cummings

said he will move this week to authorize his first subpoena in the probe. The subpoena will be for the deposition of Carl Kline, who served as the White House personnel security director and supervised Newbold. He has since left the White House for the Defense Department.

The White House did not immediately respond to a request for comment Monday. Rep. Jim Jordan, the committee's ranking Republican, said in a statement that Cummings' probe is a "partisan attack" and an "excuse to go fishing" through personnel files. He also said that one person on Newbold's list is a GSA custodian.

Also, in a response memo circulated to Republican members,

Jordan's staff cast Newbold as a disgruntled employee who had only limited knowledge of the reasons security clearances were granted. The Republican document also suggests Newbold's concerns were "overblown," saying that four or five of the clearance denials for "very serious reasons" were a small fraction of about 5,000 employees who work in the Executive Office of the President.

According to Democrat Cummings' memo, though, Newbold considered the decisions to be part of a "systematic" problem within her office where the decisions of security clearance reviewers were "continuously" overridden.

Newbold said she raised her concerns up the chain of command in the

White House to no avail. Instead, she said, the White House retaliated, suspending her in January for 14 days without pay for not following a new policy requiring that documents be scanned as separate PDF files rather than one single PDF file.

Newbold said that when she returned to work in February, she was cut out of the security clearance process. The office also announced a plan to "restructure" that would remove her from a supervisory role, she said.

In response to Newbold's interview, Cummings is asking the White House to turn over the list she created as well as documents related to the handling of security clearances for several senior officials including Flynn, Kushner and Porter.

Flynn maintained his clearance even after the White House learned that he lied to the FBI about his conversations with Russia's ambassador and that he was under investigation by the Justice Department for his previous foreign work.

Kushner failed to initially disclose numerous foreign meetings on security clearance forms, and, according to the Times, career officials recommended against granting him a clearance before Trump personally overruled them.

Porter had high-level access with an interim security clearance even though the FBI repeatedly told the White House of past allegations of domestic violence lodged against him by two ex-wives.

"The short answer is we don't know," Rubinstein told Al.com. "Certainly there isn't historically a lot of seismicity in the area, but there is a history of seismicity."

state agencies, both in Florida and Alabama, have been taking a look at these earthquakes, and trying to understand what exactly is going on in that area," Rubinstein said. "We're getting these on the ground and when we have more instruments in

the area, we'll be able to better understand what has happened."

The USGS reported in 2015 that 21 areas have seen an uptick in earthquakes believed to be related to oil and gas extraction operations. They include the Brewton, Alabama area near the Alabama-Florida line.

There were few earthquakes reported in that area before 1997. That year, several quakes

— including one that was estimated to be magnitude-4.9 — struck near Brewton. That was Alabama's second-largest earthquake ever recorded, Al.com reported.

Now, scientists will wait and see if there are additional quakes in the region to see whether the new instruments will provide more information on the cause of the quakes.

Rays 4th straight win

Lowe, Kiermaier homer, streaking Rays beat Rockies 7-1

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Brandon Lowe and Kevin Kiermaier homered to back a strong performance by Tampa Bay's bullpen in a 7-1 victory over the Colorado Rockies on Monday night.

Employing the opener strategy that has an integral part of their success since the team began using relievers to fill in for traditional starting pitchers last May, the Rays won for the fourth straight time since a season-opening loss to Houston — matching the best five-game start in franchise history.

Opener Ryne Stanek got it started before a crowd of 10,860, with Ryan Yarbrough (1-0) following and allowing one run and three hits over 4 ²/₃ innings. Relievers Wilmer Font, Jalen Beeks, Jose Alvarado and Diego Castillo finished up.

Lowe hit a two-run homer in the fourth and Kiermaier added a three-run shot in the sixth to inflict most of the damage against Colorado starter Chad Bettis (0-1), who allowed six runs and seven hits in 5 ²/₃ innings.

Kiermaier drove in a fourth run with a seventh-inning sacrifice fly.

Nolan Arenado's RBI double in the sixth snapped a 17-inning scoreless streak for the Rockies,

Calipari agrees to terms on contract

Kentucky, coach to finish his career with Wildcats

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky has agreed to a long-term contract with coach John Calipari that will allow him to finish his career with the Wildcats.

Calipari's current deal was amended in March 2017 to run through the 2023-24 season, with a base annual salary of \$8 million plus incentives. Men's basketball spokesman Eric Lindsey confirmed Monday via text to The Associated Press that the school reached a new deal with the Hall of Fame coach but did not provide details.

The 60-year-old Calipari tweeted last month that his "plan and desire" was to retire at Kentucky. He is 305-71 in 10 seasons with Kentucky and won the 2012 NCAA championship in four Final Four appearances. The Wildcats, a No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament, lost the Midwest Region final 77-71 in overtime on Sunday to third-seeded Auburn to finish the season 30-7.

Calipari's new contract was first reported by the Athletic.

Receiver Mike Evans wants to play defense, too

The team's record-setting receiver believes he can be a defensive weapon

TAMPA — Bucs wide receiver Mike Evans is already one of the best offensive weapons in the game, so this year, he said he wants to see what kind of impact he can make on the other side of the ball.

Yes, Evans wants to play both ways in 2019.

After getting a few snaps lined up at cornerback in last year's Pro Bowl — and recording an interception in the game — Evans said he is wants to play more on the defensive side this upcoming season.

"Absolutely, absolutely," Evans said when asked Monday, the first day of offseason workouts, whether playing both ways is realistic in today's NFL. "We've seen it before, haven't we?"

"I can play it because I'm an athlete," Evans said. "I don't like just being stuck at one position at receiver. You can double team me anytime you want. If a team really wants to stop me they can double team me and I'd be stopped. But if I go defense (also), I can have a lot more impact on the game."

It doesn't seem like Evans is aiming to be the next Chuck Bednarik or Sammy Baugh and define himself as a true two-way player, but he's definitely like to see the field more on defense. Evans said he hasn't yet spoken to the Bucs new coaching staff about playing on defense, but he said he will "let it be known,

situationally, I would play if they wanted me to."

Putting such an impactful offensive player as Evans is on both sides of the ball would be a challenge.

Deion Sanders was a dynamic two-way threat during his days with the Falcons and Cowboys. Only once over the past decade has a player played more than 900 snaps on one side of the ball and had double-digit on the other side, when Titans cornerback Adoree' Jackson played 993 snaps on defense and 12 on offense during his rookie year in 2017.

Evans played 940 offensive snaps (and three defensive snaps) last season. He led all Bucs receivers by playing 83.5 percent of the team's offensive snaps last season.

While Evans, who is one of the league's most physical receivers, made tremendous strides staying healthy last season, trying to play both ways would add a significant physical toll. And while it's true that Evans' size and physicality would give him some match-up advantages defending the passing game, playing defense would leave Evans more open to injury.

It might be little more than a pipe dream now, but the 6-foot-5, 231-pound Evans, said he'd like his chances against opposing receivers in press coverage.

"I'm taller than pretty much every receiver in the league almost so the only way to

get me is maybe on the back shoulder," Evans said. "That's hard to defend, but everything else, if I'm pressing, I like my chances."

"I've just got get my practice in," Evans said. "... I've got to get my hips right. No deep balls would be caught on me. I know that for sure, unless a guy just (Randy) Mosses me. Maybe (Falcons wideout) Julio (Jones) goes on top of me or something. I don't thin that will happen though."

Evans said his biggest advantage against receivers is that he is one.

"I play receiver, so I know all the releases and down the field," he said. "Even (Chiefs receiver) Tyreek Hill isn't going to get me. If the ball is in the air, me and Tyreek Hill, if he's ahead of me by a little bit, I can catch up because with my size and my ability to jump, deep balls would be covered for sure."

The Bucs have used wide receiver Evans on defense in the past to give them an additional big, tall body to prevent an opponent from completing a Hail Mary throw into the end zone.

In the Pro Bowl, Evans lined up at cornerback against Browns wide receiver Jarvis Landry in the fourth quarter, getting credit for a pass break-up and later intercepting Texans quarterback Deshaun Watson.

"He did get a pick in the Pro Bowl," Bucs cornerback Vernon Hargreaves said with a laugh. "I guess we have to put him out there and see."

The 25-year-old Evans is coming off a record-setting receiving season — he set a new Buccaneers team record with 1,524 receiving yards — while setting career highs with 17.7 yards per catch and 95.3 receiving yards per game.

Pacers use size to pull off big 111-102 win over Pistons

Thaddeus Young scored 19 points and Domantas Sabonis added 18 points and 12 rebounds to help the Indiana Pacers.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Thaddeus Young scored 19 points and Domantas Sabonis added 18 points and 12 rebounds Monday night to help the Indiana Pacers snap a three-game losing streak with a 111-102 victory over the Detroit Pistons.

It was a crucial win for the Pacers, who had lost seven of their previous eight and their grip on potentially having home-court advantage in the first round of the playoffs. Myles Turner chipped in with 17 points and five blocks.

Wayne Ellington scored a season-high 26 points and Andre Drummond had 18 points and 17 rebounds for the Pistons. Detroit started the night in the No. 6 spot with a 1 1/2-game lead over Orlando for the final playoff spot in the East.

But after a sluggish start, the struggling and short-handed Pacers finally got the spark they needed from their two big men, Sabonis and Turner. Sabonis made his first five shots as Indiana charged back from an early 10-point deficit, and Turner made the big plays in the second half, including a 3-pointer and two free throws late in the third to give the Pacers an 87-80 edge.

The combination was just enough for the Pacers to slip past the Pistons, who were firing on all cylinders early to take a 33-23 lead.

Sabonis spurred a 12-5 second-quarter charge that got the Pacers within 43-41 and Indiana closed out the half on a 7-2 run to take a 59-55 lead.

When the recharged Pistons rallied in the third quarter with runs of 9-0 and 7-0 to retake a 77-74

lead, Sabonis answered with a short hook shot, Bojan Bogdanovic scored on a fast break and Turner scored seven points in the decisive 13-3 run that gave Indiana an 87-80 lead after the third quarter.

Sabonis also started the game-sealing 9-0 run with a 9-footer early in the fourth.

CELTICS 110, HEAT 105

BOSTON (AP) — Kyrie Irving had 25 points, including a pair of key late free throws, and the Boston Celtics held off the Miami Heat 110-105 on Monday night.

Al Horford added 19 points, 11 rebounds and 10 assists for the Celtics (46-32), who are trying to beat out the Indiana Pacers for the No. 4 seed in the Eastern Conference standings.

Goran Dragic led the Heat with 30 points. Bam Adebayo added 19 points and 14 rebounds. Dwyane Wade finished with 17 points and seven assists in his final regular-season game at TD Garden.

Miami (38-39) maintained its half-game lead over Orlando for the final playoff spot in the East after the Magic's 121-109 loss to Toronto.

Boston led by as many as 23 points in the second quarter before its lead shrunk to three with 6:44 left in the fourth after the Heat went back to a zone that had been effective at times in the first half.

The Celtics continued to have some issues with it but were able to knock down a pair of 3-pointers to help push their lead back up to 101-92.

The Heat took advantage of some Boston turnovers and got a

jumper from Wade that cut it to 103-100 with 2 minutes left.

Dion Waiters missed a 3-pointer for Miami that would have tied the game and Irving converted on a three-point play on the other end.

Following a tip-in by Wade, Irving found nothing but air on a fading 3-point attempt, giving it back to Miami. But the Heat's ensuing possession ended with Kelly Olynyk's turnover.

Irving then was fouled and calmly sank a pair of free throws.

Two nights after Wade received a warm welcome in Madison Square Garden and picked up a victory in his final game against the New York Knicks, Boston gave him a similar greeting at TD Garden on Monday.

Before the game, Celtics president Danny Ainge presented Wade with a plaque in commemoration of his career accomplishments.

Later, he received a loud ovation from Boston fans when he subbed into the game in the first quarter.


It was one of the few highlights for either Wade or Miami in the first half.

The Celtics jumped out to 30-8 lead after the Heat started just 3 for 14 from the field, including 0 for 7 from the 3-point line.

RAPTORS 121, MAGIC 109

TORONTO (AP) — Danny Green scored a season-high 29 points, Kawhi Leonard and Serge Ibaka each had 15 and the Toronto Raptors clinched their sixth Atlantic Division title by beating the Orlando Magic 121-109 on Monday night.

The win also means Toronto can finish no

What will the crowd's reaction be the first time he steps to that plate in a uniform other than Washington's?


What sort of tribute will there be from the Nationals? What sort of gesture will the outfielder himself make?



UConn's Collier headlines AP women's All-America team

Napheesa Collier has had an incredible senior year so far, leading UConn back to the Final Four for a 12th consecutive year

NEW YORK — Napheesa Collier has had an incredible senior year so far, leading UConn back to the Final Four for a 12th consecutive year.

The senior forward averaged 20.9 points, 10.5 rebounds and shot 61.4% during the regular season for the Huskies to earn a spot on The Associated Press women's basketball All-America team.

"There haven't been a lot of players like her that I've seen, a few, but not a lot," UConn coach Geno Auriemma said.

She was joined on the All-America team Monday by Iowa's Megan Gustafson, Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu, Louisville's Asia Durr and Mississippi State's Teaira McCowan. Voting was done before the NCAA Tournament by the 28-member national media panel that votes on the AP Top 25 each week.

Collier received the most votes, garnering 27 first place votes from the panel. She is third on UConn's all-time scoring list with 2,386 points and third in shooting percentage and fourth in rebounding. The senior forward has been snubbed for many of the other major awards, not being named a finalist. She hasn't let it bother her.

"I don't need the validation but it's nice to be recognized," she said.

Gustafson put up eye-popping numbers at the beginning of this season and got the Hawkeyes back to the Elite Eight for the first time since 1993. She averaged a Division I-best 28 points while also ranking second in rebounding. She had

33 double-doubles to tie the NCAA's single season record.

(asterisk)She's completely taken over our record books," Iowa coach Lisa Bluder said. "Her legacy will stand for a long, long time. People will remember her for the great teammate she is and what a humble great young woman she is."

While Gustafson has been a double-double machine, Ionescu has rewritten the NCAA record book for triple-doubles and helped the Ducks reach the Final Four for the first time. She has 18 triple-doubles in her career, including one in the second round of the NCAA Tournament against Indiana. She averaged 19.6 points, 7.5 rebounds and 8.1 assists during the regular season for the Ducks. What's impressed her coach Kelly Graves is her competitiveness.

"She's defined our program since she got here. The fortunes of our program have turned since she got here," he said. "To go to the Elite Eight and what she's done that three years, that's crazy. We had only won five total NCAA games in the history of the program. She doesn't take plays off and hates to lose."

Durr has been one of the best scorers in the country the past few seasons and was an All-American for the second consecutive season. She averaged 21.3 points this season for the Cardinals.

"I'm thankful to be honored as an All-American again," Durr said. "It's a testament to my hard work paying off. I'm always in the gym, always training, always trying to find something that I can get better at. I'm just grateful

for it. To be considered one of the best five players in the country, I'm very thankful for it."

The 5-foot-10 guard would love a chance to play with the other first-teamers.

"They are all great players and fun to watch and I'm a fan of all of them," she said.

McCowan has had a stellar senior season, carrying Mississippi State to the first SEC Tournament title in school history and earning most outstanding player honors in the process. She averaged 17.8 points, 13.5 rebounds and blocked 2.4 shots a game.

"I can't tell you how proud I am of her. It's been a work in progress for her to where we are today," Mississippi State coach Vic Schaefer said. "She's going to graduate in four years, she was marginally eligible when she came to us. I'm proud of that. I'll be in front row when she walks that stage. Her development as a young lady as well as a basketball player is like something I haven't seen. She's deserving of being an All-American. ... I love the kid to death, she's made me a better coach, father, a husband."

The second team consisted of Notre Dame's Arike Ogunbowale, Baylor's Kalani Brown, California's Kristine Anigwe, Stanford's Alanna Smith and Iowa State's Bridget Carleton.

UConn's Katie Lou Samuelson headlined the third team. She was joined by Notre Dame teammates Jessica Shepard and Jackie Young, Baylor's Lauren Cox and Missouri's Sophie Cunningham.

Durr, Ionescu, Samuelson, Ogunbowale and Brown made up the preseason All-America team.

Tom Brady saves 1st tweet for April Fools' Day: I'm retiring

New England Patriots QB Tom Brady picks April Fools' Day to tweet that he's going to retire

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP) — Don't. Even. Joke.

New England Patriots fans who forgot that Monday is April Fools' Day might have been panicking when quarterback Tom Brady tweeted that he had decided to retire.

The six-time Super Bowl champion has joined Twitter and his first post said simply: "I'm retiring. In my spare time, I'll be

tweeting." An email from a Twitter spokeswoman confirmed the account, but it also referred to the fact that the tweet came on April Fools' Day.

About an hour later, Brady sent out a second tweet that said, "Was this a bad joke?"

Brady is a 41-year-old, three-time NFL MVP who has to stop playing some time. But after leading New England to the title

last year, there's no indication that he's slowing down.

And anyway, is this how he would announce it?

Even tight end Rob Gronkowski, who actually retired last month, did so with a lengthy Instagram post.

Neither Brady's agent nor the Patriots immediately responded to emails from The Associated Press seeking comment.

Big catch: Browns welcome Beckham after 'surreal' trade

Love story at a star-studded news conference following blockbuster trade

BEREA, Ohio — Odell Beckham Jr. looked at Baker Mayfield to his left, Jarvis Landry to his right and Myles Garrett at the end of the dais.

"This can't be real," Beckham said, a tuft of bleached blond hair poking out from under his orange Cleveland Browns cap.

This was no April Fools' Day joke.

His drama-filled days in New York behind him, Beckham was introduced Monday by the Browns, whose acquisition of the former Giants star wide receiver has triggered wild expectations for a team that didn't win one game two years ago.

Beckham said he has finally "come to grips

with the deal and can't wait to play again with Landry, his former LSU teammate. Beckham called the trade "the biggest blessing of my entire life."

The 26-year-old Beckham said he greeted new Browns coach Freddie Kitchens with a big hug and told him he loved him.

"It's like a love story," quipped Kitchens.

Alleged rape victim asked Knicks to mediate payment from Porzingis

The woman accusing Kristaps Porzingis of a brutal rape asked the Knicks in late October to help "mediate" a payment of \$68,000 she claimed the Latvian star contractually agreed to pay.

That was among the new details in an ESPN story based on emails, documents and text messages in the aftermath of the alleged rape nearly 14 months ago, which last week was reported by the woman to the NYPD.

Presented with her claims and photos of alleged injuries stemming from the rape, the

Knicks ultimately referred the woman to Porzingis' legal team. The team further washed its hands of the matter by trading Porzingis three months later to the Mavericks, and there's discrepancy over how much information they shared with Dallas.

Porzingis' lawyer, Roland G. Riopelle, claims the woman was/is attempting to extort his client, and had previously reported that to the FBI. Text messages from the woman to Porzingis suggest she was interested in continuing an intimate relationship after the alleged rape, according to ESPN. Some of the text messages to Porzingis

were "explicit" photos of herself. Others included Porzingis' invitation for the woman to come to his apartment the night of the alleged incident.

In her email to the Knicks from October, the woman wrote that Porzingis agreed to contribute to her brother's college tuition after "the extremely aggressive encounter." The woman also wrote she did not want Porzingis in legal trouble because she's a Knicks fan.

"After the extremely aggressive encounter, he was very apologetic, loving and caring ... hence the offer he made to pay my bro's tuition and more," she wrote in

the email obtained by ESPN. "Although how he treated me was horrendous, as a Knicks fan, I do not want him to get in any trouble with the law. I stayed back and enjoyed the rest of my time with him. It's crucial to note the fun times I had with him doesn't negate the fact that he offered to compensate me as a soothing gift even though I didn't ask him to."

The alleged incident occurred in February of last year, just hours after Porzingis tore his ACL at Madison Square Garden. She wrote to the Knicks that she paid \$10,000 for corrective surgery because of her injuries and supplied photos that she

said showed hair loss and broken nose cartilage. She also asked the Knicks to help her retrieve her "favorite" sandals that were left inside Porzingis' apartment.

About five months after emailing the Knicks, she reportedly told police that Porzingis punched her in the face and called her an expletive and "my slave." The woman is black and from Nigeria.

ESPN also obtained a handwritten letter that the woman describes as an agreement with Porzingis for payment of \$68,000. Porzingis' name is misspelled as "Kristap" instead of "Kristaps" in the letter. His lawyer said Porzingis' signature is

forged. The Knicks traded Porzingis to the Mavericks and cited his desire to leave the organization as the overriding reason. According to the Dallas Morning News, the Knicks told the Mavericks only about the extortion case, not the alleged rape.

The NBA is aware of the situation, and the Player's Union backed Porzingis in a statement Sunday.

"We have been aware of these allegations for some time, have evaluated the accuser's claims and, based on what is presently before us, stand with Kristaps," NBPA president Michele Roberts said.

Top-seed Baylor routs Iowa 85-53 to cruise to Final Four

Lauren Cox had 22 points and 11 rebounds, and Baylor earned its first Final Four berth since 2012

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Lauren Cox had 22 points and 11 rebounds, and Baylor earned its first Final Four berth since 2012 by beating Iowa 85-53 on Monday night in the Greensboro Regional final.

Didi Richards added 16 points and 10 rebounds, Chloe Jackson had 14 points and the Bears (35-1) — the top overall seed — won their 27th straight game by shooting 53%, clamping down on All-American Megan Gustafson and her supporting cast and holding the nation's best shooting team to a season-worst 32%.

Now it's on to Tampa, Florida, for the school's fourth Final Four and its first in seven years — when the Bears won their second national championship.

The 6-foot-4 Cox — a third-team AP All-America pick — and fellow twin tower Kalani

Brown, a 6-7 second-team All-American, teamed up to dominate both the glass and the heavily-hyped matchup with Gustafson, the nation's leading scorer at 27.9 points per game.

Brown finished with 14 points, and Baylor held a 47-26 rebounding advantage with 20 second-chance points to six for Iowa.

Gustafson finished

with 23 points on 9-of-17 shooting, but was held without a rebound in the second half for second-seeded Iowa (29-7). Kathleen Doyle and Tania Davis each had 10 points.

The Bears — who entered allowing their opponents to shoot a Division I-worst 31.4% — held Iowa way below its previous worst of 41.1% at Purdue on Jan. 10.



Boogity! Boogity! Boogity! Fox Sports needs a change

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Darrell Waltrip will soon “Boogity! Boogity! Boogity!” his way into retirement.

It's time. And time for Fox Sports to look at deeper changes in its NASCAR television broadcast, too.

Everyone yearns for an opportunity to say farewell on their own terms. Waltrip has that chance now to bring his second career as a NASCAR broadcaster to a close and squeeze out his classic catchphrase as Fox Sports' portion of the NASCAR schedule wraps up in June.

NASCAR fans have demanded change in nearly every area of the sport, yet one area tiptoed around for some reason is the cracker-barrel, down-home broadcast Fox gives its audience for its coverage of the elite Cup Series. The 1-2 punch of Waltrip and Mike Joy spend too much time spinning yarns from the good 'ol days while relative newcomer Jeff Gordon awkwardly guffaws along with the gang.

The carnival-like yukfest in the booth is stale, the compone of it all only magnified since the network began using current drivers in its coverage of the Xfinity Series. Kevin Harvick, Brad Keselowski and others have proven that by simply talking about the action in front of their eyes they can

deliver an informative and entertaining program void of back-slapping tales and quips that consistently fall flat.

Waltrip has hinted this could be his last season in the booth, ending a broadcast career that began with the 2001 Daytona 500 and Fox Sports' heralded acquisition of a slice of NASCAR's TV rights. He was in tears when brother Michael won the race at about the same time Dale Earnhardt was killed in a fatal crash elsewhere on the track.

“Mikey! Alright!” he cried. Then Waltrip looked at Earnhardt's wreck. “How 'bout, Dale? Is he OK?”

It was an historic moment, but in the years since, Waltrip has become a caricature of himself and the malapropisms and mistakes have only heightened the urgency for fresh voices. He also helped land a TV spot for his younger brother, who also has an over-the-top, aw-shucks persona.

The Hall of Fame driver conceded in a January response to a Twitter user that his final race could be on the horizon.

Waltrip acknowledged Fox Sports had assembled “an amazing group of young and enthusiastic” talent in his tweet, “but they still need ‘old guy’ wisdom, I'm happy to say that for another year that ‘old guy’ will be me!”

With 11 Cup races remaining in the network's coverage this season, there has been

speculation Waltrip would announce his retirement as early as this weekend at Bristol Motor Speedway. The talk was so loud last week — with the assumption that Harvick is in line to replace Waltrip in the booth — that both the 2014 champ and his manager both insisted Harvick will still drive for Stewart-Haas Racing next season.

Fox Sports said no announcement regarding its talent was currently scheduled.

Waltrip should go ahead and make his plans known.

He is one of NASCAR's storied characters, one of the first to build a brand around his supersized personality, and he parlayed it into a lifetime as one of the sport's strongest ambassadors. But active as he is on social media, there is no way he has missed the overwhelming criticism directed his way over the past several days in particular. He seemed a bit muted Sunday at Texas Motor Speedway, and seemed slow to utter his “Boogity! Boogity! Boogity! Let's go racing, boys!” call to open the race.

While Waltrip and Joy have been picked apart by those unhappy with the broadcast, Gordon has been trapped since his 2016 debut. The booth is not big enough for the two veteran egos and Gordon, the guy Hall of Famer who was supposed to be NASCAR's version of the athlete-turned-broadcast-

er that Tony Romo has become for CBS Sports.

Still trying to shoehorn his way in while being respectful to his elders, Gordon has had to learn to insert his opinion and, well, correct Joy and Waltrip. Dale Earnhardt Jr., meanwhile, was an instant hit with his exclamations of “Slidejob!” for rival NBC Sports.

Fox Sports, like everything else in NASCAR, needs a change and the first will likely be Waltrip making the biggest call of his 19-season TV career — that it is time to hit the road. He is 70 years old and has always been a central figure in the weekly touring show. He made his debut in 1975 and has been part of NASCAR's road show ever since. He has seen it all, from the lean early days to NASCAR's popularity boom to its current fight to stay relevant.

Retirement has never been his strong suit, though, and Waltrip hung around as a driver when his best days were long behind him. He won 84 races and three Cup titles, but was simply turning laps at the end of his career. It was more of a celebrity-style goodbye tour anyway: The Fox deal was waiting for him and he went from the race car to the booth without a break.

But that was 2001, and the modern fan NASCAR is chasing to watch on TV or on their devices has little connection to a driver who made his last Cup start

when today's budding stars like William Byron were still toddlers.

Fox Sports has groomed drivers like Harvick to become broadcasters down the road and has used Bobby Labonte, Regan Smith and new hire Jamie McMurray heavily on race day. The network grabbed analyst Ricky Craven and newshound Bob Pockrass when ESPN pulled out of NASCAR this season, and strengthened its commitment to the sport by investing in a state-of-the-art virtual studio set in Charlotte. Fox's resources are deep, the pit reporting team is knowledgeable and Larry McReynolds has found a new role since Gordon replaced him in the booth.

Harvick is under contract to drive through

next season. But Fox Sports should not wait to address its booth until Harvick or crew chief Chad Knaus or whomever is ready. The three-man booth has become passe and there are better ways to utilize the talent Fox Sports already has to freshen up the broadcast.

The sooner Fox Sports and Waltrip acknowledge change is coming, the better it will be for the network and its star broadcaster. Fox can begin experimenting on how to approach next season, and Waltrip can make one more farewell tour that honors his lifetime commitment and contributions to NASCAR. He can look forward to retirement as a NASCAR dignitary.

He can also skip the Monday morning reviews.



