EVICTIION OF STRIKERS HAS BEGUN

JUDGE HANAN OVERRULES MOTION TO QUASH INFORMATIONS

DE HAVILAND IN SQUADRON, FLYING TO DAVID, FALLS

CANNOT CALL GRAND JURY IS CLAIM

Continuation of Attorney MacIntyre's Argument for Quashing Motion Proves Futile for Dock Case Defense.

District Attorney Hindman Produces Precedent for Arrest of Theft Suspects on His Information.

COLON, Feb. 26. The argument continued today on the motion introduced last week by Attorney MacIntyre to quash the informations filed in the dock theft cases proved futile for Judge Hanan held that under the present law he had no right to call a grand jury and overruled the motion following remarks by both Attorney MacIntyre and District Attorney Hindman. Either the Motta or Saunders case will come up for trial next Thursday, it is announced.

Pointed to Commissions. Attorney MacIntyre, in support of his contention that the constitution and the procedure thereunder were applicable on the Canal Zone, dwelt at length on the commissions issued to the district judge and district attorney, appointing them United States district judge and United States district attorney respectively, and he held that they could not act other than under the laws as laid down by the Constitution, and particularly by the fifth amendment which grants every individual the protection of grand jury indictment.

Wiped Out Old Laws. The passage of the Adamson bill, he contended, practically wiped out the old procedure and laws which provided for the bringing of informations, and also provided for officers for the court here under an entirely distinct designation, thus placing the procedure here under the judicial procedure in continental United States.

Trial Was Unconstitutional. It was unconstitutional in the United States, he said, to bring a person to trial on an information, and, therefore, he contended, Congress could not have passed an unconstitutional law when it passed the Adamson bill, by providing for the bringing of informations on the Canal Zone.

He insisted that the District Attorney was limited by the Constitution in that he could not prosecute an offender on information.

ADMIRAL WILSON AND OFFICERS TO HOLD RECEPTION ABOARD FLAGSHIP SATURDAY

CRISTOBAL, Feb. 26. The commander-in-chief and the officers of the United States Atlantic Fleet will be at home on the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, Admiral Wilson's flagship Saturday afternoon from 3 to 6 o'clock. Guests from the Pacific side will come over and return by special train. There will be dancing on board. The flagship will be berthed at Pier Six during the reception. Invitations issued are accompanied by a card which will provide the guests with transportation on the special trains from Panama to Colon and return and admittance to the flagship. The special for the fleet reception will leave Panama City at 12:30 and will stop at Balboa Heights, Corozal, Pedro Miguel and Galun, arriving in Cristobal at 4 o'clock. The train will leave on its return trip at 9 o'clock, arriving in Panama City at 10:30 after stopping at Pedro Miguel, Corozal and Balboa Heights.

SENATORS UP IN AIR OVER CHOICE OF COLBY

Democrats and Republicans Surprised by Wilson's Selection of Lane's Successor. Polk May Retire.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—President Wilson's selection of Colby to succeed Lansing has been received with unexpected surprise among the Democrats and Republicans in the Senate which will be called on to confirm his nomination. Some, however, are venturing any public expression as to whether the appointment will be confirmed. When Colby was nominated for membership on the shipping board his confirmation was accomplished only after a prolonged debate.

Treaty Fight Involved. The possibility that the Versailles treaty fight might have some bearing on the confirmation, developed from the fact that Colby recently speaking in favor of the League of Nations sharply criticized some of the Senators, particularly those irreconcilably opposed to the ratification of the treaty.

After Colby takes office, it is expected that Frank L. Polk, who has been acting as Secretary of State since Lansing's resignation, will carry out his intention of retiring from the State Department. Polk's health has not been good for more than a year and his physicians have advised him to take a long rest.

Two Important Jobs. Should Polk retire, two important posts in the State Department will be vacant, that of Under Secretary to which Polk was promoted several months ago, and that of Assistant Secretary which post is held by William Phillips, newly appointed United States Minister to the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

MAKES PEACE OVERTURES

LONDON, Feb. 26. The Russian commissary for foreign affairs has forwarded a note to the United States, Japan and Rumania offering the assistance of Soviet Russia in connection with a wireless dispatch from Moscow.

PREPARING FOR CRUISE

MADEIRA, Feb. 26. It is reported from this city that several Spanish warships are preparing for a long cruise which it is rumored is in connection with King Alfonso's proposed visit to South America.

HOUSE MILITARY BODY REVERSES ITS STAND ON MILITARY TRAINING

Order Favorable Report on Bill Without Recommendation on Regarding Universal Military Training

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. The military committee of the House of Representatives accepted the Republican House leaders' program to amend universal military training from the army recommendation bill and ordered a favorable report on the bill without a recommendation regarding military training. The committee's decision was the reversal of its action of last week when it voted in favor of universal military training as a part of the country's future military policy.

Central American Republics Planning Unified Government

Mexico City Newspaper Gives September 15, 1921 as Date of Merging Supported by Unionists.

EL PASO, Feb. 26. The Central American republics are planning to unite under one government beginning September 15, 1921, the centennial of their independence, according to a publication appearing in the Excelsior, of Mexico City. The newspaper says that the movement has been initiated by Salvador and nurtured by the great unionist party. The chief opposition is reported to come from President Cabrera of Guatemala who is reported to contend that the party is composed entirely of reactionaries.

The Excelsior adds that a number of Guatemalans have been arrested in connection with this plan and that the political situation in Guatemala consequently is in a ferment.

GHOUL'S ROB COFFIN

BERLIN, Feb. 25. Burglars rifled the mausoleum at Charlottenburg Castle, Sunday. They forced the lid and removed the jewels from Queen Louise's coffin. They failed to open other coffins but removed the gold, silver and jeweled crowns lying on the coffins of Emperor William I, Empress Augusta, Prince Albrecht and Princess Luhrwitz.

SEEK ONE DAY REST

PARIS, Feb. 26. The press reported that when enforcing the law requesting one day rest weekly for employees he also forbade the sale of daily newspapers from Sunday noon to Monday noon.

DUO OF AIRMEN LOSE LIVES IN CRASH

Lieutenant Foreman, Army Air Pilot, is Killed Instantly at Aguadulce When Aircraft Falls. Lieutenant Vaughn, Naval Observer, Dies Hour Later. Plane Was of Squadron Flying to David.

Lieutenant Vaughn, Naval Observer, died at 11 o'clock Sunday at Aguadulce, a few hours after the crash of the plane in which he was flying to David. The plane crashed at 8 o'clock Sunday.

The plane left Colon Sunday morning passing over Capone at 7:45, leaving at 7:55 San Carlos at 7:55, and at 8:05 arriving in Aguadulce at 8 o'clock.

Stopped at Aguadulce. The mechanics stopped in Aguadulce for an hour and a half, trying to assemble and leaving at 9:30. Five of the planes left first in battle formation and after the remaining five had reached an altitude of five hundred feet Lieutenant Foreman's machine plunged to the ground.

Foreman Instantly Killed. Lieutenant Foreman was instantly killed and Lieutenant Vaughn mortally wounded. He died at 10:40 o'clock an hour and eighteen minutes later.

The five machines that left first continued the voyage, unaware of the accident. Two of the planes composing the last squadron returned to ground after the accident while the other two proceeded to Colon for medical assistance.

Five Continued Flight. The five planes that went on to David passed over Santiago at 9:50, La Mesa at 9:55, Las Palmas at 10:00, Santa at 10:05, Tole at 10:20, Remedios at 10:30 and Horcones at 10:40, arriving in David at 11 o'clock.

They will return to France Field today leaving David at 5 o'clock this morning. The machine which crashed was the A. S. 2539, in command of Lieut. Foreman of the army aviation at France Field as pilot with Lieutenant Vaughn of the navy as observer.

Minister Prier Wires. Minister Prier upon being notified of the accident sent the following telegram: "American Aviators, Aguadulce: My sincerest sympathy over sad death of two of your comrades. I am at your command, W. J. Prier."

Head Submarine at Once. A submarine was immediately sent to Aguadulce from Balboa and will bring back the bodies of the unfortunate aviators this morning.

Disposition of the remains will be decided on after hearing from the aviators' families in the States. Received by France. Lieutenant Foreman attended the ground school at Princeton university.

SPANISH PAPER PRINTS ANTI-AMERICAN ATTACK

MADEIRA, Feb. 26. The news paper, La Correspondencia, bitterly attacks the American invasion of Spain, saying that during the war Spain was obliged to use many American goods and adopted many American habits which were however, no longer necessary.

It continues saying "Spain must stick to Europe and Central and South America, leaving America severely alone. The United States never did anything for Spain and she should not steal our colonies."

IRRECONCILABLES LAUNCH NEW BROADSIDE

Verbalities Part Characterized as Instrument of Hate and Destruction by Senator France.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. Another broadside denunciation was launched by the irreconcilable opponents of the Versailles Treaty this afternoon when the Senate took up the document under the agreement to keep it constantly under consideration until it has been disposed of.

Opened Debate. Senator France of the Republicans and Reed of the Democrats opened the debate for the irreconcilables.

France characterized the treaty as an instrument of hate and destruction while Reed termed it "the serpent of Poison."

Pass Over Article 10. The debate began after the Senate voted with only a few scattering noes to pass over Article 10 until action was taken on all the other proposed reservations.

Senator France formally presenting his resolution for a declaration that the Peace reservation discussion had descended to "sophistry and mere quibbling over language" declared that none of the reservations proposed by the Republican and Democrats would materially modify the League of Nations.

By a virtually unanimous vote the Senate this evening re-adopted the Republican Peace Treaty reservation relating to the mandates after Democratic leader Hitchcock announced that the Administration forces were not opposed.

SUGAR STRIKE ENDS

KAN JEAN, Feb. 26. The police report that the strike among the sugar workers has virtually ended with all but two centrals working at full time. In many places the wages of the workers have been doubled.

The sugarmen estimate the loss from the strike at from fifteen to twenty million dollars.

PEACE OFFER NOT RECEIVED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. The State Department has not yet received the Russian Soviet peace proposals. Officials are at a loss to understand the reason why this latest offer is made to America associated with Japan and Rumania.

OPERATION OF GOVERNOR HARDING'S ULTIMATUM CAUSES FEW DESERTIONS

Governor Quashes Report He Has Agreed to Two and a Half Cent Hourly Increase to Settle Strike. Strikers Claim They Have Made No Compromise Offers and Adhere to Original Demand of Seven Cent Hourly Raise. Stoute Says Strikers' Lawyers are to Fight Eviction.

Governor Harding's ultimatum issued Tuesday to the strikers that, unless they returned to their places Thursday they not only would lose their positions and quarters but also that after the strike is over or when they report for work they will be paid a lower wage than they were receiving yesterday, incredibly and efficiently.

Police Entered La Boca. Squads of police men, accompanied by chain officers entered La Boca yesterday morning and requested occupants of government quarters to vacate them by four o'clock in the afternoon.

A detachment of troops with bayonets fixed, was stationed near the Balboa cooling plant, on the quays for the first sign of riot. Evicted Bachelors At Once. Bachelors were evicted at once and many families refused to leave when informed that the governor's notice to the striking silver employees was in effect.

Last evening it was reported that about fifty families had quitted the quarters and were standing guard over their possessions in the streets.

Claim Few Desertions. The strikers claim that few have left their ranks as the result of the governor's order but announce that on the contrary more have joined them because of it.

Canal officials yesterday admitted that the crowds into the numbers of the strikers through operations of the gubernatorial edict were light.

Stoute, the strikers' general chairman, is jubilant over the present state of affairs.

Failed To Have Effect. "The governor's ultimatum failed to have any effect on our ranks," he stated last night in a communique.

Will Discuss Situation. It is understood that certain phases of the strike situation will be considered by the executive board. It is also assumed that similar discussion will take place at the regular meeting of the central labor union this Saturday at Balboa.

As J. H. Stevenson will report for the committee recently returned from Washington, at this meeting, and as the annual election of officers for the central body will also take place at this meeting, consideration of the effects of the strike will take place.

Following the meeting of the central labor union, and that of the metal trades council this Sunday the labor officials will probably speak more freely on the subject of the present difficulty.

HERBERT HOOVER SPEAKS

WE HAVE mentioned the possibility of Herbert Hoover being a candidate for President of the United States, therefore, the following statement from him will be of interest to our readers:

In order to answer a large number of questions all at once, let me emphasize that I have taken a day off from the industrial conference in Washington to come to New York solely to attend to pressing matters in connection with the children's relief. I want to say again I have not sought and am not seeking the Presidency. I am not a candidate. I have no organization. No one is authorized to speak for me politically.

As an American citizen by birth and of long ancestry, I am naturally deeply interested in the present critical situation. My sincere and only political desire is that one or both of the great political parties will approach the vital issues which have grown out of the war and are now with a clear purpose looking to the welfare of our people, and that candidates, capable of carrying out this work should be nominated.

If the treaty goes over to the Presidential election with any reservations necessary to clarify the world's mind that there can be no infringement of the safeguards provided by our Constitution and our Nation-old traditions then I must vote for the party that stands for the League. With it there is hope not only of the prevention of war but also that we can safely economize in military policies. There is hope of earlier return of confidence and the economic reconstruction of the world.

I could not vote with a party if it were dominated by groups who seek to set aside our constitutional guarantees for free speech or free representation, who hope to re-establish control of the Government for profit and privilege. I could not vote with a party if it were dominated by groups who hope for any form of Socialism, whether it be nationalization of industry or other destruction of individual initiative. Both of these extremes, camouflaged or open, are active enough in the country today. Neither of these dominations would enable those constructive economic policies that will get us down from the unsound economic practices which of necessity grew out of the war, nor would they secure the good will to production in our farmers and workers or maintain the initiative of our business men. The issues look forward, not back.

I do not believe in more than two great parties; otherwise combinations of groups could, as in Europe, create a danger of minority rule. I do believe in party organization to support great ideals and to carry great issues and consistent policies. Nor can any one man dictate the issues of great parties. It appears to me that the hope of a great majority of our citizens in confronting this new period in American life is that the great parties will take positive stands on the many issues that confront us, and will select men whose character and associations will guarantee their pledges.

I am being urged by people in both parties to declare my allegiance to either one or the other. Those who know me know that I am able to make up my mind when a subject is clearly defined. Consequently, until it more definitely appears what party managers stand for, I must exercise a prerogative of American citizenship and decline to pledge my vote blindfold.

I am not unappreciative of the many kind things that my friends have advanced on my behalf. Yet I hope they will realize my sincerity in not tying myself to undefined partisanship.

EVARTON OF STRIKERS

Stoute issued the following statement from his Colon headquarters last night:

Situation is Excellent—

"The situation yesterday was excellent. Very few men were seen in the streets. The men from the camp got two meals a day, a loaf of bread and cigarettes at the strikers' kitchen. Last night our own bakery provided 3,000 loaves. Our laundresses are taken care of in a manner satisfactory to them. Those who work in the gold quarters walked out yesterday. We are keeping Colon clean, and free of charge.

Failed to Have Effect—

"The Governor's ultimatum failed to have any effect upon our ranks. Six silver employees under supervision of some Canal officials were busy ejecting tenants at Camp Bird, especially those who work at the cooling plant, meanwhile the ships are being held up through lack of labor. Our lawyers are in control of the situation and hope to offset the government's unjust act.

Claim Docks Fail to Function—

"It takes about three thousand seasoned men to run the docks during normal times; you can imagine the amount of work done by the three hundred new men reported to have been brought from the interior. Those who can go on the docks without getting arrested state that there are less than 200 men at work.

Arrested School Teacher—

"Teacher Parker was yesterday arrested by Canal Zone Policemen. The officer apologized after finding out that the man arrested was not Teacher Stoute. Comrades continue to be orderly and law-abiding. The crisis is passed. Our numbers are steadily increasing. Gold employees will not be content very long to push trucks and handle coal. At Colon there are but ten men at work. They are all members of the brotherhood. W. Stoute, General Chairman.

Arrested Strikers Worker

The strikers report that one of their workers, a man by the name of Donoway, was arrested at Paraiso yesterday as he was distributing hand-bills and held under \$1,200 by Judge Blackburn on the charge of restraining men from going to work.

and authority to try a man for an infamous crime on information filed by the district attorney. His answer to that question was that the court has such right and authority.

Not in Force Here

The constitution of the United States, he said, does not extend to the territorial and other possessions of the United States unless Congress expressly extends it, and that in the case of the Canal Zone, there is nowhere to be found even the slightest indication in an enactment of Congress that the constitution had been extended to the Zone.

The fact of the president signing the commissions of the District Judge and the District Attorney as United States officials could not possibly extend the Constitution here as it would be assumed to presume that the president could assume to himself the authority and power of extending the Constitution to a given territory or possession as that power rested alone in Congress.

Is Not Applicable

Since the constitution, he said, had not been extended to the Zone, the 14th Amendment to the constitution, the grand jury clause, was not applicable to the Zone. The provision of the bill of rights, he contended, protected the individual, and which he had a right to invoke in his favor, only as long as he remained under the protection of the constitution, or, in other words, where the constitution was applicable.

Has Been Alred Before

This question as to whether individuals outside of continental United States were entitled to all the rights granted under the constitution, has, he said, been before the supreme court of the United States a dozen times and there is not a single instance where the supreme court has held that the constitution of the United States is ap-

licable to the territories, or possessions of the United States unless it is made expressly applicable.

Chief Porto Rican Case

He cited a case where, after the Porto Ricans had lost their citizenship, the matter of a constitutional right was carried to the U. S. supreme court, and that court, in ruling on the question stated that because the Jones act had not so many words specifically extend the Constitution to Porto Rico, the Constitution was not applicable there, even though the defendants were American citizens of the United States.

The ship crashed to earth after being because of igniting of the motor to act as the ship was leaving the field it is thought.

The two planes have returned to company and the ill-fated De Havilland two early this afternoon and the other two had before 10 o'clock today.

Castle Great Unknown

The accident has cast a gloom over the entire Atlantic side especially at France Field where Lieutenant Foreman was stationed and at Coco Solo where Lieutenant Vaughn was flying.

Lieutenant Vaughn was 27 years of age. He is survived by wife and two little children.

He has been at France Field for the past 18 months. A good baseball player, he has played for the navy wherever he has been stationed.

Lieutenant Foreman is 24 years of age and unmarried.

FIRST JEWISH SHIP LAUNCHED

Owned by Jews, Manned by Them, and Flies the Jewish Flag—Merchant Marine Plan.

Palestine's future merchant marine, for which engineers of the Zionist Organization of America plan an ultimate appropriation of \$10,000,000, got its start recently when the first Jewish vessel, the Mediterranean, owned by Jews, manned by Jews and flying the Jewish flag, was launched at Jaffa. As the blue-white flag of Zion flew up the mast, two Italian warships in the harbor gave official recognition to the Jewish colors by saluting them, according to a report of the launching received by the Zionist Organization of America.

Former German Ship

The vessel, a former German craft, was purchased by Jews along the Palestine coast, making the ports of Beirut, Tyre, Haifa, Jaffa, Gaza and several ports in Egypt. It was named Be-Hahemah, the Prophet.

Permission was received from the British government, a vesting to the Jewish colors. The wife of Major John English, commander at Jaffa, hoisted the flag and launched the boat, expressing the hope that next year the Jewish people might possess a large merchant marine in the Mediterranean.

Conducting Campaign

Palestine is being worked in conjunction with better improvements at Haifa by Zionist engineers, who plan, through the \$10,000,000 Palestine restoration fund campaign, being conducted throughout the country this year, to convert Haifa into the leading harbor and most important city of the entire near east, whose commercial and maritime prosperity will be carried on through a Jewish fleet of merchantmen.

NEARLY A THOUSAND SILVER EMPLOYEES EVICTED FROM CAMP BIARD QUARTERS.

Chief Quartermaster R. K. Morris Aided by District Quartermaster J. M. King, Inspector of Police Arthur Kennedy and Captain L. Calloway. Was in Charge of Work of Eviction. Total Evicted Announced as 923 and 127 Silver Employees Remain in Quarters. Colon Real Estate Agents Claim scant Accommodations in City.

CRISTOBAL, Feb. 26. A one hundred and twenty-three silver employees of the canal and railroad, who were not working, were evicted from their quarters at Camp Biard this afternoon. There were 427 employees left in quarters of which 330 were living in the recently constructed large building on the Mount Hope road and 97 employees in quarters in Camp Biard and Mount Hope.

A number of employees who have had quarters before, but who have been living in Colon together with many who had come across from Panama to work were living in the vacant buildings.

Chief Quartermaster R. K. Morris was in charge of the work of eviction. District Quartermaster J. M. King, Inspector of Police Arthur Kennedy and Captain L. Calloway with a number of gold employees of the district quartermaster's office and police officers were on duty during the day at Camp Biard.

Give Every Opportunity

"We have given our silver employees every opportunity," said District Quartermaster King. "Tuesday evening I personally distributed to every employee on the silver list with quarters a copy of Governor Harding's circular and today we have given them a chance at least an hour's notice.

"The bulk of them have made no effort to move and are in full sympathy with the strike. In each case we have to place their belongings out on the road or on the grass plot adjoining.

Many Ten Year Tenants

"In a good many cases," said Inspector Kennedy, "these people have been in the same quarters for ten years, but every opportunity

CITY PREPARES TO CELEBRATE JULY FOURTH

COLON, Feb. 26. The Welfare Association will meet at the Masonic Temple Friday evening to organize a July Fourth celebration. Among the business to be transacted is the election of officers for the year, which is to end September 1.

A committee will be appointed to make arrangements for a Fourth of July celebration on the Atlantic side. This suggestion, made Friday, has met with universal approval among the Americans in both cities, and it is anticipated that the ever glorious Fourth this year will be the largest yet celebrated outside of the United States.

The Cristobal docks lend themselves for a gala aquatic event and it is proposed to include in the program a big swimming and diving contest.

Governor Harding to Make Address

It is proposed to invite Governor Harding to make the Fourth of July address and the American minister, the Hon. W. J. Price to read the Declaration of Independence. Subscriptions lists will be opened all down the line and a series of special trains will run throughout the day from Balboa and Panama and out to the Atlantic terminals.

Feeling an American business man in Colon is that this year the Fourth should be held on this side. They are always holding it in Balboa which should never have been selected as the Canal Zone capital in the first place," said a prominent local merchant today.

Grand Display of Fireworks

During the war fireworks taken over on the grounds of economy at this year it is proposed to hold the largest display ever seen on the Isthmus. The set pieces will probably show the wonderful possibilities of Colon and the port of Cristobal, or, perhaps, Columbus landing at Colon near old Pier Two. In any event the display will be one to be long remembered.

Base Ball Stadium

All the ball park today the talk was chiefly of the new concrete stadium which it was freely stated that Colon must have erected before another season. The diamond is admitted to be the best on the Isthmus. It is kept well and the huge score board is by far the largest one down here, but what is wanted to complete the park is a huge stadium and the fans feel that they have been slighted, although after the enthusiasm Friday's meeting they felt more confident that the project will be well over soon.

Colon Sails Saturday

The bulk of the cargo has been placed on the Colon Mail ship and the ship sailed for New York direct Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Men were busy at all parts of the dock today and it was stated that over 400 of them were working. They are mostly Panamanians.

DR. PORRAS SAILS FOR COSTA RICA

With Mrs. Porras and Family, Ex-President Leaves on Zaapca for Month's Visit in San Jose. Large Number Present on Pier to Wish Departing Statesman An Revolt.

COLON, Feb. 25. Dr. and Mrs. Belisario Porras with their children Camilo, Rodrigo and Isabel, sailed this afternoon on the Zaapca for Port Limon and will be away for one month to be spent with Mrs. Porras's family in San Jose.

The ex-president and his charming wife were both looking well and seemed to be looking forward to their trip to Costa Rica. They arrived with a party of friends on the waiting room of the Republic of Panama on the pier from the Canal station and were met at Colon station by Don Witten Arana, governor of the province of Abasco, Hoyo and a number of friends.

Lunched at Imperial

The party took lunch at the New Grand Imperial Hotel and afterwards Governor Arana took his guests down to the boat in his car, where a host of officials and others were waiting on Pier Eight to bid bon voyage to their distinguished countryman.

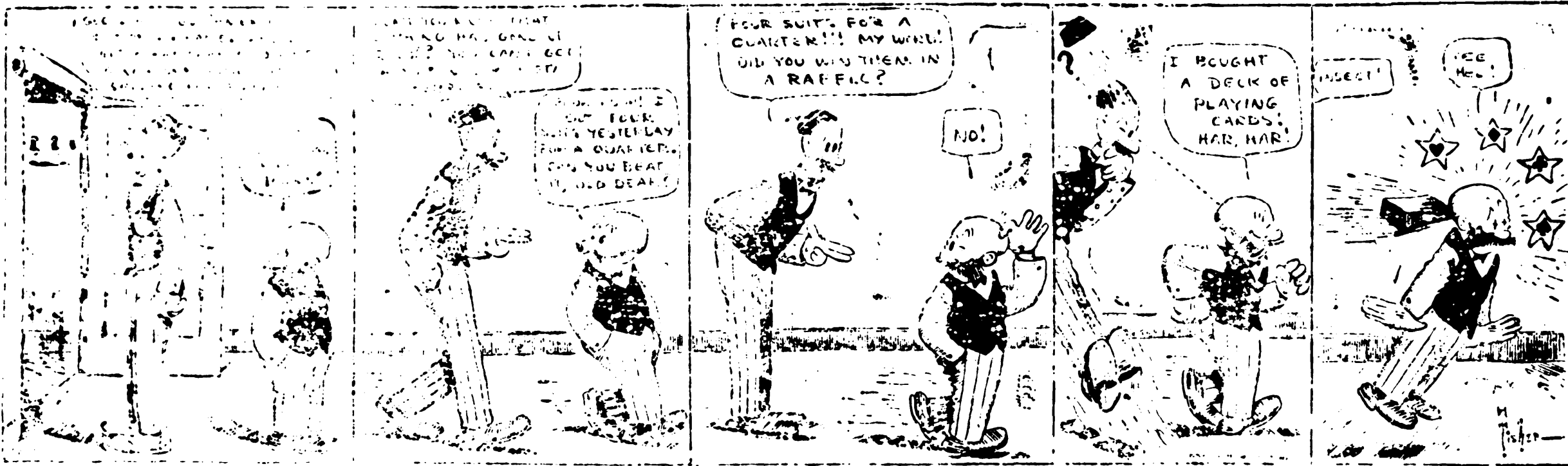

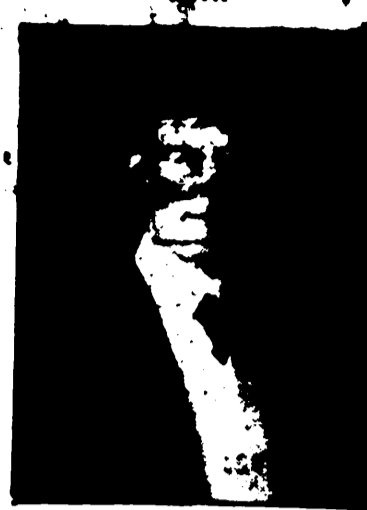

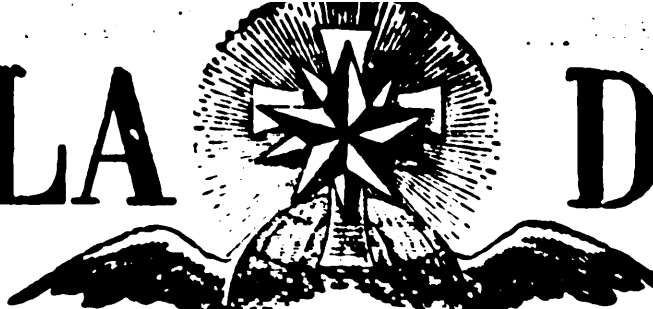
