SENATE FAILS TO REPASS THE SOLDIERS BONUS BILL OVER PRESIDENTIAL VETO

President's Disapproval Overridden In House By Vote of 258 Against 54 But Senate's Vote Did Not Meet Required Two-Thirds Majority—House Passes Resolution Favoring "Sine Die" Adjournment Tomorrow—Harding Would Call Special Session November 15

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The soldiers bonus bill was defeated in the Senate this evening by a vote of 11 against 28, the ballot failing to show the two-thirds majority necessary to override President Harding's veto.

The House of Representatives earlier in the day passed the bill over President Harding's veto with a vote of 258 against 54.

MANILA, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Serious damage is believed to have resulted from a typhoon which has been sweeping the Philippines for the last thirty-six hours. All telegraph wires are down and no details have been received.

J. C. SEARCEY TO WORK FOR LOCAL CINEMA COMPANY

Will Tour Central America In Interest of Cinema Pan-Americano To Introduce Goldwyn and Other Big Producers' Pictures

J. C. Searcey, for the past eight years in charge of the ten Panama Canal Club use theatres, will join the Cinema Pan Americano on November 1, as special representative of the big exportation and foreign distributing department of this old established corporation which was recently appointed special agent for the Goldwyn Company and is numbered among the biggest distributors of Paramount, First National, United Artists and other of the bigger companies in Latin America.

Mr. Searcey, early in November will proceed to Costa Rica and will take with him "Madam X," "Earthbound," "Prisoners of Love" and "Hoodless Mith," the great Audrey Munson picture. From Costa Rica he will visit Guatemala, Nicaragua, Salvador, Honduras, British Honduras and later Jamaica and Colombia and will be fully empowered to appoint agents and sign contracts.

All pictures handled will have both Spanish and English titles and none but the biggest States attractions will be distributed. Mr. Searcey is particularly optimistic regarding the results of his proposed tour of the Central American countries as it means that he will be offering to the local managers of these countries the output of half a dozen of the biggest concerns in the trade, the real cream of the moving picture business and one contract will cover the entire exchange.

NEW BOXING COM. INSTALLED BY COUNCIL

Don Ernesto Guardia Will Preside Commission As Chairman—Doc. Vasquez Appointed Official Referee and I. J. Hayward Timekeeper

The Municipal Council officially installed the new Boxing Commission last night. Dr. J. J. Vallarino, J. J. Hayward, Captain Patterson, Ernesto de la Guardia and Nicomedes de la Guardia compose the new body, and all were present except Mr. de la Guardia who was elected president, while Dr. Vallarino was elected vice-president.

Auxiliary members are Dr. Alejandro Vasquez, official referee with the privilege of naming his alternate; Dr. Ernesto Zubista, official medical examiner; and I. J. Hayward, member of the commission. Don Ernesto Guardia, Mayor Jose Diez was unanimously named official stake holder. Cristobal Rodriguez, Secretary of the Municipal Council will act as secretary for the commission.

Conditions For Exhibitions

Boxing permits must be requested of the secretary before 8:30 in the evening of every Wednesday. The principals must be provided with medical and training certificates before they will be permitted to appear in a public exhibition.

When these requirements are fulfilled the secretary will, with the knowledge and consent of the commission, issue the corresponding permit.

All Passes Cancelled

All free passes heretofore issued are cancelled. Those are the well known white cards. The secretary has been directed to have others printed bearing the same wording on a differently colored card. As soon as the new passes are printed they will be issued to the interested.

Capt. Andres Charges Officer Benz With Speeding.

More or less interest will be centered in the Municipal Court in Panama this Thursday afternoon, when the Benz-Andres case comes up for trial. It will await the arrival of Judge Wade from the Cristobal Court, who is to try the matter.

It may be remembered that on July 15 last, Zone policeman Benz, was riding a motorcycle along the road at Fort Clayton about 9 o'clock in the evening and collided with a machine driven by Capt. Andres. In the smash-up, Benz got the worst of it, for he received a compound fracture of the right leg below the knee and has been in Ancon hospital ever since. Andres was arrested and when tried before Judge Blackburn in the Panama court, was adjudged guilty and fined \$25.

He did not fancy this much and accordingly appealed the case and a few days later went into court and asked for a cross warrant for Officer Benz for carrying the speed limit. This is the case that is to come up this afternoon and as Judge Blackburn heard and tried the former case he thought probably that he might be disqualified in the new case so he said that Judge Wade be requested to try this new action.

BOLIVIA WOULD REVISE PACT WITH CHILE

Bolivian Delegate In Letter To League Assembly's Secretary Predicts Grave Difficulties If Issue Is Not Settled

GENEVA, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Doctor A. Gutierrez, the Bolivian delegate to the Assembly in a letter to the Secretary states that unforeseen circumstances prevented his attendance and added that Bolivia had been unable to reach an understanding with Chile by direct negotiation regarding the revision of the Treaty of 1904. He quoted the opinion of the President of Chile which Bolivia deemed made the negotiations impossible, and said: "In virtue of the promise in Doctor Edward's speech last year, Bolivia sent a mission by Santiago, but the envoy seeing its presence in Santiago, instead, asked to be recalled. It is obvious that an arrangement between Bolivia and Chile presents grave difficulties, unless the mediation of a power or the arbitration of the League of Nations can be secured."

The Chilean delegation's comment on the letter reviews the history of the case and reiterates the viewpoint of the delegation that a revision of the treaty is not within the competence of the League. It repeats its assurance that Chile will be glad to enter into direct negotiations to settle and harmonize the conflicting interests of the two countries.

RECIPROCAL REGISTRY FOR ST. TE ENGINEERS SOUGHT BY EXAMINERS

Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners Will Discuss Means For Permitting Engineers Greater Liberty in Practice

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—An arrangement between states which would permit an engineer registered in one state to practice in other states will be broached at a meeting of the Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners to be held here October 2, according to C. S. Hammett of Jacksonville, Fla., President of the council.

"A tentative plan will be submitted at the meeting," he continued, "whereby the several state boards can make the state laws operative for reciprocal registration without changing them."

The states represented in the council comprise Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming.

With the announcement of the meeting comes a statement from the office here of the American Association of Engineers that the committee on the classification of engineering positions has issued its first report. The committee, headed by A. R. McDaniel, educational specialist in the United States war department, is preparing an occupational index of engineering positions in the United States. Its program, according to the statement, includes the coding of questionnaires to at least fifty practicing engineers in each position to be studied, and criticism by members of the profession of preliminary specifications for publication.

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The country's railways are moving the largest volume of business in their history excepting in October, 1920. It was announced today, by the Association of Railway executives.

PEACE PARLEY IN 3 WEEKS PROPOSED

Definite Assurance Given At Allied Conference on Near East Problem In Paris Yesterday That There Will Be No War

PARIS, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Definite assurance that there would be no war in the Near East and the calling of a peace conference for the settlement of the Turkish problems, were the chief results of the meeting this afternoon between Poincare, Curzon and Stora.

The interested parties, including the representative of the Angora government will meet around the Peace table within the next three weeks probably in Rome or Vienna to replace the Sevres pact. Curzon, Poincare and Stora are in complete accord that there should be no further delay in settling the Near East problem. It is believed that Lord Curzon wishes to consult with Lloyd George on the French suggestion that the British troops in Cilicia withdraw to the European side of the straits on condition that the Turks formally guarantee that they will remain in Anatolia Turkey pending the peace conference.

It is believed that Lord Curzon informed Premier Poincare that the British Government will insist on the absolute freedom of the straits and will insure its freedom by the presence of a large fleet. He is said to have intimated that the British military effort would be confined to the navy, which gave the impression that the British troops in Chanak will be withdrawn.

Attack May Be Mounted In View of Fact That British Forces Have Not Yet Been Wholly Concentrated—British Forces Abandoned By French and Italians At Chanak Where Turks Are Already Reported To Have Forwarded British Outposts

BIG PINEAPPLE CARGO GOES THRU CANAL FROM HAWAII

CENTRAL, Sept. 20.—Eight thousand tons of pineapple from Honolulu arrived on the steamer Brewster City yesterday and have left again for shipment to Baltimore, Philadelphia, Canton and New York.

This is one of many recent shipments of Hawaiian pineapples that pass through the pine-rail hills of Panama to go to the States for packing and shipment to all parts of the world, where Panama can produce just as good pineapples and ships heavily any.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Kemalists are preparing to launch an attack for the possession of the straits, despite General Pelle's exhortations. They may attack before the end of the week, taking advantage of the fact that the British forces are not yet concentrated. The British forces are determined to make a stand no matter how formidable the Kemal army may be, and regardless whether or not France and Italy participate.

British Preparing

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Britain is mobilizing every available warship, man, horse, automobile, cannon and rifle within reach of the troubled zone in preparation to deal a tremendous blow on land and sea, if provoked by the Kemal army, which according to latest reports, is concentrating feverishly at Imdid and Chanak.

British Families Leaving

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Hundreds of British families are leaving the city for the interior. The Turkish army would declare war on the British if the latter attempted to interfere with the movement of Turkish troops across the straits toward Thrace.

All the British barracks in Constantinople have been evacuated and the troops are marching through the streets. British headquarters have ordered that the families of all British officers and soldiers prepare to embark tomorrow.

Nationalist troops are already reported to be massed at the edge of the neutral zone at Imdid and Chanak and skirmishes are reported to have already occurred between the Turkish advance patrols and the British outposts near the town of Chanak.

Civilians Warned To Leave

PARIS, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Times international correspondent says that the British headquarters in Chanak has advised all Christians, Moslems and Jewish civilians to clear out, for the reason that if the Kemal advance, the town may be looted.

French-Italians Withdraw

LONDON, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—It is official announced from Constantinople that the French have withdrawn their troops from Chanak, and that the Italians are also apparently withdrawing theirs, the British force alone remaining.

Kemal Gets Dispatch

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Kemal Assembly by an overwhelming majority today extended Mustafa Kemal's dictatorship and authorized the prosecution of the peace all the conditions prescribed national pact are fully satisfied.

Canal Zone Postage

The following notice to the New York Herald was published under the above heading and is reproduced for the benefit of our readers:

To the New York Herald: It is regrettable to you, editors of the New York Herald, that the Panama Herald would seem that in at least one particular these leaflets need revision, and this relates to the postal service.

It is probably not to most of our readers that the United States contributes to the Republic of Panama not only for use of the canal but also for the matter of postage, private property.

The postage stamps used on the Canal Zone are the same as those of the Panama Republic, and in fact their face value is returned and sold in the United States post office. The arrangement is a result of the agreement, but in any case it brings in a tidy revenue to the diminutive republic.

Those who live on the Zone are, therefore, experiencing a double trouble, they are paying postage to another nation and they are living on a part of the United States territory where United States stamps are worthless, and cannot be used for postage.

"THEY SAY"

How many times a day does
somebody come to you with a tale
about somebody else that is pre-
faced with the indefinite authority
of "they say." It may be something
scandalous and it may be true and
it may be a lie. It may be some-
thing that will injure the reputa-
tion of business of some innocent
person. It may do irreparable harm
to some innocent woman. Never-
theless it is peddled about on the
authority of "They say."

It is hard to tell just who "they
say" is, but generally speaking the
people who repeat the "They say"
stories are the "they says." Some
of them are original liars and others
simply take a lie and adorn it with
mendacious embroidery and give
the credit to "they say."

When the pernicious liars want to
put over a good one they quote old
reliable "they say," then the parrot
type of "they say," keep it going.
It goes from one "they say" to the
other until it is finally disproved
though that happens rarely, and
when it does happen the "They
says" never go back through the
unravelling process and correct the
wrong impressions. They keep still
because they are afraid that they
may be considered the original
"They say."

A lot of trouble and real suffer-
ing and pain could be avoided if
the "they say" habit could be broken
by exposure. That is the only
cure. The next time some one
comes to you with a tale that is
prefaced with a "they say" author-
ity, just ask the narrator who this
particular "they say" is. If you are
not told then ask if the particular
"they say" who volunteers the in-
formation is willing to accept re-
sponsibility for the truth of the
statement.

They say the "they says" are
very fearful of the acid test of
truth.

"KANSAS IDEA" ENDORSED

Wichita Beacon:
Another milestone has been passed
by the Kansas court of industrial
relations in its progress to-
ward national recognition. The
national commission for uniform
state laws, a group of the most able
lawyers of every state in the Union,
which meets yearly to discuss and
study laws that should be made
uniform throughout the nation, has
endorsed, unequivocally the idea
embodied in the Kansas court, and
has appointed a committee to draft
a bill to be presented to the Legis-
lature of every state in the Union
for adoption. This commission is a
body whose recommendations bear
the weight born of immense pre-
stige. No Legislature overlooks a re-
commendation made by this body,
no state government fails to inves-
tigate and to study a bill presented
by this organization for adoption.

States court of industrial relations

MY TRIP ABROAD

Part 2.

Our next visit was to the grave of Andrew Roosevelt. The spot where he fell is marked by a slab of marble upon which is carved his name and dates. His grave, very close by, is marked with a full length marble slab and a monument. The deep worn ruts through the meadows lead to this historical spot to a true testimonial to a young hero.

We were hurrying on our way to Rheims as it was beginning to rain and we were already late for dinner. To our great haste the chauffeur left his top cover on the road where he had stopped to put up the top. When we were on our way again we lost our rear right tire. This detained us a half hour longer and when we arrived in Rheims we were almost starved. After a wonderful continental dinner we went over to the cathedral which was in ruins for the most part. Everything is being done to save what remains of it. It is being repaired with new material. In front of the cathedral is the Maid of Orleans—Brave little Jeanne d'Arc sitting upright on her horse. It is a wonderful bronze statue; no wonder France is proud of it. During the war only six streets of Rheims were passable. Every night the French soldiers would make their way to this statue of Jeanne d'Arc. They always found her unharmed although many shot her flying by her during the day. They would raise their heads to the heavens and exclaim: "We will win! Our Jeanne d'Arc is still with us!" It was only during the last year of the war that she was packed up and moved to Paris for protection. The French knew that if she could be the first to be shot she would destroy the German. In front of an almost ruined cathedral!

While we were in the cathedral our guide was explaining the details and I was indeed how much of his story was imagination, an old Frenchman who claimed to have lived in Rheims through the entire siege, walked up to our guide and sarcastically remarked: "You had better tell that to King George. Evidently our guide was taken by an Englishman. And when French found out what a mistake he had made he wanted to kiss him. Fortunately the Germans did not completely destroy this wonderful cathedral. The Rose Window is gone, however, and many of the statues which adorn the portals.

Hill 108" was reached about 2 p.m. by good roads and a quarter of a mile walk up the hill. This is an important point as it was the front for four years. The earth about it is in a terrible condition, full of tunnels, trenches, and dugouts which also mischief, are easy to get into but hard to get out of. If our Halloga High School Building was round, instead of square, it would fit very neatly into one of the immense craters which is the result of a double mine explosion when the French and Germans were tunneling in to blow each other up. Both sides were successful. They had instruments that were supposed to help them locate their enemies underground, but sometimes their tunnels would come together and they would then fight it out.

From Hill 108" to the Arne River stretches a continuous line of trenches and barbed wire. The road over which we traveled was newly constructed and we could see the trenches on each side. The trenches had been filled in to make the road. Popples could be seen blooming everywhere in the fields which would remind one of spots of brilliant blood. I picked a few but found that they wilted immediately.

We made a short stop at Compeigne, where we saw the Chateau where Napoleon had brought his second wife, Marie of Austria. Here he built a grape arbor a mile long so his wife would not become lonely for her native land.

Our last stop was at Chatou at Compe at twilight; it was a most beautiful sight. In front of the Chateau was a statue of Compe. A moat surrounded the castle and in the park was a beautiful little pond where the swans were gracefully taking their Saturday night's bath on Sunday. We reached our hotel about eleven o'clock.

Description of Versailles

The central part of the chateau of Versailles owes its origin to Louis XIII, who used it for hunting in 1627. Later on Louis XIV, finding the place agreeable, decided to enlarge it in 1662. He spent 800,000,000 francs in new constructions without counting the unpaid labor of 30,000 villagers in May 1685.

The details of the expenditure were controlled by Colbert and after him by Louvois.

Among the many marvellous tales it may be mentioned the one given by the King in honor of Mlle de La Valliere and later one of Mlle de Montespan.

The yard of the castle was invaded during the night of the 15th of October by the people of Paris, who came for Louis XVI and his family and conducted them to Paris as hostages.

The transformation of the Palace of Versailles into a museum of Louis-Philippe's work. In the museum are found works from the greatest artists both ancient and modern.

The gardens of Versailles, designed at first by LeNôtre and later by LeNôtre and LeNôtre, were completed by LeNôtre under Louis XIV. These gardens are adorned by numerous groves of trees, ornamented fountains with many water jets and statues and vases. They are the most beautiful in the world.

Grand Trianon.
Trianon in the twelfth century was a village in the diocese of Chartres. Louis XIV. obtained possession of it in 1663. The church and houses have totally disappeared and the name alone survives. On the side a little castle was erected which took the name of China House. In 1676 the king had the present Trianon built on Mousard's place.

Little Trianon.
Louis XV. charged Gabriel with its construction and it was inaugurated by Mme. du Barry. After Louis XV's death Louis XVI gave the little castle and its dependencies to Marie Antoinette.

Los representantes que conferenciaron hoy con Lord Curzon y el Almirante Beatty por la Gran Bretaña, el Premier Poincaré por Francia, el Sr. Sforza por Italia, y M. Nincichich por Yugoslavia.

Se cree que Lord Curzon informó al Premier Poincaré que el Gobierno británico insistirá en la libertad de los Estrechos y asegura su libertad por la presencia de una gran flota. La mayoría en la Cámara para sobrepasar el veto fue abrumadora

Washington, Septiembre 20.—La carta referente a las relaciones chilenas bolivianas que fue presentada hoy a la Asamblea de la Liga de Naciones por el delegado boliviano Sr. Gutiérrez, ha llamado mucho la atención en los círculos diplomáticos locales, pero en la Embajada chilena en la ciudad de Viena han hecho declaración oficial sobre el asunto aunque se ha vuelto a confirmar la actitud de Chile y Bolivia y se deseara por completo el carácter de gravedad que se atribuye a la carta del señor Gutiérrez.

En círculos autorizados se dijo que nada podrá conducir a un caso belli y que las circunstancias actuales no presentan una amenaza inmediata.

Resolución aprobada

Roma, septiembre 20.— El Partido Católico italiano aprobó una resolución en la que dice que el Pacto de Locarno debe ser entregado a los turcos con una porción suficiente del interior para asegurar su vida política, militar y económica. También se dice que los delitos culturales, civiles y religiosos de la población cristiana de Bosnia por ilegales y la neutralidad de los Estrechos mantenida.

La resolución aboga por la intervención diplomática aliada con el fin de obtener para los griegos un armisticio con las condiciones más benignas posibles y por la convocatoria de una conferencia de paz en Viena. También se manifiesta el partido en desacuerdo con la acción de los británicos de instigar la intervención en los Balcanes.

Declarará la guerra a Inglaterra?

Constantinopla, Septiembre 20.—Mehdi Bey, representante nacional turco, informó hoy al congresista de la Asociación Pava que cree seguro que el ejército nacional turco le declare la guerra a los británicos si estos libran la intervención de manera que el cumplimiento de los términos del tratado de los Estrechos sea imposible.

Todos los cuarteles británicos en Constantinopla han sido evacuados y los turcos constantemente se movían de un lado a otro recorriendo las calles. El oficial general se retiró a las dependencias de los oficiales y soldados británicos que se preparan para cualquier eventualidad.

Las tropas nacionalistas turcas están ya concentradas a lo largo del límite de la zona neutral (Chanki) y se dice que ya ha habido escaramuzas entre las avanzadas turcas y las potencias británicas cerca del punto de Tehanak-Kalesu.

El momento actual de necesidad de la Secretaría de Fomento, si bien tenemos informes de que un caballero digno y de todo nuestro aprecio será nombrado en fecha próxima, creemos el más indicado para lanzar una idea que ha tiempo ha en nuestro cerebro y que significaría eficiencia en la labor nacional y al mismo tiempo ahorro de importancia para el Tesoro, hoy bien necesitado de ello.

(Sesión ordinaria del 20 de Sept. de 1922) (Presidencia del Diputado Julio J. Araúz)

Se lee el artículo 2o. y su parágrafo. Salazar propone un parágrafo adicional. Alvarado alega que primeramente debe discutirse el artículo. Vidal se acerca a la mesa del Presidente y manifiesta que se retira; que da su voto a todo proyecto de ley que se discuta.

Alvarado dice que la Ley original establece que los infractores se hacen acreedores a multas de B. 25.00 a B. 50.00 y a arrestos de 20 a 60 días; y modifica el artículo en el sentido de que las multas sean de B. 5.00 a B. 50.00 y los arrestos de 5 a 60 días; dice que modifica en tal sentido para darle mayor amplitud a la Ley.

Salazar lee artículos del Reglamento de la Cámara y dice que debe discutirse el parágrafo adicional que ha presentado antes de la modificación introducida al artículo por su colega Alvarado. Alvarado expresa que ha sido costumbre de la Cámara, como muestra de cortesía, dejar que el D. autor de un proyecto introduzca a este todas las modificaciones que a bien tenga, con preferencia a las de cualquiera otros; dice que desde el año 1910 a esta parte que ha venido ocupando curul en el salón en que se encuentra, es la primera vez que presencia un caso como este. Agrega que después de que él haya introducido su modificación el D. Salazar tendrá mucho campo de acción para proponer lo que a bien tenga.

Jurado considera que es antilógico, fuera de lugar, pasar a discutir el parágrafo introducido por Salazar; es de opinión que debe discutirse primeramente al art. Araúz se dirige al D. Salazar y le manifiesta que se ha dado preferencia al autor del proyecto. Se aprueba la modificación. Valdés submodifica artículo en el sentido de que los días de arresto a que se hacen acreedores los infractores de dicha Ley sean de 1 a 60. Dice que se debe tener en cuenta que al imponer estas multas y arrestos no se trata de ladrones sino simplemente de contrabandistas. Agrega que la imposición de esta Ley trae grandes beneficios al pueblo; considera justo un aumento de uno o más días para aquellos individuos que traen a territorio de la República cigarrillos, etc., estos individuos no son verdaderamente ladrones, dice. Herrera pide la palabra para proponer, pero desiste a ello. El artículo así modificado se aprueba. El Secretario da lectura al artículo siguiente del proyecto.

Alvarado explica a la (Cámara) objeto del artículo; dice que la práctica, en sus funciones de Inspector de Comisarios, le ha enseñado que la única manera que se evitarán infracciones a la Ley que se discute es implantando un verdadero control sobre aquellas personas que se placen en violar dicha Ley. Alude al Capitán del Puerto de esta ciudad; dice que este funcionario se imaginó que él (Alvarado) trataba de posesionarse de algunas de sus atribuciones; mas según una carta que él ha recibido recientemente de dicho funcionario, opina que se ha convencido de cuáles son sus ideas con el proyecto elaborado. El artículo se aprueba. Salazar propone un nuevo artículo y explica las causas que lo han inducido a introducirlo. Dice que considera a Alvarado un hombre de conciencia; que sabe dar cumplimiento al puesto que desempeña. En Colón, continúa, los cabos y subalternos del Inspector dictan resoluciones e imponen multas como a bien tienen; hace mención de varios casos y con especialidad uno del Inspector Muñoz; agrega que se cometen abusos. Alvarado se muestra opuesto al artículo nuevo; dice que en caso alguno habrá que hacerle presente a los subalternos que tenían que darle cumplimiento a la Constitución y demás disposiciones legales; opina que esa disposición no debe figurar en esa Ley. El mal estriba, agrega, en que los Jefes no saben darles la interpretación debida a las leyes. Alvarado expresa que ha sido costumbre de la Cámara, como muestra de cortesía, dejar que el D. autor de un proyecto introduzca a este todas las modificaciones que a bien tenga, con preferencia a las de cualquiera otros; dice que desde el año 1910 a esta parte que ha venido ocupando curul en el salón en que se encuentra, es la primera vez que presencia un caso como este. Agrega que después de que él haya introducido su modificación el D. Salazar tendrá mucho campo de acción para proponer lo que a bien tenga.

Jurado considera que es antilógico, fuera de lugar, pasar a discutir el parágrafo introducido por Salazar; es de opinión que debe discutirse primeramente al art. Araúz se dirige al D. Salazar y le manifiesta que se ha dado preferencia al autor del proyecto. Se aprueba la modificación. Valdés submodifica artículo en el sentido de que los días de arresto a que se hacen acreedores los infractores de dicha Ley sean de 1 a 60. Dice que se debe tener en cuenta que al imponer estas multas y arrestos no se trata de ladrones sino simplemente de contrabandistas. Agrega que la imposición de esta Ley trae grandes beneficios al pueblo; considera justo un aumento de uno o más días para aquellos individuos que traen a territorio de la República cigarrillos, etc., estos individuos no son verdaderamente ladrones, dice. Herrera pide la palabra para proponer, pero desiste a ello. El artículo así modificado se aprueba. El Secretario da lectura al artículo siguiente del proyecto.

Alvarado explica a la (Cámara) objeto del artículo; dice que la práctica, en sus funciones de Inspector de Comisarios, le ha enseñado que la única manera que se evitarán infracciones a la Ley que se discute es implantando un verdadero control sobre aquellas personas que se placen en violar dicha Ley. Alude al Capitán del Puerto de esta ciudad; dice que este funcionario se imaginó que él (Alvarado) trataba de posesionarse de algunas de sus atribuciones; mas según una carta que él ha recibido recientemente de dicho funcionario, opina que se ha convencido de cuáles son sus ideas con el proyecto elaborado. El artículo se aprueba. Salazar propone un nuevo artículo y explica las causas que lo han inducido a introducirlo. Dice que considera a Alvarado un hombre de conciencia; que sabe dar cumplimiento al puesto que desempeña. En Colón, continúa, los cabos y subalternos del Inspector dictan resoluciones e imponen multas como a bien tienen; hace mención de varios casos y con especialidad uno del Inspector Muñoz; agrega que se cometen abusos. Alvarado se muestra opuesto al artículo nuevo; dice que en caso alguno habrá que hacerle presente a los subalternos que tenían que darle cumplimiento a la Constitución y demás disposiciones legales; opina que esa disposición no debe figurar en esa Ley. El mal estriba, agrega, en que los Jefes no saben darles la interpretación debida a las leyes. Jiménez manifiesta que él es Presidente de la Cámara de Comercio; que Alvarado y Muñoz son Inspector de Comisarios e Inspector del Puerto de Colón respectivamente; replica a Salazar que si Muñoz ha faltado se lo haga saber por medio de una "notificación". Salazar dice que Alvarado no ha entendido el alcance de su artículo. (Pasa a la página 10)
