Pollen-filled air nothing to sneeze at as allergy season heats up

■ he pollen forecast for Leesburg is projected to be high today and Saturday, according to pollen.com, and it may mean more tiny particles covering our cars and – achoo! – causing allergic

"Everybody is complaining about pollen on their cars and up their noses. It's bothering them one way or another," said Greg Bonynge, owner of Quick Car Wash in Leesburg, which has seen a steady stream of tolks wanting to get the pollen washed off their vehicles.

Bonynge isn't complaining. "Pollen is good for business," he grinned. "We love anything that makes a mess."

A native Leesburg senior, who only gave her first name of Shirley, knows pollen helps plants reproduce, but she doesn't like seeing those pollen grains covering her red car.

"Every time my car turns yellow, it gets washed," she said. Bonynge believes many people may not be aware that pollen can come inside one's car,

too, through an air-condition-

"Not all vehicles have it, but most of the newer vehicles have a cabin air filter and it can be filled full of pollen," he said. "It's part of the air intake and what would blow out of your air conditioning, your heat and everything on the inside of the vehicle; it filters the air coming in. If the filter is full of pollen, sometimes that can affect people's allergies."

The cabin air filter can be found behind the glove compartment in some car models.

Lawmakers take on warning shot, voucher issues

TALLAHASSEE Legislation allowing people to fire a warning shot instead of retreating from the threat of death or bodily harm overwhelmingly approved Thursday in the Republican-controlled Florida House. and the state Senate tentatively approved a similar bill.

The 93-24 vote for the bill came after a second day of intense debate, much of which focused on Florida's controversial "stand your ground" law.

The legislation was partially inspired by the case of Marissa Alexander. The Jacksonville woman was sentenced to 20 years in prison for firing what she insisted was a warning shot during a fight with her estranged husband. An appeals court has ordered a new trial for

The bill (HB 89) addresses a law that requires lengthy sentences for specific felony firearm convictions. Lawmakers debated the legislation and a proposed amendment for over two hours, with most votes cast along party

Rep. Kionne Magee, D-Miami, questioned the definition of warning shots and how many warning shots would be allowed under the bill. Rep. Dwayne Taylor, D-Daytona Beach, pointed out that law enforcement officers are not routinely allowed to shoot warning shots.

not because I wanted to do anything with 'stand your ground,'" said Rep. Neil Combee, R-Auburndale, the bill's sponsor. "I didn't want to repeal 'stand your ground.' I didn't want to strengthen 'stand your ground.'"

"'Stand your ground' was not on my mind. Marissa Alexander was on my mind."

Some Democrats had problems with "stand your ground," but be-lieved the "warning shot" bill was a step in the right decision.

Rep. Jimmie Smith, R-Lecanto, said the bill is about common sense, that's it's better to shoot a warning shot than having to kill someone.

Rep. Perry Thurston, Lauderdale, D-Fort sought unsuccessfully to amend the bill to make major changes to "stand your ground." The amendment would have gotten rid of some of the major provisions of "stand your ground," including alterations to duty to retreat.

The Senate tentatively passed its version of the bill Thursday and an amendment that brought it in line with the House version. It is scheduled to be voted on the floor March 26.

Meanwhile, the Legislature is abandoning a plan to approve a major expansion of a state-backed program

Leesburg utility customers targeted in new phone scam

A fraudulent caller has been contacting Leesburg utility customers, claiming to be a city representative, and requesting credit card information, according to a warning issued by the city.

The caller has been telling the customers they have delinquent payments and their utilities will be turned off, the release said. Robert Sargent, public in-

formation officer for the city of Leesburg, said the custom-

er service manager told him that several customers have come to the Customer Service Department in the past week in an attempt to clarify their utility accounts because of the phone calls.

There have been as many as five walk-in complaints and five complaint calls every day about the matter, Sargent said.

The city has approximately 50,000 different utility accounts, including residential and commercial accounts, but the complaints have been primarily residential customers, Sargent said.

"It can have a big impact when you have a utility with that many accounts, and someone's going out and just blanketing the calls to customers like that," he said.

Winter's barrage hammers road budgets


TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. — In Michigan's way-upnorth Keweenaw Peninsula, where 200 inches of snow in a single season elicits barely a shrug, officials know there's nothing in the budget more important than keeping the roads passable.

Yet even they have been caught short this merciless winter. Houghton County planned to spend around \$2.1 million for plowing, salting and related maintenance, which experience suggested would be plenty, but has overshot it by \$500,000 and counting.

State and local governments across a huge swath of the nation, from the Great Plains to the Upper Midwest and the Deep South to New England, are experiencing sticker shock after one of the coldest, snowiest, iciest winters in memory. Many have spent two or three times as much as they budgeted for clearing roads. More bad weather could send costs higher.


Even as Thursday's official arrival of spring presages warmer weather, it's clear that winter's bitter aftertaste will linger much longer as officials compensate for untold millions in unexWinter takes its toll on state budgets

pected spending that includes patching a rash of potholes. In some states, legislatures are already preparing emergency appropriations. Elsewhere, road agencies are delaying repaving projects, cutting back on roadside mowing and summer hires, dipping into rainy-day funds and making do with battered equipment instead of buying more.

"It'll have a considerable impact on cities and their fiscal health," said James Brooks of the National League of Cities. "Just as they're emerging from the depths of the great recession, they got whacked very hard by this intemperate winter."

sheer ferocity caught nearly everyone by surprise, including those for whom dealing with cold and snow is second nature.

"This is a very unique winter, even talking with some of the old timers who have been here longer than I have," said

Houghton County highway engineer Kevin Hariu, a resident of the Lake Superior community since 1976. "You can get a lot of snow or you can get extremely low temperatures, but not both except this year."

Virginia budgeted \$157 million for snow removal and may exceed it by \$150 million — probably the most the state has ever spent for the purpose. "The bills are still coming in," spokeswoman Tamara Rollinson said.

Montgomery ty, Md., in the Washington, D.C., suburbs, has spent three times its budgeted amount. Illinois is 200 percent over its threeyear average, and its crews have spread almost double the usual volume of salt — a mixed blessing, since it corrodes roads and bridges as it melts the snow. North Carolina planned for \$40 million and has spent \$62 million. Arkansas, where ice is often a bigger problem than snow, has spent a record \$18 million, three times its seasonal average.

Ernie Winters, highway commissioner in Winnebago County, Wis., thought things were tough in 2013 when his department blew through its winter maintenance budget by April.

Bonynge advises those who suffer from allergies to have the filter checked and changed when needed. This can be done at a dealership or automotive business.

"People don't know in Florida that when moisture gets into the air conditioning filter, you basically start breathing mold," added Jose Aguilar of Quick Lube, located right next door to the car wash.

Aguilar showed one dirty gravish filter full with pollen particles that he had just removed and was replacing with a new white filter.

"Some people park under trees and the filter will be covered in seeds, pollen and everything," Aguilar said. "All that stuff stays in the filter, and that is what you are breathing in your car." Many allergy sufferers

complain of watery eyes, nasal congestion, runny nose and itchy throat when they seek treatment from sinus specialist Ed Neuzil, ARNP, PhD, and owner of Allergy, Sinus and Asthma Family Health Center in The Villages.

"This time of year when we do see a significant increase in people suffering from their allergies," Neuzil said. "The pollen levels are increased. The cold weather has now gone and people spending more time outdoors.

The warmer temperatures cause some people to open the windows and "air out the house," he said, only to be exposed to pollen and start sneezing and feeling the onset of sinus-triggered headaches.

"The only thing wrong (with airing out the house) is that there is nothing good about the air outdoors. It has elevated pollen, dirt and other contaminants that we now let inside our house," he said.

Neuzil said tree pollens are the most common allergy triggers in the spring and, when it rains, mold can be an issue.

"The best way to help reduce symptoms is to reduce exposure. Keep your windows and doors closed," he said.

He advises residents to make their homes a "protected environment" by using a good HEPA filter on their air conditioning system, and for older homes, to consider an inspection to clear the air ducts, if appropriate.

Annually power-washing the exterior of your home is another way to remove pollen and

mold. "If you've been outdoors, when coming in for the day, put those clothes in the washer, take a shower before going to bed, rinse your nose and eyes of the pollens and other

contaminants," Neuzil said. "Remember the longer you're exposed, the greater the chance of triggering a reaction."

He has found some people get allergy relief by flushing their noses with a sinus rinse.

Neuzil also developed his own nasal cleansing spray, Dr. Neuzil's Irrigator, which is a non-medicated, saline-based formula with natural essential oils, geared to rinse out the pollutants in one's nose while soothing nasal passages. The product is available in several local pharmacies and natural health stores.

"There are over-thecounter medications available, and discussing which to use with your pharmacist is a good idea," he said. However, if symptoms persist, Neuzil advises allergy sufferers to talk to their medical providers for further evaluation and possible medication adjustments.

Sargent could not estimate how many people were impacted, because he believes some of the fraudulent calls have not been reported, and he said there is no police investigation at the current time.

People have been pulling scams like this for a long time, Sargent said. "It's such a com-

mon and such an easy scam to do," he said. "I mean, who in the country doesn't have utilities, and who would want to be inconvenienced by having their utilities shut off?' "The best thing that

we can do is just educate our customers, and a better educated customer, a more informed customer, will know what to do prior to this

happening," Sargent said. "You don't want to be informed of it after the fact and after you've mistakenly given out your card."

The city does have an automated call to notify people they are late on their bills, but the city never calls and asks for credit card information over the phone, Sargent

"There's ways to use your credit card to pay your bill, but you have to initiate it," Sargent said. The city also has been

made aware of another call where people are being contacted about savings on their utilities and then being asked for credit card information, Sargent said. The recom-

In Orlando, Obama calls for equal pay for women

ORLANDO — Amid grappling with crisis in Ukraine, President Barack Obama made a pitch for women's pocketbook issues Thursday, calling for legislation requiring equal pay for equal work and saying Congress would get more done if it had more women.

Obama left for the event at Orlando's Valencia College after announcing additional sanctions against Russian officials from the White House's South Lawn, a public juggling of his duties as the country's chief executive and the Democratic Party's lead-

With Obama and his health care law a political liability in some parts of the country, the president is trying to help his party's effort to win November elections by leading a debate on economic issues and bringing in

campaign funds.

Florida has one of the country's most competitive gubernatorial races with incumbent Republican Gov. Rick Scott facing Democratic former Gov. Charlie Crist. But Crist did not appear publicly with Obama and only planned to see him at a private fundraiser for the Democratic National

Committee. Crist spokesman Kevin Cate would not say whether Obama would campaign with Crist later in the race. "It's well known that the president and Gov. Crist are personal friends. He enjoys spending time with him — will today, and will in the future," Cate said.

The DNC fundraiser was one of two the president was headlining Thursday evening in Miami with tickets costing up to \$32,400. The other,

Guardian ad Litems needed

The Guardian ad Litem program in Lake and Sumter counties is once again looking for volunteers, this time because the number of children in the 5th Circuit dependency court system has increased since last summer, leaving about 18 percent of the children without a legal guard-

A four-day training session will start March 31 in Ocala, and spill into April, which is National Child Abuse Prevention Awareness Month. During the sessions, attendees receive information on topics that help them prepare for being appointed by the court to represent children, from infants to age 19, who are in abusive or neglectful family situations.

"We want to make sure our volunteers are well educated and at least aware of these factors, and what they should consider when they are developing a plan for the court," said Marcia Hilty, circuit director for the Guardian ad Litem Program in the 5th Judicial Circuit, which encompasses Lake, Sumter, Marion, Hernando and Citrus

counties. Currently about 1,770 children are involved in the 5th Judicial Circuit dependency court system, up from 1,389 children in mid-summer 2013. But there are only about 600 guardians in the circuit.

Hilty said her group has a risk-assessment tool they use to focus on children who score as highest risk.

"The other children are unfortunately not assigned to a volunteer until we can find someone," she said.

While Hilty has nothe increase ticed in numbers of children needing Guardian ad Litems, she also sought to put the numbers in context. In general, numbers tend to lag during the summer break because children are not in school and therefore school staff are not identifying children that are possibly in need. The numbers

In House votes in nonpresidential election years, women average 52 percent support for Democrats; in presidential years, it's 54 percent. Among men, there is no such shift, with 48 percent average support for Democrats in both types of elections.

In the hunt for female voters, Obama appeared via satellite Thursday on "The Ellen DeGeneres Show." He joked about how his wife and daughters are smarter than he is and teased DeGeneres for breaking his Twitter record on Oscar night with a star-filled "selfie" photo that's been retweeted more than Obama's re-election victory photo.

"I thought it was a pretty cheap stunt myself," Obama said. "Getting a bunch of celebrities in the background."

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
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Echoes of Crimea keep Ukraine's east rumbling

ARTEMIVSK, Ukraine – The disheveled men barricading the muddy lane leading into a military facility in this eastern Ukraine town say they are making a stand to defend the region's Russian-speaking majority.

In the nearby city of Donetsk, gangs of pro-Russian activists and Cossacks armed with sticks and bats have been storming one local government office after another, only to leave a short while later.

It looks a lot like Crimea.

But despite feeling or speaking Russian, many in these eastern regions still adhere strongly to their Ukrainian identity, so things could play out far differently.

"Russia has been unable to achieve the rapid breakaway of eastern Ukraine and we are focused on a long-term scenario," said Andrei Purgin, whose banned Donetsk Republic separatist group has been engaged in the seizure of public administration buildings.

Rumblings in the east began soon after last month's ouster of President Viktor Yanukovych, whose political strongholds lay mainly in the nation's Russian-speaking Donbass industrial heartland.

The protests brought about his downfall and paralyzed the capital, Kiev, were perceived by many here as ardent Ukrainian nationalism.

truth. protests monthslong on Kiev's Independence Square were focused on a desire to fight corruption and strengthen ties with Europe. But when the new parliament that took center stage after Yanukovych's overthrow moved to drop Russian as an official language, easterners' worst suspicions and fears seemed to have been realized.

Although the new government quickly backed off that proposal, the damage had been done.

Police in a dozen cities across the Donbass — including Donetsk,

Kharkiv and Lugansk — have struggled to thwart pro-Russian rabbles from seizing local government buildings in protest.

At the military facility in Artemivsk, several dozen pro-Russian activists, many of them wearing black leather jackets, intermittently formed a human cordon Thursday to stop vehicles from entering or exiting. They argue that blockading the facility would prevent the use of armed forces to quell popular discontent against the interim government.

"Power in Kiev has been seized by a junta that wants to speak to defiant people in eastern Ukraine with weapons and force. We will not allow this," declared Sergei Varyuschenko, a 63-year-old businessman taking part in the endeavor.

Not unlike the encampment erected by protesters in Kiev's main square, also known as the Maidan, pro-Russia activists in Artemivsk have pitched

tents, installed open-air field kitchen and burn wood in steel drums to warm themselves.

"We'll show them Maidan. The east of Ukraine will live separately, by its own laws," Varyuschenko, who was spending his third day camping out.

For some, like 46-yearold Donetsk miner Anton Skachko, the disillusionment with Ukraine's government is about the economic consequences.

"We are tired of rev-

olutions and upheavals in Kiev. One set of thieves is replaced by another, and the economic situation just gets worse. We want stability and peace, and only Russia can give us that," Skachko said.

Around Donetsk, a city of nearly 1 million people, pro-Russian activists have set up 10 checkpoints to inspect vehicles for suspicious content. They say they are trying to keep what they call radical nationalists from western Ukraine from bringing in weapons to make trouble.

For all this activity, allies of the Kiev government in the east are confident they can avert the kind of widespread unrest that might prompt Moscow to send in troops to restore order and protect its Russian-speaking brethren.

Metals billionaire Sergei Taruta, who was recently appointed governor of the Donetsk province, an area where he has vast business interests, is fighting hard to reassert the new Ukrainian leadership's authority over the east.

2 Taliban attacks in show dangers loom in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan Four gunmen with pistols stuffed into their socks attacked a luxury hotel frequented by foreigners in Afghanistan's capital Thursday, just hours after militants killed 11 people in an assault on a police station in Afghanistan.

All the assailants were killed in both standoffs, but made their point: Afghan forces face a huge challenge in securing upcoming elections in what will be a major test of their abilities as foreign troops wind down their combat mission at the end of this year.

The attacks show the Taliban are following through on their threat to use violence to the disrupt April 5 vote, which will be the first democratic transfer of power since the 2001 U.S.-led invasion that ousted the Islamic militant movement. President Hamid Karzai is constitutionally barred from seeking a third term.

Taliban spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid

claimed responsibility for the assault on the Serena hotel and the earlier attack in Jalalabad, an economic hub near the border with Pakistan.

The violence began before dawn Thursday when a suicide bomber blew up his explosives-laden car outside the police station in Jalalabad, located near the palatial residence of Nangarhar provincial Gov. Attaullah Ludin.

tack killed 10 officers, including a city district police chief, and a university student caught in the crossfire and wounded 15 po-The Taliban spokes-

man Mujahid said the

attackers wore suicide vests and killed nearly 30 police officers. The Islamic militant group frequently exaggerates casualty figures.

The initial suicide bombing badly damaged the nearby staterun Afghan radio and television building, shattering its windows.

The Taliban have carried out numerous attacks in Jalalabad, Kabul and elsewhere in the east. But the choice of a police station as a target reflected an effort to show they can still penetrate heavily secured areas despite numerous U.S. and Afghan offensives against

them in recent years. Hours later, four young men entered the Serena hotel considered one of the safest places to stay in Kabul.

Inside they drew the pistols hidden in their socks and opened fire. Bursts of gunfire could be heard from outside the hotel as Afghan troops cordoned off the area.

The attackers appeared to be about 18 years old and all were been killed.

Congress raises pressure on CIA in torture dispute

WASHINGTON Adding heat on the CIA, the Senate will investigate a computer network that contained a still-secret review of U.S. terror interrogations that led to dueling criminal referrals to the Justice Department and a dramatic collapse in relations between the nation's spy agencies and the lawmakers entrusted with their oversight.

In letters to the heads of the CIA and Justice Senate Department, Majority Leader Harry Reid said the CIA's decision to search the Senate intelligence committee's network and computers without approval was "absolutely indefensible" and carried serious implications for the separation of powers between the executive and legislative branches.

Reid said he had instructed his Senate's chief cop to examine how Senate staffers obtained an internal CIA review, which the agency accused them of improperly copying, although Reid described the CIA's alleged monitoring of Senate computers as more serious.

Meanwhile, legislative aides said the Senate intelligence committee will push soon for declassification of parts or all of its 6,000-page report on the agency's "war on terror" interrogation tactics at secret sites, the starting point of the entire dispute.

what cooperation he'll receive from the CIA, which has been locked in a bitter rift with the intelligence committee's chairman, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif. The agency accuses committee staffers of illegally accessing certain documents; Feinstein and other senators say the CIA broke the law by monitoring its comput-

er use and deleting files.

"To my knowledge, the CIA has produced no evidence to support its claims that Senate committee staff who have no technical training somehow hacked into the CIA's highly secure classified networks, an allegation that appears on its face to be patently absurd," Reid said in a letter, dated Wednesday, to CIA Director John Brennan. A previous review, he said, appears to corroborate committee findings and contradict CIA claims.

CIA spokesman Dean Boyd said the agency was committed to resolving its differences with senators. The CIA, he said, "believes in the necessity of effective, strong and bipartisan congressional oversight."

The clash between Congress and the CIA is arcane in its particulars but potentially broad in scope, with the sides battling over who will write the official history of one of the darkest eras in American spying — the waterboarding and brutal interrogations of al-Qaida prisoners in undeclared "black site" prisons overseas. Feinstein's claim that the CIA has undermined separation of powers makes it a constitutional fight, too.

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

We can't afford not to spend more money on Alzheimer's research

lzheimer's disease and other dementias not only destroy the lives of those who suffer from them but take a devastating toll on family caregivers and on those who must pay the cost of care. An estimated 5 million people in the United States suffer from Alzheimer's. But that number will increase exponentially in the years ahead because of what Robin Barr, a senior official at the National Institute on Aging, calls "an aging tsunami." A highly cited published research analysis estimates that the number of people with Alzheimer's around the world will jump from 36 million today to 115 million by 2050.

A recent study in the journal Neurology estimated that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's figure on deaths attributable to Alzheimer's in 2010 — 83,494 in the U.S. — is a fraction of the true number. which it estimated at more than 500,000. Officials at the CDC admit that the agency's number is significantly low.

Just as alarming is this: A study by researchers at Rand Corp. and other institutions calculated that the direct cost of care for people with Alzheimer's and other dementia in 2010 was \$109 billion. In comparison, healthcare costs for people with heart disease was \$102 billion; for people with cancer, it was \$77 billion. Yet cancer research will be allocated an estimated \$5.4 billion this year in federal funds, and heart disease will get \$1.2 billion — while research on Alzheimer's and other dementias comes in at only a fraction of that, at \$666 million.

It's time to substantially increase that budget.

There's no question that the federal government has focused more intensely on research into Alzheimer's and other types of dementia in the last few years. The National Alzheimer's Project Act, signed into law in 2011, set up a national plan to aggressively

develop new treatments for these devastating diseases.

But to effectively tackle this disease over the next decade, more funding is required. Research stands at a promising new threshold. As National Institutes of Health Director Francis Collins said in an appearance before a Senate subcommittee in February, research has "shifted in recent years, from an emphasis on treatment of individuals with symptomatic disease to primary prevention among individuals at risk."

More money can fund more clinical trials. And there are significant numbers of worthy grant applications at the National Institute on Aging that have not yet been funded, according to Barr.

The U.S. must do what it can to fight this hideous disease before it consumes millions more people and billions more dollars.



US becomes global laughing stock as Russia continues to gain power

hat is it about Western leaders from Neville Chamberlain to George W. Bush who want to find good in men of bad character?

Acting as if he were endowed by special insight bestowed upon no one else, President George W. Bush declared in 2001 that he had looked Vladimir Putin in the eye and "was able to get a sense of his soul."

According to the Daily Caller.com, in a 2010 interview with talk radio host Hugh Hewitt, Bush, who was promoting his book "Decision Points," was asked about his ability to see into the souls of men. The former president explained, "The reason why I said that is because I remembered him talking movingly about his mother and the cross that she gave him that she said she had blessed in Jerusalem."

Well, bless my soul, as the saying goes. No doubt several communist leaders in the former Soviet Union had mothers who went to church and took their sons with them — until faith became a drag on upward mobility in the Communist Party. It doesn't mean any one of them underwent some drastic religious transformation.

What Bush should have asked Putin is whether he shared his mother's faith and if so, what difference that had made on his thinking? Usually when people "convert" from one belief system to another they give a reason for the shift. Not so with Putin. He has not walked the sawdust trail of redemption and embraced pluralistic, democratic or capitalistic beliefs. Quite the opposite.

In a 2005 state of the nation speech, Putin declared: "Above all, we should acknowledge that the collapse of the Soviet Union was a major geopolitical disaster of the century. As for the Rus-

sian nation, it became a genuine drama. Tens of millions of our co-citizens and co-patriots found themselves outside Russian territory. Moreover, the epidemic of disintegration infected Russia itself."

In the Hewitt interview, Bush claimed that since that early meeting with Putin, the Russian leader had become a different person. The other possibility is that Putin has always been the same person, but lied and projected a different image to a gullible Bush who wanted to believe what he thought he saw.

Putin and his cronies are now openly mocking the United States. Under President Obama we are becoming a humiliation nation. Meaningless "sanctions," which amount to not even a slap on the wrist, are laughed at in Moscow. And the problem with sanctions is that Russia has op-

tions, too, like cutting off gas and oil supplies to Europe and making trouble in other former Soviet republics. Recently, Russian news anchor Dmitry Kiselyov took to the Rossiya 1 news channel to declare that Russia is the only country capable of turning the United States into "radioactive ashes." A picture of a mushroom cloud was projected on the screen behind him. Iran might see this bragging by Russia as a challenge to its own nuclear ambitions.

Understanding one's adversary is sometimes more important than defeating him, especially if one wishes to avoid armed conflict. Putin clearly believes Russia was humiliated after the collapse and the American triumphalism that followed. But humiliation can cut two ways.

Russia feels slighted for not being recognized as a great power. In some sense — though the analogy is far from perfect – Russia reflects Germany's attitude after its defeat in World War I. The Treaty of Versailles forced Germany to disarm, concede territory and pay reparations. Hitler's rise to power two decades later was in large part due to his appeal to German nationalism and pride, which is precisely Vladimir Putin's appeal to the Russian people.

Putin has promised not to annex any territory beyond Crimea. We'll see if he keeps that promise. Meanwhile, it would be nice if President Obama led on this matter instead of making the United States the laughingstock of the world's dictators and to our detriment, perhaps some of our allies.

Donovan's


sleepwalked through the first half, swapping the lead back and forth with the pesky Great Danes, but Florida's bench provided a much-needed spark.

Scott off to a record start at Bay Hill

ORLANDO — Masters champion Adam Scott was feeling ill when he arrived at Bay Hill. One majestic round with the putter Thursday made him feel a lot better.

Scott made five putts from about 20 feet or longer, two of them for eagle and one of them from off the green for birdie, and matched the course record with a 10-under 62 to build a three-shot lead in the Arnold Palmer Invita-

The conditions were close to perfect. So was his work on the greens.

"I made a lot of putts today, and a lot of putts considerable length," Scott said. "I hit a lot of nice shots, too, but it wasn't like I was hitting it 4 feet. I had a round like this in Australia at the end of last year — in the first six holes, I didn't hit it outside 5 feet. There's a lot of different ways to get the ball in the hole. But it's good for the confidence. It's what I wanted. I sat in here yesterday and said I'd like to make some birdies and build the confidence.

And today is a good start

to that."

Ryo Ishikawa, who uses Bay Hill as his home course on the East Coast, birdied the 18th for a 67. John Merrick celebrated his 32nd birthday by reaching 8 under until a late bogey. He also shot 67.

Both were 10 shots behind before they hit their first shot of the tournament.

"That took the pressure off," Merrick said. "You're already 10 shots behind, so it's not like you're protecting anything. But this isn't the Bay Hill I remember. I don't usually play golf in Florida without 20 mph

Sanford lifts Dayton to upset of Ohio State

BUFFALO, N.Y. Dayton is re-configuring the college basketball map in Ohio.

It no longer runs through Columbus after Vee Sanford's layup with 3.8 seconds left secured 11th-seeded Dayton's 60-59 victory over sixth-seeded Ohio State in the second round of the of the NCAA tournament on Thursday.

"I guess they called us the little brother, or whatever," Flyers guard Jordan Sibert said. "We can't be called that anymore."

Sibert has seen it from both sides after transferring to Dayton following two seasons at Ohio State.

"To be able to go out there and play with this group of guys, to be able to come up with this win, it's unbelievable," Sibert said.

Leave it to another transfer, Sanford, to secure the victory in a back-and-forth game that featured 15 lead changes between two schools separated by some 75 miles.

After Ohio State's Aaron Craft hit a reverse layup with 15.5 seconds remaining, the Flyers set up a play during a timeout with 10.8 seconds left.

Dayton inbounded the ball and worked it to Sanford on the right

wing. Driving the lane without hesitation, he got a step on Craft and laid in a shot from about 4 feet away.

"No, I wasn't nervous," said Sanford, who transferred to Dayton from Georgetown. "We've drawn up a play like that, and I messed it up previously. But (coach Archie Miller) just kept his trust in me, and I'm just thankful that the shot went in."

Sanford finished with 10 points, while Dyshawn Pierre led Dayton with 12 points. For Miller, in his third year, the win came against his former mentor, Thad Matta.

The Flyers (24-10), of the Atlantic-10 Conference, who have won 11 of 13, advance to play the winner between third-seeded Syracuse and 14th-seeded Western Michigan in a South Region matchup on Saturday.

It's one and done for the Big Ten Conference Buckeyes (25-10), who were eliminated in the first game for only the third time in 26th tournament appearances. This season, Ohio State got off to a 15-0 start. and then stumbled down the stretch, split-

ting its final 20 games.

The loss marked the end for three seniors, including Craft, who were part of a team that had advanced past the third round in each of the previous three

Craft had a chance to pull out the win.

Driving the length of the court on the Buckeye's last possession, Craft bulled his way through three defenders only to have his 10-footer hit off the backboard and roll off the rim as the buzzer sounded.

Craft remained on his back in disappointment as the Flyers rushed to celebrate at their bench at the other end of the court.

"I just wanted to do everything I could to help our team win, and down the stretch I couldn't do that today," Craft said. "I can take the blame for that."

Sam Thompson led Ohio State with 18 points, and Craft scored 16.

Craft had no time for questions about whether Dayton can stake claim to being the state's better basketball school for one year at

"Sorry, I have zero thoughts on that right now," he said. "I'm upset at the way we played this game, and the way we didn't take the opportunity and make the most of it."

Craft was involved in a questionable play when he draped his arms around Sibert and was called for an intentional foul with 2:35 left. Sibert hit both free-throws to put Dayton up 55-52, but the Flyers couldn't score on the ensuing possession. Craft made up for that at the other end, when he was fouled while hitting a 6-footer, and then completed the three-point play.

Miller was antsy right up to the final buzzer. Having spent two seasons at Ohio State, he was fully aware of Craft's ability to score

clutch baskets.

"I thought it was going in," Miller said, referring to Craft's miss at the buzzer. "I've watched those guys win that game 1,000 times. He's a bulldozer with the ball. He got it down there in about three dribbles and got a good look. And it ended up rimming out. And we got lucky today.'

The Flyers have shown a flare for dramatics this season.

Sanford's basket marked the third time the Flyers have won a game on a shot in the final 4 seconds.

Sibert hit a 3-pointer with 1 second left in an 81-80 win over IPFW on Nov. 9. Then there was Devin Oliver's buzzer-beater in an 83-80 overtime win at Ole Miss on Jan. 4.

"A lot of people were going to make a big case out of beating Thad, or beating Ohio State," Miller said. "We didn't get real complicated. It wasn't about Ohio State or where they're from, or blah, blah, blah. It was about

Harvard knocks off Cincinnati in infamous 5-12 matchup

SPOKANE, Wash. — Those kids from Harvard are getting a passing grade when it comes to the first game of the NCAA tourna-

Ask New Mexico last Ask Cincinnati year.

Chambers Siyani scored 11 points, including five straight in the final two minutes, and 12th-seeded Harvard won its second NCAA tournament game in history, upsetting Cincinnati 61-57 Thursday.

Wesley Saunders led the Crimson (27-4) with 12 points as Harvard proved last year's upset of New Mexico as a 14 seed was no fluke. The Crimson became the first Ivy League school with NCAA tournament wins in consecutive years since Princeton in 1983-84. They will play either Michigan State or Delaware in the third round.

Harvard never trailed after the opening moments. They played with confidence and scrap against the No. 5 seed Bearcats, who shared the American Athletic Conference regular season title. Sean Kilpatrick led seed Cincinnati (27-7) with 18 points, but the Bearcats failed to win a tournament game for the second straight year.

There was a reason Harvard was a popular upset pick. Even President Barack Obama had the Crimson taking out the Bearcats.

The reason: defense and balance. All five starters averaged in double figures for the season and that balance was needed against Cincinnati's aggressive defense. Laurent Rivard, the Crimson's 3-point specialist, finished with

11 points, while Steve Moundou-Missi, former Montverde Academy standout, and Brandyn Curry both scored nine.

Harvard also improved to 15-0 this season when holding its opponent to 60 points or less. They entered the tournament with the 13th best scoring defense in the country. That defense helped overcome a shaky performance at the free throw line where Harvard was 17 of 28.

Cincinnati had its chances. Justin Jackson finished with 13 points and 11 rebounds, but the Bearcats shot only 37 percent and missed a number of shots around the rim.

Harvard withstood the early second-half push from the Bearcats. Jackson's dunk while being fouled and subsequent free throw pulled Ĉincinnati within 42-39 and Titus Rubles' driving layup later trimmed the margin to 45-43.

The Crimson then turnovers on forced three straight Bearcats' possessions. Saunders flipped in a driving finger roll to push the lead to five. As Harvard went to the bench for a timeout, Chambers grinned and coach Tommy Amaker pumped his fists in approval. Harvard was not go-

ing to be denied another moment. They got second and third chances at their own misses.

They littered the floor scrounging for loose balls.

Cincinnati went more than five minutes without scoring.

But the fought back and cut the lead to one before Chambers stepped up. He hit a pullup 17-footer with 1:57 left for a 56-53 lead. Kyle Casey then drew an offensive foul against Kilpatrick with 1:33 left.

Chambers hit a trio of free throws in the final minute and Saunders sealed it hitting a pair with 11 seconds left, setting off the celebration.




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
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We have much to learn from history, literature

hen I was a little girl we studied the great American poets in grade school. "Lives of great men all remind us not to take our lives in vain," is a quote from one of those poets. Even Wikipedia, the online encyclopedia, doesn't recognize it. Do you?

Poetry can have a positive effect and help you be a better person. My favorite poem of all time was written by James Weldon Johnson. He was born in Jacksonville in 1871 and educated at Atlanta University and Columbia University.

Poetry was one of Johnson's many accomplishments. In 1927 he published a book of poetry called "God's Trombones." It consists of seven sermons in verse, after the manner of the old plantation sermons.

"The Creation" is one of those sermon poems. It is so beautiful it can make you cry. Isn't that what poetry is meant to do? The simple language of this poem is what makes it so beautiful. We didn't study it in school, but we should have.

We are neglectful parents if we don't point our children to some of the great literature that is available. It is hard enough to get kids to read what is required of them in school, much less to get them to read the classics in their spare time.

My boys never stood still. After they got big enough to slide down off my knee and run away, I couldn't get them to read much. My daughters did enjoy reading some if I tied them to a chair. A friend said to me,

"Doesn't it scare you that our newspapers are going the way of the dinosaur and young people don't read books anymore?" When you hear that nonsense, remind them that news is also available on the Internet. Newspapers are as widely read as ever. Children will read if

you set an example, and the newspaper is a good way to begin.

Books and newspapers are so much more than tools for education and entertainment. Books are also our connection to the past and to all the philosophers and great men and women who have gone before us. Sometimes even a quote that stands alone (even if you can't remember where it is from) causes you to take your life more seriously and realize that you can make a difference.

Newspapers keep us informed about not only what is happening in the world but about what other people think about what is happening.

Children today are so precocious, but in ways we don't always understand or approve. We are losing the old values. Our ideas of lifelong marriages and two-parent households in which children are cherished and

cared for in the old traditional ways are all but forgotten.

Change can be good, but there has to be something to take the place of the old ways. Single parenting is not one of those things. I admire women who accept the challenge and work hard to be the best parents they can be, but no matter how roles change, children still need a good, reliable male parent in the house. Boys need a role model and little girls need a man to cherish them.

Children also need to learn about the past. There are a lot of lessons to be learned by studying the past. One of those is that one person can make a difference when they are motivated.

Teach your children to believe in something. Don't depend on the public school system to educate them. The best of schools can't take the place of parental guidance. If you don't feel confident in that respect, read. Read histories and philosophies and poetry. Learn about your family history and pass it on to your children. Tell them about their ancestors who came to this country without much but the clothes on their backs.

Most important of all, take them to church. Give them the opportunity to acquire a faith. It has to be their faith, not yours. It has to be something they can live with and believe. Parenting is not just diapers and nighttime vigils, or getting them to school on time. Help them acquire a philosophy and belief system to live by.



The Sandpiper: One of Lake County's earliest publications

s we learned last week, Lake County has had its share of newspapers. According to Emmett Peter, Jr., a local journalist, editor and author, there have been 23.

In recent years Lake County has been home to a plethora of magazines, but there is little mention of periodicals in earlier years, with the exception of promotional booklets, brochures and pamphlets.

Tucked away in the files of the Lake County Historical Society is proof that the county once had a magazine published prior to 1930.

The first issue of The Sandpiper was published July 1, 1928. The reason that name was chosen wasn't mentioned in the first issue. But it billed itself as a publication featuring Lake County events.

It cost 10 cents for a single copy and \$1,

payable in advance, for a yearly subscription.

The periodical was printed in Mount Dora by Lake Region Printing, while the editorial and business office was in Eustis. The office could be reached by dialing 244.

Although I'm not sure if the editor, Antoinette Mullikin, lived along East Crooked Lake, I know she lived in Eustis. According to Flastacowo, the Florida State College for Women annual, Frances Antoinette Mullikin graduated that year from the forerunner of FSU with a Bachelor of Arts degree, and Eustis was listed as her hometown.

In addition to an etching of a sandpiper, the cover of the initial edition had a scenic photo of East Crooked Lake Drive in Eustis. In my humble opinion, the portion of that roadway along the east shore of

East Crooked Lake is one of the most picturesque miles of motorway in Lake County. I take it almost every time my errands allow.

Antoinette humbly wrote in The Sandpiper's first editorial, "In making its debut into the magazine world, The Sandpiper has not 'sprung full-grown' from the forehead of some literary Jove, but is taking its first steps with all of the attendant enthusiasm of an enterprising youngster. This enthusiasm is dependent upon a desire to develop the ability to grow into a mature and well-balanced member of the monthly publication group."

We know so little about Antoinette but I think it's safe to assume she was enthusiastic and enterprising. And she was asking for the readers' patience as she developed her

magazine into something well-balanced. She went on to ex-

plain one purpose of her publication. "It is with a definite

purpose in view that we present a monthly periodical to the public. To acquaint fully, the friends of Lake County and Central Florida with the natural, social and commercial advantages to be found in this section of the state, is merely a part of our program."

Many of the pamphlets and brochures of that day sought to sell the county's virtues to prospective residents. Antoinette was writing to the residents and wanted them to know all the advantages available to them. Recreation was on the forefront of her list.

"The American public has learned that through play, the sterling worth of the participants, their business and commercial acumen, are reflected," she wrote. "Much of the composition space of The Sandpiper is devoted to the playtime of Central Florida.'

And then in quotes she added, "By a man's sportsmanship shall he be known."

In college Antoinette was the class athletic manager and on the Life-Saving Corps during her junior and senior years. She was also on the Athletic Board during her third year. And she was a member of the Larger Cabinet of the YWCA her final year, in addition to other activities.

It seems likely she experienced firsthand what followed in her editorial.

She wrote, "And nowhere is there a more ideal habitat for the year-round sportsman than Lake County and Central Florida. Here lakes abound for fishing. Golf courses, of which there are none superior in the United States, are plentiful. Trap-shooting is an institution, while field hunting is ideal. Tennis, swimming, boating and minor sports — each plays its part in the vacation day of the resident and visitor."

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




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



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Know the electrical functions behind your home's walls

Know your home's breaker box. The Federal Pacific Electric Company's electrical panel with FPE Stab-Lok breakers has been identified as a "latent safety hazard," which means the breakers fail when something unsafe occurs and the breaker should trip.

According to Clarence Tibbs of S.T.E. Electrical Systems, Inc., a leading code expert in the state of Florida, the panel and its breakers should be replaced. Tibbs says, "The company made a bad batch of breakers that do not trip when they should and it caused many fires."

Tibbs also noted a Zinsco electrical panel box

has fire-related problems due to the connectivity of the breaker in the panel to the bus bar. Tibbs says, "Not enough direct metal-to-metal contact between the breaker and bus bar creates arching and, in some cases, a fire." Tibbs recommends that both faulty panel boxes be replaced. The other big issue is alu-

minum wiring. From 1965 to 1977, builders across America switched from copper wiring to aluminum wiring to save money. At the time, copper supplies were very tight. Opinions differ on the longterm serviceability of aluminum versus copper wire. Tibbs contends that as a product aluminum wire will perform. Other electricians believe aluminum has conductivity, crimping, expansion and corroding issues.



The problem with aluminum wiring in most homes is that a lot of homeowners use incorrect fixtures, switches and outlets. CO/ALR- or CU/AL-rated products, which can be used with copper or aluminum wiring, are required in homes wired with aluminum. Once again, because of cost, most people buy the cheapest electrical items, which are only rated for copper.

Whether the problem exists with the panel boxes and breakers, aluminum wiring or the old knob-andtube wiring found in homes from the 1940s, electrical problems can create havoc in the home buying and remodeling process. To prevent unwanted surprises and costs, always have a licensed home inspector or electrician evaluate the wiring in any structure before you buy it.

Some homeowner insurance companies are not covering homes with known faulty electrical equipment issues, and this trend is expected to continue. Even though you might not be able to see it, faulty electrical wiring problems can cost you a fortune, or worse, your life. Know what is behind your walls.

San Francisco Bay Area homes are torn down to start fresh

Imagine paying \$1 million or more for a home — and then destroying it.

That's what's happening in some upscale San Francisco Bay Area communities as homeowners and wealthy buyers have no interest in upgrading aging houses but instead want to start from scratch and build all-new custom homes stocked with the latest

While the demolition and rebuilding trend is heaviest on the Peninsula and the most affluent parts of Santa Clara County, it extends to East Bay communities as well — anywhere it makes more sense financially to tear down the existing structure and start

That includes sought-after neighborhoods with no vacant lots, where prices of small, aging 1950s-era houses have soared.

Interviews with architects, contractors and homeowners make clear that teardowns are becoming more common.

"We're wrecking 3,000-square-foot houses and erecting 14,000-foot houses," said Hal Nelson of O. Nelson & Son excavating and demolition company in Woodside, Calif.

He said he has 20 tear-downs scheduled in nearby cities. Business was up 20 percent last year, and up 15 percent in 2012, he said.

week, Nel-Last son supervised the destruction of 2,600-square-foot suburban rancher in Menlo Park, Calif., as owners James and Teresa Bergeron and their four children watched from across the street.

As an excavator's demolition claw bit into the roof, the Bergeron kids cheered. In the new house, they'll each have their own bedroom.

"It started as a remodel," Teresa Bergeron said. "We were going to add one more bedroom."

They lived in the house for two years trying to make it work. But after finding major termite damage even after a \$5,000 tenting, problems with heating and plumbing, and a persistent tobacco smell from a previous owner, they decided to tear it down.

A full-blown remodeling job with a second story would have been just over \$1 million, and it wouldn't been have their dream home. Their 3,551-squarenew foot home will have four bedrooms and

"For just a little bit more, you get everything new," Teresa Bergeron said.

"It wasn't built for modern families. If you build a brandnew house you can build 9 1/2- to 10-foot ceilings. You get the physical and emotional spaciousness that I think our generation is looking for."

Along the Interstate 680 corridor in the East Bay, buyers of homes in upper-end towns are "pretty much razing them and building larger homes," said Eric Icay of AAA All in One Removal in Lafayette. "It picked up in the last year or so."

"Demolition booming," said Zali Lorincz of ZL Construction in Walnut Creek, Calif., a family-owned company that tears down houses and rips out swimming pools.

"It seems to be easier nowadays to completely eliminate a house rather than remodel."

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Remodeling is no panacea for home sellers

Nancy and Thomas James' Dana Point, Calif., home has expansive ocean views, four bedrooms, a wide deck for entertaining, solar paneling — even an elevator.

But until recently, the 3,258-square foot house now on the market for \$2.29 million — lacked something basic. It had just one bedroom closet.

That setup had suited the Jameses just fine. Over the years, the couple tore out closets to repurpose bedrooms they weren't using. Thomas and Nancy James, both chiropractors, weren't focused on whether that could be a stumbling block to a sale someday.

Without closets, though, the rooms could not be counted bedrooms, as prompting their listing agent to observe, "You do realize this is a really expensive one-bedroom home?"

A house that's outside the norm for a neighborhood can hobble the owners when it's time to sell. Some real estate agents and appraisers, however, say many sellers these days feel too much pressure to remodel even standard homes, whether it's because of popular TV shows and flashy home design websites, or because friends or agents recommend it when it's not really needed.

In the case of most homes being readied for sale, "You shouldn't remodel the home," said Mac Mackenzie, an agent at Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage in Irvine, Calif. "People (looking to sell) are paying too much attention to television, and they're not getting the proper evaluation."

The value of real estate depends on the location, market segment and cycle, said appraiser Steven R. Smith of Redlands, Calif., who has conducted appraisals of homes in the Los Angeles area and throughout the U.S. over his more than 30-year career.

"The exact same (remodeling) money spend in the wrong location or market segment may not be recaptured, while in the right lo-

cation or market segment it may be more than recaptured," said Smith, who has evaluated such homes as a 249-acre Rancho Mirage, Calif., estate with an 18,400-square-foot house and its own 19-hole golf course. Software billionaire Larry Ellison snapped it up three years ago for just under \$43 million.

Many houses about to go on the market could use clean windows and perhaps carpet and paint. Maybe a new roof and some other repairs.

Even contractors find them-

selves pushing back on home sellers' urge to upgrade.

Paul Paniagua, owner of All Pro Builders in Fullerton, Calif., said he's persuaded people about to put their homes up for sale not to remodel, even if their agent suggested it.

"I try to talk them out of it," Paniagua said. He tells homeowners, "Why don't you put the house up on the market for what you're asking for and see what type of offers you get? If you're absolutely being low-balled and truly believe it's the kitchen, we can talk about some

things we can do."

He added, "Some people can just throw a countertop on and that's night and day."

Often times, homebuyers are looking for the total package — a home with modest upgrades throughout, said Ryan Lundquist, a Sacramento, Calif., appraiser who writes about the housing market.

A gleaming new kitchen certainly can help sell a home, he said. "However, a kitchen remodel is also one of the most expensive remodels and ... the resale market may not be willing to pay that much."

"The layout of the house, though, matters greatly though, too, and has to be right," he said. "Otherwise a (new) kitchen that comes with the rest of a house that does not work is really not all that desirable."

Making unnecessary redos before a sale can sabotage it in another way, Mackenzie said.

"While you're in the middle of a remodel you probably shouldn't be doing, you could lose the sale of your home to someone who comes and buys one around the corner," he said. "In most cases, it's not worth the risk."

The Jameses recently finished restoring three-bedroom closets - and they did so at Mackenzie's suggestion. The home was an exception to the advice he usually gives about remodeling right before a sale. But without enough bedrooms, the residence wouldn't sell for the best price.

The restoration was among the latest remodeling changes that the couple, who have two grown children, made to the house through the years.

All along, said Nancy James, "We were upgrading for us — and for selling the home." Her rule of thumb for those who want to make changes with an eye toward an eventual resale: "Don't be afraid to go in and fix it up. Get a little unique. But don't go crazy."

Several appraisers said they like the idea of improving a house over the long haul.

"If someone has a home they like in the location they like," Smith said, "spending money to keep it up to date is a good thing."

Some money needs to be spent to keep a property competitive, he noted. "Older properties that have not been updated can sell near or not too far below the best updated, remodeled homes in the best real estate market cycle," he said, "(but) way below during the worst market conditions."

In Lake Forest, Calif., Jim Hobbs has been undergoing an extensive remodel on a home he bought in the Sycamore Creek community 35 years ago, as the third house in the tract.

He's not planning to move anytime soon.

Hobbs, a First Team Real Estate agent and house flipper, said he had a pretty good year in 2013. So he's recently redone his kitchen, knocked down walls and put in new floors.

"The only thing that's original is the toilet," said Hobbs, as workers prepared to install a large vanity mirror.

"I can't see rushing to do it before you sell it, because you aren't going to be able to enjoy it," Hobbs said. "I'll reap it one day."

Justice Department's watchdog faults mortgage fraud prosecutions

The U.S. Justice Department used faulty statistics to overstate mortgage-fraud prosecution efforts and ranked mortgage-fraud last in its list of priorities despite public pledges to combat these types of crimes, an internal watchdog said Thursday.

The 52-page report by the Justice Department's inspector general found that for the fiscal years of 2009 through 2011, the federal law enforcement agency's effort to prosecute mortgage fraud fell short even after receiving nearly \$200 million in federal fund-

Thursday's report undercuts contentions by the federal government made four years ago that it would aggressively investigate cases of mortgage fraud, which proliferated following the housing bubble and eventual

crash. President Barack Obama in 2009 signed ber of convictions rose

executive order by more than 100 percreating the Financial Fraud Enforcement Task Force, an inter-agency group that included 25 federal and state agencies, regulators and inspectors general. The task force was headed by a Justice Department official and among its missions was to ensure cooperation with the myriad of agencies.

Ellen Canale, a Justice Department spokeswoman, disputed parts of the report and pointed out that mortgage fraud convictions rose every year during the period the report examined. From 2009 to 2010, the number of convictions nearly doubled from 555 to 1,087, she said.

"The facts regarding the Department's work on mortgage fraud tell a much different story than this report," Canale said in a statement.

"In the time period in question, the number of mortgage fraud indictments nearly doucent. As the report itself notes, even at a time of constrained budget resources, the department has dedicated significant manpower and funding to combating mortgage fraud."

But for all the tough talk, the department's internal watchdog found that in the FBI Criminal Investigation Division, mortgage fraud was barely a blip on the agency's radar. In field offices in Los Angeles, New York, Miami and Baltimore cities that saw large amounts of mortgage fraud — the crime was listed as a low priority or not at all, the report said.

"Despite receiving significant additional funding from Congress pursue mortgage fraud cases, the FBI in adding new staff did not always use these new positions to exclu-

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Extreme weather tests commercial building managers

This winter has resulted in many headaches, but keeping commercial buildings operating smoothly in unusually frigid weather has proved especially daunting for some property managers.

"It's been a rough year, as bad as it's ever been," said Chuck Palm, senior vice president of occupier and investor services for Bloomington, Minn., real estate firm Cushman & Wakefield/ NorthMarq. Palm oversees engineering and maintenance for more than 400 properties, about 70 percent of them in Minnesota.

This winter was the ninth coldest on record in Minnesota's Twin Cities, and the most frigid since 1979, with 50 days recording a temperature below zero. It also ranked as the fourth-snowiest on

"It's been a real treat, and I say that with love and affection," said a wry Bill Thurmes, the property manager at US Bank Center in downtown St. Paul, Minn. "When it gets so bitter, bitter cold, it throws off the balance of a building."

The "design temperature" for buildings in the Twin Cities is minus-11 degrees, said Larry Schoen, president of Schoen Engineering, a Maryland-based consulting

firm. That means engineers design buildings here on the belief that it will be warmer than minus-11 99 percent of the time, he said.

"You don't design for the absolute worst temperatures," he said. "There are limits to engineering."

So when temperatures dip below that level for any length of time, as they have in some parts of the country this winter, some serious issues may arise.

An obvious challenge is snow removal. Most property managers try to estimate the impending season's snowfall and budget accordingly. But this year, "snow removal budgets were blown out," Palm said.

"We do all our own snow removal, and we've been running our snow machines constantly," said Mike Blomberg, operations

manager for LaSalle Plaza in downtown Minneapolis. Once the city plows the streets, Blomberg's must haul away that churned-up snowpack, as well. "Our snow budget was crushed this

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year," he said, especially given the frequent mini-snowfalls of an

inch or two that still required attention.

Julie Bauch, general manager of 180 East Fifth, a 112-year-old office building in St. Paul, said snow around her building was piled in a nearby alley. The imposing mound began to melt this past weekend - and not a moment too soon.

Finding a hauler to take the snow is not as easy as it sounds, since it may be contaminated with chemicals used to clear the sidewalks, she said. In addition, hauling snow off-site can be an expensive proposition.

Another challenge involves heating buildings in a uniform way, even when temperatures dip to or below zero for a sustained period. Corner offices are often among the chilliest, as well as perime-

ter areas. "It's really hard to balance the heat in a building," Thurmes

said.

Generally, he said, he looks at the winter patterns for the past five seasons, comes up with an average and tries to adapt energy costs accordingly. He'll even factor in predictions from the Farmer's Almanac, but few could have predicted this year's mix of intense cold and heavy snowfall.



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
