More-effective anti virus or security software could have blocked the malicious attachments or prevented users from visiting risky web links. Backend server filters could have prevented danger ous emails from reaching employees. Intrusion-de tection systems on corpo tection systems on corporate networks could have more quickly raised red flags internally after a suc "The problem.
"The problem is the technology hasn't advanced enough to detect malicious code," said Kev in Mitnick. Tricking some one to let you into the system is far easier than identifying hidden vulnerabilities that can be exploited.

## Bomb blasts in Nigeria kill at least 118

JOS, Nigeria - Two car bombs exploded at a bustling bus terminal and market in Nigeria's central city of Jos on Tuesday, killing at least 118 people, wounding dozens and leaving bloodied bodies amid the flaming debris. There was no immedi-
ate claim of responsibility for ate claim of responsibility for the twin car bombs. But they bore the hallmarks of Boko Haram, the Islamic extremist group that abducted nearly 300 schoolgirls last month and stations and other locations where large numbers of people gather in its campaign to impose Islamic law on Nigeria. The second blast came half an hour after the first, killing some of the rescue workers who had rushed to the scene which was obscured by billows of black smoke "It's horrifying, terrible, said Mark Lipdo of the Stefanos Foundation, a Christian charity based in Jos, who described the sickening sme of burning human flesh.

Nigeria's National Emergency Management Agency "Firemen are still trying to put them out. We believe we will find more bodies," Mohammed Abdulsalam, zon al coordinator for the agency, told The Associated Press. He said the fires were being fueled by flammable goods at the market, including rubber sandals.
Tensions have been rising between Christians and Muslims in Jos, the capital of Plateau state in Nigeria's Middle Belt region that divides the country into the predominantly Muslim north and Christian south. It is a flashpoint for religious violence, and there were fears the attacks could ignite a new round of sectarian violence. President Goodluck Jonathan indicated he blamed Boko Haram for Tuesday's bombings, extending sympathies to affected families in a statement and assuring all Nigerians that the govmitted to winning the wa against terror."

This time, the allegation is that the regime is dropping chlorine gas bombs from helicopters over civilian targets.If an investigation underway by the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons confirms the latest allegation - leveled by France, among others - it will be time to bring Assad before the International Criminal Court to answer war crimes charges.
Why now? Why not a year ago, when Assad used chemical weapons, including deadly sarin gas? Because until recently there remained a chance - slim though it was - for a diplomatic solution to the Syrian crisis and for Assad's negotiated exit. doesn't mind flouting international conventions doesn't mind flouting international conventions We hope he at least recognizes that the world must stand united against chemical weapons, and that Assad needs to be called to account. There is narrow cause for optimism. It was Russian intervention (after the threat of U.S. military action) that led Assad to admit last fall that he had chemical weapons, and to accept their supervised removal from his country. That process has progressed more slowly than anticipated. Although the last shipment remains stalled, international monitors are hopeful that the stockpiles will be gone.

Chlorine, because of its pervasive use in industry, is not covered under the reporting requirements of the international ChemicalWeapons Convention. But that convention, which Syria signed when it promised to give up chemical weapons, does ban using chlorine gas as a weapon. If the investigation finds the gas was used, Assad must be held accountable. The Security Council should put the war crimes referral to a vote and force Russia's hand. If Russia vetoes it, then at least the world will be able to see who stands for humanity and who stands against it.

"We're all going to do everything we can for our kids, of course; there's no way to stop that," she told me. "But it creates a huge difference in where people are at the starting line. One obvious way to address the problem would be with free, high-quality preschool for all children. Thirty states have already established universal preschool programs, including conservative Oklahoma and Georgia So far, Republicans in Congress have resisted Obama's proposal for a federal program that would help fund pre-K programs across he entire country. But if they start seeing results from states that aren't controlled by Democrats, perhaps they can be brought around. Another important element for leveling the educational playing fields is community colleges, which have historically been a route both to four-year degrees and to better jobs for low-income students.
But community colleges are struggling in both blue and red states. During the recession, states made deep cuts in their funding. The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities reported his month that state spending on both two-year and four-year public colleges has declined 23 percent per student since 2007 Providing universal preschool and improving community colleges won't close the opportunity gap. But with both parties agree ing that the gap needs attenion, they might provide a starting point for creative politicians to find some common ground and even to seize an opportunity

## Macaron: Quest for perfection

Surely, all home chefs have experienced a kitchen catastrophe so great they will likely never revisit the recipe in fear of evoking those jarring feeling of defeat. For me, that dreadful recipe was a tiny French cookie that so destroyed my culinary confidence, I vowed to never tell a soul of my fail ure. Until now.
Success in the kitchen has always come quite naturally to me. With fond memories of family recipes, cooking is a therapeutic hobby. If im feeling unimpressive, I take to the kitchen, and in 20 minutes I m feeligg accomplished as Fa nie Farmer. However, I alway have more fun than Fannie. Improvisation with ingredients suted me more than Farmer's penchant for exact measurements. Who can be bothered with systematic use of cups and spoons when everyone in your kitchen is

from
anticipation of your banana bread with tangy lemon cream cheese frosting?
For years, modifying recipes with nary a glance at the adorable porcelain kitty cat measuring cups that my sister gave me one Christmas had worked for me. As much as I enjoyed the baking process, I was more concerned with making a recipe my own and racing to feed my fans, because the flattery that followed tasted so good. But my rebel chef swagger was challenged when I met the macaron, the tiny French cookie sandwich that appears deceivingly carefree in its delightful pastel colors and creamy fillings but has a wick ed reputation for being difficult to make.
A few years ago, in the midst of a surge in macaron popularity, I turned to my prized book, "Baking" by James Peterson, for a recipe. Skipping over all of the textbooky hoopla, I looked at the ingredients: "What's so hard about whipping together sugar and egg whites?" thought. Little did

I know how crucial was this seemingly simple task. My first attempt, involving a smoky oven and someone else's confusion of wax paper for parchment, shan't be detaile here. But it wasn't enough for me to refuse to try again. Attempt No. 2 was just as tragic That second time, I hastily whipped the meringue, taking great care in crafting the perfect color batter. The additional food coloring may have caused it to be a bit runny, but never mind that. The color, Purple Mountains' Majesty, was impeccable. ## American's Paris kitchen is a way of life

PARIS - David Lebovitz snaps a photo of a practically perfect croissant before tak ing a bite, then smiling slightly.
He'll probably be asked for the recipe lat er, though he did no bake the croissant, nor was it made in his kitchen. But after six cookbooks, more than 27,000 tweets and a food website dating to the early years of html, readers expect recipes to go with the photos of Parisian food most can only crave from a distance.
Lebovitz spent 13 years as a chef at Alice Waters' Chez Panisse, quit to write books in 1999, then like many an American author before him moved to Paris in 2004 without a plan. "I thought, maybe I'll move to Paris because I can write there," he said in a recent interview after ruefully acknowledging his lack of a dramatic backstory.
A decade later, he has no intention of opening his own restaurant or bakery - France's bureaucracy is daunting even for natives.
"All the rumors you
hear about French pa-
perwork are true. I love cooking and I love baking but owning a business it's probably 10 percent cooking and paperwork and bureaucracy," he said. "I decided to take a pass."
His latest book, "My Paris Kitchen," feeds into the desire to cook, shop and eat in the city that prides itself on be ing the culinary center of the world. Half cookbook, half musings on everything from line etiquette (watch out for unexpectedly tough little old ladies) to the ac-ronym-filled documentation that floods every French household (going paperless is a dis tant dream).

## St. Michaels icon serving up artisanal ice cream

ST. MICHAELS, Md. - Justine's Ice Cream Parlour is mixing old traditions with new flavors with the help of new small-batch, artisanal ice cream.
The recipes come from the handiwork of 20 -year-old Tyler Heim, the general manager of Justine's who recently completed an ice cream making course at Penn State University, and is mixing up fresh, local ingredients in the ice cream to satisfy anyone's sweet tooth.
Heim, who has been working in ice cream parlors since he was 13 and described himself as always being an "ice cream parlor kind of guy," said instructors at Penn State really pushed for buying ice cream mix from a manufacturer.
"I figured, why can't I just make my own mix?" Heim said. "I don't want guar gum in my ice cream. I don't want high fructose corn syrup. I want cane sugar, and I want fresh heavy cream, fresh milk.
It's a food science, as opposed to a culinary art, Heim said, and it's all about composition, which he said is something he learned at Penn State.
"We have a secret ingredient that helps our texture become what it is, and that secret ingredient is booze. There's a little bit of Sailor Jerry in there. It really takes it to the next lev-
el" Heim said, who added that all the el," Heim said, who added that all the alcohol ends up being cooked out by
the time the final product is ready the time the final product is ready. "What it does is it affects the freezing temperature, so when your freezing temperature is a little bit below what it should be, it gives it that sof really emulsified, nice taste to it." Justine's is now making a frenchstyle ice cream with a crème anglaise base. Heim said Justine's has three or four flavors right now, including
strawberry cheesecake and raspber ry Oreo, which he said is selling faster than the normal ice cream Justine's uses, Jack \& Jill.
"When people tell me my ice cream is better, I don't think they understand what they're doing for me," Heim said. "That is the biggest favor, the biggest push for me.

Other spring flavors include cof fee toffee, which uses roasted coffee beans from Rise Up Coffee in Easton, chocolate chip cookie, cocoa dream, New Hampshire Maple, which uses maple syrup from Olivin's in St. Michaels, and a gollywobbler sorbet, which uses sweet blackberry win from the St. Michaels Winery
The spring flavors will be sold both at Justine's, 106 N. Talbot St., St. Michaels, and from Justine's ice cream cart at various farmer's markets and events in the area during the summer. Besides what can be bought localtine's maid he and his team at Jus into the ice everything else that goes cept for the Oreos, and each flavor is done one batch at a time.
Justine's reopened for the spring in Justine's reopened
Heim mid-March.
Heim said that his aunt, Kathy Lash, who is the third owner, bought the business about three years ago from the second owners and worked to return it to what it was originally known for as an icon of St. Michaels - a friendly atmosphere with a wall of milkshakes and "awesome combinations."
With the help of the original owner, Tom Quimby, they worked to restore Justine's to its original state, and Quimby trained Heim how to run the business.
"Our whole motto here is you can do whatever you want. Our wall of shakes is a guideline," Heim said. "If you want to have a sorbet shake with cookies and cream in it, we're not going to stop you. You can do whatever you want."
But, Heim said this whole venture couldn't have been accomplished without the rest of his team, includ ing sous-chef Stormi Coram and assistant manager Francis Malzone. What's more, Heim, who has lived in St. Michaels his whole life, said Justine's couldn't have done it without those in the community, too. "I really do it for the smiles," Heim said.
"Nobody comes into Justine's unhappy, and especially nobody leaves unhappy."
