Chinese military used bad email attachments

WASHINGTON — The victims were their own worst enemies.

The hacking techniques the U.S. government says China used against American

companies turned out to be disappointingly mundane, tricking employees into opening email attachments or clicking on innocent-looking website links.

The scariest part might be how successfully the ruses worked. With a mouse click or two, employees at bigname American makers of nuclear and solar technology gave away the keys to their computer networks.



Corman noted that the U.S. has much higher investments in research and intellectual property, making America's risk of loss in such thefts disproportionately higher than China's.

Other security layers failed in the hackings blamed on China, too. More-effective antivirus or security software could have blocked the malicious attachments or prevented users from visiting risky web links. Backend server filters could have prevented dangerous emails from reaching employees. Intrusion-detection systems on corporate networks could have more quickly raised red flags internally after a successful break-in.







where they were on the family's property from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

While Cassell's segment lasted a little more than 15 minutes, Cassell said he walked around with crew members all day offering history on every item he had.

"Some of the items I forgot I had," he said with a chuckle.

The show, which originally aired on May 14, will re-air again tonight from 8 to 9 p.m.; 12 to 1 a.m. Thursday; 10 to 11 p.m. Friday; and 2 to 3 a.m. Saturday.

Cassell said he began his collection by focusing on art décor, glass and furniture.

"I started expanding my collection of mod-

ernist items from the 50s and 60s," he said. At that point, Cassell said he became interested in kitsch, which he refers to as weird, unusual and applied arts.

"A lot of it has to do with what is termed eye candy," he said of the art, which he collected at garage sales and bought from his own pickers. "There is something you find appealing."

"Kitsch has been used to talk about culture that is considered inferior," said Charles Emmer, professor of philosophy at Emporia State University. Emmer has studied aesthetics and worked in the art world in New York City.

"The idea of culture in bad taste, it has been associated with the idea of sentimentality and nostalgia."

There are new attitudes about kitsch today in the art world and wider culture, he said.

"Most of these things Cassell collected are old remnants of a bygone era," Emmer said.

Cassell agreed, pointing to the 50s and 60s furniture he has collected.

"It brings imagery of

the past," he said. Cassell's favorite piece is the yellow submarine, which friends have referred to as the "vellow coffin."

But he was surprised at which items American Pickers purchased.

"They bought 30 items and half of the items were for their personal collections," he said.

They walked away with two Egyptian lamps, which Cassell said were hard to part with.

Cassell bought one of the lamps years ago and only recently found the matching one.

After all these years, Cassell said he is ready to begin parting with the items as he is considering selling them.

"It is very rare and not mass produced," he said of the pieces.

Certainly, the art has become a part of him.

"I like to live with the stuff in my house," he said. "I rotate pieces from the buildings to the house so I can see them more often."

Gay marriage ban struck in Pennsylvania Police: Actor told 911 he

PHILADELPHIA Pennsylvania's ban on gay marriage was overturned by a federal judge Tuesday in a decision that legalized the practice throughout the Northeast and sent couples racing to pick up licenses.

U.S. District Judge John E. Jones III called the plaintiffs - a widow, 11 couples and one couple's teenage daughters - courageous for challenging the constitutionality of the ban passed by lawmakers in 1996.

"We are a better people than what these laws represent, and it is time to discard them into the ash heap of history," the judge wrote.

The judge declined to put his ruling on hold for a possible appeal by Republican Gov. Tom Corbett, so it went into and missing out on our

immediate effect. The governor, who opposes gay marriage, did not issue a statement or indicate whether he would appeal. However, his state party chairman complained that an "activist" judge had usurped the power of the Legislature.

Amid a frenzy of celebration across the state, county offices in Philadelphia stayed open late to handle marriage applications, while officials in Pittsburgh were closed for election day but accepting them online. Couples must wait three days before getting married, unless a sympathetic judge grants a waiver.



Bomb blasts in Nigeria kill at least 118

JOS, Nigeria — Two car bombs exploded at a bustling bus terminal and market in Nigeria's central city of Jos on Tuesday, killing at least 118 people, wounding dozens and leaving bloodied bodies amid the flaming debris.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the twin car bombs. But they bore the hallmarks of Boko Haram, the Islamic extremist group that abducted nearly 300 schoolgirls last month and has repeatedly targeted bus stations and other locations where large numbers of people gather in its campaign to impose Islamic law on Nigeria.

The second blast came half an hour after the first, killing some of the rescue workers who had rushed to the scene, which was obscured by billows of black smoke.

"It's horrifying, terrible," said Mark Lipdo of the Stefanos Foundation, a Christian charity based in Jos, who described the sickening smell of burning human flesh.

"Firemen are still trying to put them out. We believe we will find more bodies," Mohammed Abdulsalam, zonal coordinator for the agency, told The Associated Press. He said the fires were being fueled by flammable goods at the market, including rubber sandals.

Tensions have been rising between Christians and Muslims in Jos, the capital of Plateau state in Nigeria's Middle Belt region that divides the country into the predominantly Muslim north and Christian south. It is a flashpoint for religious violence, and there were fears the attacks could ignite a new round of sectarian violence.

President Goodluck Jonathan indicated he blamed Boko Haram for Tuesday's bombings, extending sympathies to affected families in a statement and assuring "all Nigerians that the government remains fully committed to winning the war

N. Korea building collapse kept in secret for 5 days

SEOUL, South Korea - When a South Korean ferry sank with hundreds trapped inside last month, the whole world knew about it. But in North Korea, there was utter silence about the collapse of a 23-story apartment building for five days, until state media issued a rare apology.

The North is not a black hole for information. More than 2 million people have cellphones. Hundreds of foreigners live in Pyongyang, the showcase capital where the collapse occurred a week ago Tuesday. AVOICE **Should Bashar** Assad face trial?

eports have circulated over the last several weeks that Syrian President Bashar Assad's forces are gaining the upper hand in that nation's ugly civil war - and are once again committing atrocities using internationally banned chemical weapons. This time, the allegation is that the regime is dropping chlorine gas bombs from helicopters over civilian targets.

If an investigation underway by the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons confirms the latest allegation — leveled by France, among others — it will be time to bring Assad before the International Criminal Court to answer war crimes charges.

Why now? Why not a year ago, when Assad used chemical weapons, including deadly sarin gas? Because until recently there remained a chance — slim though it was — for a diplomatic solution to the Syrian crisis and for Assad's negotiated exit. Knowing that a jail cell awaited him at The Hague if he left the country would have been a disincentive for Assad to leave voluntarily. But the closer Assad comes to prevailing in the war, the less need there is to keep that diplomatic exit open.

Members of the U.N. Security Council are reportedly drafting a letter to refer Assad's actions to the ICC. One challenge will be to win the backing of the United States; to that end, the letter has apparently been written specifically to allay U.S. concerns that American troops or the Israeli government will somehow end up before the tribunal.

The second — and far greater — challenge will be to win Russian support. As one of the council's five permanent members, Russia has a veto, and President Vladimir Putin has been in Assad's corner from the start of the civil war. As his behavior in Ukraine demonstrates, Putin clearly doesn't mind flouting international conventions. We hope he at least recognizes that the world must stand united against chemical weapons, and that Assad needs to be called to account.

There is narrow cause for optimism. It was Russian intervention (after the threat of U.S. military action) that led Assad to admit last fall that he had chemical weapons, and to accept their supervised removal from his country. That process has progressed more slowly than anticipated. Although the last shipment remains stalled, international monitors are hopeful that the stockpiles will be gone.

Chlorine, because of its pervasive use in industry, is not covered under the reporting require ments of the international Chemical Weapons Convention. But that convention, which Syria signed when it promised to give up chemical weapons, does ban using chlorine gas as a weapon. If the investigation finds the gas was used, Assad must be held accountable. The Security Council should put the war crimes referral to a vote and force Russia's hand. If Russia vetoes it, then at least the world will be able to see who stands for humanity and who stands against it.

ver since the financial crash of 2008, we've been having an anxious national debate about the growing income gap. What does it mean for American society when most workers' wages are flat and almost all economic gains flow to the top 1 percent — or to the top onetenth of 1 percent?

But it's a discussion that too often turns into a sterile squabble over economic theology between liberal populists, who want to tax the rich, and supply-siders, who say that cutting taxes will add jobs, reward entrepreneurship and raise all boats.

So maybe it would be helpful to set the problem of the income gap aside for a while and focus instead on a problem everyone can agree on: the opportunity gap.

The American dream is the idea that anyone can get ahead in life with talent and hard work. But that ideal of wide-open opportunity has been dented quite a bit in the economic stagnation of the last few years.



of opportunity, the two political parties may actually be able to have a respectful, fact-based discussion, even though they obviously won't agree on every solution," said William A. Galston, a former Clinton aide now at the Brookings Institution.

If only it were that easy.

But here's a starting point for that discussion: education.

Education has long been the traditional route to opportunity for American families of modest means. But a growing educational achievement gap between low-income and affluent kids is making that path both harder and less accessible. And the gap is getting wider, mostly because wealthy kids' test scores have been improving dramatically while middle-class kids' have improved only slightly over time. "The top has pulled away from the middle," says Sean Reardon of Stanford's Graduate School of Education. Strikingly, much of that income differential in test scores shows up among kids who are tested in the first months of kindergarten, before they've spent significant time in school. "It's preschool," Reardon said, along with "the out-of-school environment, that creates the gap." Affluent kids are far more likely to get a good preschool education and have parents who read to them and nurseries full of educational toys. And the gap only widens from there. Other scholars found in 2006, that parents in the top onefifth of households spent about \$7,500 more each year on their children — on child care, tutors, after-school programs and athletics — than households in the

bottom fifth. Much of that spending, of course, was designed to improve kids' chances of getting into a good college, the biggest tollbooth on the opportunity trail.

Canadian writer Chrystia Freeland calls this "the educational arms race."

"We're all going to do everything we can for our kids, of course; there's no way to stop that," she told me. "But it creates a huge difference in where people are at the starting line.'

One obvious way to address the problem would be with free, high-quality preschool for all children. Thirty states have already established universal preschool programs, including conservative Oklahoma and Georgia.

So far, Republicans in Congress have resisted Obama's proposal for a federal program that would help fund pre-K programs across the entire country. But if they start seeing results from states that aren't controlled by Democrats, perhaps they can be brought around. Another important element for leveling the educational playing fields is community colleges, which have historically been a route both to four-year degrees and to better jobs for low-income students. But community colleges are struggling in both blue and red states. During the recession, states made deep cuts in their funding. The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities reported this month that state spending on both two-year and four-year public colleges has declined 23 percent per student since 2007. Providing universal preschool and improving community colleges won't close the opportunity gap. But with both parties agreeing that the gap needs attention, they might provide a starting point for creative politicians to find some common ground and even to seize an opportunity.

WASHINGTON Opening another legal attack on the NFL over the long-term health of its athletes, a group of retired players accused the league in a lawsuit Tuesday of cynically supplying them with powerful painkillers and other drugs that kept them in the game but led to serious complications down the road.

The lawsuit, which seeks unspecified damages on behalf of more than 500 ex-athletes, charges the NFL with chasing profits over protecting its players' health.

According to the lawsuit, players were routinely given cocktails of drugs that included narcotic painkillers Percodan, Percoset and Viodin, anti-inflammatories such as Toradol, and sleep aids such as Ambien.

Toradol, which can be injected, was described as "the current gameday drug of choice of the NFL." The medication can raise the risk of heart attack, stroke or intestinal bleeding.

This Date in Baseball

May 21 1926 — Earl Sheely of the Chicago White Sox hit three doubles and a home run against the Boston Red Sox. Sheely doubled in each of his last three at-bats the previous day to give him seven consec-utive extra-base hits, tying a major league record. The six doubles in the two games also tied a major

2010 - Dan Haren doubled twice, drove in three runs and pitched eight strong innings, offsetting Ed-win Encarnacion's three home runs for Toronto, and the Arizona Diamondbacks beat the Blue Jays 8-6. Haren allowed four runs on nine hits and two of En-carnacion's three homers.

Macaron: Quest for perfection

urely, all home chefs have experienced a ' kitchen catastrophe so great they will likely never revisit the recipe in fear of evoking those jarring feelings of defeat. For me, that dreadful recipe was a tiny French cookie that so destroyed my culinary confidence, I vowed to never tell a soul of my failure. Until now.

Success in the kitchen has always come quite naturally to me. With fond memories of family recipes, cooking is a therapeutic hobby. If I'm feeling unimpressive, I take to the kitchen, and in 20 minutes I'm feeling as accomplished as Fannie Farmer. However, I always have more fun than Fannie.

Improvisation with ingredients suited me more than Farmer's penchant for exact measurements. Who can be bothered with systematic use of cups and spoons when everyone in your kitchen is drooling from

anticipation of your banana bread with tangy lemon cream cheese frosting?

For years, modifying recipes with nary a glance at the adorable porcelain kitty cat measuring cups that my sister gave me one Christmas had worked for me. As much as I enjoyed the baking process, I was more concerned with making a recipe my own and racing to feed my fans, because the flattery that followed tasted so good.

But my rebel chef swagger was challenged when I met the macaron, the tiny French cookie sandwich that appears deceivingly carefree in its delightful pastel colors and creamy fillings but has a wicked reputation for being difficult to make.

A few years ago, in the midst of a surge in macaron popularity, I turned to my prized book, "Baking" by James Peterson, for a recipe. Skipping over all of the textbooky hoopla, I looked at the ingredients: "What's so hard about whipping together sug-

ar and egg whites?" I thought. Little did

I know how crucial was this seemingly simple task.

My first attempt, involving a smoky oven and someone else's confusion of wax paper for parchment, shan't be detailed here. But it wasn't enough for me to refuse to try again. Attempt No. 2 was just as tragic.

That second time, I hastily whipped the meringue, taking great care in crafting the perfect color batter. The additional food coloring may have caused it to be a bit runny, but never mind that. The color, Purple Mountains' Majesty, was impeccable. I gingerly squeezed each shell into little half-dollarsize circles on the parchment. I smiled at them, and, as they gleamed back at me, I placed them into the oven. This would be the last time I would see my precious cookies whole.

As I was fitting a bag with a pastry tip to pipe the filling, I heard a strange sizzling in the oven. It was the batter, melting from the pan and dripping onto the bottom of the oven. Three open windows, one fight with the smoke detector and

American's Paris kitchen is a way of life

PARIS — David Lebovitz snaps a photo of a practically perfect croissant before taking a bite, then smiling slightly.

He'll probably be asked for the recipe later, though he did not bake the croissant, nor was it made in his kitchen. But after six cookbooks, more than 27,000 tweets and a food website dating to the early years of html, readers expect recipes to go with the photos of Parisian food most can only crave from a distance.

Lebovitz spent 13 years as a chef at Alice Waters' Chez Panisse, quit to write books in 1999, then like many an American author before him moved to Paris in 2004 without a plan.

"I thought, maybe I'll move to Paris because I can write there," he said in a recent interview after ruefully acknowledging his lack of a dramatic backstory. A decade later, he has no intention of opening his own restaurant or bakery — France's bureaucracy is daunting even for natives.

perwork are true. I love cooking and I love baking but owning a business it's probably 10 percent cooking and baking and 90 percent paperwork and bureaucracy," he said. "I decided to take a pass."

His latest book, "My Paris Kitchen," feeds into the desire to cook, shop and eat in the city that prides itself on being the culinary center of the world. several dirty dish towels later, I hung up my apron, closed my "Baking" book and promised to never revisit that page, or any macaron recipe, ever again.

So when my editor gave me a stack of new macaron books recently and inquired about my interest in doing a story, I was conflicted.

After weeks of staring at the covers with those glossy meringue biscuits oozing with ganaches and butter creams, I decided I was not going to be defeated by these pretentious, dastardly French confections.

I signed up for a class, "Being a Chef: Le Macaron with Madelaine Bullwinkel," at Alliance Francaise de Chicago.

Bullwinkel, who's been teaching French cuisine at Chez Madelaine cooking school for nearly four decades, learned this macaron recipe from Paris' Lenotre cooking school and tea house on the Champs-Elysees. The macaron is said to have been introduced to France in the 16th century by Catherine de' Medici, an Italian noblewoman and queen to King Henry II.

My main advice: Get all of the tools. You'll thank yourself. The time it will take you to run to a specialty store to pick up a tamis – the only tool missing from the Tribune's test kitchen — will be less than what it'll take to try to push the almond meal and sugar mixture through a typical wire sieve. My arms and I learned this the hard way.

I arose from the kitchen with sore arms but better off than my first and second attempts — I had macarons to share.

VANILLA MACARONS Prep: 1 hour / Cook: 30 minutes / Makes: 50 to 60 macarons

TIPS FROM BULLWINKEL

A tamis (pronounced TAM-mee) is a very fine sieve with a flat bottom and can be much wider than the typical strainer. Press as much of the almond meal and sugar mixture through the tamis as possible so the batter doesn't come out too thin.

Clean the metal bowl of a stand mixer with distilled white vinegar, which acidulates egg whites so they don't yellow and allows them to rise. It also removes detergent and soap residue from the bowl.

You can't always trust temperature settings on an oven. Put an oven thermometer inside for best results.

If working alone, stand the pastry bag in a tall beer glass to free both hands for pouring the batter.

If you get small peaks on the tops of the shells when squeezing the batter onto the parchment, wet your finger with water, then smooth it over.

Bob's Red Mill brand of almond meal passes the easiest through a tamis.

Parchment paper Food processor with blade attachment Tamis, see tips Curved hard plastic bowl scraper Stand mixer, whisk attachment Large rubber spatula Large durable pastry bag (18-inch) ■ #7 or #10 pastry tip

Macaron shells:

250 grams finely ground almonds (almond flour or almond meal), see tips

350 grams confectioners' sugar

 200 grams egg whites, at room temperature (save 4 yolks for the filling)

50 grams granulated sugar (sifted to avoid lumps)

■ 100 grams confectioners' sugar

1/2 tablespoon vanilla

3) Empty mixture into tamis; use a hard plastic bowl scraper to scrape the mixture through the tamis into a bowl. Add any residual pieces of almond meal that won't pass through sieve, or else the batter will be too thin.

4) Clean the metal bowl of a stand mixer with distilled white vinegar. Beat egg whites in mixer at level 2 (or low), for 2 minutes. Turn setting to 4 (or medium); add the granulated sugar a little at a time over a period of 1 minute, letting each addition dissolve before adding more. When the whites are thick enough so that the beater leaves a noticeable trace, turn mixer off; add remaining 100 grams confectioners' sugar. Turn mixer to level 10 (high); beat until the whites have risen and are stiff, about 1 minute. They will appear firm and glossy. Add vanilla: beat

smooth and falls from the scraper in a steady stream, it is the proper consistency. This may take longer than expected. The batter will go from looking fluffy and airy to being thicker, with no bubbles.

7) Fit a #7 or #10 pastry tip inside the pastry bag. Twist the bag right above the pastry tip and push the twisted portion into the pastry tip so the batter won't drip out. Scrape batter into bag. (If working alone, stand bag in a tall empty beer glass.) If your pastry bag is not large enough to hold all the batter, do this in batches. When it's full, twist top of bag and turn over in the ball of your hand.

8) Dot corner of cookie sheets with a little batter to anchor parchment in place. While holding bag from the top, hold tip close to parchment, squeeze from the top of the bag, counting to 5 to form 1 1/2- to 2-inch circular cushions of batter. When squeezing, do not move bag or raise tip from parchment. At 5, stop applying pressure, and twist in a quick motion of the wrist. Repeat to fill the baking pans with macaron shells. Frequently, stop to push batter down in the bag with the scraper to

avoid air pockets

9) Bake macarons, 5 minutes at 300 degrees. Turn the heat down to 250 degrees; bake another 15 minutes. The batter will have risen and the tops will have a smooth, firm surface. The macarons are done when they do not move when pushed lightly from the side with a finger. Remove the macarons from the oven. 10) To chill the bottom of the macarons and stop them from overcooking, first remove cookie sheets that are in the freezer. Slide parchment with macarons onto a cold sheet and let it rest, 30 seconds. Then slide parchment onto a cake rack to cool completely. Repeat with remaining parchment sheets full of macarons. When the macaron shells are thoroughly cooled, loosen them one by one. Then fill.

VANILLA BUTTERCREAM FILLING

You will have extra frosting to freeze for another use.

TOOLS:

- Thermometer Stand mixer, paddle at-tachment Decorating bag
- Filling:
- 140 grams whole milk
- 60 grams granulated
- sugar 1 vanilla bean, seeds and pod, see note
- 60 grams egg yolks (about 4 large)
- 60 grams granulated sugar

400 grams unsalted butter (3 1/2 sticks), cut in 2 tablespoon pieces

DIRECTIONS:

1) Heat milk to a simmer in

a saucepan with 60 grams sugar and the vanilla bean seeds and pod until a skin forms. Stir together yolks and 60 grams sugar in a small bowl. Stir hot milk into yolks a little at a time so that the eggs don't curdle. Remove vanilla pod; transfer custard mixture to a clean saucepan.

2) Heat liquid over medium-low until it coats the sides of the pan (it should be about 180 degrees). Pour custard into a mixer bowl; beat on medium until it cools to 86 degrees. Beat in soft butter 2 tablespoons at a time. Set aside in a cool place until ready to use.

3) Spoon buttercream into a decorating bag. For each macaron, squeeze a 1/4-inch thick layer of filling over 1 macaron shell. Cover with another macaron shell. Repeat.

2) Combine almond meal and 350 grams confectioners' sugar in a food processor with blade attachment. Process for 2 minutes, stopping once to scrape the bottom and sides of bowl.

5) Spread on the pie, cover and place in the refrigerator for 2 hours. Top with favorite whipped topping (use real whipping cream). Garnish with caramel topping, chocolate or nuts, as desired. Chill for at least 4 hours.

6) Allow slices to sit at room temperature for 5-10 minutes before serving. This allows the French silk layer to soften to the desired consistency.

Oven baking ensures perfect frittatas

JEANMARIE BROWNSON MCT

Our spring entertaining often centers on brunch after an early morning bike ride or hike in the woods with friends. Hungry, we're looking for strong coffee and an easy to assemble main course. Enter the oven-baked frittata. Fresh eggs, beaten with cream or milk, embrace tender vegetables and fresh herbs.

Easier than an omelet, Italian-inspired frittatas are cooked in a skillet with the vegetables stirred in rather than used as a filling for folded eggs. Frittatas can be cooked completely on the stove top. I prefer to cook them in a low oven ing and overcooking.

As for the flavorings, fresh, tender spring vegetables, briefly cooked in advance, welcome the velvety texture of gently cooked eggs. Think asparagus, new potatoes, port and serving. skinny tender carrots, baby spinach and sweet served at room temonions.

In the first recipe, fresh mozzarella offers silken bits in between the eggs and vegetables. When the asparagus is very tender and fresh, I skip peeling the stalks. Fingerling potatoes, cut into 1-inch rounds, can stand in for round new potatoes. Green onions and fresh dill perfume the whole dish.

Bagged, peeled baby carrots work OK in a lunchbox. For a special brunch dish, I seek out the superslender carrots in various shades of 6 servings

After the base ingredients are sauteed, pour in the eggs for a savory frittata.

8 small (1-inch diameter) new potatoes (12 ounces total), scrubbed clean,

quartered 1 bunch (12 ounces) asparagus, tough ends trimmed

Chopped fresh dill, for garnish

DIRECTIONS:

1) Heat oven to 325 degrees. Put potatoes into a large microwave-safe bowl. Add water to barely cover potatoes. Cover with a lid or plastic wrap vented at one corner. Microwave on high (100 percent power), stirring once, until nearly fork-tender, 4-5 minutes. Drain.

2) Meanwhile, cut asparagus into 1 inch lengths and set tips aside. Heat olive oil in a 12-inch ovenproof skillet over medium heat. Add asparagus stalks; cook until nearly fork-tender, about 3 minutes. Stir in asparagus tips and green onions; cook 1 minute. Remove from heat; stir in potatoes and dill. (Mixture can be made ahead up to 2 days; rewarm before continuing.)

3) Whisk together eggs, milk, salt and pepper in a medium bowl.

4) Place skillet with vegetables over medium heat. When hot, sprinkle cheese over vegetables. Reduce heat to low; gently pour egg mixture over vegetables. Cook until bottom is nearly set, about 3 minutes. Transfer to oven; cook until a knife inserted in center comes out clean, about 20 minutes. Serve warm sprinkled with more dill.

St. Michaels icon serving up artisanal ice cream

ST. MICHAELS, Md. — Justine's Ice Cream Parlour is mixing old traditions with new flavors with the help of new small-batch, artisanal ice cream.

The recipes come from the handiwork of 20-year-old Tyler Heim, the general manager of Justine's who recently completed an ice cream making course at Penn State University, and is mixing up fresh, local ingredients in the ice cream to satisfy anyone's sweet tooth.

Heim, who has been working in ice cream parlors since he was 13 and described himself as always being an "ice cream parlor kind of guy," said instructors at Penn State really pushed for buying ice cream mix from a manufacturer.

"I figured, why can't I just make my own mix?" Heim said. "I don't want guar gum in my ice cream. I don't want high fructose corn syrup. I want cane sugar, and I want fresh heavy cream, fresh milk."

It's a food science, as opposed to a culinary art, Heim said, and it's all about composition, which he said is something he learned at Penn State.

"We have a secret ingredient that helps our texture become what it is, and that secret ingredient is booze. There's a little bit of Sailor Jerry in there. It really takes it to the next level," Heim said, who added that all the alcohol ends up being cooked out by the time the final product is ready.

"What it does is it affects the freezing temperature, so when your freezing temperature is a little bit below what it should be, it gives it that soft, really emulsified, nice taste to it."

Justine's is now making a frenchstyle ice cream with a crème anglaise base. Heim said Justine's has three or four flavors right now, including strawberry cheesecake and raspberthan the normal ice cream Justine's uses, Jack & Jill.

"When people tell me my ice cream is better, I don't think they understand what they're doing for me,' Heim said. "That is the biggest favor, the biggest push for me."



Other spring flavors include coffee toffee, which uses roasted coffee beans from Rise Up Coffee in Easton, chocolate chip cookie, cocoa dream, New Hampshire Maple, which uses maple syrup from Olivin's in St. Michaels, and a gollywobbler sorbet, which uses sweet blackberry wine from the St. Michaels Winery.

The spring flavors will be sold both at Justine's, 106 N. Talbot St., St. Michaels, and from Justine's ice cream cart at various farmer's markets and events in the area during the summer.

Besides what can be bought locally, Heim said he and his team at Justine's make everything else that goes into the ice cream from scratch, except for the Oreos, and each flavor is done one batch at a time.

Justine's reopened for the spring in about mid-March.

Heim said that his aunt, Kathy Lash, who is the third owner, bought the business about three years ago from the second owners and worked to return it to what it was originally known for as an icon of St. Michaels - a friendly atmosphere with a wall of milkshakes and "awesome combinations."

With the help of the original owner, Tom Quimby, they worked to restore Justine's to its original state, and Quimby trained Heim how to run the business.

"Our whole motto here is you can do whatever you want. Our wall of shakes is a guideline," Heim said. "If you want to have a sorbet shake with cookies and cream in it, we're not going to stop you. You can do whatever you want.'

But, Heim said this whole venture couldn't have been accomplished without the rest of his team, including sous-chef Stormi Coram and assistant manager Francis Malzone.

What's more, Heim, who has lived ry Oreo, which he said is selling faster in St. Michaels his whole life, said Justine's couldn't have done it without those in the community, too.

"I really do it for the smiles," Heim said.

"Nobody comes into Justine's unhappy, and especially nobody leaves unhappy."

Of the many — Many! — delicious things I've tossed on the grill over the years, I'll confess that oysters never made it onto my menu.

It simply never occurred to me that my experience of this simple raw bar treat could be elevated by the application of a few flames. That is, until I recently attended an oyster event at the South Beach Wine and Start to finish: 15 min-Food Festival in Miami utes, plus shucking time Beach. At this rooftop oyster outing, numerous chefs were offering up grilled oysters fresh off the flames.

One variation topped the oyster with a thick slab of chorizo and manchego cheese. Amazing. But my favorite was from Hung Huynh, the chef at Catch Miami and winner of the third season **I** tablespoon minced





Set the oysters directly on the grill grates and cook for about 30 seconds, or until just barely heated. Use tongs to carefully transfer the oysters (the shells will be hot) to a platter. Serve immediately.
