omposing a song takes time and reflection for jazz trumpeter Theo Croker. "It is a creative process," said the 29-year-old Leesburg native who has received national acclaim for his newest album "AfroPhysicist." "You have to let things go over in your head a few times. An idea can float around in my head for a long time before I turn it into a final piece."

Indeed, it took Croker three years to release "AfroPhysicist," but he wanted to make sure the album hit all the right notes.

The album reflects his experiences traveling around the world and meeting and inter-

TAVARES New construction up but tax roll sees only slight gain

New construction added more than \$295 million in taxable value to Lake County's 2014 tax roll, an 88.5 percent increase over the amount of new construction seen last year, Property Appraiser Carey Baker said Friday.

"For the second year in a row, new construction is the driver of tax roll growth for the county and most cities," he only grew by about said in a press release.

Some 1,586 new residential homes and 74 new commercial buildings were added to the tax roll this year, Baker said, compared with 874 residential and 46 commercial starts last year.

"This is also the first year since 2007 in which all cities are seeing increases in single-family residential values," Baker said in the release.

WASHINGTON - Libertarian-minded and moderate Republicans joined forces early Friday morning with Democrats in an early morning House vote to block the federal government from interfering with states that permit the use of medical marijuana.

The unusual coalition produced a surprising 219-189 vote in the GOP-controlled

Croker said he grew to love music at an early age, influenced by what he heard on TV and the movies.

"I think living life has been the biggest inspiration for my music," he said.

But it was his grandfather, legendary jazz artist Doc Cheatham, who continued to inspire him after hearing him play at the Sweet Basil, a jazz club in New York City, his mother Alicia Croker said.

She said her son grew up surrounded by music.

"He kind of grew into the music naturally and did all the hard work to make it a reality for him," the Tavares High School guidance counselor said of her son, who began taking trumpet lessons at age 11. "He has been amazingly focused and not afraid to take some chances."

Croker said he learned a lot from his grandfather, a Grammy award-winning artist.

"He always emphasized a musician should learn to be themselves and find their own voice," he said. "I went my own way. Even if it was not accepted, I would stick with it anyway."

Leesburg still has a soft spot in Croker's heart.

"It was quiet and safe," he said, adding he was appreciative of his nice, pure upbringing.

Alicia said her son was independent, leaving home at age 16 to attend The Douglas Anderson School of the Arts.

"He lived in a different environment away from us to be in a full-time music curriculum," she said. "I thought that was pretty brave.'

After graduating, he attended the Oberlin Conservatory in Oberlin, Ohio. He graduated in 2007.

He then began playing with older musicians such as Benny Powell, Jimmy and Tootie Heath, Billy Hart and Marcus Belgrave, according to his biography from his publicist.

In 2006, he received the Presser Music Foundation Award, using the grant money to record his first studio album, "The Fundamentals," according to the biography.

He then spent seven years in China. "The experience

pushed him to broaden his idea of jazz to encompass other genres, including salsa, fusion/ rock, blues, etc.," the biography states.

Traveling has reminded him how large and diverse the world is, he said.

Croker hopes people's spirits are lifted by his music.

"I feel fortunate to be in a position to have my music be relevant and plan to continue to strive to remain relevant to people's needs artistically," he said.

His music expresses love and heartbreak, he said.

"Heartbreak is probably the biggest theme of anyone's music," he said. "There is social commentary in my music. I hope when I write a song that people read the name, it settles in their mind and helps them deal with the same lesson, principle or interaction that I have."

And the artist never tires of the trumpet, referring to it as powerful and expressive.

"My goal is to continue to push boundaries, travel, learn about different cultures and continue to heal people," he said.

"It is totally unacceptable," Obama said. "Our vets deserve the best. They've earned it."

The president appointed Sloan Gibson, the No. 2 at the Veterans Affairs Department, as temporary secretary as the search for a permanent successor began. Obama also asked Rob Nabors, a top White House aide who has been dispatched to the VA to oversee a broad review, to stay for the time being.

Gibson, who has been Shinseki's deputy for about three months, was formerly president and chief executive officer of the USO, the nonprofit organization that provides programs and services to U.S. troops and their families. Gibson is the son of an Army Air Corpsman who served in World War II and grandson of a World War I Army infantryman.

Republicans in Congress said the shake-up wasn't enough to solve problems at an agency that has been struggling to keep up with a huge demand for its services — some 9 million enrolled now compared to 8 million in 2008. The influx comes from returning Iraq and Afghanistan veterans, aging Vietnam War vets who now have more health problems, a move by Congress to expand the number of those eligible for care and the migration of veterans to the VA during the last recession after they lost their jobs or switched to the VA when their private insurance became more expensive.

According to an arrest affidavit, both he and the girl had posted on Facebook the girl's actual age, which according to a sheriff's official is under 17 years old.

The affidavit adds Wheeler admitted he knew the girl's real age when he had intercourse with her.

The girl told investigators that after the two had sex, Wheeler said couldn't believe he had sex with someone of her age, regretted it and remarked he "could go to prison for a long time," according to police.

LEESBURG Cops to find out if teen fired in self-defense

Officials are trying to determine whether to charge a teen suspect in a Leesburg grocery parking lot shooting earlier this month that left one of his two alleged attackers dead.

Assistant State Attorney Rich Buxman said Thursday he will try to determine if the shots fired by 17-year-old Tederien M. Jackson were in self-defense in the May 16 incident involving 24-year-old Stacy Maurice Sayles and an unidentified Leesburg High School student.

According to police reports released Friday, after Jackson was met by a barrage of punches by the high school student and thrown to the ground by Sayles, Jackson allegedly started shooting from the ground. However, at least one witness said Jackson SEE SHOOTING | A4

The Lake County Sheriff's Office detained five "persons of interest" late Friday afternoon in what may be a drug-related shootout between vehicles, and deputies are looking for a possible injured person after blood was found in one of the vehicles.

Sgt. James Vachon, sheriff's spokesman, said detectives determined that two vehicles were involved

in an altercation near the Sunoco gas station at 940 U.S. Highway 27 in Clermont sometime around 1:30 p.m. Friday.

"The individuals in both cars were familiar with one another and at some point gunfire was exchanged; this was not a random act and may be drug related," Vachon said.

Medicare ban on sex reassignment surgery lifted

SAN FRANCISCO — Medicare can no longer automatically deny coverage requests for sex reassignment surgeries, a federal board ruled Friday in a groundbreaking decision that recognizes the procedures are medically necessary for some people who don't identify with their biological sex.

Ruling in favor of a 74-yearold transgender Army veteran whose request to have Medicare pay for her genital reconstruction was denied two years ago, a U.S. Department of Health and Human Services review board said there was no justification for a three-decade-old agency rule excluding such surgeries from treatments covered by the national health program for the elderly and disabled.

"Sometimes I am asked aren't I too old to have surgery. My answer is how old is too old?" the veteran, Denee Mallon, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, said in an email interview before the board issued its decision. "When people ask if I am too old, it feels like they are implying that it's a 'waste of money' to operate at my age. But I could have an active life ahead of me for another 20 years. Medicare and Medicaid Services, the agency within HHS that manages Medicare, opted not to defend the transgender surgery exclusion before the five-member board and had initiated the process for lifting it on its own before Mallon filed her complaint.

The ruling does not apply to Medicaid, which provides health coverage for individuals and families with low-incomes and is regulated by the states. Some states have exclusions on sex reassignment surgeries and the sex hormones transgender people often take during their transitions, while others evaluate claims on a caseby-case basis.

Transgender health advocates said that because private insurance companies and Medicaid programs often take their cues from the federal government on what is considered medically necessary, elective or experimental, the decision could pave the way for sex-reassignment surgeries to be a routinely covered benefit.

Mallon was born a man and has lived as a woman on and off since she was a teenager and full time since 2009. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services must eliminate its blanket exclusion on transition-related surgeries within 30 days and re-evaluate Mallon's medical claim in light of the change, the HHS board said.



India: 2 police fired for not acting in rape case

LUCKNOW, India — Facing relentless media attention and growing criticism for a series of rapes, state officials in north India fired two police officers Friday for failing to investigate the disappearance of two teenage cousins, who were gang-raped and later found hanging from a tree.

But in a country with a long history of tolerance for sexual violence, the firings also came as the state's top official mocked journalists for asking about the attack.

"Aren't you safe? You're not facing any danger, are you?" Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Akhilesh Yadav said in Lucknow, the state capital. "Then why are you worried? What's it to you?"

The gang rape, with video of the girls' corpses hanging from a mango tree and swaying gently in a breeze, was the top story Friday on India's relentless 24-hour news stations. But in just the past few days, Uttar Pradesh has also seen the mother of a rape victim brutally attacked and a 17-year-old girl gangraped by four men.

Uttar Pradesh is India's most populous state, with nearly 200 million people.

ublic university presidents across America are pulling down big bucks as their students accumulate massive debt and are increasingly taught by part-time faculty.

In fact, a new study has found that the universities with the highest-paid presidents have seen student debt and the use of adjunct faculty grow at a much faster pace than the average public university.

The study by the Institute for Policy Studies, a left-leaning Washington research group, looked at the 25 public universities with the highest executive pay from fall 2005 to summer 2012.

The University of Florida ranked 14th on the list, paying President Bernie Machen a total of more than \$4.3 million over that period, according to the study.

The study found that average annual executive pay at the 25 universities grew to nearly \$1 million in 2012. At the same time, the number of permanent faculty fell. By fall 2012, adjuncts and other part-time faculty outnumbered permanent professors at those universities for the first time.

The student debt crisis — which observers have been busily reminding us has reached the \$1 trillion mark nationally — is also worse at universities with the highest-paid presidents, according to the report. Yet, inexplicably, administrative spending outstripped scholarship spending at those schools by a more than 2-to-1 margin.

As UF searches for a new president, the study shows that high presidential pay doesn't necessarily translate to a better learning environment for students.

To Machen's credit, he has made a priority of providing scholarships to first-generation students. In 2008, he donated his \$285,000 in performance bonuses to the scholarships.

Nonetheless, Machen has been well compensated in his tenure at UF. His performance bonuses were eventually replaced by retirement contributions and retention bonuses worth hundreds of thousands of dollars. He was given a raise last year that brought his pay to more than \$725,000 annually.

His compensation isn't unusual and, in fact, puts him below some of his peers. Machen's compensation ranked 26th among public university presidents in the Chronicle of Higher Education's recently released survey.

The Institute for Policy Studies proposes that state legislatures consider measures to rein in presidential pay. The group recommends limiting administrative salaries to 10 times the pay of the lowest-paid faculty member. It also proposes limiting university spending on administration to twice the amount spent on scholarships. However the issue is addressed, university presidents shouldn't be compensated at the expense of students and faculty, and it seems that is what is happening, at least to some extent.

n early April, swastikas and "Death to the Jews" were painted on walls surrounding the Jewish cemetery in this legendary city on the Black Sea. The graffiti was signed "Right Sector," the name of an ultranationalist movement that took part in the February revolt that ousted the pro-Russian President Viktor Yanukovych.

The Kremlin claims that Ukraine's rebels — who want the country to turn toward Europe rather than Russia — are riddled with anti-Semites and neofascists. The desecration in Odessa seems to fit those charges. But what I heard from Avram Wolff, Odessa's chief rabbi — and from Jews from all over Ukraine - contradicts Moscow's propaganda machine.

Wolff told me that a top Right Sector leader quickly came to his office and denied the group's involvement. "I asked him to prove it by painting over the graffiti,' the rabbi told me in his booklined office. Soon the militiaman, wearing his fatigues with a neofascist shoulder patch, was standing shoulder to shoulder with the bearded Chabad-Lubavitcher rabbi erasing the swastikas. Odessa, whose huge Jewish population was decimated during World War II, is still home to 40,000 Jews and three synagogues; Wolff runs an active congregation, including schools, orphanages and a university, and a newsletter distributed to 15,000 families. "To say there is no anti-semitism in Ukraine is not accurate, because there is anti-semitism everywhere,' says Wolff. "Jews had no real problems, maybe the occasional incident, before the current conflict." "In this conflict," he adds, "there is no involvement of anti-semitism. This is strictly between Ukraine and Russia.' He believes that pro-Russian provocateurs, like the ones he thinks scrawled the graffiti, seek to frighten Jews into asking Russia for help, thus confirming the Kremlin's charges.



The Russian message resonates in some circles because of the role Right Sector, and Ukraine's farright nationalist party Svoboda, played in the Euromaidan revolt and the handful of posts they got in the current interim government.

But Russia grossly exaggerates the role of both groups, according to Josef Zissels, the chairman of the Association of Jewish Organizations and Communities in Ukraine. "Every society has right-wing people," he says. "The question is, what is their strength in society, and what is the mainstream?" This week's Ukrainian presidential election gave a clear answer: The Right Sector candidate, Dmitry Yarosh, won 1 percent of the vote; Oleh Tyahnybok of Svoboda received 1.3 percent. Neither did as well as Jewish businessman Vadim Rabinovich, with 2 percent. Compare that with French and British votes for ultranationalist parties in Sunday's European Parliament elections, respectively 25 and 27 percent. Moreover, Ukrainians of Jewish descent hold critical government posts, including Volodymyr Groysman, 37, a vice prime minister who is designing the critical plan to devolve more power to the regions. When I asked him about Russian claims of anti-semitism in the government, he gave a disgusted look and shot back: "That's a perfect example of black is white and white is black." I heard the same complaints about Russian propaganda from Jewish activists in the Euromaidan revolution, who noted that anti-semitism in Russia is much more blatant than in Ukraine. Jewish journalist Andrei Mysh of Donetsk told me the only anti-semitism that www.dailycommercial.com

disturbed him was the rhetoric of local pro-Russian separatists and the language on Russian TV.

Of course, much of the reason why Russian claims find receptive ears lies with history. My grandparents, who fled Ukraine when it was ruled by the tsars, told me stories of pogroms. Ukraine's nationalist hero Stepan Bandera allied with the Nazis in the struggle to win independence from the Soviet Union (he was ultimately sent to a German concentration camp). This was after dictator Josef Stalin had deliberately starved millions of Ukrainian peasants to death in the 1930s.

Some Ukrainian nationalists and police took part in anti-Jewish pogroms during World War II. (Was that the case, I wonder, when the Germans killed 3,000 Jews from my grandmother's town of Mezritch near Rovno, in August, 1942 — something I learned about for the first time from Rabbi Wolff — or might Ukrainians have helped save the 100 survivors?)

But that was then. Today's Ukraine is a very different place.

It's a place where Ihor Shchupak heads a Department of Holocaust studies at the Jewish Museum and a huge Jewish community center in Dnipropetrovsk, and lectures to university and high school teachers all over Ukraine. And, oh yes, the very successful governor of Dnipropetrovsk, Ihor Kolomoisky, is also of Jewish descent.

It's a place where preconceptions about anti-semitism confront a reality that is oh-so-different. On a Saturday night in the lovely City Park in Odessa, filled with open-air cafes around a bandstand, a singer was belting out "Hava Nagila,' while elderly Jewish (and non-Jewish) ladies danced to the music. It could have been Brooklyn. When it comes to Jewish life in Ukraine, things are not what you expect.



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

OLYMPICS IOC faces trouble finding cities to host games

LONDON — The Olympics have weathered world wars, boycotts and corruption scandals. These days, the IOC has a new crisis on its hands: Finding cities willing to host the games.

The troubled race for the 2022 Winter Olympics is a case in point. High costs and internal political opposition prevented several potential contenders not to bid. Two candidate cities withdrew and two others could still drop out.

The way things are going, the winner could be decided next year by default. Take the games, please.

"I have not seen anything like this before,' senior Norwegian IOC member Gerhard Heiberg said. "This is urgent. We need to sit down and discuss what is going on. We are at a crossroads here." It's a challenge the International Olympic Committee and new President Thomas Bach need to resolve quickly to ensure the long-term viability of the world's most prized sports event. Changes to the bidding process and efforts to reduce the cost of the games are among the key issues being addressed by the IOC as 2020," his blueprint for the future of the Olym-

"I see a problem in Western Europe," Heiberg said. "We have to accept the fact that we are not attractive to Western European countries. People think the games have become gigantic, the investments are too heavy."

The current crisis centers primarily on Winter Games, which also face concerns over whether rising temperatures will prevent countries from holding the event in future decades. But the attention will soon shift to the race for a bigger prize: the 2024 Summer Games.



Prayer meeting between pope, Israel and Palestinian presidents set for June 8

VATICAN CITY - Israeli President Shimon Peres and Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas will join Pope Francis for an afternoon praying for peace at the Vatican on June 8, the Vatican said Thursday.

Francis had invited both men to "my home" to pray during his recent trip to the Middle East. Speaking from the biblical town of Bethlehem, Francis said: "Building peace is difficult, but living without peace is a constant torment."

Both men immediately agreed, and subsequently approved the June 8 date, the Vatican said in a statement Thursday.

Francis has stressed that he is not

Men are called to be strong and courageous

hen asked if he were apprehensive during the second game of the 1973 World Series, which the Mets won by scoring four runs in the 12th inning, Yogi Berra reportedly replied, "No, but I was scared."

He had plenty of reasons. First, the Mets were down to two outs before they scored their first run in the top of the 12th, and then the Oakland Athletics got their first three men on base in the bottom of the inning.

Plenty of reason for apprehension.

Plenty of reason to be scared.

Of course, we're only talking about baseball. But we all know what it's like to be scared.

That was the case about a decade ago while we were living in Lynn, Mass. It was late at night and my wife



woke me shouting, "They're coming in through the bathroom window."

I don't really know what was going through my mind as I ran into the bathroom, other than the fact that I needed to put myself between our unknown intruder and my family. It was more instinct than anything.

Rather than pull open the shower curtain and see my assailant face to face, I made some sort of guttural growl and threw myself across the tub in the general direction of the window.

As I did that, I flung my

forearms up in a sort of violent football blocking motion with the desire to send whoever was entering my house into the next county — at least.

Thankfully, I met no resistance. There was nobody there.

That awful noise my wife heard was actually the radiator in the bathroom that sounded like someone was banging on it with a hammer.

Generally I consider myself more of a coward than a hero, but when I thought my family was threatened, I was willing to put my life on the line and put myself in harm's way.

Not to sound sexist, but that's what a man is supposed to do. Oh I know my wife Nancy would protect our kids like a mama bear if they were threatened, but it's the man's place to protect his family.

While closing his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul wrote, "Be watchful, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong."

Act like men. What did Paul mean by that?

Whoever first asked, "Are you a man or a mouse?" knew exactly what Paul was saying. It's not macho garbage. It means doing what it takes to protect your family, your people. It's sacrifice. It's spending time with your wife or children when you'd rather be watching TV. It's not opening the family to the portals of sin by viewing pornography on the tube or computer. It's being gentle, a man of velvet and steel.

It's acting like men. This is the only place in the Bible that uses the phrase, "Act like men." But Samuel recorded another similar

statement made by the leader of the Philistines when confronted by the Israelites, "Take courage, and be men, O Philistines, lest you become slaves to the Hebrews as they have been to you; be men and fight."

Paul expected the men to be courageous.

And strong.

But that strength was strength of character.

A man doesn't need to bench press his own weight to be courageous. He just needs a big heart.

Men, as we get closer to Father's Day, let's not think about the gifts we hope to receive. Rather, let us consider how we can truly act like men for those we love.

Southern Baptist membership drops for 7th year

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The nation's largest Protestant denomination saw membership decline for the seventh straight year in 2013, according to an annual report released Wednesday.

The report by the Southern Baptist Convention's publishing arm, Lifeway Christian Resources, puts total membership in the Nashville-based SBC at 15.7 million. That's down from 15.9 million in 2012, a decrease of a little less than 1 percent.

Weekly church attendance decreased more than 2 percent last year, falling to 5.8 million as a weekly average for the year.

The report also notes a 1.5 percent decrease in the number of baptisms, falling to 310,368. Baptisms are an important measure for the destrong commitment to evangelism.

Despite the membership decline, the total number of SBC-affiliated churches increased slightly in 2013 to 46,125.

LOS ANGELES - Pastor Pete Bradford, a reformed "dope fiend" from San Diego, went out into the streets of Boyle Heights looking for gang members to pray over. Finding them wasn't hard.

It was the early 1990s, the era of "Boyz n the Hood" and "Colors" and gangsta rap. Everything about gang life in Los Angeles was loud: the jagged slashes of graffiti, the thrum of police helicopters, the percussion of gun blasts.

Bradford, who said God had called him to L.A.'s Eastside, opened the Boyle Heights Christian Center in a lowslung building on 1st Street. The Pentecostal church became known as a house of worship for gang members, drug addicts and lost souls. "It was not unusual to hear gunshots every day," recalled Bradford, 66, who decided to retire last spring when Parkinson's disease made it difficult to control his body. "We had windows shot out. 

Motorola to close Fort Worth smartphone factory

FORT WORTH, Texas Google's Motorola Mobility handset unit announced Friday it will shutter its North Texas factory by the end of this year, barely a year after it opened with much fanfare as the first smartphone assembly plant in the U.S.

At the time, Google had explained its surprising decision by saying the plant's location in Texas would enable it to fulfill customized, builtto-order devices and deliver them anywhere in the U.S. within five days.

But sales of its flagship phone, the Moto X, have been too weak and the costs of running the plant too high to keep operations going, Motorola Mobility spokesman Will Moss said. Singapore-based international contract electronics manufacturer Flextronics Ltd. operates the plant.

NEW YORK — The stock market closed out May mostly higher Friday, sending two out of the three major U.S. indexes to record highs. Trading was uneven, and indexes moved between small gains and losses for most of the day. A late push higher left the Dow Jones industrial average and Standard & Poor's 500 at all-time highs, but just barely. May was the best month for investors since February. The S&P rose 2.1 percent for the month, while the Dow rose 0.8 percent and the Nasdaq rose 3.1 percent. "This market may have been choppy earlier in the year, but the trend is higher," said Karyn Cavanaugh, a market strategist with Voya Investment Management, formerly known as ING Investment Management. The Dow rose 18.43 points, or 0.1 percent, to close at 16,717.17, less than two points above its previous record high set on May 13. The S&P 500 index rose 3.54 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,923.57, also closing at a record. How to help daffodils make more daffodils

Now that daffodil bloom time has passed, some gardeners might be wondering where their flowers were. If some plants remained all leaves, with few or no flowers, why was that?

It might be that overhanging trees have made the location too shady. But the more likely culprit is the plant's age.

As a daffodil bulb gets older, baby bulbs, called offsets, develop snuggled up against its side. You can picture this most clearly if you realize that a daffodil bulb is, essentially, a compressed stem. That stem is the "plate" at the base of the bulb, and the leaves are the fleshy scales up and around it.

With good conditions, a spoon-shaped baby becomes a small flowering bulb after a year, and in another year that small flowering bulb can make two flower buds. After another year, the "double-nose," as it's called, is making offsets of its own.

DAFFODIL FUTURES

Daffodils like moderately rich soil that stays moist but is not soggy. Because most bulb growth takes place after flowering, let the foliage remain undisturbed until it chooses to die down, even if it's not all that pretty in its final throes. No tying it up or tucking it beneath other plants' leaves either, as is sometimes recommended for hiding the foliage out of sight. The leaves need light to fatten up their attendant bulbs.

Daffodils do not need this digging and dividing operation every year, which is one reason they are among

you can add to it from inside the house: vegetable scraps, dryer lint, paper towel rolls, shredtea grounds, etc. (Don't include dairy products, meat, grease, or pet waste).

From outside: grass clippings, leaves, small sticks and twigs, plant clippings, chicken and rabbit manure. Do not use manure from animals such as horses that eat hay from sources that use persistent herbicides on their fields. Modern herbicides can persist for years through the composting process. And don't overcomplicate this. Many books hose ready and spray and articles talk about a proper ratio of green waste (nitrogen source) to brown waste (carbon source). Just keep adding ingredients from wherever you can find it. Shoot for an overall size of about 3-4 feet tall and wide. Just focus on building a nice mix of greens and browns.

MIX IT UP

Find a pitchfork or garden fork and keep it close by. Once a week (more is better), turn over your pile as best you can. It will get harder as you add volume ded paper, coffee and but don't worry about that now. The goal is to introduce more oxygen into the center of the heap while blending it all together. Air is hugely important to the success of quick compost. Not turning or aerating your pile is one of the biggest reasons for ingredients not breaking down. Air is needed because live microorganisms are consuming the components. They need to breathe.

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From recycled glass to concrete, countertops get colorful, creative

Custom-designed by Fu-Tun Cheng of the Berkeley, California-based Cheng Concrete, they feature colors like brick, flowing lines and pictures of nautilus shells.

"With concrete there is a lot of room for creativity, to say nothing of color," says Zuckerman, a retired psychologist. "It gives you flexibility."

Homeowners looking to spice up their kitchens can install a variety of countertops that go beyond the traditional laminate and tile. Today's options include concrete and butcher-block-style wood, and a range of custom-designed colors and shapes. IceStone countertops use recycled glass from broken bottles.

"So many different materials are used in countertops these days," says Tony Izzo, Curtis Lumber's corporate kitchen and bath manager in Albany, New York. Until about 25 years ago, he says, roughly 90 percent of countertops in U.S. homes were laminate, and the rest tile.

Then DuPont's Corian hit the market, followed by granite and quartz, which are current favorites, he says. Today, just half of countertops are laminate, Izzo savs.

The burgeoning interest in alternative countertops is the natural extension of that trend. And they are becoming more affordable.

Grow branching sunflowers in the view from your kitchen sink for a daily show. After the petals fade, don't cut the flowers if you love birds. Instead let the densely packed mass of seed mature so song birds come to hang on the flowers as they peck away at the seed crop. For those who have never grown flowers from seed, the sunflower is a gateway plant that opens us all to the miracles in the garden. No other is such a huge lure to pollinators for the price of a single seed packet. But if you really want some fun, plant a bag of black oil sunflower bird seed in a barren or neglected corner of your yard. There it becomes the genesis of an entire sunflower forest that transforms your property into bona fide habitat.

Paper flowers: handcrafted and sneeze-free

Malinda Swain has "a thing" about nature, snowy white paper, handmade or recycled anything — and the kind of solitude others dread.

She jokingly calls the hours, days, and weeks spent alone in her suburban studio folding recycled copy paper into three-dimensional flowers "my solitary confinement.'

She sits cross-legged on the floor, folding and folding the crisp paper sheets, her slender fingers moving rhythmically and noiselessly. It's a tactile meditation that's out, fashionable.


BRIDGE A Different Kind of Squeeze



There is a play in bridge called a trump squeeze. The opportunity to use it seldom occurs, but when the proper setup arises, the trump squeeze can be applied with devastating effect.

Consider this deal where West led the jack of diamonds against six spades. Declarer played low from dummy and ruffed West's diamond continuation at trick two. At this point, it might seem that declarer requires a successful club finesse to make the slam, but South decided not to put all his eggs in this one basket.

Instead he cashed the ace of hearts at trick three, then ruffed a heart with dummy's ten. A low trump to the nine was followed by the jack of hearts, ruffed with dummy's jack as East discarded a diamond. South then overtook the queen of trumps with the king and cashed the ace of trumps, discarding a club from dummy as East discarded another diamond. This was now the position:



By this time, declarer knew that East had started with precisely one spade, two hearts, six diamonds and, therefore, four clubs. This meant that East was subject to a trump squeeze, and that it did not matter whether he had the queen of clubs or not. Accordingly, South led the spade

six and discarded the club ten from dummy, placing East in an untenable position. If East discarded a club, declarer would cash the A-K of clubs to establish his jack; if East discarded the diamond queen instead, declarer would cross to dummy with a club and ruff the eight of diamonds to establish the king. Either way, the contract was home.

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



Keep insect pests from ruining your landscape

he heat and humidity of summer create a thriving environment for our insect friends and foes. Butterflies and lady beetles are out in droves, but so are the chinch bugs, scale, aphids and other plant pests. If insect pests are wrecking your landscape and ruining your weekend, you can take preventative actions to make life easier.

One of the most important steps in reducing pest damage in your landscape is to routinely scout your plants for insects. Scouting can be performed by flipping over leaves and looking for insects and other plant problems.

Venture out into your landscape weekly and focus on the soft growing tips and the oldest leaves of your plants. Plant pests tend to attack or lay eggs on these areas first.

Scan the landscape and look for irregular growth. This could be a





sign of pest problems. If you see abnormal growth, take a closer look. You may have an insect pest lurking on the underside of leaves. The point of scouting is to catch pests early before they require repeated pesticide treatments.

If you locate an insect pest, bring it into the extension office for positive identification. You must know what insect you are dealing with in order to determine the best means of control. Sometimes control is not warranted because the insect that is thought to be a pest is actually a predatory insect that eats other bugs.

Collect your insect specimen in a jar of rubbing alcohol or place a section of the plant containing the insect in a plastic baggie. The more of a sample you can bring in, the better. Master gardeners are available to help you identify landscape problems at the UF/IFAS Extension Lake Coun-

ty Office, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

If it is determined that you have an insect problem, consider using soaps and oils first. If applied correctly, these products can offer effective control while minimizing the use of other insecticides. When using these products, it is important to thoroughly cover the insect, because soaps and oils work by suffocating the pest.

When applying insecticides, always read the label. The label will tell you how to correctly apply the product to control the insect while reducing negative effects on the plant. On tough plants, insects can simply be blasted off with a hard stream of water from a hose.

Catch plant pests early and use the UF/ IFAS Extension Lake County Service to properly identify your insect problems.

Top 5 plants there's no need to buy

First, let me be clear: This isn't a list of plants you shouldn't own, just a list of plants for which there's no need to trade actual cash unless you're feeling picky. These are the usual suspects that spread, slowly or otherwise, in people's yards and many gardeners would be happy to find a good home for their excess.

These are plants you can almost always find for free, if you ask around or find a local plant swap:

1. GENERIC HOSTA. Either the solid green or the green/white variety show up in droves, because the plants do better if they're periodically divided. Most of them are what I call no-name hostas, because they came with someone's house and weren't planted, so no one ever knew their name. But if you've got a shady area, they're super reliable all-season greenery. And usually someone will show up with some big leaf blue hosta to trade, because even gorgeous, pedigreed hostas need dividing sometimes.

2. LILY OF THE VALLEY. These plants are givers that won't stop giving, and their owners won't stop giving them away. Unless your heart is set on the pink variety, you're guaranteed to have your fill of lily of the valley.

3. CHIVES. When I see these plants for sale, I think "Really?! Please, take mine." And if you're smarter than me, you'll put them in pots or else be prepared to dig out the excess. Even garlic chives are likely to make an appearance at most plant swaps.

4. ORANGE DAYLILIES. Borders upon borders' worth show up at every swap. They may not be as exciting as the many varieties available now for purchase, but if you've just got a side of a garage you don't want to have to think about, a row of these babies will take care of it.

5. GRANDMA'S FERNS. There are a lot of gorgeous varieties of ferns worth parting with money for, but if you're just in the market for a back of the shady border staple, nearly everyone who has them has them in droves and will gladly share. (And if they're by a neighboring fence, we'll share them willy nilly.)
