When First Baptist Church of Leesburg recently sold 750 acres along the western edge of Fruitland Park, bordering the Sumter County line adjacent to The Villages, they did not include were 200-plus additional.
Now, with the massive retirement community having announced it will build 2,050 homes in The Villages of Fruitland Park, the church is courting other suitors for that leftover acreage.

## Human error blamed in Blue Rhino explosion

Repeating similar findings from a federal agency earlier this year the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services citture and Consumer Services cit-
ed human error as the cause of the Blue Rhino depot summer explosion in Ta

The investigation was conducted by inspectors with the department's Bureau of Liquefied Gas Inspections and does not ascribe blame, but contains conflicting statements from the plant's managers and workers.

State fire investigators earlier this year said they believe sparks from a forklift starting ignited a propane cloud in the storage yard the night of July 29 as the 20 -pound metal cylinders were drained of eftover gas. The explosiod 50,000
cylinders into flaming missiles. According to the Agriculture and Consumer Services report released Tuesday, Brandon Stewart, the plant's acting manager at the time of the explosion, told investigators he was not aware employees were venting propane containers in the storage yard - which is a violation of the company's operating procedures.
"Plant policy is that no propane is to be manually released at any any container while the container is in the yard," the report stated. According to statements from According to statements from of bleeding the tanks in the storage yard was not unusual storage yard was not unusual,
and some uninjured workers said they were not surprised by the practice.

Consumer Services will take ac tion on the report
The report released Tuesday comes after the Occupational Safety and Health Administration contended earlier this year that Blue Rhino violated 26 federal workplace rules and was fined $\$ 73,000$.
Blue Rhino responded to OSHA that any unsafe conditions leading to the explosion resulted from "unpreventable" and "unforesee able" employee and or supervisor misconduct, according to the company's challenge of federal workplace-safety violations released in May.
A hearing for Blue Rhino to contest OSHA's citations in front of the agency's review commission is set for Sept. 10 in Houston.
No criminal charges were filed in the case.

The women told deputies McCracken got upset after learning the former girlfriend was cook ing his pizza rolls and he attempted to stop both women from eating them, kicked the stove and unplugged it. The women added they "feared" McCracken would hurt them and bar ricaded themselves in a bedroom. But McCracken allegedly broke down the bedroom door, knocking down both women. He then allegedly grabbed and shook his sister.
According to police, both women had visible scratches on them.

Coast-to-coast bike trail funding coming

House Bill 5001, allocating \$15 million for work on a coast-tocoast bicycle trail that will cut though Lake and Sumter counties, was among 21 bills signed into law Monday by Gov. Rick Scott.
The project has been a priority for incoming Senate President Andy Gardiner, R-Orlando, especially since Scott vetoed a $\$ 50$ million allocation for the trail a year earlier. The money would be used to start filling in gaps in Central Florida between existing bicycle and pedestrian trials on both of Florida's coasts. The largest gap remaining is a 30 mile stretch between the end of the Withlacoochee State Trail in northern Pasco County and the beginning of the South Lake Trail in south Lake County
Closing the gap would take the trail from Pasco County through eastern Hernando County, through Sumter County near Webster, and east through Lake County to Clermont, where the South Lake Trail continues east to Orlando and beyond.

When it comes to talking about education in Florida, Gov. Rick Scott and former Gov. Charlie Crist and their campaign allies may campaign allies may The election is still five months away but five moady there has been already there has been a flurry of press releases, staged media events and television ads where each side blames the other for everything from college tuition to education policy and education spending in the state. Crist, who is now a Democrat, is one of several candidates challenging the GOP incumbent but so far Republicans have largely targeted him.
The increased emphasis on education is an acknowledgment that the issue continues to resonate with voters. Even members of Scott's inner circle have long thought that his lackluster poll numbers track back to his decision to push cuts

Lattes, theater tick ets and cable televi sion will still be out of reach for most mini-mum-wage workers. But about $\$ 31,000$ a year should be enough to pay the average rent for a shared one-bedroom apartment, plus utilities, health insurance, groceries and an inexpensive cellphone plan Monday's vote by the Seattle City Council created the nation's high est minimum wage. The state minimum wage in Washington was already $\$ 9.32$ an hour, the high est state wage in the U.S Expatistan, a website that tracks the cost of
living in cities around the world, says New York, San Francisco, Washington, and Seattle are Boston and Seattle are the most expensive U.S. cities overall, in that order. An Associated Press comparison of the cost of living in several other major U.S. cities shows a higher wage would make a difference in those places too, but it won't alow for many extras.

## Politics shaping

 searches for state university presidentsAs Florida State University prepares to interview a politician to be its president, the University of Florida is trying the opposite approach.
Opposite approach.
UF trustees last week approved a 25 -point list of qualifications that they're seeking in the next university president. The job description calls for a leader with a "distinguished academic career." In contrast, Florida State's presidential search committee has so far decided to interview only state Sen. John Thrasher for the job. The group has suspended its hunt for other candidates until Thrasher, a former Florida House speaker who chairs Gov. Rick Scott's re-election campaign, is interviewed this month.

Thrasher also has had stints as state Republican Party chairman and as a lobbyist. His academic experience is limited to serving on Florida State's board of trustees. While the ability to raise money and work with lawmakers are qualities that a public university president needs, that UF is emphasizing academic experience in its credentials is laudable. But that doesn't mean that politics has been taken out of its search process. UF is about six months removed from the governor blowing up its last search. Machen to postpone his retirement.

That has worked out well so far for UF, given that the university has been allocated tens of millions of dollars in its bid to be a top10 public university. But now that UF has resumed its search, it is an open question whether politics will influence the process or the threat of that happening will scare away quality candidates.
UF has touted the transparency in its search process, but the reality is far different. Buried in a UF trustee's letter announcing the new qualifications was news that the university hired Jan fications was news that the university hired Jan
Greenwood, who worked on its last two presiGreenwood, who worked on its last two presi-
dential searches, again as a search consultant. Greenwood has been critical of Florida's Sunshine Law for keeping top candidates from seeking the job. The university is again following the formula used during past again following the formula used during past searches, in whic
Top candidates formally apply at the last minute before a three-day interview process, limiting public scrutiny and increasing the possibility of out-of-sight political interference.

Bowe $\square$ Bergdahl was quickly tempered by media reports that Bergdahl had abandoned his post and that his father made comments opposing the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. Berg- <br> 

dahl's father tweeted, "I am still working to free all Guantanamo prisoners. God will repay for the death of every Afghan child.' Does that include those children killed while being used as human shields by the Taliban? Where is Bergdahl's concern for women who die from "honor killings" and for girls who are denied an education?
The up-front cost of this "prisoner exchange" is the release of five terrorists from the U.S. prison at Guantanamo Bay. Future costs could be much higher. Not to mention the fact that news of the controversial exchange knocked reports on the VA fiasco right off the front pages. Was this partly the administration's intent? Official U.S. policy has been "we don't negotiate with terrorists." Except when we do. Sgt. Distillers have begun producing a rum-like product from sorghum, Baier says, and others using it to make whiskey, beer and cocktail bitters. Soy sauce producers have also shown interest, he says.
Sorghum grain also is ambling to center stage on many chefs' plates. Harvested from a short, stout version of the sorghum plant, the tiny grain has been used as food in Africa for thousands of years, but has been known in the United States mainly as biofuel or animal feed.
Today, the grain is being milled into flour and marketed to the gluten-free and whole-
grain markets, and is being used by chefs in soups, stews and salads. Only 2 percent of production currently goes to food, says Tim Lust, chief executive officer of the United Sorghum Checkoff Program, which markets the grain, but that figure is growing by 25 percent a year. Martha Rose Shulman has compared sorghum grain to Israeli couscous, and recommends it as a base for a blackbean stew as well as for a salad with cucumber, avocado and cherry tomato. At the Clifton Inn in Charlottesville, Virginia, chef Tucker Yoder combines the grain and the syrup in a quinoa and sorghum pud ding. New York chef ding. New York chef

Here's to an inter esting summer, with a bunch of white wines from both Portugal and Spain - arguably the two best places in the world to find today's great values in wine made from grapes you have never heard of, and needn't try to pronounce, and don't eve need to remember. Just find the wines. They'll bring buckets of flavor to your table; they'll make your pa tio al fresco foods eve more delicious than they already are. I've tasted through more than 50 Iberian white wines to nail a dozen and a half that are jus pure deliciousness. You may be familiar with many of the Spanish whites; we all know chardonnay, which Spain also does well and we've all sipped our share of albarino But get acquainted with other Spanish grapes such as godello, xarel-lo and verdejo (verdelho in Portuguese). Thos three have the green ap ple, citrus and minera combo that's something of a mark of Spanish whites. And do not for get sparkling Spanish wines such as cava they're not inexpensive but are as layered as fine Champagne. Portuguese white wine grapes are off-the wall wacky, but only because we do not meet them commonly.
