WASHINGTON - A Romanian hacker is facing charges that he hacked into the Facebook or email accounts of high-ranking U.S. government officials and a relative of two former presidents.
Marcel Lehel Lazar, the hacker known as "Guccifer" who has been linked to the release of private Bush family photos, was in-
dicted Thursday by a federal grand dicted Thursday by a federal grand
jury in Virginia. Lazar, 42, faces charges including wire fraud, unauthorized comput-

The indictment states that from ate 2012 to January 2014 from hacked into the email or Facebook accounts of a former U.S. Cabinet nember, a former member of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, a former presidential adviser and a person elated to two former presidents. The individuals are not identified in the indictment, but the document says that on Feb. 7, 2013 multiple media organization published portions of the content that was taken in the email hack of the pres-
idential relative. On that day the website The Smoking Gun posted photos said to have be swiped in an email hack of the Bush family.
One of the posted photos showed George H.W. Bush during a hospital stay. Two other images, paintings that appeared to be self-portraits done by George W. Bush, received particular media attention. In one, the former president appears to be shaving in the shower. The other is of feet soaking in a bathtub. Neither shows any nudity. The word "Guccifer" is on one photo in translucent, neon blue print.

"They are very successful," he said as they give diners a chance to enjoy breakfast, lunch or dinner while watching action at the airport. "There have been a lot of people who have become pilots because of being around an airport," Brainerd said, recalling back when he and his brother used to fly with their late father to Tampa and they would eat at a greasy spoon shack featuring hot dogs and chili.
"It was some good memories," he said. "Back when I was young they used to call it the $\$ 100$ hamburger because you fly to go eat a hamburger, and by the time you got back it was $\$ 100$ in gasoline and now we call it a $\$ 1,000$
hamburger."
Leesburg Commissioner Elise Dennison is a strong proponent for projects boosting economic impact at the airport, and she recalled ond memories of watching planes take off and and at a small airport by her New Jersey childhood hometown.
"It was a small airport, smaller than Leesburg, but I tell you what, ver since that first time, I wanted to fly and think hat by bringing in the kids and the families to watch the planes take off and the helicopters, it is oing to bring in a lot of interest to the airport," Dennison said, thrilled by the latest plans to inlude an aviation museum with the café.
"This is great; the Leesburg airport has a tre mendous amount of history in that it was a prisoner of war camp, a Norld War II facility, so there is a lot of history there."

"It should come as no surprise that these suspects have extensive criminal records," Polk Sheriff Grady Judd said. "Had they been in prison, they could not have robbed these banks. Our criminal justice system is the best in the world, but it is a forgiving system that too frequently allows repeat criminals too many chances, which results in people getting hurt and property being stolen."

MIAMI BEACH - Florida's largest gay rights group endorsed Charie Crist for gove nor Thursday, boosting the liberal credentials of a budding Democrat and former Republican who once opposed gay marriage.
Equality Florida officials made the announcement at a visitors center for gays and lesbians in Miami Beach, citing Crist's current support for same-sex marriage and ongoing legal efforts to overturn the states ban on the unions. The
Human Rights Campaign, the Human Rights Campaign, the
nation's largest gay rights group,
also endorsed Crist. "The early endorsement reflects the urgency of electing a governor who will speed progress when it comes to equaliness," said Stratton Pollitzer, chairman of the Equality Florida's political action committee. Republican Gov. Rick Scott has said he supports the state's constitutional amendment defining marriage as between man and a woman
The endorsements are a boon for Crist, who still faces a primary challenge from former state Sen Nan Rich, a liberal stalwart who has long championed gay rights rights

Militants vow to march on Baghdad

BAGHDAD - The al-Qaida-inspired group that led this week's charge in capturing two key Sunni-dominated cities in Iraq vowed Thursday to march on to Baghdad, raising fears about the Shiite-led government's ability to slow the assault following lightning gains.
Signs emerged that the Islamic State of Iraq and Levant is backed in its campaign by former military officers and other members of ousted dictator Saddam Hussein's regime including a force led by Izzat Ibrahim al-Douri, the late leader's former deputy who escaped the 2003 U.S.-led invasion Iraqi forces ever since. As world leaders expressed alarm over the destabilization of large parts of the country by fighters from the militant group known as the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant, the U.N. ## UK court says terror trial can be partly secret

LONDON — A British court ruled Thursday that the bulk of a terror ism trial can be held in secret on national security grounds, but rejected prosecutors' attempt to impose secrecy on the entire case, from the selection of the jury to the identity of the defendants.
Media organizations had argued that would be a first in British legal history, and a dangerous precedent.
The case concerns two men who were arrested last year and charged with terrorism
offenses. Prosecutors argued they would have to abandon the case if the trial could not be held in private and without naming the dewithout na
Last month a judge agreed to the restrictions, but the ruling was challenged by the BBC and other media organizations. Their lawyer Anthony Hudson, called the secrecy bid a "totally

## Is Russia

 ready to back off in Ukraine?t's too early to declare an end to the crisis in Ukraine, where pro-Russia separatists continue, sometimes violently, to resist
the authority of the central government. But the authority of the central government. But

PresidentViktor Yanukovich illegal, indicated PresidentViktor Yanukovich illegal, indicated

ko. Russia's ambassador attended Poroshenko's ko. Russia's ambassador attended Poroshenko's

the crisis in eastern Ukraine and on the supply the crisis in eastern Ukraine and or
of Russian natural gas to Ukraine.

Poroshenko, a wealthy businessman, told Putin at a D-day remembrance ceremony that he doesn't accept the legitimacy of Russia's annexation in March of Crimea, a region that had been a part of Ukraine for the previous 60 years (although there is little he can do to undo it). The new president also has said he will forge links with Western Europe of the sort sought by many, if not all, Ukrainians. But Poroshenko also has acknowledged that Russia has an interest in the political future of Ukraine, and said in his inaugural address that he was willing to see greater political autonomy for pro-Russia regions. For its part, Russia has moderated its rhetoric and Putin has indicated he will make it harder for Russians to cross into Ukraine to support the separatists.

The crucial test of Russia's sincerity may be whether it will accept - or at least acquiesce in - a decision by Poroshenko (should it become necessary) to use force against separatists who have occupied official buildings and sometimes clashed with government forces in eastern Ukraine. Ideally, such a confrontation would be avoided, but one way or another, the rebels must eventually stand down and accept Poroshenko's offer of amnesty for insurgents who have "no blood on their hands." After the annexation of Crimea, there was anxious speculation that Putin's desire to re-create at least part of the Russian empire would lead to other land grabs. So far that hasn't occurred. Perhaps Putin always regarded Crimea as a special case, but it's equally likely that sanctions imposed by the U.S. and its European allies - and the threat of more significant punishment - had the intended effect. As President Obama said during the Crimean crisis, Ukraine isn't a "Cold War chessboard"; it's an independent country with a complicated history that ought to be allowed to determine its own affairs even as it seeks good relations with its neighbors, including Russia. That is a reality that Putin must recognize

There are many special people here, but I have to tell you about one standout. We coun on her for many things.
Mary is younger than some of us but has her share of health

Electron ic gadgets baffle most of us, but she understands them so we depend on her when we ose our way in the lab yrinth of cell phones and the Internet. It is very reassuring to know she is there to answer our questions. She nev er loses patience with us even when we forge what she tells us. Mary volunteers at the hospital when her own health permits. She helps edit our newsletter, picks up our dinner tickets and drives us to our bi-monthly dinner out. She picks up pizzas for our pizza parties and does a myriad of other things to make our live easier. Aside from hav ing an occasional dinner paid for, her reward is our undying thanks or her efforts.
Have you noticed the proliferation of thrift
alize that most of them rely heavily on volunteers? Anyone who works as a store clerk will tell you that they work hard for their money. Clerks in thrift stores usually don't ge paid but work solely fo the joy of helping others.
Have you eaten at God's Cafe in Leesburg? If you haven't, I recom mend it. The food is ex cellent, and it is a great place to have your or ganizational breakfast and luncheons. If you're hungry and can't afford the price of a meal, you can eat there and walk away with your hunger satisfied, your bill paid for and your pride intact.
Here's an idea. If you have blood work done and have been fasting for hours, stop by God's Cafe afterward for a good breakfast. If you have money to pay for your meal, you can just leave it on the table. The service is good, and when you pay for your meal you help to

weeks before I had the pleasure of riding the old Devil to a Sunday School picnic at Silver Springs. I believe that was one of the happies days of my life."
The train's arrival helped jumpstart Leesburg's downtown building boom.
On Main Street prior to the train's arrival, "low, plain wooden buildings, mostly of one story, ranged along one wide, sandy street, according to George M Barbour, a reporter for the Chicago Times, who described what 188081 Leesburg looked in his book, "Florida for Tourists, Invalids and Settlers."
Sid Smith, the mu-
ral's painter, was young when he began painting. He graduated from a Sarasota high school and attended chools in Tampa and schools in Tampa and
New York.
"I started out as a kid painting outdoor advertising pictures for Coca Cola," he said in 1984 Daily Commercial story. "I've never done
anything else (but art) Once, for a week I was laid off, and the next week I got a job in the theater."
The advertising ca-
reer in theater led Smith to meeting scores of movie celebrities, including Clark Gable, Ona Munson, Claudette Colbert, Leslie Howard, Car ole Lombard and oth er stars of the late 1930s and early 1940s film and early 1940s film film by lettering the art itles and subtitles for tiles and subtitles for silent films.
Smith moved south and landed a job as the person in charge of a Paramount Theater in Miami, after sound came to movies around 1928. He even produced a few films during those years. After about seven years, he got a job as an artist and advertising man for Atlanta's Lowe's Theaters.
