### Fly in and dine out

### Leesburg airport backers consider building a cafe and museum

roponents of Leesburg International Airport hope plans take off to build the Leesburg Hangar Café and Museum to attract more pilots to fly in from all over the area for a bite to eat — and attract folks here in Lake County to come out and dine as they watch planes and helicopters take off

"This would definitely be a great addition to the airport," said Leo Treggi, who oversees operations at the airport, home to 40 tenants and 600 employees.

The estimated \$2 million project is being backed by several airport tenants who are forming a limited liability company, and if all goes well, Treggi said the restaurant/museum could be built and open in nine to 12 months.

"We have a lot of activity that is already there and a restaurant at the airport would give more exposure to the airport for Leesburg residents," Mayor John Christian said.

Christian recently joined pilot Chuck Brainerd on a helicopter ride over to Thyme Fly's Bistro at the Ocala International Airport to experience the thrill of dining on the airport grounds

and watch the action in the small aviation world.

"This would actually give more exposure to the airport for Leesburg residents," Christian said of a restaurant here. "Many people have no idea how the airport operates or the crown jewel that we have in Leesburg and Lake County.

The mayor believes local residents would relish a similar experience.

"It would give a different perspective for non-aviation residents to be able to come out and see airplanes, see helicopters and to see the activity at

### **Court tosses Sumter murder** conviction

Carl Dausch was sentenced to die 25 years after slaying

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Supreme Court on Thursday threw out the conviction of an Indiana man sentenced to death 25 years after a slaying that had no suspects until DNA on a cigarette butt was re-examined years after the crime.

The court ruled that the evidence against Carl Dausch wasn't sufficient to convict him of the July 1987 murder of Adrian Mobley. Dausch was placed on death row in 2012.

While he now longer faces execution in Florida, Dausch will

WASHINGTON — A Romanian hacker is facing charges that he hacked into the Facebook or email accounts of high-ranking U.S. government officials and a relative of two former presidents.

Marcel Lehel Lazar, the hacker known as "Guccifer" who has been linked to the release of private Bush family photos, was indicted Thursday by a federal grand jury in Virginia.

Lazar, 42, faces charges including wire fraud, unauthorized comput-

Leesburg," he said, also pleased the restaurant's museum would allow visitors a chance to learn more about Leesburg's pivotal role in national history of when the airport's land was as a prisoner of war camp during World War II.

The mayor said Leesburg has one advantage over Ocala in that the local airport is nestled in the city's busiest transportation corridor on U.S. Highway 441, making it easier to attract residents to come out and dine, including employees of the surrounding car dealerships. "The airport generates \$79.8 million a year in economic impact to the community," added Dave Lewis, chairman of the Leesburg International

Airport Advisory Board, citing 2010 figures from the Florida Department of Transportation. Davis said the addition of an airport restaurant/museum is bound to provide a bigger economic boost by attracting more visitors and pilots flying in for

"It's an excellent idea and about a half a dozen airports in Florida have airport restaurants and they generate activity and recognition and awareness factor of the airport by the community," Lewis said, noting the project is being backed by "a handful of tenants that are agreeing to help fund this." Once it moves forward, he said the group would call in a professional with experience at running a restaurant.

"It's not a small project but I think that it is well worth it for the airport and for the city," Lewis said.

Brainerd recently told

the city commission when he surveyed other airport restaurants, he learned 90 percent of the business comes from folks within the community.

"They are very successful," he said as they give diners a chance to enjoy breakfast, lunch or dinner while watching action at the airport.

"There have been a lot of people who have become pilots because of being around an airport," Brainerd said, recalling back when he and his brother used to fly with their late father to Tampa and they would eat at a greasy spoon shack featuring hot dogs and chili.

"It was some good memories," he said. "Back when I was young, they used to call it the \$100 hamburger because you fly to go eat a hamburger, and by the time you got back it was \$100 in gasoline and now we call it a \$1,000

hamburger."

Leesburg Commissioner Elise Dennison is a strong proponent for projects boosting economic impact at the airport, and she recalled fond memories of watching planes take off and land at a small airport by her New Jersey childhood hometown.

"It was a small airport, smaller than Leesburg, but I tell you what, ever since that first time, I wanted to fly and think that by bringing in the kids and the families to watch the planes take off and the helicopters, it is going to bring in a lot of interest to the airport," Dennison said, thrilled by the latest plans to include an aviation museum with the café.

"This is great; the Leesburg airport has a tremendous amount of history in that it was a prisoner of war camp, a World War II facility, so there is a lot of history there."

Both men also face various drug possession charges.

Wandell was charged previously vith grand theft, larceny and battery, the sheriff's report said, while Guthridge has previously been charged with fraud, burglary and larceny.

"It should come as no surprise that these suspects have extensive criminal records," Polk Sheriff Grady Judd said. "Had they been in prison, they could not have robbed these banks. Our criminal justice system is the best in the world, but it is a forgiving system that too frequently allows repeat criminals too many chances, which results in people getting hurt and property being stolen."

### Eric Hill, creator of Spot the Dog, dies at 86

SAN FRANCISCO — Eric Hill, whose

pleton after a short illness, said Adele Minchin, a spokeswoman for his publisher, Penguin Children's Group. His first book, "Where's Spot?" — with its clean design, whimsical characters,

and bold, bright colors — was an instant success with preschool children when it hit store shelves in 1980. It told the gentle tale of Spot's mother, Sally, as she goes on a search for him around the house but finds a hippo, a lion and other creatures along the way.

Hill is survived by his wife, Gillian; his son, Christopher; and his daughter, Jane.

#### Federal funding approved for citrus greening research

ST. PETERSBURG — Federal agriculture officials said Thursday that they are allocating millions of dollars toward research to solve problems caused by the devastating citrus greening bacteria that threatens Florida's \$9 billion citrus industry.

United States Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack told The Associated Press in a statement that \$25 million in funding comes from the 2014 Farm Bill. Another \$6.5 million will be sent to projects through a group formed to combat greening.



### Bergdahl scheduled to arrive in Texas today

WASHINGTON — Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl, who has been recovering in Germany after five years as a Taliban captive, is returning to the United States today, but he will not receive the promotion that would have been automatic had he still been held prisoner.

Rear Adm. John Kirby, the Pentagon press secretary, said Thursday that Bergdahl had left Germany on board a U.S. military aircraft and was expected to arrive at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas, this morning.

A U.S. official, meanwhile, said the promotion list, which would have boosted Bergdahl to staff sergeant, was expected to be released this week and he would not be on it.







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### UK court says terror trial can be partly secret

**JILL LAWLESS** 

LONDON — A British court ruled Thursday that the bulk of a terrorism trial can be held in secret on national security grounds, but rejected prosecutors' attempt to impose secrecy on the entire case, from the selection of the jury to the identity of the defendants.

Media organizations had argued that would be a first in British legal history, and a dangerous precedent.

The case concerns two men who were arrested last year and charged with terrorism offenses. Prosecutors argued they would have to abandon the case if the trial could not be held in private and without naming the defendants.

Last month a judge agreed to the restrictions, but the ruling was challenged by the BBC and other media organizations. Their lawyer, Anthony Hudson, called the secrecy bid a "totally unprecedented departure from the principle of open justice."

On Thursday three appeals judges ruled that the case was "exceptional," and that the core of the trial should be heard without the public present. They said they were convinced that "the adthe trial were to be held

in open court."

But, in a victory for the media, they said some sections would be held in public, including the jury swearing-in, the reading of the charges, part of the prosecution's opening statement and the verdicts.

A small number of journalists will be allowed to attend most of the proceedings, but not to report on them as they unfold. They will be subject to strict restrictions, ing leaving their notebooks behind at the end of each day, and will not be able to report on the trial until a new court order is given.

The judges expressed "grave concern" about combining closed hearings with anonymous defendants, and ordered that the names of the suspects be released.

The defendants, previously named as AB and CD, were then identified as Erol Incedal and Mounir Rarmoul-Bouhadjar. Incedal is charged with preparing an act of terrorism and possessing bomb-making instructions and Rarmoul-Bouhadjar possessing the instructions and false identi-

# Is Russia ready to back off in Ukraine?

t's too early to declare an end to the crisis in Ukraine, where pro-Russia separatists continue, sometimes violently, to resist the authority of the central government. But in recent days there have been encouraging signs that Russia is willing to respect and negotiate seriously with Ukraine's newly inaugurated president, Petro Poroshenko.

Russian President Vladimir Putin, who had earlier called the ouster of former Ukrainian President Viktor Yanukovich illegal, indicated shortly before the election that he would accept the result of the vote that elected Poroshenko. Russia's ambassador attended Poroshenko's inauguration. More substantively, Russia and Ukraine have been conducting negotiations on the crisis in eastern Ukraine and on the supply of Russian natural gas to Ukraine.

Poroshenko, a wealthy businessman, told Putin at a D-day remembrance ceremony that he doesn't accept the legitimacy of Russia's annexation in March of Crimea, a region that had been a part of Ukraine for the previous 60 years (although there is little he can do to undo it). The new president also has said he will forge links with Western Europe of the sort sought by many, if not all, Ukrainians. But Poroshenko also has acknowledged that Russia has an interest in the political future of Ukraine, and said in his inaugural address that he was willing to see greater political autonomy for pro-Russia regions. For its part, Russia has moderated its rhetoric and Putin has indicated he will make it harder for Russians to cross into Ukraine to support the separatists.

The crucial test of Russia's sincerity may be whether it will accept — or at least acquiesce in — a decision by Poroshenko (should it become necessary) to use force against separatists who have occupied official buildings and sometimes clashed with government forces in eastern Ukraine. Ideally, such a confrontation would be avoided, but one way or another, the rebels must eventually stand down and accept Poroshenko's offer of amnesty for insurgents who have "no blood on their hands."

After the annexation of Crimea, there was anxious speculation that Putin's desire to re-create at least part of the Russian empire would lead to other land grabs. So far that hasn't occurred. Perhaps Putin always regarded Crimea as a special case, but it's equally likely that sanctions imposed by the U.S. and its European allies — and the threat of more significant punishment — had the intended effect.

As President Obama said during the Crimean crisis, Ukraine isn't a "Cold War chessboard"; it's an independent country with a complicated history that ought to be allowed to determine its own affairs even as it seeks good relations with its neighbors, including Russia. That is a reality that Putin must recognize.



### Is America ready for Hillary?

expected nothing but effusive praise from major media for Hillary Clinton's new book, "Hard Choices," much like the mass exaltation it showered on Barack Obama, America's first African-American president.

Initially that seemed where the reviews were headed.

Prior to the book's official release June 10, the "journalists" on CBS "This Morning" spent nine minutes of barely restrained excitement promoting Clinton's book. Host Charlie Rose called it "a portrait of doggedness." CBS News political director John Dickerson said the book portrays "a hardworking person who flew all around the world grinding it out."

The same might be said of Miley Cyrus.

Dickerson added, "The volume of this book is meant in a political context to suggest that the voters can put the world in her hands. She sees the complexity and understands it."

This suggests a possible campaign theme song: "She's got the whole world in her hands."

For reasons yet to be determined — maybe they read the book; I admit I've only read excerpts at this point — the liberal worms began to turn. Dickerson subsequently reversed himself, calling the book "a risk-free telling of Clinton's world travels" and a "low-salt, low-fat, low-calorie offering with vanilla pudding as the dessert. She goes on at great length, but not great depth."

David Ignatius, a foreign policy writer for *The Washington Post*, said Mrs. Clinton "is seen as hesitant to take big risks," and "there are times when the reader feels he is being spun, rather than enlightened," and "in these many hundreds of pages, there are very few deals concluded, agreements signed, policies brought to fruition." Ignatius added that Mrs. Clinton is "well-stocked with campaign bromides."

Last Sunday's *Washington Post* published a poll that showed

59 percent of those interviewed have a favorable view of Clinton's leadership as secretary of state. Yet no one seems able to cite any real accomplishments. When asked a few weeks ago in a news conference about Clinton's accomplishments, Jen Psaki, the State Department's chief spokesperson, couldn't answer. Psaki returned the next day loaded with "examples," which seemed to have been prepared for her by a Clinton operative. Still, the examples did not impress.

The Republican National Committee has provided a counterpoint to Hillary Clinton's book, giving it the cheeky title "Bad Choices." It compiles what diplomats, commentators and even a few media people have said about her. Surprisingly, NBC political director Chuck Todd (a former aide to Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa) said: "Frankly, many of the issues from her time at the department have either stayed

bad, or gotten worse."

Former Bill Clinton adviser Douglas Schoen wrote in *The Wall Street Journal* last December: "Another major obstacle is Mrs. Clinton's foreign policy record: She can point to no significant accomplishments as secretary of state."

Curiously, writes Byron York, columnist for the *Washington Examiner*, the book ignores Hillary's brief Senate career, perhaps because its one distinguishing mark was her vote in favor of George W. Bush's invasion of Iraq. She now says that vote was a "mistake." Senators have a bigger margin for error than presidents.

If she runs, it will be difficult, but not impossible, for a male Republican candidate to debate and defeat her. In addition to being supported by much of the media (trust me, they'll come around), she will have the support of a substantial number of women just because of the historical factor. A too-aggressive approach by a male opponent might inflame those women who think she is a martyr for putting up with her philandering husband.

Still, a Republican male candidate might gain traction if he points out that we will be finishing two terms of a president who has mastered style over substance. Can we really afford another when we face so many problems, not to mention Hillary's poor track record as first lady (health care defeated), secretary of state (a frequent flyer but little else) and senator (nothing)?

"Ready for Hillary" is the name of an unauthorized super PAC formed by Clinton supporters last January. The assumption is that we'll answer in the affirmative. But given her abysmal record, if that is what she's being judged on, we're definitely not ready.







### Martin Kaymer seizes US Open lead with 65

It was a debut that might never have occurred had Viola not been diagnosed with having an enlarged ta during a preseason physical undergo-

ing open-heart surgery in April to correct the problem. "My

very thought was that I was going to be letting down the team in Las Vegas," Viola told the Las Vegas Review-Journal. "Then, I took a breath and thought, 'I might die.' I was petrified."

Having to endure open-heart surgery was the last in a series of personal setbacks for Viola in a span of less than two months.

In February, his father died at age 86 and 26 days later, his mother passed at age 85.

Then, in late March, Viola received a telephone call from doctors that told him of his potentially life-threatening heart ailment, which was discov-

ered by doctors during a routine preseason physical.

"The doctors said it was something could have lived with the next 10

or 15 years or I could have been thronging batting practice the next day, keeled over, had an aneurysm and died," Viola said. "I think it was God's way of saying, 'Don't ever let yourself get to this point again.'

"I was 40 pounds overweight, doing and eating all the wrong things. I also think there was a little divine intervention. I don't think Mom and Dad wanted to see me up

### Police and World Cup protesters clash in Brazil

SAO PAULO - Protesters and Brazilian police clashed in Sao Paulo, Rio de Janeiro and another World Cup city on Thursday ahead of the first match of soccer's premier event.

Just after the match started, about 300 protesters demonstrating against the World Cup marched along Rio's Copacabana beach and stopped outside the FIFA Fan Fest — a closed and secured area on the beach where hundreds of fans are watching the match on a massive screen.

The protesters were carrying banners with slogans knocking the Cup. The protest was peaceful, but there were worries that violence could break out as several adherents to the anarchist "Black Bloc' tactic were seen in the crowd of demonstrators in Copacabana.



live in one of those notoriously predictable over-55 communities. It is one of the oldest such communities in Lake County and there are still many of Tom Brokaw's "Greatest Generation" living here. They care for pets, mow lawns, fix lamps, screw in light bulbs, share about special new stores, drive you to the doctor and help with meals, cleaning and shopping. It is really inspirational.

There are many special people here, but I have to tell you about one standout. We count on her for many things.

Mary is younger than some of us but has her share of health problems. She treats us all like older sisters.

She understands our weaknesses because she took care of her mother during her declining years. Electronic gadgets baffle most of us, but she understands them so we depend on her when we lose our way in the labvrinth of cell phones and the Internet. It is very reassuring to know she is there to answer our questions. She never loses patience with us even when we forget what she tells us.

Mary volunteers at the hospital when her own health permits. She helps edit our newsletter, picks up our dinner tickets and drives us to our bi-monthly dinner out. She picks up pizzas for our pizza parties and does a myriad of other things to make our lives easier. Aside from having an occasional dinner paid for, her reward is our undying thanks for her efforts.

Have you noticed the proliferation of thrift

stores lately? Do you realize that most of them rely heavily on volunteers? Anyone who works as a store clerk will tell you that they work hard for their money. Clerks in thrift stores usually don't get paid but work solely for the joy of helping oth-

Have you eaten at God's Cafe in Leesburg? If you haven't, I recommend it. The food is excellent, and it is a great place to have your organizational breakfasts and luncheons. If you're hungry and can't afford the price of a meal, you can eat there and walk away with your hunger satisfied, your bill paid for and your pride in-

have blood work done and have been fasting for hours, stop by God's Cafe afterward for a good breakfast. If you have money to pay for your meal, you can just leave it on the table. The service is good, and when you pay for your meal you help to

### The Leesburg mural captures town's history

eesburg's early history was captured in a 40-foot mural that hangs in the community building in Venetian Gardens. Sid Smith painted the mural on five panels. It's time to look at the third slice of history.

Like the second panel, this one depicts transportation. It contains two scenes important to Leesburg history: the arrival of the first train and the first steamboat.

Let's look at them chronologically, using the script from the mural's dedication in 1975.

"Aiken Stivender, son of Gilly Lee Stivender, cleared the channel in the Ocklawaha River, to Lake Griffin, and built a large landing barge. Later a wharf warehouse was built in the same location and the first boat, owned by Col. Hart, landed at the terminal November 10, 1867," began the description. "The Bauknight family also placed boats on the river."

Clearing the channel was no small project. The winding river, which was said to look like a twisted black snake, was full of logs and snags. Aiken Stivender, a nephew of Evander Lee, was hired to do the job. Within a short time he built a barge he called the Dry Dock and cleared the river.

Col. Hart landed his first steamboat, the Oklawaha, on the shore of Lake Griffin on Nov. 10, 1867. His cargo included freight and three Yankee tourists. The passage was so successful that the Bauknights, who would open the first men's clothing store in Leesburg, put three or four boats into service, according to William Kennedy's history of Lake County, and Hart added another steamer.

Gilly Lee Stivender, the widowed sister of Evander, opened what would later be called the Leesburg House and then the Leesburg Hotel. It was a plain cypress house, according to F. Wilson Kaler in a story that ran in the Florida Times Union in 1922. He wrote, "Many a weary man or woman, coming into the little village on horseback or by ox-team, were given royal entertainment and a hospitable welcome beneath its sheltering roof."

It later became part of the Lake View Hotel.

The top portion of the panel shows the first train to visit Leesburg.

"In 1883 the Florida Southern Railroad began work to extend its line from Ocala to Leesburg," according to the script. "At 4 p.m.

on Sunday, January 20, 1884 the first train pulled into Leesburg over a narrow gauge track. Residents came from miles around for the event; history records that horses ran away and children hid in the bushes at the sound of the snorting engine. The first passenger to get off the train was an organ grinder with his monkey on a chain."

When plans were being made to extend the line from Ocala to Leesburg, some doubters were sure the "iron horse" would never arrive. Despite the skepticism, many Leesburg residents gathered to watch the arrival of the first train.

Chester Lee, a grandson of Evander, witnessed that arrival and wrote about it in a history of Leesburg.

"I shall never forget as a small boy seeing the first train coming down the track huffing, blowing the whistle and ringing the bell," wrote Lee. "I thought it was the Devil after me so I ran and jumped over the fence into the house, shut the door and told everyone to get under the bed, the Devil was coming. It was not many

weeks before I had the pleasure of riding the old Devil to a Sunday School picnic at Silver Springs. I believe that was one of the happiest days of my life."

The train's arrival helped jumpstart Leesburg's downtown building boom.

On Main Street prior to the train's arrival, "low, plain wooden buildings, mostly of one story, ranged along one wide, sandy street,' according to George M. Barbour, a reporter for the Chicago Times, who described what 1880-81 Leesburg looked in his book, "Florida for Tourists, Invalids and

Settlers. Sid Smith, the mural's painter, was young when he began painting. He graduated from a Sarasota high school and attended art schools in Tampa and New York.

"I started out as a kid, painting outdoor advertising pictures for Coca Cola," he said in a 1984 Daily Commercial story. "I've never done

anything else (but art). Once, for a week I was laid off, and the next week I got a job in the theater."

The advertising career in theater led Smith to meeting scores of movie celebrities, including Clark Gable, Ona Munson, Claudette Colbert, Leslie Howard, Carole Lombard and other stars of the late 1930s and early 1940s film era. He got started in film by lettering the art titles and subtitles for silent films.

Smith moved south and landed a job as the person in charge of a Paramount Theater in Miami, after sound came to movies around 1928. He even produced a few films during those years. After about seven years, he got a job as an artist and advertising man for Atlanta's Lowe's Theaters.

### **Looking for a raise? Certain industries do well**

NEW YORK — If you hope to get a raise that finally feels like one, it helps to work in the right industry.

Historically, at this stage in the economy's recovery, pay would be rising in most sectors. But five years after the Great Recession officially ended, raises remain uneven across industries and, as a whole, have barely kept up with prices. Pay has been rising about 2 percent a year, roughly equal to inflation.

The best raises have gone to workers with few booming industries — energy, transportation, health care, been less fortunate.

"If you're in an in-demand field, with the right skill set, the chance of getting a raise is much higher," says Katie Bardaro, an economist at PayScale, a pay-tracking firm.

Typically in a recovery, raises in a few industries lead to raises in others as workers become confident enough to quit one job for another for more pay.

This time, the subpar recovery has slowed pay gains. Technology has played a role, too. It's lifted pay for people who work, for example, with programs that sift data from your mobile devices so companies can pitch products matched to your interests. Yet workers in industries upended by the Internet, such as retailers left behind by e-commerce, have been hurt.

Here are industry standouts — and laggards — on pay:

**OIL AND GAS**

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

Recent pricing data suggests that inflation may be picking up from very low levels.



### Study finds that negative view of housing market persists

Seven years after the housing crash began, most people remain deeply dour about the state of the nation's housing market. A new survey out this week from

the MacArthur Foundation found that 70 percent of Americans still believe a housing crisis remains today or that "the worst is yet to come." Although that's lower than the 77 percent who felt that way a year ago, it suggests that double-digit percentage price gains in the past year haven't inspired much confidence. Indeed, more than 40 percent of survey respondents said that the housing market remains a "serious" problem for the economy. And that's translating into a shift of



opinion on the role of housing in personal finances, too. Respondents to the survey, which polled 1,355 people by phone in April, were nearly split on whether buying a house still represents an "excellent long-term investment." Half of respondents said it still is a good investment; 43 percent said that is no longer the case.

Nearly two-thirds said it has become harder to build wealth through homeownership than it was 20 or 30 years ago. Meanwhile, a majority said that renting a home has become more appealing in the past few decades while buying one has become

Indeed, it would appear the traumatic housing market of the past few years may be changing the longheld link between homeownership and the so-called American Dream. Some 58 percent of respondents and 66 percent of those aged 18 to 34 — said that renters can be "just as successful" at achieving the American Dream as homeowners can. Nevertheless, 70 percent of current

renters — and 85 percent of people aged 18 to 34 — still aspire to own a home someday.


